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To regulate and manage all matters relating to Public Health or concerning the duties of the Medical Officer of Health and Inspector of Nuisances, and to carry into effect the powers of the Council under the following Acts and Orders : Public Health Acts, The Cheltenham Improvement Acts and Provisional Orders (Sanitary Provisions), Factory and Workshops Acts, Infectious Diseases (Notification) Act, 1889, The Notification of Births Act, 1907, The Notification of Births (Extension) Act, 1915, Infectious Diseases (Prevention) Act, 1890, The Housing Acts, 1890 to 1919, so far as regards insanitary houses, and the Dairies, Cowsheds and Milkshops Orders.

To have delegated to it the powers of the Council under the following sections of the Public Health Act, 1875, namely : 23, 24, 25, 35, 36, 37, 38, 40, 41, 46, 47, 49, and 50, the sections relating to nuisances and unsound meat, also sections 62, 70, 120, 121, 123, 124, 126, 127, 128 and 129, and Section 28 of the Housing, Town Planning, etc., Act, 1919.

To examine and report upon all plans for new streets and buildings, including the enforcement of the Bye-laws made by the Council with regard thereto, so far only as drainage and other sanitary matters are concerned. To deal with the repair and reconstruction of all sewers in the Borough and with the outfall sewers and sewage tanks and the control and treatment of the sewage and to have the management and control of the Sewage Farms of the Corporation, and the purchase and sale of stock, farming implements, etc.

To deal with the cleansing of watercourses and the enforcement of the provisions of the Rivers Pollution Prevention Acts.

Housing Committee— Resolved, That the following members of the Council do form the Housing Committee for the ensuing. year :—The Mayor, Aldermen Bendall and Taylor, Councillors Bastin. Dicks, Moore. Street and Highway Committee—Resolved, That the following members of the Council do form the Street and Highway Committee for the ensuing year :—The Mayor, Alderman Bendall Councillors Dicks, Mann, Pates, Sawyer and Yarnold (one vacancy), and that their powers and duties be as follows : To regulate and manage all matters relating to the repair of the streets, including public and private streets and main and contribution roads, to examine and report upon all plans for new streets and buildings, including the enforcement of the Bye-laws made by the Council with regard thereto (with the exception of drainage and other sanitary matters) and to consider all proposed public street improvements. To consider and report upon any matters arising in connection with the Cheltenham and District Light Railway within the Borough or in connection with the Bye-laws made by the Council with reference thereto.

To have the management of the Central Depot and the horses, materials and carts, etc., there any matters in connection with the Borough Surveyor's Department and of any properties acquired by the Corporation in respect of street improvements. To deal with matters in connection with Street Projections. To enforce the provisions of the following Acts so far as regards new streets and buildings : The Public Health Acts, the Public Health (Building in Streets) Act, 1888, The Cheltenham Improvement Acts, 1852 and 1889, and the Cheltenham Order of 1896 (with the exception of drainage and other sanitary matters), and to deal with any Town Planning scheme under the Housing, Town Planning, etc., Acts, 1909 and 1919.

To carry into effect the provisions of the Cheltenham Corporation Water Acts, 1878 and 1881, and the Provisional Orders amending the same.

General Purposes and Watch Committee—(Chairmen of the several Standing Committees, when appointed). Resolved, That the powers and duties of the General Purposes and Watch Committee be as follows :—To regulate and manage any properties of the Corporation and other matters not specifically referred to any other Committee. To discharge the duties of the Watch Committee under the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, and to consider and report upon all matters arising in connection with the Petroleum Acts, and the Police. To regulate and manage all matters relating to the licensing of Hackney Carriages, Drivers and Conductors, and to Markets and Fairs. To be an Executive Committee of the Council under the Diseases of Animals Acts, with all the powers and authority conferred upon the Council (except the power to make a rate) and to carry into effect the Orders of the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries in relation thereto. To consider and report to the Council upon the numbering and re-numbering of houses in, and the naming and re-naming of, streets in the Borough. To regulate and manage all matters in connection with the Fire Brigade and Fire Extinguishing Appliances.

T. Agg-Gardner, M.P., Dr. R. Davies, Messrs. G. Dimmer and F. B. de Sausmarez as Consulting members, and that their powers and duties be as follows : To regulate and manage the Art Gallery and Museum and all matters relating thereto.

Resolved, That the necessary Notices be given to the respective Owners under Section 36 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and Section 27 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, requiring them in each case to provide a moveable ash receptacle of such size, pattern, and construction as may be approved by the Sanitary Inspector on behalf of the Corporation.

5-Overcrowding at 1 Regent Place, Swindon Road ; 27, Upper Norwood Street ; 7, Roebuck Cottages ; 4, Providence Place, Portland Street ; and 3, Ebenezer Cottages, King Street. The Medical Officer of Health reported that these premises were so overcrowded as to be dangerous or injurious to the health of the inmates. Resolved, That the Committee being satisfied of the existence of a nuisance on the said premises, Notice under Section 94 of the Public Health Act, 1875, be served on the occupiers thereof, requiring them to abate the same.

6-Cleansing and Whitewashing at 13 and 15, Stanhope Street ; 2, 4 and 5, Providence Place, Portland Street ; 1 and 3, Coltham Fields, Hale's Road ; 29, Hungerford Street ; 28, Hanover Street ; 37, Sun

Street ; 11, Worcester Street ; 5, Springfield Place, Rosehill Street ; and 34, Upper Park Street. The Medical Officer of Health having certified under Section 46 of the Public Health Act, 1875, that the above-named dwelling-houses were in such a filthy and unwholesome condition that the health of the inmates was affected or endangered thereby. Resolved, That Notice be given to the Owners under the said Section requiring the houses to be cleansed and limewashed.

7-Nuisances from Drains, etc., at 31 and 32, Dunalley Parade ; 424 and 425, High Street ; and 9 and 10, Tewkesbury Road, The Sanitary Inspector having made written application under Section 41 of the Public Health Act, 1875, stating that the drains, &c., on or belonging to the above-named houses, were in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health. Resolved, That authority be given to the Sanitary Inspector to open the ground, examine the drains, and report to the Committee.

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8—Insanitary Property—(a) 2, 4, and 5, Providence Place, Portland Street ; 1 and 3, Coltham Fields, Hale's Road ; 11 and 12. Worcester Street ; Nos. 1, 28 and 29, Hungerford Street; and 13, 14 and 15, Stanhope Street. The Medical Officer of Health reported that the above-mentioned premises were in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to the health of the inmates owing to defective roofs, walls, ceilings, floors, &c. Resolved, That the Council being satisfied that the said premises are in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health, Notices under Section 94 of the Public Health Act, 1875, or Section 28 of the Housing Town Planning, etc., Act, 1919, be served upon the Owners requiring them to put the same into a healthy condition, and for that purpose to carry out the works specified therein.

(b) 8 and 9, Alstone Place As instructed by Minute No. 4 (d) at Meeting on 9th October last, the Sanitary Inspector submitted the following tenders for work specified to be done, viz.

9—Surrender of Diseased Meat—The Medical Officer of Health reported the surrender of 6 cwts. beef; 1 cwt. 2qrs. mutton ; 1 cwt. 3 qrs. 4 lbs. pork, 68 tins of fish, fruit and meat.

10—Notices not complied with—The Medical Officer of Health submitted List of Notices requiring abatement of nuisances, etc., arising from dirty walls and ceilings, leaky roofs, etc., served but not complied with. Resolved, That the Town Clerk be instructed to take the necessary steps to compliance.

11—Common Lodging Houses—Applications were received from Mrs. Alice A. Evans in respect of the Nelson Inn, High Street, and Cumberland Cottage, Grove Street, and Mr. Mickel Fortucci in respect of Nos. 20 and 21, Stanhope Street and Cottage at rear of 21, Stanhope Street, for renewal

of their registration as keepers of these Common Lodging Houses. Resolved, That the registration be renewed for one year, from the 9th inst.

12-Houses Let in Lodgings—The Sanitary Inspector reported that the occupiers of 18, Grosvenor Street, 5, 6 and 10, Rutland Street, 5 and 7, Grove Street, and Cumberland Lodge, Grove Street, had failed to fill up the prescribed forms and give the necessary information for the registration of the premises as Houses let in Lodgings. Resolved, That the Town Clerk be instructed to take proceedings to compel compliance with the Bye-laws.

13—Hayden Sewage Farms—(a) Humus Tanks—The Borough Surveyor reported that the Humus Tanks had been completed.

(b) Storm Water and Effluent Carrier—The Town Clerk submitted correspondence with the Sequestrator of Staverton-cum. Boddington with regard to the construction of the Carrier through Glebe land belonging to the living from which it appeared there would be considerable delay in obtaining the necessary consents. The Borough Surveyor reported that, subject to confirmation, he had arranged with the two adjoining land Owners for an alternative route for the Carrier, and submitted proposed terms as to compensation payable to these Owners and the provision and maintenance of fences, etc. He also submitted revised estimate of the cost of the work amounting to £1,600 exclusive of compensation, fences, etc. Resolved, That the terms arranged with the two Owners for alternative route be approved and agreements entered into with them accordingly. Resolved, also, That the estimate be approved and that application be made to the Unemployment Grants Committee for sanction to a loan of £1,700, that application be made for a grant of 65 per cent. towards payment of interest and sinking fund charges on the loan for a term of 15 years in accordance with the terms offered, and that the Resolution to Minute No. 16 of the Committee's proceedings on the 11th September last, be varied accordingly.

14—Houses Unfit for Human Habitation—1, Limbrick Cottages—Mr. W. H. F. Cousins attended the Meeting and stated that the work required to be done to these premises would be put in hand as soon as he could obtain possession of the adjoining house. Resolved, That consideration of making a Demolition Order be further adjourned for two months.

15—Smallpox—Read, Circular 350 of the 6th inst., from the Ministry of Health forwarding Memorandum on steps to be taken on the occurrence of Smallpox. Since the last meeting 1 cart horse had been purchased for £37. 1 calf had been bred on the Farms. 12 heifers, 1 cow, 25 steers, 3 calves, 6 ewes, 12 lambs and 2 pigs had been sold for £886 14s. 1d.

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11—National Scheme for Disabled Men—Read, Circular letter of the 17th inst., from the Local Employment Committee suggesting that the King's National Roll die be inserted in advertisements issued by the Corporation. Resolved, That no action be taken.

12—Ex-Service Men, Cancellation of Government Maintenance, etc.—Read, circular letter of the 28th ult., from the Town Clerk, South Shields, forwarding the following Resolution adopted by the Council of that Borough, and asking that similar action be taken. "That this Council strongly protest against the callous treatment meted out by the Ministry of Pensions to ex-service men who are mental patients in our Asylums by the cancellation of their Government maintenance and weekly allowances ; also the stopping of the pensions of war widows whose husbands' deaths were not directly attributable to war service, with the result that these men and women will be pauperised and dependent on Rate-payers who are unable to meet the demand. This Council urges that immediate legislative measures be taken for the renewal of the before mentioned Government maintenance, weekly allowances and pensions." GENERAL PURPOSES AND WATCH COMMITTEE AND FINANCE COMMITTEE (JOINT MEETINGS). REPORT.

