Resolved, That the same be disapproved, the thickness of the walls being insufficient to carry the height of the building.

- 3 -Trees—Resolved, That the Resolution to Minute No. 16 of the proceedings of this Committee of date the 29th day of November last be rescinded, and that no trees at all be felled this season.
- 4- -- Byelaw's re Deposits of Rubbish in back Streets—A letter from Inspector Young, was read, asking to be relieved from the duty which instructed had been required of him to see that the recently made Byelaw to prevent the deposit of rubbish in back streets is complied with, as he had so much to do already that he would be unable to perform this additional work satisfactorily. 7—The View The following Members attended the View Meeting, viz., Councillors Baker, Bence, Cypher, M. Davis, Dix, and Margrett.

8--Street Projections The Street Inspector reported that at Mr. R. W. Jackson's, No. 2, Clarence Street, a gas rail had been fixed in front of the premises; that a projecting sign board, which was removed in September last, had been replaced by Mr. D. Larner, at Robin Hood Inn, St. James's Street. and that Mr. Crowther had failed to comply with the notice that he had given him to remove the sign board placed by him on the premises occupied by Mrs. Hooper at the corner of St. James's Street. Letters were read from Mr. R. W. Jackson, asking permission to allow his gas rail to remain; from Mr. W. E. Crowther stating that he had obtained permission to write on the wall and he would take down the sign, and requesting permission to remove the sign board from his former workshop in St. James's Street to the one then in his occupation next door; also one from Messrs. Showells' Brewery Co., Limited, per Mr. J. H. Webbe, of No. 11, Regent Street, requesting permission to replace the lamp then fixed on the corner of the premises known as the Whitesmith's Arms, near the Gas Works, with one of a better make and pattern, bearing the name of the House and the words Showell's Ales; also for permission to fix a sign 2 ft. deep round the eaves of the Whitesmith's Arms which would not project, and to fix a lamp at the Britannia Inn, corner of St. Paul's Street, South, and Swindon Road, on the corner over the entrance; also from Mr. James Villar, on behalf of Messrs. Flower & Sons, Ltd., applying for permission to move the lamp which then hung from the front of the Cafe Continental in the High Street to over the doorway in Regent Street, provided it is kept back closer to the wall of the building.

Resolved, That the applications be acceded to upon the usual terms except that as regards the one at the Britannia Inn, which the Committee omitted to view, the permission be granted subject to the approval of the Chairman after inspection by him, and that Mr. Lamer be given notice to remove the sign at the Robin Hood Inn.

9—Laying of Underground Telephone Wires-The consideration of this matter was adjourned pending receipt of information from other local authorities by the Town Clerk.

10—Application to Parliament by Great Western Railway Company to acquire part of the side approach to the Station The Town Clerk laid before the Committee notice of application to Parliament by the Great Western Railway Company to acquire part of the side approach to the Station, extending from St. James's Square, 4 chains or thereabouts in a Westerly direction, and a plan delineating same. Resolved, That the Town Clerk be instructed to write to the Solicitor to the Company asking him what the Company propose to do about the public right of way from St. James's Square to the road leading to the Parish Church Schools from the Knapp.

Resolved, To adjourn further consideration of the question until after the receipt of a reply from the School Committee.

14-Tree opposite Flesk Lodge—A letter from Mr. N. W. Olive was read, requesting that the oak tree in front of the entrance to Flesk Lodge might be removed. Resolved, To inform Mr. Olive that the Council have decided to fell no more trees this season.

15 Fairfield Road —A Memorial from Mr. Thomas Jenkins and seven other abutting owners in Fairfield Road was read, applying to the Council to take over the same as a Highway. Resolved, That the necessary Notices be posted declaring the street a Highway.

16--Private In Works in Lane off Clare Street—A letter was read from Mr. Edwin Coome, of Coomeville, Clare Street, claiming 12s 6d for alterations he had to do to his doorways and raising and refixing the sill, occasioned by the raising of the roadway. Resolved, That he be allowed 12s 6d as soon as he has carried out the requirements of the Public Health Committee.

- 17– Highbury Lane Resolved, To instruct the Borough Surveyor to bring up a specification of the works to be done by the abutting owners to put this street into a proper state of repair.
- 18—Rosehill Street -Resolved, That a crossing be constructed across the entrance to Rosehill Street from Hales Road.
- 19-- Paving in Old Bath Road opposite Oxford Place—Resolved, To instruct the Borough Surveyor to do what is necessary to put this paving into a proper state of repair and prevent the water from making its way into the cellars of the houses.
- 20-Back Lane between North Place and Portland Street—Resolved, That a crossing be laid down in this lane, and that the Borough Surveyor be instructed to bring up a specification of the work to be done to put the lane into proper repair.
- 21-Channelliqg in Townsend Street Resolved, To instruct the Borough Surveyor to have the channelling in this street repaired where necessary.
- 22-Malvern Road Footpath, Footpath West side of Christ Church Road and Inner Road at St. Margaret's Terrace (Apportionments) The Borough Surveyor reported that the cost of carrying out the Private Improvement Works ordered to be done to the abovementioned streets amounted to £93 Os. 1d., £182 8s. 11d. and £14 5s, 7d. respectively, which sums he had respectively apportioned between the abutting owners according to the frontage of their respective premises. Resolved, That the apportionments be approved, and that Notices thereof and of demand be served on the owners.
- 23– Footpaths in Swindon Road and opposite the Woodlands, Rodney Road—Specifications from the Surveyor, of date the 23rd day of December, 1897, of the works required to be done to the above streets were read and approved. Resolved, That notice be given under Section 44 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1852, to the Owners of the premises fronting, adjoining, or abutting upon the parts of the said streets requiring to be drained, levelled, repaired, flagged, and channelled; requiring them to do the specified works within 28 days: and that if such notice is not complied with, the Surveyor do proceed to execute the works mentioned or referred to therein; and that the expenses thereof be recovered in the manner provided by the Act, and the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889.
- 24-Bath Parade—A Specification from the Surveyor of date the 13th day of December, 1897, of the works required to be done to the above street, was read and approved. Resolved, That the necessary plans, sections, and estimates be prepared, and Notices be given under Section 150 of the Public Health Act, 1875, to the owners of the premises fronting, adjoining, or abutting upon the parts of the said street, requiring to be severed, levelled, paved, metalled, flagged, channelled, or made good. requiring them to do the specified works within 28 days; and that if such notice is not complied with, the Surveyor do proceed to execute the works mentioned or referred to therein; and that the expenses thereof be recovered in the manner provided by the Act, and the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889.

PUBLIC HEALTH COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Wednesday, the 8th day of December, 1897-Present: Alderman Norman; Councillors Bence, M. Davis, Gurney, Lenthall, Margrett, and Moles (Councillor Bence in the chair).

- 1 -Zymotic Disease- The Medical Officer of Health reported that there had been notified since the last meeting of the Committee, 7 cases of Scarlet Fever, 1 of Enteric Fever, and 1 of Diphtheria; that 6 cases of Scarlet Fever had been sent into the Delancey Hospital, and that the number of cases then in the Delancey Hospital sent in by the Corporation was 34.
- 2- Nuisance from Drains, &c. at Nos. 341, 369, and 342, High Street, No. 17, Townsend Street, Craven Cottage, Folly Lane, Nos. 9, 10, 12, 20, 21, and 23, White Hart Street, No. 35, Duke Street, Stables behind No. 23, Lansdown Place, and House in Hatherley Lane in occupation of Mrs. Page.-The Inspector of Nuisances having made written application under Sec. 41 of the Public Health Act, stating that the drains, &c., on or belonging to the above-named houses were in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health. Resolved, That authority be given to the Inspector of Nuisances to open the ground, examine the drains, and, if necessary, give the notices and act as provided by the said section.
- 3-W.C's without Flushing Apparatus-The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses having w.c's without flushing apparatus. Resolved, That Notices under Section 28 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, be given to the owners requiring them to provide the necessary flushing apparatus, and to the occupiers to lay on a proper supply of water thereto, and that in default of compliance with such notices proceedings be taken for the penalties.
- 4-Houses without proper Ash Receptacles-The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses which had no proper ashpits or ash receptacles. Resolved, That the necessary Notices be given to the respective Owners under Sec. 36 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and Sec. 27 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, requiring them in each case to provide a moveable ash receptacle of such size, pattern, and construction as may be approved by the Borough Surveyor on behalf of the Corporation, and that where a common fixed ashpit may be constructed that form may be permitted.
- 5-Cleansing and Limewashing at No. 61, Upper Park Street, Nos. 22 & 25, Brunswick Street, and No. 17, Marle Hill Road- The Medical Officer of Health having certified under Sec. 46 of the Public Health Act, that the above-named dwelling houses were in such a filthy and unwholesome condition that the health of the inmates was affected or endangered thereby. Resolved, That Notice be given to the owners under the said Section requiring the houses to be cleansed and limewashed.

- 6--Dairies, Cowsheds, and Milkshops Order An application to be registered as a Dairyman and Purveyor of Milk, was received from James Lamport, Imperial Temperance Hotel, No. 388, High Street. Resolved, That the same be granted.
- 7- Sewer in White Hart Street -Resolved, To instruct the Borough Surveyor to inspect this sewer, and furnish an estimate of the cost of relaying it.
- 8- Cowsheds and Dairies in the Borough-The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of the Cowsheds and Dairies within the Borough, which had all been recently inspected, also a list of places from which milk was known to be supplied in the Borough, to each of which printed notices of the requirements and of the powers contained in the Provisional Order recently obtained had been sent.
- 9-Insanitary Property at No. 230, High Street, No. 25, Brunswick Street & Nos. 334, 335,365, 368 & 357, High Street-The Medical Officer of Health reported that the premises above-mentioned were in such a state as to be injurious to the health of the inmates owing to defective walls, roofs, yards, &c. Resolved, That the Committee being satisfied that the said premises are in such a state as to be injurious to health, Notices under Sec. 94 of the Public Health Act be served upon the owners requiring them to put the same into a healthy condition and for that purpose to carry out the works specified in the Notices.
- 10-Wells at Nos. 1, 2, 4, 24. 25, 27, 35, 36, 37, & 38, Brunswick Street, No. 16, Victoria Street, St. Paul's, No. 230, High Street, and the British Schools-The Medical Officer of Health reported that the water in the wells at the above-mentioned premises was used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, and was so polluted as to be injurious to health. Resolved, That proceedings under Sec. 70 of the Public Health Act be taken to obtain orders for these wells to be closed.
- 11-Notices not complied with-The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of Notices to carry out sanitary requirements which had not been complied with. Resolved, To instruct the Town Clerk to take proceedings, if necessary, to compel compliance with the Notices.
- 12-Flushing Box to W.C. at Somerton Villa, Great Western Road -A letter from Mr. J. W. Gunning, was read, requesting to be relieved from the obligation to comply with the notice which had been served upon him to provide flushing apparatus to the w.c. at Somerton Villa, as it was sufficiently flushed from a rain water cistern, and was outside the house. Resolved, To inform Mr. Gunning that the Council are unable to make any exceptions, and he must comply with the notice.
- 13-Barbed Wire at Sewage Farms -A letter from Mr. G. B. Witts, Hon. Sec. of the Cotswold Hunt, was read, on behalf of the Hunt Committee, requesting to be allowed to remove any barbed wire on the sewage farms at their cost, undertaking to replace same at the end of the season if wished, and if there should be any wire which cannot be dispensed with to be allowed to place Danger Boards where necessary to mark the existence of hidden danger. Resolved, To inform Mr. Witts that the Council have no barbed wire at the farms, but that the Tenants will be required to comply with the request.
- 14 -Lodging House Byelaw -A letter from the Local Government Board, was read, with which the draft of the proposed Byelaws with respect to houses let in lodgings, or occupied by members of more than one family, was returned for consideration of their alterations and marginal notes. Resolved, That the same be printed and that a copy be sent to each member of the Council.

15—Sewerage Loan —A letter from the Local Government Board, was read, with reference to the application for sanction to borrow £13,310 for works of sewerage and sewage disposal, and as they include works outside the District, enquiring whether the Notices required under Sec. 32 of the Public Health Act had been given, and requesting that separate estimates be sent to the Board showing how the amount asked for in each resolution is made up; also a letter from the Town Clerk in reply, was read. Resolved, That the necessary Notices be issued at once, and that the Borough Surveyor be instructed to furnish the required estimates as far as possible,

Resolved, That authority be given to the Inspector of Nuisances to open the ground, examine the drains, and, if necessary, give the notices and act as provided by the said section.

18—Overcrowding at Nos. 4 & 6, Brunswick Terrace The Medical Officer of Health reported that the above premises were so overcrowded as to be dangerous or injurious to the health of the inmates. Resolved, That the Committee being satisfied of the existence of a nuisance on the said premises Notices under Sec. 94 of the Public Health Act be served on the owners and occupiers thereof, requiring them to abate the same.

19—Water Closets without Flushing Apparatus-The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses having water closets without Flushing Apparatus. Resolved, That Notices under Sec. 28 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, be given to the Owners requiring them to provide the necessary flushing apparatus, and to the Occupiers to lay on a proper supply of water thereto, and that in default of compliance with such Notices proceedings be taken for the penalties.

20—Houses without Proper Ash Receptacles The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses which had no proper Ashpits or Ash Receptacles. Resolved, That the necessary Notices be given to the respective owners under Sec. 36 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and Sec. 27 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, requiring them in each case to provide a moveable ash receptacle of such size, pattern, and construction as may be approved by the Borough Surveyor on behalf of the Corporation, and that where a common fixed ashpit may be constructed that form may be permitted.

21 -- Cleansing and Limewashing at No. 51, Sherborne Street, No. 6, Hamilton Place, and Nos. 2, 5, 7, 8, 9, 11 & 12, Brunswick Terrace—The Medical Officer of Health having certified under Sec. 46 of the Public Health

Act, that the above-named dwelling houses were in such a filthy and unwholesome condition that the health of the inmates was affected or endangered thereby, Resolved, That Notices be given to the owners under the said Section requiring the houses to be cleansed and limewashed.

22 - Dairies, Cowsheds, and Milkshops Order- Applications were received from Edward Stephens, of Harthurstfield Farm, Gloucester Road, to be registered as a Cowkeeper, and from W. C. Brady, of the Star Coffee Tavern, Tewkesbury Road, to be registered as a Purveyor of Milk. Resolved, That consideration of the application of Mr. Stephens be adjourned pending an inspection of his Cowsheds, and that the application of Mr. Brady be acceded to.

23-Sewer in Market Street—The Medical Officer of Health reported that this sewer was not sufficiently deep to drain the houses of Albion Parade, Market Street, and suggested that as it was included in No. 1 drainage scheme, its relaying should be proceeded with at once. Resolved, That the work must remain in abeyance pending receipt of sanction to the loan.

24-Common Lodging House An application was received from William Gapper to be registered as the keeper of a Common Lodging House at Nos. 80 & 81, Stanhope Street. Resolved, That the application be refused, the premises not being in a satisfactory condition.

25- Insanitary Property, viz.-- Nos. 1, 2, 4, 5, 6, 7, 10, 11, & 12, Brunswick Street, No. 1, Francis Place, No. 6, Corpus Street, and No. 12, Beaufort Buildings--The Medical Officer of Health reported that the premises above-mentioned were in such a state as to be a nuisance and injurious to the health of the inmates, owing to defective walls, roofs, ceilings, yards, &c. Resolved, That the Committee being satisfied that the said premises are in such a state as to be injurious to health, Notices under Sec. 94 of the Public Health Act be served upon the owners requiring them to put the same into a healthy condition and for that purpose to carry out the works specified in the Notices.

Resolved, That proceedings under Sec. 70 of the Public Health Act be taken to obtain Orders for these wells to be closed.

28-Heyden Farm—A letter was read from Mr. James Wood, offering £300 per annum for this farm, free of all rates, tithes and taxes, and to do all the ploughing out. Resolved, That the offer be accepted provided the farm is taken to in its present from state.

31-Drainage from Marle Hill Mansion A Letter from Mr H. W. Chatters was read, enquiring if the owner of this house would be permitted to connect the house drains with the Corporation Sewer free of encumbrance. - 3—Clarence Square Resolved, To instruct the Borough Surveyor to have the verges re-turfed and the fencing repaired, and that the Committee pay a visit to inspect the hedges and verges on the Pittville Estate.
- 4—Bye-Laws—The Town Clerk laid before the Committee the draft Bye-laws for the regulation of the use of the Gardens in Clarence and Wellington Squares. Resolved, That the same be printed and that copies be sent to each member of the Committee.
- 5—Rate for Bands—A letter from the Town Clerk of Worthing was read, forwarding copies of resolutions adopted by the Town Council of Worthing expressing satisfaction that Sir A. Hickman, M.P. intends to reintroduce in the next Session of Parliament the Bill to enable Towns and Urban District Councils to obtain, amongst other things, a power to contribute out of the Rates for the purpose of subsidising a Town Band, but suggesting an amendment of the Bill so as to allow an annual contribution not exceeding one penny in the pound, and requesting the co-operation of Boroughs and Urban District Councils who have not already such powers granted by Local Acts. Resolved, To adjourn consideration of the matter until the Bill is reintroduced into Parliament.
- 6-- Easter Monday Sports at Montpellier Gardens---A Letter from Mr. F. Wilks, Hon. Sec. of the Cheltenham Athletic Society, was read, applying for the use of Montpellier Gardens on Easter Monday next for their usual annual Athletic Meeting. Resolved, To accede to the application upon the same terms as last year.
- 7—Swans—With reference to Minute No. 11 of the proceedings of this Committee at their last meeting, a Letter from Mrs. Taylor was read, explaining that she intended to offer a pair of swans as well as cygnets; also one from the Town Clerk in reply that the Council would be glad to have the cygnets but not the swans as the latter would probably fight with those already possessed by them. Resolved, That the Town Clerk's letter be approved.

9-Coffee Tent at Pittville Park during Skating—A Letter was read from Messrs. G. Davis and Wm. Rawlings, of No. 14, St. Paul's Street South, offering 7s 6d per day for the right to have a coffee tent at Pittville Park during the skating, and 10sper day for the right to have 6 men to put on skates, and if more should be required, to pay a sum in proportion for each man over six. Resolved, That the Council cannot entertain the offer.

10- Pictorial History of Cheltenham—Terms were received from the Publishers of the Pictorial History of Cheltenham for insertion of an advertisement in it of the attractions of the town. WATER COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Thursday, the 23rd day of December, 1897—Present: The Mayor; Councillors Baker, M. Davis, Ll. Davies, Dix, Lenthall, and Margrett (Councillor Margrett in the chair)—

1-Water Engineer's Report-The Water Engineer reported that on the 22nd inst. the supply from the Hewletts and Northfield Springs was 186 gallons, the average for the last four years being 290 gallons per minute; and the quantity of water instore at Hewletts and Leckhampton was 11,520,109 gallons.

On the same date the depth of water in Dowdeswell Reservoir was 19 feet 2 inches and the contents 41,511,708 gallons, or about 62 days' supply, exclusive of the daily yield of the springs, which was then about 1,885,792 gallons.

2—Water Supply to the Reddings—A Letter was read from the Clerk to the Cheltenham Rural District Council asking if there would be any and if so what charge for rent of water meter in addition to the charge of 1s 3d per 1,000 gallons, and whether the dead rent would be calculated upon the amount of the water plus the rent of meter or upon the actual consumption of water without taking into consideration the money paid for rent of the meter. Resolved, To inform the writer that a charge of 2s d3 per quarter will be made for rent of

each meter in addition to the charge made for the water, and that the dead rent in each case will be calculated upon the annual rental of the premises and be exclusive of the rent of the meter.

- 3-Tewkesbury Water Accounts--A Letter from the Town Clerk of Tewkesbury was read, stating that his Council had agreed to the resolution of this Council to Minute No. 4 of the proceedings of this Committee at their last meeting.
- 4 Charge of Water Supply to Workhouse---A Letter was read from the Clerk to the Guardians thanking the Corporation for the reduction of the dead rent of 200,000 gallons per quarter from 1s 3d to 1s per 1000 gallons, but asking reconsideration of the matter with a view to reducing the charge for supply of water to the Workhouse to 10d. per 1000 gallons; also drawing attention to the necessity of maintaining a strong pressure of water at the Workhouse for use in case of fire. Resolved, That the Council cannot make any further reduction in the charges for the water.
- 5--Water Supply to Electric Works—Resolved, That provided a corresponding reduction is made by the Lighting Committee in their charges for street lighting the water supply to the Electric Works be in future delivered free.
- 6--Water Supply to the Gas Works--With reference to the resolution to Minute No. 6 of the proceedings of this Committee of the 18th of October last, reducing the charge for the water supply to the Gas Works to 1s 3d per 1000 gallons, a Letter from the Clerks to the Company was read, with which they forwarded a copy of the following resolution of their Directors, viz., "That the Council be respectfully informed that the Directors cannot consider the amount of the proposed reduction as "satisfactory having regard to the fact that the Company are one of the largest consumers of water in the town, and of "their willingness to take the Severn water instead of the hill water as heretofore." Resolved, That the Council are unable to make any further reduction.

7-Appeals The cases entered in the Appeal Book were considered and the rates settled and adjusted.

1.--Gas Examiner's Report—The Monthly Report of the Gas Examiner, as follows, was read:—

2—Cal Inspector's Report—The Gas Inspector reported that the hourly average consumption of Gas per lamp during the previous month had been 4.2123 cubic feet.

3-Lamp Book—This Book was produced and examined. Lamps extinguished, 7 metered, 23 unmetered; and 5 burning dimly.

8

4-Public Lighting, &c.--A Letter from Councillor Bence was read advocating better lighting of certain localities in the East Ward, as follows, viz.—Of most importance: one lamp in Providence Square, one near Jersey Cottages, Leighton Road, two in Highbury Lane, one in Coltham Terrace Lane, Hale's Road, and one at end of Denmark Villas. Of lesser importance: one lamp in Sherborne Street and remove an existing one to another site, and one large lamp at the top of Mount-pleasant. Resolved, That the lamp in King's Road be moved so as to shine down Coltham Terrace, that one new lamp be fixed in Providence Square, and one near Jersey Cottages in Leighton Road, that consideration of the better lighting of Highbury Lane be adjourned until the Street and Highway Committee have dealt with the repairing of the road, and of Denmark Villas pending another view by the Committee, and that consideration of the better lighting of Sherborne Street and Mount Pleasant be adjourned; that one new lamp be placed in each of Barnard's and Little's Rows, one in the Old Bath Road near Laracor half way between the present lamp and the footpath across Charlton Park, that one lamp in Lypiatt Street be moved to near Messrs. Webb & Son's premises, and that a new one be placed in Princes Terrace, and that three new lamps be placed in Hatherley Road. On the application of Councillor Dix, Resolved, That a new lamp be fixed midway in Oriel Walk.

5-- Lighting of Passage to Churchyard from Nigh Street between Nos. 349 and 350, Nigh Street—A Memorial from Messrs. T. P. Waite, M. A. Treasure, and A. N. Cole, was read, calling attention to the inadequate lighting of this passage. Resolved, That an incandescent electric lamp be placed in the lantern of or near to the present gas lamp in the passage.

6—Lighting of Swindon Road —A Memorial from Edwin Jordan and 13 other residents in Swindon Road, was read, calling attention to the inadequate lighting of this road especially in the neighbourhood of Maud's Elm. Resolved, To adjourn consideration of the matter pending a view by the Committee.

7—Increase of Consumption of Street Gas Lamps---A Letter from the Clerks to the Gas Co. was read, enquiring whether the Committee intended to proceed with a suggested improvement of street gas lighting by increasing the consumption of the lamps from at cubic feet per hour at a cost in accordance with the tabular statement thereto annexed, i.e.,

To 4 ½ cubic feet £162 per annum

To 4 cubic feet £324 per annum, and

To 5 cubic feet [?] 4486 per annum.

and also pointing out that the displaced Guildhall Lamps were in readiness at the works awaiting particulars for their re-erection as suggested by the Committee at the recent Conference, Resolved, That the Committee would be prepared to recommend an uniform consumption of 5 feet per hour for every lamp, but cannot do this unless the increased expenditure for so doing is provided for in the estimates for the next Rate; and with reference to the Guildhall Lamps the Council will be glad to purchase one from the Company in order to try experiments with it before deciding as to the re-erection of the remaining ones.

8--- Electrical inspector's Report The Electric Inspector reported the result of his tests of the electric supply during the past month as follows, viz.—

9-- Electrical Engineer's Report—The Electrical Engineer reported that an application for electric supply had been made by Mr J. Bradbury of Regent Street, and he recommended provision of a main along Regent Street and Ormond Place from the High Street to Ormond Place Substation at a cost of £137. That the Training College was contemplating a rather extensive installation and to supply it a high pressure main would have to be laid from the High Street along King Street to the Swindon Road: the cost of which with necessary transformer would be £145. That the owner of Marle Hill House. Mr. G. Phelps, was anxious to have the electric light in this house, and he suggested that he be offered supply on condition of his paying £30 towards the cost of the service which would be about £50 or £60. He understood that about 60 or 70 lamps would be required. And he recommended that the two new Babcock boilers should be insured for £1000 each with the Vulcan Insurance Co. at an annual premium of 50s each. Resolved, That the extensions to supply current to Mr. Bradbury's premises in Regent Street, and the Training College be carried out, and that the Local Government Board be applied to add an additional £282 to the loan for which sanction has already been applied for to provide for the cost of these extensions; that the extension to Marle Hill House be carried out if Mr. Phelps will pay £30 towards the cost, and that the report be approved and the recommendations of the Electrical Engineer adopted.

10—Damage to Electric Lamp Pillar—The Electrical Engineer reported that on the 11th inst a wagon belonging to Mr. G. Jackson, of Gotherington, collided with one of the lamp pillars in St. James's Square and broke it but he had not been able to ascertain what the damage done would amount to. Resolved, That as soon as the Electrical Engineer has ascertained this the Town Clerk be instructed to claim payment thereof from the owner of the wagon.

11-Electric Lighting of London Road—A Letter from Mr. H. C. Gregory, of No. 1, Keynsham Bank, was read, expressing a hope that when the arc lighting of the London Road is carried out a lamp-post opposite his gate will be continued as hitherto.

12--Lighting of Gloucester Road—A Letter from Mr. R. Bin, of Lansdown, St. Mark's, was read, again complaining of the inefficient lighting of this road. Resolved, To adjourn consideration of the matter pending a view by the Committee.

13-Lighting of Town Clock—Resolved, That the Electrical Engineer make an experimental trial of lamps, &c., for lighting the Town Clock by reflection.

14—Sub-Committee—Resolved, That the Chairman and Councillors Baker and Margrett be constituted a Sub-Committee of this Committee.

15—Guarantee of Electrical Engineer—With reference to the Resolution to Minute No. 10 of the proceedings at the last meeting of the Finance Committee, the Electrical Engineer stated that his father and Alderman Norman had consented to join with him as his sureties in a bond for such an amount as the Council may require. Resolved, That the sureties mentioned be approved, that the amount of the bond be fixed at £300 and that the Town Clerk be instructed to prepare it.

16— Charges for Water Supply to the Electric Works—Resolved, That if the Water Committee will waive payment of the charge for the water supply to the Electric Works a corresponding deduction will be made from the accounts for street lighting.

GENERAL PURPOSES AND WATCH COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Tuesday, the 21st day of December, 1897--Present: The Mayor; Aldermen Norman and Winterbotham; Councillors Baker, Bence, M. Davis, Hayward, Margrett, Mills, Moles and Steel (The Mayor in the chair)—

1—Superintendent McRae's Report—Superintendent McRae reported that on the 23rd ultimo there had been an outbreak of Swine Fever on the premises of Mr. Charles Gould, in Hale's Road; 10 pigs were affected, 1 died, and the remaining 9 were slaughtered. He also reported that the Swine Fever Order had been properly complied with, and the premises disinfected.

Under the provisions of the Muzzling Order 21 dogs had been seized, of which number 9 had been destroyed, and 9 claimed 25 persons had been proceeded against for offences under the Order, and 2s had been paid by the owners of dogs claimed for their keep. The Lethal Chamber provided by the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals was in working order, and 5 dogs had been destroyed in it.

- 2--Sheep Scab—The Town Clerk laid before the Committee a circular letter from the Board of Agriculture on the subject of Sheep Scab.
- 3— Fire Brigade—The Superintendent of the Fire Brigade reported that the Brigade had been called out to a rick fire on the 5th inst. at Moorend Park Road, owner, Mr. William Hall, of the Treelands, cause unknown, Damage £70, insured in the Phoenix Fire Office, to whom the account of the extinction expenses amounting to £11 8s. 6d. had been sent. On the 16th instant, the Brigade was called out to a fire at the Rowanfields, Alstone, owned and occupied by Mr. W. H. Smith, Market Gardener. Supposed cause, the upsetting of a benzoline lamp; damage £40. The building and contents were insured in the Equitable Fire Insurance Office, to whom the account for extinction expenses, £3 13s. had been sent.

The Superintendent appended to his report an abstract of the work of the Brigade during the past 12 months.

4 — hackney Carriage Drivers' Licenses—Applications were received from Charles Bin, of 3, White Cross Square, Arthur John Bin, of 9, Cakebridge Terrace, Alexander Arter, of 17, Lansdown Place Stables, Francis

Gough, of No. 5, Witcombe Place, Charles East, of No. 7, Lypiatt Street, and Ernest Edward Simms, of 17, Hanover Street, St. Paul's, to be licensed as Hackney Carriage Drivers. Resolved, That the application of Alexander Arter he adjourned in order that he may obtain an independent recommendation, the present one being signed by his father, and that the other applications be granted.

5-Hackney Carriages--Applications were read from John Morgan. of 28, Mountpleasant, and William Wiggett, of 13, Regent Street, for Hackney Carriage Licenses, the latter also asking whether if he bought a carriage now licensed the license would be transferred to him. A letter was also read from Frederick Bishop, of 24, Dunalley Parade, stating that he had been offered a licensed carriage, and was anxious to know whether the license would be transferred to him if he purchased such carriage; and one from Mr. S. Hill, of Lansdown Crescent Mews, asking to be allowed to use for three months another similar carriage in place of his licensed one, which required extensive repairs.

10

Resolved, That Messrs. Morgan and Wiggett be informed that the Committee cannot increase the number of licenses, and moreover these applications cannot be considered out of their turn; that Messrs. Wiggett and Bishop's applications cannot be granted; and that Mr. Hill's application be granted. The Street Inspector reported the results of the inspection he had made of the licensed Hackney Carriages in pursuance of instructions given to him at the last meeting of this Committee in consequence of complaints made as to the condition of some of them. Resolved, That the Inspector do report every month to this Committee on the matter.

6 — Hackney Carriage Byelaws — A letter was read from the Local Government Board, stating that they had confirmed the Byelaws as to Hackney Carriages recently made by the Council with regard to the number of persons which may be conveyed in a "Pony Carriage."

7—Hackney Carriages at Railway Stations—The Town Clerk laid before the Committee a letter from Mr. Charles Cooke, Secretary of the Cheltenham Cab Drivers' Union on the above subject. Resolved, That the further consideration of the matter be adjourned until the appeal in the case of the Midland Railway Station now understood to be pending has been disposed of.

8—Cabman's Shelter at Montpellier—With reference to the Resolution to Minute No. 7 of the proceedings of this Committee at their last meeting, a letter was read from Mr. Hay, stating that he had much pleasure in giving to the Town Council the Cabmen's Shelter at Montpellier, if they would accept it. Resolved, That Alderman Winterbotham be appointed to such position in the place of Mr. Lawrence.

12—Re-Numbering of Houses--Ambrose Street and St. George's Square—The Borough Surveyor laid before the Committee a plan showing how he proposed Ambrose Street and St. George's Square should be renumbered. Resolved, That the same be approved, and that the Borough Surveyor take the necessary steps to get the houses re-numbered accordingly.

- 2- Side Approach to Crest Western Railway Station—With reference to Minute No. 10 of this Committee's proceedings at their last meeting, the Town Clerk read a correspondence he had had with Mr. Nelson, the Solicitor to the Great Western Railway Company, in which the latter stated that he would be pleased to insert the following clause drafted by the Town Clerk in the Bill, provided the word "way" in the last line was altered to "footway"
- "Nothing in this Act contained shall empower the Company to stop up or interfere with the public right of footway "extending from St. James's Square over and along the private road the soil of part whereof the Company are "hereby authorised to acquire to a road extending from New Street and a place called the

Knapp known as " Workhouse Lane leading to the Parish Church Girls' and Infants' Schools and to the Station of the Company " or any other public rights of way over the said land."

Resolved, That the clause as proposed by the Town Clerk be approved, and that the alteration proposed by the Company be not agreed to.

4—The View—The following Members attended the View Meeting on Friday last, viz.:—Councillors Baker, Bence, Cypher, Dix, and Mills.

5—Street Inspector's Report The Street Inspector reported that the projection of Mr. D. Larner, at the Robin Hood Inn, St. James's Street, and the signboard placed by Mr. W. E. Crowther against the premises occupied by Mrs. Hooper at the corner of St. James's Street had not been removed as required by the Council, and that the outside advertising lamp at the premises of Mr T. Whitaker, 78, High Street, was not kept alight until 10 o'clock p.m. in accordance with the conditions subject to which the same was allowed to be fixed. A Letter from Mr. James Villar, on behalf of Messrs. Flower & Sons, the owners of the Robin Hood, was read, stating that the sign had been in use on the premises for over 38 years, that it was only taken down for a short time to allow of the front wall of the house being partially rebuilt, and expressing a hope that the Committee would see their way to allow the sign to remain or at any rate to allow some kind of projecting board to be put up, such as a V shaped one, to come out from the face of the wall 18 inches or 2 feet. Resolved, That the re-erection of the old sign cannot be permitted but an application to erect a V shaped sign if accompanied with a sketch and full particulars of same will be considered; that the Town Clerk be instructed to give notice to Mr. Whitaker that if his advertising lamp is again found on any occasion to be not alight till 10 o'clock he will be required to remove it and to give notice to Mr. Crowther to remove the sign at the premises of Mrs. Hooper forthwith.

Gullies Repaired-1 in Brunswick Street, 1 in Oxford Parade, 1 in Hewlett Street, 1 at back of Montpellier Terrace.

McDougall's Patent Bricks—1 New Crossing had been laid at the bottom of Rosehill Street, and 1 at Montpellier from Lauriston House to Messrs. Thomas Brothers' shop. 1 on the London Road had been repaired.

The cab stands in Imperial Square, 2 in the Promenade, at the Midland Station, and Albert Place had been laid with Tar Macadam.

Ashes Collected—Van Loads 1,171; Cart Loads 174; Ashes consumed at the Destructor 1,223 tons.

Resolved, That, where paving is repaired by the Council for the expense of which the abutting owners will not be liable and down pipes from houses extending under the pavement to the gutters are interfered with or guttering across the paving has been used in lieu of a pipe under ii the same shall in the former case be made good, and in the latter case shall be replaced with a pipe under the paving to the gutter free of cost to the owners.

7- -Application of Telephone Co. to lay Wires Underground—The Town Clerk laid before the Committee a Report that he had prepared with reference to the powers of the Telephone Co. to carry wires either over or under the streets in the Borough. Resolved, To inform the Company that in future the consent of the Council must be obtained before wires can be carried across the streets, and that with reference to the underground wires the further consideration of the application be adjourned.

9-Trees and Pavement opposite Deodar House, King's Road —A Letter from Miss Standish was read, calling attention to the trees in front of her house which required greatly decreasing in size as they obscured the light, and to the pavement which required repairing. Resolved, That the Council do not consider there is any necessity to lessen the growth of the trees referred to but that the Borough Surveyor be instructed to have the paving repaired.

10-Footpath in Painswick Road--A Letter from Mrs. Gunning Campbell was read, complaining of the bad state of the footpath on the right hand side of the Painswick Road. Resolved, To inform Mrs. Campbell that the Council will give attention to the repairing of this footpath as soon as the completion of pressing matters now in hand permits.

11-Crossing in Glenfall Street — Resolved, That, the crossing in the footpath in Glenfall Street recently put in by Mr. Winstone, having too great a rise, he be required to lower it forthwith to a proper gradient.

12--Sydenham Villas and Sydenham Roads—Resolved, To instruct the Borough Surveyor to bring up Specifications of the works required to be done by the abutting owners to edge, asphalte and channel the footpaths in these footpaths in these roads without prejudice to the right of the Council at any future time to require, them to replace the asphalte with flagging or other paving if they shall think fit.

13-Channelling and Footpath in Bath Road and Footpath in Bath Terrace —A Letter from Councillor Dix was read calling attention to the defective state of the channelling and footpath on the West side of the Bath Road from Lower Bath Street to Oriel Road, and to the had condition of the road and footways in Bath Terrace, Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to have the channelling and footpath referred to in the Bath Road repaired, and to inform Councillor Dix that notices have been served upon the abutting owners in Bath Terrace to put the road and footpaths into a proper condition.

14—Road in Montpellier Street near Ladies' College—A Letter from Sir S. G. Johnson, Chairman of the Council of the Ladies' College, was read, requesting that this part of Montpellier Street may be relaid with material of a less noisy character than at present. Resolved, That when this road next requires repair it be relaid with Gore stone to lessen the noise.

15—Paving in front of Lansdown Place and Paths in Hatherley Road - -A Letter from Councillor Cooper was read, calling attention to the bad state of the paving in front of Lansdown Place, the pathway adjoining the Hatherley Court property in Hatherley Lane and the pathway between Godfrey House and Coulter further along the Hatherley Road, which had sunk in places below the level of the road. Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to bring up Specifications of the works required to be done by the abutting owners to edge, asphalte and channel the pathway on the East side of Hatherley Road from Hatherley Hall to Coulter and the footpath on the West side from Lansdown Road to the bridge over Hatherley Brook, in both cases without prejudice to the right of the Corporation to require the owners to replace the asphalte with flagging or other paving if at any time in future they shall think fit, and that consideration of the question of repairing the paving in front of Lansdown Place be adjourned.

- 16-Paving opposite No. 98, High Street—A Letter from Mr. A. Hill was read, complaining that vehicular traffic crossed over the pavement instead of the crossings to Liverpool Place and the Royal Hotel Yard owing to the want of proper curbing. Resolved, To instruct the Borough Surveyor to do what is necessary to prevent the traffic crossing over the pavement.
- 17- Paving in Henrietta Street—A letter from the Secretary of the Original Brewery Co. was read, protesting against the proposed repaving of this street as owing to the pathway being so little used his Board considered it was not a case in which such a large charge should be made against the Company, that the paving suggested is of the most extravagant kind, and requesting that the matter should be further considered with a view to an abatement being made in the amount the Company will have to pay. Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to amend the Specification by the substitution of concrete in situ paving for flagging, and to re-serve amended notices to carry out the work, and that the Resolution to Minuet No. 31 of the Committee's proceedings of the 29th November last be varied accordingly.
- 18— Condition of Oxford Street—A letter from Mr. R. T. J. Price and seven other owners and occupiers of property in Oxford Street was read, calling attention to the dangerous state of the road and paving in the said street, and requesting that the same may be put in order. Resolved, To instruct the Borough Surveyor to bring up a specification of the works to be done by the abutting owners to re-metal the road, and flag, edge and channel the footpaths.
- 19-Cabmen's Shelter at Montpellier-A letter from F. Gordon Allen and 32 other occupiers of property in the neighbourhood, was read, suggesting that it would be an improvement to remove the Cabmen's Shelter opposite the Rotunda to inside the railings of Montpellier Gardens near the Lodge. Resolved, That the Council do not consider there is sufficient reason to cause them to alter the position of the Shelter.
- 20—Noise from traffic in Sandford Street—A letter from Mr. H. M. Wakefield, of Bath Road, was read, calling attention to the noise from traffic that occurs on account of the narrow street named Sandford Street, which shakes the foundation of his Stores, and the china on the mantelshelves. Resolved, That when next this road requires repair it be faced with Gore stone to deaden the noise.
- 21 --Surface Water on Gloucester Road--A Memorial from Anthony White, of Midland Cottage; J. W. Arundell, of the Midland Hotel, and Edwin Smith, occupier of the neighbouring stone yard. was read, complaining of a nuisance caused by the surface water from the Gloucester Road at the Midland Railway Bridge running into their respective premises. Resolved, To instruct the Borough Surveyor to have a gully constructed to carry off the water.
- 22--Seat In Hatherley Road-A letter from Mr. C. C. Prance, was read, on behalf of Mrs. Prance's trustees, requesting that this seat may be removed as it leads to the persistent destruction of the oak fence behind it, and to trespassing in the plantation. Resolved, That the seat be moved to the opposite side of the road under the lamp there.
- 23— Private Improvement Works, Glenfall Street-A letter from Mr. H. A. Gwinnell, was read, objecting to pay £1 9s. 2d. for private improvement works in respect of the frontage of No. 34, Glenfall Street, as Mr. Winstone did the work for him according to the specification of 11th June, 1897. A letter from the Town Clerk to Mr. Gwinnell, was read, pointing out that the work for which he is charged was not part of that done by Mr. Winstone. Resolved, That, the Town Clerk's letter be approved, and that Mr. Gwinnell be informed he must pay the amount claimed.

24-Private Improvement Works, Folly Lane-A letter from Messrs. Ticehurst & Sons, was read, requesting to be informed what was the cause of delay in completing the settlement of this matter, and pointing out the desirability in the interests of all parties that the road should not be left entirely without care and attention. A letter from the Town Clerk in reply, was read, informing Messrs. 'Ticehurst & Sons that the Council has been waiting for Mr. Baylis to supply them with particulars as promised by him of the traffic over the road from the brickyard owned by him. PUBLIC HEALTH COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Monday, the 10th day of January, 1898—Present: Alderman Norman; Councillors Bence, M. Davis, Lenthall, Margrett, and Waghorne (Councillor Bence in the chair).—

- 1-Zymotic Disease— The Medical Officer of Health reported that there had been notified since the last meeting of the Committee, 15 cases of Scarlet Fever, 1 of Enteric Fever, and 4 of Diphtheria; that 12 cases of Scarlet Fever had been sent into the Delancey Hospital, and 3 of Diphtheria into the General Hospital, and that the number of cases then in the Delancey Hospital sent in by the Corporation was 22.
- 2 -Wells at 8 to 13, 16, and 19 to 22, Corpus Street and Oxford Villa—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the water in the wells at the above-mentioned premises was used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, and was so polluted as to be injurious to health. Resolved, That proceedings under Sec. 70 of the Public Health Act be taken to obtain orders for these wells to be closed.

- 3—Dairies, Cowsheds, and Milkshops Order The Medical Officer of Health reported the result of his inspection of the cowshed at Harthurstfield Farm, with reference to the application of Mr. Stephens to be registered as a Cowkeeper. Resolved, That the applicant be registered.
- 4-Overcrowding at 62, Duke Street, 8, Gunnell's Court, and 1, Angel Court The Medical Officer of Health reported that the above premises were so overcrowded as to be dangerous or injurious to the health of the inmates. Resolved, That the Committee being satisfied of the existence of a nuisance on the said premises Notices under Sec. 94 of the Public Health Act be served on the owners and occupiers thereof, requiring them to abate the same.
- 5-W.C's without Flushing Apparatus—The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses having w.c's without flushing apparatus. Resolved, That Notices under Section 28 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, be given to the owners requiring them to provide the necessary flushing apparatus, and to the occupiers to lay on a proper supply of water thereto, and that in default of compliance with such notices proceedings be taken for the penalties.
- 6—Houses without proper Ash Receptacles—The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses which had no proper ashpits or ash receptacles. Resolved, That the necessary Notices be given to the respective

Owners under Sec. 36 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and Sec. 27 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, requiring them in each case to provide a moveable ash receptacle of such size, pattern, and construction as may be approved by the Borough Surveyor on behalf of the Corporation, and that where a common fixed ashpit may be constructed that form may be permitted.

7-Heyden Knoll Sewage Farm—A letter was read from Mr. John Lea, the Clerk to the Staverton Parish Council, asking that pipes may be laid in the open drains running through the pathway in the field known as the Breaches leading from the Valley Lane to Hayden. Resolved, To inform the writer that the Borough Surveyor will comply with his request.

8-Cleansing and Limewashing at Nos. 3 & 4, Gothic Cottages, Francis Street, No. 18, Corpus Street, and No. 1, Angel Court The Medical Officer of Health having certified under Sec. 46 of the Public Health Act, that the above-named dwelling houses were in such a filthy and unwholesome condition that the health of the inmates was affected or endangered thereby. Resolved, That Notice be given to the owners under the said Section requiring the houses to be cleansed and limewashed.

9— Nuisance from Drains, &c. at No. 29, Lansdown Place, No. 4, Lansdown Terrace, Nos. 11, 12 & 13, Corpus Street, Nos. 6, 7 & 8, Gunnell's Court, Oxford Villa, 373 & 411, High Street, and 3, Lansdown Terrace Mews The Inspector of Nuisances having made written application under Sec. 41 of the Public Health Act, stating that the drains, &c., on or belonging to the above-named houses were in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health. Resolved, That authority be given to the Inspector of Nuisances to open the ground, examine the drains, and, if necessary, give the notices and act as provided by the said section.

10 - Insanitary Property at Nos. 1, 3 & 4, Gothic Cottages, Nos. 5 & 6, Gunnell's Court, Nos. 18, 19 & 20, Corpus Street, and 397 & 413. High Street—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the premises above-mentioned were in such a state as to be injurious to the health of the inmates owing to defective roofs, ceilings, walls, yards, &c. Resolved, That the Committee being satisfied that the said premises are in such a state as to be injurious to health, Notices under Sec. 94 of the Public Health Act be served upon the owners requiring them to put the same into a healthy condition and for that purpose to carry out the works specified in the Notices.

