Apologies—Apologies for absence were received from Councillors Avery, Bettridge, Fletcher and Till.

1—Election of Mayor—RESOLVED, That Councillor John Howell, F.R.C.S., C.B.E., J.P., be and he is hereby elected Mayor of the Borough of Cheltenham for the ensuing year.

The Mayor then made the Declaration of Acceptance of Office and took the Oath of Allegiance and Judicial Oath.

The Mayor in the Chair.

2—Appointment of Deputy Mayor—The Mayor signified in writing that he had appointed Alderman Capt. John Henry Tyre, C.B.E., R.N. (Retd.), to be his Deputy, and it was RESOLVED, That the appointment be recorded on the Minutes of the Council.

3—Minutes of Previous Meeting—RESOLVED, That the Minutes of the Quarterly Meeting of the Town Council held on the 30th October, 1939, having been printed and a copy sent to each Member of the Council, be taken as read, and that the same be adopted and confirmed.

4—Appointment and Duties of Committees—**Public Health Committee**—RESOLVED, That the following members of the Council do form the Public Health Committee for the ensuing year :— Aldermen Clara Winterbotham, Leigh James and Pruen ; Councillors Barnett, Rev. de Courcy Ireland, Garland, Dr. Curling Hayward, Ben James, Moore, Morris, Rogers and Waite, and that their powers and duties be as follows : To regulate and manage all matters relating to Public Health or concerning the duties of the Medical Officer of Health and Sanitary Inspector, and to carry into effect the powers of the Council under the following Acts and Orders : Public Health Acts, The Cheltenham Improvement Acts and Provisional Orders (Sanitary Provisions), Factory and Workshops Acts (except the provisions relating to Fire Escapes), Infectious Diseases (Prevention) Act, 1890, The Housing Acts, 1890 to 1936, so far as regards insanitary houses, the Housing (Rural Workers) Act 1926, and the Milk and Dairies Acts and the Orders made thereunder, the Public Health (Meat) Regulations, and the Cheltenham and Gloucester Joint Water Board etc. Act, 1936 (Sanitary and Drainage Provisions).

To deal with the repair and reconstruction of all sewers in the Borough and with the outfall sewers and sewage tanks and the

control and treatment of the sewage and to have the management and control of the Sewage Farms of the Corporation. To deal with the cleansing of watercourses and the enforcement of the provisions of the Rivers Pollution Prevention Acts.

To have the management of the Central Depot and the horses, materials and carts, etc., there ; any matters in connection with the Borough Surveyor's Department and of any properties acquired by the Corporation in respect of street improvements : To deal with matters in connection with Street Projections: To consider and regulate all matters concerning Traffic, and to manage and control the Royal Well Omnibus Station.

: To consider and report on applications for extensions of service under Superannuation Scheme. To regulate and manage the Public Parking Places.

#### PUBLIC HEALTH COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, 13th November, 1939. Present—Aldermen Leigh James and Clara F. Winterbotham ; Councillors Barnett, Rev. de Courcy Ireland, Garland, Ben James, Moore, Morris, Rogers and Waite (Alderman Leigh James in the chair).

1—Chairman—RESOLVED, That Alderman Pruen be appointed Chairman of this Committee for the ensuing year.

2—**Flooding Sub-Committee**—RESOLVED, That the Chairman and Councillors Garland, Ben James, Moore, Morris and Waite be appointed the Flooding Sub-Committee for the ensuing year.

3—**Farms and Abattoir Sub-Committee**—RESOLVED, That Alderman Leigh James and Councillors Barnett, Ben James,

Moore and Rogers be appointed the Farms and Abattoir Sub-Committee for the ensuing year.

4—Nuisances from Drains—King's Cottage, Kingsditch Lane ; 3 and 5 Duke Street—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that the drains, etc., on or belonging to the above premises were in such a condition as to be prejudicial to health and a nuisance. RESOLVED, That he be instructed to examine the drains etc., and apply any test other than a test by water under pressure, and, if necessary, to open the ground.