The Joint Committee appointed by the Council on the 3rd July last to survey the salaries and appointments of the Staff, as apart from the workmen, met on **the 27th July last**. Present: The Mayor ; Deputy Mayor ; Aldermen Bendall, Horsley and Steel ; Councillors Dicks, Mann, Moore, Pruen, Rogers, Sawyer, Welstead and Yarnold (The Deputy Mayor in the Chair).

The Committee carefully considered list of Officials and salaries paid, and certain suggestions for effecting economies were referred to the Public Health Committee, Street and Highway Committee and Finance Committee for consideration and report.

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The Joint Committee met again on the 28th November, 1922. Present : The Mayor; Deputy Mayor ; Aldermen Bendall, Steel and Taylor, Councillors Dicks, Mann, Moore, Pruen, Regan, Rogers, Sawyer, Stewart, Capt. Trye, Welstead, Whitaker and Yarnold (The Deputy Mayor in the Chair).

It may be well to state shortly the facts which led up to the adoption by the Council of the maximum and minimum Scale now in force. The first application for a war bonus was made by the Officials early in 1917 and was refused. The Council were urged by the Municipal Officers' Guild, supported by the Local Government Board and the N.A.L.G.O., to reconsider the matter and adopt the Civil Service Scale or to refer the matter to arbitration, but the Council did not alter their previous decision until 3rd March, 1919, when, on the recommendation of the Joint Committee, some small bonuses were granted to some, but not all, of the Officials. The Civil Service Scale was increased by Award No. 84 as from the 1st April, 1919, and further letters were received from the Local Government Board and Ministry of Labour urging the Council to adopt this Scale.

On the 1st December, 1919, the Council, on the recommendation of the Joint Committee, decided to grant an increased bonus to the Officials (excluding certain Officials).

In the meantime the Civil Service Scale had been further increased by Award No. lot as from 19th November, 1919, and was again increased by Award No. 102 as from 1st March, 1920, and further representations were made by the Ministry of Health, Ministry of Labour, and the N.A.L.G.O. in regard to the bonuses granted by the Council. The question was again considered by the Joint Committee, who recommended the Council to do away with the war bonus system and to adopt the present maximum and minimum Scale which was approved by the Council on the 6th September, 1920, and came into operation on the 1st October, 1920. This Scale was considerably lower than the Civil Service Scale, which was adopted by many Local Authorities including the County Council and the Gloucester Corporation. The Scale admittedly was not based on the then cost of living but on what was considered to be the fair value of the various positions and the object of fixing a maximum

and minimum Scale was in order that persons entering the employment of the Corporation might know the maximum salary which might be expected for the appointment. Since the Scale was adopted several appointments have been made in accordance with the Scale. The Joint Committee do not see their way to recommend a general reduction of salaries, but on going through the list of salaries have made such adjustments as appeared to be fair and reasonable.

They make the following recommendations :--

1—Water Department—That the salary of Mr. J. S. Pickering as Water Engineer be referred to the Water Committee for consideration and report.

2—Street and Highway Department—That the salary of the Outdoor Superintendent be reduced from £257 8s. 0d. to £200 per annum.

3- -Bath Superintendents—That the salaries of the Superintendents of the Montpellier and Alstone Baths be reduced from £193 12s. 0d. to £156 per annum.

4—Electricity Department—That the salary of the Electricity Accountant be reduced from £318 10. to £275 per annum.

5—Public Health Department--That the salary of the Disinfecting Assistant be reduced from £180 to £150 per annum.

6—Farms Manager—That the salary of the Farms Manager be reduced from £420 to £400 per annum.

7—Rates Department –That Mr. E. J. Cornock be transferred to the Finance Department when a suitable opportunity arises and that a Junior at a lower salary be engaged in his place.

Borough Accountant—Mr. Minett has intimated his desire to resign his appointment at the end of the year. The Joint Committee recommend :-

8—That his resignation be accepted to take effect on the 31st December, 1922, and that he be appointed Consulting Accountant for a period of 5 years from that date if he shall so long be able and willing to render to the Council and their Officials all information and assistance reasonably required by them in connection with the work of the Borough Accountant's Department, and that he be paid his present salary up to the 31st March next, and thereafter a salary of £200 per annum, during the remainder of the period of his appointment as Consulting Accountant.

9—That Mr. E. W. Deacon be appointed Borough Accountant as from the 1st January next at a salary of £400, rising by annual increments of £25 to £550 per annum.

10—That the salary of Mr. Alan Lewis (Cashier), be increased as from the 1st January next from £238 12s. 0d. to £250 per annum, rising by annual increments of £5 to a maximum of £275 per annum, and that he take charge of the Department in the absence of the Borough Accountant.

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11—That the salary of Mr. G. B. Pearce (General Clerk) be increased as from the 1st January next from £225 to £250 per annum, rising by annual increments of £5 to a maximum of £275 per annum.

12-That the salary of Mr. P. J. Midwinter (Ledger Clerk) be increased as from the 1st January next from £156 per annum to £175 per annum.

13—That the salary of the two Assistant Ledger Clerks be reduced from £171 12s. 0d. to £150 per annum in each case.

14—That the salary of the Wages Allocation Clerk be reduced from £115 to £130 per annum.

15—That Mr. S. A. E. Harris be transferred to the Electricity Department at his present salary.

1—Chairman—Resolved, That Councillor Mann be appointed Chairman of this Committee for the ensuing year.

2-Appointment of Sub-Committee—Resolved, That Aldermen Green and Steel ; Councillors Mann and Regan ; Rev. Canon P. M. C. Johnstone ; Dr. R. Davies ; Messrs. J. R. Claridge and E. C. Rogers be appointed the Sub-Committee for the ensuing year. Resolved, also, That the filling of the vacancy created by the resignation of Mr. W. R. Carles, C.M.G, be deferred.

3—Librarian's Report—Read, the Librarian's Report for October. Receipts, £8 10s. 8d. The number of volumes consulted in the Reference Library was 3,806 (last year 3,566). Lending Library, 10,925 (against 12,109). Children's Library, 1,510 (against 1,949) Although the Reference issue shows a continued increase, that in other Departments results in a total decrease of 1,383 volumes. Allowance should be made for only 4 Saturdays against 5 last year ; but the drop is due mainly to-absence of fresh books, the soiled condition of the works most in demand, and to the fact that 288 volumes are at present laid aside to await re-binding, white some 837 volumes, which have been worn out by frequent use, have been withdrawn during recent months. Of this latter number at least 300 of the more popular and standard works should be replaced. The Librarian's estimate for rebinding the 288 volumes is £34, and for replacing 300 volumes approximately £45. As the Estimate submitted by the Library Committee last March was cut down from £1,600

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to £1,300, the sum originally provided for new books, rebinding and replacements (£320) was reduced to £120, and this has already been practically spent. The Committee regret to report, therefore, that the essential work of re-binding and replacement of popular standard works, to say nothing of the adding of new books, must cease for the current financial year, if a serious debt is not to be incurred.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, 11th December, 1922: Present—The Mayor ; The Deputy Mayor; Aldermen Green and Steel ; Councillors Leigh James, Moore, Rogers, Whitaker and Yarnold. (Councillor Rogers in the chair).

1—Houses without proper Ash Receptacles —The Sanitary Inspector reported that the following houses had no proper ashpits or ash receptacles, viz.:-16, Victoria Street ; 30, New Street ; Calkein Cottage, Malthouse Lane ; Glyndon Villa, Carlton Street ; 77, Brunswick Street ; 43, Montpellier Villas ; 2, Bath Street ; 30, Elm Street ; 1 and 2, Weston Cottages, Tewkesbury Road ; and 6, Newent Place, Marsh Lane. Resolved, That the necessary Notices be given to the respective Owners under Section 36 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and Section 27 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, requiring them in each case to provide a movable ash receptacle of such size, pattern, and construction as may be approved by the Sanitary Inspector on behalf of the Corporation.

2-Overcrowding at (a) 9a and 13a, Russell Place, The Medical Officer of Health reported that these premises were so overcrowded as to be dangerous or injurious to the health of the inmates. Resolved, That the Committee being satisfied of the existence of a nuisance on the said premises, Notice under Section 94 of the Public Health Act, 1875, be served on the occupiers thereof, requiring them to abate the same. (b) 2, Ebenezer Cottages, King Street; 27, Upper Norwood Street ; and 7, Roebuck Cottages, Hereford Place. 6--Notices not complied with—The Medical Officer of Health submitted List of Notices requiring abatement of nuisances, etc., arising from dirty walls and ceilings, leaky roofs, etc., served but not complied with. Resolved, That the Town Clerk be instructed to take the necessary steps to compliance.

The daily average number of visitors had been 125; 355 catalogues at 3d. each had been sold (£4 8s. 9d.), and 11 pictures to a total value of £55 45. 0d., in respect of which 5 per cent. is payable to the funds of the Art Gallery.

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During the month the three small War Trophies—Dervish, South African and Egyptian—secured by Colonel G. O. Welch C.B., whilst on active service, had been hung in the Armour Room on the walls which had been plugged and railed a: the Colonel's expense. The collection of Cornish and Lizard Rocks, purchased by members of the Cheltenham Science Society and presented to the Museum, had been placed on exhibition in a separate case.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, 8th January, 1923: Present-The Mayor ; The Deputy Mayor ; Aldermen Green and Steel ; Councillors Leigh James, Moore, Rogers, St. Clair, Thomas, Whitaker and Yarnold. (Councillor Rogers in the chair).

1-Houses without proper Ash Receptacles -The Sanitary Inspector reported that the following houses had no proper ashpits or ash receptacles, viz.:,-80, Stanhope Street; 35, 47, 72, 122, 123, and 139, Tewkesbury Road; Victoria House and "Virden," Tewkesbury Road; St. Anne's Cottage, Mitre Street; 18, Imperial Square; 4, Whitecross Square, Naunton Lane; and 27, Sandford, Street. Resolved, That the necessary Notices be given to the respective Owners under Section 36 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and Section 27 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, requiring them in each case to provide a movable ash receptacle of such size, pattern, and construction as may be approved by the Sanitary Inspector on behalf of the Corporation.

2-Overcrowding at 3, Powell's Cottages Grove Street. The Medical Officer of Health reported that these premises were so overcrowded as to be dangerous or injurious to the health of the inmates. Resolved, That the Committee being satisfied of the existence of a nuisance on the said premises, Notice under Section 94 of the Public Health Act, 1875, be served on the occupiers thereof, requiring them to abate the same.