- 11-Destruction of Diseased Meat—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the carcass of a sheep badly affected by tuberculosis, found in a certain private slaughter-house had been seized, and with the consent of the owner it had been cremated at the Ash Destructor.
- 1 2-- Defective Sewer behind Nos. 11, 12, & 13, Corpus Street The Medical Officer of Health reported that complaints had been made of offensive smells from a Sewer behind Nos. 11, 12 & 13, Corpus Street, and that rats found a free entrance and exit to and from the sewer. On examination the sewer was found to be very defective, and it required to be at once replaced by a stoneware pipe sewer. Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to do this.
- 13-- Insufficient W.C. Accommodation at Gunnell's Court, House in Mountpleasant, and Timber Yard, &c., Albion Street—The Inspector of Nuisances reported that the above-mentioned premises were without sufficient w.c. accommodation. Resolved, That Notices under Sec. 36 of the Public Health Act, 1875, be served upon the Owners requiring them to provide such accommodation.
- 14 Slaughter House Licenses-Letters were read from Messrs. Storr & Co., John Hastings, and E. C. Davis, for the renewal of their Slaughter-house Licenses. Resolved, That the same be granted for one year.

15-Supply of Sewage -A letter from Mr. F. W. Brown, of Arle Court Farm, asking to be supplied with Sewage to a meadow in his occupation, and the Borough Surveyor's report thereon, were read. Resolved, That the Committee regret they cannot comply with Mr. Brown's request.

16-Slaughter Houses, Closing of—A letter from Mr. Yarnold, the Lessee of the registered Slaughter-house, at No. 296, High Street, was read, stating that he would accept the sum of £75 as compensation for the closing of the Slaughter-house mentioned. Resolved, That the further consideration of the letter be adjourned until the owner's claim has been received.

17-Byelaws as to Houses let in Lodgings—Resolved, That the further consideration of these Byelaws be adjourned, the Medical Officer of Health in the meantime to obtain certain information from other Towns desired by the Committee.

18-Pollution of Stream below Pittville Park--With reference to the Resolution to Minute No. 25 of the proceedings of this Committee of date the 25th August last, the Town Clerk read a letter, dated the 10th ultimo, he had written to the Clerk to the Rural District Council again calling his attention to the question of the pollution of the stream below Pittville Park by the over-flow of sewage from a pond. A letter from Mr. Ticehurst in reply was also read, stating that the matter had been under investigation, and that no such pollution as alleged arising in the District of the Rural District Council could be traced to the brook, and that if the Medical Officer of Health for the Borough still thought that there was cause for complaint, they

would be glad if he would place himself in communication with their Medical Officer of Health on the matter. The Medical Officer of Health having reported that he had already done this, Resolved, That the Town Clerk be instructed to reply that the Council regret that no action has been taken by the Rural District Council in the matter to abate the nuisance complained of, which indirectly affects the health of the Borough, and that if steps are not shortly taken by the Rural District Council in the matter, the Town Council will feel it their duty to call the attention of the Local Government Board to the matter.

19-Sewer in Market Street—The Borough Surveyor reported that he had found it absolutely necessary in order to take the drainage of the houses now being built in Market Street to commence the relaying of the sewer there, Resolved, That the action of the Borough Surveyor be approved, and that the resolution to Minute No. 23 of this Committee's proceedings at their last meeting be rescinded accordingly.

20—Barn Farm With reference to the Resolution to Minute No. 30 of this Committee's proceedings of date the 22nd ultimo, the Town Clerk reported that he had forwarded the draft submission to arbitration to Mr. Corbett for his approval, but that Mr. Corbett had called upon him and objected to having to pay any expenses whatever in connection with the arbitration, and that the Corporation should pay the whole. Mr. Corbett attended before the Committee and eventually he agreed to accept the sum of £75 in full discharge of any claim for compensation or damages he might have against the Corporation. He complained that the tree lopping's on the Barn Farm had been hitherto taken by the Corporation, whereas he considered he was entitled to them. Resolved, That the above-mentioned sum be accordingly paid to Mr. Corbett in full settlement as aforesaid, and that in future he be permitted to have the tree lopping's of the pollard withies.

21-Zymotic Disease The Medical Officer of Health reported that there had been notified since the last meeting of the Committee, 16 cases of Scarlet Fever, 1 of Enteric Fever, and 3 of Diphtheria; that 14 cases of Scarlet Fever had been sent into the Delancey Hospital, and that the number of cases then in the Delancey Hospital sent in by the Corporation was 28.

22-Wells at Nos. 13, 14, 15, 16, 17 and 23, Hanover Street, Hanover Cottage, and Whaddon Cottage—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the water in these wells was used, or likely to be used, by man for drinking or domestic purposes, and was so polluted as to be injurious to health. Resolved, That proceedings under Sec. 70 of the Public Health Act be taken to obtain Orders for these wells to be closed.

23-Nuisance from Drains, &c., at No. 14, Worcester Street, No. 404, High Street, No. 1, Belle Vue Lawn, No. 20, St. Paul's Street North, No. 197, High Street, and Cottages at Ark occupied by Messrs. Peart, Cox and others—The Inspector of Nuisances having made written application under Sec 41 of the Public Health Act, stating that the drains, &c., on or belonging to the above-named houses were in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health. Resolved, That authority be given to the Inspector of Nuisances to open the ground, examine the drains, and, if necessary, give the notices and act as provided by the said section.

24---Overcrowding at a house in Arle occupied by G. Pearl and family--The Medical Officer of Health reported that the above premises were so overcrowded as to be dangerous or injurious to the health of the inmates. Resolved, That the Committee being satisfied of the existence of a nuisance on the said Premises, Notices under Sec. 94 of the Public Health Act be served on the owners and occupiers thereof requiring them to abate the same.

25-House unfit for Human Habitation, viz., a Cottage in Cousen's Yard, Waterloo Street—The Medical Officer of Health having certified that this house was in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and unfit for human habitation, Resolved, That proceedings under Sec. 32 of the Housing of the Working Classes Act, 1890, be taken to obtain Orders for them to be closed.

26-- Insanitary Property, viz.— Nos. 76,78, 401, 424, 429 and 430, High Street, Two Cottages at Ark occupied respectively by Messrs. Peart and Cox, Nos. 1 and 2, Wakefield Court, Bath Street, South Cambray Lodge, No. 95, Tewkesbury Road, Bricknells, Gloucester Place, and Elm Cottage, Pilley—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the premises above-mentioned were in such a state as to be injurious to the health of the inmates, owing to defective roofs, walls, floors, yards, &c. Resolved, That the Committee being satisfied that the said premises are in such a state as to be injurious to health, Notices under Sec. 94 of the Public Health Act, 1875, be served upon the owners requiring them to put the same into a healthy condition and for that purpose to carry out the works specified in the Notices.

27-Water Closets without Flushing Apparatus-The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses having water closets without Flushing Apparatus. Resolved, That Notices under Sec. 28 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, he given to the Owners requiring them to provide the necessary flushing apparatus, and to the Occupiers to lay on a proper supply of water thereto, and that in default of compliance with such Notices proceedings be taken for the penalties.

28-Houses without Proper Ash Receptacles The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses which had no proper Ashpits or Ash Receptacles. Resolved, That the necessary Notices be given to the respective owners under Sec. 36 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and Sec. 27 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, requiring them in each case to provide a moveable ash receptacle of such size, pattern, and construction as may be approved by the Borough Surveyor on behalf of the Corporation, and that where a common fixed ashpit may he constructed that form may be permitted.

29-Cleansing and limewashing at No. Greville Terrace and two Cottages at Ark occupied respectively by Messrs. H. Peart and G. Cox—The Medical Officer of Health having certified under Sec. 46 of the Public Health Act, that the above-named dwelling houses were in such a filthy. and unwholesome condition that the health of the inmates was affected or endangered thereby, Resolved, That Notices be given to the owners under the said Section requiring the houses to be cleansed and limewashed.

30---Inspection of Bakehouses--The Medical Officer of Health reported that he had personally inspected all the Bakehouses in the Borough quite recently and had taken notes as to Notices required for limewashing and other amendments.

31-Workshops-The Medical Officer of Health reported that the list of workshops in the Borough furnished by the Factory Inspector had been largely amended and added to, and an amended list sent back to the Factory Inspector.

32-Byelaws as to Offensive Trades--A Letter from the Local Government Board was read with which they forwarded a copy of a letter they had received from Mr. G. M. Davis, Secretary to the Cheltenham and District Butchers' Association, criticising the Byelaws made by the Council for the regulation of certain offensive trades and asking for their modification in several respects, and requesting that the Board might be furnished with any observations which the Council might wish to make on the subject of that letter. The Medical Officer of Health read observations which he suggested should be forwarded to the Local Government Board. Resolved, That the observations of the Medical Officer of Health be adopted and that his suggestions be approved, but that the Local Government Board be informed that the Council will leave the matter in their hands to make such modifications as they may deem reasonable.

33-Smoke Nuisance at Mrs. Weaver's Laundry---The Medical Officer of Health reported that the residents in the neighbourhood of this Laundry had complained of blacks from its chimney soiling the clothes hung out to dry, but no black smoke had been observed. Resolved, That the Medical Officer of Health be instructed to recommend Mrs. Weaver to make use of coke or anthracite coal to obviate the cause of complaint, as if the nuisance continues the Council will be under the necessity of taking proceedings to abate the same.

34-Water Supply to No. 37, Hungerford Street-A Letter was read from Mr. R. Baglin, the owner of this house, asking to be allowed an extension of time to carry out the notice requiring him to lay on a supply of water to it from the Corporation main as he was not then prepared to meet the expense. Resolved. That Mr. Baglin be informed that the notice must be complied with.

35-Cottages at Hayden Knoll-Resolved, To instruct the Borough Surveyor to report as to the condition of the cottages at Heyden Knoll belonging to the Corporation, and to bring up a specification of the work required to be done.

36-Barnard's Row -..-A Letter was read from Mr. R. E. Steel, Solicitor for Mr. Edward Steel, enquiring what the Council required should be done to this property to make it fit for human habitation, and stating that it

the Council would purchase it his client would be willing to entertain such a proposal. A Letter from the Town Clerk in reply was read informing Mr. Steel to the effect that he must do whatever is necessary to make the houses tit for human habitation, but it is not for the Council to prepare a specification of the works necessary. Resolved, That the reply of the Town Clerk be approved; that Mr. Steel be informed that the Borough Surveyor is of opinion that nothing short of rebuilding will make the property fit for human habitation; and that Mr. Steel be asked to inform the Council what his client would be prepared to sell the property to them for.

37- Sewage Flooding of Meadow at Arts -A Letter was read from the Rev. W. Butt, stating that Mr. Brown, farmer at Arle, was desirous of obtaining the permission of the Council to flood one of his meadows with sewage water and expressing his opinion that no nuisance would be caused at this time of year. The Committee having paid a visit of inspection, Resolved, That permission he granted to flood the meadow with sewage water up to the 31st of March, and that the Resolution to Minute No. 15 of this Committee's proceedings at their last meeting be varied accordingly.

38-Slaughter House at back of No. 296 High Street-A Letter from Mr. G. W. Sadler, agent for Corpus Christi College, Oxford, the owners in fee of this property subject to a lease to Mr. H. T. "Yarnold for 10 years from October, 1892, at £35 a year, was read, claiming on their behalf the sum of £100 as compensation for the loss of the Registered Slaughter House.

39-Building Plans-The plans of such new buildings necessitating drainage as had been or were intended to be placed before the Street and Ilia by ay Committee for consideration, were laid before this Committee. Resolved, That so far as drainage the same be approved.

WATER COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Wednesday, the 26th day of January, 1898 Present: Councillors Baker, Bence, Dix, Lenthall, and Margrett (Councillor Margrett in the chair)

1—Water Engineer's Report—The Water Engineer reported that the supply from the Hewletts and Northfield Springs was 212 gallons, the average for the last four years being 2645 gallons per minute; and the quantity of water in store at Hewletts and Leckhampton was 22,236,184 gallons.

On the 25th inst., the depth of water in Dowdeswell Reservoir was 29 feet 5 inches and the contents 86,681,246 gallons, which gave a total of 108,917,430 gallons, or about 134 days' supply, exclusive of the daily yield of the springs, which was then about 2,097,216 gallons.

That an application had been received for an extension to near the Oaklands, Prestbury Road, for a supply to six houses. The cost would be about £13 and the return would be ample.

With regard to the report on meters, he found that there was a new maker commencing who would supply meters practically identical with the one the Council had used for some years, and he suggested deferring consideration of this question for a month, and in the meanwhile he hoped to obtain a definite quotation, which would probably be lower than that in the past, the Patent rights having expired, and that the connection between the gin. and thin. mains in High Street, to enable increased pressure to be put upon the whole of the town mains, in case of fire, would be finished the next day. Resolved, That the report be approved and the suggestions and recommendations contained therein adopted, and that the main he extended along the Prestbury Road so as to supply the houses near the Oaklands.

- 2- Water Supply to Ashchurch Board School—A letter from Mr Badham, Clerk to the Ashchurch School Board, was read, stating that his Board must decline to take the water upon the conditions insisted upon by the Town Council, viz: That the agreement contain a clause restricting the use of the supply to the purposes of the Schools, and that the Board pay the usual meter rent in addition to the amount charged for the water.
- 3— Field at Sandford Pumping Station—A letter was read from Mr. J. Ferguson, of Belmore House School, enquiring whether the Corporation would let this Field as a playground for the pupils attending his School, and if so, upon what terms and conditions. Resolved, To refer Mr. Ferguson to Mr. Pates the tenant.
- 4-Trench for Water Main—London Road—A letter from the Clerk to the Charlton Kings Urban District Council was read, calling attention on behalf of his Council to the untidy state of the filling in of the trench in the London Road, made for re-laying the water main, and requesting that it should be properly levelled and rolled. Resolved, To inform the writer that the Borough Surveyor states that the filling in has been recently rolled by the steam roller; further that the Borough Surveyor be instructed in future to have the filling in of all trenches made by the Corporation workmen properly rammed, levelled and rolled.
- 5—Re-stocking of Dowdeswell Reservoir with Trout With reference to a letter from the Town Clerk to Mr. Unwin, the lessee of Dowdeswell Court, enquiring whether he would be willing to share in the expense of restocking the reservoir with trout, and calling his attention to the desirability of cleaning out the ponds at the Court, a letter from Mr. Unwin was read, stating that he did not enter into possession until the 1st of March, and consequently if the Council wish for their own benefit to clean out the ponds referred to, they should obtain consent from Col. Beak Brown, and with regard to re-stocking that he would always be glad to do his share in keeping up the stock of trout, but thought the Council would not have asked him to contribute now had they known he did not enter into possession until the spring. Resolved, To allow the matter to remain in abeyance until Mr. Unwin shall have entered into possession.
- 6 -Damage to Dowdeswell Pike—A letter from Mr. E. H. Lloyd, from the Imperial Institute, was read, admitting liability for the cost of repairing the damage done to the Pike in transit from the Exhibition recently held at the Institute, but that it was impossible to forward a cheque until they should receive the amount from the Insurance Company. Resolved, To instruct the Town Clerk to apply for immediate payment.
- 7- Water Supply to the Electric Works—With reference to the resolution to Minute No 5 of the proceedings of this Committee at their last meeting, referred back for further consideration by the Council, Resolved, That in the opinion of the Committee each department should be credited with what it supplies and be

debited with what it is supplied, at the rate fixed by the Council, and that accordingly no alteration be at present made in the terms on which water is supplied to the Electric Lighting Department.

8-Appeals- - The cases entered in the Appeal Book were considered and the rates settled and adjusted.

3—Gas Inspector's Report—The Gas Inspector reported that the hourly average consumption of Gas per lamp during the previous month had been 4,953 cubic feet. —

4-Lamp, Book—This Book was produced and examined Lamps extinguished, 5 metered, 25 unmetered; and 1 burning dimly.

5— Lighting of Gloucester Road, Streets in North Ward, Swindon Road, Langdon Road, near Ravenhurst, and Minnow Ditch—The following letters were read, viz: from R. Birt, of Lansdown, St. Marks, requesting that the better lighting of Gloucester Road should be again considered; from Councillor Lenthall giving a list of localities in the North Ward where improvement in the lighting was required; from E. Jordan and 13 other residents in Swindon Road, calling attention to the inadequate and unsatisfactory condition of the lighting of that road; from J. E. Bendall applying for a lamp in Langdon Road, off Leckhampton Road; from C. W. Smith applying for two gas lamps to be erected in the neighbourhood of Ravenhurst, Pittville, one in the lane at the bottom of it, and the other in Clarence Road by the front gate of his house; and from Councillor Dix applying for two lamps to be placed on the footpath known as Minnow Ditch. Resolved, To adjourn consideration of these applications pending inspection by the Committee.

6-- Lighting of Pittville Circus Road--A letter from Mrs. Harrison, of Holmdale, Pittville Circus Road, was read, complaining of the removal of the lamp from opposite her front gate, and requesting that it should be restored. Resolved, To inform Mrs. Harrison that the positions of the lamps in the road were re-adjusted for the benefit of the general public, and that the Council is unable to comply with her request without further experience as to how far this object has been attained by the change.

7-Highbury Lane— With reference to the Resolution to Minute No. 4 of the proceedings of this Committee at their last Meeting, so far as related to this matter referred back by the Council to the Committee for further consideration, Resolved, That two lamps be erected in this lane.

8-Lighting of Hatherley Road-- Resolved, That a lamp be placed in this road opposite the footpath to Cloddimore.

9- Increase of Consumption of Street Can Lamps—With reference to Minute No. 7 of the proceedings of this Committee at their last Meeting, a letter from the Clerks to the Gas Company, was read, with which they forwarded a copy of a resolution of their Directors consenting to supply the Council with a new Guildhall Lamp at cost price. Resolved, To thank the Directors for their offer and to accept same, and that they be asked upon what terms they will supply and maintain incandescent burners to, say 20, of the ordinary gas lamps.

10-ctrical Engineer's Report - The Electrical Engineer reported that the two new boilers had been erected and subjected to a hydraulic test with satisfactory results; that the first 220 kilowatt steam alternator had been practically completed, and that it would be ready for the steam trials on the 9th proximo. That good progress had been made with the building extensions during the past month, and with a continuance of the present mild weather, the Stores, Battery Room, &c., should be finished in about another month's time. That an application hail been received from Miss C. H. James, of 12, Park Place, in which the wiring had been finished and she was anxious for electric supply at the earliest possible date. The best way of giving supply to residents in Park Place would be by means of a 200 volt main laid along it from Grafton Road to Suffolk Road, and not, at present, by means of a high-pressure cable from Montpellier as formerly contemplated. The sanction of the

11

Local Government Board had been already received for the raising of a loan to cover the necessary works for giving electric supply in Park Place, and the above-mentioned extension—though a variant in detail from the plan submitted to the Local Government Board—would be properly regarded as a part of the larger scheme already approved. The cost of the above-mentioned low pressure cable would be £170. He anticipated receipt of applications from some residents in the Lansdown Road for electric supply to their premises, and in view of this and the known impetus given to private supply in any road by provision of good street arc lighting, he proposed at the next meeting to lay before the Committee an estimate of the cost of the works necessary for giving supply to private residents, and for lighting by arcs the Lansdown Road from Westal Green to the Castle. He anticipated that provision of a main along the Lansdown Road would prove very remunerative, as there were a number of very good houses in this road.

Resolved, That the extension to No. 121 Park Place be proceeded with in the manner suggested and that the report be approved and adopted.

11-Rating of Electric Undertaking —A letter from Mr. M. B. Ricketts, Assistant Overseer, was read, stating that the Overseers were of opinion that an increase in the assessment of the Electric Light Works was necessary, and that they proposed to make it £600 gross and £450 rateable. The Chairman reported that he had replied that he considered the assessment should not be increased until, at all events, the undertaking was being carried on at a profit, but that if the Overseers would agree to allow the assessment proposed above to stand for not less than two years, he would advise the Committee to agree to it. A further letter from Mr. Ricketts, was read, stating that the Overseers would agree to this. Resolved, That the terms proposed by the Chairman be agreed to.

6--Footpaths West Side of Regent Street, in Ormond Place, East side of Rodney Road, South side of Albion Street, from Promenade to Royal Well Lane, and West side of Royal Well Lane—Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to bring up a Specification of the Works required to be done by the abutting owners to channel and curb the footpath on the west side of Regent Street from Ormond Terrace to the South end of Regent Street on the West side and the footpaths on both sides of Ormond Place, to kerb, pave and channel the tariff part of the footpath on the East side of Rodney Road, the footpath on the South side of Albion Street from Hewlett Street to Berkeley Street, to asphalte, kerb and channel the footpath from the Promenade to Royal Well Lane, and the footpath on the West &de of Royal Well Lane.

7-Fairfield Road—Letters from Mr. Dix were read formally objecting as owner of this road to its being declared a highway unless an allowance be made to him which he suggested should be £65 of the amount of £79 claimed from him by the Corporation for Private improvement Works in respect of frontages to the road ow ned by him in consideration of his having had to buy land for widening the road and for the land given up by him for the same purpose opposite Nos. 1 and 16 which had never belonged to him, at the time the road was made. Resolved, To adjourn the matter for further consideration at the next monthly meeting of the Committee.

8-Overton Park Road —Private Improvement works—A Letter was read from Mr. H. J. Sheppard, of No. 23, Montpellier Terrace, was read objecting to pay the amount of £63 10s of the Private Improvement Works in this road apportioned in respect of the frontage of Wyborne on the ground that the chief frontage of the house was to St. George's Road and the repairs to the frontage to Overton Park Road were of no advantage to him. Resolved, To inform Mr. Sheppard that the Council is unable to make any reduction of their claim, as the cost of the works was fairly apportioned between himself and the other abutting owners according to the extent of the frontages of their respective properties.

9-Shelburne Road-A Letter from the Rev. G. P. Griffiths, Local Secretary of Dean Close School, was read stating that this road was in good repair as far as the school property abuts upon it, and that with regard to opening it to the public the School Committee would be glad to know the probable amount of the expenses that would be incurred either at the present time or after if they consented to such opening, and upon whom the expenses would fall. A Letter front the Town Clerk in reply was read. Resolved, That a conference on the subject between a deputation of this Committee, consisting of the Chairman, Councillor Bence and the Town Clerk, and the Committee of the School be proposed.

10-Power of Telephone Co. to carry Wires- A Letter from the General Post Office was read stating that the delegation to the National Telephone Co. of the Postmaster General's Statutory Powers of Wayleave in the Borough was complete so far as he was concerned, but the consent of the Urban Authority was necessary before the Company could exercise any powers under the Telegraph Acts; also a further letter from the Solicitor to the Company, claiming the right of the

Company to stretch wires across the streets, but that no occasion had arisen for him to consider what might be the position of the Company at some future time which was purely a question of construction. Resolved, To further adjourn consideration of the matter.

11-Trees in Wellington Square—A Letter from Alderman Winterbotham was read stating that he had a Letter from Mrs. Webb approving of the removal of the second lime tree from the corner on the pavement side on the south front of Amberley House, and advocating himself its removal and also the overhanging branch of the elm by the stable. Resolved, To draw Alderman Winterbotham's attention to the fact that the Council has passed a Resolution that no more trees shall be cut down this season and that the Committee are consequently unable to accede to his request, but that the Borough Surveyor be instructed to have the branch referred to cut off.

12--Suffolk Road Improvement—A Letter from Mr. Wade was read stating that his client would not entertain the proposal of the Corporation to purchase the corner of the garden of Roderic House required to throw into the road for £50, and that unless an advance be made the negotiation must be at an end. Resolved, That the Town Clerk be instructed to ascertain from Mr. Wade what his client will sell the land in question for.

13—Stable in Rutland Street—Resolved, That notice be given to the owner of the stable at No. 36, Rutland Street, being a wooden building, to remove the same, and that the attention of the Public Health Committee be called to its insanitary condition.

14-Bicycle for Chief Assistant of the Borough Surveyor Resolved, That £3 per annum, commencing from the 1st of April last, be paid to Mr. Anderson towards the cost of hire of the bicycle used by him in connection with the work of the department.

15 -Pathways East side of Hatherley Road from Hatherley Hall to Coulter, and West side of same from Lansdown Road to bridge over Hatherley Brook—Specifications from the Surveyor, of date the 22nd day of February, with plans of the works required to be done to the above street were read and approved. Resolved, That notice be given under Section 44 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act. 1852, to the owners of the premises fronting, adjoining, or abutting upon the parts of the said street, requiring to be edged, asphalted and channelled; requiring them to do the specified works within 28 days; and that, if such notice is not complied with, the Surveyor do proceed to execute the Works mentioned or referred to therein; and that the expenses thereof be recovered in the manner provided by the Act and the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889.

16-- Road in Liverpool Place—A Specification from the Surveyor, of date the 12th day of February, with plan, of the Works required to be done to the above street. was read and approved. Resolved, That the necessary estimates be prepared and notices be given under Section 150 of the Public Health Act, 1875, to the owners of the premises fronting, adjoining, or abutting upon the parts of the said street. requiring to be sewered, levelled, paved, metalled, flagged, channelled or made good; requiring them to do the specified works within 28 clays; and that if such notice is not complied with, the Surveyor do proceed to execute the Works mentioned or referred to therein; and that the expenses thereof be recovered in the manner provided by the Act, and the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889.

17-Footpaths at South end of Regent Street and in St. Margaret's Road—The Borough Surveyor reported that the costs of carrying out the Private Improvement Works ordered to be done to these footpaths amounted to £76 15s. 10d. and £279 5s. respectively which sums he had apportioned in each case between the abutting owners according to the frontages of their respective premises. Resolved, That the apportionments be approved and that notices thereof and of demand be served upon the owners.

- 18 Urinal Guides—Resolved, To instruct the Borough Surveyor to have affixed in prominent positions guide plates to the urinals.

PUBLIC HEALTH COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Monday, the 14th day of February, 1898—Present: Alderman Norman; Councillors Bence, M. Davis, Gurney, Lenthall, Margrett, and Waghorne (Councillor Bence in the chair).

1--Zymotic Disease—The Medical Officer of Health reported that there had been notified since the last meeting of the Committee, 12 cases of Scarlet Fever, 5 of Diphtheria, and 1 of Puerperal Fever; that 7 cases of Scarlet Fever had been sent into the Delancey Hospital, and 1 into the College Sanatorium; that the 5

cases of Diphtheria were being treated in the General Hospital, and that the number of cases then in the Delancey Hospital sent in by the Corporation was 26.

- 2—Nuisance from Drains, &c., at Woburn House, No. 2, Argyle Place, Nos. 5 and 35, Hanover Street, No. 12, Leamington Place, No. 4, Lypiatt Street, The Pittville Hotel, and No, 31, Whitehart Street- The Inspector of Nuisances having made written application under Sec. 41 of the Public Health Act, stating that the drains, &c., on or belonging to the above-named houses were in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health. Resolved, That authority be given to the Inspector of Nuisances to open the ground, examine the drains, and, if necessary, give the notices and act as provided by the said section.
- 3—Overcrowding at a room at No. 1, All Saints Buildings—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the above premises were so overcrowded as to be dangerous or injurious to the health of the inmates. Resolved, That the Committee being satisfied of the existence of a nuisance on the said Premises, Notices under Sec. 94 of the Public Health Act be served on the owners and occupiers thereof requiring them to abate the same.
- 4- Wells at Nos. 26, 27, 29 and 30, Dunalley Parade, Nos. 1, 8, 11 and 10, Hanover Parade, No. 58, High Street, and Nos. 18 and 19, Bath Parade—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the water in these wells was used, or likely to be used, by man for drinking or domestic purposes, and was so polluted as to be injurious to health. Resolved, That proceedings under Sec. 70 of the Public Health Act be taken to obtain Orders for these wells to be closed.

5-Insanitary Property, viz.-Nos. 136, 137, 138 and 139, Tewkesbury Road, No. 3, Grosvenor Street, and Nos. 1 and 2, Albert Cottage, Russell Place--The Medical Officer of Health reported that the premises abovementioned were in such a state as to be injurious to the health of the inmates, owing to defective yards, floors, ceilings, &c. Resolved, That the Council being satisfied that the said premises are in such a state as to be injurious to health, Notices under Sec. 94 of the Public Health Act, 1875, be served upon the owners requiring them to put the same into a healthy condition and for that purpose to carry out the works specified in the Notices.

6—Dairies, Cowsheds and Milkshops Order—Applications to be registered as purveyors of milk were received from Mr. A. E. Townley, Marlborough House, Swindon Road, and Mrs. F. Elliott, No. 260, High Street. Resolved, That the applications be granted.

7-W.C's without Flushing Apparatus -The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses having w.c's without flushing apparatus. Resolved, That Notices under Section 28 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, be given to the owners requiring them to provide the necessary flushing apparatus, and to the occupiers to lay on a proper supply of water thereto, and that in default of compliance with such notices proceedings be taken for the penalties.

8- Houses without proper Ash Receptacles The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses which had no proper ashpits or ash receptacles. Resolved, That the necessary Notices be given to the respective Owners under Sec. 36 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and Sec. 27 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, requiring them in each case to provide a moveable ash receptacle of such size, pattern, and construction as may be approved by the Borough Surveyor on behalf of the Corporation, and that where a common fixed ashpit may be constructed that form may be permitted.

- 9-Cleansing and Limewashing at No. 18, Bath Parade, Nos. 7, 10 and 11, Rutland Street, and Woburn House—The Medical Officer of Health having certified under Sec. 46 of the Public Health Act, that the abovenamed dwelling houses were in such a filthy and unwholesome condition that the health of the inmates was affected or endangered thereby. Resolved, That Notice be given to the owners under the said Section requiring the houses to be cleansed and limewashed.
- 10 Disinfecting outside District--The Medical Officer of Health reported that at the request of the Medical Officer of Health for the Rural District a house at Prestbury had been disinfected for the Rural Sanitary Authority by his officials. Resolved, That a charge of 15s. be made to the said Authority for the cost of the disinfecting.
- 11-Charge for Lairage at Abattoir --- The Medical Officer of Health reported that hitherto the charges authorised to be made for Lairage had not been levied which had given rise to a tendency to abuse the privilege thus accorded by keeping animals in contravention of the byelaws for too long a time before slaughtering, and that Mr. George Willis, Butcher, of Regent House. Swindon Road, was a great offender in this respect. Resolved, To instruct the Town Clerk to write to Mr. Willis to inform him that if further cause for similar complaint is given by him the byelaw will be strictly enforced against him.
- 12- Smoke Nuisance- The Medical Officer of Health reported that a nuisance had occurred from black smoke emitted from the chimney of Georges Limited at their premises adjacent to the High Street and Colonnade, three observations on different days having been noted. Resolved, That Notice under Sec. 94 of the Public Health Act be served upon the Company requiring them to abate the nuisance.
- 13- Report of Medical Officer of Health- The Medical Officer of Health presented his Annual Report and submitted Tenders he had obtained for printing it as follows, viz.

- 14-Barn Farm-A Letter from Mr. Corbett was read making a request to the Council to have the draining at the Barn Farm done at once before the grass begins to grow, and stating that he would be glad to cart the clinker for the new yard before his busy time began. Resolved, To instruct the Borough Surveyor to report as to the extent of the drainage required and the probable cost, and also with reference to a request made by Mr. Corbett for another shed, and that Mr. Corbett be informed he can have the clinker as soon as he likes.
- 15--Offensive Trades Byelaws—A Letter from Mr. G. M. Davis, of No. 4, Rotunda Terrace, was read, asking to be informed what the observations of the Medical Officer were which were to be forwarded to the Local Government Board. Resolved, That Mr. Davis be furnished with a copy.

16—Sanitary Requirements at No. 5, St. James's Terrace -A Letter from Mrs. C. Stevens, the owner of this property, was read, stating that she had not got the money to pay for carrying out the sanitary works which she had been required to do at the premises mentioned, but she was willing to pay £3 per quarter with 5 per cent. interest if the Council would do the work and charge her with the expense. Resolved, That the proposal be agreed to.

17-Smoke Nuisance at Mrs. Weaver's Laundry—A Letter from Mr. Dutton, of No. 26, St. Paul's Street North, was read, complaining of the nuisance arising from the emission of smoke from the chimney of this Laundry. Resolved, To inform Mr. Dutton that Mrs. Weaver has undertaken to burn coke instead of coal so as to abate the nuisance.

18— Sick Pay of Corporation Workman - A Letter from Mr. F. D. W. Smith was read, stating that he had been incapacitated from work for the past two months owing to an injury to his knee, and requesting that he might be allowed a portion of his pay during that period. Resolved, To instruct the Borough Surveyor to ascertain the circumstances under which the injury was received and report to the Committee at their next meeting.

- Cleansing and Limewashing at No. 36 Sun Street, No. 220a High Street, and No. 2, Phoenix Passage, high Street The Medical Officer of Health having certified under Sec. 46 of the Public Health Act, that the above-

named dwelling houses were in such a filthy and unwholesome condition that the health of the inmates was affected or endangered thereby, Resolved, That Notices be given to the owners under the said Section requiring the houses to be cleansed and limewashed.

24 - Nuisance from Drains, &c. at York Cottage behind No. 82, High Street, and No. 7, St. Ann's Terrace—The Inspector of Nuisances having made written application under Sec. 41 of the Public Health Act, stating that the drains, &c., on or belonging to the above-named houses were in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health. Resolved, That authority be given to the Inspector of Nuisances to open the ground, examine the drains, and, if necessary, give the notices and act as provided by the said section.

28—Insanitary Property at Nos. 67, 68, 83, & 220a, High Street, and Belmont, Grosvenor Street—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the premises above-mentioned were in such a state as to be injurious to the health of the inmates owing to defective walls, roofs, &c. Resolved, That the Council being satisfied that the said premises are in such a state as to be injurious to health, Notices under Sec. 94 of the Public Health Act be served upon the owners requiring them to put the same into a healthy condition and for that purpose to carry out the works specified in the Notices.

29- Notices clot complied with—The Medical Officer of Health handed in a List of Notices which had been served to carry out sanitary requirements. ordered by the Council, which had not been complied with. Resolved, To instruct the Town Clerk to take proceedings to compel compliance with the Notices.

30-Destruction of Unsound Meat— The Medical Officer of Health reported that the carcass of a sheep dressed by a butcher at the Abattoir was destroyed on February 19th as being diseased and unfit for human food.

31--- Barnard's Row—With reference to the Resolution to Minute No. 36 of the proceedings of this Committee of the 24th of January last, a Letter from Mr. R. E. Steel was read on behalf of his client, Mr. E.

Steel, offering to sell this property to the Corporation for £500. Resolved. That the Council are unable to entertain the offer.

- 32-Sanitary Works at Cottage at Arle—A Letter from Capt. Welch was read stating that he had been unable to carry out the Sanitary Works at the cottages at Arle belonging to him, as one of the inmates was in a dying condition, and asking for an extension of time for a fortnight from the 26th inst. WATER COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Wednesday, the 23rd day of February, 1898 Present: The Mayor; Councillors Baker, Bence, Ll. Davies, Dix and Margrett (Councillor Margrett in the chair)

1—Water Engineer's Report The Water Engineer reported that on the 21st inst. the supply from the Hewletts and Northfield Springs was 166 gallons, the average for the last four years being 223 gallons per minute; and the quantity of water in store at Hewletts and Leckhampton was 17,254,681 gallons.

On the 22nd inst., the depth of water in Dowdeswell Reservoir was 31 feet and the contents 94,756,149 gallons, which gave a total of 112,010,830 gallons, or about 132 days' supply, exclusive of the daily yield of the springs, which was then about 820,464 gallons.

It appeared from the report that shortly before Christmas a 4-inch iron pipe near the pipe line from the spring at California which had been left so as to be available for repairs when the ground should become too wet to safely cart over it had been missed. The police reported that they had ascertained that a pipe answering to the description of the missing one had been some weeks ago conveyed by Mr. C. Randall, of Coxhorn Farm, to place under a roadway leading to the back of premises at East End, Charlton Kings, belonging to him. Mr. Randall said he found the pipe and some others of the same sort lying in a ditch on his farm years ago and that he had laid one of the same sort under a gateway in a field in his occupation at Dowdeswell about a year ago, and that as the pipes had been lying on his farm for so many years he thought himself justified in using them.

The Water Engineer further reported that the extension of the main at Arle was completed and the cottages were being connected. With regard to the water supply to the General Hospital he gave the readings of the meter since September 28th last which averaged 4,643 gallons per day, and with regard to an application he had received from the Trustees of the Delancey Hospital for the reduction of the charges made to them for the water supply to that institution he suggested that the charge be 1s per 1,000 gallons and not as then half an arbitrary amount with a portion at 1s 3d per 1,000 gallons by meter.

A Letter from Mr. H. T. Carrington, Hon. Sec. of the General Hospital, was read, stating that the cisterns had been refilled shortly before the meter was examined that it seemed impossible that the ordinary consumption could be at the rate of 100,000 gallons for 17 ½ days, requesting that the meter be again tested for the same length of time, now that their consumption was normal, and asking it there would be any objection to an officer of the Hospital being present when the meter was read.

Resolved, That Mr. Randall be charged 15s the value of the two pipes taken by him; that Mr. Carrington be informed that the readings of the meter taken over the whole period since it was fixed show an average daily consumption of 4,643 gallons which works out at £105 8s. 9d. per annum, but that the charge will be reduced to 1s per 1,000 gallons, and that in addition to the 20 guineas subscribed by the Council a rebate be allowed on their water account of £29 per annum, provided the Hospital will grant to the Council additional patients' tickets as if for a donation of that amount, and that it Le suggested to the hospital authorities that the Chairman of this Committee for the time being should be appointed on the Board of Governors of the Hospital; also That the charge for the water supply to the Delancey Hospital be 1s for 1,000 gallons and that a rebate of £20 per annum be allowed on their water account.

- 2-Water Pressure to Christ Church Organ—A Letter from the members of the Christ Church Council was read complaining that the water pressure was insufficient to properly work the hydraulic machinery for working the organ at the church. Resolved, That the writers be informed that the Organ appears to have been erected and fitted with machinery which requires a higher pressure of water than the Corporation can possibly give, and therefore that the Committee regret they are unable to do anything to overcome the present difficulty as to the working of the Organ.
- 3—Dowdeswell Pike—The Town Clerk reported that the amount claimed from the Imperial Institute for the damage done to this pike had been paid.
- 4 —Theft of Boiler —With reference to a charge against a man named Spreag of having stolen from Barrett's Mill a boiler belonging to the Corporation in July, 1892, Resolved, That the Town Clerk be instructed to attend at the hearing of the case before the magistrates in the interest of the Council.
- 5--Water Supply to Flushing Box--A Letter was read from Mr. W. Smith, of No. 12a, Norwood Terrace, stating that he was willing to comply with a notice which had been served upon him to fix a flushing box provided the same rate be charged him for the water supply as the adjoining houses, and no increase made in respect of his stabling for which he did not require details he had an abundant supply for that already. Resolved, To adjourn consideration of the matter to the next meeting in the absence of the Water Engineer on account of indisposition.
- 6--Appeals--The cases entered in the Appeal Book were considered and the rates settled and adjusted.

- 2--Gas Inspector's Report—The Gas Inspector reported that the hourly average consumption of Gas per lamp during the previous month had been 4.1923 cubic feet.
- 3-- Lamp Book—This Book was produced and examined Lamps extinguished, 3 metered and 5 unmetered.

4—Lighting at Junction of Montpellier Terrace and Roads leading into Suffolk Square--A letter from Councillor Ward-Humphreys was read, representing the urgent need for a couple of Guildhall lamps at the junction above mentioned at its North-West corner. Resolved, To adjourn consideration of the matter pending inspection at the next view meeting of the Committee, and in the meantime the Electrical Engineer be instructed to report as to the means of improving the lighting of this area with an arc light or lights.

5---Electrical Inspector's Report—The Electrical Inspector reported the result of his tests of the electric supply during the past month as follows, viz.-

6— Electric Supply to the Ladies' College—A letter from the Secretary of the Ladies' College was read, complaining of the failure of the Electric light on the evening of the 21st of February, on the occasion of the annual Dancing Assembly in the New Hall of the College, causing great inconvenience and disappointment, as parents and friends had come from a distance for the occasion. The Electrical Engineer reported that the disaster arose owing to failure of the fuse through which the cable supplying current to the College is fed, causing the supply to the College to be cut off altogether. That he was unable to give a definite reason for the failure of the' fuse, as there should have been a margin of safety of nearly 30 per cent. as appeared from tests made on the following morning. There was a very large number of lamps at the College and as regards the evening in question he understood that practically the lighting would be limited to the Great Hall. He believed, however, that the number of lamps in use was largely in excess of those in the Hall, and though this did not account for the failure of the lose, it considerably reduced the factor of safety possible. Resolved, To send a copy of the Electrical Engineer's report to the Secretary of the College, and to inform him that the Council very much regret that there should have been such cause for complaint and that so much inconvenience was caused thereby.

7- - Electric Supply to St. Hilda's—A letter from the Secretary of the Ladies' College was read, complaining of the very large increase in the account for the electric supply to St. Hilda's for the last quarter, amounting to £40 2s. 4d. for 2,027 units; whereas the account for the corresponding quarter last year amounted to £28 7s. 8d. for 1195.23 units, although the number of lamps in use and the regulations with regard to them had been exactly the same, except that owing to the greater strength of the current they could not in passages, lavatories, &c., use lamps of such low candle power as before. He suggested that the meter could not be correct, and that unless the charge was reduced to a reasonable amount arrangements would have to be made to again use gas as the illuminating power. Further, he submitted that the charge of 1s per day for lighting of his office was excessive, and suggested that a credit allowance should be made. The Electrical Engineer reported that he had had the meters tested, and he was of opinion that the principal reason for the large increase was the lavish use of the lamps and want of care in switching them off when not required. That the amount of energy invoiced correspond to about 4 ½ to 4 ¾ hours daily use of all the lamps, an amount for the October—December quarter not unreasonable at St. Hilda's if the lamps were carelessly left on. Resolved, That the account be allowed to stand over until the expiration of the current quarter for the purpose of comparison, and that in the meantime the meters be re-tested.

8-Electrical Engineer's Report---The Electrical Engineer reported that steady progress had been made with connection of customers to the mains. The total number of services connected was 241, and the equivalent number of 8 candle power lamps was He was daily expecting delivery of an additional Transformer for the Sub-station from which most of the customers at Montpellier were supplied, which would enable him to put in fuses with a considerably larger factor of safety, and pending this Transformer being fixed at Queen's Circus, it would be best to attempt to supply the whole of the Ladies' College on Wednesday evening. only. Resolved, That this suggestion be approved.

9

9-Arc Light at the Spa Pharmacy—A letter from Messrs. Thomas Bros. was read, stating that the Arc light system of lighting in the Montpellier district had greatly reduced the value of their lamp outside Bayshill Lodge as an advertising medium, and they proposed to do away with it, but as it had been a great public boon and would be missed, they suggested that an Arc lamp should be erected at the corner of Rotunda Terrace outside the Spa Pharmacy, thus lighting Montpellier Street, Queen's Parade, and the open space opposite, and offering to hand over their lamp, if this be done, to the Council as a free gift. Resolved, To inform Messrs. Thomas Bros. that the Council cannot comply with this suggestion until the question of lighting Montpellier Street comes up for consideration.

1—Swine Fever—Superintendent Hopkins reported that on the 30th January a case of Swine Fever occurred at Mr. F. Townsend's, Sunnymead, Hatherley, that one pig died and 25 others were slaughtered, the premises had been cleansed and disinfected and the carcases of the diseased pigs destroyed at the Ash Destructor, that the provisions of the Swine Fever Order had been complied with, and that 3 more outbreaks of Swine Fever had been reported in the Borough since.

A Letter from the Board of Agriculture was read, with which they forwarded copy of an Order applying the Markets and Fairs (Swine Fever) Order, 1896, to (inter alia) the Borough of Cheltenham on expiry of the infected Areas Order. Resolved, That notice of the same be duly advertised.

- 2-Muzzling Order—Superintendent Hopkins reported that since the last report 18 unmuzzled dogs had been seized by the police, 9 were claimed, 7 destroyed, and 2 still remained in the kennels; that 15 persons had been proceeded against for offences under the Muzzling Order, and 3s had been paid by owners of dogs claimed for their keep.
- 3--Fire Brigade— A Letter from the Superintendent of the Fire Brigade was read, stating that the Spring Meeting of the West Midland District National Fire Brigades Union would be held in Cheltenham on May 14th next, on which occasion the usual competitions for prizes and a tournament will be held, and requesting permission for the Brigade to take part in the same and to participate generally in the event. Resolved, To grant the permission asked for.
- 4-- Hackney Carriages—The Street Inspector reported that 5 hackney carriages had been placed under repair during the month, and a new vehicle had been used in lieu of pony carriage No. 107. A Letter from Mr. C. T. Arundell, of Leckhampton Mews, was read, stating that he had disposed of his landau No. 65 and requesting permission to transfer the license to another similar but better vehicle. Resolved, That subject to approval of the carriage by the Chairman the application be acceded to.
- 5—Transfer to County Councils of certain Powers, Duties and Liabilities of the Local Government Board -A Letter from the Association of Municipal Corporations was read with which they forwarded copy of a report of the Town Clerks of Morley and Darwen with reference to the proposed transfer of powers from the Government Departments to County Councils in which they expressed an opinion that it should receive the most strenuous opposition possible, and that a vigorous attempt should be made to exclude non-County Boroughs altogether from the proposed transfer. Resolved, That this Council fully concur in the opinion above stated and that the Town Clerk be instructed to prepare and forward to the Association of Municipal Corporations a statement showing the particular ways in which this borough will be adversely affected should the proposal be carried out.
- 6—Conference of National Union of Teachers—The Boroughs Surveyor laid before the Committee a Specification he had prepared of the requirements of the N.U.T. to render the Winter Garden convenient for the purposes of the Conference. Resolved, That the same be approved and that Tenders be advertised for to carry out the work, and that the chairs required in addition to those at present belonging to the Council be hired and included in the Specification.