5—Insanitary Property at 7 Princes Street—The Committee having considered the representation of the Medical Health of Officer in regard to this house are satisfied that the said house is occupied or is of a type suitable for occupation by persons of the working classes and is unfit for human habitation in the respect mentioned in the said official representation, and that it is capable at reasonable expense of being rendered fit for human habitation. RESOLVED, That in pursuance of Sub-section 1 of Section 9 of the Housing Act, 1936, notice be given to the person having control of the house requiring him to execute the works to be specified in the notice which will in the opinion of the Committee render the house fit for human habitation.

6—Houses Unfit for Human Habitation—(a) 5,6 and 7 Exmouth Street and 30 Marle Hill Road—The View Committee reported their inspection of these premises and the Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that work was now proceeding on all the houses.

(b) 28 Union Street ; 23 All Saints' Road and 16 Waterloo Street—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that the owners of these houses had now carried out to his satisfaction the works required to render these premises fit for human habitation. RESOLVED, That their Undertakings be cancelled,
(c) 40 Queen Street—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that the Owner of this house was carrying out the necessary work to render the premises fit for human habitation.

7—Surrender of Diseased Meat, etc.—The Medical Officer of Health reported the surrender of 15 cwt. 2 qrs. 26 lbs.

of Beef : 2 qrs. of Mutton , 1 qr. 16 lbs. of Pork ; 1 qr. 19 ½lbs of Ham ; 3 qrs. 21 lbs. of Fowl 1 qr. 4 lbs. of Rabbits ; 1 qr. ¼ lb. Eggs.

8---Housing Act, 1936—Certificates as to Fitness—(a) 16 Waterloo Street and 20 Bath Terrace—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that the Owners of these houses had carried out to his satisfaction works which in his opinion would with reasonable care and maintenance render them fit for human habitation for a period of at least 10 years.

RESOLVED, That a certificate be issued to the Owners under Section 51 of the Housing Act, 1936, that the houses are fit for human habitation and will with reasonable care and maintenance remain so fit for a period of 10 years.

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(b) 47 Russell Street and 35 Queen Street—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that the Owners of these houses had in accordance with the provisions of Section 51 (i) of the Housing Act, 1936, submitted lists of proposed works with requests in writing that the Council should inform them whether in their opinion the houses would, after the execution of those works or of those works together with any additional works, be in all respects fit for human habitation and would with reasonable care and maintenance remain so fit for a period of at least five years. RESOLVED- That the Chief Sanitary Inspector be instructed to submit to the Owners lists of any additional works which he considers should be carried out before certificates could be given.

9—Analyses of Water—The Medical Officer of Health submitted his report of analyses of water taken since the last Meeting of the Committee.

10—Notification of Measles and Whooping Cough—The Town Clerk submitted Circular from the Ministry of Health together with provisional regulations providing for the notification of all cases of Measles and Whooping Cough by Medical Practitioners to Medical Officers of Health. The Medical Officer of Health reported that books of Certificates have been ordered and that copies would be sent to Medical Practitioners in Cheltenham as soon as possible.

11—Offensive Trade—Fish Frying—The View Committee reported their inspection of the premises at Royal Well House, College Place, proposed to be used as a Fried Fish Restaurant by Mrs. Haryett of Stroud. RESOLVED, That the application for permission to use these premises for the trade of fish frying be refused.

12—Diphtheria Immunisation—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the Birmingham Authorities had agreed to pay the expenses incurred in inoculating the children evacuated to Cheltenham from Birmingham against Diphtheria.

