

ST MARY'S CHELTENHAM PARISH RECORDS TRANSCRIPTION PROJECT 1558-1804

Occupations

Occupations are seldom recorded, so the absence of an occupation does not mean that it was not present in the community. It would seem that when they were recorded, they were used to indicate a particular person of the same fore- and surname as another or that the person held some status in the community. Two periods are particularly well documented: to a lesser extent the first decade of the 17th century while the period September 1714 to April 1716 provides a better sample.

The table below sets out the presence of occupations in the area, between 1558 and 1653 contrasted with those post-1667 to 1804.