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Wednesday, the 2nd day of March, 1898--Present: Alderman Haddon Councillors Cypher, Ll. Davies, Mills, and Steel (Councillor Steel in the chair)—

- 1—Attendance Officers' Report The Monthly Report of the Attendance Officers was read, from which it appeared that duplicate registers had been received from the schools, from which 740 names of absentee children had been extracted, all of whom had been visited. They also reported that the parents of 50 children had been summoned to attend before the Local Committees who had held 7 meetings, and that 2 parents had been prosecuted and fined.
- 2 -Local Committees—The Minute Books of the several Local Committees were gone through and examined. Resolved, That proceedings under the Bye-laws be taken against the parents of the following children, viz., Ernest and Elsie Eden, 26, Bloomsbury Street, and that proceedings under Section 12 of the Act of 1876 be taken against the parents of Frederick and William Stevens, 2 Millbrook Cottages, and Thomas Veale, Albion Place, for non-compliance with attendance orders, and also under the same Section against the parents of Albert Wilson, late of St. Peter's Place, Alfred Barter, Bruton Cottage, Portland Street, and Charles Haines of Young's Court, Rutland Street, with a view to their being sent to Industrial Schools.

A letter was read from Mr. J. P. Cook, of St. Luke's School, stating that the boy John Sims, against whose parents a summons was ordered at the last Meeting of the Committee for irregular attendance, had attended 187 times out of a possible 201, and that during the period covered by these attendances there had been several reasonable excuses for absences in his case from school. The Attendance Officer reported that the boy's mother would not attend the meeting of the Local Committee, and was very defiant. Resolved, That the Town Clerk write to the boy's mother and inform her that unless she apologises for her conduct and sends the boy to school regularly she will be summoned.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, 1898—Present Alderman Haddon; Councillors Baker, Bence, Cypher, and Margrett (Councillor Baker in the chair)—

1-Great Western Railway (General Powers) Bill—A Letter was read from Mr. R. R. Nelson, the solicitor to the Great Western Railway Company, suggesting that a conference on the subject of the petition presented by the Corporation might facilitate an arrangement, and asking whether it would be convenient to have such on an early date.

The Town Clerk placed before the Committee the evidence he had obtained on the subject, which went to show that a right of way of the user of the road in St. James's Square for carriages, and on foot by the public did exist.

Resolved, That the Chairman of this Committee, the Mayor, the Town Clerk and the Borough Surveyor be empowered to conk; with the Company with a view to a settlement being arrived at and the petition withdrawn on the basis of the Company giving up the piece of land at the back of St. James's Square in the road to the Knapp and if possible to their giving up sufficient land to enable Workhouse Lane to be widened at the top so that carriages could turn round in it.

6—Street Projections—The Street Inspector reported that three cycle wheels had been fined in front of the premises of Messrs. J. Wheway and Co., No. 1 Promenade Place, Clarence Street, without permission of the

Council having been first obtained, and that the sign at the Robin Hood Inn, St. James' Street, had not been removed, as required by the Council. A letter from Messrs. Wheway and Co. was read, asking permission to permanently exhibit the aforesaid sign of three cycle wheels, which they had had temporarily fixed in position for inspection. Resolved, That the permission be granted, and that consideration of matters relating to the sign at the Robin Hood Inn be adjourned until the next monthly meeting of the Committee.

7—Billposting Station, Bath Place—A letter from Mr. C. H. Rainger was read, stating that a Billposting Station had been established on a wall adjoining his premises, which was a nuisance and annoyance to the public and a source of damage to the adjoining property, and enquiring whether there was any Bye-law in existence dealing with such matters. Resolved, To inform Mr Rainger that at present the Council have no power to deal with the matter, but that the possibility of being able to make a Bye-law to do so is under consideration.

8-Pavement of Lauriston House, Lansdown, and Pathway Back of Queen's Parade —A letter from General Macdonald was read, stating that the residents of Queen's Parade complain of the state of the narrow strip of pavement and pathway above mentioned. - 13-Ditch South Side of Harp Bill Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to have this ditch piped and covered over and a footpath lot med above it.
- 14-Crossings in Leckhampton Road Resolved, That crossings in Leckhampton Road be constructed at the west ends of the Ewlyn and Fairfield Roads.
- 15-Report of the Borough Surveyor re Highways--The Borough Surveyor reported that the work done by the Highways Department from the 26th of February to the 25th of March, both inclusive, had been as follows:

PUBLIC HEALTH COMMITTEE.

At a M:eting of this Committee, held on Monday, the 14th day of March, 1898—Present: Alderman Norman; Councillors Bence, M. Davis, Gurney, Lenthall, Margrett, Moles and Waghorne (Councillor Bence in the chair).

Zymotic Disease— The Medical Officer of Health reported that there had been notified since the last meeting of the Committee, 14 cases of Scarlet Fever, 1 of Puerperal Fever and 2 of Diphtheria; that 13 cases of Scarlet Fever had been sent into the Delancey Hospital, and 1 of Diphtheria into the General Hospital, and that the number of Corporation cases then in the Delancey Hospital was 24.

- 2— Cleansing and Limewashing at Nos. 8 and 9, Moorend Street, No. 12, Albert Street, St. Peter's, and No. 15, Upper Bath Street—The Medical Officer of Health having certified under Sec. 46 of the Public Health Act, that the above-named dwelling houses were in such a filthy and unwholesome condition that the health of the inmates was affected or endangered thereby. Resolved, That Notice be given to the owners under the said Section requiring the houses to be cleansed and limewashed.
- 3– Nuisance from Drains, &c., at Marion Cottage, Moorend Street, No. 25, Duke Street, No. 4, Swindon Terrace, Nos. 1 to 5, Denmark Cottages, and No. 2, Cyprus Cottages—The Inspector of Nuisances having made written application under Sec. 41 of the Public Health Act, stating that the drains, &c., on or belonging to the above-named houses were in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health. Resolved, That

authority be given to the Inspector of Nuisances to open the ground, examine the drains, and, if necessary, give the notices and act as provided by the said section.

4-- Wells at Nos. 12, 13, 15, 19, 20, 21, 22. 23, 21, 25 and 28, Dunalley Parade, and Nos. 13 and 14, Carlton Place.—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the water in these wells was used, or likely to be used, by man for drinking or domestic purposes, and was so polluted as to be injurious to health. Resolved, That proceedings under Sec. 70 of the Public Health Act be taken to obtain Orders for these wells to be closed.

5-Overcrowding at Nos. 1 and 5, Exmouth Terrace—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the above premises were so overcrowded as to be dangerous or injurious to the health of the inmates. Resolved, That the Committee being satisfied of the existence of a nuisance on the said Premises, Notices under Sec. 94 of the Public Health Act be served on the owners and occupiers thereof requiring them to abate the same.

6--W.C's without Flushing Apparatus—The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses having w.c's without flushing apparatus. Resolved, That Notices under Section 28 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, be given to the owners requiring them to provide the necessary flushing apparatus, and to the occupiers to lay on a proper supply of water thereto, and that in default of compliance with such notices proceedings be taken for the penalties.

7-Houses without proper Asti Receptacles-The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses which had no proper ashpits or ash receptacles. Resolved, That the necessary Notices be given to the respective Owners under Sec. 36 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and Sec. 27 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, requiring them in each case to provide a moveable ash receptacle of such size, pattern, and construction as may be approved by the Borough Surveyor on behalf of the Corporation.

4

8-Houses unfit for Human Habitation, viz., a Room over a Stable in Hermitage Street occupied by Mrs. Pearce, and a Room over a blacksmith's shop in New Street, occupied by Mr. Waive—The Medical Officer of Health having certified that these houses were in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and unfit for human habitation, Resolved, That proceedings under Sec. 32 of the Housing of the Working Classes Act, 1890, be taken to obtain Orders for them to be closed.

9—Dairies, Cowsheds and Milkshops order An Application was received from Ellen A. Gregory, of Norwood House, Great Norwood Street, to be registered as a purveyor of milk. Resolved, That the application be granted.

10—Treatment of Diphtheria and Typhoid Fever —The Medical Officer of Health called attention to the fact that provision had been made at the Delancey Hospital for treatment of diphtheria and typhoid fever cases, and he was of opinion that such cases are more safely treated in a Special Hospital than in a general one. Resolved, That in future Corporation cases of these diseases be sent to the Delancey Hospital as far as they can be accommodated in preference to the General Hospital, and that the Resolution to Minute No. 30 of the proceedings of this Committee of date the 10th day of November, 1895, that as many cases of enteric fever as can be received there be sent to the General Hospital be varied or altered accordingly.

11-Ambulance for Diphtheria and Typhoid Cases—Resolved, That the present ambulance used for these cases be inspected by the members of this Committee on the Delancey Trust, and if it appears to them to be sufficiently commodious and repairable that it be properly repaired and done up so as to make it efficient for

the purpose of conveying diphtheria and typhoid patients to the Delancey Hospital, and that they do report as to the provision of shedding for the ambulances at the Delancey Hospital.

12 — Pollution of Brook below Pittville Lake The Medical Officer of Health reported that he had inspected the field and pond from which the pollution found its way into the stream and he had found the pond in the field so grossly polluted as to be an undoubted nuisance and the water in it rendered dangerous by the reception of sewage which came through a culvert from the direction of the houses on Marle Hill immediately above, and that there was an overflow from the pond at that time that discharged into the brook, but only a little of it appeared to reach the brook as it was mostly absorbed by the soil of the field en route. A Letter was read from Mr. R. Ticehurst, Clerk to the Cheltenham Rural District Council stating that there seemed to be a misapprehension on the part of the Town Council as to the nuisance having been already pointed out by the Medical Officer of Health of the Town Council to the Medical Officer of Health of the Rural District Council as the latter had distinctly stated that such was not the case, and that his Council were consequently at a loss to know what the complaint was about as neither their Medical Officer of Health or Inspector of Nuisances could find any foundation for it, that the pond referred to had been inspected by a Committee of the Rural District Council and was found not to be a nuisance or the cause of one, but that it was possible it might become so and a strict watch would be kept on it. Resolved, That the Medical Officer of Health be requested to arrange a meeting between himself and the Medical Officer of Health of the Rural District Council to point out to the latter the desirability of impressing upon his Council the necessity of their taking steps to cause abatement of the nuisance,

13-Offensive Trades Byelaws-A Letter was read from Mr. G. M. Davis, Secretary of the Cheltenham and District Butchers' Association, a copy of which he had sent to the Local Government Board criticising the proposed byelaws against offensive trades, and suggesting in what respects they should be modified. Resolved, That it be left to the Local Government Board to decide what modifications, if any, should be made.

14-Smoke Nuisance at Georges Limited—A Letter was read from the General Manager of Georges Limited stating that measures had been taken to comply with the notice which had been served upon the Company to abate the nuisance caused by the emission of smoke from their chimney at the back of No. 366, High Street, but as the necessary alterations could not be completed by the expiration of the time allowed requesting that it might be extended for 14 days. The Town Clerk reported that he had intimated to the Manager that the request would be granted. Resolved, That the reply of the Town Clerk be approved.

15-Smoke Nuisance from Mrs. Weaver's Laundry—A Letter was read from Mr. Dutton, of No. 26, St. Paul's Street North, the land-lord of property in the vicinity of this laundry, complaining that this nuisance had been in no way abated and was greater than ever. Mrs. Cummings, of No. 38, and Mrs. Cook, of No. 39, Sun Street, attended the meeting of the Committee and produced articles of clothing with black smuts thereon which they alleged had been emitted from the chimney of the Laundry and had lodged on the clothing which had been hung out to dry after washing. Resolved, That the Medical Officer of Health be instructed to have further observations made and report as to the result.

16-Flushing Box, ace., at No. 23, Hungerford Street—A Letter was read from Mr. M. Doxsey stating that he could not comply with the notice which had been served on him to provide a flushing box and lay on the water as he had only 2s 6d a week to live on and was 79 years of age so that he could not do any work. Resolved, That the Town Clerk be instructed to inform Mr. Doxsey that the notice must be complied with.

17-Complaint against Corporation Officials—A Letter was read from Mr. E. W. Sharland, of Ambro House, complaining of the treatment he had received from the Officials of the Corporation in serving him with notices, &c., to carry out sanitary requirements ordered by the Council.

18-Sick Pay of Employee—With reference to the application of Mr. F. D. W. Smith for an allowance during the time he had been incapacitated from work through illness, Resolved, That for the present he be granted half wages from the 6th of February, the date of his application, such services as may be within his power to be rendered by him.

19-Congress of British Institute of Public Health--A Letter was read from the Lord Mayor of Dublin stating that the Annual Congress of this Institute would be held this year in Trinity College, Dublin, from August 18th to August 23rd, and inviting the Council to appoint delegates to be present and take part in the deliberations. Resolved, That consideration of the matter be adjourned.

20-Hayden Farm.--The Town Clerk reported that Mr. Wood, jun., called on him with the draft Agreement for the tenancy of Heyden

Farm and objected to the clauses against mowing, underletting and not turning out from the 1st December to 1st March. Resolved, That the Council cannot consent to any variation of the Agreement as regards the clauses above referred to, and that any dispensation or relief from them at any time that can be properly given must be left to the Borough Surveyor.

- 21- Sewer Connections—A Letter from Mr. J. D. Bendall, builder, Leckhampton Road, was read complaining that when recently he had had to make connections with the main sewers in Pilley, Leckhampton and Evelyn Roads he had been required by the Borough Surveyor to take out pipes and put in a junction, which he considered unjust, as he knew of cases where other builders had been allowed simply to cut a hole in the side of the sewer and insert a pipe, and he contended that the same regulation should be enforced upon all builders alike and each be supplied with a copy of such regulation. Resolved, That the regulations which the Borough Surveyor had already drafted be printed and a print thereof be furnished to each member of the Committee previous to consideration of them at a future meeting.
- 22--Corpus Street Sewer—The Borough Surveyor having reported that it would be necessary to enter upon and open the gardens of Nos. 1 to 13, Corpus Street for the purpose of laying this sewer. Resolved, That the notice required by Sec. 16 of the Public Health Act be served upon the owners or occupiers of the said premises informing them of the intention of the Council to exercise the powers of entry, &c., conferred on them by the said section.
- 23 —Urinal in High Street—With reference to Minute No. 20 of the proceedings of the Street and Highway Committee at their last meeting the Borough Surveyor reported that it would be practicable to build a urinal at the site fixed upon by that Committee which would not be more than about 18 inches in height above the level of the ground. Resolved, That this Committee regards the resolution to the said minute merely as a consent by the Street and Highway Committee to construction of a urinal at the junctions of Ambrose, New and High Streets, and that the Borough Surveyor be instructed to bring up the plan and estimate therein referred to this Committee.

24-Tivoli Sewer—The Borough Surveyor reported that the cost of this sewer was £12 0s. 4d. Resolved, That the Town Clerk be instructed to communicate with Messrs. Winterbothams & Gurney with reference thereto.

25— Building Plans-The plans of such new buildings necessitating drainage as had been or were intended to be placed before the Street and Highway Committee for consideration were laid before this Committee. Resolved, That so far as regards drainage the same be approved with the exception of Nos. 1021 for two houses in Eldorado Road for Mr. G. Stockwell, which be disapproved.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, the 21st day of March, 1898—Present: Councillors Bence, M. Davis, Gurney, Lenthall and Margrett (Councillor Bence in the chair).

26-Zymotic Disease—The Medical Officer of Health reported that there had been notified since the last meeting of the Committee, 5 cases of Scarlet Fever, and 2 of Diphtheria; that 5 cases of Scarlet Fever had been sent into the Delancey Hospital, and that the number of cases then in the Delancey Hospital sent in by the Corporation was 26.

27-House without a proper Water Supply, viz., Brookside Cottage, off Leckhampton Road—It appearing on the Report of the Borough Surveyor dated the 21st March, 1898, that the above premises were without a proper supply of water, but that such supply could be furnished at a cost not exceeding the Water Rate authorised by the Cheltenham Water Acts. Resolved, That Notice be given under Sec. 62 of the Public Health Act, 1875 to the owner, requiring him or her to obtain such a supply and do all such things as may be necessary for the purpose.

28-Wells at Nos. 2, 5 and 6, Hawarden Parade, and Nos. 2, 3, 7, 8, 9 and 11, St. Paul's terrace—The Medical Officer of Health re-ported that the water in the wells at the above-mentioned premises was used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, and was so polluted as to be injurious to health. Resolved, That proceedings under Sec. 70 of the Public Health Act be taken to obtain orders for these wells to be closed.

29-- Water Closets without Flushing Apparatus-The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses having water closets without Flushing Apparatus. Resolved, That Notices under Sec. 28 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, be given to the Owners requiring them to provide the necessary flushing apparatus, and to the Occupiers to lay on a proper supply of watt; thereto, and that in default of compliance with such Notices proceedings be taken for the penalties.

30-Houses without Proper Ash Receptacles The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses which had no proper Ashpits or Ash Receptacles. Resolved, That the necessary Notices be given to the respective owners under Sec. 36 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and Sec. 27 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, requiring them in each case to provide a moveable ash receptacle of such size, pattern, and construction as may be approved by the Borough Surveyor On behalf of the Corporation.

31-Cleansing and Limewashing at No. 16, Albert Street, St. Paul's, and Avenall Cottage—The Medical Officer of Health having certified under Sec. 46 of the Public Health Act, that the above-named dwelling houses were in such a filthy and

unwholesome condition that the health of the inmates was affected or endangered thereby, Resolved, That Notices be given to the owners under the said Section requiring the houses to be cleansed and limewashed.

32—Dairies, Cowsheds and Milkshops Order—Applications to be registered as purveyors of milk were received from J. W. Cox, No. 2, Suffolk Road, and from James Phelps, No. 32, Tivoli Street. Resolved, That the applications be granted.

33— Nuisance from Drains, &c. at Nos. 1, 3, 4, 5 and 6, Rockford Terrace, Tivoli, Nos. 30, 31, 32 and 33, Cambray, Duke of Sussex Inn, Swindon Road, and 3, Carlton Place--The Inspector of Nuisances having made written application under Sec. 41 of the Public Health Act, stating that the drains, &c., on or belonging to the above-named houses were in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health. Resolved, That authority be given to the Inspector of Nuisances to open the ground, examine the drains, and, if necessary, give the notices and act as provided by the said section.

34—Leckhampton National Schools—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the w.c. accommodation at these schools was defective and insufficient. Resolved, That authority be given to the Inspector of Nuisances to open the ground and examine the drains if necessary and act as provided by Sec.,41 of the Public Health Act, and that Notice under Sec. 36 of the same Act be served on the School Managers requiring them to provide sufficient and effective closet accommodation at the schools.

35-Pollution of Wyman's Brook—The Medical Officer of Health reported that this brook was polluted by drainage from Glen Cottage in Folly Lane and from some old culverts. Resolved, To adjourn consideration of the matter pending a visit of inspection to be paid by the Committee on the 23rd inst.

36—Heyden Farm The Town Clerk reported that he had had another interview with Mr. Wood who said he would agree to the terms of the draft as drawn if he be allowed to turn out sheep, cattle, or horses up to the end of December and is relieved from the obligation to mow one-third of the pasture in each year. Resolved, That he be allowed to turn out until the end of December each year unless the wetness of the season renders it in the opinion of the Surveyor inadvisable, but that the clause as to mowing must remain with power however to the Surveyor to waive it in any year if he thinks he can properly do so, and that the resolution of the Committee on this subject passed at their last meeting that they could not consent to any variation in the terms of the draft as drawn be varied accordingly.

37-Building Plans The plans of such new buildings necessitating drainage as had been or were intended to be placed before the Street and Highway Committee for consideration, were laid before this Committee. Resolved, That so far as regards drainage and matters affecting public health the same be approved.

38-Alleged Pollution of Wyman's Brook—The Committee, accompanied by the Medical Officer of Health and the Borough Surveyor, proceeded to inspect the sewerage and drainage arrangements so far as relates to the disposal of sewage from that part of the District of the Rural Authority adjoining Wyman's Brook.

Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor be directed to remove the iron culvert crossing the Wyman's Brook near Glen Cottages and that the Medical Officer of Health be instructed to trace the discharge of sewage into the brook by suitable tests and to report thereon to this Committee.

Also Resolved, That the attention of the Town Improvement Committee be called to the desirability in the interests of Public Health and on other grounds of extending the borough boundaries in the direction of the adjoining parishes of Prestbury and Swindon.

TOWN IMPROVEMENT COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, the 21st day of March, 1898 Present Aldermen Drew and Winterbotham; Councillors Bence, Cooper, Dix, Lenthall, Macdonald and Mills (Alderman Winterbotham in the chair)

- 1—Mr. Robson's account-The Town Clerk read the Report of Alderman Winterbotham and himself on the subject of Mr. Robson's Account for the Schemes for the proposed Kursaal and relating to his charges for the work which had been done by him. Resolved, That the Report be Printed and copies supplied to each member of the Committee, and that consideration thereof be adjourned until the next meeting of the Committee.
- 2-Winter Garden-A Letter was read from Messrs. H. G. Norton & Co., complaining of the treatment which they had received by the refusal of the Council to accept their offer to hire the use of the Winter Garden for their Cycle Show.
- 3—Montpellier Gardens.-The Electrical Engineer attended the meeting to ascertain from the Committee whether they would pay the Capital cost of the lighting of the band stand by electricity last summer less £35 which had been received from the Jubilee Fund, or whether the fittings should be removed. Resolved, That the fittings be retained and that the balance due be paid out of the fund authorised by Sec. 59 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889.
- 4—Sunshine Recorder-Letters from the Borough Meteorologist were read with reference to the different kinds of Sunshine Recorders and the position in which the one decided upon should be fixed and suggesting that if the instrument could be efficiently attended to by one of the men employed at the Pittville Gardens, the top of the dome of the Pump Room would undoubtedly be a better site for it than any position in his garden could be. Resolved, That it be left to Mr. Tyrer to obtain such kind of instrument as he shall consider best and that the Borough Surveyor be instructed to arrange with him as to the position in which it can best be fixed having regard to the attention required.

5--Coal Store in back road East side of Clarence Square-A Letter was read from Mr. Henry Wilkins, of No. 35, Clarence Square, calling attention to the fact that a stable in the road above-mentioned had been let by Messrs. Engall, Cox & Co. to a Mr. Collins for a coal store to and from which coal was taken in a waggon for retail in the streets, and that being a private road for the use of residents in the square the practice should be put a stop to. Resolved, To instruct the Town Clerk to write to Mr. Collins to inform him that he must cease to use the road in the manner complained of.

6-- Football Grand Stand, Montpellier Gardens—A Letter from Mr. F. Wilks, Hon. Sec. of the Athletic Society, was read asking if the Grand Stand at Montpellier Gardens could be allowed to remain until after the Sports on Easter Monday. Resolved, That the Council have no objection to its remaining up subject to the Society being responsible for its removal within two days after the Sports and to the conditions upon which the Football Club were allowed to erect it being strictly observed and carried out.

7-Town Band—A Letter from Mr. J. Hall, Secretary of the Town Band, was read asking if the Council will require the services of the band for the summer months. Resolved, That the Letter be referred to the Concert Sub-Committee, which be made General for band purposes, to deal with and report to this Committee.

8-Military Tournament at Montpellier Gardens —A Letter was read from Quarter-Master R. C. Bastin, stating that Lord Worcester had fixed Wednesday, May 18th, for the Tournament, and requesting that the gardens should be reserved for that date at the price agreed upon, viz., 15 guineas.

9-Damage by Peacocks—A Letter from Mrs. Parr, of Saxham, Pittville, was read complaining of damage which had been done in her garden by the peacocks from Pittville Park. Resolved, That the Council very much regret that Mrs. Parr should again have cause for complaint in this respect, and to inform her that endeavours are being made to capture the birds and prevent any recurrence of the complaints.

10-Black Swan—A Letter from Mr. Agg-Gardner was read expressing his thanks to the Council for their resolution of the 7th inst. with reference to his gift of a black swan.

WATER COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Wednesday, the 23rd day of March, 1898 Present: Councillors Bence, Ll. Davies, Al. Davis, Dix and Margrett (Councillor Margrett in the chair)—

1-Water Engineer's Report—The Water Engineer reported that on the 22nd inst. the supply from Hewletts and Northfield was 119 gallons, the average for the last four years being 200 gallons per minute; and the quantity of water in store at Hewletts was 17,341,281 gallons.

8

On the 21st inst., the depth of water in Dowdeswell Reservoir was 29 feet 11 ½ inches and the contents 89,402,315 gallons, which gave a total of 106,943,596 gallons, or about 130 days' supply, exclusive of the daily yield of the springs, which was then about 561,024 gallons.

The Water Engineer laid before the Committee correspondence he had had with the Vicar of Christ Church with reference to the pressure of the water to the Organ, and the Chairman reported that he had instructed the Water Engineer to have the supply from Hewletts turned on at the new Junction Valve in the London Road during hours of Service on Sundays, which had proved entirely satisfactory.

The Water Engineer further reported that he was at that time requiring a quantity of Turf for use at the Winter Garden, and having also had an application for garden ground, he had arranged to give the present tenant of the land at Sandford notice to terminate his tenancy,, and proposed to re-let the land in future as garden ground, by which means the return will be doubled. Resolved, That the Report be approved, and proposals and proceedings therein mentioned confirmed and adopted.

2—Water Supply to General Hospital—A letter from Mr. Carrington, Hon. Sec. of the General Hospital, was read, stating that the Rules of the Hospital did not allow the Board to adopt the suggestion of the Water Committee relative to placing the Chairman of the Committee on the Board. The Town Clerk laid before the Committee the draft of a letter which he proposed to write in reply, that the principle of representation of the Corporation on the governing bodies of the Grammar School, the Cleeve Hill Common Conservators and the Delancey Hospital, to the funds of which institutions and bodies the Corporation contributes, has been fully and freely recognised. That the Rules of the Hospital provide that donors of 50 guineas and annual subscribers of 10 guineas shall be *ex-officio* members of all Boards of the Hospital. That the Corporation being, therefore, annual subscribers of 20 guineas at present, and of £50 as proposed, would be entitled to be an ex-officio Governor if an individual, and inasmuch as the Corporation cannot in their Corporate capacity sit and vote as Governors, except by a representative or nominee, it is usual in such cases to place their nominee upon the governing body, That, under those circumstances, he was directed by the Council to express the hope that the Rules will be altered, if necessary, to allow of this being done. Resolved, That the proposed reply of the Town Clerk be approved.

3-Water Supply to Flushing Box—With reference to the letter read at the last meeting of the Committee from Mr. W. Smith, of No. 12A Norwood Terrace, stating that he was willing to comply with a Notice which had been served on him to fix a Flushing Box, provided the same rate be charged him for the water supply as the adjoining houses, and no increase made in respect of his stabling, for which he did not require it. Resolved, That he be charged upon the gross value of the house only.

4-Pipes at Coxhorne Farm Belonging to the Corporation Used by Mr. Randall—With reference to the resolution to Minute No. 1 of the proceedings of this Committee at their last meeting relating to this matter, a letter from Mr. Randall was read, stating that he did not understand why he should be charged for the pipes which he was alleged to have taken, as he had taken none from Dowdeswell, but had some theft that were on the Farm nine years ago, and he had not sold any; and that if there were any belonging to the Waterworks Department he requested that they should be fetched away. A letter from the Town Clerk, in reply, was read, explaining that there were two pipes in question, one of which it appeared had been put under a gate roadway to carry water along the ditch, and the other had recently been given by him to the roadmen in the employ of the Highway Surveyor to form a similar channel in the roadway to a gate leading on to his farm, and that unless the pipes are taken to the Dowdeswell Works of the Corporation. or the value of them paid, within a week from that date, he (the Town Clerk) would be under the necessity of commencing proceedings against him. Resolved, week reply of the Town Clerk be approved.

5-Water Rate on Nos. 21 and 22, Hungerford Street and Nos. 33 and 34, Lower Park Street--A letter from Mr. John Blake, owner of these premises, was read, asking to be allowed to compound for the Water Rates upon them. Resolved, That the application be acceded to.

6-Arrears of Water Rates—The Collector laid before the Committee a list of Water Rates which were in arrears. Resolved, to give to the Collector a general authority to take proceedings for recovery of arrears of Water Rates, as he has been accustomed to do for recovery of arrears of the General District Rate.

7-Appeals—The cases entered in the Appeal Book were considered and the rates settled and adjusted.

The Borough Surveyor explained that owing to the increase in the number of houses on the line of the main to the church the draught upon it was so great that full pressure could not be maintained. Resolved, That a separate 4-inch main be laid from Hewlett's Road down to the church for supply to the organ and fire hydrants only at an estimated cost of about £100.

provisional Order for Loan of £30,000 The Town Clerk read the draft of the Provisional Order for the Loan which he had received from the Local Government Board but which he could not recommend the Committee to approve in its present form as under it every expenditure of capital, however small, could only be made with the sanction of the Local Government Board, and it did not even empower the Council to raise the capital necessary for the wants of the Corporation in the near future, or the £8,000 for which plans and estimates were laid before the Inspector at the Inquiry. The Town Clerk read the amendments he proposed to insert in the draft, and a letter he proposed to write to the Local Government Board explaining the reasons for making them. Resolved, that the amendments and letter of the Town Clerk be approved.

3-Gas Inspector's Report—The Gas Inspector reported that the hourly average consumption of Gas per lamp during the previous month had been 4.1633 cubic feet.

4—Lamp Book—This Book was produced and examined. Lamps extinguished, 6 metered, 15 unmetered; and 5 burning dimly.

5- Incandescent Street Lighting—A letter was read from the Clerks to the Gas Co. with reference to the resolution of the Council enquiring upon what terms the Company would supply and maintain incandescent burners to say 20 of the ordinary gas lamps, with which they forwarded a resolution of their Directors informing the Council that before quoting terms the Company are desirous of making experiments with a new form of incandescent burner for street lighting to be brought out shortly, and hope at an early date to communicate the result to the Council.

6 -Electrical Engineer's Report—The Electrical Engineer reported that an arrangement was required for a further supply of New Bowson Slack Coal to the Electric Works for twelve months. Resolved, That Tenders be advertised for, specification and particulars to be obtainable on application to the Electrical Engineer.

7-Electric Lighting Loan of £20,667 —A letter was read from the Local Government Board with which they forwarded their formal sanction to borrow the sum of £20,667 for purposes of Electric Lighting, and requesting that the Board might be furnished with a map of the Borough showing in different colours mains originally laid and the subsequent extensions. Resolved, That the Electrical Engineer be instructed to furnish the plan required.

8-Electric Supply to Ladies' College-A letter was read from the Secretary to the Ladies' College with reference to Minute No. 6 of the proceedings of this Committee of the 24th of February last. alleging that the Electrical Engineer was incorrect in his belief that the number of lamps in use at the Ladies' College on the 2Ist ulto.

was largely in excess of those in the hall, as the lighting was limited to the new hall and three or four lamps in his office, and all the lamps in the hall were not in use.

9-Electric Supply to St. Hilda's - A letter was from the Secretary of St. Hilda's, repeating that Miss Lumby, the lady principal of St Hilda's. was quite sure that lamps had not been carelessly left on and lavishly used as suggested.

10-Damage to Electric Light Standard-With reference to Minute No. 10 of the proceedings of this Committee of the 22nd of December last, and the resolution thereto, the Town Clerk reported that he had written to Mr. Jackson, of Cubberley, the owner of the cart that did the damage, claiming the cost of repair, amounting to £7 1s. 3d., that Mr. Jackson had been to see him, and alleged that the accident occurred owing to the unskilful guidance of the wagon by one of the Corporation workmen who was assisting to back it into a yard, and requesting that some abatement of the amount demanded might he made. Resolved, That the claim be reduced to £5 if paid at once.

11-Lighting of Brighton Road, Late Leckhampton-A letter from Mr. G. B. Dale and seven other owners and occupiers of property in this road was read, applying for the provision of a lamp in it. Resolved, To adjourn consideration of the matter for the Committee to view, and to call the attention of the General Purposes and Watch Committee to the fact that there are two Brighton Roads within the Borough.

12— Lighting of Bloomsbury Place-A letter was read from Mr. James Roylance complaining that by the removal of the lamp from the High Street corner of Bloomsbury Place his side door and the whole of the footpaths on either side had been turned into a urinal after dark, and made use of as a closet. Resolved, To adjourn consideration of the matter for the Committee to view.

13-Lighting near Hatherley Schools---A Memorial from the Rev. G. P. Griffiths and others was read, suggesting the need of a gas lamp to light the road near the Hatherley Schools. Resolved, To adjourn consideration of the matter for the Committee to view.

- 3—Chairman —In the absence of the Chairman, Councillor Margrett was appointed chairman at this meeting.
- 4- Diseases of Animals Acts—Superintendent Hopkins reported that since the last meeting nine unmuzzled dogs had been seized by the Police; six were claimed and three destroyed. That 27 persons had been proceeded against for offences under the Muzzling Order. That 1s had been paid by the owner of a dog claimed for its keep; and that with reference to the out-break of Scab amongst 16 sheep belonging to Mr. Cornelius Smith at Arolf, Leckhampton Road, the animals had all completely recovered, the premises had been thoroughly disinfected, and were free from infection.
- 5--Muzzling Order— A letter was read from the Town Clerk to the Board of Agriculture suggesting that the Muzzling Order should be withdrawn from Cheltenham and neighbourhood, and pointing out the inconsistency of its only being applicable to certain areas, to which a letter from the Board in reply was read, to the effect that they would not feel justified, in view of the length of the period of incubation of this disease, in withdrawing the regulations at the present time.
- 6—Fire Brigade—The Superintendent reported that the Brigade was called to extinguish a fire on the 27th ulto. at No. 2 Montpellier Avenue, resulting in damage estimated at £5; that the property was insured in the Liverpool, London and Globe Office, to whom the account for the extinction expenses had been forwarded.
- 7—Sub-Committee's Minutes---Resolved, That the Minutes of the proceedings of the Fire Brigade Sub-Committee, at their meeting of date the 4th inst., be approved and confirmed.
- 8— Power of Board of Agriculture to issue Regulations Affecting Dogs—A letter from Sir E. Lee and others was read calling attention to the introduction into Parliament of a Bill to extend the power which the Board of Agriculture already has of issuing regulations affecting dogs over the heads of Local Authorities, who have to bear the trouble and cost of carrying them out, and urging the necessity of the Bill being watched to prevent its being rushed through without discussion. Resolved, That Mr. Poulston be ordered to remove his sign; that Mr. Fennell be informed that his role must be removed if it projects more than 18 inches from the facia of the building; and that the application of Mr. Davis be acceded to.

6--Report of the Borough Surveyor re Highways--The Borough Surveyor reported that the work done by the Highways Department from the 26th of March, to the 22nd of April. both inclusive, had been as follows.

Repaired with Clee Hill Stone-Tewkesbury Road 9,000 super yards, North Place 856 super yards.

Patching-Swindon Street, St. George's Place, Oriel Road, Lansdown Parade, Lansdown Place, Old Bath Road, Gloucester Road.

Repaired with Wickwar Stone Grafton Road 3,611 super yards; Naunton Crescent proceeding.

Paving, Crossing, Kerb and Channelling--Bath Road, Gloucester Road, Market Street. Winchcomb Street, High Street, Naunton Crescent, Prestbury Road, Tewkesbury Road, Gloucester Place, St. Paul's Street, Suffolk Parade, Montpellier Street, Barnett's Row, Queen's Parade, Rotunda Terrace, Townsend Street, Sandford Road, Warwick Place.

Crossings had been relaid in the Promenade from the Fountain to 25, Promenade Villas and at the end of Sandford Street with McDougall's bricks.

Private Improvements Henrietta Street (proceeding), Bath Terrace (proceeding), Rodney Road (finished), Bath Parade (proceeding).

One gully in Tewkesbury Road had been rebuilt and one new gully in Henrietta Street. The Contract for Provender will expire on the 1st June.

Ashes Collected Van loads 817; Cart Loads 106. Consumed at Destructor 974 tons, 11 cwt.

Complaint had been made by Mr. Villar on behalf of Mr. Smith, of Moor's Farm, that the Corporation had encroached on his land near the Electric Lighting Station. Some few years ago the late Mr. Smith removed the hedge which formed the boundary between his garden and the field belonging to the Corporation. At one end the boundary line was very irregular and Mr. Smith is now taking advantage of this to claim more than in the Surveyor's opinion he is entitled to. At the same time the amount in dispute was so small it would be well if it could be settled without recourse to legal proceedings, and he suggested that the Council arrange to purchase the strip of land so that the boundary in future may be from the wall of the Corporation, which would avoid any disputes in future. Resolved, That the Town Clerk be instructed to write to Mr. Villar to inform him that in order to avoid litigation the Council would be willing to purchase from Mr. Smith the strip of rand referred to if he would accept a reasonable price for it and to enquire what he would be willing to sell it for.

Fodder-Resolved. That tenders for the supply of fodder for 6 months from the 1st June be advertised for, the hay and oats to be English.

7 -Billposting Station in London Road -A Memorial from Mr. William Phillips and 26 other residents in the vicinity again corn-Plaining of the nuisance caused by the Billposting Station in the London Road, near the Beaufort Arms, and requesting the Council to intervene and protect them from a continuance of the nuisance was read. Resolved, To inform the Memorialists that the Council very much regret that as yet they have been unable to obtain power to compel its removal, but hope that they will eventually be successful in obtaining it when the matter shall at once receive attention.

8-Postal Pillar Box in Lansdown Road—A Letter was read from the Postmaster asking permission to have a postal pillar box placed in Lansdown Road at the edge of the pathway near a lamp on the town side of a house called Pallas, on the right hand side going up the road and about midway. Resolved, That the permission be granted.

9-Private improvement Works to Footpath in Road from Regent Street to Rodney Road—A Letter was read from Mr. J. T. Ireland, of Rodney House, asking for an allowance to be made him from the cost of the edging, flagging and channelling of this footpath, apportioned in respect of the frontage of his house thereto, amounting to £14 12s. 4d., as the footpath and curbing had been laid by previous owners to the satisfaction of the Highway Authority when the street was declared a Highway, and the footpath was in good condition and did not need repair, as the Borough Surveyor admitted. Resolved, That an allowance of £7 10s. be made in respect of the work previously done.

10-Cyclists' Caution Boards for Hills-A letter from the Secretary of the Cyclists' Touring Club was read, stating that Caution Boards for dangerous hills would be supplied by the Club gratis and carriage paid to any Corporation willing to erect them on receipt of a requisition on one of the forms of which he enclosed a supply. Resolved, That the Secretary be thanked for the offer, but be informed that there are no dangerous hills within the Borough.

11-Application of Telephone Co. to lay Underground Wires-The Town Clerk read a letter he had written to the Solicitor to the Telephone Co., that having regard to the discussion on the general subject of the relations of the Company with Municipalities which took place in the House of Commons on the 1st instant, and to the decision of the Government to appoint a select Committee to enquire into the matter, he did not think it likely that the Council would enter into any agreement at present. Resolved, That the letter of the Town Clerk be approved.

12-Accident to Pedestrian falling on Crossing- A further letter from Mr. Henderson was read, asking the Committee to reconsider their previous resolution that the Council cannot admit any liability to compensate him for his accident. Resolved, That there is no sufficient reason for its rescindment or variation.

13--Electric Trolley System for Trams-A Letter was read from Mr. R. Bickerdike, of Montreal, applying for a franchise to

construct and operate a line or system of lines for electric cars, forming a complete service for the town on the principle at the American Trolley system, and undertaking if the Council are favourable to immediately put the system in operation the town on terms which he was sure would be acceptable. Resolved, To inform Mr. Bickerdike that if he likes to make a proposition the. Council will consider it.

14-Extension of Shop Front of Mr. C. J. Davies in Suffolk Road-A Letter from Mr. Davies was read, stating that he had had no reply to the application he had made at the beginning of last year for permission to extend the frontage of his shop as compensation for encroachment on his property of the electric lighting substation other than a notification that the committee would locality premises. Resolved, To inform Mr. Davies that Committee regret that they had not the yet inspected the locality and premises with a view to dealing with his application, but they will pay a visit of inspection when their view meeting takes place next month.

15-Crossing and Gulley near Lansdown Station-A Letter from Mr. W. Hodgson, Southern Divisional Engineer of the Midland Railway Co., Derby, was read, asking if any decision had been come to with regard to the proposed improvement at that place. Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to bring up a Specification of the Works required to be done by the abutting owners to pave, edge and channel the footpath from the bridge over the Great Western Railway to the entrance to the Midland Railway Station.

16- Shelburne Road—The Chairman reported that he and Councillor Bence with the Town Clerk and the Borough Surveyor had met a deputation from the Committee of Dean Close School, consisting of the Rev. G. P. Griffiths, Mr. D. T. Woodward, and Mr. R. Ley Wood. It appeared that the deputation had no definite instructions from their Committee on the subject and would communicate with the Council again after the next meeting of their Committee.

17-Paving in York Passage--Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to have this passage laid with McDougall's bricks.

18-Repairs to Upper Park Street--A Letter from Councillor Bence was read asking why the work ordered to be done to the footpaths in Upper Park Street had not been advertised for tender in accordance with the resolution of the Council that all work and materials required estimated to exceed £20 should be advertised for tender. The Town Clerk read a letter he had written in reply that the Borough Surveyor intended to have the work done by the Corporation men, and he apprehended that the resolution referred to was not intended to apply to cases where the work was intended to be done by the Corporation workmen. Resolved, That this particular work be submitted to tender.

19-- Fairfield Road Private Improvement Works-Resolved, To further adjourn consideration of Councillor Dix's application for abatement of the demand made upon him in respect of the cost of these works pending another visit of inspection by the Committee.

20-Private Improvement Works Expenses--Resolved, To instruct the Town Clerk to take steps to obtain immediate payment of all amounts due from abutting owners in respect of Private Improvement Works, and especially those due from Mr. Smith Resolved, further, that the Borough Accountant be instructed to and Mr. Baylis in respect of the Works in Folly Lane. prepare an account showing the receipts and expenditure of the Council during the last four years in respect of Private Improvement Works to be laid before the Committee at their next meeting.

21-Ormond Terrace and Promenade Villas, Queen's Retreat, and York Terrace Apportionments—The Borough Surveyor reported that the costs of carrying out the Private Improvement Works ordered to be done to the roadways and footpaths in these streets and retaining wall at back of York Terrace amounted respectively to £35 9s. 2d., £129 0s. 4d., and £451 7s. 2d., which sums he had in each case apportioned between the abutting owners according to the frontage of their respective premises. Resolved, That the apportionments be approved and that notices thereof and of demand be served upon the owners.

22-Watering of Thirlestaine Road-- Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to have this road more frequently watered than hitherto.

23-Henrietta Street Improvements----Resolved, That application be made to the Local Government Board for sanction to borrow the sum of £282 128. 4d., the estimated cost of the proposed improvement of this street.

24-Footpaths East side of Rodney Road and in Lane from St. James's Square to New Street — Specifications from the Surveyor, of date the 16th and 20th days of April, 1898, with Plans of the Works required to be done to the said footpaths in the above streets were read. Resolved, That Notices be given under Section 44 of The Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1852, to the owners of the premises fronting, adjoining, or abutting upon the parts of the said streets, requiring to be drained, levelled, repaired, flagged and channelled; requiring them to do the specified works within 28 days, and that, if such Notice is not complied with, the Surveyor do proceed to execute the works mentioned or referred to therein; and that the expenses thereof be recovered in the manner provided by the Act, and the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889.

25-Lane front St. James's Square to Nov Street--A Specification from the Surveyor, of date the 20th April, 1898, with Plan of the works required to be done to the above street was read and approved. Resolved, That the necessary plan, sections, and estimates he prepared and notices be given under Section 150 of the Public Health Act, 1875, to the owners of the premises fronting, adjoining, or abutting upon the parts of the said street requiring to be sewered, levelled, paced, metalled, flagged, channelled or made good, requiring them to do the specified works within 28 days, and that if such notice is not complied with the surveyor do proceed to execute the works mentioned or referred to therein; and that the expenses thereof be recovered in the manner provided by the Act and the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889.

26-Maining of Roads—A Letter was read from the County Surveyor informing the Council that in future all applications for mauling of roads will be considered in October instead of February as heretofore, and that applications (made out on the proper form and accompanied with a portion of the one inch ordnance map showing the road) should reach his office not later than 1st July. Resolved, To instruct the Borough Surveyor to bring up a report at the next meeting as to what roads he suggests application should be made to the County Council to declare Main Roads.

27-Building Plans—The Borough Surveyor laid before the Committee Notices and Plans which he had received from the following persons intending to erect new buildings, as follows, viz.:—

PUBLIC HEALTH COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Tuesday, the 12th day of April, 1898—Present: Alderman Norman; Councillors Bence, M. Davis, Gurney and Margrett (Councillor Bence in the chair).

- 1- Zymotic Disease— The Medical Officer of Health reported that there had been notified since the last meeting of the Committee, cases of Scarlet Fever; that 10 cases of Scarlet Fever had been sent into the Delancey Hospital, and that the number of cases then in the Delancey Hospital sent in by the Corporation was 23.
- 2-- Wells at Nos. 1 to 4, Waterloo Place, Nos. 7, 12, 16 to 21, 26 and 38, Waterloo Street, and 261 & 381, High Street The Medical Officer of Health reported that the water in these wells was used, or likely to be used, by man for drinking or domestic purposes, and was so polluted as to be injurious to health. Resolved, That proceedings under Sec. 70 of the Public Health Act be taken to obtain Orders for these wells to be closed.
- 3-Common Lodging-House—Cumberland Villa, Grove Street—An application was received from Auguste Alphonse Meulbronck to be registered as the keeper of the Common Lodging-house, Cumberland Villa, Grove Street. Resolved, That the applicant be registered.
- 4- -WC's without Flushing Apparatus-The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses having w.c's without flushing apparatus. Resolved, That Notices under Section 28 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, be given to the owners requiring them to provide the necessary flushing apparatus, and to the occupiers to lay on a proper supply of water thereto, and that in default of compliance with such notices proceedings be taken for the penalties.
- 5—Houses without proper Ash Receptacles—The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses which had no proper ashpits or ash receptacles. Resolved. That the necessary Notices be given to the respective

Owners under Sec. 36 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and Sec. 27 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 188g, requiring them in each case to provide a moveable ash receptacle of such size, pattern, and construction as may be approved by the Borough Surveyor on behalf of the Corporation.

