MINUTE'S of the Proceedings of the Committees of the Town Council to be submitted for approval at a Meeting of the Council, to be held on Monday, the 5th of January, 1891.

STREET AND HIGHWAY COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Tuesday, the 9th day of December, 1890—Present Aldermen Griffith and Simms-Bull; Councillors Darby, Heath, Lawrence and Steel (Alderman Simms-Bull in the chair)—

—Tree Sub-Committee—Resolved, That the Chairman, Alderman Griffith, and Councillors Heath, Lawrence and King be the Tree Sub-Committee of this Committee for the ensuing year.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Tuesday, the 30th day of December, 1890—Present: Aldermen Griffith and Simms-Bull; Councillors Heath, King, Steel and Lawrence (Alderman Simms-Bull in the chair)—

- 2 -- Gas Examiner's Monthly Report—The Monthly Report of the Gas Examiner was read: average illuminating power 16.29 candles, sulphur 10.53 grains per 100 cubic feet.
- 3—Gas Inspector's Monthly Report—The Monthly Report of the Gas Inspector was read average hourly consumption of gas per lamp, during the month 4.213 cubic feet Total consumption in new lamps during the period from 5th to 27th December 3030 cubic feet.
- 4— Lamp Book—The Book kept at the Police Station was produced and examined. Lamps extinguished during the month 260 (including 9 metered); burning dimly 102.

5----Sulphur Tests—A letter from Messrs. Griffiths, the Clerks to the Gas Company, stating that the Directors desired them to say that the increased quantity of sulphur reported last month appeared to have been attributable to the action of the purifiers, they would, however, assure the Council that no trouble or expense is spared by the Company in endeavouring to reduce the prescribed maximum of sulphur, which is 30 grains, to the lowest possible quantity, was read.

6-Improved Lamps—A letter from Messrs Griffiths, forwarding copy of the following resolution passed by the Directors of the Gas Company and the resolution were read:—" That the Town Council be informed, in reply to their enquiry, that the actual cost of the six months lighting of the improved lamps has been found to be slightly in excess of the approximate cost of per lamp per annum communicated to the Town Council in May last, and that if the Company had charged for the lighting, the maximum price would have been at the rate of £5 3s. 6d. per lamp per annum.

Resolved, That the Corporation, being desirous of giving the new lamps a further trial for a period of six months from the 1st January, are willing to pay the Company at the rate of £5 per lamp per annum, the present rate of consumption not to be lessened.

7—St. George's Road—Bridge over G.W. Railway—This matter having been referred back to the Committee by the Council, was again considered. The Surveyor read a letter he had received from Mr. Lancaster Owen, the Company's Engineer, stating that he was not quite in a position to commence the building of the New Station forthwith, and would therefore prefer if it is practicable, to come to an understanding with the Council as to this Bridge so as to include it in the same contract, he had therefore made an estimate of the cost of the Council's proposal that the New Bridge should be 36 feet wide and found it amounted to £450, and desiring to know if the Town Council would be prepared to pay that sum to the Company provided the latter undertake to widen the Bridge as suggested. Resolved, That unless the Company are prepared to widen the Bridge to 36 feet, the Committee cannot permit any interference with the existing roadway.

8—Crossings at Sandford Street—A memorial from Edwin Agg and others calling attention to the great need of a crossing in a line with Mitre Street, and also at the top of Sandford Street leading from St. Luke's Place to the upper end of Bath Parade, was read, and the matter adjourned to enable the Committee to view.

9—Urinal at St. George's Square—Memorials from Mr. James Leighton and others and Miss Simms and others, praying for the removal of this urinal and suggesting the piece of land belonging to the Corporation at the corner of Ambrose Street and New Street as a suitable site for it, was read. Resolved, That the Committee are not prepared to recommend the erection of a Urinal on the plot of land above mentioned, also that the question of the removal of the existing Urinal is one for the consideration of the Public Health Committee to whom the Memorials be referred.

10—Lighting of Ewlyn Road—A memorial from Mr. J. D. Bendall and others calling attention to the need of a gas lamp in Ewlyn Road where considerable building operations are in contemplation, and which road, though much used as a thoroughfare, is wholly unlighted, was read. Resolved, That the matter be adjourned to enable the Committee to view.

11—Trees on Chelt Bank—Harford's Trustees—A letter from Messrs F. and E. Griffiths, the solicitors to Harford's Trustees, stating that they could not concur in the Town Clerk's interpretation of the correspondence in 1887; and that their clients claimed the whole length of the land enclosed within the fence bounding the footpath as far as the middle of the river, from, on the East, the Eastern boundary of Perry's meadow to College Road and from College Road to the bridge leading to 433, High Street, and that the trees on such land are their property. That upon the distinct understanding that the recent action of the Corporation shall not be quoted as a precedent in support of any claim of right on their part, and that the damage to the fence is made good and the gate put up as desired their clients are willing to treat the case as one of inadvertence, and on this occasion to take no further action; at the same time their clients desired them to say that they expect the value of the tree removed to be paid to their agents, Messrs. Young and Gilling, and to have the right to place any gates in any portion of the fence they might think proper, was read. Resolved, That the Committee quite accept the understanding above mentioned, with which, however, the payment of the value of the brushwood, although trifling in amount, would be inconsistent, at the same time the Committee raise no objection to the removal by Messrs. Harford of the branches which were left on their land.

12--Bridge over the Chelt at Central Depot—A letter from Gen. Mackenzie expressing his thanks to the Council for the permission accorded to him in this matter, which permission he accepted on the conditions named in the resolution of the Committee, and also a letter from Mr. J. Burns desiring permission to retain the planks which form a path across the Chelt from his garden to the Central Depot agreeing to remove the same at any future time on receiving notice, and stating that he was quite prepared to find shrubs to be planted on the land at the rear of Broughton Lodge, were read. Resolved, That the Committee having re-considered the whole question of the placing of bridges or planks over the Chelt to the property of the Corporation, and having regard to the application of Mr. Burns above and others of a similar nature which would probably be made they have determined to recommend not to permit a bridge of any description to be placed between private property and the property of the Corporation, but that the applicants be informed that it is not the intention of the Corporation to remove any trees or shrubs, but on the contrary they will probably extend the planting along the bank.

13—Damage to Horse and Trap—Jeynes—Letters from Mr. C. Jeynes of Barnwood, Gloucester, reporting an accident which befell him on the 20th ulto. whilst driving his horse and trap near the Gordon Memorial Lamp at Montpellier, caused as he alleged by the horse bolting at the noise

occasioned by the felling of a tree in Montpellier Terrace, and requesting the Corporation to allow him £5 towards the injury caused to the horse and trap, and also to himself and another, were read. Resolved, That the matter be adjourned to enable the Town Clerk to consider the evidence in the case.

14— Election Bills—A letter from Mr. Witchell of Clanfield Villa, commenting upon the unsightly and depreciating effect the numerous Bills posted up at Election times have to visitors and the general public, by being allowed to remain hanging in shreds and strips for months after the Elections and trusting the matter would be considered by the Committee, with a view to the future improvement in the appearance of the town, was read. Resolved, That Mr. Witchell be informed the matter shall receive attention.

15—Street Projections—A letter from Mr. A. Davis, adverting to the notice given to him to remove the Sign Board put np at IS, Park Street, and submitting sketch of a proposed Flat Board and Sign Brush, to be put up in lieu of the present one, seas read Resolved, That permission be given to erect the new Sign, subject to the right of the Council to order its removal at any time they may think fit to do so.

A Report from the Street Inspector was read, sheaving that the following Signs, &c. had been put up during the month without the sanction of the Council. Messrs Bayley & Jones, two removable Lamps at 6, Pittville Street. Plough Hotel Co., Gas Lamp in front of Hotel. Mr. G. Oliver, two removable Gas Rails in front of 346, High Street. Mr. C. Boyce, Sign Board at 12, Montpellier Street.

Resolved, That the consideration of these matters be adjourned to enable the Committee to view.

16—Surveyor's Monthly Report re Highways—The Surveyor reported that the following Works had been done in his Department daring the past month:—Repairs: Patching and Backing-up Crossings—Suffolk Road, near Park Place, 540 feet; Suffolk Road, near Painswick Lawn, 700 feet; Lypiatt Terrace, 1,222 feet; Lansdown Crescent, 528 feet; Bayshill Road, 1,598 feet; St. George's Road, 1,17 feet; Montpellier Street, 3,076 feet; Imperial Square, 4,430 feet; Bath Road, 1,065.

Curbing, Crossing and Channelling and Flagging—Suffolk Road, Lansdown Place, St. Stephen's Road, Winchcombe Street Bayshill Road (commenced), High Street, Clarence Street, Suffolk Square and Parade, Colonnade (temporary).

Gravel Footpaths—Vittoria Walk, Tewkesbury Road (commenced) near Moor's Farm.

Asphalte Footpath—St. Paul's Road.

Ashes Collected-1,761 Loads.

17—Snow, Removal of—The Borough Surveyor further reported as follows.

With respect to clearing away snow from business places and houses abutting upon the streets. The usual practice is for the Occupiers to remove the snow from those parts of the pavement immediately in front of their premises.

"A considerable number of shopkeepers do so, but some, relying on the Act of 1852, do not do it. The most difficult cases ar in the High Street and Promenade, where every morning after the paths have been covered with sawdust, sand, &c., and in many cases within an hour, the whole has been swept off. Under these circumstances I think you should take some means of establishing uniformity of practice by making a Bye-law requiring the Occupiers to clear their own fronts or compelling them to leave the pavement alone entirely and to prohibit snow being thrown upon it from the roofs of the houses

Resolved, That the Town Clerk be instructed to draw up and submit to the Committee a Bye-law for the removal of snow from the footways by the occupiers of premises abutting thereon.

- 18—Name Plates—The Surveyor recommended that name plates be put up in the following streets:—St. Paul's Street, North, St. Paul's Street, South, 1; Rutland Street, 1; Brunswick Street, 1; Courteney Street, 2; Marle Hill Parade, 2; Marl Hill Road, 2. Resolved, That the same be procured and fixed.
- 19— St. George's Road—Footpath in Park Place—Specifications from the Surveyor, of date the 30th instant of the Works required to be done to the above streets with plans, sections, and estimates relating thereto, were read and approved. Resolved, That Notices be given under the provisions of The Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1852, and the Cheltenham Improvement Act 1889, to the Owners of the Premises fronting, adjoining, or abutting upon the parts of the said streets requiring to be drained, levelled, repaired, flagged and channelled; requiring them to do the specified Works within 28 days; and that such Notice is not complied with, the Surveyor do proceed to execute the Works mentioned or referred to therein; and that the expenses thereof be recovered in the manner provided by the Act.
- 20.—Horniman —An application was received from Mr. Horniman for leave to put pavement lights in the Colonnade and Clarence Street opposite the new dairy there. Resolved, That the required permission be not given.
- 21—Colonnade Improvement—The Town Clerk laid before the Committee draft Conveyance of property in the Colonnade to Messrs. Webb Resolved, That the same be approved as altered by the Town Clerk.
- 22-New Buildings—The Surveyor submitted Notices and Plans received by him from the following persons intending to erect new buildings, all of which were approved, viz. Mr. Samuel Adams for house in Christ Church Road, Miss Crawford for green-house at No. 2, Wolseley Terrace, Messrs. Lock and Sons for additions to house at back of Clarence Street; and Mr. W. Smith for five cottages at Kew Place, the latter approved subject to an amendment of the drainage as shewn on the Plan.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Wednesday, the 10th day of December, 1890—Present: Alderman Griffith; Councillors Hands, Neale and Norman.