13—Tuberculosis of Mulch Cow—The Medical Officer of Health reported that a Milk Cow from Lifely's Farm was found at the Slaughter House to be suffering from advanced Tuberculosis, and it appeared that milk from this cow was marketed up to the time of slaughter. The matter had been reported to the County Medical Officer of Health. RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to write to the Clerk of the County Council pointing out the seriousness of this occurrence and asking for particulars of the numbers of the inspections taken by the County Council for Tuberculosis

14—Shops Act, 1934-3 Montpellier Avenue—The Committee considered the application for exempting these premises from the provisions of Section 10 (2) of the Shops Act, 1934, which requires the provision of sufficient and suitable sanitary conveniences, RESOLVED, That a Certificate be granted, subject to the owner undertaking to inform the Council of any alteration in the arrangements reported to the Committee

15 -Abattoir—(a) The Town Clerk submitted letter of 25th ult. from the Ministry of Food with regard to the taking over by the Ministry of the Public Abattoir. RESOLVED, That consideration be referred to the Farms and Abattoir Sub-Committee.

(b) Blood Fertiliser—The Chief Sanitary Inspector recommended that he be authorised to make arrangements for utilizing the blood from animals slaughtered at the Abattoir for conversion into fertiliser. RESOLVED, That this recommendation be approved.

16—Land adjoining Sewage Farm, Elmstone Hardwicke—The Town Clerk submitted an offer from Messrs. Merrett, Halls & Co, Ltd. to sell about 35 acres of land adjoining the Corporation Sewage Farm. RESOLVED, That consideration be referred to the Farms and Abattoir Sub-Committee and that they be requested to inspect the land.

17—Camping Site—The Town Clerk reported that he had received an application from Mr. C. C. Comely of Harthurstfield Farm, Gloucester Road, for a renewal of the licence granted to him under Section 269 of the Public Health Act, 1936, in respect of the Camping Site provided by him at these premises RESOLVED, That a licence be granted for the period 15th October, 1939, to 15th October, 1940, on the same conditions as were contained in the previous licence.

18—Land at Barn Farm Cottage—Read, letter from the County Surveyor stating that the execution of road works in this vicinity is being deferred owing to the War and asking that the provisional settlement of £5 for the land required for the improvement of Barn Farm Cottage should be regarded as still in force, so that on the cessation of hostilities the land may be taken up without delay, the payment being made at that time. In the meantime, the land should remain in the occupation of the Corporation. RESOLVED, That this be agreed to.

19—Byelaws—The Town Clerk submitted draft byelaws for preventing the occurrence of nuisances from snow, filth, dust, ashes and rubbish, which would take the place of the byelaws previously in force, which had expired. RESOLVED, That consideration be adjourned to the next meeting.

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20—Sewers—(a) Disposal of Sludge—The Borough Surveyor reported on the disposal of sludge and stated that he understood that certain of the grazing lands round the sewage works were to be ploughed up, in which case the present outlet for sludge would be seriously curtailed, and it would be impossible to proceed without the process of sludge digestion which would involve extra labour and clearing sludge from dry beds in the works. RESOLVED That the Town Clerk be instructed to write to the Agricultural Committee of the County Council and to Mr. Rymer asking that the Corporation should be consulted before breaking up land at the Sewage Farm.

(b) Main Drainage Scheme—The Borough Surveyor reported that the Sewers originally intended to be reconstructed had been examined and made recommendations with regard to the carrying out urgent work for keeping these working temporarily at an estimated cost of £785 This figure would be subject to amendment due to the difficulty of estimating at the present time He proposed to commence the work as soon as the Duke Street Sewer is completed. RESOLVED, That his recommendations be approved.

(c) Recorder at Gas Works—The Borough Surveyor reported that the automatic recorder which measured the flow of waste liquors into the sewers was worn out and the Gas Company were proposing to install a new recorder which would enable satisfactory recordings to be obtained RESOLVED, That the proposal be approved.