3-Cleansing and Whitewashing at 80, Stanhope Street; 73, Queen Street; 1, 2, 3, and 4, Weston Cottages, Tewkesbury Road; 35, Tewkesbury Road; 15, Albert Street, St. Peters; 27, Sandford Street: 2, St. Anne's Cottages, St. Anne's Terrace; and St. Anne's Cottage, Mitre Street. The Medical Officer of Health having certified under Section 46 of the Public Health Act, 1875, that the abovenamed dwelling-houses were in such a filthy and unwholesome condition that the health of the inmates was affected or endangered thereby. Resolved, That Notice he given to the Owners under the said Section requiring the houses to be cleansed and limewashed.

4-Nuisances from Drains, etc., at (a) 2, Southfield Villas, Bath Road ; Quarrycroft, Pilley Lane; Fairford Lawn, Leckhampton Road ; 34, Francis Street; 28, Hermitage Street ; 13 and 15, Bath Terrace ; 1, 2, 3, 5, 6, 7, and 8, Brecon Terrace, Rosehill Street; and 122, Fairview Road. 1—Railway Track between Cheltenham and Gloucester—The Committee considered Resolutions of the Cirencester Urban District Council and Traders' Association, urging the necessity of doubling the line from Cirencester to Swindon, and of putting in a junction at Rushey Platt (Swindon) with the main line, with a view to providing work for the unemployed and to accelerate and shorten the train service to London from Cheltenham and Cirencester, which matter was referred to the Committee by the Council at their last meeting. Resolved, That no action be taken thereon.

Resolved, That a representation be made to the Great Western Railway Company, urging that the quadrupling of the railway track between Gloucester and Cheltenham should be put in hand which was required to accommodate the increased traffic and would provide work for the unemployed in Cheltenham, Gloucester and District.

Resolved, also, That the County Council, the Gloucester Corporation, and the Gloucester and Cheltenham Chambers of Commerce be asked to support this representation.

2-Three Counties Show, 1924—The Sub-Committee appointed at the last Meeting reported that, in company with Messrs. L. W. Bayley, J. G. Villar, and L. C. Wrigley, they had that day viewed Charlton Park and land on the Housing Estate with a view to providing a site for this Show, and recommended that arrangements be made for the Show to be held on part of the Housing Estate (including land adjoining, in the occupation of Mr. Harris), if this site is approved of by the Three Counties Show Committee.

Motor Fire Engine—The Town Clerk submitted estimates (ranging from £450 to £1,490) received from 6 firms for the supply of a Motor Fire Engine.

The Captain reported that from particulars given in the Specification of the "Stanley" Fire Engine, the price of which was £495, it appeared that this engine would meet the immediate needs of the Borough. The Sub-Committee recommended that consideration of the question of providing a Motor Fire Engine be deferred for the present, and that the Street and Highway Committee he asked to have the 2 horses now used for the Fire Engine replaced by younger horses. Inspection of Cabs—That there should be stricter inspection of Motor Cabs before Licences were issued, several cabs had been passed which in the opinion of the Association were unsuitable and they asked for a strict inspection before the Licences were renewed.

Hackney Carriage Stands—That a stand for 20 Motor Hackney Carriages be appointed in Royal Well Lane, and that the number of Hackney Carriages allowed to stand in Crescent Terrace be increased from 2 to 3.

Limitation of Licences—They asked that no additional Licences be granted as the present supply exceeded the demand.

Regulation of Traffic—They asked that there should be a stricter enforcement of the byelaws particularly at the Railway Stations, and in respect of Theatre traffic in Regent Street.

Fares—They were unable to agree to a reduction of fares. They pointed out that they were only charging from the point of picking up passengers and not from the point of hiring, as they were entitled to do, and they also did not charge an additional fare outside the Borough if within a radius of 2 miles from Crescent Terrace.

Resolved, That the part of Royal Well Lane now used as a stand be appointed a stand for 20 motor cabs, and the stand in Crescent Terrace be appointed for 3 motor cabs instead of 2.

Resolved, That the attention of Superintendent Hopkins be called to the representation made as to the regulation of traffic.

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7--Cinematograph Act, 1909—Read, applications front Messrs. H. G. Beard, Shakspere Sher and F. Sims and the Cheltenham Winter Garden Co., Ltd., for renewal of licences in respect of the Coliseum Theatre—The Picture House, North Street ; The Palace ; The Daffodil Picture House, and the Winter Garden. Resolved, That licences be renewed for one year from the 7th February, 1923, subject to the same conditions as contained in previous licences.

1-Houses without proper Ash Receptacles -The Sanitary Inspector reported that the following houses had no proper ashpits or ash receptacles, viz.:-18, Columbia Street ; 21, Rosehill Street ; 13, Hill View Terrace ; 81, Stanhope Street ; 19, Hamilton Place, St. Paul's ; 4, 5 and 6, Swindon Terrace ; Alfellanda, Swindon Road ; Stone Cottage, Swindon Road ; 42, 43 and 44, Malvern Street ; 3, Park View, Albany Road, and 2, Witcomb Place. Resolved, That the necessary Notices be given to the respective Owners under Section 36 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and Section 27 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, requiring them in each case to provide a movable ash receptacle of such size, pattern, and construction as may be approved by the Sanitary Inspector on behalf of the Corporation.

2-Cleansing and Whitewashing at 47, 91, 93 and 121, Tewkesbury Road; "Brandon," Virden," and " Swinton," Tewkesbury Road ; 5, Albert Street, St. Paul's ; 18, Columbia Street ; 12, Oxford Place ; 4, Queen Street ; 81, Stanhope Street ; and 2, Witcomb Place. The Medical Officer of Health having certified under Section 46 of the Public Health Act, 1875, that the above-named dwelling-houses were in such a filthy and unwholesome condition that the health of the inmates was affected or endangered thereby. Resolved, That Notice be given to the Owners under the said Section requiring the houses to be cleansed and limewashed.

3-Nuisances from Drains, etc., at (a) 30, 31 and 32, Elm Street ; 34 and 45, Bloomsbury Street ; 13 (and Stables adjoining), and 16, Andover Street ; and 5 and 6, Berkeley Avenue. The Sanitary Inspector having made written application under Section 41 of the Public Health Act, 1875, stating that the drains, &c., on or belonging to the above-named houses, were in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health. Resolved, That authority be given to the Sanitary Inspector to open the ground, examine the drains, and report to the Committee.

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(b) 15 and 16, Tivoli Street—The Sanitary Inspector reported that in accordance with instructions of the Committee, at their meeting on 11th September last (Minute No. 5 (b)) the works of repair specified to be done to these premises had been carried out to his satisfaction by Messrs. C. T. Clark & Son at cost of £25 3s. 6d. and £8 5s. 0d. respectively. Resolved, That application be made to the Owners for payment

5—Surrender of Diseased Meat—The Medical Officer of Health reported the surrender of 4 cwt. 3 qrs. 21 lbs. of pork; 2 cwt. 1 qr. 14 lbs. fish ; 2 ½ cwt. cauliflowers ; 85 lbs. beef ; 3 tins beef and 2 tins ox tongue.

6—Dairies, Cowsheds, and Milkshops Order — Read, applications from Cecil H. Taunt, 84, Fairview Road, and H. G. Ballinger, Fairview Street, to be registered as purveyors of Milk. Resolved, That the applications be granted.

8—Milk and Dairies (Amendment) Act. 1922 The Medical Officer of Health reported on the Milk (Special Designations) Order, 1922, made under this Act, and the Amendment Order, as follows : -

Ordinary Milk—Would be sold without licence or special designation as hitherto.

Specially Designated Milk—Would be sold under one or other of five special designations, viz.:—(1) Certified; (2) Grade "A"; (3) Grade " A " Tuberculin Tested : (4) Grade " A " Pasteurised ; (5) Pasteurised. To enable milk distributors to sell under either of the special designations a licence, issuable by the Town Council, would be necessary, a fee for such licence to be charged according to scale prescribed by the Ministry of Health.

Milk producers, as distinguished from distributors, would be licenced by the County Council.

The sale of milk under special designations would involve considerable labour and cost in inspection of premises and apparatus, and the collection and bacteriological examinations of samples of milk at periodic intervals in every case ; the bacteriological examinations were to be conducted at an approved laboratory. The Ministry of Health would, subject to arrangements being made to the satisfaction of the Ministry as to the laboratory, and subject also to the estimated cost being approved by the Ministry, repay the cost of bacteriological examinations of " Certified Milk."

The Order came into force on the 1st January, 1923, except the provisions with regard to Pasteurised Milk, the operation of which had been postponed until the 1st July next to enable milk traders to provide the special apparatus required.

9—Houses Unfit for Human Habitation—17, etc., Stanhope Street—Read, letter of 26th ult., from the Ministry of Health stating that the Inquiry into the Appeal of Mr. H. Stroud against the demolition orders made would be held on the 20th inst.

Ltd., applying for permission to place weighing machines in the public conveniences and offering £3 per annum per machine for the right to do so. Resolved, That the offer be accepted.

Farms Manager's Report --Read, Report of Farms Manager. Number of livestock on the Farms on 12th inst. was 12 horses (and 6 at Depot) ; 74 head of cattle ; 98 tegs and 36 pigs, all doing very well.

Since the last meeting 1 calf had been bred on the Farms. 5 cows in calf, 5 barren cows, 11 heifers and 4 steers had been purchased for £494 15s. 0d, 6 bullocks, 2 cows, 2 heifers in calf, 2 calves and 12 store pigs had been sold for £363 3s. 4d.

Stock—The Sub-Committee considered reference from the Finance Committee as to the possibility of reducing the livestock on the Farms. The Farms Manager reported that there was 74 head of cattle now on the Farms as compared with 89 in 1922 and 115 in 1921, and that the stock could not be further reduced if the grazing was to be kept down. Resolved, That the Finance Committee be informed accordingly.

Shooting at Farms—The Sub-Committee considered the advisability of inviting tenders for the shooting at the Farms for the 1923-24 Season. Resolved, That Mr. W. Unwin be invited to submit an offer for the shooting and sporting rights over Barn Farm and Mr. G. McIlquham for the shooting at Hayden Farm.

Cottage Roof--Resolved. That the Farms Manager be authorised to have the roof of Harper's Cottage repaired at an estimated cost of £4.

Fencing Posts—Resolved, That the Farms Manager be authorised to purchase 100 larch fencing posts at estimated cost of 1s 3d each.

Valuation of Farms—Read, letter of 11th ult., from Mr. J. G. Villar quoting £5 5s. 0d. as his fee for making valuation of the live and dead stock at the Farms.