6-Overcrowding at No. 6, Exmouth Terrace —The Medical Officer of Health reported that the Notice served upon the occupier of No. 6, Exmouth Terrace, to abate the nuisance caused by overcrowding had not been complied with, and that the time given in the notice had expired. Resolved, That the Town Clerk be instructed to take proceedings to compel compliance.

7-Dairies, Cowsheds and Milkshops Order—An Application was received from Charles W. Baylis, Montpellier Dairy, 8, Rotunda Terrace, to be registered as a dairyman. Resolved, That the applicant be registered.

8-Closing of Parish Church Infants' School--The Medical Officer of Health reported that on March 24th last, in consequence of the prevalence of measles, he had advised the closing of the Parish Church Infants' School, and that this had been on and the matter duly reported to the Local Government Board.

9-Alleged Pollution of Wyman's Brook—The Borough Surveyor reported that as instructed at the last meeting of this Committee, he had had the iron culvert crossing the Wyman's Brook near Glen Cottages removed, and the Medical Officer of Health informed the Committee that at the next meeting he would present his report on the matter.

- 10—Closing of Slaughter Houses—Resolved, That the further consideration of the claims made in this matter be again adjourned.
- 11—Cleansing and limewashing at House in Grafton Passage, No. 4, Carlton Place, West, No. 7, Columbia Street, Nos. 7, 16, 17, 18, and 19, Waterloo Street, No. 1, Waterloo Place, and No. 10, Kew Place—The Medical Officer of Health having certified under Sec. 46 of the Public Health Act, that the above-named dwelling houses were in such a filthy and unwholesome condition that the health of the inmates was affected or endangered thereby. Resolved, That Notice be given to the owners under the said Section requiring the houses to be cleansed and limewashed.
- 12- Nuisance from Drains, &c., at Rodway House, Battledown, No. 1, Fairfield Villas, Leckhampton, Elm Villa Stables, and No. 26, Rutland Street —The Inspector of Nuisances having made written application under Sec. 41 of the Public Health Act, stating that the drains, &c., on or belonging to the above-named houses were in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health. Resolved, That .authority be given to the Inspector of Nuisances to open the ground, examine the drains, and, if necessary, give the notices and act as provided by the said section.
- 13—Destruction of Diseased Meat—The Medical Officer of Health reported that on the 6th instant, he had had destroyed, as unfit for human food, the carcase of a sheep that had been killed to prevent it dying a natural death. The butcher on whose premises the meat had been found had agreed to its destruction.
- 14-Sewer in Hatherley Street The Town Clerk presented the following Report with reference to the sewer in Hatherley Street :—

" PRIVATE SEWERS AT TIVOLI AND LANSDOWN.

The only provision in force within the Borough relating to such of these sewers as are under Public Highways is Section 40 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1852, which section provides that in case any private sewer, that is, any sewer saved from vesting in the then Commissioners, requires to be cleansed, reconstructed, or repaired, the Commissioners shall cause written notice requiring the Proprietors of the sewer to do the necessary works to be advertised twice consecutively in some newspaper published in the Borough, and if default is made in complying with the notice the Commissioners are to execute the works, and the expenses of doing so, if not repaid by the Proprietors of the sewer, shall be declared Private Improvement Expenses to be defrayed by a rate on the owners and occupiers of premises in the street or part of the Borough which the Commissioners deem benefitted by such works, and such owners and occupiers are, if they have not consented to any alienation of the rent charges, entitled to deduct from any rent charges they may be liable to pay for the repair or use and repair of the said sewer the following contributions until they are repaid the amount of the rate, viz:—

If the rent charges are reserved in respect of the sewers alone the whole of the rent charges.

If for such purpose and some other purpose such as the repair of private roads, one-half, and if for such purpose and several other purposes such as repair of roads and the maintenance of pleasure grounds, then 1/10th.

All Sewers in the Borough not made for profit are vested in the Corporation. The particular sewer in respect of which a question has now arisen is one said to belong to Messrs. Winterbotham, situate in Hatherley Street which is a Public Highway, and extending from Tivoli Place to a point about 34 yards from Princes Street, and being a sewer for the use or use and repair which rent charges are reserved it must be deemed to be a sewer made for profit and one therefore which does not vest in the Corporation.

This Sewer serves to drain the houses in Hatherley Street on both sides. At the back of Nos. is and rig, Hatherley Street are three houses called Fairlight Cottages, which may be liable to pay a rent charge but do not actually do so. They were without sufficient drainage and the private sewer in Hatherley Street not being within 100 feet of these houses it became necessary to extend the same for a distance of 122 feet at a cost of £12 0s. 4d.

This was an urgent matter and the Borough Surveyor executed the work by direction of the Public Health Committee.

Had Hatherley Street been a private street the owners of the premises abutting thereon could under Section 46 of the Improvement Act of 1852, been compelled to extend the sewer, and would have a right to deduct from their rent charges the expenses paid by them in doing so in the proportions mentioned in that section; not being so there was no alternative but either to make the extension or oblige the owners of the private road at the back of these houses to make a new sewer.

The private Sewer in Hatherley Street joins another private sewer belonging to Messrs. Winterbothams in Tivoli Road, that sewer in its turn enters into a public sewer at the Westal Green, which ultimately joins the Hatherley Brook Sewer.

This Sewer is one typical of most of the private sewers now existing in Cheltenham, and unless any sewer is in a sufficiently bad state to require reconstruction the parties having the right to use such sewer would have no power to withhold payment of the rent charges."

Resolved, That the Town Clerk do apply to Mr. Winterbotham for repayment of the expense of repairing and unstopping the sewer in Hatherley Street incurred some time since by the Corporation, and the cost of the extension necessary for the proper drainage of Fairlight Cottages.

15-Building Plans--The plans of such new buildings necessitating drainage as were intended to come up for consideration at the next meeting of the Street and Highway Committee were laid before this Committee. Resolved, That Nos. 1031 and 1032 be disapproved as regards drainage and matters affecting health, and that the remainder of the plans be approved.

17— Wells at Nos. 46, 47, & 54, Waterloo Street, Grafton Cottage, Grafton Passage, and Cottage in Grafton Passage—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the water in the wells at the above-mentioned premises was used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, and was so polluted as to be injurious to health. Resolved, That proceedings under Sec. 70 of the Public Health Act be taken to obtain orders for these wells to be closed.

18—Water Closets without Flushing Apparatus--The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses having water closets without Flushing Apparatus. Resolved, That Notices under Sec. 28 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, be given to the Owners requiring them to provide the necessary flushing apparatus, and to the Occupiers to lay on a proper supply of water thereto, and that in default of compliance with such Notices proceedings be taken for the penalties.

19—Houses without Proper Ash Receptacles The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses which had no proper Ashpits or Ash Receptacles. Resolved, That the necessary Notices be given to the respective owners under Sec. 36 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and Sec. 27 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, requiring them in each case to provide a moveable ash receptacle of such size, pattern, and construction as may be approved by the Borough Surveyor on behalf of the Corporation.

20—Dairies, Cowsheds and Milkshops Order—An application to be registered as a Dairyman was received from William Wiggett, of No. 14, Northwick Terrace, Suffolk Road. Resolved, That the application be granted. Cleansing and Limewashing at No. 7, Vulcan Terrace, No. 9, Walton Terrace, No. 63, Rutland Street, and Nos. 4 & 5, Worcester Street—The Medical Officer of Health having certified under Sec. 46 of the Public Health

Act, that the above-named dwelling houses were in such a filthy and unwholesome condition that the health of the inmates was affected or endangered thereby, Resolved, That Notices be given to the owners under the said Section requiring the houses to be cleansed and limewashed.

22 - Nuisance from Drains, &c. at Nos. 1 & 2, Burton Street, and No. 5, Worcester Street—The Inspector of Nuisances having made written application under Sec. 41 of the Public Health Act, stating that the drains, &c., on or belonging to the above-named houses were in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health. Resolved, That authority be given to the Inspector of Nuisances to open the ground, examine the drains, and, if necessary, give the notices and act as provided by the said section.

23-Insanitary Property at No. 64, Rutland Street, Northfield Cottage, Vine Cottage, No. 17, Northfield Terrace, Collett's Brewery, Rutland Street, and No. 5, Clarence Parade—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the premises above-mentioned were in such a state as to be injurious to the health of the inmates, owing to defective roofs, yards, drains, damp walls, &c. Resolved, That the Council being satisfied that the said premises are in such a state as to be injurious to health, Notices under Sec. 94 of the Public Health Act, 1875, be served upon the owners requiring them to put the same into a healthy condition and for that purpose to carry out the works specified in the Notices.

24—Smoke Nuisance from Mrs. Weaver's Laundry—The Medical Officer of Health reported that further complaints had been received as to smuts from the chimney of this Laundry soiling the washed linen of the neighbours when hung out to dry. Resolved, That Notice under Sec. 91 of the Public Health Act, 1875, be served upon Mrs. Weaver requiring her to abate the nuisance.

25-Barnard's Row—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the Notice served upon Mr. Steel on the 11th January last had not been complied with, the time given having expired. Resolved, That the Town Clerk do take steps to obtain a Closing Order.

26-Polluted Pond at Marle Hill The Medical Officer of Health reported that a letter had been received from the Clerk to the Rural District Council asking him to make an appointment with the Medical Officer of the District Council to together inspect this pond. That he had written to the Medical Officer of Health to the District Council asking for an appointment, and that he would report upon the matter after the meeting had taken place.

27—Complaint against Corporation Officials—A further letter from Mr. E. W. Sharland, was read, with reference to the treatment he had received from the Officials of the Corporation in serving him with Notices to carry out the sanitary requirements ordered by the Council.

28—Rivers Pollution Prevention Bill The Town Clerk laid before the Committee a Bill which was intended to be introduced into Parliament to prevent amongst other things anyone from allowing liquid sewage (of which there is no definition in the Bill) to flow into any stream or river, but as it did not contain any saving clause as in the existing Act, that it should not be deemed to be an offence against the Act if the Authority showed to the satisfaction of the Court that it is using the best practicable and available means of rendering such sewage matter harmless, he recommended that a Petition from the Council as on the previous occasion of the introduction of the Bill should be presented praying for insertion in the Bill of a similar clause. Resolved, That the recommendation of the Town Clerk be approved and adopted, and that the Committee be authorised to settle and affix the Common Seal to such Petition. Estimate of Expenditure-Resolved, To

estimate the expenditure of this Committee for the current year at the same amount as last year, viz., £1,360.

30—Building Plans---A plan numbered 1034, from the Committee of Cambray Chapel, for additions to the Chapel was laid before the Committee. Resolved, That so far as regards sanitary matters the same be approved.

At a meeting of this Committee, held on Wednesday, the 30th day of March, 1898, Present—The Mayor; Aldermen Drew and Winterbotham; Councillors Bence, Cooper, Dix, Macdonald and Mills (Alderman Winterbotham in the chair)

1-Pittville Park—Peacocks— A letter from Mrs. Parr, suggesting that in order to lessen the noise another Pea Hen should be pro-cured, and that she would not wish the birds to be shut up on her account, was read.

2-Kursaal, Mr. Robson's Account—The Report of the Chairman and the Town Clerk was considered. Resolved, That the Town Clerk be instructed to write to Mr. Robson, with a copy of the report, informing him that if he is prepared to accept £1909 12s. 0d., making, with the sum of £500 already paid on account, the sum of £2,409 12s. 0d., in discharge of his and the quantity surveyor's accounts, the Committee will recommend the payment by the Council of that sum, all to be without prejudice and on the understanding that the Plans are handed over to the Council.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Tuesday, the 5th day of April, 1898—Present: Aldermen Drew and Winterbotham; Councillors Bence, Dix and Macdonald (Alderman Winterbotham in the chair)

- 3-Montpellier Gardens—Letters were read from Miss D'Argent and Colonel Leir, asking for the use of the Montpellier Gardens for a Bicycle Gymkhana on Saturday, the 14th May next, in aid of the Nurse's Fund of the Eye Infirmary. Resolved, That the application be acceded to on the same terms as last year.
- 4-Stopping up of Road on the East side of Imperial Square—The Town Clerk reported that he had instructed counsel to make the application at the Quarter Sessions on the 6th instant for the enrolment of the certificate, and that he had received no statutory notice of objection to the proposed stopping up of the road. Resolved, That the Town Clerk be authorised to undertake that no buildings, except an entrance lodge or lodges, will be erected on the part of the highway proposed to be taken in, that the trees will be retained, and that the land taken in will be used for ornamental purposes only.
- 5-Winter Garden—Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to procure two flagstaffs and flags, at a cost not exceeding £10, for erection on the two towers of the Winter Garden.
- 6-Pittville Park—The Borough Surveyor reported that he had been in communication with representatives from the Cheltenham College with reference to the proposed use of the Pittville Park Lake for boating

practice by the College boys, but that another boat would be required, arrangements to be made for this boat to be at the disposal of the College on certain afternoons during the week. The Borough Surveyor laid before the Committee prices he had obtained for the boat required from two boat builders. Resolved, That the College be charged £5 5s. Os. per term for the use and hire of the boat when obtained, that sum to include admission to the Park for those using the boat; that the matter being urgent, a boat be procured from Mr. Foster, Boat Builder, Cambridge, at a cost of £24, the boat to be of mahogany.

7—Band —The Sub-Committee reported that the Town Band, consisting of 12 performers, offered to place themselves at the disposal of the Council every evening, and on Sunday afternoons, from the 1st of May to the 30th September, for £10 per week. Resolved, That the offer be accepted.

A letter was read from Mr. J. P. Hatton offering his services to organise or conduct a Band during the ensuing summer. Resolved, to inform Mr. Hatton that arrangements have been made with the Town Band.

8-Military Tournament at Montpellier Gardens--Quarter-Master Sergt. Bastin having attended the Committee to ask them to reconsider their decision not to allow galloping of the horses otherwise than on the broad gravel path, Resolved, That the resolution to Minute No. 3 of the proceedings of this Committee of the 21st of February last be varied as follows, viz. :—The competitors be permitted to gallop their horses on a strip of the turf of the Archery ground 12 feet wide, on condition that the same be covered with a coating of tan not less than three inches deep; that the Tennis Courts be fenced off, and no one allowed to stand upon or move over them; and that the Hussars undertake to make good all damage done to the turf.

9—Filling up of Settling Pond, East End of Pittville Lake —A letter was read from Mrs. E. L. Daubeny, suggesting that this pond should be fined up. Resolved, To inform Mrs. Daubeny that the Council regret they are unable to accede to her suggestion, as the pond was constructed for the express purpose of acting as a settling pond for the mud carried down by the stream.

10-Bowls at Winter Gardens— A letter from Mr. J. W. Gunning, Hon. Secretary of the Bowling Club, was read, asking permission to make use of one of the old lawns to play on until the new ground is in fit condition, and requesting to know if a room could be allocated for the use of the Club to keep the bowls in and to retire to in case of storm. Resolved, That the Club be allowed the use of the lawn opposite the Queen's Hotel until the new ground is ready, and that a room in the building be found for their use as before.

11—Road East Side of Winter Garden—The Town Clerk reported that the Court of Quarter Sessions had made the Order empowering the Council to stop up this road. Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to commence the proposed improvement by first constructing the new footpath on the West side of the Eastern of the two roads, and to stop up the portion of the Western of the said roads intended to be stopped up at the North and South ends thereof.

12-Extension of Borough Boundaries in direction of Prestbury and Swindon—With reference to the resolution of the Public Health Committee to Minute No. 38 of their proceedings of the 23rd of March last, Resolved, That the Committee is of opinion that the time has hardly arrived at which it would be politic to apply again for an extension of the Borough Boundaries with a view to increase of the population of the Borough; and as regards the pollution of Wyman's Brook, it appears that the Health Committee have sufficient power in another manner to deal with the cause of complaint.

13 -Volunteer Band Concert—A letter was read from Mr. C. James, on behalf of the Volunteer Band, asking permission to give two Concerts in Pittville Park on the afternoons of Yeomanry Sunday and Whit Sunday, and to be allowed to hold boxes at the gates, as the Concerts on Good Friday and Easter Sunday had been failures. Resolved, That the application be acceded to.

14-Sunday Concerts at Winter Garden Resolved, That the Town Clerk be instructed to write a letter of thanks to each of the ladies and gentlemen who had so kindly assisted at these Concerts.

15---Greenhouses at Pittville Park--The Borough Surveyor laid before the Committee Plans for two new Greenhouses, as instructed by the resolution to Minute No. 11 of the proceedings of this Committee of the 21st of December last, to be erected in Pittville Park, the cost of which he estimated at £500, or for one of them £300. Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to obtain tenders for construction of one of them, the cost to be defrayed out of revenue.

16-Estimate of Expenditure for the Current Year Resolved, That the expenditure of this Committee for the current year be estimated at £4,050.

WATER COMMITTEE.

At a meeting of this Committee, held on Wednesday, the 20th day of April, 1898—Present: The Mayor; Councillors Baker, Bate, Davis, Dix and Margrett (Councillor Margrett in the chair)—

1-Water Engineer's Report—The Water Engineer reported that on the 20th inst. the supply from Hewletts and Northfield was 101 gallons, the average for the last four years being 153 gallons per minute; and the quantity of water in store at Hewletts was 16,758.666 gallons.

On the 19th inst., the depth of water in Dowdeswell Reservoir was 28 feet 4 inches and the contents 81,318,898 gallons, which gave a total of 98,077,564 gallons, or about 106 days' supply exclusive of the daily yield of the springs, which was then about 659.520 gallons.

He reported that he had received an application from Mr. Burke, the purchaser of the copper stolen from Barrett 's Mill, to be allowed to have it. That to accommodate the increasing demand for water supply in the district of Leckhampton, an additional 6-inch main should be laid between the Norwood Arms and the Ladies College Sanatorium. That the mains near the Great Western Railway Station were too small for affording an adequate supply in case of fire, and he advised that a 5-inch main be laid from the junction of Ambrose Street and Manchester Street to the corner of St. James's Place and St. George's Place. That he had received a letter from Mr. Badham, Clerk to the Rural District Council, asking if it was correct that the Corporation are willing to lay down mains and supply Elmstone Hardwicke with water at the rate of 3d. per 1,000 gallons, the repayment of the cost of the mains to be extended over 47 years, and to be informed what lengths of piping would be required, what is the estimated cost of laying the main, including cost of pipes, what rate of interest would be charged on the outlay, what scale of repayment would be required, and who would have to be responsible for the payment. Resolved. That Mr. Burke be informed he has no right to the copper, which will be retained by the Council. That a 6-inch main be laid from the Norwood Arms to the Ladies College Sanatorium. That a 5-inch main be laid from the junction of Ambrose and Manchester Streets to the corner of St. James's and St. George's Places; and that Mr. Badham be informed that the price for the water supply to Elmstone Hardwicke would be 5d., not 3d., per 1,000 gallons, and that replies to the other questions contained in his letter must remain in abeyance pending-information as to what points it is desired the main should be laid, and that the Borough Surveyor be instructed to prepare a plan of the district and send the same to Mr. Badham and request him to mark the points upon it.

- 2 Provisional Order Amending Corporation Water Act A letter from the Local Government Board was read, forwarding copies of the Provisional Order they had issued for altering the Corporation Water Act 1881, and stating that the usual practice of the Board must be adhered to, that their sanction must be obtained to raise any Loans required under the Order.
- 3-Water Supply to Ashchurch Board Schools—A letter from Mr. Badham, Clerk to the Ashchurch School Board, was read, enquiring whether the Council Intend to adhere to the form of Agreement restricting the supply to the purposes of the Schools, and requiring the Board to pay for the rent of the meter, as if so the Board would at once make other arrangements for the supply of water. Resolved. To inform Mr. Badham the Council do intend to adhere to the form of the agreement sub-mitted to him.
- 3—Appeals—The cases entered in the Appeal Book were considered and the rates settled and adjusted.

1—Electrical Inspector's Report—The Electrical Inspector reported the result of his tests of the electric supply during the past month as follows, viz.

4-Gas Inspector's Report—The Gas Inspector reported that the hourly average consumption of Gas per lamp during the previous month had been 4.2073 cubic feet.

5-Lamp gook—This Book was produced and examined. Lamps extinguished, 10 metered, 8 unmetered; and 5 burning dimly.

6-Lighting of Town Clock—Resolved. To inform Mr. Ralph that the Town Clock now being lit by the electric light, his services for attending to the lighting of it are no longer required. a-Electrical Energy, Generating Stations and Supply—Letters from the London Chamber of Commerce and the Association of Municipal Corporations were read. stating that a joint Committee of the two Houses of Parliament been appointed to consider and report whether power:, should be given in any cases for acquiring land compulsorily for generating stations, for breaking up streets between the station and boundary of area of supply, for supply, of energy over an area including districts of numerous local authorities and as to what conditions should be imposed, and suggesting, in the letter first referred to, that the various Municipalities interested in electric lighting be asked to support the principles contained in the reference to the joint Committee. Resolved, To refer the letter to the Electrical Engineer to report upon.

7--Lighting of Entrance to the Public Library—Resolved. To adjourn consideration of this matter pending a view by the Committee.

8-Report of the Electrical Engineer—The Electrical Engineer reported that the new steam alternator No. 6 had been started, and had ran very satisfactorily for about ten days on the town mains; the buildings were nearly complete. and he hoped to get the battery of accumulators into place shortly. He recommended that a small part of the extension to the arc lighting mains included in his estimate of extensions laid before the Committee in February should be carried out, the extension being from Manchester Street Substation to the bottom of North Street, where the mains join the Winchcomb Street arc lighting circuits, the cost of which

would be about £120 laid complete. That an application bad been received for electric supply to Marston Lodge, and he recommended that he be authorised to lay this when required, but he would lay an estimate of the cost of this and the small Regent Street extension, authorised at the last meeting, before the Committee at the next meeting.

That in view of the large increase in the price of coal. due to the Welsh Coal Strike, he recommended that the advertisement for tenders for the supply of small coal to the works be delayed for the present. and that he be authorised for the present to do the best he could as regards obtaining coal at the lowest prices possible, consistent with economy.

That in consequence of two faults on high pressure cables on Saturday evening last the town supply was interrupted for periods of eight and eighteen minutes respectively, at about 7.20 p.m. and 10.50 p.m. The earlier lank was due to break-down of a rubber insulated cable forming a service in Lansdown Terrace, and the second fault occurred on one of the two main feeders and at the junction of the St. George's and Gloucester Roads. At this place the cable had been several times disturbed by openings made by the Gas Company, the Highways and the Waterworks Departments, and he thought it likely it had suffered some rough usage; the fault, however, was very much burnt up and at that time he could give no definite opinion as to the cause of the trouble. Both faults had been repaired, and. except for the temporary cessation of the light generally for the times mentioned, very few customers had been inconvenienced. Resolved, That the report be approved, and the recommendations of the Electrical Engineer adopted.

9—Cost of the Electric Light Installation In the Municipal Offices—The bill for the cost of this installation having been referred back by the Finance Committee for revision. Resolved, That the Chairman and Councillor Waghorne be requested to ascertain with the assistance of the Electrical Engineer, whether or not the charge made is unreasonable, and report thereon to the Finance Committee.

10-Electrical Engineer's Bond—The Town Clerk laid before the Committee the Bond of the Electrical Engineer, duly executed by himself, and his father and Alderman Norman as sureties.

11-Estimate of Expenditure on Street Lighting for the Current Year—Resolved. To estimate this expenditure at the sum of £3,750 for gas and £2,550 for electric lighting (Total £6,300).

Guildhall lamp be fixed opposite the Sussex Arms, and another such lamp in the open space at the junction of St. Paul's and Swindon Roads, and one of the present lamps be moved to opposite Maidenhorn Cottage. That the lamps in Swindon Road be re-arranged, with four additional ordinary

lamps. That an additional lamp be fixed near the Lansdown Inn, three additional ones in the path adjoining the Minnow Ditch, one additional lamp in the new road at Leckhampton, and another in Hatherley Lane near the Schools.

With reference to the lighting of Tewkesbury Road and Gloucester Road, as to which complaint had also been made, Resolved, That in the opinion of the Committee the lighting of Tewkesbury Road from the Trafalgar Lamp to the High Street Railway Station, and Gloucester Road from the Trafalgar Lamp to the Lansdown Castle, should be by arc lamps, and that the Electrical Engineer be directed to submit a plan of the same with alternative estimates for lighting from side standards and by hanging the lamps over the centre of the roadway.

- 2 -Fire Brigade Rules and Regulations—The Town Clerk laid before the Committee printed proofs of these rules and regulations. Resolved, That they be referred to the Sub-Committee to settle and report upon.
- 3 --Report of Superintendent of Fire Brigade—The Superintendent of the Fire Brigade reported that on the 16th inst. the Brigade had been called to extinguish a fire at Hatherley Manor, which caused damage estimated at £150; that the property was insured in the Manchester and British Law Fire Offices, to whom the account of the extinction expenses, amounting to £7 13s 6d., had been sent. On the 11th inst. the Brigade was called to extinguish a fire at No. 146, High Street, which caused damage estimated at £350; that the property was insured in the Phoenix Office, to which the account of the extinction expenses, amounting to £4 11s. 6d., had been sent. Resolved, That the residence of the Superintendent be placed in Telephonic connection with the Fire Brigade Station, and that it be referred to the Sub-Committee to decide how this could be best done.
- 4-Drivers' Licenses—An application was received from Arthur J. F. Paul, of No. 1, Hartley Place, to be licensed as a Hackney Carriage Driver. Resolved, That the application be acceded to.
- 5-Licensing of Hackney Carriages—Resolved, That the Annual Meeting for Inspection of Hackney Carriages be held at the Central Depot on the 3rd of June, at 9.30 in the morning, and that the Annual Licensing Meeting be held at the Municipal Offices on the 10th of June at noon.
- 6-Transfer of Hackney Carriage Licenses—A letter was read from Mrs. Hannah Davis, of No. 1, Corpus Street, stating that she was negotiating for the sale of her business, and requesting that the Hackney Carriage Licenses held by her might be transferred to the purchaser. A letter from Mr. F. G. Baldwin, of No. 12, Keythorpe Street, Leicester, was read, stating that he was the purchaser referred to, and requesting to be

informed if the Licenses held by Mrs. Davis might be transferred to him. Resolved, To inform Mrs. Davis and Mr. Baldwin that as this appears to be a bona-fide sale of the whole business outright the Licenses will be allowed to be transferred with the business.

Letters were read from Mr. W. T. Smith, of Montpellier Mews, and Mr. R. Suite, of Berkeley House Stables, Pittville, requesting permission, respectively, to transfer Hackney Carriage Licenses Nos. 31 and 118 to new carriages. Resolved, That the applications be acceded to.

7-Hackney Carriages--The Street Inspector reported that 11 Hackney Carriages had been placed under repair during the past month, and a new Carriage had been taken into use in place of No. 72. That the undermentioned Licensed Drivers had been twice convicted within 12 months of offences against the Bye-Laws, viz., George Page, William Smith, and Henry John Tilley.

8-Letting of Market Tolls—Resolved, That the advertising for tenders for rental of these Tolls be confined to the local papers.

9-Drinking Fountain Presented by Mr. Marshall—Resolved, to inform Mr. Marshall that the Council propose to make use of this Fountain at Montpellier.

Wyllie, Manager of the Original Brewery Company, with reference to the proposed widening of the High Street by taking into it part of the site of the Red Lion Inn, stating that he would bring the matter before the Directors at their next meeting, but as the Company had expended nearly £200 on improving the house within the last year, the Directors would expect some compensation, as 6ft. taken off the bar parlour would materially affect the value of the house, and the Trustees of the Baptist Society, to whom the house belongs, would also have to be consulted; also one from the Town Clerk in reply that the Council expected to have to pay some compensation, but as the improvement would very materially benefit the premises leased by the Company he hoped it would be light. Resolved, That the reply of the Town Clerk be approved.

29-- Footpath froth Pittville Circus Road to Entrance to All Saints' Church—Resolved, That the Tariff work along this footpath be removed, and replaced with Wickwar chippings. Upper Park Street The following Tenders for carrying out the Improvement Works in this street were received and opened, as follows:—

PUBLIC HEALTH COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Monday, the 9th day of May, 1898, Present: Alderman Norman; Councillors Bence, M. Davis, Gurney, Lenthall, Moles and Waghorne (Councillor Bence in the chair)-

- 1 --Zymotic Disease-The Medical Officer of Health reported that there had been notified since the last meeting of the Committee, 8 cases of Scarlet Fever; that 7 cases of Scarlet Fever had been sent into the Delancey Hospital, and that the number of cases then in the Delancey Hospital sent in by the Corporation was 20.
- 2-Nuisance from Drains, &c., at Atherstone, Hale's Road, 43, Winchcomb Street, 5, Worcester Street, 3, Priory Terrace, 1, Chats-worth Villas, Old Bath Road, the Plough Hotel, 334, High Street, 44, 45 and 46, Rutland Street, Rowanfield House, and 2 and 3, Winchcomb Street-The Inspector of Nuisances having made written application under Sec. 41 of the Public Health Act, stating that the drains, &c., on or belonging to the above-named houses were in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health. Resolved, That authority be given to the Inspector of Nuisances to open the ground, examine the drains, and, if necessary, give the notices and act as provided by the said section.
- 3-Overcrowding at No. 23, Brunswick Street, 13, Brunswick Terrace, and 7, Pantile Row-The Medical Officer of Health reported that the above premises were so overcrowded as to be dangerous or injurious to the health of the inmates. Resolved, That the Committee being satisfied of the existence of a nuisance on the said Premises, Notices under Sec. 94 of the Public Health Act be served on the owners and occupiers thereof requiring them to abate the same.
- 4-- -W.C's without Flushing Apparatus -The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses having w.c's without flushing apparatus. Resolved, That Notices under Section 28 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, be given to the owners requiring them to provide the necessary flushing apparatus, and to the occupiers to lay on a proper supply of water thereto, and that in default of compliance with such notices proceedings be taken for the penalties.
- 5-Houses without proper Ash Receptacles-The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses which had no proper ashpits or ash receptacles, Resolved, That the necessary Notices be given to the respective Owners under Sec. 36 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and Sec. 27 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889,

requiring them in each case to provide a moveable ash receptacle of such size, pattern, and construction as may be approved by the Borough Surveyor on behalf of the Corporation.

6-Urinals in an Insanitary Condition-The Medical Officer of Health reported that the Urinals at Plough Hotel Yard, The Cooperage, Lower High Street, and 184. High Street were, owing to want of flushing apparatus, so foul or in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health, Resolved, That Notices under Section gr of the Public Health Act, 1875, be served on the owners requiring them to abate the nuisance.

7-Destruction of Diseased Meat-The Medical Officer of Health reported that on the 21st ultimo a carcase of pork, reported by the butcher, was inspected at a private slaughterhouse and destroyed as being diseased, and on the 5th inst. a carcase of beef, killed at the Abattoir, was seized and destroyed on a Magistrate's Order for a similar reason. 8-Cleansing and Limewashing at 49, Fairview Street, 46 and 52, Stanhope Street, 4, Exmouth Court, Rose Cottage, Stanhope Street, 15, Townsend Place, 11 and 12, Greville Terrace, 47 and 49, Worcester Street, and 23, Brunswick Street-The Medical Officer of Health having certified under Sec. 46 of the Public Health Act, that the above-named dwelling houses were in such a filthy and unwholesome condition that the health of the inmates was affected or endangered thereby. Resolved, That Notice be given to the owners under the said Section requiring the houses to be cleansed and lime-washed

9-House Unfit for Human Habitation, viz.-House in Albion Gardens, Gloucester Road. The Medical Officer of Health having certified that this house was in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health and unfit for human habitation. Resolved, That proceedings under Sec. 32 of the Housing of the Working Classes Act, 1890, be taken to obtain an Order for it to be closed.

10--Insanitary Property at Nos. 47 and 43, Worcester Street, 2, Pantile Row, Outhouses at Royal Oak, and 2, Cleveland Passage. The Medical Officer of Health reported that the premises above-mentioned were in such a state as to be injurious to the health of the inmates owing to defective roofs, ceilings, yard pitching, &c. Resolved, That the Council being satisfied that the said premises are in such a state as to be injurious to health, Notices under Sec. 94 of the Public Health Act, 1875, be served upon the Owners requiring them to put the same into a healthy condition, and for that purpose to carry out the works specified in the Notices.

11-Wells at Nos. 48, 49, and .55, Waterloo Street, No. 49, Stanhope Street, 195 and 303 High Street, and 15, Townsend Place-The Medical Officer of Health reported that the water in these wells was used, or likely to be used, by man for drinking or domestic purposes, and was so polluted as to be injurious to health. Resolved, That proceedings under Sec. 75 of the Public Health Act be taken to obtain Orders for these wells to be closed.

- 12-Alleged Pollution of Wyman's Brook-With reference to Minute No. 38 of this Committee's proceedings of the 23rd March last, the Medical Officer of Health presented the following Report on the matter: Your Medical Officer of Health and Inspector of Nuisances, accompanied by Mr Bence, inspected the abovementioned pond on March 23rd, when the following notes were taken:-
- (1) The nature of the water seen discharging into the pond at its East end was that of strong sewage that had under-gone some sedimentation. It was very turbid, and had a strong sewage odour. Submitted to analysis, it was found to have the characteristic composition of sewage.
- (2) The condition of the pond at the end where the above-mentioned water is led into it was very foul. The bottom consisting of foetid black mud, and the whole pond bore signs of great pollution, and its water was

crowded with microscopic growths, particularly of one organists which coloured the whole bulk of the water green.

5

- (3) The amount of water coming into the pond, as above, was upon this day considerable, as much as would be expected from the drainage of four or five houses.
- (4) A minor discharge of sewage into the pond was also noticed at the opposite or West end of the pond from a drain that had apparently been stopped up. Here a little polluted water was oozing through the soil, and this end of the pond bore similar signs of great pollution.
- (5) Where the water found exit from the pond a stream 9 ½ inches wide and one inch deep was falling over a permanent built unmovable weir. The quantity of water passing was roughly estimated by eye at about 100 gallons per minute. The water as it fell had a greenish tint, due to the living organisms mentioned above, and made some considerable froth. The quantity of water discharging from the pond was greater than had been before observed, and greater in amount than the amount of sewage observed coming into the pond. There had been recent rain, and probably the pond receives a considerable amount of surface water from the neighbouring land.
- (6) At Wyman's Brook, opposite Glen Cottages, Folly Lane, a stream of water was observed issuing into the brook from under a large old arch. This water was of the same green colour as that which had been seen to leave the pond. and its colour was due to the same green organisms as was the colour of the pond water. The water dis-charged into the brook was about equal in amount, so far as the eye could judge, with the amount falling over the discharge weir at the pond. A bottle of strong dye was put into the water at its point of discharge at the pond, and the stream corning from under the culvert into Wyman's Brook was watched, and in due course the dye was observed in the water as it entered the brook.
- (7) The general character of the water entering Wyman's Brook was that of the pond, and yielded to analysis evidence of sewage pollution.

I further have to report that in accordance with the request expressed in a letter received from the Clerk to the Rural District Council, and the instructions of the Public Health Committee, I visited the pond and the brook, &c., in company with Dr. Johns, Medical Officer of Health of the Rural Authority, and discussed with him the several points of Sanitary interest connected with the matter, and Dr. Johns will doubtless make representations to the Rural District Council in accordance with the view he takes of the matter.

The drainage of Marle Hill House, as at present done, will be sure to bring much additional pollution to Wyman's Brook when the house comes to be occupied."

Resolved, That a copy of the Report be sent to the Rural District Council.

13-Sewer in Hatherley Street—With reference to the resolution to Minute No. 14 of this Committee's proceedings of date the 12th ult., a letter was read from Mr. James B. Winterbotham stating that it should be clearly understood that the work of extending the sewer was clone by the Corporation illegally, and neither by his desire nor for his advantage, and that on that basis and on the clear understanding that the addition to the sewer belonged solely to him and in no way to the Corporation he was willing to pay the cost of it. He also wished it to be made plain that the owner of Fairlight Cottages would in any event have no right

to open any communication with the extended sewer unless the latter shows he has a right to or is willing to arrange terms with the owner. Resolved, That the understanding mentioned in Mr. Winterbotham's letter be agreed, and that payment be accepted on the understanding named.

14-Public Health Acts Amendment Bill A letter was read from the Town Clerk of Wolverhampton, forwarding draft of a Petition in favour of the Public Health Acts Amendment Bill, and expressing the hope that the Council would authorise their Common Seal to be affixed thereto without delay. The Town Clerk read a correspondence he had had with the Town Clerk of Wolverhampton on the subject of some amendments suggested by the former. Resolved, That the Town Clerk do communicate with the Member for the Borough with a view to the Bill being amended (1) so as to make the same adoptable by sections instead of by parts, (2) by providing therein that Section 19 of the Public Health Acts Amendment Act, 1890, shall be read and construed as if the words "belonging to different owners " had been omitted therefrom.

15-Sanitary Work at 7, Hawarden Parade—A letter was read from Mr. James Smith, of No. 7, Hawarden Parade, asking that on account of his age and infirmities and poverty the requirements of the notices served on him in respect of his residence should not be insisted on. Resolved, That the further consideration of the application be adjourned pending a Report from the Inspector of Nuisances as to the work in respect of which notices have been served.

16—Sanitary Work at Nos. 15 and 16 Victoria Street and 25 and 26 Hungerford Street—A letter was read from Mr. Joseph Dutton, owner of Nos. 15 and 16, Victoria Street and 23 and 26, Hungerford Street, asking that compliance with the notices served on him to lay on the Corporation water and fix flushing apparatus to the w.c's at the houses named might be postponed for twelve months, on the ground that he had in the past most assiduously complied with the requirements of the Council in respect of fourteen other houses belonging to him, and that his only source of income was his rents, and he had great difficulty in making his income meet his expenditure. Resolved, That the Committee regret they cannot do more than extend the time given in the notices by one month, and that Mr. Dutton must make arrangements with the tradesman employed by him as to payment.

17-Sanitary Work at No. 6, Hawarden Parade—A letter from Mrs. Brushfield, owner of No. 6, Hawarden Parade, was read, asking whether the Corporation would have the water laid on and flushing apparatus fixed, in respect of which she had had notice, and allow her to repay the cost of the same by half-yearly instalments, as she had not the ready money to pay for the work being done at present. Resolved, That Mrs. Brushfield be informed that she must carry out the work and make her arrangements as to payment with the tradesman she employs.

18-Flushing Boxes and Sewer connections-A letter was read from Mr. John Parslow complaining of the action of the Water Department in allowing flushing boxes to be fixed which were not efficient, and calling attention to an alleged clashing of the Health and Surveyor's Departments at Pomfret House, Winchcomb Street, in the matter of connecting with the sewer. Resolved, That the writer be informed that the Corporation do not guarantee the efficiency of any box, but that owners

are required to provide efficient ones, and that the Committee regret the misunderstanding that has arisen in connection with Pomfret House.

19-Plans The Plans of such new buildings necessitating drainage as were intended to come before the next meeting of the Street and Highway Committee were laid before this Committee. Resolved, That the same be approved so far as this Committee is concerned.

21—Wells at Nos. 56 and 61, Waterloo Street, Nos. 252 and 259, High Street, and the Early Dawn Inn The Medical Officer of Health reported that the water in the wells at the above-mentioned premises was used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, and was so polluted as to be injurious to health. Resolved, That proceedings under Sec. 70 of the Public Health Act be taken to obtain orders for these wells to be closed.

22-Water Closets without Flushing Apparatus-The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses having water closets without Flushing Apparatus. Resolved, That Notices under Sec. 28 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, be given to the Owners requiring them to provide the necessary flushing apparatus, and to the Occupiers to lay on a proper supply of water thereto, and that in default of compliance with such Notices proceedings be taken for the penalties.

23-Houses without proper Ash Receptacles—The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses which had no proper ashpits or ash receptacles. Resolved, That the necessary Notices be given to the respective owners under Sec. 36 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and Sec. 27 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, requiring them in each case to provide a moveable ash receptacle of such size, pattern, and construction as may be approved by the Borough Surveyor on behalf of the Corporation.

24—Cleansing and Limewashing at No. 49, Waterloo Street, Nos. 21, 23, and 25, Russell Street, Nos. 212 and 219, High Street, Nos. 2, 14, 15, 17, 18, and 19, Swindon Place, No. 44, Upper Norwood Street, No. 33, Bloomsbury Street, No. 2, Edward Terrace, and No. 31, Albert Street, St. Peter's—The Medical Officer of Health having certified under Sec. 46 of the Public Health Act that the above-named dwelling houses were in such a filthy and unwholesome condition that the health of the inmates was affected or endangered thereby. Resolved, That Notice be given to the owners under the said Section requiring the houses to be cleansed and limewashed.

25-Nuisance from Drains, &c., at No. 7, Hatherley Place, Gordon Cottage, North Street, No. 67, Brighton Road, and Great Western Hotel—The Inspector of Nuisances having made written application under Sec. 41 of the Public Health Act, stating that the drains, &c., on or belonging to the above-named houses were in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health. Resolved, That authority be given to the Inspector of Nuisances to open the ground, examine the drains, and, if necessary, give the notices and act as provided by the said section.

26-Insanitary Property at No. 307, High Street, Nos. 2 and 3, Edward Terrace, Red Lion Inn, and the Royal Oak, High Street The Medical Officer of Health reported that the premises above-mentioned were in such a state as to be injurious to the health of the inmates owing to defective roofs, ceilings, floors, &c., and as regards the Red Lion and Royal Oak Inns from the insanitary condition of the urinals owing to want of water supply, &c. Resolved, That the Council being satisfied that the said premises are in such a state as to be injurious to health, Notices under Sec. 94 of the Public Health Act, 1875, be served upon the Owners requiring them to put the same into a healthy condition, and for that purpose to carry out the works specified in the Notices.

27—Pollution of Pond near Rowanfield-The Medical Officer of Health reported that a pond behind Rowanfield House, Gloucester Road, was polluted by the drainage from that house passing into it, and the overflow from the pond would flow in the direction of Alstone Ditch. Resolved, That Notice under Sec. 23 of the Public Health Act be served upon the owner, requiring him or her to make a covered drain, or drains, emptying into the Sewer.

28-Sanitary Work at No. 7, Hawarden Parade—With reference to the Resolution to Minute No. 15 of this Committee's proceedings at their last meeting, Resolved, That the Medical Officer of Health be authorised to extend the time for doing the work in his discretion.

29--Passage between Greville Terrace and Edward Street-The Medical Officer of Health reported that inspection of this passage had been made, and nothing was found requiring the action of the Sanitary Authority.

30-Notices Complied with-The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of notices to carry out Sanitary requirements which 30,tiotiches not Complied not been complied with. Resolved, That the Town Clerk be instructed to take proceedings to compel compliance with the notices

31—Hatherley Street Sewer—A letter from Mr. Winterbotham was read, stating that he would send a cheque for £12 18s. 10d., the cost of extending and unstopping this Sewer, as soon as the Council had confirmed the resolution of the Committee consenting to his condition that it should be clearly understood that the extension belonged to him, and to acknowledge that the work of extension had been done by the Council illegally, and not by his desire nor for his advantage, and requesting to be informed whether any order had been made upon the owner of No. 3, Fairlight Cottages to connect the drains of the house with the sewer, and whether, the Council had power to make such order when the only sewer within 100 feet of his property was one not belonging to them; also one from the Town Clerk in reply, that no order had been served, and the Council do not contend that they have power to compel compliance with any such order. Resolved, That the Town Clerks reply be approved.

32—Public Health Acts Amendment Bill—The Town Clerk reported that as directed he had written to General Russell, Member of Parliament for the Borough, suggesting certain provisions for insertion in the Public Health Acts Amendment Bill and had received a letter from General Russell in reply that he was informed that there was no chance of the Bill passing this Session, and that if it should come up for discussion it would be referred to a Select Committee.

33-Lavatory and Conveniences in High Street opposite St. George's Square—The Borough Surveyor laid before the Committee a plan of the above-mentioned scheme, the cost of which he estimated at about

£400. Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to bring up the Specification at the next meeting to enable the Committee to fully consider the matter.

34—Building Plans —The plans of new buildings necessitating drainage as bad been or were intended to be laid before the Street and Highway Committee for approval were laid before this Committee. Resolved, That the same, so far as regards drainage and sanitary matters, be approved.

- 1-Chairman --In the absence of the Chairman, Councillor Macdonald was appointed Chairman at this meeting.
- 2-Kursaal Mr. Robson's Account- A letter from the Local Government Board, of date the 9th May, was read, stating that they were

not prepared to entertain an application for their sanction to borrow the sum of £2,740 15s. Od. for payment of the amount at which Mr. Robson had agreed to settle his account for Architect's fees, and a further letter from the Board, of date the 19th May, inst., in reply to one from the Town Clerk, stating that the Board's sanction was not required to the payment of the fees to the Council. Resolved, That the amount agreed to be paid to Mr. Robson, viz. £2,740 15s. Od, be transferred from the Water Surplus Account to the Borough Fund Account, and that an Order on the Borough Fund be made to pay the balance of £2,240 15s. Od. due to Mr. Robson, and that the amount already paid to him, £500, be debited to the Borough Fund Account. and credited to the Winter Garden Capital Account.