- 1—Slaughter Houses—The Committee met and proceeded to make an inspection of the Slaughter Houses in the Borough.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Wednesday, the 31st day of December, 1890—Present: Alderman Griffith; Councillors Hands, King, Neale and Norman (Alderman Griffith in the chair)—

2-Slaughter Houses—Mr. Long reported that the Licenses of the following Slaughter Houses had expired, viz., Messrs. C. Phipps, 1, Exchange Buildings, F. Waghorne, Tivoli Street, S. Kearsey, St. Mark's Emporium, Storr & Co., Whaddon Lane, F. Hastings, Folly Lane, T. Verrinder, 3, Hewlett Road, E. Rymell, 3, High Street, A. Mills, Russell Street, E. Pleydell, 288, High Street. Resolved, That all the foregoing Licences be renewed for one year or until the intended Public Slaughter House is built, except the slaughter house in Tivoli Street, which appears to be used by more than one butcher.

3—Dairies and Cowsheds Orders—Purveyors of Milk—The following applications to be registered as Purveyors of Milk were considered, viz., T. Lander, Tivoli Coffee Tavern, T. Hopkins, Sherborne Coffee Tavern, C. Walker, Conservative Club, F.W. Sumner, Andover Dairy, J. Tombs, 3, Hermitage Terrace, and W. Howell, 3, Tivoli Buildings. Resolved, That all the Applicants be registered except F. W. Sumner, for the Andover Dairy.

4—Zymotic Disease—Ths Inspector of Nuisances reported that there had been no case of enteric fever, that there had been two cases of diptheria, and ten of scarlet fever.

The Surveyor was directed to report on the condition of No. 30, New Street.

5—Infectious Disease—The Inspector of Nuisances laid before the Committee a List of Fees of Medical Practitioners for reporting cases of Infectious Disease for the quarter, amounting to 12 15s. The Medical Officer reported that sewer and drain testing apparatus and chemicals were required in his department, and he was authorised to procure the same.

6—Smoke Nuisance at the Albion Saw Mills and the Original Brewery---The Inspector of Nuisances reported that he had observed black smoke issuing from the chimneys at the Albion Mills and Original Brewery in such quantities as to be a nuisance on several occasions during the past month. Resolved, That Notice be given under Sec. 91 of the Public Health Act, 1875, to abate the nuisance

7 —Medical Officer of Health—A letter from Dr Roch stating that he was confined to his bed and would be unfit for duty for some time to come, and suggesting the appointment of Dr. Cocks Johnstone as his deputy during his absence from illness, and that the arrangement hitherto made by him with Mr. Cocks Johnstone whereby the Council would not be called upon to pay him anything would continue, was read. Resolved, That Dr. Cocks Johnstone be appointed to act as temporary substitute for Dr Roch during such time, not exceeding three months, as Dr. Roch shall be incapacitated by sickness from performing the duties of his office.

8—Assistant Inspector of Nuisances—Resolved, That the necessary steps be taken for appointing an assistant or additional Inspector of Nuisances under the rules and regulations of the Local Government. Board relating to officers whose salaries are partly paid by the County Council.

9-----General Hospital Fees—Resolved, That Mr. J. H. Hack be required to repay the Corporation £1 16s., being one moiety of £3 12s. the amount of the hospital charges in his case.

- 10—Closet in New Street—A letter from Mr. T. Morris calling attention to a nuisance from a closet in an exposed position in or near New Street, was read. Resolved, That notice be given to the owner, under Sec. 33 of the Improvement Act of 1889, to remove the closet
- 11— Urinal near St. George's Square--Memorials from Mr. Jas. Leighton, Miss Sims, and others, asking for the removal of this urinal, were read, and the Surveyor was directed to confer with the Proprietors of the Fleece Hotel, with a view to the construction of a urinal in the yard of the hotel, which would be available for the use of the public, and persons frequenting the hotel.
- 12- Heyden Knoll Estate—The Town Clerk laid before the Committee the Draft Lease of this Farm to Mr. R. C. Cooke, which he had settled with Mr. Cooke Resolved, That the same be approved and the Common Seal of the Corporation be affixed to the engrossment thereof.

- 3— Hackney Carriage Bye-Laws—The Town Clerk reported that he had received these Draft Bye-Laws from the Local Government Board approved, but that he had since made a slight alteration in one of the Bye-Laws to allow of the use of a badge made of metal, leather, or other suitable material, and this alteration he had submitted to the Local Government Board, and to which he had no doubt they would assent. Resolved, That the Draft as altered be approved, and that the Bye-Laws be made at the next meeting of the Council.

- 4- Omnibus Bye-Laws—The Town Clerk laid before the Committee a Draft of these Bye-Laws with Letter thereon from the Local Government Board. Resolved, That the Town Clerk make a further communication to the Local Government Board with reference to Bye-Laws 3, 4, and 12
- 5 -Allotments Regulations—The Town Clerk laid before the Committee the Draft of these Regulations, with further alterations made by the Local Government Board. He recommended that a Shed be built, at an estimated cost of £20, of sufficient size to contain all the planks and trucks, adjoining the room used by the Cemetery workmen, that the Building, W.C. and Urinal, be removed from the present site and the materials of same be used in the construction of the New Shed; that the W.C. now attached to the Vestry of the Nonconformist Chapel, be altered so as to permit its use by persons visiting the Cemetery and a Urinal be fixed as shewn; that to meet the difficulty of disposing of surplus soil the plan prepared and submitted by him with reference to the New Ground be adopted, and that with respect to the letting of the latter, the whole might be let reserving the right to deposit soil upon not more than two roods, and that the cost of a Sheep and Bullock fence would be about £16; that he desired to submit to the Committee whether it would not be desirable to extend the covered way entrance to Chapels so as to permit a hearse or carriage with horses to stand

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entirely within the building, and avoid the danger to health which the draughts occasion, and lastly that the W.C. adjoining the Church Vestry was in a most offensive and dangerous condition, and he had therefore caused it to be altered so as to prevent the nuisance recurring. Resolved, That all the matters and things recommended by the Surveyor be approved and adopted, except with regard to the alteration to the Chapel entrance, as to which the Surveyor is requested to bring up an estimate of the cost, also that the new ground be let as pasture by Tender, to be advertised for.

3—Bank Charges—The Resolution of the Council at their Meeting of date the 1st December, inst., referring it to this Committee to consider the terms on which the accounts of the Corporation is kept by the Treasurer and his Bankers and to report whether any alteration, and if any what, should be made in such terms, was considered. Resolved, That a copy of the Resolution in question be sent to the Bank, and that the Directors be asked to meet and confer with a Deputation from this

Committee, consisting of the Mayor, the Chairman, and Councillors Drew and Lawrence on the subject, on Wednesday, the 7th prox.

MINUTES of the Proceedings of the Committees of the Town Council to be submitted for approval at the Quarterly Meeting of the Council, to be held on Monday, the 2nd of February, 1891.

STREET AND HIGHWAY COMMITTEE.

It a Meeting of this Committee, held on Tuesday, the 27th day of January, 1891—Present, Aldermen Griffith, Parsonage and Simms-Bull; Councillors Heath, Steel and Lawrence (Alderman Simms-Bull in the chair)—

1---Gas Examiner's Monthly Report —The Monthly Report of the Gas Examiner was read: average illuminating power 15.79 candles. Maximum, 16.62; minimum 15.22. Purity: 19.23 grains of sulphur per 100 cubic feet.

Resolved, That the attention of the Gas Company be called to the lowness of the illuminating power on the 12th inst., and to the large quantity of sulphur on the 7th and 8th inst.

- 2—Gas Inspector's Monthly Report —The Monthly Report of the Gas Inspector was read: average hourly consumption of gas per lamp, during the month 3.575 cubic feet
- 3—Lamp Book—The Book kept at the Police Station was produced and examined. Lamps extinguished during the month: 1,982 (including 17 metered); burning dimly 448 (including two metered).

4--Improved Lamps—Resolved, That this Committee do report to the Council that after reconsidering this matter they desire to affirm the resolution they (the Committee) passed thereon last month.

5—Crossings at Sandford Street—The Memorial from Mr. E. Agg and others hereon was again considered. Resolved. That a crossing be constructed in Sandford Street at the point fixed by the Committee.

6—Lighting of Ewlyn Road—The Memorial of Mr. J. D. Bendall and others praying for a gas lamp in this road was again considered. Resolved, that the Committee will consider the question of lighting the road when it is made.

7—Damage to Horse and Trap—Jeynes—The further consideration of this matter was again adjourned.

8-Bridge over Chelt at Central Depot. Con. Mackenzie—A letter from Gen. Mackenzie expressing his astonishment at the resolution hereon passed by the Committee at their last meeting, rescinding a resolution passed at a previous meeting, with full knowledge of the facts, submitting that the soils, manure and such like requisites for his garden and glass houses are kept across the bridge, there being no possible space for them in his garden, that without access to them he could not work the garden, which is his chief tie to the house, if the Council adhere to their last decision, which he trusted they would kindly reconsider as an exceptional case; and requesting to have some feet in the middle of the bridge only removed, so that a plank could be laid across the gap whenever required for his gardener to cross over for soil, &c., and

sending a photograph of the place, was read and considered. Resolved, That Gen. Mackenzie be reminded that the original resolution of the Improvement Commissioners only gave him permission to plant evergreens on the bank of the River opposite his house and garden, that the new bridge was put across the River without the knowledge or sanction of the Commissioners or their successors, the Corporation, and the land appears to have been put to uses not contemplated or sanctioned by the terms of the original permission, and which have only now been made known to the Corporation by Gen. Mackenzie's own letter. The Committee, whilst much regretting that Gen. Mackenzie should be put to any personal inconvenience by the decision of the Council, feel that it is extremely undesirable that private individuals should have such privileges of using the Corporation property as those asked for by Gen. Mackenzie, and which could not consistently be refused to other owners or occupiers of houses which happen to adjoin the Corporation properties.

9—Cabmen's Rest—A letter from General Morton applying for permission to remove this Rest from St. James' Square, where it now stands, to the rear of the Cab Stand near the Belle Vue Hotel, was read. Resolved, That the Committee regret they cannot comply with General Morton's request, as they consider the proposed new position an unsuitable one for it.

10—Wm. Todd—Letters from Mr. Wm. Todd, complaining of his treatment by the Surveyor in regard to his dismissal, and declining to relinquish his office unless properly discharged by the Council, were read. Resolved, That the Committee decline to interfere with the discretion of the Surveyor and that Mr. Todd be required to leave the house at the Central Depot forthwith.

11. —Lamp at Westal Green—A memorial from Mr. T. A. Hub, and others calling attention to the desirability of placing a large lamp at the junction of the Queen's and the Lansdown Roads and immediately in front of Osborne House which part they consider dark and dangerous, was read. Resolved, That the Committee consider the locality is quite sufficiently lighted.