The cases had been removed to the Isolation Hospital and he had taken steps to trace contacts and prevent spread of infection. He recommended that the Board of Guardians be asked to arrange for the appointment of Deputy Vaccination Officers to attend at suitable centres, and that he be authorised to issue a poster urging the danger of infection and importance of vaccination and to issue a statement to the Press, and that Chicken Pox be made a notifiable disease. Resolved, That the steps taken by the Medical Officer be approved. Resolved, Also, That the Board of Guardians be asked to have a special Meeting for the appointment of Deputy Vaccination Officers to attend centres in the populous districts in the North, East and South Wards. Resolved, Also, That the Council be recommended to make an Emergency Order making Chicken Pox a notifiable disease.

Refuse Collection and Disposal—During the tour weeks ended 8th inst., 770 loads collected, 745 consumed, and 25 tipped away (Weight consumed 1,017 tons 144 cwts).

2-Tenders The Committee considered the advisability of inviting tenders for a six months supply of Stores. Resolved. That the present system of obtaining quotations for goods as required be continued for the present.

3 -Brooklyn Road Allotments -- Pig Sty — Read, application from Mr. G. F. Tibbets for permission to erect a pig sty on Allotment No. 5. Resolved. That permission be not granted.

Eldorado Road and Eldorado Crescent—Private Improvement Works—The Borough Surveyor reported that the Private Improvement Works at these roads had been carried out at a cost (including supervision) of £299 18s. and £44 15s. 3d. respectively. The Borough Surveyor estimated that the cost of alteration to the roof would amount to £140, and submitted tenders for the supply of 2 roof principals which would be required. ART GALLERY AND MUSEUM COMMITTEE.

1—Curator's Report—Number of visits to the Art Gallery and Museum, 3,295 (against 1,657). Sale of postcards realised 6s 8d One reproduction of the picture of the Glo'ster Regiment £1 1s., and two pamphlets on " Rock Specimens" 1s.

The exhibition of the Rowley Panels was opened on the 10th January, and has been visited by 2,922 persons during the thirty days which it had been opened. Catalogues sold realised £2 11s. 2d., and the Collection Box a further sum of £1 0s. 11d.

Mr. H. A. Kennedy, the head of the Department controlling the Circulation Collections of the Victoria and Albert Museum, with Mr. A. E. J. Torrens, visited the Gallery on the 23rd and 24th January, and permission had been now given for two of the South Kensington cases to be moved to the Decorative Art Room and one placed in the Dutch Gallery, and one, because of the need for having a connection for electric light in its interior, had been retained in the long gallery. The gallery was now more suitable for the uninterrupted display of pictures, and at the same time made available for occasional lectures, etc.

As to the collections received on loan for eighteen months from the Victoria and Albert Museum, the Committee had been very fortunate in receiving such a valuable set of objects. The Stained Glass case, for instance, was one of two which the State Collections are circulating. The case containing English Pottery and Porcelain, 45 objects in all, was of value, not so much for the monetary value of the specimens, but for the fact that the examples were of the type met with in very many homes. The case of tiles was considered by those who have a special interest in these subjects to be very good indeed. The fourth case contained Chinese Porcelain, and included specimens upon which art students and lovers of such arts in general would find of quite exceptional merit.

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To make way for the change of location of the South Kensington cases, the collection of objects from Pompeii, shown for many years in a large case in the Dutch Gallery, have been removed to a suitable position, near like objects, in the Decorative Art Room. The opportunity had been taken of cleaning the specimens, and of taking out two of the large examples, suitable for standing on pedestals, and re-arranging the remaining objects, which had a pleasing effect.

The case of twelve specimens of Ravenscourt Pottery, lent to the Gallery last August, had been returned to the maker Miss Dora Lunn, of London,

He had attended a meeting of the Society of Antiquaries in London on the 25th January, and exhibited the Neolithic specimens from the long barrow at Notgrove, and on the following day took the examples to the British Museum, where one of the Artists on the permanent staff took drawings of many of the pieces for illustration in the Journal of the Society. A vote of thanks by the Society was passed to this Committee for their kindness in thus contributing to promote the objects for which the Society is incorporated.

The following gifts had been received :--

Captain R. P. Wild: Eighteen Ethnographical Specimens from West Africa.

Director of Geological Survey: Geological Map of Cheltenham and district, revised in 1922.

Mr. E. J. Burrow: Fifteen framed pen and ink drawings, illustrating his book " The Ancient Earthworks of Gloucestershire," which he requested should be hung in a reasonable position on the walls of the Museum near the cases containing prehistoric remains, implements, etc.

In view of the visit of the National Association of Manual Training Teachers at Easter he had arranged for the insertion of a brief article, descriptive of the Art Gallery and Museum Collections in

the Conference Handbook, and the work of organising the exhibition of Local Arts and Crafts, already agreed to, was being pushed forward with a view to opening it about the 20th March.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, 12th March, 1923: Present—The Mayor : The Deputy Mayor ; Aldermen Green and Steel ; Councillors Leigh James, Rogers, St. Clair, Thomas, Whitaker and Yarnold. (Councillor Rogers in the chair).

1—Houses without proper Ash Receptacles —The Sanitary Inspector reported that the following houses had no proper ashpits or ash receptacles, Leighton Road ; 18, Commercial Street ; Brown Jug Inn and 10 Bells Inn, Bath Road ; 68, Rutland Street ; Mitre Inn, Sandford Street ; Garrick Inn, Bath Street ; 3 and 4, Moor's Parade, Tewkesbury Road ; 7 and 12, St. Paul's Street South ; 40 and 42, Roman Road ; and 225, High Street. Resolved, That the necessary Notices be given to the respective Owners under Section 36 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and Section 27 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1839, requiring them in each case to provide a movable ash receptacle of such size, pattern, and construction as may be approved by the Sanitary Inspector on behalf of the Corporation.

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2-Overcrowding at 105, Tennyson Road. The Medical Officer of Health reported that these premises were so overcrowded as to be dangerous or injurious to the health of the inmates. Resolved, That the Committee being satisfied of the existence of a nuisance on the said premises, Notice under Section g- of the Public Health Act, 1875, be served on the occupiers thereof, requiring them to abate the same.

G. Wood, to whom a producer's licence had been granted, for bacteriological examination. The Ministry should be informed before any arrangements are completed of the Laboratory to which it is proposed to send samples and of the proposed charge.

1—Site for Almshouses - Read, letter of 7th inst. from the Hon. Secretary, Charity Organization Society, stating that the alternative site suggested for the Jessie Mary Chambers Almshouses at the corner of Brooklyn Road and Tennyson Road would be suitable, but that an area of 2904 square yards would be required. The District Valuer reported that he valued the site required at £440 but that the Ministry would require an undertaking from the Corporation that no part of the cost (if any) of completing the abutting roads would be charged to the Assisted Housing Scheme. The Borough Surveyor reported that the construction of the road, including footpath abutting the site, was complete except that for a length (not quite half the frontage of the site (the footpath was only a gravel footpath with grass verge. Resolved, That (subject to the consent of the Ministry of Health) the site be offered for the Almshouses for £440, free from liability to kerb, channel and pave the footpath, and that this be done at the cost of the Corporation, if and when the Corporation consider it necessary, and that the undertaking required by the Ministry of Health be given.

2-House for Police—Read, letter of the 10th inst., from the Chief Constable, asking that one of the Non-parlour type houses be allocated to him for the occupation of married Constables in succession. Resolved, That a Non parlour type house be let to the Chief Constable after the four applicants who had been definitely promised a house had been satisfied.

STREET AND HIGHWAY COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, 19th March, 1923, Present—The Mayor ; Councillors Dicks, Mann, Pates, Sawyer, Captain Trye and Yarnold, (Councillor Mann in the chair),

1-Borough Surveyor's Monthly Report re Highways---The Borough Surveyor reported the work completed by the Highways Department from 16th February to 15th March, 1923 (both dates inclusive), including particulars of roads coated, patched and tarsprayed, and of trenches reinstated and trees planted and pruned during the period, and also the number of slabs made during the period.

Refuse Collection and Disposal---During the tour weeks ended 8th inst., 767 loads collected, 750 consumed, and 17 tipped away (Weight consumed 1,050 tons 15 ½ cwts).

2 -Promenade—Rooks' Nests—The Borough Surveyor asked for instructions as to reducing the number of Rooks' Nests. Resolved, That no action be taken this Season.

3—Alma Road—The Borough Surveyor reported that Owners of properties abutting on this road (which had not been taken over by the Corporation) wished to repair the same and had made application for a supply of clinker, and as the Corporation were the owners of the Allotments in the road, he recommended that a supply be given. Resolved, That the application be granted.

4— Chelt Footpath—The Borough Surveyor reported that the fencing between Barrett's Mill and Keynsham Road was again in bad condition. He had met the agents for the Harford Trustees (Messrs. Young & Gilling) who would advise the Trustees to erect a more substantial fence if the Corporation would at the same time build up the retaining wall of the footpath. Resolved, That this be agreed to, and that the Borough Surveyor be instructed accordingly.

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5-Cement — Read, letter of 22nd ult., from the Oxford Portland Cement Co. Ltd., offering to supply cement at 50s per ton, plus railway carriage at rate of 13s 4d. per ton for deliveries to the Slab Factory, and 10s 5d. per ton for deliveries to the Central Depot. Resolved, That the offer be accepted, subject to a Contract, to be prepared by the Town Clerk, being entered into for the supply of cement for the year ending 31st March, 1924, the Contract to provide that if the Company reduce the price below 50s or if there be any reduction in railway rates, the Corporation shall be entitled to a corresponding reduction.

6--Road from Ewlyn Road to Langdon Road—Private Improvement Works—The Borough Surveyor submitted for approval an amended apportionment of the cost of Private Improvement Works in this Road amounting to £130 17s. 4d. (including supervision). Resolved, That the same be approved, that Notice thereof and of demand for payment be served upon the Owners mentioned therein and that the Resolution to Minute No. 5 of the proceedings of the Committee at their Meeting on the 19th ult., be rescinded.

7 —Whaddon Lane--Private Improvement Works—Resolved, That in view of the building operations in this Road, the service of Notices authorised by Minute No. 17 of this Committee at their Meeting on the 19th ult., be postponed for the present.

8—Bayshill Road—The Town Clerk reported that he had enquired into the circumstances in which the seat in this Road had been damaged and it appeared that this was not due to any negligence on the part of the driver of the taxi-cab. Resolved, That no action he taken and that the Resolution to Minute No. 15 of the Committee at their Meeting on the 19th ult., be rescinded.

9---Harp Hill Surface Water Drain—Read, letter of 12th inst., from the Rev. R. H. M. Bouth, stating that he would be responsible for half the cost, up to £35, of the new surface water drain in Harp Hill. Resolved. That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to have the surface water drain laid at an estimated cost of £70.