3-Photographs of the Town in Midland Railway Carriages-A letter was read front the General Manager of the Midland Railway Co., stating that they were fitting the compartments of their new rolling stock with coloured photographs of places of interest reached by their line and its connections, which are produced b)

the Photochrom Company, and that if the Council care to supply 100 copies of each of the following, viz.: No, 10,728 on the Photochrom Company's list, Pittville Gardens, and No. 10,726, the Promenade, he would include them in some of the compartments along with the other views.

The Town Clerk submitted copies of these Photos, which he had obtained from the Photochrom Company, the price of which were I:- each. Resolved, That the offer of the General Manager of the Midland Railway Company be accepted, and that 100 of each of the Photos referred to be ordered from the Photochrom Company to be sent to him.

4-Lecture in Winter Gardens for Trade Unions-A letter vas read from the President and Secretary of the Cheltenham and District Trade and Labour Council, stating that the Trade Unions of Cheltenham were desirous of having a Lecture by Mr. Tom Mann on Poverty and Combination amongst the Workers as the most Effectual Means of its Removal, and asking the Council to grant the free use of the Winter Garden for its delivery, the date to be such as would not clash with any other engagement there. Resolved, That the application be acceded to.

5-Terrier Show at Winter Garden-A letter was read from Mr. J. C. Tinne, of Bashley Lodge, Lymington, asking if the Fox Terrier Club could have the Winter Garden for a Show on the 16th and 17th of November, with half days on the 15th and 18th for getting in and out. Resolved, That the application be granted upon the same terms as arranged with the Committee of the last Dog Show.

6- Montpellier Studio-A letter from Mr. Waite was read, again appealing for further compensation for his having had to remove his Photographic Studio from Montpellier Gardens, on the ground of his having been a tenant of the Council for 16 years, during which time he had built up a business which will in all probability be greatly injured by his removal, and he estimated his loss therefrom at £100. Resolved, That the terms and conditions under which Mr. Waite left having been settled, and the arrangement concluded, the Committee are now precluded from making any addition to the compensation made to Mr. Waite.

7-Barbed Wire at Montpellier Gardens—A letter was read from Mr. S. M. Cornelius complaining that barbed wire had been placed in the Montpellier Gardens in such positions that he feared damage must inevitably be caused to children and others. A letter from the Borough Surveyor to Mr. Cornelius was read, alleging that no injury was at all likely to occur except in the case of boys attempting to rush through the shrubbery. Resolved, That the Council see no sufficient reason to interfere with the arrangements made by the Borough Surveyor.

8-Fireworks in Cricket Week-A letter from Messrs. W. and J. Wilder, of Birmingham. was read enquiring whether the Council would let them the Montpellier Gardens for two Displays of Fireworks, to take place in Cricket Week on two days to be decided upon later. Resolved, That the application be acceded to, at a rental of five guineas for the two days, subscribers to be admitted free.

9-Boating at Pittville Park by Members of the letter was read from the Secretary of the Young Men's Christian Association offering for the use of the boats at Pittville by the members of their Boating Club to purchase for half the usual charges a book of tickets admitting to the Gardens free, each member to be provided with a card of membership, to be shown at the gate on entrance. Resolved, That the suggestion cannot be acceded to, but that tickets will be supplied to the Club for 6d. each to include admission and use of a boat for an hour, provided that not less than 50 tickets be purchased at a time, and that the same be only issued to and used by members of the Association.

10-Damage to Trees in the Promenade- A report from the Superintendent of Police was read, stating that two boys, named Thomas Hawker, of No. 9, Bath Terrace. and Walter Sallis, of No, 1, Exmouth Court, were observed by Constable Gabb, on the 21st inst., stripping the bark from a tree opposite the Winter Garden, the part stripped being about one foot by 9 or 10 inches. Resolved, That the boys be prosecuted.

WATER COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Wednesday, the 25th day of May, 1898—Present: Councillors Baker, Bence, M. Davis, At and Dix. (Councillor Bence in the chair)

- 1—Chairman—In the absence of the Chairman, Councillor Bence was appointed Chairman at this Meeting.
- 2 -Water Report—The Water Engineer reported that on the 24th inst. the supply from Hewletts and Northfield 199 gallons, the average for the last four years being 147 gallons per minute; and the quantity of water in store at Hewletts was 19,171,469 gallons.

The depth of water in Dowdeswell Reservoir was 29 feet 8 inches and the contents 87,836,124 gallons, which gave a total of 107,007,593 gallons.

The Water Engineer laid before the Committee correspondence he had had with Mr. Badham with reference to a letter he had written enquiring as to cost, &c, of laying on a water supply to Elmstone Hardwick, and requesting other particulars from which it ultimately appeared that he had had no instructions to apply to the Corporation to lay on the water either at Elmstone Hardwicke or Stoke Orchard, but the object of his letter was only to ascertain whether certain statements which had been made to him were correct or not.

The Water Engineer laid before the Committee correspondence he had had with Mr. James Wall, the latter having complained that after he had paid 1s for building supply at No. 6, Oriel Terrace the water had not been laid on. The Water Engineer explained that the Inspector found the water fittings were defective when he went to turn on the water, and that he had properly refused to turn it on until they were put right, and that the water had been turned on as soon as this had been done. Resolved, That the action of the Inspector be approved.

He further reported that on the 15th ultimo, he saw a boy from the shop of Mr. Haslam, Cabinet Maker, at the back of St. James' Square, fetching water from the Central Depot for use at the shop, and the same day he wrote to Mr. Haslam advising him to have water laid on, that no reply had been received to it, but on two occasions since the same boy was seen taking water from the Fire Brigade Station for use at the same premises. Resolved, That the Town Clerk be instructed to write and caution Mr. Haslam that the Council will prosecute without further notice should there be any repetition of the offence. He also reported that within the last few days the wall of No. 3 Reservoir at Hewletts had moved over two feet out of position, and he

anticipated that a collapse might occur at any moment, but in any case it must be entirely rebuilt. The Committee having paid a visit of inspection, Resolved, That no action be taken in the matter until the next meeting of the Committee and that the Borough Engineer do then report to the Committee on the cause of the movement.

3-Inspectors' Uniforms - Resolved, That a Notice inviting tenders for the summer uniforms for the Inspectors be affixed on the board outside the Municipal Offices.

4-Water Supply at the General Hospital—A letter was read from Colonel Croker-King, President of the Hospital, stating that the Board of Governors wished to draw the attention of the Council to the fact that though a meter was fixed on the 28th September last, no intimation was given to any official of the Hospital till the 4th of February last, and having regard to what the Hospital had clone for the Council in cases of epidemic and during the last three years, and to the benefit derived by the inhabitants of the Town generally, the Governors trusted that a largely increased charge for water would not be made, but that the Council would continue the arrangement made in May, 1888, to pay to the Hospital an annual subscription equal in amount to the Water Rate for the time being paid by the Hospital. The Water Engineer stated that he frequently put on meters to check consumption, in which cases it was not the practice to inform the consumers, and he produced sheets for two successive days from a recording meter which plainly showed excessive waste had occurred, it appearing from one of the sheets that a tap had been shut off at 4.45 in the morning that had been left open all night. Resolved, That Councillor Dix, with the Water Engineer, be instructed to have an interview with Colonel Croker-King, and that the matter be allowed to remain in abeyance until after it has taken place.

5-Crossing over Stream below Hewletts--A letter from Mr. Bradfield, Clerk to the Prestbury Parish Council, was read, asking per-mission to place a crossing over the stream running below the Hewletts Reservoir forming the boundary between the Parishes of Cheltenham and Prestbury. The Committee having paid a visit of inspection, Resolved, That the Committee see no objection to the proposed bridge or crossing.

6-Additional Main at Tewkesbury--A letter was read from Mr. Badham, Town Clerk of Tewkesbury, requesting the Council to lay a 3-inch main at the back of Swilgate, with the necessary hydrants, but before commencing the work to furnish him with an estimate of the cost. The Town Clerk reported that he had written to Mr. Badham to say that an estimate could not be furnished until particulars had been received of the length of main, number of Hydrants, &c. required. Resolved, That the reply of the Town Clerk be approved.

7-Loan Provisional Order for Amending Water Acts—A letter from the Local Government Board, was read, with reference to the application of the Council for sanction to borrow £8,060, pointing out that no loan could be sanctioned unfit the Order had been confirmed by Parliament. A letter from the Town Clerk in reply, was read, informing the Board that since the Enquiry the committee had been considering whether it would not be more economical to pump the unfiltered water from the Severn to the Dowdeswell Works where the filter beds could be added to at a less this is decided upon the plans and estimates will require revision and the application may have to be amended, by which time probably the Order will have been confirmed. Resolved, That the reply of the Town Clerk be approved.

8-WaterTroughs at Whithorne, Charlton Kings—A letter was read from Mrs. Holmes, asking that Water Trough near her house might be altered by removing it a short distance so as to provide access to the trough by another field. Resolved, That the Water Engineer be instructed to comply with the request.

9-Appeals --The cases entered in the Appeal Book were considered, and the rates settled and adjusted.

3-Gas Inspector's Report—The Gas Inspector reported that the hourly average consumption of Gas per lamp month had been 4.2506 cubic feet.

4—Lamp Book—This Book was produced and examined. Lamps extinguished, 8 metered, 9 unmetered: and 2 burning dimly.

5--Lighting in North Ward--Resolved, That a gas lamp be fixed half way down the lane between Victoria Street and Albert Street, St. Paul's, and one half way down the lane between Albert Street and Hungerford Street. St- Paul's.

6-Lighting of Langdon Road—Resolved, That two gas lamps be fixed in Langdon Road, and that it be left to Councillor Baker and the Borough Surveyor to determine their positions.

7-Unused Gas lamp Posts—Resolved, To inform the Gas Co. that the Council cannot allow the posts opposite their offices in North Street to remain unless the lamps are lighted, and that the Street and Highway Committee be requested to order the removal of the unused gas lamps and posts at the top of Montpellier Avenue.

8-Report of the Electrical Engineer--The Electrical Engineer reported that, in accordance with the Committee's instructions, he begged to submit the following estimates of the costs of providing Arc Lamps for Lighting the Gloucester Road from the High Street to the Lansdown Castle, and the Tewkesbury Road from the Gloucester Road to the High Street Railway Station:—

1. Gloucester Road, 27 Arcs 76 yards apart.

(a) 26 arches and one centre pillar .. £2550 0 0 (b) 26 side pillars and one centre pillar .. £2050 0 0

2. Tewkesbury Road, 12 Arcs, 72 yards apart,

3. Gloucester Road, Tewkesbury Road and Lansdown Road (from Lansdown Castle to Westal Green) 15 Arcs on arches in Lansdown Road, 37 on side pillars in Gloucester Road and Tewkesbury Road and one on a centre pillar at the Lansdown Castle. The estimate assumed that the arc lighting cables along Lansdown Road are laid at the same time as the private supply cables for this Road; if these cables were not laid as described the extra cost would be about £80 ...

He recommended Scheme 3 which involved an application for an additional loan of £875 beyond the loan last applied for and not yet granted. The additional Switch Gear for the street lighting circuits at Manchester Street Substation, which was included in the last application for a loan would be required as soon as the Bath Road and Lansdown Place arc lamps were ready for use, and he asked for authority to order the same.

Two houses at the Lansdown Castle end of the Lansdown Road had been already wired and he understood that a third would shortly be wired also; it would therefore be necessary to lay down the cables included in his estimate of 28th February last, but in the first instance only one of the three transformers estimated for would be required. Also the expenditure now would be £785 instead of £985.

In addition to the small extensions along Regent Street and to Marston Lodge, which were recently authorised by the Committee, other small extensions would be required to supply Dr Abbott in Bath Street, two houses in Carlton Street and probably the Lansdown Inn. At the next meeting he would lay before the Committee estimates of the costs of all these extensions and of other extensions which would probably be necessary very soon, but in the meantime he asked for authority to lay the short length of cable required in Bath Street.

Resolved, That the report be confirmed, and the proceedings and recommendations therein contained approved and adopted, that the Electrical Engineer be authorised to make the necessary arrangements for carrying out Scheme 3, that the private lighting main in Lansdown Road be laid at the same time as the main for street lighting, that application be made to the Local Government Board for sanction to increase the Loan for which application to borrow is now pending by the sum of £875, and that the Electrical Engineer be authorised to order the Switch Gear required for the arc lighting circuits in Manchester Street.

9-Lighting of Entrance to Library--Resolved. That current to the three proposed additional lamps at the Library for lighting the entrance be supplied free of extra charge on condition that the consumption of the lamps inside shall be reduced so as to compensate for the current consumed by the lamps first referred to.

10-Montpellier Gardens Band Stand—Resolved, That the Electrical Engineer be instructed to make arrangements for lighting the Band Stand in Montpellier Gardens and to take instructions from the Chairman of the Town Improvement Committee.

He also reported that Mr. Boote removed by License three sows to the premises of Mr. Silas Wasley, Gloucester Road, for breeding purposes, and in consequence of the outbreak 22 pigs on the premises of Mr. Wasley had also been killed by direction of the Board of Agriculture, and that the premises, as well as those of Mr. Boote, were being properly cleansed and disinfected.

5— Muzzling Order-Superintendent Hopkins reported that between the 19th of April and the 3rd inst., from which date the Muzzling Order was revoked, one dog had been seized and destroyed, and eight persons had been proceeded against for offences against the Order.

6— Fire Brigade—The Superintendent of the Fire Brigade reported that on the 25th ult. the Brigade was called to extinguish a fire at No. 16, North Place, by which damage was caused estimated at £150. BATHS AND RECREATION GROUNDS COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Monday, the 23rd day of May, 1898—Present: Alderman Drew; Councillors Baker, E. Ll. Davies, Dighton, Hayward, Lenthall, Mills and Moles (Councillor Mills in the chair)

1-Alstone Baths—The Borough Surveyor reported that the number of bathers for the season up to and including the 21st inst., exclusive use of ticket holders, had been 3,018; the fees received, including 840 special tickets for the Training College, 720 for Christ Church Schools, and 278 for the Gordon Boys' Brigade, amounted to £44 6s. 4d. That no additional Season Tickets had been issued, but the Bath had been used on two occasions by the Gordon League for the purpose of playing Water Polo, at a charge of 2s 6d on each occasion.

Workhouse Children--A letter was read from Mr. F. Ticehurst, Deputy Clerk to the Board of Guardians, asking the Council to allow the boys from the Elms to use the Alstone Swimming Bath free of charge. Resolved, That tickets of admission be supplied to the Board of Guardians for the boys referred to upon the same terms as those issued for children attending the Elementary Schools.

An application was received from Mr. Wallich, of Inholmes School, Pittville Circus Road, for the use of the Alstone Bath on three days each week, from the present time until the end of July, for the use of the boys attending his School, between 12 and 1 p.m. on each occasion. Resolved, To inform Mr. Wallich that the exclusive use of the Bath cannot be granted, but that tickets be issued for his boys upon the same terms as granted to other Schools.

- 2-Agg-Gardner Recreation Ground—A letter from Admiral Christian was read stating that he had given direction for the nuisance complained of outside this ground to be put a stop to.
- 3- Montpellier Baths—The Town Clerk laid before the Committee the Provisional Order that had been issued by the Local Government Board authorising the purchase of the Baths, but pointed out that under Art. II. the effect was to limit the borrowing power to the balance remaining unborrowed authorised by Art. V. of the Order of 10th May, 1892, as the Board had omitted an addition he had made to the draft of the Order that the purposes of it should be deemed to be purposes for which the Corporation might borrow money under Sec. 118 of the Improvement Act of 1889, and he read a letter he had written to the Board asking that this addition should be inserted in the confirming Act, so as to enable the Council, if necessary, to borrow more than the amount aforesaid with the sanction of the Board. Resolved, That the letter of the Town Clerk be approved.

The Borough Surveyor laid before the Committee plans for alteration of, and additions to, the existing Baths, showing three alternative modes of dealing with them, viz.:

Scheme A-To retain all the existing arrangements, and carry out such repairs as would render them available at an estimated cost of £2,500.

Scheme B —Showing alterations to the Swimming Bath, reconstructing the present arrangements for the Baths, with divisions for 1st, 2nd and 3rd class Baths, and additional ones on a second floor over part of the site, at an estimated cost of £3,600.

Scheme C-An entire reconstruction of the whole of the Baths at an estimated cost of £12,500. These Plans were accompanied by an explanatory Report, a copy of which accompanies these Minutes.

In Schemes A and B it was proposed to retain the existing apparatus for the Manufacture of Salts, with such repair as would render them effective for a limited output. Resolved,

That Scheme B affords a practicable, and, in point of expenditure, a reasonable solution of the question of utilizing and adapting the existing buildings, and that it be therefore adopted. That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to prepare such plans and specifications as may be necessary to support an application to the Local Government Board for sanction for a loan under the Provisional Order about to pass through Parliament. That such application be made for sanction to borrow such an amount as may be necessary for the purpose of carrying out the said Scheme, not exceeding £4,000. and that consideration of a recommendation contained in the Report with reference to the boring for Brine be adjourned until the next meeting.

A letter from Mr. Barron was read, appealing on behalf of Mrs. Thirkel, for lenient treatment, as she was over 70 years of age, and the flowers were picked by her from the grave of a friend when she was visiting the grave of her husband to retain them as mementoes, and did not intend to commit any wrong by so doing. Resolved, That the Town Clerk be instructed to withdraw the summons he had issued against Mrs. Thirkel, on payment of the costs. That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to obtain for use at the Cemetery two pairs of garden shears and another cask of weed killer. To furnish from Pittville each year the necessary bedding-out plants, at a charge to this Committee of £4, and to purchase for the Cemetery, a Pensylvanian Mowing Machine. That the Superintendent be instructed to make a return of the vault spaces which have not been used or purchased, and which can be used as grave spaces, in accordance with the recommendation of this Committee of 22nd April last.

4 - Street Projections —The Street Inspector reported that Mr. J. S. Friskney had put up at Nos. 23 and 24, Pittville Street a sign of a fish suspended from the fittings to the outside trade lamp without having first obtained permission from the Council.

A letter was read from Mr. A. G. Sanders, asking permission on behalf of Messrs. Marks and Spencer, of Cheetham, Manchester, to fix two 100 candle-power electric lamps outside the shop recently occupied by Mr. Organ, in Winchcomb Street Resolved, That Mr. Friskney's projection be allowed to remain, and that the application of Mr. Sanders be granted upon the usual conditions.

5 - Borough Surveyor's Report re Highways -- The Borough Surveyor reported that the work done by the Highways Department from the 21st May to the 24th June, both inclusive, had been as follows: -

Paving, Kerb, Crossing and Channelling-North Street, Promenade, Oriel Road, Gloucester Road, back Lansdown Place, Montpellier Walk, Swindon Road, Larput Place, Great Norwood Street, Moorend Street, Granville Street, Suffolk Road, Thirlestaine Road, Francis Street, Exmouth Street, Bath Road Bath Street, Montpellier Parade, Gordon Lamp, Sherborne Street, Andover Street, Tivoli Road, Lansdown Crescent, Cambray, St. George's Place, Malvern Road, Portland Street, Marle Hill Parade, Rodney Road, York Street, Malvern Street, Victoria Street, Warwick Place, Pittville Circus Road, Henrietta Street, Brunswick Street, Leckhampton Road.

Crossings had been relaid with McDougall's patent bricks at the end (South) of Winchcomb Street, in Rodney Road, and in High Street, at the Plough Hotel Yard, and at entrance to Fairfield Road.

The kerb and channelling adjoining Montpellier Gardens in Montpellier Spa Buildings Road had been fixed, and two gullies had been reconstructed.

Private Improvements- Bath Place (finished), Bath Parade (finished as regards the kerb, channelling and paving.) The road improvement in Imperial Square was proceeding.

Trees had been pruned in the following places —Battledown Approach, Hales Road, Cemetery Road, Albion Street, Hewlett Road, King's Road, Prestbury Road, Pittville Circus, Selkirk Street, All Saints' Road, Pittville Circus Road.

Ashes Collected-Van loads, 1396; consumed at Destructor, 1,291 tons 18 cwt. 2 qrs.

Resolved, That in future no roads be re-faced without previous sanction of the Committee. and that at each monthly meeting of the Committee the Borough Accountant do lay on the table a statement of the

expenditure incurred during the past month for highways and other roads, including wages, chargeable to the General District Rate.

6- Ashes Collection-Letters were read from the Rev. F. W. Parker, of Bicknor, Suffolk Square, and Col. Thoyts, of The Abbots, Pittville, complaining of the imperfect way in which the ashes from their houses have been collected, the latter complaining that the men came in at his front gate, and suggesting that probably the new system inaugurated by Councillor Bence was to blame for the want of promptness in removal. Resolved. That the Committee regret that the men should have annoyed Col. Thoyts by entering at his front gate and that he should have made any personal reference in his letter, and that the question of ash collection be fully considered by the Committee at their next meeting to be held on the nth proximo.

7-Tenders for Street Works in Rosehill Street and Monson Avenue--Tenders were received from Messrs. H. Packer and H. Griffin for executing the works required in these streets as follows, viz., Rosehill Street £154 7s., and Monson Avenue £80. Resolved, That these tenders being the only one: received be accepted, and that in future tenders for street works be advertised in the Cheltenham Mercury as well as the Examiner and Echo.

- 8- Private Improvement Works opposite Rodney House-A Letter from Mr. Ireland was read submitting that he should not be charged anything for these works as he could prove that the pathway opposite his house had been edged as well as paved and channelled before the new work was carried out. Resolved, That as it appears that the edging, paving and channelling opposite Rodney House had been previously done the whole cost of the new work charged to Mr. Ireland be remitted.
- 9- Henrietta Street Improvement-The Town Clerk reported that he had received notice from the Local Government Board of their intention to hold an Enquiry on the following day with reference to the application to borrow £283 to meet the expense of carrying out this improvement.
- 10Fairfield Road Private Improvement Works -A Letter from Mr. S. B. Dix was read withdrawing all opposition to Fairfield Road being declared a highway.
- 11---Trees opposite Greville House-A Letter was read from Miss Hamilton offering to pay £5 for the removal of two of these trees, or 50s for one. Resolved, That the Council regret they cannot consent to the removal of any of the trees upon any terms.
- 12—Swindon Road Private Improvement Works--A Letter from Messrs. A. Dagley, W. Wollen and C. Curtis was read asking permission to substitute blue Stafford diamond faced paving for the cement concrete paving required by the notices served upon them. Resolved, That the request be acceded to and the resolution to Minute No. 23 of the 24th December last altered accordingly.
- 13—Paving in Winchcomb Street-- A Letter from J. Huber and 30 other persons having business premises in Winchcomb Street, was

read complaining of the bad state of the footways in the street. Resolved, To inform the Memorialists that the paving will be repaired where required.

14 — Sydenham Villas Road — A Letter from Mr. R. J. Webb was read calling attention to the wretched state of repair of this road and footpaths and expressing a hope that the Corporation would take it over without

throwing any additional burden on those who have already paid the road-repair charges made by the Town Council.

15-Queen's Retreat Road-A memorial from W. Fitzroy Fowles and five other owners of property in Queen's Retreat was read, asking the Council to reduce the charges made to them for repairs in this street, and submitting that the old system of repair with local stone would have been good enough for this road owing to the small amount of traffic passing over it, and asking that it should be declared a highway. Resolved, To inform the memorialists that no reduction can be made in the charges, as the system of repair suggested is not applicable for roads which are to be declared highways; that the road be declared a highway, and the necessary notices thereof posted.

16--Tree in College Road opposite Brookland Villa- A letter was read from Messrs. Griffiths, Ryland and Co., stating that their client, Miss Goddard, would probably find it necessary to cut such portion of this tree as overhangs her premises, and that if the Committee wish she will employ the Corporation gardeners to do the work. Resolved, That the Council are obliged for Miss Goddard's courtesy, but they cannot consent to the employment of the Corporation workmen for the purpose suggested.

17 --Pipe under Footpath at South Bank and Barrett's Mill -A letter from Messrs. Young and Gilling, on behalf of the trustees of the late C. L. Harford, was read, stating that a pipe had been found under this footpath which had been placed there without con-sent of the trustees, and requesting its removal, or that the Corporation give an acknowledgment on similar terms to that given by the General Post Office and National Telephone Co. regarding poles erected by them on the path. A letter from the Town Clerk in reply was read, informing Messrs. Young and Gilling that the Corporation are not in the same category as the Post Office Authorities and Telephone Co., and that the Corporation have full power to lay pipes under highways for all public purposes. Resolved, That the reply of the Town Clerk be approved.

18—Electric Trams—A letter from Mr. R. Bickerdike, of Montreal, was read, stating that he would build, equip, and operate a system of lines of electric railways on the trolley plan, forming a complete service for the town and suburbs, free of charge, on the following conditions

- (1) That the Council will accord to his Company the exclusive right to do so. The Council to select the streets.
- (2) The speed of the cars to be regulated by the Council.
- (3) The rate of fares to be mutually arranged, but suggested aid. for continuous trip.
- (4) The Company's cars and plant to be free from taxation.

Also one from Mr. T. Nevins, stating that he was prepared to renew the application previously made by him for power to construct an electric tramway between Cheltenham and Winchcomb upon the following terms, provided he received the support of the Council, viz.:—The line to be at least from the Great Western Railway Station, along Clarence Street, North Street, Portland Street, and Prestbury Road to the Rising Sun, with any further extension in the town desired by the Council and agreed upon, and to Winchcomb through Bishops Cleeve, provided the consent of the County Council is obtained. The agreement between the Council and himself previously come to be adopted as it now stands. If the Council are prepared to accept his proposal he would make the application forthwith and commence construction of the line as soon as the necessary powers are obtained. Resolved. That subject to what may be done by the Council at its next meeting with reference to these letters the further consideration thereof be adjourned.

19--Shamrock Tavern, St. George's Place—A letter from Messrs. Ticehurst and Sons, Stewards of the Manor of Cheltenham, was read, stating that as Mary Ann Thompson, the last tenant on the Court Rolls of this Copyhold property, was dead, and that the same was purchased by the Corporation some years ago for street improvements and pulled down, they would be glad to receive the conveyance for enrolment and arrange terms for its enfranchisement. Resolved, To adjourn consideration of the matter pending investigation by the Town Clerk.

20-Hanover Street—A letter was read from Mr. J. J. Morgan, of 2, Dunalley Parade, calling attention to the bad state of the channelling and guttering opposite Nos. 21, 22, and 23, Hanover Street. Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to have it repaired.

21—Refuges at Montpellier—A letter was read from Major Cunningham suggesting that street refuges should be placed—one mid-way on the crossing from Montpellier Terrace to Montpellier Exchange, and another in the middle of the crossing from the Spa Pharmacy to the end of Queen's Parade, and that the lamp posts and foundations removed from the top of Montpellier Avenue should be used for the purpose. Resolved, That the Council cannot approve of the suggestion.

22— Grossing in Promenade—A letter was read from Mr. J. C. Cooper, Managing Director of Cavendish House Co., Limited, asking for replacement of the crossing removed some time ago which extended from Messrs. Engall and Co.'s, corner of Clarence Street, to the opposite side of the Promenade. Resolved, That the crossing be relaid.

23—Trees near Leahoo, Hewlett Road, Resolved, That the Council consider there is no reason to interfere with these trees.

24-High Street Improvement--Letters were read from Mr. G. W. Sadler, on behalf of the Trustees of Pate's Charity, stating that No. 312, High Street belonged to them, and is let on lease to Mr. Tapp for 10 years, from October, 1895, at £30 per annum. That the Trustees were not anxious sellers. and would not name a price, but would consider an offer, but as a guidance he mentioned they were in receipt of a net rental of £30, and could only re-invest in Consols, and he suggested the best way would be for the Corporation to treat for the whole of the property.

A letter from the Manager of the Original Brewery Co. was read, stating that the Company might become purchasers of the Red Lion Inn, and he would be in a better position in a day or two to say what compensation would be required for the

portion of the frontage required for the improvement. Resolved, To adjourn consideration of the matter pending inspection of the locality by the Committee.

25-Footway North Side of Nos 14, Promenade-A letter from Mrs. Drake was read protesting against having to put this pathway into repair, and requesting to be relieved from payment of the cost. Resolved, That the Council regret they are unable to accede to the application.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, the 13th day of June, 1898 Present : Councillors Bence, Davis, Lenthall and Waghorne (Councillor Bence in the chair)

- 1 -Zymotic Disease-The Medical Officer of Health reported that there had been notified since the last meeting of the Committee, 15 cases of Scarlet Fever, 1 of Enteric Fever, and 4 of Diphtheria; that 11 cases of Scarlet Fever had been sent into the Delancey Hospital, and that the number of cases then in the Delancey Hospital sent in by the Corporation was 28 of Scarlet Fever and 2 of Diphtheria.
- 2-Wells at Nos. 4, 5, 6, 8, and 9, Wellington Grove, Thurston Villa, and Hazledale, Marle Hill Parade, Nos. 1 and 2, Lawson Villas, Nos. 1 and 2, Barnsley Villas, Nos. 104, 105, 106, and 207, High Street, Knapp Cottage, New Street, and St. George's Wine Vaults-The Medical Officer of Health reported that the water in these wells was used, or likely to be used, by man for drinking or domestic purposes, and was so polluted as to be injurious to health. Resolved, That proceedings under Sec. 70 of the Public Health Act be taken to obtain Orders for these wells to be closed.
- 3-Cleansing and Limewashing at No. 1, Fountain Cottages, No. 15, Albert Street, St. Peter's, No. 2, Llewellyn Cottages, No. 23, Dunalley Parade, No. 31, 7crscy Street, No. 24, St. James's Street, No. 3, jersey Cottages, No. 5, Wellington Grove, Thurston Villa, and No. 2, Glendale Cottages-The Medical Officer of Health having certified under Sec. 46 of the Public Health Act, that the above-named dwelling houses were in such a filthy and unwholesome condition that the health of the inmates was affected or endangered thereby. Resolved, That Notice be given to the owners under the said Section requiring the houses to be cleansed and limewashed.
- 4 -Nuisance from Drains, &c., at Nos. 140, 141, 142, and .143, Tewkesbury Road, and two Cottages adjoining, House in Clarence Parade occupied by Mr. A. G. Sanders, No. 2, Moorend Cottages, Nos. 6, 7, 8, 9, and 10, Vulcan Terrace, No. 14, Brunswick street, Blenheim Cottage, and St. George's Wine Vaults-The Inspector of Nuisances having made written application under Sec. 41 of the Public Health Act, stating that the drains,

&c., on or belonging to the above-named houses were in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health. Resolved, That authority be given ground, examine the drains, and, if necessary, give the notices and act to the Inspector of Nuisances to open the as provided by the said section.

5—Overcrowding at No. 6, Mount Pleasant, and a Room at No. 24 St. James's Street, occupied by William Hayes and others—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the above premises were so overcrowded as to be dangerous or injurious to the health of the inmates. Resolved, That the Committee being satisfied of the existence of a nuisance on the said Premises, Notices under Sec. 94 of the Public Health Act be served on the owners and occupiers thereof requiring them to abate the same.

6-W.C's without Flushing Apparatus The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses having w.c's without flushing apparatus. Resolved, That Notices under Section 28 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, be given to the owners requiring them to provide the necessary flushing apparatus, and to the occupiers to lay on a proper supply of water thereto, and that in default of compliance with such notices proceedings be taken for the penalties.

7--Houses without proper Ash Receptacles—The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses which had no proper ashpits or ash receptacles. Resolved, That the necessary Notices be given to the respective Owners under Sec. 36 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and Sec. 27 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, requiring them in each case to provide a moveable ash receptacle of such size, pattern, and construction as may be approved by the Borough Surveyor on behalf of the Corporation.

8—Closing of Schools —The Medical Officer of Health reported that, acting on behalf of the Sanitary Authority according to general instruction, the following Schools were closed on his advice for three weeks on account of the prevalence of measles, viz., May 26th, Baker Street Schools; June 10th, St. Peter's Schools; and that the matter had been duly reported to the Local Government Board.

9--Destruction of Unsound Meat and Fruit— The Medical Officer of Health reported that on May 24th, 8 Sieves of Cherries, about 1 cwt., and on June 3rd, a fore quarter of beef, were reported by the owners as being unsound, and being so adjudged were destroyed at the Destructor.

11-Dirty Workrooms at No. 4, Birdlip Place, No. 4, St. Mark's Emporium, No. 27, North Place, Swiss Cottage, No. 20, Portland Street, No. 6, Promenade Villas, No. 320, High Street, and No, 8, St. Luke's Place—The Inspector of Nuisances having certified that the Workrooms at the premises above mentioned were in such a dirty condition as to render the limewashing and cleansing of the walls and ceilings necessary for the health of the inmates, Resolved, That Notice under Sec. 4 of the Factories and Workshops Act, 1891, be served on the owners or occupiers of the said premises to limewash, cleanse, or purify the same as the cases require.

12-Public-House Urinals at Royal Hotel Vaults, Albion Street, and Somerset Inn, Moorend Street---The Medical Officer of Health reported that the Urinals at these premises were in such a state from want of water supply, &c., as to be a nuisance or injurious to health. Resolved, That Notices under Section 94 of the Public Health Act be served upon the owners or occupiers of the said premises requiring them to abate the nuisances within a time to be specified therein, and to execute such works and do such things as may be necessary for that purpose.

13-Barnard's Row—With reference to the resolution to Minute No. 35 of the proceedings of this Committee at their last meeting, Mr. Steel, with his Solicitor, Mr. Heath, attended this meeting to lay before the Committee the following proposition, viz. That if the Committee would on payment of the costs of the summons by Mr. Steel withdraw the proceedings which had been instituted to obtain an Order for closing of Nos. 1 to 9, Barnard's Row, Mr. Steel, the owner, would undertake that the three older and most dilapidated of the houses should henceforth cease to be used as dwelling houses, and that the remaining six houses should, under the direction and supervision and to the satisfaction of the Medical Officer of Health and the Borough Surveyor, be at once repaired by Mr. Steel and rendered fit for human habitation. The Committee having paid a visit of inspection, Resolved, That the proposal be agreed to, and that the Town Clerk be instructed to withdraw the summons upon the undertaking in the terms mentioned above being given by Mr. Steel, or Mr. Heath on his behalf, and on payment by Mr. Steel of the costs of the summons, &c.

14—Slaughterhouse at back of No. 278, High Street —A letter was read from Messrs. Ley Wood and Rickerby, Solicitors for Mr. N. W. Olive, stating that the compensation required by the owners for the closing of this Slaughterhouse was £625.

15- Complaint against Inspector of Nuisances—A letter from Mr. Gunning was read on behalf of his niece, Mrs. Felton, of Atherstone, Hales Road, who had been served with notice to do certain alterations to the drains, &c., enquiring whether Mr. Hudson had the power to previously enter upon the premises with a man and dig up and disturb the paving and soil and throw it back in a careless manner without first consulting her, as owner of the property. A letter from Mr. Hudson was read, explaining that he acted by authority of the Council, specially granted under Section 41 of the Public Health Act, that the ground was opened in only two places and carefully filled in again and left in as good condition as before it was opened, that the Health Department had been set in motion as regards this property by Mrs. Evans, the occupier, and that his investigations satisfied him that Mrs. Evans was justified in complaining. Resolved, That the explanation of Mr. Hudson is entirely satisfactory, and that Mrs. Felton does not appear to have had any reason for complaint.

16--Barn Farm—The Town Clerk reported that Mr. Corbett had declined to pay at present the £25 10s. 10d. charged him for 3 per cent. on cost of extension to Rule Meadow Patch to 25th December, 1897, and £2 5s. 0d. for the quarter's percentage on the said extension to 25th March, 1898, as he said the Committee had not been down to inspect the Farm as promised with reference to an application made by him for certain improvements to be carried out. 21— Dirty Workshops, viz., Workrooms at Woodstock Cottage, No. 19, Montpellier Street, No. 10, Promenade, No. 4, Promenade Villas, Premises of Mr. Mathews, Rose and Crown Passage, No. 22, North Place, Nos. 94, 155, 130, and 381, High Street, Premises of Messrs. Dale and Forty, Regent Street--The Medical Officer of Health having certified that the Workrooms situated as above were in such a dirty condition as to render the limewashing and cleansing of the walls and ceilings necessary for the health of the inmates, Resolved, That Notice under Sec. 4 of the Factories and Workshops Act, 1891, be given to the owners and occupiers to limewash, cleanse and purify the same as may be required.

WATER COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Wednesday, the 22nd day of June, 1898—Present: Councillors Bence, Ll. Davies and Dix. (Councillor Bence in the chair)

- 1—Chairman In the absence of the Chairman Councillor Bence was appointed Chairman at this meeting.
- 2—Water Engineer's Report—The Water Engineer reported that on the 20th inst. the supply from Hewletts and Northfield was 130 gallons, the average for the last four years being 109 gallons per minute; and the quantity of water in store at Hewletts and Leckhampton was 12,897,962 gallons.

On the 20th inst. the depth of water in Dowdeswell Reservoir was 29 feet 6 inches and the contents 87,199,872 gallons, which gave a total of 100,097,834 gallons, or about 105 days supply exclusive of the daily yield of the springs which was then about 839,904 gallons.

With regard to the Hewlett's Reservoir and the wall of No. 3 a small portion of it had fallen in and the remainder was still moving but very slowly and he was therefore at present unable to ascertain the cause of the failure.

He further reported that Mr. A. H. Smith had made an application for a supply of water for cleaning purposes at Keynshambury House, but on the Inspector visiting the house he found the supply pipe to the bath was not in accordance with the regulations and he had therefore refused to authorize the water to be turned on until the fittings were altered, and a correspondence between him and Mr. Smith on the matter was read.

He also reported that the specification for the supply of cast iron pipes was ready and the advertisements could be issued immediately. He anticipated the quantity that would be required this year would be 150 tons. That in connection with the waste inspection he had obtained two fireman's lamps from Messrs. Merryweather quoted in their price list at 10seach but they had sent an invoice charging 30s each, and on their attention being called to the matter they said the amount stated in the price list was a misprint.

Resolved, That the action of the Water Engineer in the matter of the water supply to Keynshambury House be approved, that tenders be advertised for the supply of 150 tons of iron pipes, and that Messrs.

Merryweather be informed that the lamps will be returned unless they are prepared to accept their list price which was the inducement for the order being given.

- 3—Water Trough at Whithorne Farm—A Letter was read from Mrs. Holmes expressing her thanks to the Council for complying with her request to alter the position of the water trough in the field near her house.
- 4 Water supply to Hospital—A Letter was read from Col. Croker-King stating that he would lay the copy resolution of the Council on this matter, passed at their last meeting, before the Board of Governors at their meeting on the 14th of June, and afterwards would be glad to arrange an interview with Councillor Dix and the Water Engineer.

5—Horse and Agricultural Show—A Letter was read from Mr. J. G. Villar on behalf of the Committee of this show requesting the Council to grant a supply of water for the Show Yard and permit a service pipe to be taken from the main in the Old Bath Road, opposite the Show Yard to carry the water service to it, the Committee undertaking to do the work and replace the ground opened, &c., to the satisfaction of the Borough Surveyor; also requesting the use of two water carts for carrying water to various parts of the Show Yard on the 25th, 26th, 27th and 28th days of July, the Committee undertaking to make good any damage the carts might sustain to the satisfaction of the Borough Surveyor. Resolved, That the application be acceded to except as regards the water carts the use of which can only be granted so far as may be possible having regard to their being required for use in the town.

- 6-- Clauses in Water Bills—A Letter was read from the Town Clerk of Brighton on the subject of the proposal of the President of the Local Government Board to move the insertion in certain Water Bills before Parliament of certain clauses with reference to the obtaining of samples of water by individuals and the examination of the sources of pollution of water supply.
- 7 -Smoke Nuisance at Tewkesbury Water Works—A Letter was read from Mr. H. A. Badham, of Tewkesbury, complaining of the nuisance caused to him by the emission of black smoke from the chimney of the Water Works at Tewkesbury which blew into his house when the wind was in the direction of it. A letter in reply from the Town Clerk was read stating that the Water Engineer would take all possible means to abate or mitigate the nuisance, and a further one from Mr. Badham acknowledging its receipt and stating he would be very reluctant to have to take proceedings against the Council which he would have to do unless the nuisance is abated. Resolved, That the Water Engineer be instructed to use Welsh steam coal or anthracite

at the Tewkesbury Works if the same can be obtained until the furnaces have been reconstructed, and that the Letter of the Town Clerk be approved.

8—Flushing Boxes at 16, Granville Street—A Letter was read from Mr. W. H. Pearce, of Messrs. Pearce & Sons, Builders' Merchants, asking why he had been required to take down a flushing box which had been passed in many other buildings in the town. Resolved, To inform Mr. Pearce that the kind of box fixed at the premises above-mentioned has never been approved by the Water Department in that or any other building in the town, and it must be removed and replaced by one of an approved kind.

9—Arrears of Water Rate in respect of No. 54, St. George's Place—A Letter was read from Mrs. E. Beams for James Midwinter with reference to the two summonses which had been taken out against the latter to recover arrears of water rate due from him in respect of the premises above-mentioned, stating he had no means to pay, that he was over 80 years of age, and the property was fully mortgaged, and that he wished to have the supply discontinued as there was a well and the town supply was therefore not required. Resolved, That in this case the arrears be remitted on the ground of the extreme poverty of the consumer and the summonses be withdrawn.

10—Tewkesbury Water Rating—The Town Clerk read correspondence he had had with Messrs. Hedley, Mason & Hedley with reference to their valuation of the Waterworks, &c., of the Council at Tewkesbury, and the mains, &c., at Ashchurch and other adjacent parishes which they had assessed for Poor Rate purposes in Tewkesbury at an annual value of £767, but which they offered to reduce to £700 if that valuation would be accepted by way of compromise and without prejudice. Resolved, That in the opinion of the Committee even that amount is much too high and that it ought not to be more than £500.

11—Appeals—The cases entered in the Appeal Book were considered, and the rates settled and adjusted.

3 –Gas Inspector's Report—The Gas Inspector reported that the hourly average consumption of Gas per lamp during the previous month had been 4.2293 cubic feet.

4 Lamp Book—This Book was produced and examined Lamps extinguished, 4 metered, 2 unmetered; and 3 burning dimly.

5— Report of the Electrical Engineer—The Electrical Engineer reported that all work, both of extensions and running, had been satisfactory during the past month. The Bath Road arc lighting extension had been completed, and the lighting effect was considered very good. The building extensions at the works were practically finished; and the work of connecting up the new boilers, steam pipes, &c., was complete.

He submitted the following estimates of the cost of various extensions to mains then in hand or about to become necessary, of which the first four had been already sanctioned by the Council, viz.:—

He reported that in consequence of the recent rise in the prices of copper and lead, it would be necessary to increase the amounts of his recent estimates of the costs of the Gloucester, Lansdown and Tewkesbury Road arc lighting extension from £3,855 to £3,980, and of the Lansdown Road extension for private supply from £985 to £1,035. That street-box transformers would be required for supplying Hewlett Street, All Saints' Road and London Road extensions before-mentioned; and in the application for a further loan, it would be wise to allow £500 for these and for extensions in the existing sub-stations, which would almost certainly be required before the end of the year at the present rate of progress.

He further reported that the Committee of the Training College had decided to make an extensive installation of the electric light during the summer vacation the equivalent number of 8-candle power lamps to be provided exceeded 500, and provision—as regards the main wiring—was to be made for supplying at a later date the three masters' houses, the chemical laboratory and the workshops. The Training College load would exceed, with the probable extensions mentioned, what he formerly estimated it to be, and he would need to lay before the Committee a new estimate of the cost of the necessary extension to give the College supply: meantime he estimated that the total cost would be about £200, and he recommended that he be authorised to proceed at once with this work, as very little time remained before supply will be required.

Resolved, That the report be approved and the recommendation therein adopted; that application be made to the Local Government Board for sanction to borrow a further sum of £3,000 to cover the outlay referred to in the report, and that application be made to the Board of Trade to extend the electric lighting area to the Borough boundaries, and confer upon the Council power to borrow £25,000 for the purpose of extending the undertaking. Lighting in Croat Norwood Street—Resolved, That an arc lamp be established near the Railway Inn, at the upper end of Great Norwood Street.

7-- Lighting of Winchcomb Street—A memorial from Joseph Huber and others was read, urging the Committee to carry out immediately the lighting of the arc lamps in this street. Resolved, That the

memorialists be informed that the delay has occurred owing to the non-delivery of the necessary plant by those from whom it had been ordered, and that everything possible will be done to expedite the matter.

- 2 --Fire Brigade—The Superintendent of the Fire Brigade reported that the Brigade was called to extinguish a fire at Strawberry Villa, Leckhampton, on the 12th inst., which caused damage estimated at £50. The contents were uninsured, but the buildings were insured in the Liverpool, London and Globe Fire Office, to whom he had forwarded the account of extinction expenses, amounting to £3 17s. 6d.
- 3-Driver's License—An application was received from Arthur George Gough, of No. 42, Rosehill Street, to be licensed as a hackney carriage driver. Resolved, That the application be acceded to.
- 4—Hackney Carriage Licenses—The Street Inspector reported that on the 9th inst., No. 23 hackney carriage, belonging to F. Jeanes, of 15, Albert Street, St. Peter's. was brought before the Inspecting Committee, with a complete set of new cushions and linings, but on the afternoon of the following day these new fittings had been removed and old ones substituted. Mr. Jeanes attended the meeting, and explained that the new cushions were too large, and he had returned them to the maker and had refused to keep and pay for them. The new cushions, however, were not forthcoming for re-inspection and the carriage being subsequently inspected by the Committee with the old fittings in it, Resolved, That the same be passed.