12-Census of 1891—A letter from the Registrar General requesting the Corporation to afford their co-operation to secure the successful completion of the approaching Census within their Sanitary District, by rendering as far as may be possible the necessary assistance to the Census Officers for the proper identification of individual Streets and Houses, was read. Resolved, That the Registrar General be informed, that so far as this Authority is concerned every facility will be given to the enumerators in carrying out the work.

13—Surveyor's Monthly Report Highways—The Surveyor reported that owing to the state of the weather, no work of the nature of repairs could be undertaken during the past month; to render the paths passable during the slippery weather Sawdust had been used, and a large quantity- of clinker had been crushed and spread upon the roads; 1436 loads of ashes had been collected; that from the results of the rains last week, he found that it would be necessary to construct some more efficient means of conveying the Storm Water from the Old Bath Road Ditch to the Stream near Sandford Road, and in Gloucester Road near Alstone Lawn, by putting down a Storm Water Sewer to communicate with one of the Streams leading to the Chelt, that in both instances considerable damage was done, in the former case by scour, and in the latter by the water standing in pools owing to want of drainage, and sinking in the ground. Resolved, That the works recommended be executed.

14—Telephonic Communication—The Surveyor reported that now that all the clerical work of the Central Depot is brought into one room and someone will at all times be in attendance, it will be desirable to have some means of communication between the Municipal Offices and the Depot, so as to enable any matters to be dealt with promptly, and that the cost of telephones at the Central Depot and at Sandford, would be £13 15s. per. annum. Resolved, That the matter be adjourned for further consideration.

15—Sign Boards—The Street Inspector reported that the following projections had been put up during the month in contravention of the Bye-laws:—

Bailey and Jones, two Removable Lamps at 2, Pittville Street.

Plough Hotel Company, one Lamp in front of Plough Hotel.

Mr. G. Oliver, two Removable Gas Rails at 346, High Street.

Mr. C. Boyce. Sign Board at 12, Montpellier Street

Resolved, That the Sign board erected by Mr Boyce be required to be removed, and that the remainder of the projections be allowed to remain, subject to the right of the Town Council to require their removal at any time they may think fit to do so; and subject also, in the case of the Plough Hotel Company to the Lamps remaining lighted till midnight.

16—Snow, Removal of—The Town Clerk submitted draft of proposed Bye-laws with regard to the removal of snow, and the same were considered, and ordered to be submitted to the Local Government Board for approval.

17—Crossing over Old Bath Road at London Road—A letter from the Rev. Dr. Robinson, of Raymond Villa, Charlton Kings, applying for the restoration of the crossing which formerly existed at this point, was read. Resolved, That Dr. Robinson be informed that the Committee hope that at no very distant date he and his neighbours will be in a position as rate-payers of the Borough to ask the Corporations to lay down a crossing at the point indicated.

18-G.W. Railway Goods Station—Resolved, That it having come to the knowledge of the Committee that the Great Western Railway Company have re-erected their Goods Station at Cheltenham with combustible materials and without first submitting plans thereof for the approval of the Town Council, a course which is in contravention of Sec. 74 of the Improvement Act of 1852, and the Bye-Laws, the attention of the Company be drawn thereto, and that they be informed that in this instance the Council will take no action in the matter it, as they understand to be the case, and are so assured by the Company, this erection is only a temporary one.

19—Colonnade Improvement — The Town Clerk laid before the Committee statement of proposed settlement with Mr. Cockrell and his trustees as contained in the Town Clerk's letter to Messrs. Winterbothams and Gurney of date the 5th December last, and their reply of date the .d inst., and an account of their charges in relation thereto amounting to £96 18s. 4d. Resolved, That Mr. Cockrell be charged for use and occupation of the late Miss Haywood's premises as from Midsummer, 1890, according to the notice given to Messrs. Winterbothams and Gurney by the Tos.vn Clerk's letter of date the 29th of April last, and that Messrs. Winterbothams and Gurney's bill be paid.

PUBLIC HEALTH COMMITTEE.

1-Delancey Hospital—A letter from Dr. E. T. Wilson, of date the 31st ulto., enclosing copy of the following resolution of the Delancey Trustees, viz. "The income of the Delancey Hospital being found inadequate to meet the current expenses of the establishment; Resolved, that from the 1st of January, 1891, all patients using its Public Wards shall be required to "pay 3s. 6d. per day. A charge of 2s. a day, as at present, will be made for patients sent in by annual subscribers of not less than one guinea or by Public Bodies on making special arrangements with the Trustees; but the total payment on the higher scale is riot to exceed seven guineas for any one patient," and the said resolution, were read. Also copy of the following resolution of the said Trustees, of date the 31st ult., viz.: "Referring to a resolution of the Town Council, dated "the 2nd December, which was fully considered: It was Resolved that the Trustees decline to entertain the proposition " for vesting the management of the Delancey Hospital in a Joint Committee to be composed of the Trustees and " members of the Corporation; but, subject to this being understood, they are willing to meet a deputation from the Public Health Committee of the Council to discuss the other points referred to in the resolution "Resolved, That this Committee, while desirous of entering into an arrangement with the Trustees, and willing to contribute generously towards the cost of providing for public patients in the Delancey Hospital, feel that they cannot commit the ratepayers to the payment of a large annual contribution, "legally secured," in perpetuity, unless upon the condition previously stated—a representation of the Sanitary Authority upon the Management Committee of the Hospital; and, understanding the resolution of the Delancey Trustees to mean that this requirement most be abandoned as a preliminary to any conference between the two Bodies, they reluctantly feel that a conference would, under the circumstances, be useless.

6—Infectious Diseases Prevention Act, 1890, and Public Health Act, 1890—In pursuance of the resolution passed at the Meeting of the Council in November last referring it to this Committee to report whether it is expedient that the above Acts, or either of them, or any sections thereof be adopted by the Corporation, and the instructions of the Committee thereon, the Town Clerk laid before the Committee his report thereon. With regard to the former Act, he doubted if any good was to be obtained by the adoption of any of its Sections, which for the most part are the same as those in the Improvement Act of 1889, except perhaps Section 13; and that with regard to the latter Act which, except as to Part I., must be adopted by Parts and not by Sections He reported that Part I. was of general application without adoption. That Part II., relating to the Regulation of Telegraph Wires, is practically the same as Sec. 76 and 77 of the Improvement Act of 1889. That as to Part III., although nearly all the Sections are similar to those contained in the Improvement Act, there are some sections which it would be desirable to adopt, were it not for Sec. 41, which, for the reasons mentioned in the report would render it undesirable to adopt that part. That Part IV. related to the Licensing of Houses, Rooms, Gardens and other places for Music and Dancing, and the policy of adopting that part would be for the Council to consider; and that Part V. empowered Urban Authorities, with the consent of the Local Government Board, to create and issue Stock subject to Regulations to be made by that Board. Resolved, That the report of the Town Clerk be adopted, except as to Part V, which should be referred to the Finance Committee for consideration; and that the Town Clerk take the necessary steps for the adoption of Sec. 13 of the Infectious Diseases Prevention Act, 1890.

7—No. 30 New Street and Pantile Row—The Surveyor submitted a report upon the condition of this property, and of the works necessary to render same fit for human habitation. Resolved, That a copy thereof be sent to the Owners, with an intimation that if the works therein mentioned were not forthwith carried out, the Council would take the necessary legal steps to enforce them.

WATER COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Friday, the 9th day of January, 1891—Present: The Mayor; Alderman Simms Bull; Councillors Heath and Williams (The Mayor in the chair) –

1-Tewkesbury Works—Gloucester--The Mayor reported that on Tuesday, the 6th inst., he, the Town Clerk, and the Borough Surveyor had an interview at Gloucester with the Mayor, the Deputy Mayor, the Town Clerk and the City Surveyor of Gloucester on the subject of the water supply at Gloucester, and the supplementing of such supply from the Work; of the Corporation at Tewkesbury, at which interview the subject was fully discussed, and it was arranged that the Mayor and City Surveyor of Gloucester should meet the Deputy Mayor and the Borough Surveyor at Tewkesbury the next day to inspect the works there.

The Surveyor reported that the Deputy Mayor and himself had met the Mayor of Gloucester and the City Surveyor, as arranged, at Tewkesbury on Wednesday, the 7th inst; that they thoroughly inspected the whole of the Works and took samples of the water both before and after filtration.

A report from the Borough Surveyor on the subject was read, and the question of the terms to be given to the Gloucester Corporation considered.

Resolved, That the Town Clerk do write to the Town Clerk of Gloucester informing him that the Committee would be prepared to recommend the Council to agree to the following terms, viz.

1. The Corporation of Cheltenham to lay down a gin. main from their Works at Tewkesbury to the boundary of their area of supply at, or near, Twigworth, with all necessary sluices, valves, alterations and extensions of their Works at Tewkesbury to enable the Corporation to give a maximum supply of 300,000 gallons per diem for the sum of £1,500 per annum.

- 2. Should the Gloucester Corporation require a 12in. main to be laid down the payment in this case would be £1,770 per annum.
- 3. Should the Gloucester Corporation require a supply exceeding 300,000 gallons per diem, this would necessitate the construction of still further works, and in that case the annual payment required would be £2,170.

In either case the price would include a supply of 100,000 gallons per diem, any quantity in excess of that to be paid for at the rate of 6d. per 1,000 gallons.

STREET AND HIGHWAY COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Tuesday, the 24th day of February, 1891—Present Aldermen Griffith, Parsonage and Simms-Bull; Councillors Darby, King, Lawrence, Steel and Heath (Alderman Simms-Bull in the chair)—

- 1—Gas Examiner's Monthly Report —The Monthly Report of the Gas Examiner was read average illuminating power 16.07 candles. Maximum, 16.48; minimum 15.27. Purity: 10.65 grains of sulphur per 100 cubic feet.
- 2 Gas Inspector's Monthly Report—The Monthly Report of the Gas Inspector was read : average hourly consumption of gas per lamp, during the month 4.167 cubic feet

- 3—Lamp Book—The Book kept at the Police Station was produced and examined. Lamps extinguished during the month 9 (including 1 metered); burning dimly 20.
- 4—Jeynes--Damage to Horse and Trap—The further consideration of this matter was adjourned.
- 5—Telephonic Communication—The further consideration of this matter was adjourned.
- 6—Bridge over Chelt at Central Depot—Con. Mackenzie—A letter from Gen. Mackenzie stating that he was at some expense and inconvenience having the bulk of the garden soils removed from the shrubbery, and the small remainder of the soils he would make use of this Spring, after which there would be no occasion to cross the river, and the planking from mid-stream could then be removed, and that he trusted the Town Council would allow the Bridge in so far as it encroaches on the Town land to remain intact until he has finally cleared out the ground, was read. Resolved, That this be assented to.
- 7-Channelling in Bath Street—A letter from Mr. T. R. Jackson calling attention to the manner in which the repairs in this street are being carried out, was read. Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor do bring up a report upon the matter.
- 8-Footpath by Park Villas—A letter from Gen. Muspratt Williams enquiring if there is any probability of the above footpath being paved, which would be a great convenience and improvement, was read. Resolved, That Gen. Williams be informed that notices have been given to the owners to do the necessary works
- 9—Footpath Henrietta Street—A Letter from Mr. E. Palmer, complaining of the state of the Footpath abutting on his premises, which is getting dangerous, was read. Resolved, That the matter be referred to the Surveyor to report upon.
- 10---Footpath in Carlton Place—St. Paul's Road —A Letter from Mr. Geo. Bradfield, calling attention to the bad state of the footpath leading from Carlton Place to the Training College in St. Paul's Road, and to the necessity of some improvement being effected in the lighting of that locality, was read. Resolved, That one of the existing lamps be moved to the opposite side of the road, and that the Borough Surveyor do bring up a Specification for the repair of the footpath.
- 11 --Bennington Street—A Letter from Mr. S. B. Dix, enclosing copy of the following resolution passed by a meeting of the property owners concerned That taking into consideration the fact that Bennington Street has for 20 years been used "as a public road and hitherto kept in repair by the Owners, we resolve that if the Town Council will allow £50 for damage "done to the road by laying water mains, &c., we are willing to pay the amount due, less the £50 above-named, or else we "request the Town Council to make the Street a Public Highway, and in the event of this being done, we are prepared to "pay the demands for repairs in full, this offer to be made without prejudice," was read, and also a subsequent letter from Mr. Dix enquiring what allowance the Corporation are willing to make if the amounts are now paid in. Resolved, That if the parties are prepared at once to pay the amounts due from them, an allowance of 3d. per yard run, which is the full sum allowed for making good trenches in which pipes have been laid, be allowed as a deduction from the sums due, but that so long as any sums due to the Corporation for the works executed by them in the street are unpaid, the Committee will decline to consider the question of taking to and declaring the street to be a Highway.