(d) Lower Arle Development—The Borough Surveyor reported that owing to the War, development of land at Lower Arle, adjoining the stream flowing between Arle Road and Brooklyn Road, had been temporarily abandoned and the Owner of the land on the lower level was not desirous of proceeding with the work of culverting his portion of the stream. Notices under Section 262 of the Public Health Act, 1936, had been served on the Owners concerned, but there was some justification for the objection of the Owner owing to the development of the land ceasing, RESOLVED, That the matter be referred to the Flooding Sub-Committee.

(e) Albert Road Sewer—It was reported that the connection of the Rural District Council's Sewer to the Wyman's Brook Sewer had been completed.

(f) Sewer at the rear of Nos. 1-22 Windsor Street—It was reported that a section of the Sewer outside No. 21 Windsor Street had been found to contain a large amount of silt with the result that the sewage was not getting away satisfactorily. RESOLVED, That the Borough Surveyor be authorised to sink one or two trial holes with a view to ascertaining the condition of this sewer for the remainder of its length.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Thursday, 16th November, 1939. Present—Alderman Pates ; Councillors Addis, Compton, Rev. de Courcy Ireland, Fisher, Garland, Green, Grimwade, Moore and Morris.

1—Chairman—RESOLVED, That Alderman Pates be appointed Chairman for the ensuing year.

2—Vice-Chairman—RESOLVED, That Councillor Grimwade be appointed Vice-Chairman of the Committee for the ensuing year.

3—Selection of **Tenants, View and Repairs Sub-Committee**—RESOLVED, That the following be appointed this Sub-Committee for the ensuing year Alderman Pates ; Councillors Addis, Bush, Compton, Rev. de Courcy Ireland, Fisher, Garland, Green, Grimwade, Moore and Morris.

4—Housing Manager—(a) Annual Report—The Housing Manager submitted her Report for the year ended 31st March last RESOLVED, That this be approved as now settled by the Committee and circulated to the members of the Council.

(b) The monthly Report of the Housing Manager on the collection of rents was submitted. RESOLVED, That the sum of £18 19s 10d. arrears of rent written off as irrecoverable on last month's minutes be altered to £18 7s. 4d., and that Minute No. 4 (b) of the last Meeting of the Committee be varied accordingly.

(c) Student—RESOLVED, That the Student in the Housing Office be granted a bicycle allowance of per annum.

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5—Selection of Tenants—(a) The Housing Manager reported that the number of applicants now on the Waiting List was 440 of whom 120 were on the Selected List of applicants. RESOLVED, That for the present no further applicants for tenancy of houses be interviewed by the Sub-Committee except very urgent applications.

(b) Report of Sub-Committee—Read, report of Meetings of the Sub-Committee held on the 19th October and 10th inst. and of the View Sub-Committee held on the 25th July last.

They recommended (inter alia) as follows --

(a) That the rents fixed and rebates granted, as set out in the Rents Rebate Book, signed by the Chairman, be approved.

(b) Fumigation—That the Thermotox system of fumigating houses be adopted in lieu of the present cyanide fumigation.

(c) 66-74 Hope Street —That any necessary repairs be carried out to maintain these houses in a habitable condition and that no action be taken at present in regard to their demolition.

(d) 2 Kingsley Gardens—That the gaps in the hedge of this house be filled up with privet.

(e) 24 and 26 Milton Road—That the Servall Grates be removed and replaced with new open grates and boilers.

(f) That the sheds and out-buildings inspected by the Sub-Committee be approved as now reported.

RESOLVED, That the proceedings of the Sub-Committee be approved and adopted.

6—Steel Casements—RESOLVED, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to proceed with the interior painting of the steel casements of houses on the Moors Estate and also of the houses erected under Contracts "A " and "B " on the Whaddon Estate, and that half the houses on the Moors be painted with graphite ante-rust paint, and half with aluminium paint.