10—Main Roads—The Town Clerk submitted draft Agreement with the County Council providing for the payment by the County Council to the Corporation of the annual sum of £7,000 for a period of three years from the 31st March, 1923, towards the cost of maintenance, repair and reasonable

improvement of Main Roads within the Borough, and also the sum of £3,400 as an annual contribution by the County Council towards the cost of the maintenance, repair and improvement of Contribution Roads for the same period. Resolved, That this be approved and the Common Seal be affixed thereto,

11—Gloucester Road—Re-coating—The Borough Surveyor reported that it was necessary that the re coating of Gloucester Road should be carried out as soon as weather permitted. He recommended that some form of asphalt or bitumastic macadam construction should be adopted, that in the first place the portion of the road from Tennyson Road to Hatherley Lane (an area of about 13,000 sq. yds.) should be re-coated, and that provision should be made in the Contract for any further area decided upon to be constructed at the same price per sq. yd. Resolved, That tenders for the work be invited by advertisement and that the Chairman and Borough Surveyor be authorised to inspect roads of similar construction in Swansea and report to the next meeting of the Committee.

ART GALLERY AND MUSEUM COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Wednesday, 14th March, 1923: Present—The Mayor ; Alderman Green ; Councillors Rogers, Captain Trye and Whitaker ; Messrs. G. Dimmer and F. B. de Sausmarez. (The Mayor in the chair). 1—Curator's Report—Number of visits to the Art Gallery and Museum, 2062 (against 1,307), the daily average being 86 persons against 54 last year.

Rowley Panels—During the 54 days the Rowley Panels had been on exhibition 4,764 people had visited the Institution, a daily average of 88. 458 catalogues had been sold at 2d. each £3 16s. 4d. ; the Collecting Box had produced £1 13s. 4d. and sale of postcards 5s 2d.

Horticultural Insects—The 9 examples of Horticultural Insects ordered from Mr. A. H. Bastin, Reading, had been received, 6 of these being of injurious insects and 3 beneficial ones. They would provide a feature of very great interest. By special request he had secured these specimens without any charge for packing or carriage, an expense which usually has to be borne by the Museum, to which no part of the Grant-in-Aid is applicable.

Loans—(a) 4 Water-colours and 3 Oil Paintings which had been on loan from Mr. E. Udal, Clevedon, were about to be removed by the Owner.

(b) The three models of Nelson Ships, on loan from Major Mouat Biggs since 1911, had been removed.

(c) Councillor Captain Trye had lent a pair of Elizabethan gloves for exhibition.

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Natural History Room—The work of cleaning and re-labelling the cases of birds in the Natural History Room was in progress, as also the cataloguing of the collection of pewter, brass, copper, and steel, on loan from Mr. Isher. In this work Mr. Isher was giving every assistance and had agreed to construct metal supports for fixing inside the large case containing his material. Timber was required to construct a graduated stage, to display this collection to better advantage, and this would cost about 15s

Local Arts and Crafts Exhibition—He had been engaged in organising the forthcoming Exhibition of Local Arts and Crafts. It was intended to open the Exhibition with a Private View, on the afternoon of the 21st or 22nd inst. On this occasion, the four houses in Cheltenham contributing last year :— Messrs. H. H. Martyn & Co., Ltd., R. L. Boulton & Sons, R. E. & C. Marshall Ltd., and C. W. Hancock & Son were again contributing examples of their work in various materials. In addition, about a score of other individual workers from Prestbury, Sapperton, Campden and other places around the Cotswold Hills were sending in examples of arts and crafts work, so that there was a prospect on this occasion of showing exhibits which would indicate, that, notwithstanding the fact that the County was an agricultural one, there was a very considerable amount of art work being produced. He was preparing a catalogue which would take about 20 pages, but the cost thereof would be met by advertisements which he had secured from local firms.

Resolved, That the Report be approved and that the purchase of timber required for the graduated stage be authorised.

2—Grants of Grave Spaces—Resolved, That the Common Seal be affixed to Grants Nos. 6694 to 6710 (both inclusive) of the exclusive right of burial in the graves referred to therein, which had been purchased.

3—Grave Spaces—The Superintendent reported that further 1st Class grave spaces were required. Resolved, That a footpath 5 feet wide with a grass verge 2 feet wide on either side thereof be made through Sections A.1. and B.1. on the site of grave spaces Nos. 1591 to 1650 and that the under mentioned spaces be allocated as 1st Class and 2nd Class grave spaces, viz :—

As 1st Class grave spaces (119) — Sections A.1. and B. 1. Spaces 1542 to 1600 and 1641 to 1700.

As 2nd Class grave spaces (113)—Sections A 1, and B. 1. Spaces 1493 to 1550 ; 1691 to 1729 and 1735 to 1750.

Resolved, Also, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to have the Plans of the Cemetery in the Town Clerk's Office and at the Cemetery Office altered accordingly –

4—Designs—Resolved, That the following designs be approved, viz.: Memorial Crosses and Kerbing to the graves of Elizabeth B. Leach, Atwell R. Porter and Grace G. Smith ; Memorial Cross to grave of Eliza R. Plumbridge and Memorial Kerbing to grave of Pattie Moles.

5—War Cross and Headstones--Read, letter of 20th inst., from the Imperial War Graves Commission forwarding designs of a War Cross proposed to be erected at the junction of Drives 2 and 3 and of Headstones to be erected on the individual graves of soldiers interred in the Cemetery. The Commission applied for the exclusive right of burial in all soldiers graves, for which those rights had not already been granted, and for the site of the War Cross, to be granted to them, and they asked if the existing laurel hedge at the corner of Section F. could remain in perpetuity as a background for the War Cross.

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The Superintendent reported that, allowing for a hedge of Laurustinus 4 feet thick as a background, the War Cross would occupy the site of 8 grave spaces, Section F. 7684 to 7688 (First Class) and F. 7724 to 7727 (Second Class). He also reported that the exclusive right of burial had already been granted in respect of 19 of the 78 soldiers graves in the Cemetery and that memorials had already been erected on as graves. Resolved, (r) That the design and site of the War Cross and the design and method of fixing the headstones be approved. (2) That the exclusive right of burial in all soldiers graves for which those rights have not already been purchased, be granted to the Commission, including the site of the War Cross (8 graves). (3) That a suitable evergreen hedge 4 feet in thickness be maintained in perpetuity to form a semi-circular background for the War Cross.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, 9th April, 1923: Present-The Deputy Mayor ; Aldermen Green and Steel ; Councillors Leigh James, Rogers, St. Clair, Thomas, Welstead, Whitaker and Yarnold. (Councillor Rogers in the chair).

1-Houses without proper Ash Receptacles -The Sanitary Inspector reported that the following houses had no proper ashpits or ash receptacles, viz.:-36, Brunswick Street ; 21, 24 and 27, Naunton Crescent ; 44, Rosehill Street ; 5, Granley Cottages, St. Mark's ; 10, Russell Terrace ; 12, Townsend Place, Tewkesbury Road ; 97, Tewkesbury Road ; and 20, Great Norwood Street. Resolved, That the necessary Notices be given to the respective Owners under Section 36 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and Section 27 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, requiring them in each case to provide a movable ash receptacle of such size, pattern, and construction as may be approved by the Sanitary Inspector on behalf of the Corporation.

2-- Cleansing and Whitewashing at 36, Brunswick Street ; 24, 25, 27 and 29, Naunton Crescent ; 3, Cotswold View, Marsh Lane ; 44, Rosehill Street ; 21, Bath Terrace ; Bridge Inn, 12, Townsend Place, Cleeveland Inn, White Horse, Brandon and Swinton, Tewkesbury Road and 81, 94, 95 and 97, Tewkesbury Road. The Medical Officer of Health having certified under Section 46 of the Public Health Act, 1875, that the above-named dwelling-houses were in such a filthy and unwholesome condition that the health of the inmates was affected or endangered thereby. Resolved, That Notice be given to the Owners under the said Section requiring the houses to be cleansed and limewashed.

3-Nuisances from Drains, etc., at (a) Nos 10-19, Brecon Terrace, Rosehill Street ; 4, 5 and 6, Upper Paley and 12, Sidney Street. The Sanitary Inspector having made written application under Section 41 of the Public Health Act, 1875, stating that the drains, &c., on or belonging to the above-named houses, were in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health. Resolved, That authority be given to the Sanitary Inspector to open the ground, examine the drains, and report to the Committee.

(b) 4, 5 and 6, Berkeley Avenue and 13, 15 and 17, Bath Terrace-The Sanitary Inspector reported that he had examined the drains, etc., on or belonging to the above premises, and found the same to be defective and to require amendment and alteration. He submitted a specification of the work required to be done. Resolved, That the same be approved, and that Notice be given under Section 41 of the Public Health Act, 1875, to the Owners of the premises, requiring them to do the specified work within 28 days.

(c) Fountain Cottage and Fountain Inn, Upper Bath Road 9, 10, 10a and 11 Commercial Street ; 1-11, Victoria Place, Bath Road and 30, Upper Bath Road-The Town Clerk reported that as arranged a case had been laid before Counsel on the legal points in dispute in connection with the cost of the combined drain for these premises, and that the opinion was in favour of the Corporation and the amounts due had now been paid, together with Counsel's fee, by the Owners of the properties concerned.

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4—Insanitary Property-24, 25, 27 and 29, Naunton Crescent ; 5 and 6, Stanhope Street ; 44 and 45, Rosehill Street ; 55, Worcester Street ; 21, Bath Terrace ; 6 and 36, Brunswick Street ; 12, Townsend Place ; and 96, Tewkesbury Road. The Medical Officer of Health reported that the above-mentioned premises were in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to the health of the inmates owing to defective roofs, walls, ceilings, floors, &c. Resolved, That the Council being satisfied that the said premises are in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health, Notices under Section 94 of the Public Health Act, 1875, or Section 28 of the Housing Town Planning, etc., Act, 1919, be served upon the Owners requiring them to put the same into a healthy condition, and for that purpose to carry out the works specified therein.

5—Surrender of Diseased Meat--The Medical Officer of Health reported the surrender of 41 cwt. beef; 3 cwt. 1 qr. 5 lbs. mutton ; 11 cwt. pork ; 3 ¼ cwt. fish ; 14 lbs. tripe ; 19 tins meat, milk, etc,

6—Notices not complied with—The Medical Officer of Health submitted List of Notices requiring abatement of nuisances, etc., arising from dirty walls and ceilings, leaky roofs, etc., served but not complied with. Resolved, That the Town Clerk be instructed to take the necessary steps to compliance.

7 --Houses Unfit for Human Habitation-17 etc. Stanhope Street—The Town Clerk submitted copy of an Order of the Ministry of Health dated 27th ult., dismissing the Appeal of Mr. H. Stroud against the Demolition Orders made in respect of these premises, and directing the costs of the Enquiry to be paid by Mr. Stroud. 8— Small Pox--The Medical Officer of Health reported that three further cases of Small Pox of the mildest type had occurred in a locality not far from that before affected. The resignation of Dr. Allman Powell as Public Vaccinator had taken effect and he had written to the Ministry of Health urging them to expedite the ratification of the appointment of Dr. Atkinson to that post. Resolved, That the Medical Officer he authorised to write to the "Echo " informing the public of the further outbreak and drawing attention to the desirability of vaccination. Resolved, Also that the Guardians be asked to re-open Vaccination Stations.