- 12—St. George's Road Bridge—A Letter from the Secretary of the Great Western Railway Co., acknowledging receipt of this Committee's resolution thereon, and stating that the matter has had consideration and the Directors are unable to comply with the requirement of the Council that the Company shall widen the bridge to 36 feet, that the lengthening of the bridge will in no way affect permanently the surface of the road over it, and having regard to the fact that it is necessitated in connection with extensive and costly works which the Company contemplate in improving the station accommodation, the Directors think it is somewhat unreasonable that the Council should seek to impose upon the Company additional expense in the widening of a public road, and that the result of the Town Council insisting on the requirement would be to delay the works to admit of Parliamentary Power being obtained, was read Resolved, That after full consideration of all the circumstances the Committee regret they are unable to recommend the Council to accede to the proposition made by the Company.
- 13—Main Roads—A Letter from the County Surveyor, stating that he had surveyed the road from Pilley to the Cemetery and found the Specification fairly carried out, and that the amount to be paid by the County Council for this road, for the three months ending April next, and also the annual sum to be added to the contract, should now be settled, and requesting this Committee to name a sum for his Committee to discuss, was read. Resolved, That the Committee will expect to receive from the County Council in respect of this road a sum calculated at the rate of £150 per mile per annum.
- 14—Lighting of Hatherley Lane—A memorial from Mr. Edward Apperley and others requesting the Corporation to light this lane with gas, seas read. Resolved, That three, lamps be fixed in positions to be fixed by the Committee, provided the Gas Company will extend their main along this road.
- 15— Lamp at Westal Green—On further consideration of the application in this matter. Resolved, That an additional ordinary lamp be placed in this locality in the position fixed by the Committee.
- 16 Keynsham Road—A memorial from Charles Wilson, Esq. and others praying the Corporation to have this road inspected, with a view to its being repaired if need be, between Sirsa House and the gate of Glendouran House by the abutting owners or at their expense, was read. Resolved, That the Surveyor do bring up a Specification of the repairs to be done by the abutting owners.
- 17 —Street Projections—The Street Inspector reported that the sign board of Mr. Boyce, at 12, Montpellier Street, had been removed in accordance with the order of the Committee. He also reported that Mr. F. Stock had fixed a gas rail at 3, Exchange Buildings, Bath Road. Resolved, That permission be given for this gas rail, subject to the right of the Corporation to require its removal if at any time they think fit to do so.

20 —St. George's Road Footpath—Letters from Mrs. A. Bloodworth, Mr. T. E. Gill, Mr. T. W. Harvey, Messrs. E. Smith & Son, and others, requesting the Committee to reconsider the order made on them to pave, border, and channel the footpath opposite their respective properties, the bordering and channelling being, in their opinion, quite unnecessary in this case, and in some cases the work having been already done on a previous occasion by the owners, were read. Smith & Son, the formation of the road and footpath referred to by them was a matter entirely distinct from the present one; and with respect to the other Memorialists, the Committee are not prepared to recommend any alteration of the specification.

21 —Great Western Railway Goods Station—A Letter from the Secretary of the Great Western Railway Company, stating that the Goods Shed which has been erected at Cheltenham in place of the shed recently destroyed by fire is, as the Town Council understand, merely a temporary structure, but requesting the Council not to assume that the Company in any way acquiesce in the view that in the erection of buildings for railway purposes they are subject to the jurisdiction of such Act and Bye-Laws, was read. Resolved that the Secretary's explanation is satisfactory in so far as it states that the building is intended to be a temporary one only, but the Committee feel that the Company must be asked to fix a reasonable time within which the building shall be removed, and

thereby render it unnecessary to decide whether or not the Company are subject to the provisions of the Improvement Act.

1—Pittville Estate—Shenton—A letter from Messrs. Resolved, That, although the Committee would much prefer that Mr. Shenton should remove or sell the things, they wish to treat him with every consideration, and will recommend the Council to pay him £50 for them if he is willing to accept that sum.

3—Broom—A letter from Mr. Edwin Broom stating that he intended laying out the piece of building land on the West side of the West Spa Drive (which has a frontage of 345 feet) with frontages to the said drive, for the erection of six Detached Villa Residences; but was willing to sell the same to the Corporation for £500, was read. Resolved, That Mr. Broom be informed that, pending the application of the Corporation for an extension of the Borough Boundaries, the Corporation do not feel themselves at liberty to entertain the offer, and that in any case the Committee consider the price excessive. At a Meeting of this Committee, held on. Tuesday, the 10th day of March, 1891—Present: Alderman Simms-Bull; Councillors Darby, Lawrence, and Steel (Alderman Simms-Bull in the chair)—

1-Colonnade Improvement—Cockrell —A Letter from Messrs Winterbothams and Gurney stating that their client strongly objected to being charged anything for rent of the premises temporarily occupied by him, but offering to pay £22 10s. half the sum fixed, and a Letter from the Town Clerk in reply thereto, were read. Resolved, That the Committee having fully considered Mr. Cockrell's objections and the reasons given by his solicitors, see no reason, having regard to all the circumstances, for departing from their previous resolution.

2-Great Western Railway Goods Shed —A Letter from the Secretary of the Great Western Railway Co., stating that he was not in a position to name a time within which the goods shed should be removed, that the plans of the new shed were under consideration, and the construction of it would be proceeded with as soon as circumstances would admit, was read. Resolved, That the Secretary's reply is very unsatisfactory, and that the Surveyor do give notice to the Company, under Sec. 74 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1852, to remove or alter the same.

- 6-Channelling in Bath Street—The Surveyor laid before the Committee plan sheaving how he proposed to deal with this matter. Resolved, That the same be approved and the work be done accordingly.
- 7--Footpath in Henrietta Street—Resolved, That the pavement and retaining curb or wall in this street be repaired.
- 8-Footpath in St. Paul's Road—Resolved that the Owners of abutting property from Carlton Place to St. Paul's Lane be required to curb and channel, the Corporation to lay down tar paving.
- 9- Marle Hill Road—Road to Glendowran House—Specifications from the Surveyor, of date the 31st instant, of the Works required to be done to the above Streets, were read and approved. Resolved, That the necessary Plans, Sections, and Estimates be prepared, and Notices be given under Section 150 of the Public Health Act, 1875, to the Owners of the Premises fronting, adjoining, or abutting upon the parts of the said Streets requiring to be severed, levelled, paved, metalled, flagged, channelled, or made good; requiring them to do the specified Works within 28 days; and that, if such Notice is not complied with, the Surveyor do proceed to execute the Works mentioned or referred to therein; and that the expenses thereof be recovered in the manner provided by the Act.
- 10--Trees —The Tree Sub-Committee reported that they had viewed the Trees in St. George's Road, Montpellier Parade, and Montpellier Terrace, and recommended that 41 Trees in St. George's Road, 6 in Montpellier Parade, and 1 in Montpellier Terrace—all of which had been marked—be removed. Resolved, That the recommendations of the Sub-Committee be adopted.

- 11-Telephonic Communication—Resolved, That this matter be adjourned till July next.
- 12-Main Roads—A letter from the County Surveyor stating that, from the Returns sent him, the Borough seemed to have made a profit of £181 on the last year's Contract, and that he wished to settle the figures for the next year, and would advise his Committee to enter into a contract with the Corporation on the following terms:

For the existing Main Roads .. £56900For the new Main Roads .. £23400Total .. £80300

this sum being independent of the £874 paid for contribution to roads not manned, and desiring a reply as to whether he might submit these figures to his Committee, was read. Resolved, That the Committee cannot accept the proposal of the County Surveyor, as, although there would appear to have been a profit during the past year, the expenditure during the previous year was much above the sum allowed by the County Council, and it would, therefore, be proper to take the average, which is £734 7s. 2d. Furthermore, that it be pointed out that no allowance has been made in respect of Street Watering, for which the Committee consider an allowance of £40 per mile should be made; or for Plant, for which an allowance of £2 per mile should be made; also that some allowance should be made in respect of the unexhausted expenditure on the Old Bath Road and Hale's Road to put them in a state to be declared Main Roads, and for repayment of the expenses of repairing the Bridge in the Old Bath Road.

- 13-Vernon Place A Memorial from Mrs. Dickins and others, complaining of the bad state of the road in Vernon Place, was read, and the Surveyor was directed to bring up a Specification of the Works to be done by the abutting Owners.
- 14 Footpath on North Side of Swindon Road A Letter from Mr. P. Collins, calling attention to the unfinished state of the path on the North side of the Swindon Road, the ground having been given up by the abutting Owners on the understanding that the path should be carried on to Marsh Lane, but instead of that the crossing had been removed during the repair of the road, and had not been re-laid, and pointing out that the highs fence makes a corner for a nuisance near his house, was read. Resolved, That Mr. Collins be informed the Corporation are quite prepared to carry out the work as soon as the Owner is prepared to set back his fence.
- 15-Whaddon Lane—A complaint front W. F. Hicks-Beach, Esq., of the condition of this lane, was read. Resolved, That the Surveyor be empowered to pay the expenses of such repairs as he may consider have been rendered necessary by the Corporation Traffic and the laying of the Water Main, under Section 110 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889
- 16 Pillar Letter Box—All Saints Road—An application from the Postmaster-General for leave to erect a Pillar Letter Box at the corner of All Saints Road and Pittville Circus Road, was read. Resolved That the required permission be given, the Pillar Box to be fixed on the East side of the first-named road, at the junction with Pittville Circus Road.
- 17 St. George's Road Bridge— A Letter from the Secretary to the Great Western Railway Co., acknowledging receipt of the Committee's resolution of last month, and stating that since he last

wrote the Directors had come to the conclusion, after consultation with the Directors of other Companies, that having regard to the serious reduction of revenue which the Company will suffer in the event of the Great Western Railway (Rates and Charges) Provisional Order Bill becoming law, they would not be justified in proceeding at the present time with works involving any large outlay the construction of which can be properly postponed, whether or not this decision is to apply to the construction of the proposed New Station at Cheltenham has not yet been finally determined, but the decision of the Town Council in the matter of the lengthening of the above bridge will not be calculated to influence the Directors in favour of proceeding with the proposed improvements at Cheltenham, was read. Resolved, That the Committee are not prepared to recommend any departure from the terms of their previous resolution.