7—Benhall Gardens and Benhall Cottage—The Borough Surveyor reported that Benhall Cottage was in a poor state of repair, and also the out-buildings of Benhall Gardens, and a sink was required in the wash-house of the latter premises. He estimated the cost of carrying out the work at Benhall Cottage at £15, and Benhall Gardens at £64. RESOLVED, That he be instructed to have this work carried out. 8—Whaddon Farm Estate—(a) RESOLVED, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to renew the turf verges on the Whaddon Farm Estate where these have become worn.

(b) RESOLVED, That the due proportion of the cost of constructing the roads and footpaths adjoining sites which have been sold off be charged against the purchase money received from the sales of the sites.

9-38 Waterloo Street—Read, letter of 3rd inst. from the Ministry of Health that, in view of the circular from the Treasury, the Minister was not prepared to issue loan sanction of £59 for the purchase of this house. RESOLVED, That the Ministry be asked if they will consent to the Corporation purchasing the property if the cost is charged to revenue.

10—Keeping of Poultry on Housing Estates—The Town Clerk submitted circular of 7th inst. from the Ministry of Health on the importance at the present time of relaxing so far as may be practicable such restrictions as may exist to prevent the keeping of poultry by tenants of Council houses. The Ministry was of the opinion that even in normal times it was desirable that tenants of Council houses should be allowed such reasonable freedom to keep poultry as is consistent with the preservation of amenities, and he felt sure that the particular importance of this form of food production with the aid of household, garden and allotment refuse at the present time would be evident to all Authorities. The Ministry urged Authorities which had thought it necessary to prohibit the keeping of poultry to reconsider the matter with a view to determining how far the prohibition could reasonably be relaxed.

It was necessary for the good of the community as a whole that proper safeguards, especially in urban areas, against the possibility of a nuisance being created by poultry keeping should be imposed. These should include the use only of types of hencotes approved by the local authority ; control over siting ; restriction, according to space available, of number of birds kept ; and a ban on keeping of male birds capable of creating a nuisance to neighbours by crowing.

RESOLVED, That the circular be considered when any applications are received.

RESOLVED, That this be agreed to, also that the Borough Surveyor supply the Ministry of Transport with a description of the condition of the existing culvert as requested,

8—Boundary Fence, High street—The Borough Surveyor submitted letter of 25th ult. from the Entertainments Manager for permission to place a pictorial sign on the fence on the High Street frontage of Lance's old site. RESOLVED, That no objection be made to the proposal.

9—County Road Estimates, 1940-41—The Borough Surveyor read letter of 8th inst from the County Surveyor asking for draft of County Road Estimates for 1940-41 to be submitted by the 15th inst. and that he had submitted the following estimates for the respective roads :—

6--Supply to Gas Company—It was reported that the Cheltenham & District Gas Company are considering taking the supply of Electricity for their works in Lower Mill Street which would involve laying a low pressure 3 phase cable from the Gloucester Road Sub-Station along Arle Avenue a distance of 160 yards at a cost of £143 plus £38 10s. 0d. for the service cable to the premises The Borough Electrical Engineer recommended that as there is no immediate prospect of any other consumer being supplied from the new cable the Gas Company be asked to pay half the cost, the Corporation to pay the other half because this cable will eventually be interconnected with the ordinary distribution system. The Gas Company would pay the whole of the charge for the Service Cable. RESOLVED, That this recommendation be approved.

7—Duplicating Machine----The Committee considered the recommendation of the General Purposes Committee that this Committee should contribute towards the cost of the purchase of a new Gestetner Duplicating Machine. (d) The Borough Treasurer reported that H. Rimell, Ambulance Driver at Delaney Hospital had been certified by the Medical Officer as medically unfit. RESOLVED, That he be paid a pension of 10s a week in respect of 8 years contributory and 8 years non-contributory service.

9--Airport—The Town Clerk reported that the Joint Airport Committee at their Meeting on the 14th inst agreed to recommend that the two Corporations should contribute £100 towards the cost of £396 incurred by Rotol Airscrews Ltd. in constructing a concrete roadway from their hangar (erected on the land leased to them) to the landing ground. RESOLVED, That this recommendation be adopted.