9--Whooping Cough--The Medical Officer of Health reported that the Infants' Departments of St. Peter's and Holy Trinity Schools had been closed owing to the prevalence of Whooping Cough.

Refuse Collection and Disposal—During the five weeks ended 12th inst., 923 loads collected, 884 consumed, and 34 tipped away (Weight consumed 1,197 tons 17 cwts).

2—Depot—Sheds—Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to submit plans for the extension of shedding at the Central Depot.

3—Horses—The Borough Surveyor reported that the Horse Sub-Committee purchased two horses at Gloucester Market on the 23rd ult., for £48 and £45 3s. 0d., respectively, and that two of the horses hired from Mr. H. Newman would now be dispensed with. Resolved, That this be approved.

4—Royal Well Lane -Private Improvement Works—The Borough Surveyor submitted plan,
specification and estimate of the work required to be done to the footpath on the East side of Royal
Well Lane. He estimated the cost for paving with Slabs at £172 5s. 2d. and with asphalt at £111 16s.

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ART GALLERY AND MUSEUM COMMITTEE.

Curator's Report---Number of visits to the Art Gallery and Museum, 2,574 (against 1,378), the daily average being 99 as against 51.

The sale of postcards realised 3s 2d and 2 " Rock Specimen " pamphlets 1s-.

Rowley Panels—This Exhibition was closed on 17th ult. During the 58 days it was open there were 5,100 visits, a daily average of 88. Two panels were sold No. 23 (£4 14s. 6d.), and No. 73 (£3 3s. 0d.). The net cost of the Exhibition was £4. 7s. 6d.

Local Arts and Crafts Exhibition--This Exhibition was opened on the 22nd ult. There was a large attendance at the private view, and a record number of visitors during the Easter holidays. On Easter Monday visitors numbered 507, the highest number on record for one day. 1,000 copies of the catalogue were published and were nearly exhausted, and the question of publishing a second edition was under consideration. A collecting box had not been resorted to, as it was felt that donations in this way should only be sought from the public for exhibitions of other than a local character. It was a pleasing feature, however, that many enquiries for the collecting box were made by people wishing to help the work forward in a small way. A number of letters had been received congratulating the Committee on their effort, including one from the Director, Victoria and Albert Museum, London, who expressed his interest in the movement, and hoped that the Exhibition had proved a success, and who had asked the head of the Department concerned, to mention to the Committee that grants-in-aid for purchases by local Museums were available to a limited extent during the current year. Of special interest, too was the fact which the Director reported, that one of the Exhibitors, Miss Ramsay, had been asked to submit a necklet, similar to those which were on view, for purchase for circulation in the State Collections.

The Exhibition was visited officially by the President and members of the Conference of the Institute of Handicraft Teachers on the 6th inst., when the party were conducted over the Institution, after which their pleasure and surprise at the variety of art objects brought together from this district, was expressed.

Pewter—The case of Pewter on loan to the Museum had been rearranged, and in large part named. The staging had been erected, Mr. Isher supplying the iron framework gratuitously, and in order to get the work through before Easter, it had been found necessary to employ a carpenter for two days.

Donations—An important gift had been received from the Executors of the late Miss Jarratt, " The Moorings " Tivoli Road, viz :—Two mahogany cabinets, veneered in rosewood, containing 195 reproductions of Ivory Carvings, of dates between the 2nd and 16th century. These reproductions were issued by the Arundel Society in 1855, in a specially prepared material, which gives a very close imitation of the original ivories. The collection was originally issued at 25 guineas, and he estimated that the 2 cabinets apart from the specimens they contain, were worth another 25 guineas. A collection of 33 specimens of fictile ivories were already in the Museum.

A gift had also been received from Dr. N. L. Sheldon, Ph.D., F.I.C., "Granleigh," Montpellier Drive, of a geological specimen of the Inferior Oolite, from Sudeley Hill.

The total number of visitors for the past year had broken all previous records, being 31,906 as against 26,745 for the preceding year, an increase of 5,161. Proof was thereby established of the growing interest which was being taken in the collections and Institution.

The Sanitary Inspector having made written application under 41 of the Public Health Act, 1875, stating that the drains, &c., on or belonging to the above-named homes, were in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health. Resolved, That authority be given to the Sanitary Inspector to open the ground, examine the drains, and report to the Committee.

(b) 9 to 19, Brecon Terrace, Rosehill Street ; 4, 5 and 6, Upper Pilley, and 12, Sidney Street.-The Sanitary Inspector reported that he had examined the drains, etc., on or belonging to the above premises, and found the same to be defective and to require amendment and alteration. He submitted a specification of the work required to be done. Resolved, That the same be approved, and that Notice be given under Section 45 of the Public Health Act, 1875, to the Owners of the premises, requiring them to do the specified work within 28 days.

4-Overcrowding at 21, Bath Terrace, off Bath Road. The Medical Officer of Health reported that these premises were so overcrowded as to be dangerous or injurious to the health of the inmates. Resolved, That the Committee being satisfied of the existence of a nuisance on the said premises, Notice under Section 94 of the Public Health Act, 1875, be served on the occupiers thereof, requiring them to abate the same.

5-Insanitary Property-(a) 110, 111 and 236, Tewkesbury Road ; 2, Ambrose Place ; 9, Russell Place ; 1, 2 and 3, Elm View Terrace ; 1, Swindon Terrace. 42 43 and 44, Malvern Street; 3, Nelson Buildings, Wellington Passage ; Gladstone Arms, Sherborne Street; 11, Burton Cottages and 38 and 40, Winstonian Road. The Medical Officer of Health reported that the above mentioned premises were in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to the health of the inmates owing to defective roofs, walls, ceilings, floors, &c. Resolved, That the Council being satisfied that the said premises are in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health, Notices under Section 94 of the Public Health Act, 1875, or Section 28 of the Housing Town Planning, etc., Act, 1919, be served upon the Owners requiring them to put the same into a healthy condition, and for that purpose to carry out the works specified therein.

6 -Houses Unfit for Human Habitation-(a) Nos. 5, 6, 7 and 9, King Street Gardens-The Medical Officer of Health reported that these premises in respect of which a Closing Order was made in October, 1921, had not been rendered fit for human habitation and should be demolished. Resolved, That notice be given to the Owner of the premises that it is the intention of the Committee at their next meeting to consider the question of making Demolition Orders.

(b) 2, 4 and 5, Providence Place, Portland Street ; and 20, 21 and 22, Malvern Street-The Medical Officer of Health made a representation that these dwelling houses were in a state so dangerous or injurious to health as to be unfit for human habitation and he recommended that the same be closed. Resolved, That further consideration be adjourned to the next Meeting, and that Notice be given to the Owner of the intention of the Council to make a Closing Order.

7--House without sufficient Water Closet Accommodation-Gladstone Arms, Sherborne Street-It appearing on the report of the Sanitary Inspector that the above premises were without sufficient water closet accommodation. Resolved, That notice be given to the Owner requiring him to provide the same.

8-Notices not complied with-The Medical Officer of Health submitted List of Notices requiring abatement of nuisances, etc., arising from dirty walls and ceilings, leaky roofs, etc., served but not complied with. Resolved, That the Town Clerk be instructed to take the necessary steps to compliance.

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9—Surrender of Diseased Meat —The Medical Officer of Health reported the surrender of 4 cwt. 1 qr. 18 lbs beef; 8 cwt. 3 qrs. pork; 3 qrs. mutton; 2 qrs. 5 lbs. veal; 15 ox tails ; 5 tins beef and 1 tin liquid eggs.

10 -Small Pox --The Medical Officer of Health reported that the number of cases of Small Pox to date was 30. Very active measures had been taken to control the outbreak and these had been assisted by the fact that the number of Centres affected at one time had not been so numerous but that a keen supervision of known contacts could be exercised. The adoption of notification of Chicken Pox, vaccination and the visitation of contacts, especially children contacts, had been effective in lessening the number of cases. In order to keep certain contacts under daily observation and control to prevent spread of the disease, he had had to advise the withdrawal of several persons temporarily from their work and in two cases it had been necessary to give temporary supplies of food and other necessary commodities, stints, for which he submitted amounting to a total of £6 13s. 9d., and he had received four applications for a monetary allowance for loss of employment. Resolved, Also, That no allowance be made in respect of loss of employment where precautions by vaccination are not taken.

11—Sanitary Inspectors Association—Read, circular letter of 24th ult., from this Association inviting the agenda: of Delegates at the 36th Annual Conference to be held at Rhyl on September 4th-7th next. Resolved, That the Sanitary Inspector be authorised to attend the Conference.

12-Ladies' Lavatory—High Street--(a) The Borough Surveyor submitted arrangements as to hours of opening and attendants (including remuneration to the latter).

Hours of Opening—The Lavatory and Cloak Room to be opened 9 a.m. daily (except Sundays) and to remain open until 7 p.m. on Mondays (including Bank Holidays), Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays ; until 3 p.m. on Fridays and until 9 p.m. on Saturdays.

Attendants—Mrs. Barber (Arcade Caretaker's Wife) to be in attendance during opening hours except for three hours daily when she will be relieved by Miss Neale (Cleaner at the Municipal Offices).

Cleaning—Mr. Barber (Arcade Caretaker) to clean down Lavatory and Cloak Room before opening as necessary. Resolved, That the arrangements be approved.

(b) Charges—Resolved. That the charges for the use of the Lavatory and Cloak be as follows :—Use of Lavatory, 1d. Wash and Brush-up, 2d. Use of Cloak Room, 2d. per article.

" That this Meeting. realising that private enterprise has failed to build houses for the working classes, requests the Government to proceed with an adequate housing scheme on national lines, to co-operate with local authorities with a view to promoting the building of houses by direct labour, and take the necessary steps to control prices of all building material required for this purpose. We further request the Government to give local authorities power to take over all unoccupied houses, with the alternative of compelling payment of full rates as assessed."

Resolved, That no action be taken.

6—Housing Bill, 1923--The Town Clerk submitted Circular 388, of the 27th ult., from the Ministry of Health, with regard to the provisions of the Housing Bill now before Parliament. The Ministry were prepared forthwith to consider schemes which, if approved, and subject to the passage of the Bill, would be eligible for financial assistance from the Government which would take the form of an annual contribution on each house of £6 a year for a period of twenty years towards the expenses incurred by Local Authorities for the assistance of private enterprise. Where an Authority could satisfy the Minister that houses could best be provided by the Authority themselves, financial assistance would be available in respect of houses erected with the approval of the Ministry on a flat rate annual contribution on each house of £6 per year for a period of twenty years. Resolved, That Messrs Chatters, Smithson and Rainger be instructed to prepare plans for two pairs of Non-Parlour

houses (of different type), and that tenders be invited by advertisement for the erection of ten pairs of Non-Parlour houses.