18—Street Projections—The Street Inspector reported that three removable lamps had been put up by Mr. W. J. Harrison, in front of 369, High Street, and that Mr. J. Stephens had fixed a Sign in front of 32, Jersey Street, without the sanction of the Corporation. Resolved, That the Lamps at Mr. Harrison's Shop be allowed to remain, subject to the right of the Corporation to require their removal if at any time they think fit to do so, and that notice be given for the removal of the Sign put up by Mr. Stephens.

Winterbothams meant that the Corporation were to pay Mr.

Cockrell the amount awarded to him for disturbance in his business, and sue him for use and occupation, it certainly did not commend itself to him. Resolved, That the Town Clerk's letter be approved.

FINANCE COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Wednesday, the 8th day of April, 1891—Present: The Mayor; Alderman Simms-Bull; Councillors Darby, Kite, Drew, Lawrence and Parsonage (Councillor Darby in the chair)—

CORPORATION STOCK.

The Sub-committee appointed at the meeting of this Committee, held on the 26th February last, to confer with the General Managers of Lloyds Bank and the National Provincial Bank of England, reported to this Committee that they had had such conference, at which the mode and terms of creation and issue of the Corporation Stock were fully discussed, on the 3rd March last. The Town Clerk has since laid before the Committee a letter received from the Manager of Lloyds Bank, Letters from the General Manager of the National Provincial Bank were also laid before the Committee, and the Mayor and the Town Clerk had another interview with the Manager of that Bank in London on questions of detail.

The Committee have held several meetings at which these communications, the question of the amount of Stock to be raised, the price of issue, and other matters have been fully discussed.

The negotiations with the National Provincial Bank have resulted in the settlement of the Draft Prospectus of the Loan the substance of which is embodied in the second of the Resolutions, a copy of which accompanies this Minute, and the Committee now recommend the passing of these Resolutions; and, further, recommend that Notice be at once given to the holders of Corporation Water Annuities that the Corporation propose to redeem the Annuities on the terms provided by the Corporation Water Act, 1878, and to the Debenture holders that the Corporation intend to pay them off on the expiration of the Notice, unless they are prepared to accept Corporation Stock in substitution for their Annuities and Loans, and that they accordingly be invited to 'fender for the Stock.

Resolved First—That under the authority, and subject to the provisions, of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, the Corporation acting by the Council, do hereby, in exercise of their several statutory powers, create Stock to be called "Cheltenham Corporation £3 per cent. Redeemable Stock," and to be issued to an amount which shall be sufficient for the following purposes, but not exceeding £375,000: and such further sum, if any, as may be sufficient to pay the expenses mentioned in Sec. 183 of the said Improvement Act.

- A. For raising, instead of re-borrowing, the sum of £212,961 13s. 4d. required for the purpose of paying off, redeeming, or issuing Stock in substitution for, securities granted by the Corporation under the following Acts, and now outstanding, that is to say:-
- 1. The sum of £173,041 13s. 4d., being part of the Loans of £90,000, £77,000 and £30,000 borrowed under the Cheltenham Corporation Water Act, 1878, and mentioned in Part I. of the 2nd schedule to the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889.
- 2. The sum of £37,120, being part of the Loans mentioned and described in Part II. of the 2nd schedule] to the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889.
- 3. The sum of £1,300, part of a Loan of £2,100 borrowed under the provisions of the Public Health Acts, for the purpose of Street Improvements.
- 4. The sum of £1,500 borrowed for the purchase of Land for the purpose of a Refuse Destructor, and enlargement of the Arle Tank Depot of the Corporation.

STREET AND HIGHWAY COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Tuesday, the 28th day of April, 1891—Present: The Mayor; Aldermen Griffith and Sininis-13u11; Councillors Heath, King, and Lawrence (Alderman Simms-Bull in the chair)—

- 3--Gas Examiner's Monthly Report —The Monthly Report of the Gas Examiner was read; average illuminating power 15.89 candles. Maximum, 16.20; minimum 15.70. Purity 13.15 grains of sulphur per 100 cubic feet.
- 4 —Gas Inspector's Monthly Report—The Monthly Report of the Gas Inspector was read : average hourly consumption of gas per lamp, during the month 4.188 cubic feet
- 5 -- Lamp Book--The Book kept at the Police Station was produced and examined. Lamps extinguished during the month: 14 burning dimly 116
- 4-Vernon Place—A Specification from the Surveyor. of date the 28th inst., of the works required to be done to the above street, was read and approved. Resolved, That Notice be given under Section 44 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1852, to the Owners of the premises fronting, adjoining, or

abutting upon the parts of the said street, requiring to be drained, levelled, repaired, flagged and channelled; requiring them to do the specified works within 28 days; and that, if such Notice is not complied with, the Surveyor do proceed to execute the works mentioned or referred to therein; and that the expenses thereof be recovered in the manner provided by the Act.

5-Lighting of Folly Lane—A Letter from Mr. Thos. Smith, calling attention to the urgent need of a Lamp in this Lane, was read. Resolved, That the consideration thereof be adjourned till the Lamp in St. Paul's Road, near the corner of the lane, has been removed in accordance with the recent directions of the Committee.

6—Snow, Removal of—A letter from the Local Government Board, returning the Draft of these Bye-Laws, with certain marginal notes and alterations, to which they directed the attention of the Council, was read. Resolved, that the Bye-Laws as they now stand be approved, and be made by the Council at the Meeting on Monday next.

7-Private Improvement Works —Belmore Road—A letter from the Trustees of the Blind Asylum disputing the accuracy of the apportionment and demand made upon them in respect of works executed in the above road, and setting forth their reasons for objecting, was read. Resolved, That the Trustees be informed that questions as to right of user of the road do not affect their liability.

8-Private Improvement Works in Victoria Place, Tewkesbury Road —Letters from Mrs. Jane Mullins and Mr. H. Wilcox, and a Memorial from Mr. Geo. Tillott and others, objecting to the Apportionment and Demand made upon them in respect of the above works, on the ground of its having been a public pathway for many years, and that Land in front of the houses was purchased by the Corporation from the then owner, when any improvements should have been carried out by the Council, were read. Resolved, That the matter be adjourned for further consideration.

9—Jeynes—Damage to Horse and Trap—A Letter from Mr. Langley Smith, Solicitor, stating that his client, Mr. Jeynes, had in-structed him to take proceedings against the Corporation to recover £10 10s. 0d. the amount of his loss, but before doing so he would like to know whether the Corporation were prepared to settle the matter out of court, was read. Resolved, That, in view of the evidence before them, the Committee cannot acknowledge any liability in the matter.

10--Well Place Road—A Letter from Henry Chapman, Esq., calling attention to the state of the above road, the Christ Church Road end being almost impassable for about 7 months of the year even for heavy carts; and stating that there is also on the same road a Mineral Well in a very dilapidated shed, quite open to the public and very dangerous especially to children, was read. Resolved, That the Surveyor do bring up a Specification of the necessary repairs to be done to the road, and that the Town Clerk do write to the Montpellier Gardens Co. calling their attention to the dangerous state of the well.

A Letter from Messrs. Stead and Simpson, requesting permission to fix two new lamps upon the old connections and also to fix a large six-side 40-candle power lamp in the centre, at No. 139, High Street; and a Letter from Messrs. Hepworth & Son, requesting to be allowed to place four outside

lamps similar to a sketch enclosed in place of those at present used on rods at No. 152, High Street, were read. 1-Chelt Floods —Lower Alstone Mill—The Town Clerk laid before the Committee a letter from the Secretary of the Local Government Board stating that they had had under consideration the Report of their Inspectors on the application for Provisional Orders in these cases, and were prepared to issue a Provisional Order authorising the purchase of the Mill for the purpose of the drainage of the district, and that if the Town Council acquired the Mill and removed the dam they will then be better able to form an opinion as to what works, if any, may be necessary in connection with the river.

With reference to the application for an Order altering the Local Acts, the Secretary was desired to state that, having regard to Secs. 327 and 332 of the Public Health Act, 1875, the Board were not prepared to issue an Order conferring powers of deepening and altering the course of the Chelt, and of borrowing money for the purpose of earring out such works; any such powers should, the Board considered, be obtained by means of a Local Act. Resolved, That the Committee recommend the Council to accept the Order for purchase of the Mill, but are not prepared at present to recommend the promotion of a Local Act for the purpose above mentioned relating to the Chelt, but that application should be made to the Local Government Board for their sanction to a Loan of an amount sufficient to enable the Corporation to alter the Bridges at Sandford Road and the Depot and executing such other works as may be within the existing powers of the Corporation.

WATER COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Friday, the 15th day of May, 1891—Present: The Mayor; Alderman Simms-Bull; Councillors Darby, King, Williams, and Waghorne (The Mayor in the chair). —

1—Street Watering—Supply to Alstone Bath, &c.—The Surveyor reported that the effect of the long continued drought is now showing itself in the diminishing supply from the Springs and in the fact that the Reservoirs have never quite filled this year; under these circumstances he desired to lay before the Committee statistics of the rainfall, quantity of water in store, rate of consumption, &c., and to press upon them the importance of obtaining such an additional supply for the purpose of Street Watering, Supply of the Bath, &c., as will relieve the excessive drain from the Reservoirs for those purposes, and thus enable the Store of Water at Dowdeswell and the Hewletts to be husbanded in case the drought continues through the Summer to as late a period as last year. He stated that a duplicate supply, which would be available for the Street Watering of a considerable portion of the town (the consumption for which in hot weather is equal to 100,000 gallons per day), could be obtained by connecting a line of 4in. pipes with the Pumping Main at Sandford Mead, and continuing such pipe line along the bed of the Chelt to St. George's Place, and placing Stand-pipes in Bath Road, Keynsham Road, Wellington Street, Regent Street or Rodney Road, the Promenade, St. George's Road and St. George's Place, and into the yard at the back of the Alstone Bath. The pipes would be laid upon the bed of the Stream and secured by stakes driven down, the joints would be flanged and bolted together so as to be easily removable if required at any time.

The cost of the above would be about £300, and the work could be done within three weeks.

Resolved, That the Report be approved; that a sufficient quantity of pipes be ordered forthwith, and that the Surveyor be authorised to carry out the work with the least possible delay

2-Volunteer Camp at Kayte Farm—A letter from Capt. Baines, the Adjutant of the 2nd Volunteer Battalion Gloucester Regiment, stating that the Battalion will encamp at Kayte Farm, Cheltenham, from the 25th July to 1st August next, and he was directed to ask the Council if they would be good enough to grant a gratuitous supply of Water from the nearest Stand-pipe and also lend them

sufficient Water Carts to take the same to the Camp. The details as to quantity could, he presumed, be arranged hereafter with the proper official, was read. Resolved, That the Adjutant be informed that the Corporation will be pleased to grant the necessary supply of Water, and that the question of the use of the Water Carts be referred to and considered by the Street and Highway Committee.