10—Employees on War Service—The Committee further considered the making up of civil pay to employees with H.M. At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, 11th December, 1939. Present—Aldermen Pruen and Clara F. Winterbotham ; Councillors Barnett, Rev. de Courcy Ireland, Garland, Dr. Hayward, Ben James, Morris and Rogers (Alderman Pruen in the chair).

1—Houses Unfit for Human Habitation—(a) 40 Queen Street—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that the work of reconditioning this house was being carried out.

(b) Bruton Cottage—RESOLVED, That consideration be adjourned for one month and that the Owners be informed that unless a proposition is placed before the Committee by that time a Demolition Order will be made.

(c) 14 and 15 Hereford Place (converted into one house) ; 6 and 21 Queen Street ; and 16 Clare Place—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that the owners of these houses had now carried out to his satisfaction the works required to render the premises fit for human habitation. RESOLVED, That their Undertakings be cancelled.

(d) 4, 5 and 6 Exmouth Street—The Committee further considered the work required to be done to render these premises, in respect of which an Undertaking had been given by the Owner, fit for human habitation. RESOLVED, That the Owner be asked to attend a Meeting of a Sub-Committee consisting of the Chairman, Alderman Winterbotham and Councillor Morris to discuss the question of structural alterations.

2—Surrender of Diseased Meat, etc.—The Medical Officer of Health reported the surrender of 6 cwt. 13 lbs. Beef 2 cwt. 3 qrs. 23 lbs. Pork ; 54 Rabbits ; 14 Fowls ; and 1 qr. 14 lbs. Eggs.

3—Analyses of Water—The Medical Officer of Health submitted his report of analyses of water taken since the last Meeting of the Committee.

4—Housing Act, 1936—Certificates as to Fitness--14 and 15 Hereford Place—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that the Owners of these houses had carried out to his satisfaction works which in his opinion would with reasonable care and maintenance render them fit for human habitation for a period of at least 10 years. Evans be registered as Common Lodging housekeepers until the 30th June, 1940, in respect of Cumberland Villa, Grove Street and the Shamrock, High Street respectively.

6—Tuberculosis of Milk Cow—Mr. J. Brain, Veterinary Surgeon, and Mrs. Lifely attended and were interviewed by the Committee with regard to the cow which as reported previously had been slaughtered at the Abattoir and found to be suffering from advanced Tuberculosis. RESOLVED, That consideration be adjourned and that Mr. Lifely and Mr. Mudway (the butcher who had purchased the cow from Mr. Lifely) be asked to attend the next Meeting of the Committee.

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7—Milk (Special Designations) Order, 1936—RESOLVED That the following applications for licences be granted for one year to the 31st December, 1940, subject to the provisions of the Order :--

(c) Applications of Mr. M. E. Chamberlayne and the Gloucester Co-operative & Industrial Society Ltd. for Dealers' Licences authorising the use of the Special Designation " Pasteurised " in relation to milk sold for consumption at Christowe, Sandford Road and in the Borough respectively.

(d) Application from Mr. F. Hammond for a Supplementary Licence authorising the use of the Special Designation " Accredited in relation to milk sold in the Borough.

8—Offensive Trade—Fish Frying—RESOLVED, on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health, That consent be given under Section 107 of the Public Health Act, 1936, to the trade of fish frying being carried on by Mr. W. T. Morris at his shop at 82 Tennyson Road, by Mr. Collins at his shop in Whaddon Road, by the Cheltenham Spa Fisheries at their premises in Gloucester Road, and by Mr. W. T. Harris at his shop at 76 Tewkesbury Road, until the 31st December, 1940.