1—Minutes of Previous Meeting—Resolved, That the Minutes of the Quarterly Meeting of the Council on the 7th May last, having been printed, and a copy sent to each member of the Council, be taken as read, and that the same be adopted and confirmed.

2—Unemployment—Read, circular letter of 18tb ult., from the Unemployment Grants Committee stating that the provision of works for the relief of unemployment during the Winter, 1923-24, was under consideration by the Government and asking that a preliminary statement of works which could he put in hand locally, if required, be submitted before the end of July. The terms of assistance proposed by the Government were as follows :—

I-Capital Works .financed by Loan—(a) Revenue Producing Schemes—Grants equal to 50 per cent of the interest on loans raised by Local Authorities for a period of not less than ten years, in respect of expenditure on approved schemes, would be paid by the State for a period of five years.

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(b) Schemes for work undertaken in connection with or as part of a revenue producing undertaking which, in the view of the competent department, would not themselves directly produce revenue or were not likely to produce revenue for a considerable number of years. Grants equal to 50 per cent of the interest on loans raised for a period of not less than ten years, in respect of expenditure on approved schemes, would be paid by the State for a period of fifteen years or for the period of the loan, whichever was the less.

(c) Non-Revenue Producing Schemes. Grants equal to 65 per cent of the interest and sinking fund charges on loans raised to meet expenditure on approved schemes would be paid by the State for a period of one-half the term of the loan, subject to a maximum of fifteen years.

II— Works financed otherwise than by Loan—Grants would be paid by the State on the basis of 60 per cent of the wages bill for unemployed men taken on for the work.

The general conditions previously laid down would continue to apply. It would he optional for Local Authorities to carry out schemes by direct labour or through contractors, but the view of the Government was that the contract system should be adopted to the utmost possible extent.

Resolved, That the letter be referred to the Public Health, Housing, Street and Highway, and Water Committees for consideration and report.

PUBLIC HEALTH COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday 11th June, 1923 : Present-The Mayor ; Aldermen Green and Steel ; Councillors Leigh James, Moore, Rogers, St. Clair, Thomas, Welstead, Whitaker and Yarnold. (Councillor Rogers in the chair).

1-Houses without proper Ash Receptacles -The Sanitary Inspector reported that the following houses had no proper ashpits or ash receptacles, viz. :-44, Waterloo Street ; 21, Edward Street ; 4, Imperial Square ; 13 and 14, Grosvenor Terrace ; 11, Northfield Terrace ; and 22, Gloucester Place. Resolved, That the necessary Notices be given to the respective Owners under Section 36 of the Public Health Act, 1875., and Section 27 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, requiring them in each case to provide a movable ash receptacle of such size, pattern, and construction as may be approved by the Sanitary Inspector on behalf of the Corporation.

2-Overcrowding at 5a, St. Anne's Terrace---The Medical Officer of Health reported that these premises were so overcrowded as to be dangerous or injurious to the health of the inmates. Resolved, That the Committee being satisfied of the existence of a nuisance on the said premises, Notice under Section 94 of the Public Health Act, 1875, be served on the occupiers thereof, requiring them to abate the same.

3- Cleansing and Whitewashing at 62, Roman Road ; and 10, Grosvenor Terrace ; 3, Grosvenor Cottages ; 23, Rutland Street ; and 1, Tanner's Cottages. The Medical Officer of Health having certified under Section 46 of the Public Health Act, 1875, that the above named dwelling-houses were in such a filthy and unwholesome condition that the health of the inmates was affected or endangered thereby, Resolved, That Notice he given to the Owners under the said Section requiring the houses to be cleansed and limewashed.

4-Nuisances from Drains, etc., at (a) 2, Jersey Place ; On Hewlett Street and 10, Sidney Street ; and 2, Bayshill Lawn. The Sanitary Inspector having made written application under Section 41 of the. Public Health Act, 1875, stating that the drains, &c., on or belonging to the above-named houses, were in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health. Resolved, That authority he given to the Sanitary Inspector to open the ground, examine the drains, and report to the Committee.

(b) 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10, St. Anne's Terrace and 1, 2 and 3, St. Anne's Cottages, St. Anne's Terrace -The Sanitary Inspector reported that he had examined the drains, etc., on or belonging to the above premises, and found the same to be defective and to require amendment and alteration. He submitted a specification of the work required to be done. Resolved, That the same be approved, and that Notice be given under Section 41 of the Public Health Act, 1875, to the Owners of the premises, requiring them to do the specified work within 28 days.

(c) 11, Sidney Street and 38 and 40, Winstonian Roan-Read, letters from the Owners that they were not in a position to execute the works required and asking the Corporation to do same and make the cost repayable by instalments. Resolved, That the Sanitary Inspector be instructed to obtain estimates.

5-Insanitary Property-(a) 69, Roman Road ; 2 and 10, Grosvenor Terrace ; 3, Grosvenor Cottages ; 20 and 23, Rutland Street ; 1, Tanner's Cottages, Arle; and 11, Victoria Place, Bath Road. The Medical Officer of Health reported that the above-mentioned premises were in such a state as to be a

nuisance or injurious to the health of the inmates owing to defective roofs, walls, ceilings, floors, &c. Resolved, That the Council being satisfied that the said premises are in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health, Notices under Section 94 of the Public Health Act, 1875, or Section 28 of the Housing Town Planning, etc., Act, 1919, be served upon the Owners requiring them to put the same into a healthy condition, and for that purpose to carry out the works specified therein.

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(b) 15, Burton Street—The Sanitary Inspector reported that the works specified had now been completed to his satisfaction by Messrs. Daffurn Tombs at a cost of £9 17s. 6d. Resolved, That application be made to the Owner for payment.

(c) 15, Tivoli Street—Read, letter from Miss Spring asking if the £25 3s. 6d. due for sanitary repairs could be made payable by instalments. Resolved, That an Order he made under Section 28 of the Housing Town Planning, etc., Act, declaring these expenses to be payable by annual instalments within a period of 8 years with interest at 5 per cent.

6—Notices not complied with —The Medical Officer of Health submitted List of Notices requiring abatement of nuisances, etc., arising from dirty walls and ceilings, leaky roofs, etc., served but not complied with. 10—Small Pox—The Medical Officer of Health reported that since the last Meeting four cases of Small Pox of the mildest type had occurred.

11 — Houses Unfit for Human Habitation—(a) No. 1, Limbrick Cottages--Resolved, 'That consideration of making a Demolition Order be adjourned until September.

(b) 2, 4 and 5, Providence Place, Portland Street—The Sanitary Inspector reported that the Owners of these premises offered no objection to a Closing Order being made. Resolved, That it appearing to the Council that the above-mentioned premises are in a state so dangerous and injurious to health as to be unfit for human habitation, an Order be now made pursuant to Section 17 (2) of the Housing, Town Planning, etc., Act, 1909, prohibiting she use of the said premises for human

habitation until the same have been rendered fit for that purpose, that the Common Seal be affixed to the said Order, and that Notice be given to the Owner.

(c) 20, 21 and 22, Malvern Street- Resolved, That the question of making a Closing Order be adjourned at the request of the Owners until September.

12-Surrender of Diseased Meat—The Medical Officer of Health reported the surrender of 3 cwts. 1 qr. 12 lbs. beef; 76 lbs. mutton ; and 75 tins fruit.

13--Dairies, Cowsheds, and Milkshops Order--Read, application from Mr. J. Lithbridge, 27, Grosvenor Street, to be registered as a purveyor of milk. Resolved, That the application be granted.

14— Milk (Special Designations) Order, 1923--(a) The Town Clerk submitted copy of this Order revoking the Milk (Special Designations) Order, 1922 and the Milk (Special Designations) Amendment Order, 1922. Resolved, That the same be referred to the Medical Officer of Health.

(b) Bacteriological Examinations—Read, letter of 3rd inst. from Ministry of Health stating that the fee of 15s per sample proposed to be charged by the University of Bristol was too high, having regard to the routine character of the examination and that an endeavour should be made to get the work done for a fee of 5s a sample. The Town Clerk reported that he was in communication with the County Analyst on the matter.

Total purchases £614 14s. 2d. 3 calves and 7 pigs had been bred on the Farms. 47 sheep, 7 heifers (4 barren), 5 cows (2 in calf) and 2 calves had been sold for £548 9s. 2d., and produce for £7 16s. 6d. Total sales £556 5s. 8d.

Forty Acres Orchard—The Town Clerk reported that the Owners had agreed to sell this piece of freehold land for £65. Vacant possession could be given on completion. Resolved, That the offer be accepted. Resolved, That the proceedings of the Farms Sub-Committee be approved and adopted.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Friday, 15th June, 1923. Present—The Mayor ; Aldermen Bendall and Taylor; Councillors Bastin, Rogers, Thomas and Whitaker. (Alderman Bendall in the chair).

1—Tennyson Road—Land—Read, letter from Miss D. Freeman, Hon Secretary, Cheltenham Technical Schools Old Girls' Hockey Club, applying for the use of the land in Gloucester Road, used for hockey, on the same terms as last season. Resolved, That the Club be granted the use of the ground for £3 for the season.

2—Building Contracts—Final Accounts—Read, letter of 22nd ult. from the Ministry of Health, intimating that the final statement of accounts, amounting to £20,998 10s. 11d. and £31,632 5s. 9d. in respect of twenty houses erected by Mr. W. Drew and thirty houses by Messrs. Collins & Godfrey, had been examined and on the information available the Minister had no observations to make, but that the accounts would be subject to review by the District Auditor in due Course.

3—Site for Almshouses--The Town Clerk reported that the Ministry of Health had now issued their formal sanction to the sale to the Charity Organization Society.

4—Relief of Unemployment —The Committee considered circular letter of 18th ult., from the Unemployment Grants Committee, with regard to relief works for the unemployed during winter 1923-24, Resolved, That the Town Clerk write to the Ministry of Health with a view to the shrubberies, to be made on Gloucester Road frontage, being now laid out and charged to the Housing Scheme.

5—Temporary Recreation Ground—Read, letter of 31st ult., from Mr. E. H. S. Wetherstone, protesting against the use of temporary recreation ground being restricted to residents on the Housing Estate and their children. Resolved, That the use of the ground be restricted to children in the District only and that the notice board be altered accordingly.

6—Selection of Tenants—Resolved. That the application of Mr. James McAlister of Kidderminster be not entertained, in view of the number of local applicants.