STREET AND HIGHWAY COMMITTEE.

At Meeting of this Committee, held on Tuesday, the 30th day of June, 1891—Present: Alderman Griffith; Councillors Darby. Heath, Lawrence, and Steel (Councillor Darby in the chair)—

- 1--Gas Examiner's Monthly Report —The Monthly Report of the Gas Examiner was read: average illuminating power 16.02 candles. Purity 12.37 grains of Sulphur per 100 cubic feet.
- 2-Gas Inspector's Monthly Report—The Monthly Report of the Gas Inspector was read: average hourly consumption of gas per lamp. during the month 4.306 cubic feet
- 3-Lamp Book—The Book kept at the Police Station was produced and examined. Lamps extinguished during the month: 4 (2 metered); burning dimly 35.
- 4-Improved Lighting—A letter was read from Messrs F. and E. Griffiths, enclosing the following resolution of the Gas Company, in reply to the resolution of this Committee passed in December last and confirmed by the Council in February last:-
- "That the Directors regret that the Company is not in a position to make any reduction in the price now paid by "the Town Council for the Improved Lamps, namely £5 3s. 6d per lamp, per annum. This price was arrived at "as the lowest possible charge the Company was able to make after full and

careful consideration on the part of the "Directors, who had every desire to meet the views of the Council. It will be in the recollection of the Council" that a Resolution of the Directors to the above effect, dated the 19th December 1890, was communicated to the "Council on that date."

WATER COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Wednesday, the 1st day of July, 1891—Present: The Mayor; Councillors Darby, Heath, Waghorne and Williams, (The Mayor in the chair) -

1—Surveyor's Report—The usual Monthly Report of the Surveyor was read, as follows: On the 29th instant the springs supplying the Hewlett Reservoirs were yielding 170 gallons per minute, the average for the past 4 years being 170 gallons per minute; and the quantity of water in store was 27,027,208 gallons, the average being 29,729,575 gallons.

On the 29th instant the depth of water in the Dowdeswell Reservoir was 24 feet 9 inches, and the contents was 61,768,100 gallons, which gives a storage of 88,795,308 gallons, or 100 days' supply.

Water Mains have been extended in Swindon Road, St. Paul's Parade, and Horsefair Street, Charlton Kings.

An application has been received from the Midland and South Western Junction Railway Co. for permission to take water from the Midland Railway Co's. water crane at the Lansdown Station, and this has been agreed to, provided the Midland Railway Co. will be responsible for payment of the charges for all water through their meter.

All the Reservoirs have now been thoroughly cleaned; the supply pipes from the springs on the hills examined and repaired where necessary, and a Map prepared. The Filters at Dowdeswell and Tewkesbury have been cleaned to the bottom, and are now in good order.

The flange pipes have arrived and are being laid down from Keynsham Road to Barrett's Mill along the line of the footpath, parallel with the Chelt, as this offered fewest difficulties to be contended with. It will be continued across Barrett's Mill Garden and then in the Chelt.

The samples of water from Oxford Passage, submitted last month, have been examined. Both were taken from the same tap, which is supplied with a lead pipe, which had been condemned and notices served to connect to a new main. So far as can be ascertained no similar sample has been taken from the high main for some time; and I am of opinion that the contamination was drawn into the defective pipe, and that the water in the main was not in the state represented by the sample.

- 2--Barrett's Mill—A Letter from Mr. Combe, stating his inability to tell beforehand when the malting season would commence and end, was read. Resolved, That the Malthouse be let to Mr. Coombe for the season 1891-2, but not later than 1st May next, at the same rent as heretofore, viz., £20.
- 3— Volunteer Camp at Kayte Farm—A Letter from Capt. and Adjutant Baines, thanking the Committee for their Resolution of date the 15th May last, was read.

4—Appeals—The cases entered in the Appeal Book were considered, and the rates settled and adjusted. Supply of Water—Applications and agreements for the supply of water for the past month were examined and approved.

The Corporation, at their own cost, to erect an unclimbable iron fence not less than 4ft. 6in. in height along the North and West boundaries of the land from the Evesham Road to the Recreation Ground, with one gate therein, and such additional number of gates as may be required, not exceeding 11, for the use of occupiers of houses abutting on the Corporation property, who may become subscribers to the Pittville Gardens, subject to the Bye-laws and Regulations for the time being in force relating to the said gardens and the property.

No entrance to the property from the Recreation Ground for the use of the general public to be permitted.

(8)

Not more than 10 timber trees to be cut down by the Corporation except trees that may interfere with the proper growth of other trees, or that may become decayed or dangerous. The Vendor, on his part, not to cut down the avenue of trees on his land on the North, except to cut a drive across it not exceeding 60 feet in width.

The purchase to be completed within three months after the sanction of the Local Government Board to the necessary loan has been obtained; and the works to be completed within 12 months from the completion of the purchase. The Corporation to engage to apply for such sanction immediately after the purchase of the property has been approved by the Council.

Mr Villar's commission, the amount of which he leaves entirely to the Council, to be paid by the Corporation.

Resolved, That, subject to a satisfactory arrangement being conic to with Mr. Winterbotham for the purchase of that part of his property necessary to carry out the scheme in its entirety, the foregoing terms and conditions be agreed to.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Tuesday, the 28th day of July, 1891—Present: Alderman Simms Bell; Councillors King, Lawrence, and Steel (Alderman Simms Bull in the chair)—

- 1—Gas Examiner's Monthly Report —The Monthly Report of the Gas Examiner was read average illuminating power 1610 candles. Purity: 9.06 grains of Sulphur per 100 cubic feet.
- 2—Gas Inspector's Monthly Report—The Monthly Report of the Gas Inspector was read average hourly consumption of gas per lamp, during the month 4.378 cubic feet
- 3 Lamp Book—The Book kept at the Police Station was produced and examined. Lamps extinguished during the month: 8 (1 metered); burning dimly 1.

A Letter from the Clerks to the Gas Co., forwarding copy of the Co's. resolution in reply to the complaint of this Committee as to the burners and regulators in the public lamps, in which resolution the Company stated that the whole of the lamps are under the constant supervision of the Company's workmen, that the regulators are changed immediately the necessity arises, and the burners at all times kept clean so as to ensure efficient lighting, and that these matters will continue to engage the careful attention of the Manager, was read.

4—Surveyor's Monthly Report, re Highways—The Surveyor reported that the following works had been done in his Department during the past month:

Curbing, Crossing and Flagging: Park Place (proceeding), Victoria Street, Albion Street, Bath Road, St. George's Place, Queen Street, Western Road, St. Peter's Place, Clarence Street, Crescent Terrace, High Street (proceeding), Church Street, Ormond Place, Carlton Street, London Road, Bath Street, Promenade, Montpellier Terrace (proceeding), Whitehart Street, Tewkesbury Road, Swindon Road, Sandford Road, St. George's Road, Cleeveland Street, Townsend Street, Warwick Place, Six Chimney Lane (Tariff), Gloucester Road, Suffolk Square and Place, Dagmar Road, Grove Street (Burial Ground), Glenfall Street (proceeding). Footpaths: Granite: St. George's Road (proceeding), Magenta Place, Montpellier (finished). Gravel: Pittville Circus Road, Lansdown Road (proceeding). Tar Macadam: Colonnade. Ashes: 1,530 Loads collected. Trees: 1 dead cut down in Montpellier Street. Pruning-Trees, Lansdown Road and Place, Queen's Road, Christ Church Road, Malvern Road, Tewkesbury Road, Overton Road, Montpellier Walk, Bayshill Road, Fauconberg Road, Parabola Road, St. George's Road, All Saint's Road, Priory

Street, St. Luke's Road, Dagmar Road, Montpellier Parade and Terrace, Vittoria Walk, Tivoli Place, Imperial Square, and at various private houses.

5—Royal Crescent — A Specification from the Surveyor, of date the 28th inst., of the works required to be done to the above street, was read and approved. Resolved, That the necessary Plans, Sections, and Estimates be prepared, and Notice be given under Section 150 of the Public Health Act, 1875, to the Owners of the premises fronting, adjoining, or abutting upon the parts of the said street, requiring to be severed, levelled, paved, metalled, flagged, channelled, or made good; requiring them to do the specified works within 28 days; and that, if such Notice is not complied with, the Surveyor do proceed to execute the works mentioned or referred to therein; and that the expenses thereof be recovered in the manner provided by the Act.

6—Ambrose Street—St. Paul's Road: C. Bailey—A Letter from Mr. C. Bailey, stating that the steam roller had, while repairing the road in Ambrose Street, damaged the stone work and broken his gutter pipe, and calling attention to the fact that the Corporation men had taken up pipes in St. Paul's Road and made the road so hilly at the entrance to his Stores that it cannot be entered without injury to his horses and damage to his vans, was read. Resolved, That Mr. Bailey be informed with regard to Ambrose Street he most complete his crossing, and the margin of the path will be asphalted, and that in St. Paul's Road Mr. Bailey be required to put in either a gulley or a crossing.

Mowatt, stating that he had every wish to comply with the Bye-Laws, but he did not think the sign boards complained of were in contravention thereof, as they do not project beyond his premises, was read. 8—Pavement in Paragon Terrace—A Letter from the Rev. H. Hall, calling attention to the very bad state of this pavement, was read. Resolved, That the Surveyor do bring up a specification of the necessary works to be done by the abutting owners.

11—Swindon Road Improvement—A Letter from Mr. J. Davies, asking the Committee to grant him some compensation for the in-convenience he suffers in his business by reason of a portion of the land formerly occupied by him having been used for the construction of a footpath in Swindon Road, was read Resolved, That Mr. Davies be informed the Committee can-not entertain the application.

12-Street Projections—The Street Inspector reported that all the signs directed by this Committee's resolution of last month to be removed had been removed, with the exception of those put up by Mr. J. R. Mowatt. He also reported the erection by Mr. G. Chew, at Brunswick Buildings, Bath Road,

of a sign board in contravention of the Bye-laws. The Committee, having inspected the latter, decided that the sign projects only over private ground.

PUBLIC HEALTH COMMITTEE.

1-Chairman—In the absence of the Chairman, Councillor Norman was appointed Chairman at this meeting.

2— Houses without a Proper Supply of Water —A Report from the Surveyor of date the 28th inst., that the Houses mentioned therein are without a proper supply of water, and that such supply can

be readily obtained from the Corporation Mains at a cost not exceeding the Water Rate authorised by the Local Act in force within the Borough, was read. Resolved, That Notices be given under Sec. 62 of the Public Health Act, 1875, to the Owners of the houses in question, requiring them to obtain a supply and do all such works as may be necessary for that purpose.