Applications for Hackney Carriage Licenses were received from Frederick Jones, of Portland Mews, and G. H. Fowles, of Lansdown Stables, for Landau Licenses; from F. Paynter, of 9, Swindon Street. George Clifford, of 12, Queen Street, John Beamish, of 35, Exmouth Street, Josiah Jones, of No. 31, North Place, C. A. Hill, of 241, Lower High Street, Joseph Williams, of 10, New Street, H. Winters, of 4, St. Philip's Street, Bath Road, and John Morgan, of 28, Mount-pleasant, for Hackney or Pony Carriage Licenses. Resolved, That the applicants be informed that the Council are unable to grant them Licenses as they have previously decided not to increase the number now issued, and there are not at present any vacancies.

Resolved, That the Stand near the New Club be increased to accommodate 3 more carriages and a Stand for 2 be established on the south side of the road opposite Cambray Spa Photographic Studio.

TECHNICAL EDUCATION COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee, **held on Friday, the 10th day of June, 1898** Present : Councillors Al. Davis, Gurney, Hayward, and Steel (Councillor M. Davis in the chair).—

1-School of Cookery-A Letter was read from Mrs. Wethered, President of the School of Cookery, stating that the Committee of the School desired to lay before this Committee a proposition which had been made to them by the Committee of the Girls'

Training Institution that they should rent from the latter a very large room next door to the institution in question and that the two schools or institutions should be worked in connection with each other, each however retaining their own name and their own committee and keeping their finances quite separately. The advantages of this to the School would be that the School of Cookery would have a much larger room than at present and at less rent, and that other subjects such as laundry work might be taught, that the loss on cooked food would be obviated as the Girls' Training Institution would take it, and that no caretaker would be needed as at present. Bickerdike, of Montreal, the Secretary of the Electric Works Co., the British Electric Traction Co., and Mr. Nevins, offering to construct and work a Light Railway, as regards the latter upon the same terms as his offer of last year, were read. Resolved, That the Committee go to Kidderminster on Wednesday next to inspect the line constructed by the British Electric Traction Co., now in work, and, time permitting, to Coventry also.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Monday, the 25th day of July, 1898—Present: Alderman Norman; Councillors Baker, Bence, Cooper, Dix, Hayward and Mills (Alderman Norman in the chair)-

3-Electric Tramways The Chairman reported that the following members of the Committee, accompanied by the Town Clerk, the borough Surveyor and the Electrical Engineer, viz., The Chairman, Councillors Baker, Bence, Cooper, Dix, Hayward, Macdonald, Margrett, Mills and Steel, went to Kidderminster on the 13th inst. to inspect the Electric Tramway of the British Electric Traction Co., and were much pleased with it. The Committee were received by the Town Clerk of Kidderminster in the absence of the mayor, by Mr. Raworth, one of the Directors of the Company, the Local Superintendent, and other officials of the Company, and the Committee desire to thank them for the attention shewn and the information given to the Committee.

Having regard to proceedings in this matter last year and the abortive result of them through no fault of Mr. Nevins, and the way in which he met the requirements of the then Committee, this Committee consider they can do no less than give him the preference in considering the several applications before them at the present time. Mr. Nevins in his letter proposes to adopt the agreement and arrangements come to last year prior to the hearing before the Light Railway Commissioners. The Committee propose to adopt the Provisional Order and clauses for insertion therein as settled last year and that a copy thereof be sent to Mr. Nevins for his approval, subject to the following alterations in and additions to the route then agreed on and as otherwise expressed in this minute, that is to say, one route to commence in the Gloucester Road at the Lansdown Castle, thence along the Gloucester Road to the Midland Railway Station, thence along the Queen's Road, Lansdown Place to the Gordon Lamp, thence round Queen's Parade and along Bayshill Road, crossing St. George's Road, and along St. George's Place and through St. James's Square to the Great Western Railway Station, thence through Manchester Street and Clarence Street to the High Street, crossing the High Street, along North Street into Albion Street by the Gas Company's Office. along Albion Street to Portland Street, along Portland Street to Wellington Road, along Wellington Road to Pittville Circus, thence along the Prestbury Road to the Borough Boundary, and so on to the Rising Sun on the Winchcombe Road.

Another route between the Midland Railway Station and the G.W. Railway to be along the Gloucester Road to Market Street, along Market Street and New Street to the junction therewith at The Knapp of the road from St. James's Square to The Knapp, along the said last mentioned road to St. James's Square, with the option of adopting both or either of the aforesaid routes as may be arranged with Mr. Nevins.

The Committee consider that whoever constructs an Electric Tramway should take the power from the Electric Lighting Station of the Corporation, and that the pitching or paving in the Borough which the Promoter has to lay down and maintain should be either of Australian or other hard wood blocks or of the MacDougall bricks as the Corporation may determine.

2-Wells at Nos. 1a, 5 and 13, Swindon Street, Nos. 1 and 2, Hereford Cottages, Hanover Inn, Nos. 1, 2, 3, and 4, College Terrace, No. 1, Bickbury Cottages, No, 8, Cleeveland Buildings, and No. 37, Albert Street, St. Peter's—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the water in these wells was used, or likely to be used, by man for drinking or domestic purposes, and was so polluted as to be injurious to health, Resolved, That proceedings under Sec. 10 of the Public Health Act be taken to obtain Orders for these wells to be closed.

3-Dairies, Cowsheds, and Milkshops Order - An application to be registered as a Purveyor of Milk was received from Elizabeth Cooper, of Wentville, Shurdington Road. Resolved, To accede to the application subject `to slight improvements required in trapping of the drains being first carried out to the satisfaction of the Medical Officer of Health.

4-Cleansing and Limewashing at No. 40, Burton Street, No. 2, Newent Place, No. 46, Queen Street, No. 7, Townsend Place, No. 22, Cleeveland Street, No. 1, College Terrace, and No 2, Hereford Cottages—The Medical Officer of Health having certified under Sec. 46 of the Public Health Act, that the above-named dwelling houses were in such a filthy and unwholesome condition that the health of the inmates was affected or endangered thereby. Resolved, That Notice be given to the owners under the said Section requiring the houses to be cleansed and limewashed.

5-Nuisance from Drains, &c., at Oswald Villa, Swindon Road, Nos. 66 and 67, Rutland Street, and No. 8, Portland Street—The Inspector of Nuisances having made written application under Sec. 41 of the Public Health Act, stating that the drains, &c., on or belonging to the above-named houses were in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health. Resolved, That authority be given to the Inspector of Nuisances to open the ground, examine the drains, and, if necessary, give the notices and act as provided by the said section.

6—Insanitary Property at Nos. 66 and 67, Rutland Street, No. 22, Cleveland Street, and No. 10, Carlton Place—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the premises above-mentioned were in such a state as to be injurious to the health of the inmates owing to defective roofs, walls, floors, &c. Resolved, That the Council being satisfied that the said premises are in such a state as to be injurious to health, Notices under Sec. 94 of the Public Health Act, 1875, be served upon the Owners requiring them to put the same into a healthy condition, and for that purpose to carry out the works specified in the Notices.

7--Pantile Row—The Medical Officer of Health presented a Report he had made at the request of the Mayor on the condition of the houses in Pantile Row, and the same was read.

8—Overcrowding at No. 7, Pantile Row—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the above premises were so overcrowded as to be dangerous or injurious to the health of the inmates. Resolved, Thar the Committee being satisfied of the existence of a nuisance on the said premises, Notice under Sec. 94 of the Public Health Act be served on the owner and occupier thereof requiring them to abate the same.

9---Water Closets without Flushing Apparatus-The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses having water closets without Flushing Apparatus. Resolved, That Notices under Sec. 28 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, be given to the Owners requiring them to provide the necessary flushing apparatus,

and to the Occupiers to lay on a proper supply of water thereto, and that in default of compliance with such Notices proceedings be taken for the penalties.

10-Houses without proper Ash Receptacles The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses which had no proper ashpits or ash receptacles. Resolved, That the necessary Notices be given to the respective owners under Sec. 36 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and Sec. 27 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, requiring them in each case to provide a moveable ash receptacle of such size, pattern, and construction as may be approved by the Borough Surveyor on behalf of the Corporation.

11- Slaughterhouse in Prestbury Road-A letter was read from Mr. J. Page, the owner of the slaughterhouse in Prestbury Road, stating that it was now vacant, and suggesting that advantage should be taken of this to have it closed, as there would only be compensation to the owner to provide Resolved, That Mr. Page be asked to inform the Committee what amount of compensation he expects.

12-Conference of Sanitary Inspectors' Association—A letter was read from this Association asking the Council to send the Inspector of Nuisances to their Annual Meeting and Conference at Newcastle-upon-Tyne on August the 5th and 6hnext Resolved, That as the Inspector is authorised to attend the Sanitary Institute Congress at Birmingham it will be unnecessary for him to attend the meeting at Newcastle.

13-Urinals without sufficient Water Supply-The Medical Officer of Health reported that Urinals at The Union Inn, Union Street, and Hanover Jun, Hanover Street, were so foul for want of water and other requirements as to be a nuisance and injurious to health. Resolved, That Notices under Section 94 of the Public Health Act, 1875, be served upon the owners or occupiers of the premises to abate the nuisances and to execute such works and do such things as may be necessary for that purpose.

14-Notices not compelled with -The Medical Officer of Health reported that Notices under Section 41 of the Public Health Act had been served upon the owners of Nos. 1 to 7, Linden Terrace to relay a common drain, &c., but owing to disagreement among themselves the notices had not been complied with, and the nuisance existing requires to be abated without delay. Resolved, That Notice be given to each owner that unless the work be done forthwith the Council will proceed to execute the work and recover the expense incurred by them in so doing in a summary manner as provided by the said section.

The Medical Officer of Health further reported that a Notice which had been served three months ago to provide a proper water supply to Nos. 38 and 39, Victoria Street, St. Paul's, had not been complied with. Resolved, To instruct the Town Clerk to take proceedings to compel compliance with the Notice.

15-Pollution of Wyman's Brook-A letter was read from Mr. R. Ticehurst, Clerk to the Cheltenham Rural District Council, stating that this matter has been and will continue to be under the observation and serious consideration of the Rural District Council, who had not up to that time been able to find that the Brook was in any way contaminated by the overflow of the pond in the field at Marle Hill lately belonging to Mr. Margrett. Resolved, That this Committee again urge the Town Improvement Committee to apply for such an extension of the Borough Boundary on the South side of the town as shall at least include the houses on Marle Hill and contiguous to Pittville and as far as the Oaklands on the Prestbury Road as the only satisfactory means of applying to these Urban Districts the sanitary control of the Borough.

16-Closing of Schools— With reference to a notification made to them by the Medical Officer of Health that he had recently ordered St. Peter's schools to be closed on account of the prevalence of Measles amongst the pupils, acting on behalf of the Sanitary Authority in pursuance of their general instructions, a letter from

the Local Government Board in reply was read stating that it did not appear to the Board that a Medical Officer of Health was entitled to act in the matter of school

closure in the place of the Sanitary Authority, as Art. 88 of the Code of the Education Department contemplates that the action shall be taken by the Authority or by any two members thereof acting on the advice of the Medical Officer of A letter from the Town Clerk in reply was read referring the Board to the resolution of this Committee dated the 16th December, 1892, authorising the Medical Officer of Health to take action in the matter of excluding particular scholars, and that he reported to the Committee at the next meeting the action taken by him with regard to closing. The medical Officer of Health read a correspondence he had had with the Local Government Board on the subject. Resolved, That the Board be informed that in future the terms of the Memorandum of the Medical Department of the Board of date July, 1897, will be complied with.

17--Building Plans—The Borough Surveyor laid before the Committee the Plans of such new buildings necessitating drainage as were intended to come before the Street and Highway Committee for their consideration. Resolved. That the same be approved as shown so far as regards this Committee. Permission to connect with the town sewers in the case of Plan No. 1058 (Mrs. Gretton) being granted subject to the payment of the usual rate.

18-Zymotic Disease—The Medical Officer of Health reported that there had been notified since the last meeting of the Committee, 5 cases of Scarlet Fever and 1 case of Puerperal Fever; that 5 cases of Scarlet Fever had been sent into the Delancey Hospital, and that the number of cases then in the Delancey Hospital sent in by the Corporation was 22.

19-Wells at Nos. 1, 3, and 4, St. Margaret's Parade, 26 and 27, Manchester Street, Shirley House Stables, Banbury House, Oswald Villa, Swindon Road—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the water in the wells at the above-mentioned premises was used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, and was so polluted as to be injurious to health. Resolved, That proceedings under Sec. 70 of the Public Health Act be taken to obtain orders for these wells to be closed.

20-Notices not Complied with—The Medical Officer of Health submitted a list of Notices which had not been complied with. Resolved, That the Town Clerk do take the necessary steps to compel compliance in each case.

21- Sewerage Loan—A letter from the Local Government Board was read with reference to the application to borrow £13,310 for the purposes of sewerage and sewage disposal, stating that the Board would direct an Inquiry to be held on the subject. including the propriety of the work intended to be executed outside the district to which objection had been made, and adding that it would be contrary to the practice of the Board to sanction a loan for works of ordinary repair.

22-Nuisanoe from Drains, &c., at No. 53, Union Street, Fairview—The Inspector of Nuisances having made written application under Sec. 41 of the Public Health Act, stating that the drains, &c., on or belonging to the above-named were in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health. Resolved, That authority be given to the Inspector of Nuisances to open the ground, examine the drains, and, if necessary, give the notices and act as provided by the said section.

23--W.C's without Flushing Apparatus—The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses having w.c's without flushing apparatus. Resolved, That Notices under Section 28 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1859, be given to the owners requiring them to provide the necessary- flushing apparatus, and to the occupiers to lay on a proper supply of water thereto. and that in default of compliance with such notices proceedings be taken for the penalties.

24--Houses without proper Ash Receptacles —The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses which had no proper ashpits or ash receptacles. Resolved, That the necessary Notices be given to the respective Owners under Sec. 36 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and Sec. 27 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, requiring them in each case to provide a moveable ash receptacle of such size, pattern, and construction as may be approved by the Borough Surveyor on behalf of the Corporation.

25--Cleansing and Limewashing at 8, Upper Norwood Street, 85, Stanhope Street, 2, Elm Street, 1, Newent Place, 18, Marsh lane. 2, Parker's Cottages, and 47, Burton Street—The Medical Officer of Health having certified under Sec. 46 of the Public Health Act that the above-named dwelling houses were in such a filthy and unwholesome condition that the health of the inmates was affected or endangered thereby. Resolved, That Notice be given to the owners under the said Section requiring the houses to be cleansed and limewashed.

26-Bye-Laws as to Houses let in lodgings-With reference to Minute No. 17 of this Committee's proceedings of date the 10th January last, the Medical Officer of Health laid before the Committee the information he had obtained from other places on the subject of the proposed Bye-Laws for houses let in lodgings, which had been returned by the Local Government Board with suggested amendments in certain respects. The Medical Officer of Health also brought before the Committee the amendments he suggested should be made in the draft Bye-Laws. The Bye-Laws were gone through by the Committee and the draft amended and settled, Resolved, That the same as now settled be again forwarded to the Local Government Board.

27—Collection of Fish Offal, Fruit Refuse, &c. The Medical Officer of Health recommended that the Council should undertake the collection of fish offal, fruit and other refuse which is likely to become a nuisance if not frequently and regularly removed, either gratuitously or at a small charge to cover the expense of so doing. Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor report as to what arrangements can be made with the tradesmen concerned in order to carry out the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health.

28—Barn Farm--Mr. John Corbett, the tenant of this farm, attended this meeting of the Committee to complain that the pipe laid down at his request for the supply of sewage to Rule Meadow Patch was inefficient and did not supply the quantity of sewage he expected to get, and he therefore objected to pay the amount due from him under the agreement on the cost of laying down the pipe in question, but expressed his willingness to pay half of it. Resolved, That the further consideration of the matter be adjourned pending a report from the Borough Surveyor thereon.

29-Offensive Trades Bye-Laws-With reference to the Resolution to Minute No. 13 of this Committee's proceedings of date the 14th March last, a letter from the Local Government Board was read returning the sealed copy of the Bye-Laws for the regulation of Offensive Trades with a suggestion that a fresh print of them should be obtained and adopted by the Council embodying the alteration made by the Board in Clause 11 exempting a fellmonger from the obligation to empty his liming pit at least once every day, and stating that a fresh compliance with Section 184 of the Public Health Act, 1875, would be necessary before the Bye-Laws could be confirmed by the Board. A copy of a letter the Board had addressed to Mr. G. M. Davis on the subject of the Bye-Laws was also sent. Resolved, That the Byelaws with the alteration in Byelaw No. 11 mentioned by the Board be now adopted and made at the next meeting of the Council, and that the Town Clerk do take the necessary steps to obtain confirmation of the same.

30-Nuisance from Conveyance of Offal along Ham and Greenway Lanes-A letter was read from the Clerk to the Charlton Kings Urban District Council forwarding copy of a resolution of that authority instructing their Medical Officer of Health to interview the Medical Officer of Health for the Borough with a view to ascertaining if the Council will assist in preventing the nuisance arising from the conveyance of offal and other refuse along the Ham and Greenway Lanes, complaint as to which had been received by the Charlton Kings Urban District Council from Mr. J. S. Garrard, of Elmore, Ham Lane, during the hours prohibited under the power conferred by Section 73 of the Improvement Act of 1852. Resolved, To inform the Urban District Council that the Police and the Street Inspector will receive instructions to see that the regulations made under the power referred to are strictly complied with.

31-Compensation for Closing of Slaughterhouses The further consideration of these claims was adjourned until the next ordinary or a special meeting of the Committee.

32- Urinal, &c., in High Street opposite St. George's Square—The tenders sent in in response to the advertisement for the construction of the urinal and conveniences in High Street opposite St. George's Square were opened and found to be as follows:

Resolved, That the tender of Messrs. C. Malvern and Son be accepted, subject to the sanction of the Local Government Board being obtained to the necessary loan and to a proper contract being entered into, and that application be made to the Local Government Board for sanction to a loan of £450 for the work proposed.

33-New Buildings—The Plans of such new buildings necessitating drainage as had been received by the Borough Surveyor were laid before this Committee. Resolved, That the same be approved with the exception of Plan No. 1062, sent in by Mr. T. G. Smith, which is disapproved.

TOWN IMPROVEMENT COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Monday, the 18th day of July, 1898—Aldermen Drew and Winterbotham; Councillors Bence, Cooper, Dix, Lenthall, Macdonald and Mills (Alderman Winterbotham in the chair).

1-Band Concerts by Band of Royal Horse Guards (Blue)—With reference to Minute No. 18 of the proceedings of this Committee at their last meeting, a letter was read from Mr. Cecil Barth stating that the 26th proximo had been booked for these concerts on the terms stated in this Committee's resolution, and that a programme would be sent in the course of a week or so.

Resolved, That the Concert Sub-Committee be authorised to advertise these concerts.

- 2-Concert Sub-Committee--Resolved, That with reference to Minute No. 12 of this Committee's proceedings of date the 24th November last, the "arrangements" there mentioned shall be deemed to include what advertising the Sub-Committee may consider necessary of the concerts given under their direction; and that keys for the gates at the Montpellier Gardens be provided for the Concert Sub-Committee.
- 3- Band at Pittville on Sundays—A letter was read from Mrs. Dawson, of Aubervie, Pittville, hoping that the Band would on Sunday afternoons play lower down in the Gardens rather than at the Pump Room, as her house being so close to the Pump Room it was most disturbing.

Resolved, That Mrs. Dawson be informed that the Concert Sub-Committee will endeavour as far as possible to comply with her request.

- 4 Cheltenham Brass Band—A letter from Mr. C. E. Preston, the Conductor of the Cheltenham Brass Band, was read, stating that the Band in question were willing to play in Naunton Park once a week till the end of October for the sum of £5 5s. Od. Resolved, That the offer be accepted, provided that the Band will play in addition at Pittville on August Bank Holiday, the date and length of the performance to be settled by the Concert Sub-Committee.
- 5-- Football at Montpellier—Letters were read from Miss Carnegy, Hon. Secretary to the Cheltenham Archery Club, and Mr. C. Burton, of Vittoria Lawn, protesting against the use of the Montpellier Gardens for football matches, the former on account of the damage to the archery ground, and the latter, as a resident in the vicinity of the Gardens, on account of the intolerable shouting and noise occasioned. Resolved, That the writers be informed that the arrangement with the Foot-ball Club is only for the present season, and it is understood that the Club will not thereafter require the Gardens.
- 6-Admission to Pittville Park—Letters were read from Mr. Archibald Gibbs, of 13, Gloucester Place, complaining that he had had to pay 4d. for the admission of himself and a lady friend to Pittville Park, at the Essex Lodge entrance, on Wednesday evening, the 6th instant, notwithstanding, as he alleged, that he previously informed the gatekeeper that he came to hear the Band, and he considered he should have been informed by the gatekeeper that the other gate behind Saxham was free. The Borough Surveyor reported that the gatekeeper's statement was that Mr. Gibbs said nothing about coining to hear the Band until after he had issued the tickets. Resolved, That the Committee think that the gatekeeper only did his duty, but that as some misapprehension might have arisen from the terms of the advertisement as to free admission the writer of the letters be returned the amount paid by him.

- 7--Angling at Pittville—A letter was read from Mr. H. W. Stubbin, Hon. Secretary and Treasurer of the Cheltenham Popular Angling Association, suggesting the issue of half-day fishing tickets for Pittville Park in £1 packets, two to equal a full day's fishing, a ticket to be available either from the opening of the Gardens until 1.30 p.m., or from the latter time until closing, the tickets to give free admittance to the Park. He also suggested that if this were done the money for any tickets unused at the end of the season should be refunded by the Corporation. He had no doubt that he would be able to place a few pounds' worth of tickets amongst the members of his Club alone. Resolved, That the Committee think that the better way would be for Mr. Stubbin to make an offer on behalf of his Association for free fishing by all its members, and if this is done the Committee will consider it.
- 8- -Street Shelters--Councillor Macdonald laid before the Committee a plan of suggested Street Shelters prepared by him. The subject having been discussed, Resolved, That the further consideration of it be adjourned.
- 9-Seats--Resolved, That half a dozen teats be placed in Lansdown Place Road.
- 10 --Road in Imperial Square—With reference to Minute No. 10 of this Committee's proceedings of date the 18th April last, Resolved, That tenders for the removal of the iron railing on the East side of the Winter Garden to its new position and the necessary additional fencing be advertised for.
- 11-Illustrated Railway Guides—A letter was read from Mr. H. R. Travis, on behalf of Messrs. Morton & Co., Limited, asking for a continuance of the advertisement of Cheltenham which appeared in five of their Illustrated Railway Guides last year, in two of them a view being also inserted. If the advertisements were continued for three years the price would only be double the price for a single year, that is to say, £10 per page for each Guide for the three years, payable at the commencement of the series. Resolved, That the advertisement be continued for three years in the same Guides as last year on the terms mentioned in Mr. Travis' letter, the letterpress to be subject to revision from time to time as required and a view of Cheltenham to be inserted in all the Guides advertised in.
- 12-Hours of Closing of Montpellier Gardens and Pittville Park—Resolved, That after this month the Montpellier Gardens and Pittville Park be closed at the hours at which cyclists have to light their lamps, except on the occasions of Illuminated Concerts or Fetes.
- 13-Supply of Refreshments at Montpellier Gardens----Resolved, That tenders for the right to supply refreshments in the Montpellier Gardens on the occasion of Band Concerts and other entertainments arranged by the Corporation during the ensuing 12 months be advertised for.

- 14--Pittville park--August Bank Holiday-- Resolved, That an offer made by Mr. E. Maisey to provide a Minstrel Entertainment at Pittville on August Bank Holiday for £5 be accepted.
- 15—Aquatic Display at Pittville Park-With reference to the resolution to Minute No. 6 of this Committee's proceedings of date the 22nd ultimo, the Cheltenham Polo Club applied for the use of the boats on the occasion of the Aquatic Entertainment to be given by them at Pittville Park on the afternoon and evening of August 10th. Resolved, That the use of the Marle Hill Annexe to Pittville Park and the boats be granted free to the Club on the afternoon and evening mentioned, subject to the Club undertaking to make good all

damage done to the boats and other property of the Corporation and to the sub-scribers to the Gardens being admitted free.

WATER COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Wednesday, the 20th day of July, 1898—Present: Councillors Bence, Baker, and LI. Davies (Councillor Bence in the chair)

1-Chairman—In the absence of Councillor Margrett, Councillor Bence was appointed Chairman at this Meeting.

2-Borough Engineer's Report-The Borough Engineer reported as follows:

On the 18th inst. the supply from Hewletts and Northfield was 108 gallons, the average for the last four years being 80 gallons per minute; and the quantity of water in store at Hewletts and Leckhampton was 10,933,360 gallons.

On the 19th inst. the depth of water in Dowdeswell Reservoir was 26 feet 6 inches and the contents 71,403,323 gallons. which gave a total of 82,338,883 gallons, or about 82 days supply exclusive of the daily yield of the springs, which is now about 339,424 gallons.

In regard to the use of steam coal at Tewkesbury, he was experimenting with various coals which claimed to be smokeless, but was not yet in a position to report definitely as to what is best to be done.

Since the last monthly report there had been a further fall of the wall at Hewletts No. 3 Reservoir, but no general movement had yet taken place, but he was of opinion that the wall was originally too thin in proportion to its height.

An opportunity having arisen for obtaining a supply of sand, he had ordered 100 tons from Mr. Walker, of Tewkesbury, who has always supplied it in the past, and if on delivery of the first it proves to be equal to the report he had received of it he proposed to obtain an additional 50 tons, as it is frequently difficult to secure sand suitable for filtering purposes when required.

3-Agricultural and Horse Show—A letter was read from Captain Ryves, Secretary of the Cheltenham and East Gloucestershire Branch of the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, stating that he was directed by his Committee to say that Mrs. C. E. Symonds, of Pengethly, Ross, had offered, as she did on the occasion of the Show in 1894, to defray all expenses if the Corporation would, as they did in 1894, supply water for cab-horses outside the Show Ground, and suggesting that a stand-pipe should be fixed to a water main at some convenient spot and a man placed in charge; the drivers of carriages as required. Resolved, That the request be complied with.

4-Cattle Troughs Resolved, That the Borough Engineer be instructed to do what is necessary to keep the Street Cattle Troughs provided through the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals in working order so that the water is not granted.

5-Illbgal user of Corporation Water---With reference to the report of the Borough Engineer in May last that Mr. Haslam, Cabinet Maker, St. James's Square, had obtained water for his use from the Fire Brigade Station

and the Central Depot, a letter from Mr. Haslam in reply to one from the Town Clerk was read stating that he was sorry to have given trouble, but that he could get what little water he required from the pump at the stables adjoining his workshop.

6-Water Supply to Hatherley Laundry, A letter was read from Colonel Thoyts, Chairman of the Directors of the Hatherley Laundry Company, alleging that there must have been some error in the meter readings for the quarter ending March last in respect to the water supply to the Laundry, as such a large increase, i.e., 148,000 gallons over the quarter in June, as cysts entered on the account sent in, could not possibly be due to anything connected with the working of the Laundry, and suggesting that payment should be made on the average of previous quarters. Resolved, That the further consideration of the matter be adjourned pending a report by the Borough Engineer as to the working of the meter and generally.

7-Uniforms for Inspectors—The only tender sent in in response to the notice inviting tenders put up outside the Municipal Offices and at Sandford was opened and found to be as follows:—

4—Gas Inspector's Report—The Gas Inspector reported that the hourly average consumption of Gas per lamp during the previous month had been 4.259 cubic feet.

5- --Lamp Book — This Book was produced and examined. Lamps extinguished, 10 metered, 7 unmetered; and 13 burning dimly. Resolved, That the Gas Company's attention be called to the large number of lamps reported extinguished or burning dimly.

6-Rucker's Patent—A letter of date the 14th instant, from Messrs. Hind & Robinson, of No. 8, Stone Buildings, Lincoln's Inn, Solicitors of Mr. Martin D. Rucker, the Proprietor of Letters Patent, No. 3379, of the year 1885, being an invention for improvements in distributing Electricity and apparatus therefor, calling attention to the fact (as alleged) that the Corporation are now and have for some time past been infringing such Letters Patent, and requiring payment of damages for past unauthorised user of the Patent, and an undertaking to cease using the same until the Corporation have obtained a license from him, was read, with a reply thereto from the Town Clerk, and a further letter from Messrs. Hind & Robinson enclosing copy of a paragraph containing particulars of breaches of the Patent delivered in an action brought against an alleged infringer of the Patent, understood to be the London Electric Supply Association. Resolved, That this being a matter in which probably all other Companies and Corporations using the high pressure alternating current system are interested, the Committee be empowered if any action by way of combination or otherwise is necessary to be taken before the monthly meeting of the Council in September, to take it, and that the Chairman, the Town Clerk, and the Electrical Engineer be requested to obtain further information on the subject.

7-- Electrical Engineer's Report-The Electrical Engineer reported that all work had continued to progress satisfactorily during the month, and that the London Road arc lamps would be tried the following night.

He had obtained and now submitted tenders from a considerable number of firms for the supply of arc lamp carbons during the 12 months commencing on the 1st prox. Samples had been sent for trial by the firms tendering, and it would take a week or two to test these, and as it would be necessary to order carbons as soon as the tests had been completed he suggested that the Committee should authorize him to accept whichever proved the most satisfactory as regards quality and price.

He had received a quotation from Messrs. Siemens for replacing one of the small alternators by a direct current dynamo (suitable for charging the accumulators, exciting the large alternators and driving the Works motors) at a cost of £200. As the engine was in his opinion large enough to drive a dynamo nearly one-third larger than the quotation was for he had requested Messrs. Siemens to look into the matter and furnish another quotation. For a dynamo of suitable size fixed in place of No. 1 Alternator, the foundations being altered as required, and complete with switchboard panel and regulating gear the cost would be about £400 to £450, and he strongly recommended that this be authorized at once. Resolved, That the Report be approved and the recommendations therein adopted, the Chairman and the Electrical Engineer to decide upon the tenders for the supply of carbons.

8-Electrical Engineer's Assistants— Resolved, That the length of notice to be given by and to the Assistants of the Electrical Engineer to terminate their engagement be one month, and that they be so informed.

9- Electrical Engineer-With reference to Minute No. 1 of this Committee's proceedings of date the 14th instant, a letter was read front Mr. Kilgour, accepting the terms of the Committee's Resolution of that date and undertaking accordingly and ex-pressing his appreciation of the action of the Committee.

10- Salary of Chief Assistant to the Electrical Engineer A Letter was read from Mr. H. E. Soper, Chief Assistant to the Electrical Engineer, applying for an increase in his salary from £130 to £156 per annum, and stating that when he applied about twelve months ago and obtained an increase of £26 per annum he understood that the further increase now applied for was only postponed for about six months. Skemp, of Great Norwood Street, had, without having given proper notice of his intention so to do, made an opening in the road and footpath opposite No. 13, Lansdown Parade for the purpose of laying a drain and had damaged the cover of the electric light cable there. A letter was read from Mr. Skemp, in reply to one from the Borough Surveyor calling his attention to the matter, stating that the notice was sent, if not delivered, before the work was commenced, and that as it was in pursuance of a notice from the Health Department he had hardly thought a notice of intention to open necessary, but sent it to be on the safe side. A Resolution was passed approving in general terms of an agreement being come to on the basis of the foregoing, but without pledging any Corporation or Company to the scheme, and the further consideration of the matter was adjourned to enable the representatives of the Municipalities present who had not authority to agree, to bring the subject before their respective Councils. Resolved, That the Chairman, the Town Clerk, and the Electrical Engineer do attend the meeting of the Municipal Electrical Association, on the 5th August, with power to concur in the aforesaid scheme or any similar scheme that may be formulated for the combination of the sub-scribers in the matter.

MINUTES of the Proceedings of the Committees of the Town Council to be submitted for approval at a Monthly Meeting of the Council, to be held on Monday, the 5th day of September, 1898.

STREET AND HIGHWAY COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Monday, the 8th day of August, 1898 Present : Alderman Haddon ; Councillors Baker, Bence, Cypher and Dix, (Councillor Baker in the chair)

1-Chairman - A letter was read from Councillor Baker expressing his gratification at the resolution passed by the Council, which he concluded was intended as a vote of confidence in the way he had acted as Chairman of the Committee, and withdrawing his resignation.

2-Henrietta Street Improvement—Resolved, To proceed at once with the formation of the carriage way.

3-Hatherley Road Footpath—A letter from Lieut.-Colonel Cumming, of Coulter, was read, stating that the Owners of property abutting upon this footpath did not wish to have it asphalted, kerbed and channelled, &c., but only to have it dressed with blue gravel, but if the Council insisted upon the notices being carried out against their wishes, he must protest against his being called upon to do the work to the path further than to his second back entrance gate, as he considered it quite un-necessary as regards the portion of it running co-extensive with his field. Resolved, That the Council see no sufficient reason to alter their resolution.

4-Footpath South side of Montpellier Gardens—Resolved, That this footpath be channelled and kerbed in a manner similar to the path in front of Spa Buildings, and that the resolution to Minute No. 26 of the proceedings of this Committee of the 27th of May last, that the Borough Surveyor be instructed to form a grass verge be varied accordingly.

5- Building Plans—The Borough Surveyor laid before the Committee the following Plans for erection of new buildings, &C., viz.:-

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, the 29th day of August, 1898—Present: Councillors Baker, Bence, cypher, M. Davis, Dix and Margrett (Councillor Baker in the chair)

6-The View-The following members attended the View Meeting on the previous Friday, viz., Councillors Baker, Cypher, Davis and Margrett.

7-Street Projections-- The Street Inspector reported that at the premises of the London Meat Supply Co., Westall Buildings, Bath Road, a gas rail had been fixed by Messrs. Moore & Son, projecting in front of the premises 14 inches. A letter from Messrs. A. C. & S. Billings was read, asking the Committee to allow a show shelf projecting 10 inches outside the premises at No. 4, Winchcomb Place to remain. Also one from Mr. T. Harvey, of 192, High Street, asking permission to remove his padlock sign from 192, High Street to No. 180. Also one from Mr. J. E. Causier, of 80, Winchcomb Street, asking permission to place out a small dyers' sign from his premises. Resolved, That the sign at the premises of the London Meat Supply in the Bath Road having been fixed without the permission of the Committee having been first obtained must be removed; that the application of Messrs. Billings be acceded to; that the application of Mr. Harvey be refused, and that the application of Mr. Causier be acceded to subject to the regulations as to height, &c., being complied with.

8-Opening of Roads—Resolved, That consideration of the draft Regulations as to opening the roads, &c., be adjourned, and that in the meantime a copy of the Borough Surveyor's Report be sent to each member of the Council who has not already had one.

9-Henrietta, Sherborne, Rosehill and Upper Park Streets— A letter from the Local Government Board, was read, stating that if the sanction to borrow £982 for the improvements of Sherborne, Rosehill, and Upper Park Streets issued on the 4th of March had not been acted upon, the Board would issue a sanction for £1,265 for a period of 13 years so to include the additional £283 required for the improvement of Henrietta Street, to which the Town Clerk had replied, pointing out that the sanction to borrow the £982 was for 16 years, and the improvement of Henrietta Street was if anything of a more permanent and substantial a character than the others mentioned, and he could not understand why the addition of the amount required for Henrietta Street to the amount to be sanctioned should cause the Board to reduce the term for repayment from 16 to 13 years, but suggesting that the Council would be satisfied if the period for repayment of the entire loan were fixed at 15 years. A further letter from the Board in reply, was read, stating that they had decided to allow a period of 15 years for the repayment of the entire sum of £1,265. Resolved, That the action of the Town Clerk be approved.

10-Borough Surveyor's Report re Highways The Borough Surveyor reported that the work done by the Highways Department from the 23rd July to the 26th August, 1898, both inclusive, had been as follows:

Repaired with Clee Hill-Bath Terrace 720 super yards, Malvern street 467 super yards.

Patching—Hewlett Road, Gloucester Road, All Saints Road, Park Place, Albion Street, Hewlett Street, Lansdown Place, Sherborne Street, High Street, Queen's Road, Royal Well Lane, New Street, Evesham Road, St. Paul's Road, Hale's Road, Ambrose Street, Bath Road, Leckhampton Road, Norwood Road, The Park, Shurdington Road, Tivoli Road, Suffolk Square, Painswick Road.

Patched with Wickwar---Mill Lane, College Road.

The footpath on the east side of All Saints Road had been repaired with gravel.

Private Improvements—Bath Parade finished. Henrietta Street Improvement proceeding.

Paving, Kerbing, Crossing and Channelling—Hungerford Street, Brunswick Street, High Street, Henrietta Street, Winchcomb Street, Swindon Road, Lansdown Place, Albion Street, Bath Street, Suffolk Road, Bayshill Road, Mill Lane, College Road, Spa Road, Douro Road, Hewlett Street, Glenfall Street, Bath Street.

The footpath in Gloucester Road from Church Road to the lane leading to Hillfield had been relaid with concrete slabs.

Trees had been pruned in the following Roads:—Promenade, High Street, Leamington Place, Hewlett Road, Rodney Road, Parabola Road.

He recommended that Hungerford Street, Hanover Street, Victoria Street, and Albert Street, St. Paul's, be recoated forthwith.

A new gully had been built in College Road.

Ashes Collected—Van loads 979. Consumed at the Destructor 884 tons, 4 cwt., 1 qr.

Resolved That the Report be approved and the recommendation of the Borough Surveyor adopted.

11-Flooding of No. 14, Henrietta Street—A letter from Mr. Geo. Bradfield was read, complaining that in consequence of the removal of the channelling in Henrietta Street as far as his house preparatory to the new

channelling being laid down, the storm water arising from the heavy rain on the evening of the 12th inst. had run down the excavation and being checked opposite his house found its way under the paving into his house and flooded the basement a foot deep doing considerable damage, for which he asked the Council to recompense him. Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor be authorised on behalf of the Council to pay to Mr. Bradfield such compensation as the Borough Surveyor may consider

A further letter from Mr. Bradfield was read, urging the necessity of pushing on as rapidly as possible with the paving of the street, as the abutting houses had been nearly flooded again.

12-Flooding of Premises of Mr. Strang In Spa Road—A letter was read from Mr. Strang, complaining of loss having been Occasioned to him by the storm water overflowing from the road gully in Spa Road into his premises, causing damage to the extent of £5, which amount he considered himself entitled to claim as compensation from the Council. Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to have the crossing in the footpath raised to prevent the flow of water from the gully into Mr. Strang's premises, and to have the necessary alterations made to his entrance doors.

13-Overtime Work on Improvement of Rosehill Street—A letter was read from Mr. J. W. Betteridge, Secretary of the Amalgamated Society of Gasworkers, Brickmakers, and General Labourers, stating that the men employed by Messrs. Packer and Griffin on this work were being employed overtime, and that they considered it desirable that public work should be done by the Council themselves, also enquiring what the Committee consider should be the standard rate of wages to be paid on this particular work. Resolved, To inform the writer that the standard rate of wages to be paid by all contractors for the Corporation is the standard rate for the time being adopted within the Borough, and that the Council cannot interfere with the employment of men overtime.

14-Sydonham Road, North—A memorial from Mr. J. F. Claridge and to other residents in the neighbourhood was read, requesting the Council to declare this road a highway as considerable repairs had been done by the abutting owners in compliance with notice from the Council, and it was used much more by the general public than by the owners and occupiers of the property abutting upon it. Resolved, That consideration of the question of taking over all the Sydenham Roads as highways be adjourned until the next meeting of the Committee, that the Borough Surveyor be instructed to then report as to the position of affairs with regard to work ordered to be done by the abutting owners and service of notices, &c., and that as Mr. Webb was unable to meet the Committee when they went to view on the previous Friday, he be again invited to meet them at the next Monthly View Meeting.

15 -Folly Lane Private Improvement Works —A letter from Mr. E. L. Baylis was read, with which he enclosed a cheque for £93 12s., being, as he alleged, the sum claimed from the executors of the late Mr Jas. Leighton, less the amount which would have to be refunded to them by the Council on an adjustment between contributors under the Award made in pursuance of the Cheltenham Enclosure Act, 1801. Resolved, That the cheque be returned to Mr. Baylis with an intimation that the full amount claimed, viz., £99 16s. 10d., with £6 15s 10d. for interest, must be paid as a condition precedent to consideration by the Committee as to whether or not the Council are liable to make any contribution under the Award referred to.

16-Private Improvement Works, Beckingsale's Passage—A letter from Mrs. Jane Jones, of No. 186, High Street, was read, claiming exemption from having to pay the amount of the cost of these works apportioned

in respect of the frontage of her premises abutting upon this street, on the ground that there was no entrance to or from it, and she and her tenants had never made use of it Resolved, To inform Mrs. Jones that this makes no difference, and she must pay the amount claimed.

17- Moors Farm Boundary—The Borough Surveyor having reported the result of a meeting which had taken place of the Town Clerk and himself, Mr. Villar and some members of Mr. Smith's family. Resolved, That the Council consider there is no foundation for the allegation that there had been any encroachment by them upon Mr. Smith's land.

18—Sale of 313, High Street--A letter from Messrs. Sadler & Son, occupiers of this property, was read, requesting to know the reserve price for this property fixed by the Committee. Resolved, To inform Messrs. Sadler & Son that the Committee have not been empowered to fix any reserve price for sale by private treaty.

19-Red Lion Inn —A Letter from Mr. R. Wyllie, Manager of the Cheltenham Original Brewery Co., was read, stating that the cost of removing the projection and renovating the front of the Red Lion Inn would be £155, besides which the rent would have to be reduced Owing to the curtailment of space and inconvenience occasioned to the tenant, and the Trustees of the Baptist Society to whom the property belongs would also require to be consulted. Resolved, That consideration of this matter be adjourned.

20-Crossings in Footway opposite Beaufort Arms Inn, London Road, and Footpath West Side of North Place—The Borough Surveyor reported that the costs of carrying out the Private Improvement Works ordered to be done to the footways in these streets amounted respectively to £11 16s. 6d- and £49 8s. 4d,, which he had apportioned as to the amount first mentioned to the Cheltenham Original Brewery Co. as owners of the Beaufort Arms, and as to the latter amount amongst the several abutting owners according to the frontages of their respective premises. Resolved, That the apportionments be approved and that notices thereof and of demand be served upon the owners.

21- Footpaths opposite Hamilton Place from G.W. Railway Bridge to Midland Railway Station and North side of Mountpleasant—Specifications from the Surveyor, of date the 29th, 25th and 27th days of August respectively, of the works required to be done to the parts of the streets above mentioned were read and approved. And it was resolved that Notices be given under Section 44 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1852, to the owners of the premises fronting, adjoining, or abutting upon the parts of the said streets, requiring to be drained, levelled repaired, flagged, and channelled; requiring them to do the specified works within 28 days; and that, if such Notices are not complied with, the Surveyor do proceed to execute the works mentioned or referred to therein; and that the expenses thereof be recovered in the mariner provided by the Act, and the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889. —

22-Building Plans—The Borough Surveyor laid before the Committee Notices and Plans which he had received from the following persons intending to erect new buildings, viz. :--

PUBLIC HEALTH COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, the 8th day of August, 1898 Bence, Ll. Davis, Gurney, and Margrett (Councillor Bence in the chair)-- Present: Alderman Norman; Councillors

- 1-Zymotic Disease—The Medical Officer of Health reported that there had been notified since the last meeting of the Committee, 8 cases of Scarlet Fever and 2 of Diphtheria; that 8 cases of Scarlet Fever and 1 of Diphtheria had been sent into the Delancey Hospital, and that the number of cases then in the Delancey Hospital sent in by the Corporation was 21.
- 2—Wells at Nos. 3, 47, 8, 9, 10, 17, 18, 21 and 30, King Street, Caledonian Cottages, Nos. 16, 17 and 40, Swindon Street, No. 2, St. Margaret's Parade, and Nos. 66 and 68, St. George's Place—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the water in the wells at the above-mentioned premises was used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, and was so polluted as to be injurious to health. Resolved, That proceedings under Sec. 70 of the Public Health Act be taken to obtain orders for these wells to be closed.
- 3--Cleansing and Limewashing at Nos. 4, 4 ½, 7 and 10, King Street, The King's Arms and No. 14, King Street Gardens The Medical Officer of Health having certified under Sec. 46 of the Public Health Act that the abovenamed dwelling houses were in such a filthy and unwholesome condition that the health of the inmates was affected or endangered thereby. Resolved, That Notice be given to the owners under the said Section requiring the houses to be cleansed and limewashed.
- 4 --Nuisance from Drains, &c., at No. 4 King Street, The Cooperage, High Street, The Midland Inn, Builder's Yard in Vittoria Walk occupied by 7. Wall, and No. 12, St. George's Street—The Inspector of Nuisances having made written application under Sec. 41 of the Public Health Act, stating that the drains, &c., on or belonging to the above-named houses were in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health. Resolved, That authority be given to the Inspector of Nuisances to open the ground, examine the drains, and if necessary, give the notices and act as provided by the said section.
- 5-Overcrowding at No. 2, Carlton Place and No. 28, Rutland Street The Medical Officer of Health reported that the above premises were so overcrowded as to be dangerous or injurious to the health of the inmates. Resolved, That the Committee being satisfied of the existence of a nuisance on the said premises, Notices

under Sec. 94 of the Public Health Act be served on the owners and occupiers thereof requiring them to abate the same.

6-W.C's without Flushing Apparatus—The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses having w.c's without flushing apparatus. Resolved, That Notices under Section 28 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, be given to the owners requiring them to provide the necessary flushing apparatus, and to the occupiers to lay on a proper supply of water thereto, and that in default of compliance with such notices proceedings be taken for the penalties.