9—Food and Drugs Act, 1938—(a) The Chief Sanitary Inspector submitted Certificates of the Public Analyst in respect of 6 samples of milk and one each of linseed oil, cocoa, powdered glucose and sultanas all of which were found upon analysis to be genuine

(b) RESOLVED, That the Standing Sub-Committee be asked to meet when necessary in order to consider reports of any unsatisfactory samples analysed and to make any necessary observations and recommendations.

(c) RESOLVED, That the premises set out in the report of the Chief Sanitary Inspector be registered for the sale of Ice Cream, Preserved food etc. in accordance with Section 14 of the Act. RESOLVED, also, That an advertisement be inserted in the "Echo" calling attention to the provisions of the Section.

(d) Authority to enter Premises—RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be authorised to sign Certificates authorising Mr. C. W. Clifford, Mr. F. Keene and Mr. A. L. Jones to enter premises under Section 77 of the Food and Drugs Act, 1938.

10—Abattoir—(1) The Sub-Committee recommended that the use of the Abattoir be offered to the Ministry of Food on the following terms:-

(a) The Ministry to pay the cost of the blackout--£190 ; headage charges in accordance with the scale, plus 1d. per head per beast for stunning ; a contribution to cover meat inspection for the County Area, £62 10s. 0d. ; and the Electricity and Water charges to the ordinary scale of charges.

(b) The Services to be provided by the Corporation as follows :— (i) Use of Abattoir, buildings and equipment as now completed. (ii) The Corporation to pay all rates, land taxes, insurance and loans thereon, also to provide wagon, horse and driver for removal of offal.

(2) Read, letter of 28th ult., from the Ministry of Food agreeing to pay on the basis of tolls but stating that they were not willing to contribute towards the recent capital expenditure incurred amounting to £513 nor to make a contribution towards the meat inspection which they considered would be met by the tolls from the County Area. The Ministry did not desire to take the initiative in suggesting that the Council should contract for the slaughter of stock but it was open to them to do so if they so desired.

(3) Read, also, letter from the Cheltenham Butchers' Buying Committee forwarding a resolution, namely :—" That the Cheltenham Butchers' Buying Committee, in the event of the Corporation entering into a contract with the Government for slaughtering, were willing to give all the support and co-operation in their power."

RESOLVED, That the Ministry be informed that the Corporation consider that the expenses (190) incurred for the blackout should be paid by the Government and also the additional capital cost incurred in rendering the premises suitable for their use and that the Town Clerk be instructed to enter into further negotiations with regard to this.

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11—Byelaws--RESOLVED, That consideration of the draft Byelaws for preventing the occurrence of nuisances from snow etc. be further adjourned to the next Meeting of the Committee.

12—Importation of Meat etc. (Wrapping Materials) (Amendment) Order, 1939—The Town Clerk submitted circular letter from the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries together with a copy of this Order. RESOLVED, That the Order be referred to the Chief Sanitary Inspector.

13—Corporation Sewage Farms—Read, letter of 18th ult., from the War Agricultural Executive Committee stating that at present no land on these farms had been scheduled for ploughing and that they would see that no land is scheduled for ploughing without consulting the Corporation,

14—Influenza and Typhoid Fever—The Town Clerk submitted Circulars Nos. 1865 and 1906 together with Memoranda from the Ministry of Health with regard to typhoid fever and influenza respectively. RESOLVED, That these be referred to the Medical Officer of Health.

15—Benhall Farm—Nuisance front Caravans—Read, letter from Mr. C. Harris, tenant of this farm, stating that the caravans which had been causing a nuisance to adjoining householders, had now all been removed.

16—Treatment of Foodstuffs contaminated by Gas—Read, letter of 24th ult., from the Ministry of Food with regard to the steps to be taken for the treatment and disposal of foodstuffs contaminated by gas, The Ministry requested local authorities to authorise officers qualified for food inspection to deal with such contaminated foodstuffs. The letter pointed out the desirability of such officers undertaking the full anti-gas course. RESOLVED, That the Chief Sanitary Inspector, who had already taken the anti-gas course, be placed in charge of the actual work and that the Assistant Sanitary Inspectors be asked to take the course with a view to assisting with the treatment of contaminated food and that the Ministry be notified accordingly.