7—Housing Scheme—Read, letter of 31st ult, from Messrs. Chatters, Smithson, and Rainger, offering to undertake the erection of additional houses as a continuation of the State aided Housing Scheme, so as to give the Corporation the benefit of the reduced fees payable under that Scheme. They recommended that working drawings should be prepared for one design only for the purpose of tendering, and that, if a tender was accepted, the builder might then be asked to erect houses of varied design at a corresponding price per foot. Resolved, That Messrs. Chatters, Smithson, and Rainger he asked to submit sketch designs for approval and that they be instructed to prepare working drawings according to a design approved of by this Committee.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, 18th June, 1923. Present—Alderman Bendall ; Councillors Mann, Pates, Sawyer and Captain Trye. (Alderman Bendall in the chair).

1—Borough Surveyor's Monthly Report re Highways--The Borough Surveyor reported the work completed by the Highways Department from 18th May to 14th June, 1923 (both dates inclusive). Refuse Collection and Disposal—During the four weeks ended 7th inst., 734 loads collected, 707 consumed, and 27 tipped away (Weight consumed, 880 tons 6 ½ cwts.)

2-Cement- The Borough Surveyor submitted letter of 12th inst., from the Oxford Portland Cement Company, Ltd., stating that the railway rates were penny per ton less than reported at the last meeting.

3—Depot Sidings—The Borough Surveyor reported that these sidings required immediate repairs, which it was estimated would cost about £75 Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor be authorised to arrange with the Company to have the repairs executed.

4—Ash Vans and Carts--Covers—The Borough Surveyor reported that two of the vans and three of the carts were not provided with covers, he recommended that the two vans be provided with covers, and he submitted an offer from the Birmingham Corporation of some second-hand Ash-vans for £30 each. Resolved, that the two vans be provided with covers, and that the Chairman, Councillor Sawyer, and the Borough Surveyor be asked to inspect the vans offered, with authority to purchase three vans if satisfactory, at a cost not exceeding £30 each.

5—Stable Manure—The Borough Surveyor submitted tenders for stable manure for the ensuing year. Resolved, That the tenders of Mr. A. H. Sindrey of 10s per ton for the manure from the Central Depot ; and of Messrs. T. Carey & Sons of 10s 6d per ton for manure from the Leckhampton Depot ; and of Mr. A. W. Smith of 2s 6d per ton for sweepings from the Central Depot be accepted.

6—Colonnade—Wood Paving—The Borough Surveyor reported that the wood paving in the Colonnade was worn out and should be renewed, and recommended that it be paved with creosoted deal blocks, at a cost of £600. Resolved, That consideration be adjourned to enable the Committee to view the same.

7—Andover Road and Park Place Junction— Read, letter of 16th inst., from the Automobile Association and Motor Union, declining to supply signs for this crossing, as they were of opinion that the erection of warning signs in towns is undesirable, because to give warning at every point at which special caution is necessary would result in such a multiplicity or signs as to seriously effect their utility, and the erection of signs at this crossing would not be any more justified than at a considerable number of other crossings in the town. Resolved. That no further steps be taken in the matter.

8--Waste Paper—The Borough Surveyor reported that the cost of removing waste paper from business premises had considerably increased, and recommended that the present system of collecting the paper should be changed. He submitted a tender from the Meadow Mills, Ltd.,

offering £2 per ton for the paper, put into bags and loaded into trucks at Cheltenham. Resolved, That the business premises from which waste paper is collected be supplied with bags, to be collected when full by the Corporation, and that the tender of Messrs. Meadow Mills, Ltd., be accepted for a period of twelve months, determinable thereafter by three months notice on either side.

9—Building Bye Laws--The Town Clerk reported that draft of the revised bye-laws was ready for consideration. Resolved, That a Sub-Committee be appointed, consisting of the Chairman (Alderman Bendall), Councillors Dicks, Mann, Captain Trye and Yarnold, to consider the revision of the Bye-Laws.

10—Unemployment— Relief Works—The Committee considered circular letter of 18th ult. from the Unemployment Grants Committee referred to Committee by the Council at their last Meeting. Resolved, That this Committee is unable to suggest any Schemes suitable for the relief of unemployment.

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11—The Town Clerk reported that no one had been appointed Street Inspector since Superintendent Griffin resigned. Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor be asked to arrange for Mr. H. J. Holbourn 'o undertake this work.

12—Road from Lypiatt Terrace to Tivoli Road—Councillor Mann complained of the state of this road. Resolved, That consideration be adjourned for view.

13—Street Projections—(a) 23 Clarence Street—Resolved, That the application of Mr. Cantrill to fix an illuminated sign at these premises be granted subject to the usual conditions and to a plan being submitted to and approved by the Borough Surveyor.

Owing to the various epidemics the general standard of health had not been quite so good as previously.

Children suffering from the following complaints had been examined by the medical officers at the Centres : Impetigo 10 Glands 6, Bronchitis 16. Stomatitis 4, Asthma 2, Ringworm 6, Eczema 3, Jaundice 3, Blepharitis 2, Umbilical Hernia 3, Urticaria, Enuresis, Scabies, and Rickets. Several minor treatments had been undertaken, such as tongue cutting, scalds, and accidents to eyes, hands, and heads. There were eight deaths recorded. to cases were taken to the General Hospital ; 3 to the Eye, Ear and Throat Hospital, 1 to Battledown and 5 to the Delancey Fever Hospital. The proportion of breast-fed babies was still very high, and in consequence less dried milk was being sold at the Dispensary.

3—Unemployment Relief Works—Read, circular letter of 6th inst., from the Unemployment Grants Committee stating that the Government desired to stimulate employment of a normal character in industrial districts to assist revenue-producing schemes in which a substantial part of the expenditure would include material which would give employment in an industry seriously affected, though not necessarily in the area in which the work is to be carried out. Resolved, That the Council consent to the mains being laid in the position approximately shewn on the plan, subject to the exact position being approved by the Borough Surveyor and reserving to the Corporation the right to require the removal or alteration of any mains or services on their property, if at any time necessary owing to building development or for other reasons, and subject also to the Company undertaking to make good any damage that may be done to the property of the Corporation in laying any mains or services, and it being understood that the Corporation shall not be liable for any expenditure whatsoever in laying services or providing gas fittings or apparatus of any description to houses on the Estate.

2 — Gardens — Prize Scheme—**The Gardens Sub-Committee** reported that they inspected the Gardens on the 27th July last. Present: The Chairman (Alderman Bendall), Councillors Dicks and Moore. Prizes were awarded as follows:—

T. Saunders for permission to erect a motor cycle shed at the rear of this house be not granted.

5--Housing Act, 1923—The Town Clerk reported on the provisions of this Act. Resolved, That the Town Clerk be instructed to prepare a scheme for assisting building by private enterprise.

6—Subsidy House, Hall Road—The Town Clerk reported that the house in course of erection in Hall Road for Mr. G. Sims was not eligible for a subsidy.

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7—Fields No. 395, 396, and 440—The Town Clerk submitted draft lease of this land to Mr. C. Harris. Resolved, That the same be approved.

He also reported that he had instructed Mr. C. C. Castle to inspect and report on the condition of the land on the termination of Mr. J. R. Brown's tenancy at Michaelmas, to ascertain jibe had complied with the terms of his lease as to the proper cultivation of the land, Resolved, That this be approved.

8—Site for Almshouses --The Town Clerk reported that the Charity Organisation Society were unable to carry out their original scheme owing to restrictions imposed by the Charity Commissioners as to expenditure, which had necessitated the reduction of the size of the building and of the site. He submitted plan shewing the reduced site now required by the Society, and the District Valuer's report that he valued the reduced site (containing 2,100 square yards) at £345, free from liability on the purchasers for road making, kerbing and channelling charges, Resolved, That subject to the consent of the Ministry of Health the Council be recommended to agree to the area of the site, contracted to be purchased by the Charity Organisation Society, being reduced to 2,100 square yards, at the price of £345.

9--Gloucester Road Land--Shrubberies—The Town Clerk reported, that in accordance with the instructions of the Committee he had communicated with the Ministry of Health with a view to the shrubberies to be made on Gloucester Road frontage being now laid out and charged to the Housing Scheme, and submitted a letter of the 17th ult., from the Ministry asking to be furnished with an estimate of the cost, and stating that the Minister was advised that the land would be more readily saleable if the plots on this frontage were increased in size. Resolved, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to approach Mr. Unwin with a view to the reduction of the footpaths between the shrubberies and the houses (when erected) from 10 feet to 7 feet 6 inches.

(Alderman Bendall in the chair). 1--Borough Surveyor's Monthly Report re Highways--The Borough Surveyor reported the work completed by the Highways Department from 13th July to 13th September, 1923 (both dates inclusive).

Refuse Collection and Disposal--During the nine weeks ended 6th inst., 1533 loads collected, 1509 consumed and 24 tipped away. (Weight consumed 1507 tons 11 cwts, 2 qrs.)

2-Shoeing Horses- -Resolved, That tenders be invited by advertisement for shoeing Corporation horses.

3—Tenders for Coal—Resolved, That the tender of Messrs. J. Williams & Co. to supply 80 tons Birch Coppice deep lump house coal at 29s 9d per ton be accepted.

1-Houses without proper Ash Receptacles -The Sanitary Inspector reported that the following houses had no proper ashpits or ash receptacles, viz.:-14, Commercial Street ; 322, High Street ; 1, Belle Vue Lawn, awl Devonshire Brewery, High Street ; 33, Rose and Crown Passage ; 16 and 33, Great Western Terrace ; Stone Cottage, 5, 7, 35, 47, 51 and .54, Sherborne Street ; 58, Sun Street ; 25, St. James' Street ; 26 and 27, Grange Crescent, Gloucester Road ; and "Springfield", and 2, Pelham Villas, Alstone Avenue. Resolved, That the necessary Notices be given to the respective Owners under Section 36 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and Section 27 of the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, requiring them in each case to provide a movable ash receptacle of such size, pattern, and construction as may be approved by the Sanitary Inspector on behalf of the Corporation.

2--Cleansing and Whitewashing at Nos. 3 and 4, Richmond Cottages, Stone Cottage and No. 5, Sherborne Street ; Sherborne Arms, and 7, Fairhaven Cottages, Fairhaven Street. The Medical Officer of Health having certified under Section 46 of the Public Health Act, 1875, that the above named dwelling-houses were in such a filthy and unwholesome condition that the health of the inmates was affected or endangered thereby. Resolved, That Notice be given to the Owners under the said Section requiring the houses to be cleansed and limewashed.

3-Nuisances from Drains, etc., at (a) 44 and 54, Fairview Street ; 30, 31, amid 32, Sidney Street ; and 22, St. James' Street. The Sanitary Inspector having made written application under Section 41 of the Public Health Act, 1875, stating that the drains, &c., on or belonging to the above-named houses, were in such a state as to be a nuisance or injurious to health.