7-Houses without proper Ash Receptacles—The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses which had no proper ashpits or ash receptacles. Resolved, That the necessary Notices be given to the respective Owners under Sec. 36 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and Sec. 27 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, requiring them in each case to provide a moveable ash receptacle of such size, pattern, and construction as may be approved by the Borough Surveyor on behalf of the Corporation.

8-Ash Receptacles for Ashes to be Collected Resolved, That all persons depositing ashes or refuse on the footway' for collection must provide a suitable covered receptacle of galvanized iron of sufficient size to contain the deposit.

9-Exclusion of Children from School by Medical Officer of Health-Correspondence with the Local Government was read, with reference to their observation that the Medical Officer of Health had no power individually, with a view to preventing the spread of disease, to order the exclusion of children from school; but that in pursuance of Art. 88 of the Education Code such proceeding could only be taken by the Sanitary Authority or any two members thereof acting on the advice of the Medical Officer of Health. Resolved, That the Medical Officer of Health and the Town Clerk be instructed to settle a form of notice for exclusion of particular children from school, to be issued in accordance with the requirements of the Local Government Board.

10-Mouth-blown Meat--Resolved, That an Inflator be purchased for use at the Abattoir for the inflation of the carcases of lambs and calves.

11-Seizure of Unsound Meat The Medical Officer of Health reported that on the 23rd ulto. a quantity of meat in an unsound and unwholesome condition and entirely unfit for food, and consisting of 66 pieces of beef, 18 of mutton, 2 calves heads and two strings of sausages, weighing together 3 cwt. 1 qr., were seized upon the premises of Mr. Aucott, Butcher, No. 142, High Street, and in the refrigerator of Mr. Barnett, Fishmonger, No. 86, High Street, the whole being the property of Mr. Aucott, and having been taken before a Magistrate and condemned by him was duly destroyed. The greater part of the meat was hanging upon hooks in Mr. Aucott's shop exposed for sale. Resolved, To instruct the Town Clerk to take proceedings against Mr. Aucott under Sec. 117 of the Public Health Act to procure the imposition of a penalty for the offence.

12-Insanitary Urinals at the Mitre Inn, Sandford Street, and Midland Inn, Gloucester Road--The Medical Officer of Health reported that the Urinals at the premises above-mentioned were in such a filthy state for want of water supply and owing to their dilapidated condition as to be a nuisance or injurious to health. Resolved, That notices under Sec. 94 of the Public Health Act be served upon the owners requiring them to abate the nuisances, and for that purpose to carry out the works to be specified therein.

13-Lethal Chamber -A letter was read from the Rev. J. E. Walker, on behalf of the local branch of N.S.P.C.A., in the absence of the Secretary. stating that notice had been given to remove the Lethal Chamber from the

yard at the Police Station, and asking if the Corporation would allow it, at a yearly rental, to be erected at the Abattoir to be under the responsible charge

of the Inspector of the Society. Resolved, That the Council do not consider the Abattoir is a suitable place, but it may be erected on the property of the Corporation near the Ash Destructor, in a situation to be fixed upon by the Borough Surveyor at a nominal rent of 1s annum.

- 14—Sanitary Requirements at No. 439, High Street--A letter from Mr. James Phillips was read, with reference to a notice served upon him to fix a flushing box to the w.c., provide an ash receptacle. and carry out certain sanitary requirements at No. 439, High Street, asserting that all the sanitary arrangements were in good condition, that the work required to be done was unnecessary, and requesting that the notices should be withdrawn. Resolved, That the reasons stated by Mr. Phillips are not sufficient to justify the Council in relieving him from having to comply with the notices.
- 15— Corpus Street Sewer —A letter from Mr. John Smith, of No. 13, Corpus Street was read, requesting compensation for the occupation of a portion of the garden of which he was tenant by a large stone which had been placed o'er a flushing tank belonging to the Corporation, and for the loss of vegetables and fruit bushes NS hick had been removed to make room for the tank and stone. Resolved, That it be left to the Borough Surveyor to make such compensation as he shall consider Mr. Smith is reasonably entitled to.
- 16-- Flooding of basement of Earlston, Tivoli —A letter was read from the Rev. W. S. Macgowan, complaining that on the 6th August the basement of his residence had been flooded from the sewers, and requesting the Council to give their immediate attention to the matter with a view to preventing a recurrence of the nuisance, and requesting to be informed to whom he should apply for compensation for the loss and damage to property he had sustained. Resolved. That the Town Clerk be instructed to inform Dr. Macgowan that the Council exceeding]) regret the occurrence which they will do their best to prevent being repeated, and that the Borough Surveyor be instructed to bring up a report on the matter.
- 17-- Closing of Slaughter Houses—With reference to the claims for compensation made by the owners and tenants of those slaughter houses who had received notice to close them as such, Resolved, That the Town Clerk be instructed to procure from two valuers a report and valuation in each case.
- 18— Barn Farm—With reference to Minute No. 28 of the proceedings of this Committee of the 18th of July last the Borough Surveyor reported that the daily flow of sewage on to Rule Meadow Patch was 40,000 to 60,000 gallons per day for 5 days a week. Resolved, To instruct the Town Clerk to send to Mr. Corbett a copy of this Minute and to inform him that the Council expect him to pay the amount due from him forthwith.
- 19—Plans—The plans of such new buildings necessitating drainage as were intended to come before the next meeting of the Street and Highway Committee were laid before this Committee. Resolved. That No. 1068 be not approved, but that so far as regards sanitary matters the other plans be approved as shown.

20-Zymotic Disease—The Medical Officer of Health reported that there had been notified since the an meeting of the Committee, 1 case of Scarlet Fever and 1 of Diphtheria; that the case of Scarlet Fever had been sent into the Delancey Hospital. and that the number of cases then in the Delancey Hospital sent in by the Corporation was 11 of Scarlet Fever and 2 of Diphtheria.

21- Wells at Nos. 4, 6, 7, 9, 10 and 11, Northfield Terrace, No. 15, Swindon Street, and the King's Arms Inn The Medical Officer of Health reported that the water in the wells at the above-mentioned premises was used, or likely to be used. by man for drinking or domestic purposes, and was so polluted as to be injurious to health. Resolved. That proceedings under Sec. 70 of the Public Health Act be taken to obtain Orders for these wells to be closed.

22 -Insanitary Property at Nos. 3, 4 ½ and 10, King Street, Nos. 3, 8 and 17, Northfield Terrace, and No. 90, Tewkesbury Road—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the premises above-mentioned were in such a state as to be injurious to the health of the inmates owing to defective roofs, ceilings, walls, floors, &c. Resolved, That the Council being satisfied that the said premises are in such a state as to be injurious to health, Notices under Sec. 94 of the Public Health Act, be served upon the Owners requiring them to put the same into a healthy condition, and for that purpose to card- out the works specified in the Notices.

23-Insufficient Closet Accommodation at Stables behind Shirley House, Pittville—The Inspector of Nuisances reported that the dwelling house at the above premises, occupied by the coachman and his family, had an insanitary privy without any appropriate ground upon which to dispose of the refuse. Resolved, That it appears to the Council that the house is without a sufficient water closet, earth closet or privy, and that Notice under Section 36 of the Public Health Act to provide a sufficient water closet, earth closet or privy be served on the owner of the premises, and that the Borough Surveyor be instructed to bring up a specification of the work to be done by the abutting owners under Section 150 of the Public Health Act, to sewer the street coextensive with the premises at the backs of the houses on the North side of Pittville Circus Road and extending thence to the said road.

24—Cleansing and Limewashing at Nos. 5, 8 and 9, Northfield Terrace and Bruton Cottage—The Medical Officer of Health having certified under Sec. 46 of the Public Health Act, that the above-named dwelling houses were in such a filthy and unwholesome condition that the health of the inmates was affected or endangered thereby. Resolved, That Notice be given to the owners under the said Section requiring the houses to be cleansed and limewashed.

25—Nuisance from Drains, &c., at Nos. 51 and 52, Waterloo Street, Delhi Collage, No. 12, Tivoli Street, No. 21, King Street, The Bell Inn, Bath Road and No. 4, Hatherley Villas—The Inspector of Nuisances having made written application under Sec 45 of the Public Health Act, stating that the drains, &c., on or belonging to the above-named houses were in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health. Resolved, That authority be given to the Inspector of Nuisances to open the ground, examine the drains, and, if necessary, give the notices and act as provided by the said section.

26—Overcrowding at Nos. 4, 5 and 6, Barnard's Row—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the above premises were so overcrowded as to be dangerous or injurious to the health of the inmates. Resolved, That the Committee being satisfied of the existence of a nuisance on the said premises, Notices under Section 94 of the Public Health Act be served on the occupiers thereof requiring them to abate the same.

27—Water Closets without Flushing Apparatus—The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses having water closets without Flushing Apparatus. Resolved, That Notices under Sec. 28 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, be given to the Owners requiring them to provide the necessary flushing apparatus, and to the Occupiers to lay on a proper supply of water thereto, and that in default of compliance with such Notices proceedings be taken for the penalties.

28—houses without proper Ash Receptacles—The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses which had no proper ashpits or ash receptacles. Resolved, That the necessary Notices be given to the respective owners under Sec. 36 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and Sec. 27 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, requiring them in each case to provide a moveable ash receptacle of such size, pattern, and construction as may be approved by the Borough Surveyor on behalf of the Corporation.

29—Notices not Complied with—The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of Notices to fix flushing boxes and provide ash receptacles, &c., which had not been complied with. Resolved, To instruct the Town Clerk to take proceedings to compel compliance with the Notices.

30—Ambulance for Conveyance of Typhoid Fever and Diphtheria Patients—A letter was read from Dr. E. T. Wilson, calling attention to the dangerous condition of this ambulance, and stating that a new one was urgently needed, which should be provided with an air cushion. Resolved, That a new ambulance be purchased, and that the Committee be empowered to attend the forthcoming Congress of the Sanitary Institute at Birmingham on one day to view the appliances.

31—House for Ambulances—The Borough Surveyor submitted to the Committee a suggestion for alteration of this house which would provide more accommodation for the ambulances Resolved, That the suggestion be approved and adopted, and to instruct the Borough Surveyor to carry it into effect.

32—Tivoli Place Sewer -Letters were read from Mr. D. Jones, of No. 4, Hatherley Villas, Tivoli Place, and Mr. P. Bendall, occupier of property in Tivoli Place, complaining of the imperfect construction of this sewer which permits the escape of server gas and which causes the basements of the houses to be flooded in case of a heavy rainfall with sewage. Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor be requested to have an interview with Mr. Winterbotham, the owner of the server, to suggest what should be done by him to abate the nuisance.

33-Slaughter house in Prestbury Road—A letter from Mr. Jas. Page was read, claiming £350 as compensation for the closing of this building as a slaughter house. Resolved, That this claim is too unreasonable for consideration.

34—Unsound Meat—The Town Clerk reported that he had, as instructed, taken proceedings against Mr. Aucott, of No 142, High Street, for exposing for sale unsound meat, and that a fine of £15 and costs, or in default two months' imprisonment with hard labour, had been imposed, and the fine had been paid.

35- Building Plans—The Borough Surveyor laid before the Committee the plans of such new buildings necessitating drainage as were intended to come before the Street and Highway Committee for their consideration. Resolved, That so far as regards Sanitary matters the same be approved.

Resolved, That the recommendations of the Sub-Committee stated above be approved and adopted. That the Surveyor be authorised to obtain from Messes Newth, of Gloucester, a sail cloth covering and backing for the band platform at Pittville, at a cost of £1 17s. 6d. That the Borough Surveyor be authorised to make petty cash disbursements in connection with the entertainments provided by the Council, and present the account thereof to the principal Committee each month for repayment, and That the Sub-Committee be requested to meet at least once a week, viz: at 10 o'clock on Monday mornings.

Handley, was read, complaining that he had been charged for admittance to Pittville Gardens at Essex Lodge entrance on a Wednesday afternoon, whereas at Saxham Villa entrance there was no charge, and there was nothing to prevent persons coming from the Marge Hill annexe to the upper gardens without payment. Resolved, To instruct the Town Clerk to write to Mr. Handley to inform him that he was mistaken, as persons coming from the Marle Hill part had to pay the same charge for entrance to the upper gardens as at Essex Lodge.

7-Admittance to Montpellier Gardens by Key Holder of Non-Subscribers—With reference to information received that General Houghton had on one occasion admitted by means of his key non-subscribers to Montpellier Gardens, through the gate near the Riding school, a letter from him, was read, stating that he let some persons out of the Gardens, and possibly someone might have passed in, but if so it was unknown to hint Resolved, To instruct the Town Clerk to write in reply that the Council trust he and other key holders will be careful when making use of the side gates not to admit non-subscribers.

8-Religious Services In Whiter Garden A letter was read from Mr. C. Hayward, Honorary Secretary of the Cheltenham Free church Council, asking the Council to grant them the use of the Winter Garden on the afternoons of Sunday, the 30th of October, and Sunday the nth of November, to hold a Service on the first occasion for men, and on the other, for the Scholars of the Free Church Sunday Schools. Resolved, That the application be acceded to on the Free Church Council undertaking to pay the expenses of lighting, heating, &c., if any.

9-Angling at Pittville—With reference to Minute No. 7 of the proceedings of this Committee of the 18th of July last, a letter was read from Mr. H. W. WATER COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Wednesday, the 24th day of August, 1898---Present: The Mayor; Councillors Baker, Bence, Ll. Davies and Margrett (Councillor Margrett in the chair)—

1—Report of Water Engineer—The Water Engineer reported that on the 22nd inst., the supply from Hewletts and Northfield Springs was 87 gallons, the average for the last four years being 74 gallons per minute; and the quantity of water in store at He sinus and Leckhampton was 8,928,831 gallons.

8

On the 23rd inst. the depth of water in Dowdeswell Reservoir was 22 feet 5 inches and the contents 53,526,542 gallons, which gave a total of 62,455,373 gallons, or about 69 days supply exclusive of the daily yield of the springs, which was then about 244,328 gallons.

With reference to the letter from Colonel Thoyts, Chairman of the Directors of the Hatherley Laundry Company, read at the last Meeting of this Committee, suggesting that there was an error in the readings of the Water Meter at the Laundry, as the account for the March quarter showed an increase of 148,000 gallons over the June quarter, which could not conceivably be correct, the Water Engineer laid before the Committee the readings which had been taken from June, 1894, up to June, 1898, which showed an average consumption per quarter since June, 1895, of 375,000 gallons per quarter, and from which it appeared that the consumption had not materially varied between Christmas, 1894, and Christmas, 1897, except on one occasion in the quarter ending September, 1896, when the consumption was 85,000 gallons above the average. The quarter ending June 24th last was only 340,000 gallons, and as this reduction had taken place without any alteration in the meter it appeared clear that the excess amount registered during the quarter ending March last must be due to some action at the Laundry and not to any defect in the meter. During the last month, when it might be assumed that special care and economy would be exercised, special readings had been taken at short intervals and an average over a period of 24 days showed a consumption of about

311,000 gallons per quarter. The consumption for the whole quarter ending 24th June having been 340,000 gallons. He stated that he was having a large tank built at Sandford Mead with a view of testing any meter which might be questioned.

He further reported that applications had been received for extensions to Brookfield Cottage, Prestbury; to the Leigh along the Gloucester and Tewkesbury Roads; and to Northway House, Ashchurch. In the case of the extensions at Prestbury and at Northway House, he was unable to advise these being carried out unless the owners would pay a substantial pro-portion of the capital cost, as they were not in districts where the main would be remunerative, He suggested that the terms to Brookfield Cottage be an immediate payment of £60 and a three years' agreement to pay ordinary rate.. To Northway House an immediate payment of £100 and a three years' agreement to pay ordinary rate. And as regards the extension to The Leigh, he recommended that the main be extended provided the owners will pay a sum of £150 towards the expenses, or a yearly rate of £27 for seven years certain.

He also reported that the boilers at Tewkesbury were showing signs of weakness, and he therefore strongly advised that the New Boiler House be put in hand without further delay, and that one new boiler be ordered. Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to have the meter at the Hatherley Laundry tested, and to notify to the Directors the time and place when and where the test will take place so that they may be present if they wish. That the recommendations of the Water Engineer as regards the extensions to Brookfield Cottage, Northway House, and The Leigh be approved and adopted; and that Tenders be advertised for erection of the New Boiler House and provision of the new boiler.

2-Rating of Waterworks in Tewkesbury Union —A letter was read from Messrs. Hedley, Mason & Hedley, stating that they could not advise the Assessment Committee of the Union to accept so low a rateable value as £500 for Tewkesbury, but they had advised the Committee to fix the Assessment for the present at £600 rateable value. Resolved, That this Assessment he agreed to without prejudice.

3-Meter Readings at Tewkesbury —A letter from Mr. Badham, Town Clerk of Tewkesbury, was read, suggesting that all amounts under 1000 gallons should be ignored in taking the meter readings. Resolved, That the suggestion be approved and adopted.

4-Assault on Caretaker at Dowdeswell Reservoir-The Town Clerk reported that Mr. King had informed him that on Saturday, the 30th ultimo, two men named James Fisher and George Powell, in the employment of Mr. Randall, Coxhorne Farm, had assaulted him and alarmed his wife by forcing their way through the entrance gate to the house, and striking and hustling him, that previously to this Powell had climbed over the gate and subsequently after being put out he had again climbed over it, and that the cause of this conduct was because he had complained of their having drenched a kitten belonging to his wife with beer at the public house opposite. Resolved, That if Mr. King thinks fit to take proceedings against the men, the Town Clerk or Deputy be authorised to appear on his behalf if he so desires.

5-Appeals The Appeals entered in the Appeal Book were considered, and the Rates settled and adjusted.

3—Gas Inspector's Report The Gas Inspector reported that the hourly average consumption of Gas per lamp during the previous month had been 4.260 cubic feet.

4-Lamp Book—This Book was produced and examined. Lamps extinguished, 8 metered, 17 unmetered; and 5 burning dimly.

5-Lighting of Henrietta Street, Catholic Alley and Bath Parade—A letter from Mr. G. Bradfield, of No. 14, Henrietta Street, was read, suggesting that before the new paving in Henrietta Street is laid down a cable for electric light should be laid along the street.

A proposal from Councillor Macdonald that a light be placed at the end of the passage from St. George's Parade to St. Gregory's Place as near as possible to the urinal, was laid before the Committee.

Resolved, That consideration of these matters and the question of improving the lighting in Bath Parade be adjourned pending inspection by the Committee.

6-Rucker's Patent—With reference to the Resolution to Minute No. 14 of the proceedings of this Committee at their last meeting, a report of the Committee appointed to represent the interests of Municipal Corporations, &c., having alternating electrical energy undertakings of their proceedings at a meeting held on the 8th instant formulating recommendations with reference to combination of Local Authorities and others interested in resisting the claim made by Mr. Rucker, and as to the basis of contribution to the Defence Fund was laid before this Committee. Resolved, That in accordance with the said Resolution the Town Clerk be authorised to inform the Directors of the London Electric Supply Corporation, Limited, that the Council are prepared to assent to the recommendations contained in the report referred to, and will engage to contribute to the Defence Fund accordingly, their contribution to be ascertained pro rata in accordance with the basis indicated in the report.

7-Electrical Engineer's Report-The Electrical Engineer reported that both extensions and running had progressed satisfactorily during the past month.

That he recommended that the extension for private supply in Hewlett Street and All Saints' Road be continued via Pittville Circus to Leamington Place, and that the public lighting extension for Hewlett Street should similarly be enlarged to include the whole of All Saints' Road and Pittville Circus, at an additional cost

of £550 for private lighting mains and a total cost of £1,035 for the public lighting extension; also that he would be glad to be instructed to proceed with this work at once.

That the new feeder (included in a previous application for a Loan) from the works was now necessary, and that to supply customers in Christ Church Road it was necessary to lay the already authorised mains there without delay; that he recommended he be instructed to proceed with the work of laying the new feeder, and both the private and public lighting mains in Christ Church Road at once.

That he submitted a schedule, which included the extensions authorized at the June and July Meetings of the Council, of small extensions, &c., which were all now required, and he recommended that he be instructed to proceed at once with all those extensions for which he had not already instructions to proceed.

That he had received an application from Mr. Harman for electrical supply at Staverton Court, and he recommended that this application be not acceded to That with the Chairman's authority he had accepted the quotation of Messrs. 8-Cab Stand at end of Wolseley Terrace Gardens —A memorial from Mrs. A. E. Moore, the Contractor, stating that the omission to make the application for permission had arisen through a misunderstanding with the local Manager of the business and not through misfeasance, also one from W. Hollingsworth, the Manager referred to, to the same effect. Resolved, Having regard to the explanations given, to allow the rail to remain, but to inform Mr. Moore such negligence will not again be overlooked.

A letter was read from Mr. R. Hudson, asking permission to erect the trade lamp used by him at his former business premises, No. 84, High Street, over the entrance to No. 77 ½, High Street, to which premises he had removed his business. Resolved, To accede to the application subject to the Regulations as to height, projection, and hours of lighting being complied with.

Dix and Co., applying on behalf of Mr. Salisbury, Tailor, Bath Road, for permission to fix an outside lamp for shop window lighting. Paving, Kerb, Crossing and Channelling—Hewlett Street, Swindon Road, St. Margaret's Road, Bath Road, Parabola Road, Promenade, Suffolk Road and Square, Cambray, Winchcomb Street, Painswick Road, Hanover Street, St. Luke's Road, Crescent Terrace, Dunalley Street. The footpath on the East and West side of Painswick Road had been repaired with gravel 2353 super yards. Three crossings in Swindon Road at the top of Henrietta Street had been relaid with McDougall's bricks. Two crossings in St. George's Place had been relaid with McDougall's bricks. Five new gullies had been built in Roman Road and Rowanfield Road to replace those found to be defective.

7-Sydenham Roads—The Borough Surveyor reported that to put these roads in a state for dedication it would be necessary that the following works should be carried out, viz. :—

Sydenham Road South—Both sides, pave 5ft. wide.

Sydenham Villas Road—Both sides, pave 5ft. wide, edge and channel where not already done and make up roadway from High to Sydenham Road South with Wickwar stone, the cost of which he estimated as follows, viz. :-

Resolved, To inform Mr. Betteridge that contractors for the Corporation in all cases have to pay their men engaged on work for the Corporation the Standard Rate.
- 16— Covers for Dust Heaps—A letter was read from Mr. C. F. Allnutt, of 28, Montpellier Villas, suggesting that matting baskets should be provided to place on the dust heaps swept up by the road men to prevent the dust being blown about until collected by the dust carts.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, the 12th day of September, 1898 Present : Councillors Bence, M. Davis, Margrett, Moles and Waghorne (Councillor Bence in the chair)—

- 1-Zymotic Disease The Medical Officer of Health reported that there had been notified since the last meeting of the Committee, 14 cases of Scarlet Fever, 1 of Puerperal Fever, and 3 of Diphtheria; that 14 cases of Scarlet Fever and 1 of Diphtheria had been sent into the Delancey Hospital, and that the number of cases then in the Delancey Hospital sent in by the Corporation was 17 of Scarlet Fever and 1 of Diphtheria.
- 2—Wells at Nos. 2, 3, 4, 21, and 22, Sherborne Place and Walcot Cottage, Sherborne Street The Medical Officer of Health reported that the water in the wells at the above-mentioned premises was used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, and was so polluted as to be injurious to health. Resolved, That proceedings under Sec. 70 of the Public Health Act be taken to obtain orders for these wells to be closed.

3—Cleansing and Limewashing at No. 28, Townsend Street, No. 29, York Street, Nos. 22 and 23, King Street, and Nos. 2 and 5, Orchard Cottages-The Medical Officer of Health having certified under Sec. 46 of the Public Health Act that the above-named dwelling houses were in such a filthy and unwholesome condition that the health of the inmates was affected or endangered thereby. Resolved, That Notice be given to the owners under the said Section requiring the houses to be cleansed and limewashed.

4—Nuisance front Drains, &c., at No. 31, Russell Street, No. 1, St. James's Parade, and the Somerset Arms-The Inspector of Nuisances having made written application under Sec. 41 of the Public Health Act, stating that the drains, &c., on or belonging to the above-named houses were in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health. Resolved, That authority be given to the Inspector of Nuisances to open the ground, examine the drains, and, if necessary, give the notices and act as provided by the said section.

5—Insanitary Property at Nos. 2, 3, and 4, Orchard Cottages, and No. 6, St. George's Terrace-The Medical Officer of Health reported that the premises above-mentioned were in such a state as to be injurious to the health of the inmates owing to defective roofs, floors, ceilings, walls, and paving of yards, &c. Resolved, That the Council being satisfied that the said premises are in such a state as to be injurious to health, Notices under Sec. 94 of the Public Health Act, 1875, be served upon the Owners requiring then to put the same into a healthy condition, and for that purpose to carry out the works specified in the Notices.

6- Smoke Nuisance at Montpellier Baths--The Inspector of Nuisances reported that on several occasions he had observed dense black smoke issuing from the chimney at the Montpellier Baths in such quantity as to be a nuisance. Resolved, That Notice under Sec. 91 of the Public Health Act be served upon the Company requiring them to abate the nuisance.

7-Overcrowding at No. 45, Orchard Cottages-The Medical Officer of Health reported that the above premises were so overcrowded as to be dangerous or injurious to the health of the inmates. Resolved, That the Committee being satisfied Notices under Section 94 of the Public Health Act be served on the of the existence of a nuisance on the said premises, owners and occupiers thereof requiring them to abate the same.

8--W.C's without Flushing Apparatus—The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses having w.c's without flushing apparatus. Resolved, That Notices under Section 28 of the Cheltenham Improvement A requiring them to provide the necessary flushing apparatus, and to the occupiers to lay on a and that in default of compliance with such notices proceedings be taken for the penalties

9—Houses without proper Ash Receptacles The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list or ash receptacles. Resolved, That the necessary Notices be given to tor. Public Health Act, 1875, and Sec. 27 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, requiring them in each case to provide a moveable ash receptacle of such size, pattern, and construction as may be approved by the Borough Surveyor on behalf of the Corporation.

10—Insanitary Urinals—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the Urinals at the Somerset Inn, High Street, and Fairview Inn, Fairview, were in an insanitary condition owing to want of water supply. Resolved, That Notices be served on the owners of the premises under Sec. 94 of the Public Health Act requiring them forthwith to abate the nuisances, and fin that purpose to lay on a sufficient water supply to flush the urinals.

- 11-No. 57, Worcester Street—With reference to the Resolution to Minute No. 16 of the proceedings of this Committee at their meeting of date the 10th of November last, the Medical Officer of Health reported that this house had not been demolished as ordered by the Council. Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to have the house demolished and proceed as indicated by the Housing of the Working Classes Act with reference thereto.
- 12—Lighting of Urinal behind St. George's Place Wine and Spirit Vaults—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the lighting of this urinal was so bad that after dark anyone entering would have to feel the way in. Resolved, That the attention of the Lighting Committee be called to this unsatisfactory state of things.
- 13-Old Sewer under No. 2, Argyle Villas--The Medical Officer of Health reported that under this house was an old sewer in a defective condition which should he filled up under the house or relaid there with iron pipes if required to convey surface water. Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed, if practicable, to have the old sewer connected above the house with the sewer now in use, and to have the portion of the old one under the house filled up with lime.
- 14—Lethal Chamber—A letter from the Rev. J. E. Walker, on behalf of the Local Branch of the R.S.P.C.A., stating that the site offered for the Lethal Chamber at the Destructor ground was too far off, and that the Society had obtained a more convenient site for it.
- 15— Collection of House Refuse—A letter was read from Me R. R. Skemp complaining that the collection of house refuse in the side streets was not made often enough.
- 16---Sewer across Land of Gas Company on North-West Side of Lower High Street—A letter was read from the Clerks to the Gas Company stating that on the 6th ultimo this sewer burst and flooded the premises of the Company, and requesting the Council to have the sewer strengthened to prevent a recurrence of the accident and to make such alterations as will enable the storm water to flow away freely. Resolved, That the Council regret that cause for the complaint should have arisen and to inform the writers that the damage has been made good and the sewer strengthened as suggested.
- 17—Flushing Box to W.C. at 269, High Street—A letter was read from Mr. J. W. Gunning, the owner of these premises, stating that rather than be put to the expense of complying with a notice served upon him to fix a Flushing Box to the w.c. and lay on the water he would remove the w.c. altogether, as the premises were only used by the tenant for business purposes and he did not require the w.c. Resolved, To inform Mr. Gunning that the Notice must be complied with, as the removal of the closet would only result in his having to replace it or provide another on the premises.
- 18—Sewer, &c., under Property of the Great Western Railway Company—A letter from the Assistant Secretary of the Great Western Railway Company was read stating that the Company would grant permission to the Corporation to lay a 9-inch sewer and construct a 4-foot subway with two manholes in connection therewith upon and across their land or line of railway subject to (amongst others) the following provisions, viz.:—An annual payment by the grantees of £2, or a payment of a lump sum equivalent to 25 years' purchase, payment by them of cost of watchmen during carrying out of work, compensation for damage to the railway or works or interruption of traffic and compensation to tenant for damage, Company not to be responsible for damage to grantees works, Company to have right to build over serer without responsibility for damage caused thereby, works of grantees to be shifted or supported at their expense if

found to interfere with future works of the Company or alteration or repair of existing works, and costs of grant and duplicate to be paid by grantees. Resolved, That the conditions required by the Company be left to the Town Clerk to settle.

19-Flooding of Nethercott, Gloucester Road—A letter was read from Mr. F. C. Stranger complaining that the cellar of this house was continually being flooded by land drainage owing to his being unable to drain off the water into the sewer which was above the level of the cellar floor, and as the plans for the house were passed by the Council showing the basement as it exists he considered the Council should adopt some means to cause a cesser of the nuisance complained of. Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to report upon the matter at the next meeting of the Committee.

20-Agenda -Resolved, That a copy of the Agenda be sent by post to each member of the Committee on the Saturdays previous to ordinary meetings.

21-Urinals in High Street--A letter from the Local Government Board was read with reference to the application to borrow £450 for the provision of underground Conveniences in High Street, stating that an Inquiry would be held, due notice of which Would be given, and requesting certain information, also enquiring if the site belonged to the Council, and calling attention with reference thereto to a decision given in a case quoted in the letter to which the Deputy Town Clerk had replied that the decision referred to had no bearing on the present case as the site was unquestionably vested in the Council. Resolved, That the reply be approved.

22-Alleged Nuisance from Sewage Farms at Staverton--A copy of a letter received by the Clerk to the County Council (which had been forwarded by him to the Borough Surveyor) from the Clerk to the Staverton Parish Council was read, calling

attention to the nuisance caused in the parish by the Sewage Farms of the Cheltenham Corporation, which, it was alleged, polluted the streams, ditches and atmosphere, and in particular complaining of the Filter Bed, which was placed in a "most unsuitable position near to dwelling houses, public roads and paths, and from which the sewage in a foul state is " conducted through a carrier into the adjacent Hatherley Brook."

23—Plans—The plans of such new buildings necessitating drainage as were intended to come before the next meeting of the Street and Highway Committee were laid before this Committee. Resolved, That No. 1072 be not approved, but that so far as regards sanitary matters the other plans be approved as shown.

24-Zymotic Disease—The Medical Officer of Health reported that there had been notified since the last meeting of the Committee, 4 cases of Scarlet Fever and 1 of Diphtheria; that 4 cases of Scarlet Fever had been sent into the Delancey Hospital, and that the number of cases then in the Delancey Hospital sent in by the Corporation was 19 of Scarlet Fever and 1 of Diphtheria.

25 –Overcrowding at No. 60, Sun Street-The Medical Officer of Health reported that the above premises were so overcrowded as to be dangerous or injurious to the health of the inmates. Resolved, That the Committee being satisfied of the existence of a nuisance on the said premises, Notices under Sec. 94 of the Public Health Act be served on the owners and occupiers thereof requiring them to abate the same.

26-Water Closets without Flushing Apparatus—The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses having water closets without Flushing Apparatus. Resolved, That Notices under Sec. 28 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, be given to the Owners requiring them to provide the necessary flushing apparatus, and to the Occupiers to lay on a proper supply of water thereto, and that in default of compliance with such Notices proceedings be taken for the penalties.

27-Houses without proper Ash Receptacles—The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses which had no proper ashpits or ash receptacles. Resolved, That the necessary Notices be given to the respective owners under Sec. 36 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and Sec. 27 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, requiring them in each case to provide a moveable ash receptacle of such size, pattern, and construction as may be approved by the Borough Surveyor on behalf of the Corporation.

28-Cleansing and Limewashing at No, 13, Waterloo Street and No. 2, Moorend Place-The Medical Officer of Health having certified under Sec. 46 of the Public Health Act, that the above-named dwelling houses were in such a filthy and unwholesome condition that the health of the inmates was affected or endangered thereby. Resolved, That Notice be given to the owners under the said Section requiring the houses to be cleansed and limewashed.

29--Nuisance from Drains, &c., at No. 13, Waterloo Street and No. 15, Fairview Street-The Inspector of Nuisances having made written application under Sec. 41 of the Public Health Act, stating that the drains, &c., on or belonging to the above-named houses were in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health. Resolved, That authority be given to the Inspector of Nuisances to open the ground, examine the drains, and, if necessary, give the notices provided by the said section.

30-New Ambulance for Diphtheria Cases—The Medical Officer of Health reported that he had received letters from Messrs Wilson and Stockall, of Bury, Lancashire, and Messrs. Atkinson and Philipson, of Newcastle-on-Tyne, offering to tender for this new Ambulance. Resolved, To request the Chairman and Alderman Norman to consider the matter and make a recommendation to the Committee.

31--insufficient Closet Accommodation at Locomotive Shed of Great Western Railway Company near St. George's Road arid at Signal Box near St. George's Road Bridge—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the premises above mentioned were without a sufficient water closet, earth closet, or privy. Resolved, To serve notice upon the Company to provide sufficient water or earth closets at the said premises.

32-Flooding of Cellar at Nethercott—With reference to the letter from Mr. F. C. Stranger, complaining that he was unable to Properly drain the cellar of this house as it was below the level of the sewer, the Borough Surveyor reported that no drainage from the cellar was shown or indicated on the Plan which was submitted to and passed by the Committee before the house was built, consequently the Council are in no way responsible for the inability to drain the cellar into the sewer. Resolved, To inform Mr. Stranger accordingly, and to request the Borough Surveyor to advise him what he had better do to try to abate the inconvenience.

33-Cost of Manhole in Sewer in Albany Street, Tivoli-- A letter was read from Messrs. B. W. Pearce and Sons objecting to have to pay for the construction of the manhole at the junction of their sewer in Fairmont Road

with the main in Albany' Street. Resolved, To inform Messrs. Pearce and Sons that the manhole is a necessary part and consequence of the new sewer, and must, as has been the practice in all similar cases, be paid for by the owners of the new sewer.

34-Sewer in Road at Back of houses North Side of Pittville Circus Road and Extending thereto—In accordance with the resolution 3 to Minute No. 23 of the proceedings of this Committee of date the 22nd August last, the Borough Surveyor laid before the Committee a Specification of date the 19th day of September, 1898, of the works required to be done in the above street, which was read and approved. Resolved, that the necessary Plans, Sections, and Estimates be prepared, and Notices be given under Section 150 of the Public Health Act, 1875, to the owners of the premises fronting, adjoining, or abutting upon the parts of the said street, requiring to be sewered, requiring them to do the specified works within 28 days; and that if such Notice is not complied with, the Surveyor do proceed to execute the works mentioned or referred to therein; and that the expenses thereof be recovered in the manner provided by the Act, and the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889.

It was proposed to hold the concerts in the Montpellier Gardens if the weather was suitable, but if otherwise in the Winter Garden, but the Sub-Committee recommended that the necessary seven days' notice should be given for the closing of the Montpellier Gardens to subscribers on the date fixed for the Concerts.

Resolved, That the recommendation of the Sub-Committee be the agreed to and that the Town Clerk do give such notice accordingly.

- 2-Chairs—Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to expend the sum of £15 in the purchase of a number of chairs at Cavendish House suitable for both indoor and open air concerts.
- 3-Admission of Subscribers to Concerts in Montpellier Gardens—Resolved, That the subscribers to the Montpellier Gardens be at once notified by post-card from the Borough Surveyor that on every occasion when concerts, to which subscribers have the right of admission, are held in the Gardens the conditions printed on the Subscription Card as to its production before entrance will be strictly enforced.

- 5-Illumination of Montpellier Gardens—The Concert Sub-Committee recommended that for the purposes of entertainments the Mont-Paler Gardens should be illuminated by means of small coloured electric

incandescent lamps placed in festoons along the boundary of the outside paths encircling the Montpellier Gardens. the cost of which was estimated by the Electrical Engineer as follows, viz, :—£850 for establishment and £1 per night for maintenance, calculated upon the basis of illuminating the Gardens three nights a week for 26 weeks between the beginning of April and end of September. Resolved. That the recommendation of the Sub-Committee be approved and adopted, the scheme to be carried out in accordance with the plan and estimate of the Electrical Engineer at an initial cost not exceeding £1,000. and that the Finance Committee be requested to decide in what manner the -capital expenditure should be provided.

6-User of Pittville Pump Room for Meeting of Sanitary Inspectors' Association—A letter from Councillor Bence, Chairman of the Public Health Committee, was read, stating that on the 1st of July next the Western Branch of the above-mentioned Association intend to hold their Annual Meeting in Cheltenham, and applying for the free use on their behalf of the Pittville Pump Room and Garden on that day. Resolved. That the application be acceded to.

7-Dancing in Winter Garden—A letter was read from Mr. Geo. Hawkins. lessee of the Promenade Assembly Rooms, at corner of :Regent Street and Ormond Place, advocating the provision at the Winter Garden during the ensuing season of popular dances, and offering to render assistance in their promotion or to undertake the sole management on behalf of the Committee. Resolved. That at present the Council are not prepared to entertain the proposal.

8-Issue of Cheap Railway Tickets for Entertainments—Letters from the Midland and Great Western Railway Companies were read stating that they were unable to comply with the re-quest made to them to issue cheap return tickets from the neighbouring twins to accommodate visitors to the entertainments promoted by the Corporation

9-Advertising in Steamship Guides—A letter was read from the International Advertising Agency, Limited, suggesting that an Advertisement of the town should be inserted in the Official Guides of the sixteen leading Steamship Companies published Ike: them. Resolved, That the Council do not consider it necessary to advertise the town in the manner suggested.

10-Referenc to The Town in the Sanitary Record Diary -A letter was read from the Assistant Secretary of the Sanitary Record stating that the 17th edition of the Sanitary Record Diary was being prepared for publication, and the cost of insertion of the Notice of Cheltenham in the list of Health Resorts as before would be 4s. which would include a voucher copy of the Diary post free. Resolved. To authorise insertion of the Notice in the new edition.

11-ladies Bicycle Gymkhana--An application Was received from Colonel heir for the exclusive use of Montpellier Gardens for two days in the first week of June next, to be subsequently decided upon, for holding a Ladies' Bicycle Gymkhana, the profits of which would be devoted to the Eye, Ear and Throat Infirmary. Resolved, That the application be acceded to at a charge of 10 guineas subject to rebate in case of bad weather, that the requisite notice for closing the Gardens to the subscribers be given, and that the ladies intending to ride be allowed to make use of the Winter Garden free of charge for an hour one day a week for drilling purposes only for so long previously to the entertainment as shall be required.

12-Badminton in Winter Gardens--Resolved, That books of tickets of admission to the Winter Garden for playing Badminton be issued to the three clubs, managed respectively by Colonel Leir, Mr. Currie. and Mr.

Adams, at a reduction of 33 1/3 per cent., the gentlemen mentioned to account at intervals for the price of the tickets issued to the members of their respective Clubs.

WATER COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Wednesday, the 21st day of September, 1898 Present: Councillors Baker, Bence, Dix, M. Davis, Ll. Davies, and Margrett (Councillor Margrett in the chair)—

1–Borough Engineer's Report—The Borough Engineer reported as follows:

On the 20th instant the supply from Hewletts and Northfield Springs was 71 gallons, the average for the last four years being 62 gallons per minute; and the quantity of water in store at Hewletts and Leckhampton was 5,821,301 gallons.

On the 20th inst. the depth of water in Dowdeswell Reservoir was 17 feet 10 inches and the contents 36,621,685 gallons, giving a total of 42,442,986 gallons, or about 35 days' supply, exclusive of the daily yield of the springs, which is now about 191,488 gallons.

The owner of Staverton Court, Lieut.-Colonel James St. Clair, has renewed the application for an extension of the main at Heydon Hill to Staverton Court. He agrees to pay the sum of £120 and his tenant to pay the ordinary water charges. This extension will considerably facilitate the supply to Heydon Knoll and cottages as well as some other houses. I am arranging to commence the work on Monday next so as to be ready by the end of the month.

Resolved, That the report be approved and the extension therein mentioned be made on the terms stated.

2-- Hydrants in Tewkesbury—A letter was read from the Town Clerk of Tewkesbury stating that his Council were desirous that two sluice valve hydrants should be erected on the 7-inch main in High Street, Tewkesbury, in positions specified, and stating that an existing hydrant near Messrs. Collins and Godfrey's works would be almost useless in case of fire, and should be removed to a more convenient position, and that all the hydrants in the town should be put into a proper state of repair. He presumed that the Cheltenham Town Council would see to this being done.

Resolved, That Mr. Badham be informed that the Council are prepared to provide and fix the ordinary hydrants for fire extinguishing purposes when and where required by the Tewkesbury Town Council subject to the provisions of the Water Acts and to the payment by them of £6 per cent. on the cost of so doing and of 1s per annum for maintenance in respect of each hydrant, but that this Committee wish for further information as to what is meant by "sluice valve hydrants" and for what purpose such are required.

3-Water Supply to Cotham Fields Infants' School—A letter was read from Miss Woodard, the Treasurer of the Coltham Fields Infants' School, stating that she believed it was usual in Cheltenham not to charge voluntary schools a water rate, that such a rate had been paid by the school in question up to June this year, and that she would be glad if they could be relieved from it in future. Resolved, That Miss Woodard be informed that voluntary schools in Cheltenham do pay for the water they consume, and that her school can be supplied by meter on the same terms if desired.

4-Water Supply Keynshambury "—Mr. A. H. Smith attended this meeting of the Committee by special permission and stated this case with regard to the fittings and the refusal of the Borough Surveyor to lay on the water which he only required for the purpose of cleaning, the fittings not being in accordance with the regulations.

Resolved, That Mr. Smith be informed that the water will be turned on for cleaning purposes as required for one month on the understanding that at the expiration of that time or prior to the letting of the house, whichever first happens, the necessary alterations in the fittings be made.

Resolved, That the attention of the Gas Company be called to the inferior quality of the gas as regards purity, as shown by the above report.

4—Gas Inspector's Report—The Gas Inspector reported that the hourly average consumption of Gas per lamp during the previous month had been 4.2783 cubic feet.

5—Lamp Book—This Book was produced and examined. Lamps extinguished, 4 metered, and 9 unmetered.

6—Lighting of Swindon Road—Letters were read from Mr. Alfred Cook, of Chosen View, Swindon Road, and Mr. W. J. Cypher of Horwood Lodge, Swindon Road, calling attention to the need of two or three lamps on the Swindon Road On the West side of the Railway Bridge. Resolved, To adjourn consideration of the matter pending a visit by the Committee.

7—Lighting of Urinal behind Wine and Spirit Vaults, St. George's Place-Resolved, To instruct the Electrical Engineer to have an incandescent light ordered for this urinal fixed at once.

8—Lighting at Corner of Devonshire Street —A suggestion having been made that a gas lamp be placed at the corner of Devonshire Street, Resolved, To adjourn consideration of the matter pending a visit by the Committee.

9—Electrical Engineer's Report-The Electrical Engineer reported that the number of customers then connected was 269, equivalent to about 16,140 eight c.p. lamps, and that the number of arcs in use was 121.

He estimated the cost of lighting by arcs the roads and streets hereinafter mentioned as follows, viz.: —

- (a) College Road from High Street to Sandford Road, from College Road to Bath Road, Bath Parade (1 arc) and St. Luke's Road (2 arcs). £1,300 for 15 arc lamps, those in College Road to be suspended over the road.
- (b) Suffolk Square (North side), Suffolk Parade, and Great Norwood Street from Montpellier Terrace to the Railway Inn. £860 for 13 arc lamps.
- (c) Priory Lawn Road, arc lamp, £55.

He had an application for supply of current to a house necessitating an extension of low pressure cable along Thirlestaine Road from the College Junior Department to College Lawn, the cost of which would be about £115, and he reported that at the request of the Chairman of the Concert Sub-Committee of the Town Improvement Committee he had worked out a scheme and estimate for illuminating the path encircling the Montpellier Gardens by means of small electric lamps, and that the Town Improvement Committee would probably require him to issue the necessary specifications and supervise the work of providing an installation as aforesaid. The additional demand occasioned thereby would be from 20 to 25 kilowatts which would produce at 3d. per unit about 6s per hour's use. Resolved, That the report be approved, that the streets and roads referred to be lit as therein mentioned, that the extensions therein referred to be carried out, that the Electrical Engineer be authorised to comply with the request of the Town Improvement Committee, that a shelter over the yard in Manchester Street at a cost of £50 be erected, and that application to the Local Government Board he made to sanction an additional loan of £2,500 to provide for the expenditure referred to above and contingencies.

10— Lighting Corner by Roderic House—A Memorial from T. James and seven others was read calling attention to the insufficient lighting of this corner and suggesting that an electric arc light should be erected there. Resolved, To inform the memorialists that the Committee propose to light Suffolk Parade and Great Norwood Street with electric lamps, and the lighting at the corner referred to will then be improved.