- 3 Water Supply to Houses—Orders not complied with—The Medical Officer of Health submitted a list of houses, the owners of which had not complied with the Order to lay on a proper supply of water. Resolved, That Notices in those cases be given to close the wells and the necessary proceedings be taken to enforce compliance with the notices in case of default.
- 4--Norman and others —Lime Kiln near Ewlyn Road—A Memorial from Mr. Alfred Norman and others, complaining of a nuisance arising from noxious odours and dense volumes of smoke caused by the burning of slack coal and scavenger's refuse in this Lime Kiln, worked by Miss Weaver, and the deposit of the said refuse, was read, and referred to the Medical Officer of Health to report thereon.
- 5—Zymotic Disease—The Medical Officer of Health reported that there had been 6 cases of Scarlatina and 1 of Diphtheria during the month.
- 6 Hayward's Lane, Charlton Kings —A Letter from the Clerk to the Charlton Kings Local Board, forwarding extract from the Report of their Medical Officer of Health, reporting the deposit of ashes and decaying vegetable refuse in this road, and pronouncing it to be a nuisance dangerous to health, and stating that the Board were informed that the refuse was de-posited by the scavengers of the Town Council, and requesting the Council to discontinue the practice and cause the offensive matter to be removed, was read. And the Borough Surveyor having reported that no ashes or refuse had been deposited there by the Council for some months past, Resolved, That Mr. Gabb be so informed, and furthermore that the Committee had been informed that refuse had been recently deposited in the road by the Local Board's Contractor for removal of scavenger's refuse.
- 7—Daft's Cottages, St. Mark's Place—An application in writing from the Medical Officer of Health stating that the water closets on or appurtenant to the above premises are a nuisance and injurious to health, and Letters of Complaint from one of the tenants, were read. Resolved, That the Surveyor take action under Sec. 41 of the Public Health Act, and if the drains and water closets appear to be in bad condition, that notice be given to the owner of the premises requiring him to do such works as the Surveyor shall specify to be necessary. Also that notice be given to the owner under Sec. 28 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, requiring him to provide efficient flushing apparatus and means of ventilation to the water closets connected with the said cottages.

WATER COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Wednesday, the 2nd day of September, 1891—Present: The Mayor; Alderman Simms Bull; Councillors Heath and King (The Mayor in the chair)—

1—Surveyor's Report—The usual Monthly Report of the Surveyor was read, as follows: On the 31st ult. the springs supplying the Hewletts Reservoir were yielding 407 gallons per minute the average for the last four years being 221 gallons and the quantity of water in store at Hewletts and Leckhampton was 21,499,974 gallons, the average being 26,550,218 gallons.

On the 31st ult, the depth of water in the Dowdeswell Reservoir was 27 feet 9 inches, and the contents 75,404,246 gallons, or 118 days' supply.

On the 12th August the Boilers at Tewkesbury were examined by an Inspector of the Boiler Insurance Society, and he reports that the plates are slightly pitted in No 2 Boiler, but otherwise in good condition.

Mr. Baker, the Superintendent of the Fire Brigade, having called my attention to the insufficient number of Hydrants in some streets, I have examined them, and find that to properly protect the following streets about 48 additional hydrants will be required. In many of the streets there are no hydrants or other means of extinguishing fire—Naunton Park Terrace 2; Whitecross Square 1; Naunton Crescent 4; Exmouth Street 2; Francis Street 2; Bath Terrace 1; Christ Church Road 4; Overton Road 4; Malvern Road 3; Western Road 2; Great Western Road 3; Great Western Terrace 2; Millbrook Street 3; the whole of Fairview District, viz., Union Street 2; Jersey Street 1; Columbia Street 2; &c. Alexandra Street 2; Dagmar Road 1; Oakfield Street 2; St. Stephen's Road 2; Cleeve Road 2; Pittville Crescent 1.

I visited the Tewkesbury Works yesterday, and had an interview with Mrs. Smith, the widow of the late tenant of land adjoining the works. the rent (£24 per annum) is six months in arrear, and another quarter will be due on September 29th There is a small stack of hay on the ground which she estimates to weigh 7 to 8 tons, but which is unthatched. It is in good condition now. Probably at £2 10s per ton it would be sufficient to pay all the half-year's rent, and might pay something towards this quarter.

She also says that the quantity of land is over estimated, and wishes for a reduction in the rent. She is willing to pay £3 per acres. The area is 6 acres.

Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor do arrange with Mrs. Smith to take the rick of hay off her hands in liquidation of the debt, and that the rental in future be £20 instead of £24.

The Mayor stated that the matter was receiving the immediate attention of the Borough Surveyor and the Water Committee.

6—Sewer Ventilation—The Surveyor laid before the Committee a Report on the subject of Sewer Ventilation, and recommending the connection with the house drains, on the sewer side of the intercepting trap, of a small galvanized wrought iron pipe, to be continued up the outside wall of each house to a point at least 3 feet from any window, and 2 feet above any roof. WATER COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Wednesday, the 30th day of September, 1891—Present: The Mayor; Councillors Darby, Heath (old King (The Mayor in the chair)—

1--Surveyor's Report—The usual Monthly Report of the Surveyor as follows, was read:

On the 28th instant the springs supplying the Hewletts' Reservoirs were yielding 266 gallons per minute, the average for the last four years being 204 gallons; and the quantity of water in store at Hewletts and Leckhampton was 27,379,170 gallons; the average being 25,689.694 gallons.

On the 29th inst. the depth of water in Dowdeswell Reservoir was 31 feet, and the contents 94,756,149 gallons, which gives a total storage of 122,135,319 gallons or 189 days' supply.

On Thursday, the 24th instant, I observed an offensive fishy odour in the water, and thinking that it proceeded from fish the supply was changed on Friday to Hewletts Reservoir No. 4, and all the mains washed out. Since Monday the pipes have again been washed thoroughly: yesterday upwards of 1,000,000 gallons of water was used, in addition to the ordinary daily supply of 650,000. Two small eels were sent to the office yesterday from Montpellier, and it was stated they came from the tap. The offensive odour still continues, but in some parts of the Town it is not quite so bad as yesterday and appears to pass off after the water has stood for a time.

Resolved, That notice be given to Messrs. W. Blackburn & Co., Mr. Pope, and the Telephone Company, to remove the Signs put up by them.

Applications from the London Rubber Co. of the Colonnade, and Mr. G. H. New, of 102, High Street, for permission to fix two lamps in the first case and one lamp in the other case, outside their respective premises, were read. Resolved, That the required permission be given, subject to the Lamps being not less than 8 feet in the clear above the pavement and to their not being used as advertising lamps, and subject also to the right of the Corporation to require their removal, if at any time they think fit to do so.

19—No. 313, High Street—The Surveyor reported that he had arranged with Messrs. Sadler & Son to let the premises to them at £30 per annum, an allowance being made to them of £5 out of the first quarter's rent for inside repairs, the Corporation to repair and maintain the roof, and a letter from Messrs. Sadler & Son accepting these terms, was read, and the Town Clerk reported that he had prepared and sent to Messrs. Sadler & Son the draft agreement. Resolved, That the arrangement be approved.

20-Osborne House—A letter from Messrs. Bubb & Co., on behalf of Miss Podmore, the owner of the above property, stating that for many years the footpath immediately opposite each entrance gate has been sloped to a level with the plinth of such gate so as to allow of Carriages being driven up to the door, that on the recent laying down of Asphalte on the footpath in front of the house, the slope to the gates had been removed and the footpath levelled so that there is a considerable drop from the stone between the plinths of the gates to the level of the path, rendering it impossible for carriages to enter or leave the drive, and that under the circumstances they had to ask that the footpath might be reinstated to its former condition, was read. Resolved, That Messrs. Bubb be informed the Surveyor will lower the Carriage Drive and re-hang the gates.

Resolved, That a fence be erected in the Home field at an expense of not more than £25. The Medical Officer of Health made an examination of the water supplied to the house and found it singularly pure and of good quality.

3--Houses without a proper supply of Water—A Report from the Surveyor of date the 27th inst. that the houses mentioned therein are without a proper supply of water and that such supply can be readily obtained from the Corporation mains at a cost not exceeding the Water Rate authorised by the Corporation Water Acts, was read. Resolved, That notice be given under Section 62 of the Public Health Act 1875 to the owners of thy: houses in question, requiring them to obtain such supply and do all such acts as may be necessary for that purpose.

Also the owner of No 2 Regent Street be served with notice to close the well on the said premises.

- 4—Notices re Water Supply not complied with—The Medical Officer of Health submitted a list of houses the owners of which had failed to comply with the Notices to lay on a proper supply of water. Resolved, That notice he given in those cases to close the wells and that the necessary proceedings be taken to enforce the compliance with such notices in cases of default.
- 5—Slaughterhouse at Arle Mill—An application from Mr. J. F. Willis to have the above place registered as a slaughterhouse, was read together with a report from the Medical Officer of Health, to the effect that he visited the Mill on the 26th of October and found the place had been used as a slaughterhouse and was in a most abominably filthy condition. Resolved, That the application for a license be refused, and that if the premises are again used as a slaughterhouse the proprietor will be prosecuted.

6—Albion Saw Mills and Flour Mills—The Inspector of Nuisances reported that he had observed black smoke issuing from the chimney belonging jointly to the above mills on several occasions during the past month in such quantities as to be a nuisance. Resolved, That notice be given to the respective occupiers under Section 91 of the Public Health Act requiring them to abate the nuisance, and that the necessary steps be taken to obtain an order prohibiting the recurrence of the nuisance.

During the month it has been found necessary to extend the mains in Belmore Place; and applications have been received for a supply of water to Hatherley Vicarage; in all of which cases the return will be sufficient to meet the statutory requirements.

They also suggested the commutation of the Parish Clerk's fees. The Committee having fully considered the question. Resolved, That the Town Clerk do reply to Messrs. 2—Marle Hill Estate—A letter from the Local Government Board, of date the 22nd inst., in reply to letters from the Town Clerk enquiring whether the Board would make a Provisional Order amending the Improvement Act of 1889 so as to enable the Corporation to purchase Mr. Noble's and Mr. Winterbotham's land, and extend the Provisions of the said Act to such land, authorising them to make charges for admission and otherwise, stating that with reference to the Town Clerk's letter and his interview with Mr. Dalton on the 14th inst., and to the proposals of the Council and assuming that such proposals would not involve any interference with Water Rights under Secs. 327 and 332 of the Public Health Act, 1875, the Board are aware of no reason why those proposals should not be carried into effect by means of a Provisional Order, altering the Local Act of 1889 as proposed, so as to make such of the Provisions of the Local Act as at present apply to the Pittville Estate applicable

with such modifications if any, as may be found advisable to the maintenance and regulation of the additional land in question

3—Pittville Estate—Cotterell—A Report from the Town Clerk and Borough Surveyor on this subject was read and considered. The Report stated that the frontage of this land to the Cleeve Path Drive is 1,955 feet, 55 feet of which is intended for a road opposite the cross drive to the Pump Room. That it is proposed to divide the land into 30 Lots, four of which front the New Barn Lane. The width of the Lots adjoining the Cleeve Path Drive varying from 55 to 65 feet, and of those fronting the New Barn Lane 78 feet, the frontage of these latter Lots to the Cleeve Path Drive being about 308 feet. Resolved, That a Rent charge of 1s per foot frontage be charged on the land built on or held either by an owner or occupier with a house. In the meantime £10 per cent per annum be charged on the full amount of the Rent Charge on the land remaining unbuilt on or not held as aforesaid which would be payable if it were so built on or held. The Rent Charge on the Lots fronting to the New Barn Lane to be calculated on the frontage to the Cleeve Path Drive, and to be equally divided between the said 4 Lots. Neither the Lot of Land intended for a road, or any other part of the land to be used as a (road by the owners or occupiers of the land behind and on the east side of Cotterell's land, or as a means of access to such land without the consent of the Corporation, and on such terms as may be agreed on. No house to be built on the land of a less value than £500 exclusive of the value of the land on which it is built. All houses to be set back at least 40 feet from the road. The rights and privileges to be granted in consideration of such rent charges being the right of user of the Cleeve Path Drive and the other Rides and Drives on the Pittville Estate, but not the user of the Gardens. The right of user of the Sewers of the Corporation to be granted on payment of a rate of sixpence in the £ on the rateable value of the houses draining into or using such sewers.

4—Gift of Water Fowl —A Letter from Major Selwyn Payne, stating he would be pleased to give the Committee—for the Pittville Gardens—a pair of Black Muscovy Ducks, a pair of White Call Ducks, an East Indian and a Shell Duck, was read. SCHOOL ATTENDANCE COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Saturday, the 24th day of October, 1891—Present: Alderman Sir Alexander Ramsey; Councillors Hands, Moles, Steel and Parsonage (Councillor Hands in the chair)—

1—Local Committees—The Minute Books of the various Local Committees were gone through and examined. Resolved, That summonses be issued in the following cases:

Flora Hill, 2, Bubb's Cottages, Sherborne Street Kate Cole, Hereford Place Reuben Cowles, 76, Stanhope Street William Welsh, Gas Lane Elizabeth Hunt, Fairlight Place.

- 2-Attendance Officers' Reports—The Monthly Reports of the School Attendance Officers were read.
- 3—South Ward—Mr. Turner reported that in consequence of the information given him by the Rev. Despard that there were a number of children in Kew Place and Clare Place who were not attending any School at all, he had visited every house in those places, and found that there were only 26 children of school age residing there, and that they were all attending some School; and he laid before the Committee a list of the children, and the Schools they attended. Resolved, That a copy of this Minute and of the list be sent to Mr. Despard.

4—Duties of tile School Attendance Officers—The Council having expressed a wish to be informed as to the duties of the School Attendance Officers, and the means taken to enforce the attendance of children at School, the Committee beg to report as follows .—

Fortnightly Returns are required to be sent in by the School Teachers, on a form in duplicate, shewing the number of children on the books and average attendance. The names and ages of the absentees, with the Standard they have passed, the address of the parents, the length of absence, and the cause, if known. There are also columns for the date of visit by the Officer to the house, and for remarks which are filled up by the Attendance Officers. These returns include absentees who have been struck off the register since the date of the previous return.

On receipt of these returns, the Attendance Officers, according to arrangements made between them for division of the work, visit the house where each child lives to ascertain the cause of absence, and the cause stated is entered on the return. If the Officer is not satisfied that there is a reasonable excuse for non-attendance he leaves a summons with the parent to attend before the Local Committee of the district and show cause why proceedings should not be taken against him or her. The duplicate Return is returned to the School, filled up by the Attendance Officer with the alleged cause of absence, that the Teacher may be informed thereof. These Returns are laid before the Local Committees, who meet once every fort-night, and hear the parents and investigate the cases. Their proceedings are entered in Minute Books, which are laid before this Committee at their usual meeting. The Attendance Officers, both before and after the meetings of the Committees, visit the Schools to ascertain if the children returned as absentees are attending School, and for other information bearing on their duties.

The results of these enquiries are entered in the Minutes Books, before the same are laid before this Committee, which orders summonses to be issued in all cases when recommended by the Local Committees, and in all other cases they think necessary. During the past year 336 parents have been summoned to appear before the Local Committees, and 35 have been summoned before the Magistrates and fined. Two boys have been sent to Industrial Schools.

It is the special duty of Mr. Turner to look after the children who are reported to the Officers or whom they find to be not attending School, and Mr. Turner frequently makes house to house visitations in the poorest and most populous parts of the town to ascertain if there are any children not attending any School, and he visits the Schools where they are said to attend, if any, to verify the statements made. The Caretaker of the Recreation Ground also reports to the Attendance Officers any children apparently under School age who are playing truant there or in the neighbourhood, and the police do the same with regard to any children found wandering in the streets. The Officers also visit the houses of parents of children who appear to have ceased to attend a particular School, to ascertain where they do attend.

The Committee have now under consideration some additional forms and books to be kept by the School Attendance Officers, and they intend to invite a conference between this Committee and the Local Committees at an early date.

- 8—Cloddimore Road—A memorial from Mr. H. A. Palmer and others calling attention to the condition of this road, and praying the Council to have it repaired. was read. Resolved, That the Surveyor do bring up a Specification for the repair of the road as a private road.
- 9 —Montpellier Grove—A memorial from Gen. Hawkes and others praying the Corporation to give directions for the repair of this road, with a view to its being declared a public road, was read. Resolved, That the Surveyor do bring up a Specification for the repair of this road, with a view to its being declared a highway.
- 10—College Lawn Road—The further consideration of this matter was adjourned.
- 11— County Court Road—A Letter from the Registrar of the County Court stating that the noise caused by the large amount of traffic passing over Regent Street and County Court Road is, at times, so great as to be an annoyance to the Officers of the Court, to the Advocates and to the Suitors and to render difficult the administration of Justice, and that if the traffic cannot be diverted then he thought a considerable alleviation of the noise might be made by laying down the road with similar material to that used in the Colonnade, seas read. Resolved, That Mr. Williams be informed that the next time the road requires repair the question of an improved mode of construction will be considered.
- 12-Cabmens Shelter—A letter from Mrs. Bannerman. applying to the Committee to fix a site for a Cabmen's Shelter, in the event the Council permitting such an erection, was read. Resolved, That the site he fixed at about the centre of the Cab Stand at the New Club.

had arisen in connection with certain land, and the Company were forced either to narrow and seriously restrict the Station accommodation, they had proposed to afford, or acquire other land on the opposite side of the Station site to permit of the expansion that was necessary for the provision of a handsome and commodious Station, that the Directors had adopted the latter alternative, and that his call at the Town Clerk's office on the 15th October, was made within two hours of having arranged terms for the additional land required, and the Company were now in a position to considerably amplify their pro-posed accommodation in a manner which they believed could not fail to give satisfaction to the town and trade of Cheltenham, that the New Plans were in course of preparation and it was the intention of the Company to commence the work with all practicable despatch, that it would not be necessary for him to raise the point as to whether it seas competent for the Surveyor to give such a notice as had been given, having regard to the Company's Parliamentary powers, and it being understood that the object of the Corporation in putting forward the question, was to accelerate a decision in regard to the general proposals for improved Station accommodation, and after receiving the foregoing information he hoped the Corporation would feel that their purpose had been served, and that the notice in question could properly now be withdrawn, was read. Owen the Local Superintendent of the Telephone Company acknowledging receipt of notice to remove this sign, which the Company had complied with, but stating that the Company, would be glad to have permission to refix it, as having a Sign Board at that place is a most important matter to the Company, and a convenience to the public, and he trusted the Council would not withhold such consent, was read. Resolved. That the Committee regret they cannot in this case make any exception to the general rule.

2-No. 1, Bath Street—A letter from Mr. E. J. Rivers, Surveyor of Taxes, enquiring whether the Corporation would be willing to let these premises on an annual tenancy at the same rent (£55) on the expiration of the existing lease, which expires at Mid-summer next, was read. Resolved, That the tenancy be continued on the expiration of the lease, as a yearly tenancy, at the same rent and on the same terms as in the lease.

3—Borough Surveyor's Report--The usual Monthly Report of the Surveyor as follows, was read:

On the 30th ultimo the Springs supplying the Hewlett's Reservoirs were yielding 531 gallons per minute, the average for the last 4 years being 286 gallons per minute, and the quantity of water in store at Hewletts and Leckhampton was 22,897,727 gallons, the average being 21,630,259 gallons.

On the 30th ultimo the depth of water in the Dowdeswell Reservoir was 32 feet, and the contents 100,023,701 gallons, which gives a total storage of 122,921,428 gallons, or 189 days supply.

With a view of ascertaining the effect of an effort made last year to reduce the waste of water at Tewkesbury, I have caused the weekly consumption of coal for the half-year Lady Day to Michaelmas 1891, to be compared with the half year Lady Day to Michaelmas, 1890, i.e., six months before, and the corresponding six months after, the inspection.

The result shows an average decrease in the weekly consumption of coal, of 10 cwt. 3 qrs., being a total saving of £7 13s. 9d. in the half year.

According to your Regulations the Stop Tap under the pavement is to be entirely within the control of your officers, and the usual method of ceasing to supply water to a house is by shutting the Stop Tap, thus avoiding damage to the roadway, inconvenience to the consumers by stopping the supply, cost to the waterworks, and waste of water; the whole of a large main having frequently to be emptied to disconnect one house; the whole of these inconveniences are again encountered when the house has to be supplied for a new tenant. Several cases have been found in which the Stop Taps have been opened by some unauthorised person and supplies of water, for Building and other purposes, obtained without any payment being made. I was induced to devise a fitting which could be attached to the existing taps and would effectually prevent any tap being altered after being shut by the Turncock (sample submitted). The cost will he about 30s. per dozen. Probably seven or eight doz. will be required at first, and twelve doz. afterwards.

At the present time No. 4 Reservoir is being emptied. As the vegetable organisms in the water showed no sign of reducing in numbers, I thought it desirable to change the water entirely.

Resolved, That the Surveyor be authorised to obtain 100 of the Stop Tap Fittings.

4-Appeals—The cases entered in the Appeal Book were considered and the rates settled and adjusted.

Carey and Mr. Bird, and that they would now proceed to issue a Provisional Order in compliance with the application of the Town Council, so far as it relates to the extension' of the Borough by the addition thereto of part of the Local Government Districts of Leckhampton and Charlton Kings.

5-Longley's Holiday Guides-A letter from Mr. F. E. Longley, of 39, Warwick Lane, London, proposing to issue a first-class Guide to Cheltenham at 1d., and enclosing specimens of other similar Guides already issued, on the terms of a full page advertisement of the Town for £10 and £3 per 1,000 copies, was read. Resolved, That the Committee cannot recommend the proposal to be entertained.

6-Montpellier Gardens—The Committee further considered the question of the purchase of this property in pursuance of the Amendment to their previous Resolution made at the last meeting of the Council. REPORT ON TECHNICAL BOOKS.

To the Chairman and Members of the Library Committee.

GENTLEMEN,

I beg respectfully to report to you on the Technical Books purchased out of the grant from the County Council.

Up to the present time 128 volumes have been purchased, 104 of which have been placed in the Lending Library, and 24 in the Reference Library.

Out of this number 62 volumes have been issued for home reading, and 20 volumes consulted in the Reference Library.

In order to give as much publicity as possible to these books, two shelves in the glazed book-case on the counter have been set apart for their display, and a classified list of them prepared for the use of Borrowers.

The attention thus called to this class of literature has resulted in a demand for books of this character which the Library already possessed, and during the 13 days these books were exposed to view, 215 volumes were issued.

There have been many applications for books on subjects which are not represented in the recent purchases, but I hope very shortly to prepare a list, embodying the works enquired for.

A specially prepared classified Catalogue of all the works of a technical nature, in both departments of the Library, would be of great service to students, and if you are of opinion that such a catalogue is advisable, the work shall be commenced at once.

The cost of printing would not be much, and it might be sold at a price which would cover the cost of the same. I remain, Gentlemen,