- 1-Chairman In the absence of the Chairman, Alderman Norman was appointed Chairman at this meeting.
- 2-Report of Superintendent of Fire Brigade The Superintendent of the Fire Brigade reported that on the 28th ulto. the Brigade was called to a fire at No. 82, High Street, which resulted in damage estimated at £50, and he had sent the account for extinction expenses, amounting to £3 5s. 0d., to the London and Lancashire Fire Office, in which the building and contents were insured.

Also on the 5th inst. to a fire at the Model Bakery of George's, Limited, Bedford Buildings, which resulted in damage estimated at £200. and that he had sent the account for the extinction expenses, amounting to £3 2s. 6d., to the Queen's Insurance Office, in which the buildings and contents were insured.

He also reported that the tunics of the uniforms were in a very bad condition, having been in use since September, 1890, and he had obtained a tender from Messrs. Hebbert and Co., Limited, 16, James Street, Haymarket, London, who would supply new ones at a total cost of £33 14s. 0d.

That he had obtained tenders from Messrs. Slader and Son, of Bath Street, and Mr. H. Harris, of Royal Well Place, for the supply of furniture required for the new room at the Station, and he recommended that two additional spreading nozzles of aluminium be obtained from Messrs. John Morris and Sons, of Cross Lane, Manchester, at a cost of £3 each. Resolved, That the Sub-Committee be requested to investigate and bring up a recommendation with regard to the Superintendent's suggestion that new tunics should be provided, that the tenders for the furniture be referred to the Sub-Committee to select, and that the Sub-Committee be requested to consider the Superintendent's recommendation to purchase the two additional nozzles before mentioned.

- 3 –Drivers Licenses—Applications for drivers' licenses were received from Thomas Gabb, James C. Hearn, and Arthur Liddiard. Resolved. That the same be granted.
- 4.--License Transfers from Landaus to Open Carriages Applications were received from Arthur Fryer, Henry Workman, and A. Spreadbury, holders of licenses for landaus, for transfer of same to open carriages. Resolved, That the applications be acceded to, subject as to Fryer's to approval by the Chairman of the substituted vehicle.

5-Hansom Cab Licenses—Memorials and letters from several persons were read objecting to the proposal of the Committee to grant hansom cab licenses to Mr. Cook.

Letters were read from Robert Fowles, of No. 2, Great Norwood Street, and G. H. Fowles, of Lansdown Stables, applying for hansom cab licenses. Resolved, That the Committee recommend the granting of hansom cab licenses, not exceeding 20 in number, and that two be now granted to Mr. Cook and one each to Robert Fowles and G. H. Fowles on condition that the vehicles are regularly plying for hire by the 1st January next, and that the Resolution to Minute No. 1 of this Committee's proceedings of date the 8th January, 1897, be varied accordingly.

6-Hackney Carriage Licenses—The Street Inspector reported that Samuel Hill had been twice convicted of offences against the Hackney Carriage Bye-Laws within 12 months.

Applications were received as follows, viz.: From W. P. Jones for a license for a brougham.

From F. Bishop for a hackney carriage or pony carriage license.

From G. H. Fowles for a landau license, and from

George Clifford for a hackney carriage license. Resolved, To inform the applicants their requests cannot be acceded to, as they are no vacancies for licenses other than hansom cab licenses.

Letters were read from George Clifford, F. Paynter, and John Morgan advocating free trade for carriage proprietors, and from F. Jones reminding the Committee he was first on the list and should be granted a license before C. Cook.

7-Report of Market Sub-Committee --The Market Sub-Committee reported that they had considered what arrangements could be made for performance of the duties of Collector and Attendant at the Market, and they resolved to recommend that the Public Health Committee be requested to permit Mr. C. Marshall, the attendant at the Abattoir, to take entire charge of the Market and collect the Tolls, and that he be paid therefor 2s 6d per week in addition to his present wages, and that the Borough Surveyor be authorised to provide him with such further assistance as may be required in cleaning up and at Fair times. Resolved, That the recommendation of the Sub-Committee be approved and adopted.

8-Workmen's Insurance--The Town Clerk reported that he had been unable to obtain from the Lancashire Insurance Company such a form of Policy as he considered necessary to cotter the risk which the Corporation desired to insure against, as the Company had declined to consent to the alterations and additions which he had made in the form which the Company said they were prepared to grant and which they would not consent to vary.

He reported that he had communicated with a number of Corporations to ascertain what other Town Councils were doing in the matter, and a considerable number had replied to the effect that they had not as yet insured against the risk, and intended to wait until the Workmen's Compensation Act had been in operation some time in order to ascertain its effect. Resolved To allow the matter to remain in abeyance for the present pending consideration by the Finance Committee of question of formulating a Scheme of Self Insurance and to enable the Town Clerk to make further enquiries.

He also reported that the contract for the supply of coal would expire on 1st December next.

Ashes Collection—Van loads, 574; consumed at Destructor, 599 tons 12 cwt. Resolved, That tenders for the supply of coal for six months, from the 1st December next, be advertised for.

5—Destructor —The question of improving the present arrangements for destruction of raise at the Ash Destructor was considered. Resolved, That the following Report be presented to the Council on the subject: "On the 15th day of September last your Committee visited Manchester, and, by appointment, they were met by Mr. Wilson, one of the Directors of the firm of Messrs. W. F. Mason, Limited, the patentees of the Destructor upon which your Committee were instructed to report.

Your Committee received from Mr. Wilson a very full and clear explanation of the scientific principles which have led to the present design.

On the following morning your Committee visited the Works of the Manchester Corporation in Water Street, and there saw in operation two forms of Destructor, one having moveable bars for mechanical clinkering. They then visited the Destructor at Moss Side, which was in ordinary operation; no smoke was visible any portion of the time your Committee were at the Works, although wet and offensive refuse was being thrown into the furnace at regular intervals.

The furnace consists of a brick chamber of any convenient size, but usually about five or six feet square, and seven to eight feet in height. The bottom is formed by a water trough into which the clinker falls after passing through the furnace and from which the clinker is removed in a cold state-in marked contrast to the removal of clinker from all other forms of Destructor. The fire is from four to five feet in depth, and is blown by a steam jet which draws in such quantity of air as will combine with the carbon in the refuse to produce carbonic oxide. Around the furnace are a number of air passages, the air circulating through these passages becomes heated, and at point near the top of the down flue, just below the gas valve, the heated air is

brought into contact with the carbonic oxide, resulting in a flame with an intense heat, considerably above 2,000 deg. Fahr., the products passing off' as invisible gases and absolutely without smoke or smell.

A model in the possession of the Borough Surveyor shows generally the arrangements, and a plan shows how the present Destructors may be so modified as to adapt them to the new process.

One important advantage of this system is shown on the plan, viz., that the gas may be conveyed to the boilers at the Generating Station of the Electric Light Works without material loss of heating power, therefore no special boiler will be required for utilising the Destructor heat.

Your Committee are satisfied that the process offers considerable advantages in many respects over the present form of Destructor, especially that it realises all the possible heat value in the refuse, and relieves the men from a dangerous and arduous occupation.

Judging by the quantity of refuse dealt with by one man, the labour charges will certainly not be greater than at present, and probably materially less.

Your Committee recommend that two cells be erected on the site of the existing cremators as an experiment, and that they be tried for three months in ordinary work, and, should the result prove satisfactory, as your Committee believe will be the case, at the end of that time such number of the present cells be converted to Mason's system, as, from the experience gained by your Committee during this period, shall be deemed necessary for dealing with the whole of the refuse of the town."

6---Utilisation of Clinker at Destructor—The Borough Surveyor presented the following Report:

I desire to bring to your notice the difficulties we are now experiencing in the removal of clinker from the Refuse Destructor, and also from the Electric Lighting Station.

The demand has fallen off materially, and the quantity now accumulated is larger than I see any immediate prospect of dealing with.

With a view to solving the problem I have experimented in various ways, the most promising being the manufacture of bricks, of which I submit herewith a sample. The process consists in breaking the clinker small and then grinding it with a small proportion of Has lime to the consistency of rough mortar; moulding this mortar roughly to the form of bricks. partially drying them, and then pressing them. The brick before you was pressed in an ordinary handpress by one man, consequently a better quality of brick could be produced if steam power were applied.

The quantity of clinker we have available would be equivalent to an output of 3,000 bricks per day. There is very little doubt that this quantity would be readily absorbed if sold at a price to compete with the ordinary burnt clay brick, and that this can be done I have no doubt, the cost of producing them being less than one pound (£1) per thousand.

I do not consider they would be adapted for face work but for foundations, particularly in damp soil where they would continue to harden; for inside walls and similar purposes they would answer every purpose of the ordinary burnt brick, and in some respects be superior to the ordinary local brick.

I find that various patents have been taken for the manufacture of bricks in some similar manner, but I think that at the present time no one has any exclusive right, though there may be some right in the methods of manufacture, appliances used, and the like.

I am not in a position at present to say what the cost of Plant would be, but wish to put the proposal before you prior to incurring any expense for further work in preparing the necessary estimates of cost. I think you may rest assured that it would not exceed £1,000.

Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor do bring up an estimate of the cost of plant, &c.

7-Grosvenor Terrace-Resolved That the Borough Surveyor do repair the road and footpaths in Grosvenor Terrace.

8-Sydenham Road South—The letter read at the last meeting of the Council and referred to this Committee from Messrs. Simmonds and Kilbey, owners of property in Sydenham Road South, asking that a conference should take place between the Street and Highway Committee and the owners before anything is decided as to the repairs was laid before this Committee. Resolved, That the writers be referred to the resolution of this Committee approved by the Council at its last meeting.

9—Bath Terrace Private Improvement Expenses-A memorial and letters were read from John Hill, Clement Press, George Tillott, and other owners of property abutting on Bath Terrace, objecting to the apportionment, as the street had been taken over by the Commissioners years ago, and asking the Committee to reconsider the matter. Resolved, That the further consideration of the matter be adjourned pending a view by the Committee.

10 -Opening Road without proper Notice-The Borough Surveyor reported that on the 28th ultimo Mr. Amos Wilson, Builder, Swindon Road, had opened the road in Manchester Street for the purpose of laying on water, the notice of intention to open the road not being given until some hours after that had been done and the electric cable bared in so doing. Resolved, That the Town Clerk do write to Mr. Wilson and inform him that should such an offence be again committed by him proceedings will immediately be taken.

11-Street works-The tenders sent in in response to the advertisement with respect to the execution of works of street improvement were opened and found to be as follows, viz

13-High Street Pavement—A letter was read from Lieut.-General Morton, of 2, Priory Parade, calling attention to the deplorable state of the pavements in the High Street on Sundays, Mondays and Fridays, partly owing to dogs and partly to persons spitting all over the place, and suggesting that late on Saturday nights and early on Monday and Friday mornings the pavements in the High Street should be swilled with water and men should follow with swabs. Resolved, That General Morton be thanked for his suggestion and informed that the Committee will give their attention to the matter so as to remove the cause of complaint.

14-Land adjoining No. 1, Hatherley Place —A letter was read from Mr. E. L. Cave, Solicitor, Bromyard, on behalf of his client, the owner of No. 1, Hatherley Place, asking whether the Council had any objection to a strip of land adjoining the house at present unenclosed but belonging to his client being enclosed with a railing or built upon, as the tenants complained that the land was a nuisance to the house as it was. PUBLIC HEALTH COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, the 10th day of October, 1898—Present: Alderman Norman, Councillors Bence, M. Davis, Gurney, Margrett, Moles and Waghorne (Councillor Bence in the chair)—

1-Zymotic Disease—The Medical Officer of Health reported that since the last meeting there had been notified 13 cases of Scarlet Fever, 2 of Diphtheria, and 3 of Enteric Fever; that 12 cases of Scarlet Fever had been sent into the Delancey Hospital, and that the number of cases then in that Hospital sent in by the Corporation was 26 of Scarlet Fever and 1 of Diphtheria.

2-Unsound Meat—The Medical Officer of Health reported that a carcase of mutton with offal was taken at the Abattoir on September 23rd, and having been condemned by a Magistrate was destroyed.

3-Smoke Nuisance—The Inspector of Nuisances reported that he had observed dense black smoke being emitted from the chimney of Messrs. Smith Bros, Timber Merchants, Leckhampton, on October 7th, in such quantities as to be a nuisance. Resolved, That Notice under section 94 of the Public Health Act be served upon Messrs. Smith Bros. requiring them to abate the nuisance.

4-W.C's without Flushing Apparatus --The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses having w.c's without flushing apparatus. Resolved, That Notices under Section 28 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, be given to the owners requiring them to provide the necessary flushing apparatus, and to the occupiers to lay on a proper supply of water thereto, and that in default of compliance with such notices proceedings be taken for the penalties.

5—Houses without proper As Receptacles—The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of houses which had no proper ashpits or ash receptacles. Resolved, That the necessary Notices be given to the respective Owners under Sec. 36 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and Sec. 27 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, requiring them in each case to provide a moveable ash receptacle of such size, pattern, and construction as may be approved by the Borough Surveyor on behalf of the Corporation.

6-Cleansing and Limewashing at Tulloch's Cottage, No. 44, St. George's Street, and No. 1, Tivoli Works Cottages-The Medical Officer of Health having certified under Sec. 46 of the Public Health Act that the above-named dwelling houses were in such a filthy and unwholesome condition that the health of the inmates was affected or endangered thereby. Resolved, That Notice be given to the owners under the said Section requiring the houses to be cleansed and limewashed.

7—Overcrowding at No. 2, Witcombe Place—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the premises above mentioned were so overcrowded as to be dangerous or injurious to the health of the inmates. Resolved, That the Committee being satisfied of the existence of a nuisance at the said premises, owing to the same being overcrowded, Notices under Section 94 of the Public Health Act be served on the owners and occupiers thereof requiring them to abate the same.

8-Insanitary Property at Gilthorne Cottage, Hewlett Road, No. 3, Portland Street, and No. 1, Tivoli Works Cottages—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the premises above-mentioned were in such a state as to be injurious to the health of the inmates owing to defective roofs, traps, w.c's, &c. Resolved, That the Council being satisfied that the said premises are in such a state as to be injurious to health, Notices under Sec. 94 of the Public Health Act, 1875, be served upon the Owners requiring them to put the same into a healthy condition, and for that purpose to carry out the works specified in the Notices.

9-Defective Drainage at No. 1 Hatherley Place, Stone Cottage, Gainsboro House, No. 4, Bayshill Parade, No. 4, Malvern Cottages and No. 33, Worcester Street —The Inspector of Nuisances having made written application under Sec. 41 of the Public Health Act, stating that the drains, &c,, on or belonging to the abovenamed houses were in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health. Resolved, That authority be given to the inspector of Nuisances to open the ground, examine the drains, and, if necessary, give the notices and act as provided by the said section.

10-Insanitary Urinal at Tivoli Ale and Porter Stores —The Medical Officer of Health reported that this Urinal was in such a state as to be a nuisance and injurious to health, owing to want of a water supply. Resolved,

That Notice under Sec. 94 of the Public Health Act be served upon the owners requiring them to abate the nuisance, and for that purpose to lay on a water supply to flush the urinal.

11-Inspection of Dairies, Farms, &c., Supplying Milk to College Boarding Houses-The Medical Officer of Health reported that at the places from which milk supplied to the College Boarding Houses is derived, and he laid before the Committee a copy of a Report he had made to Mr. Laffan thereon. inspected all the Painswick request of the Principal of the College he had made to Mr. Laffan thereon.

12-Wells at No. 56, Winchcomb Street, No. 13 Granville Street, Granville House, No. 4, Courtenay Villas, and Mews--The Medical Officer of Health reported that the water in these wells was used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, and was so polluted as to be injurious to health. Resolved, That proceedings under See. 70 of the Public Health Act be taken to obtain orders for these wells to be closed.

13-Notices not Complied with --The Medical Officer of Health handed in a list of Notices to carry out sanitary requirements which had been served but not complied with. Resolved, To instruct the Town Clerk to take proceedings to compel compliance with the notices.

14-Mackintosh for Disinfesting Resolved, That a new mackintosh be purchased for inspector Juries for use during disinfecting.

15-Re-appointment of Medical Officer of Health -The Medical Officer of Health reported that the present term of his appointment had expired, and requesting; if re-appointed that it might be permanently instead of for three years, and that his salary might be increased. Resolved, That consideration of the application increase of salary be adjourned, but that the Chairman do give notice at the next meeting of the Council of his intention to move that Dr. Garrett be permanently re-appointed Medical Officer of Health.

16-Public Health Supervision at Brockhampton—Resolved, To instruct the Town Clerk to call the attention of the Counts- Council to the necessity of making some provision for the supervision of the Public Health at Brockhampton, being a place from which milk is brought into Cheltenham for sale.

17-Sewerage Loan- A letter from the Local Government Board was read stating that they considered that the present arrangements for the treatment and disposal of sewage are unsatisfactory, that the management of the sewage farms should be entirely in the hands of the Corporation, and requesting the Council to take this into their immediate consideration with the view of determining the present arrangements for disposing of the sewage and taking the entire management of the sew age farms into their own hands. Also that the Council might consider the expediency of making use of alumino ferric or lime at the sewage works before the sewage is taken to the farms, and that the Board would defer further consideration of the application before them until they have been informed what course the Council propose to take in the matter. The Town Clerk read the draft of a letter which he proposed to write in reply, to the effect that the Council regret that the Board intend to delay the consideration of the application for the loan as above mentioned, having regard to the facts that upwards of £8,000 is urgently required for the reconstruction of sewers in the Borough, that £1,500 of it is for carrying out work which will tend very materially to abate any nuisance to the neighbourhood arising from the farms, and that £2,600 is urgently required for the reconstruction of the outfall sewer to the Barn Farm. That the Council will give the suggestions of the Board most serious and earnest consideration, but that alteration in the management of the Farms cannot be made immediately as the leases cannot be determined before February and December, 1900, respectively. That the experience of

the Council and of their predecessors, the Improvement Commissioners, in the use of chemicals in the treatment of sewage was far from encouraging, and that the Council trusted that the Board would not delay giving their sanction to the borrowing of the amount applied for so that the Council may be in a position to deal with immediate and pressing difficulties. Resolved, That the draft reply of the Town Clerk be approved, and that as a first step towards meeting the suggestions of the Local Government Board the present tenancies of the Sewage Farms be determined at the earliest possible dates with a view to the Council taking the entire control of the farms into their own hands.

18-Nuisance from Sewage Farms —A letter from the Clerk to the County Council was read stating that complaints had been received as to the nuisance cawed by alleged imperfect system of sewage drainage in use in connection with the Sewage Farms of the Corporation and consequent pollution of the streams, ponds and ditches in the neighbourhood of the Farms, and stating that unless the Corporation take such steps to abate the nuisance as shall be considered sufficient to deal with the matter the County Council will be obliged to take proceedings under the Rivers Pollution Prevention Acts. Resolved, To inform the County Council that the Corporation have hitherto used the best practicable and available means of rendering harmless the sewage matter of their Borough, but the Town Council, at the instance of the Local Government Board, are now considering whether the existing system cannot be improved.

19—Sewage Disposal—A letter from Mr. J. F. Trew, C.E., was read stating that if the Committee would like to inspect the Sewage Farm tanks in use on the Northern Drainage of the Rural District Council of Gloucester he would be pleased to arrange for them to visit the Works. Resolved, To request the Borough Surveyor to accept the invitation for himself and report to the Committee.

20—Meeting of Western Branch Sanitary Inspectors' Association —A letter was read from Mr. T. J. Moss-Flower, Hon. Secretary of this Association, expressing thanks to the Council for the invitation to the Association to hold their next Annual Meeting in Cheltenham.

- 21-Market Attendant—Resolved, To inform the General Purposes and Watch Committee that this Committee regret that Mr. Marshall, the Attendant at the Abattoir, cannot be spared to look after the Market as well, and to suggest that pending the appointment of a new Street Inspector this matter should remain in abeyance.
- 22-Charges for Slaughtering at Abattoir -A letter vas read from Mr. J. C. Green, Butcher of No. 102, Albion Street, applying for a fixed charge to be made to him for his slaughtering at the Abattoir, and that he would prefer a separate house. Resolved, To inform Mr. Green that the Council cannot consent to compound their charges, and that the Committee are contemplating the erection of more slaughter houses, when his application for a separate one shall receive consideration.
- 23-Sanitary Requirements at No. 12, St. George's Street —A letter was read from Mr. C. Pontin asking to be excused carrying out certain sanitary requirements at these premises on the ground of poverty, as he was not the owner of Property. Resolved, To adjourn consideration of the matter pending enquiry by the Medical Officer of Health.
- 24-Barn Farm--A letter from Mr. Corbett was read stating that he would be glad if the Committee would pay a visit to the Farm with a view to an early settlement of the matter concerning the pipe to Rule Meadow Patch.

25-Plans-The plans of proposed new buildings which had been approved by the Street and Highway Committee were laid before this Committee. Resolved, That as regards sanitary matters the same be approved.

37-Smoke Nuisance at Original Brewery-The Inspector of Nuisances reported that dense black smoke was emitted from the chimney at the Original Brewery on the 10th and 25th inst. Resolved, That the Committee being satisfied of the existence of a nuisance, Notices be served on the Original Brewery Company under Sec. 94 of the Public Health Act, 1875, requiring them to abate the same.

38-Sanitary Requirements at 12, St. George's Street-with reference to the letter read at the last meeting of the Committee from Mr. C. Pontin, asking to be excused from carrying out certain sanitary work at No. 12, St. George's Street, the Medical Officer of Health having reported thereon, Resolved, That Mr. Pontin be informed that the Notices must be complied with.

39 -Sanitary Work at Nos. 202 and 202 ½, High Street-The Medical Officer of Health reported that the Sanitary work for which Notices had been served on the owners had been carried out by the Corporation, the owners not having executed the same within the time specified in the Notices. 41—Scarlet Fever--The Medical Officer of Health reported that, owing to a rapid increase in the number of scarlet fever cases notified during the past two or three weeks, the Delancey Hospital was filled to its full capacity with such cases. Of these 46 had been sent in by the Corporation, and others from Charlton Kings, the Rural District and private subscribers. Nearly every case notified had been sent into Hospital, but as it was probable that other notifications might be received before vacancies in the Hospital occurred it was necessary to consider the possibility of providing additional hospital accommodation. There was an iron and wood structure belonging to the Corporation which had never yet been used, and which was intended for the reception of small-pox cases. This might now be brought into use, but an addition of a kitchen and a bath and hot water supply would have to be made to it, as it is too far from the main administrative building of the Delancey Hospital to be served from that, and it was advisable that the permanent Small-Pox Hospital itself should be entirely reserved for small-pox.

Resolved, That the recommendations of the Medical Officer of Health be approved and carried into effect forthwith by the Borough Surveyor.

1—Report of Water Engineer—The Water Engineer reported that on the 12th inst. the supply from Hewletts and Northfield Springs was 64 gallons, the average for the last four years being 61 gallons per minute; and the quantity of water in store at Hewletts and Leckhampton was 5,412,542 gallons.

On the 11th inst. the depth of water in Dowdeswell Reservoir was 14 feet 73 inches and the contents 25,769,662 gallons, which gave a total of 31,182,204 gallons, or about 31 days' supply, exclusive of the daily yield of the springs, which was then about 173,624 gallons.

He further reported that Mr. G. F. Hough, the tenant of garden land at Sandford, requested permission to put up an iron shed there, 170 feet from the Keynsham Road Resolved, That the application be granted provided Mr. Hough will agree to pay an additional rent of £1 per annum.

He also reported that the slack coal delivered at the Sandford Mead Pumping Station by Messrs. Harris and Co., the con-tractors, was so fine and dirty that it had been almost impossible to maintain steam with it. That it would be desirable to use some other slack or engine coal instead of that contracted for, and he recommended that an offer made by Messrs. Harris and Co. to supply engine coal from New Bowson Colliery at list price, and deliver same to Sandford and the Baths at an additional cost of 1s per ton, or 10s 9d per ton,

delivered. Resolved, That having regard to the special need for obtaining at this time the utmost efficiency from the pumping machinery at Sandford, the offer of Messrs. Harris and Co. to supply New Bowson engine coal at 10s 9d per ton (delivered) be accepted for the period remaining unexpired of their contract.

2—Cost of Water Connection with Main--A Mr. Mansfield, of Tivoli Street, appeared to make an application to be relieved from having to pay the cost of laying a service pipe across the road to connect his house with the main, and also for compensation for extra expense incurred by the service pipe having been, in the first instance, connected with the wrong main. - 12—Electrical Engineer's Report—The Electrical Engineer reported that a good start had been made with cable laying for the Lansdown and Gloucester Road extensions, and that he would be able to give supply to intending customers in Lansdown Road within a few days. He asked whether the Committee wished him to lay cable along Shelburne Road as far as Dean Close School when the Lansdown Road extension was completed, and he laid before the Committee estimates of the cost of some small extensions, viz. :—
- (a) Portland Street and Clarence Road—from Winchcomb Street Sub-Station for 200 yards—to supply Mr. Bence's house, Maisonette. The cost of this extension is £61.
- (b) Mountpleasant—from Winchcomb Street for 200 yards. This is sufficient to supply Mr. Bence's shop, and the cost will be £65.
- (c) Christ Church Road (East side) for 200 yards, to supply Glendronach, and the cost of which is £65.
- (d) Thirlestaine Road from Ravensworth to the Old Bath Road—to supply Cotswold. Thus extension is about 150 yards and will cost £55.
- (e) Bennington Street—from High Street for 100 yards--to supply Mr. Poole. The cost of this would be £40.

At the next meeting he would bring tip estimates of the costs of other small extensions, for which he had not yet received the formal applications, and of the costs of some small sub-stations which were necessary, and that as regards application to the Local Government Board, the before mentioned extensions might very well be taken with those he would put before the Committee at the next meeting.

The account of the Brigade extinction expenses (£7 8s. 0d.) had been sent in to the owner, Mr. Richard Jones, of No, 29, Townsend Street, at whose personal request the Brigade, as well as the Norwich Union Fire Brigade, Gloucester, attended.

STREET AND HIGHWAY COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Tuesday, the 15th day of November, 1898— Present Councillors Baker, Bence, Cypher, M. Davis, Margrett and Mills (Councillor Baker in the chair)—

1—Chairman --Resolved, That Councillor Baker be appointed Chairman of this Committee for the ensuing year.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Monday, the 28th day of November, 1898—Present The Mayor; Alderman Haddon; Councillors Baker, Bence, Cypher, M. Davis, Dix, Margrett, and Mills (Councillor Baker in the chair)—

2-The View—The following Members of the Committee attended the View Meeting on the previous Friday, viz:—Alderman Haddon; Councillors Baker, Cypher, Davis, and Margrett.

3—Street Projections—The Street Inspector reported that at Norfolk House near the Colosseum, Bath Road, a small sign had been put without permission at the entrance, 7ft. above the footway and projecting 15 inches.

A letter was read from Mrs. G. Brawn, stating that the sign at Norfolk House had been put up by her in ignorance that the permission of the Council should have been first obtained, and asking for permission for it to remain.

Also one from M. Ward, on behalf of Messrs. Mc Loughlin Bros., asking permission to fix a gas rail outside No. 94, High Street.

Also one from Mr. J. J. Banks, stating he had an electric pendant in the doorway of No. 57, Promenade Villas which might, as

it was reversible, at times project a few inches beyond the doorway, and asking permission to use it in that way when so required. Resolved, That the sign at Norfolk House be allowed to remain subject to its position being altered so as to raise it 8 feet clear from the footpath, and limit the projection to 12 inches. That the application of Mr. Ward be acceded to subject to the same conditions; and that consideration of the application of Mr. Banks be adjourned pending inspection by the Committee.

4—Underground Telephone Wires— A letter was read from Mr. W. E. L. 6—Footpaths in Royal Well Place and St. George's Place—A letter was read from the occupier of No. 7, Royal Well Place, calling attention to the very bad state of the guttering in Royal Well Place. Resolved, To instruct the Borough Surveyor to bring up a specification of the works required to be done by the abutting owners, to pave, edge and channel the footpaths on both sides of Royal Well Place, and on both sides of St. George's Place, except where already paved.

7—Borough Surveyor's Report—The Borough Surveyor reported that the work done by the Highways Department from the 15th October to the 25th November, both inclusive, had been as follows:—

Repaired with Wickwar—Spa Road (proceeding), Wellington Road, from Leamington Place to Pittville Lawn 750 super yards.

Patching—Albert Street, St. Paul's, Townsend Street, Fauconberg Road, Swindon Road.

Paving, Crossing, Kerb & Channelling—Albert Street, St. Paul's, Portland Street, Albion Street, back of Lansdown Place, Fairview Street, Queen Street, Lansdown Crescent, Montpellier Terrace, High Street, Russell Street, Winchcomb Street, Bath Street and Road, Lansdown Parade, Priory Terrace, Promenade, Gordon Lamp, Sherborne Street, St. George's Road, Great Norwood Street, Russell Place, Swindon Road, St. George's Place, St. James' Street, Suffolk Road, Tivoli Circus, Prestbury Road, Western Road, Hewlett Road, County Court Road.

Crossings had been re-laid in Winchcomb Street, bottom of Mountpleasant, Bath Street, Promenade opposite the Post Office, and Albion Street near Witcomb Place with MacDougall's patent bricks.

The Footpath in Hewlett Road had been laid with gravel from Brighton Road to Eldon Road.

Gullies had been re-built to replace defective ones, Shurdington Road 1, Suffolk Square 1, Albion Street 1, Gloucester Road 3, New Street 1. Winchcomb Street 1, Albert Street 1.

Trees had been pruned in the following Roads: -Park Place, Tivoli Road, The Park, Rodney Road, Moorend Park Road, St. George's Road, Malvern Road, High Street, Hewlett Road, College Road, Promenade, Christ Church Road, Queen's Road, Lansdown Place, Montpellier Walk.

The Ditch at Harp Hill had been laid with 12-inch pipes and levelled over the surface to form a path.

8-- Accident to Mr. J. W. Varnish—A letter was read from Mr. Varnish, of No. 49, James Street, Rugby, stating that on the 17th of September, he fell over a large stone embedded in the road close to the footpath in Winchcombe Street, near Mr. Jackson's shop at the junction of Winchcomb and Albion Streets, with the result that he broke his thigh, and was an in-patient at the Cheltenham Hospital for five weeks, that it would be a long time before he could resume his occupation as a carpenter, at which he earned 45s a week. He had a wife and children dependent upon him, and he had suffered and would continue to suffer considerable pain, damage, and loss, for which he thereby claimed compensation from the Council by reason of their act, negligence, or default, in placing or allowing to remain a dangerous obstacle in the public highway. Resolved, To adjourn consideration of the matter for the Town Clerk to report as to the liability (if any) of the Corporation.

9—Bath Terrace Private Improvement Expenses—With reference to objections received from John Hill, Clement Press, George Tillott, and other owners of property abutting on this street to the apportionment, as the street had been taken over by the Commissioners years ago, Resolved, That the memorialists be

informed no alteration can be made in the apportionment, and that they can see a detailed specification of the works done, at the Municipal Offices, on application to the Borough Surveyor.

10—Crossings opposite Ewlyn and Langdon Roads—A letter was read from Mr. A. G. Stockwell and nine others, calling attention to the very bad condition of the pathway or crossings opposite Ewlyn and Langdon Roads. Resolved, To inform Mr. Stockwell the crossings will be laid in due course.

11 -Telegraph Poles and Wires in Malvern Road—A notice was received from the Secretary of the General Post Office, that the Post-master General acting under the Powers conferred upon him by the Telegraph Acts, 1863 to 1892, was about to erect a line of Telegraph at Cheltenham, and was desirous of obtaining the consent of the Council to the erection and maintenance by the Department of two poles on the south side of the Malvern Road near Christ Church, and to cross the said road

with two wires near the railway bridge, and he undertook to make good any damage done in the maintenance thereof. Resolved, To adjourn consideration of the matter the execution of the work or Town Clerk to report as to the powers referred to.

12—Land adjoining No. 1, Hatherley Place —With reference to Minute No. 14 of the proceedings of this committee at their last meeting, a further letter from Mr. Cave, was read, stating that he withdrew his request for permission to build on the, land, as there is a sewer under it, and applying for permission to enclose it only, as he considered it would be an improvement to the street if the land were railed in. Resolved, That the Council are unable to accede to the application.

13-Ditch at Harp Hill A letter was read from Messrs. Ticehurst & Sons stating that they did not object to the work being done by piping and covering in this ditch, but on behalf of Mr. Agg Gardner whose land for about 100 yards abuts upon it, they claimed that the ditch so far belonged to him, and they could not admit that the land or pathway so formed belongs to the Corporation or any other person than win Agg Gardner, to which the Town Clerk had replied that the rule as to 3-ft, of land from the hedge belonging to the owner on whose land the hedge stands does not obtain in the carve of a fence forming the boundary of a highway, and that no fence or other encroachment can he made adjoining a highway which does not leave a clear 15-ft. between the centre of the highway and the fence, and the width of the road in question is as nearly as possible from the one side of the road to the roots of the hedge on Mr. Agg Gardner's side 30-ft, That the Corporation had no intention to infringe in any way on Mr. Agg Gardner's rights, and that he felt sure if Mr. Agg Gardner had any such rights he would waive them in consideration of the benefit that must result from the works being done not only to the public but to his own property. Resolved, That the reply of the Town Clerk be approved.

14—Trees in front of Flesk Lodge----A letter was read from Mr. N. W. Olive, stating that a resolution passed by the Council two years ago, to have the trees in front of Flesk Lodge, Wellington Square, lopped, had never been carried out, and suggesting that the semi evergreen oak standing in front of the gate entrance should be removed. Resolved, That the Council cannot comply with the suggestion.

15- Selkirk Parade--A letter from Mrs. White and other residents in Selkirk Parade, was read, asking that the name of the row of houses called Selkirk Parade should be conspicuously indicated at either end. Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to have a name plate put up at the south end of the row.

16—Cleveland Street Private Improvement Works---A memorial was received from John Belcher and five other owners of Linden Terrace, Cleveland Street, requesting that instead of Portland cement concrete slabs, blue ribbed bricks be used for the footpath, which they considered would last longer, would not be made use of by children for playing on, and would he less expensive. Resolved, That the Council are unable to make any alteration now as the contract for the work had been tendered for and a tender accepted.

17—Conveyance of Fish Offal--With reference to proceedings which had been taken by the Town Clerk in pursuance of instructions against Messrs. Olive and Olive in the County Court to recover the sum of £3 2s. 6d. for conveyance of fish offal from their premises, a letter from them was read, asking the Council to accept £2 2s. 0d. in discharge of the claim as other Fish-mongers in the town had not availed themselves of this means of removing their offal as much as was expected and consequently the proportion of the cost charged to Mews. Olive and Olive was considerably more than they anticipated. Resolved, That the amount offered, together with the court fees, be accepted in discharge of the claim.

18-Suffolk Road Improvement ---A letter was read from H. B. Wade, Solicitor for the owners of Roderic House, stating that he would accept service on behalf of his clients of notice of intended application by the Corporation for a Provisional Order, and stating that if the Council had any proposition to make he would consider it.

19---Gloucester Road Footpath- A letter was read from the Clerk to the County Council acknowledging receipt of letter from the Town Clerk asking the County Council to authorise the expenditure of £600 for the paving, &c., of the footpath on the West side of the Gloucester Road from the Midland Railway Station to Arle Road, and enquiring whether the expense should not be borne by the abutting owners under the Cheltenham Improvement Acts or the Public Health Act, 1875, and what the status, and history of the road are. To which the Town Clerk had replied that it was clear the abutting owners are not liable unless they are required to do the works by the Town Council, and the fact that it is a main road and as such repair-able by the County Council would form a very important element in the consideration of the question, and as the County Council are liable he did not think it likely the Town Council would require the abutting owners to do the work.

20-Moors Farm Boundary—A letter from the Town Clerk to Messrs. Ticehurst Sons, was read, with which he enclosed a plan showing where the Corporation would like to have the line of the new fence. The quantity of land required was 15 ½ perches, and the value of it putting it at £200 per acre would be £19 1s. 3d The estimate of the Borough Surveyor for an unclimbable iron fence 117 yards in length, and 5-feet 6-inches high, on a concrete base, is £58 10s 0d., and if their client would pay half the cost of the fence, and convey to the Corporation all his right and interest in the land indicated on the plan, it would be a fair settlement of the matter, and one that he would advise the Council to accept. Resolved, That the letter of the Town Clerk be approved.

- 21-King Street-Resolved, To instruct the Borough Surveyor to bring up a specification of the works required to be done by the abutting owners, to pave flag, edge, channel and metal this street.
- 22-Trinity Church Lane Resolved, To instruct the Borough Surveyor to bring up a specification of the works required to be done by the abutting owners, to asphalte, edge, channel and metal this street.
- 23-Oriel Road Footpath from New Club to Bath Road- Resolved. To instruct the Borough Surveyor to bring up a specification of the works required to be done by the abutting owners, to asphalte the path from the New

Club to the north-east corner of the Winter Garden, and to pave, edge, and channel from thence to Bath Road.

24-Hewlett Place Resolved, To instruct the Borough Surveyor to bring up a specification of the works required to be done by the abetting owners, to channel the road from Priory Street to Hewlett Street.

29-Wellington Passage—Resolved. To instruct the Borough Surveyor to have this street paved with McDougall's bricks, and the roads remetalled.

30-Footpaths in Bath Terrace and Commercial street Resolved, To instruct the Borough Surveyor to bring up a specification of t:te work required to be done to repave, edge, and channel the footpaths on both sides of Bath Street, West side of Commercial Street and North side of Bath Terrace from Bath Terrace to Upper Bath Street.

31-Roof over Yard at Portland Mews—A letter was read from F. - 1—Chairman—Councillor Bence was appointed Chairman of this Committee for the ensuing year.
- 2—Ambulance—Tenders for building the new ambulance required for Typhoid and Diphtheria cases were received from

Messrs. Mills and Sons, Winchcomb Street.

and the further consideration thereof was adjourned.

- 3--Temporary annexe to Delancey Hospital—Resolved, To instruct the Borough Surveyor to have complete Telephonic connection made between this annexe and the other Blocks.
- 4 —Zymotic Disease—The Medical Officer of Health reported that there had been notified since October 16th 53 cases of Scarlet Fever, 9 of Enteric Fever, and so of Diphtheria; that 37 cases of Scarlet Fever and 4 of Enteric Fever had been sent into the Delancey Hospital, and that the number of cases then in the Delancey Hospital sent in by the Corporation was 48 of Scarlet Fever, 4 of Diphtheria, and 2 of Enteric Fever. The Medical Officer of Health further reported that during the past month, since the last meeting of the Committee, there had been more Zymotic disease in the town than for a considerable time past.
- 5--Wells at Nos. 1 and 2, Woodbine Cottages, Nos. 1, 2, and 3, Rose Cottages, Yew Tree Cottage, and Cleeve Cottage, Swindon Road—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the water in the wells at the above-mentioned premises was used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, and was so polluted as to be injurious to health. Resolved, That proceedings under Sec. 70 of the Public Health Act be taken to obtain orders for these wells to be closed.

- 6-- Dairies, Cowsheds, and Milkshops Order An application was received from Thomas John Stephens, of No. 3, Great Norwood Street, to be registered as a Dairyman. Resolved, That the application be acceded to.
- 7-Overcrowding at No. 4, Berkeley Avenue—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the above premises were so overcrowded as to be dangerous or injurious to the health of the inmates. 13—Insanitary Property at Nos. 130, 137 and 138, Tewkesbury Road—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the premises above-mentioned were in such a state as to be' injurious to the health of the inmates owing to defective roofs, walls, floors, &c. Resolved, That the Council being satisfied that the said premises are in such a state as to be health, Notices under Sec. 94 of the Public Health Act, 1875, be served upon the Owners requiring them to put the same into a healthy condition, and for that purpose to carry out the works specified in the Notices.

14-Insanitary Urinals at the Brewer's Arms, St. Paul's Road, South, Royal Well Tavern, and Cherry Tree Inn, Swindon Road—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the urinals at these premises were in an insanitary condition owing to want of water supply. Resolved, That the Council being satisfied of the existence of nuisances caused by the insanitary condition of these urinals, Notices be served upon the owners of the premises referred to requiring them to abate the nuisances forthwith.

15—Flooding of Cellar at Nethercote—A further letter was read from Mr. Stranger, stating that before getting out the foundations for his cellar the builder was instructed that the drain in the roadway was 6 ft. deep, whereas it was found to be only 3 ft. below the surface of the road. He suggested that this would not long satisfy the requirements of Health Department, and if he could be assured that within a reasonable time the Corporation would put in a sewer at a proper date he would wait, but if not he must ask to be informed what the Health Department or the Borough Surveyor suggest as a remedy. At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Tuesday, the 15th day of November, 1898—Present: Councillor Baker, Bence, Davis, Lenthall, Margrett, and Waghorne (Councillor Margrett in the chair)

1—Chairman.— Resolved, That Councillor Margrett be appointed Chairman of this Committee for the ensuing year.

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on Wednesday, the 23rd day of November, 1898—Present: Councillors Baker. Bence, Davis, Margrett and Waghone (Councillor Margrett in the chair)—

2-Report of Water Engineer- The Water Engineer reported that on the 21st inst. the supply from Hewlett and Northfield Springs was 52 gallons, the average for the last four years being 76 gallons per minute; and the quantity of water store at He miens and Leckhampton was 3,251,615 gallons.

On the 21st inst. the depth of water in Dowdeswell Reservoir was 10 feet 7 inches and the contents 14,459,732 gallons, which made a total of 17,911,347 gallons, or about 18 days' supply, exclusive of the daily yield of the springs, which was then about 171,396 gallons.

The consumption had been maintained during the past month at about 1,000,000 gallons per day, of which 700,000 gallons had been received from the Springs and from Tewkesbury. With care the present resources would last until Christmas but not longer.

He recommended that in order to prevent waste as much as possible the men inspecting be furnished with leather washers, and be authorised to supply and fix them on all domestic taps free of charge whenever requested to do so by the occupier of any house, and that a return periodically be made to the Committee of the places at which taps have been so furnished with washers.

He further reported that an application had been received from N. P. Milne, of Ashchurch House, near Tewkesbury, for a short extension of main main along a new road which he was laying out for building purposes, the cost of which amounting to £12 would be amply covered by the ordinary rating charge.

Resolved, That the report be approved and the recommendation therein contained adopted, and that the extension referred to be carried out.

3-Reconstruction of Wall at No. 3, Reservoir at Hewletts—The Water Engineer laid before the Committee a plan for reconstruction of this wall. Resolved, To instruct him to prepare the specification and advertise for tenders.

4-Extension of Main to Hill View, Golden Valley--A letter was read from Mr. A. H. Taylor, making application for a supply of the Corporation water at Hill View, which would necessitate an extension of the main. Resolved, That the main be extended along the Gloucester Road from Benhall Farm to the Borough Boundary at an estimated cost of £280, which would furnish a supply to Hill View.

5-Water Supply to General Hospital--A letter was read from Mr. Carrington, Hon. Sec. and Treasurer of the Hospital, reminding the Committee that the Annual Subscription of the Corporation had not yet been paid, and that the maximum number of tickets for one subscription had been sent. Resolved, With reference to Minute No. 4 of the proceedings of this Committee of the 23th of May last that as the interview between Councillor Dix, the Water Engineer and Col. Croker-King had not yet taken place the resolution thereto be varied as follows, viz., that the Chairman and the Water Engineer be requested to have a personal interview with Col. Croker-King and Mr. Carrington with reference to the water supply to the Hospital and charge made therefor.

6-Water Supply for Greenhouse, Beechworth Lodge-A letter from Messrs. Ley Wood and Rickerby, Solicitors for Mrs. Baker, of Beechworth Lodge, Hales Road, was read, stating that for the last five years they had paid 21s per annum for water supply for a greenhouse which had not existed during that period, and requesting repayment. Resolved, That on the Water Engineer being satisfied that the greenhouse has not been in existence during the five years Mrs. Baker be repaid the five guineas paid by her in respect thereof.

7-Hydrants in Tewkesbury-A letter was read from Mr. Badham, Town Clerk of Tewkesbury, suggesting that as his Council have to pay 6 per cent. on the cost of extension of mains they consider that is quite sufficient to repay the cost of fixing the Hydrants without the further charge of 1s a year for maintenance, to which the Town Clerk had replied calling attention to Secs. 38, 39 and 40 of the Waterworks Clauses Act, 1847, that the price for fixing and maintenance was very low, and he thought the Tewkesbury Town Council had better accept it without further question. Resolved, That the reply of the Town Clerk be approved, and that the same charge be made in respect of all hydrants in the Borough of Tewkesbury.

8-Sandford Pumping Station Premises-A letter was read from Messrs. Ticehurst and Sons, enquiring on behalf of a client whether the Council would sell the whole or any part of the field in which the Pumping

Station at Sandford stands. Resolved, To inform Messrs. Ticehurst and Sons that the Council have no intention of selling any part of the premises, as they cannot part with what they may in the future urgently require to make use of.

9-Salary of Mr. Harris—The application of Mr. Harris for an increase of salary was considered. Resolved, To recommend to the Finance Committee that his salary be increased by £10 per annum up to £150, and that this Committee contribute thereto £100 per annum as the proportion in respect of the work of this department

10-Arrears of Water Rates-The Chairman laid before the Committee arrears of Water Rates, amounting to £303 19s. 10d., which the Collector had been unable to collect. Resolved, That the Town Clerk be instructed to take proceedings to recover such of the arrears as he in his discretion may deem recoverable.

4-Gas Inspector's Report The Gas Inspector reported that the hourly average consumption of Gas per lamp during the previous month had been 4.275 cubic feet.

5-Lamp Book-This Book was produced and examined. 8 Lamps extinguished, 8 metered, 25 unmetered, and 5 burning dimly.