17—Billets for Troops—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that he had been supervising the provision of sanitary and other equipment in preparation for the reception of about 200 troops. He foresaw complaints arising as a result of insufficient screening of W.C, apartments by canvas screens particularly in Clare Street. RESOLVED, That he be authorised to take such steps as he may deem necessary to ensure adequate screening.

18—Alleged pollution of Well by Sewage—The Borough Surveyor reported that the tenant of Ivy Cottage, Hester's Way, alleged that his well had been polluted by sewage pumped on to adjacent lands. No sewage had reached a point nearer the well than 80 yards and the discolouration appeared to be due to flood water passing over clay. RESOLVED, That the Medical Officer of Health be instructed to take a sample of the water in the well for analysis.

19—Windsor Street Sewer—The Borough Surveyor reported his investigation of this sewer. The sewer is constructed of old pipes which have moved and sag in places. He estimated the cost of reconstruction it at £200. He recommended in the present circumstances that a manhole be constructed at each end which would enable the sewer to be rodded and kept clear in the meantime. This would cost about £40. RESOLVED, That this recommendation be approved.

4—Wages and Conditions of Service—(a) Casual Employees—The Borough Surveyor submitted application from the National Union of General and Municipal Workers for the advance granted by the National Civil Engineering Conciliation Board of a half-penny per hour as from the second full pay period in December to be granted to the Corporation casual labourers, also for the wages to be reviewed every four months during the emergency periOd. The Borough Surveyor reported that on Minute No. 28 (a) (vi) at the Meeting of the Committee on the 24th January, 1938, the Council agreed that casual general labourers should be paid according to the Civil Engineering rate. RESOLVED, That the advance of one half-penny an hour be granted to the casual labourers as from the second full pay period in December.

(b) Read, circulars from the National Federation Building Trades Operatives that the wages of men engaged in the building industry had been increased by a half-penny an hour from the 1st inst. RESOLVED, That this increase be given to the Corporation employees engaged in the building industry including any builders labourers.

5—Trunk Road—The Borough Surveyor reported that at the request of the Ministry of Transport he had supplied an estimate of the expenditure proposed to be incurred on the Trunk Road during the ensuing year amounting to £3,315. RESOLVED, That this be approved.

6—Annual Tenders—The Borough Surveyor reported that as instructed he had circularised the present Contractors to ascertain on what terms they would be willing to extend the present Contracts which expire on the 31st March next, and he now submitted the replies received. In nearly every case the Contractors were prepared to extend their Contracts subject to the payment by the Corporation of legitimate trade increases, RESOLVED, That this be approved.

7—Leckhampton Depot—The Borough Surveyor submitted letter of 7th inst. from Mr. H. Boreham asking when it was intended to take possession of the land recently purchased. RESOLVED, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to take possession of the land and mark off the land purchased by concrete posts.

8—Pittville Street Improvement—(a) RESOLVED, That the Sub-Committee be asked to consider and report on the sale and development of this site.

(b) Left Book Club—Read, letter from Mr. J. Curtis that the rooms offered were too small for the purpose required and asking if other rooms about treble the size could be let to them. RESOLVED, That the Committee have no other suitable rooms.

(c) 13 Pittville Street-----The Town Clerk reported an offer from Mrs. Weaver to rent No. 13 Pittville Street on a quarterly tenancy at a rent of £45 per annum exclusive subject to the Corporation blocking up the doorways which connect the premises with No. 14. RESOLVED, That the offer be accepted and the Common Seal be affixed to the Tenancy Agreement.

9—Private Improvement Works—(a) Arle Road—The Borough Surveyor submitted plans, specifications and estimates for making up the unpaved portions of two lengths of footpath in Arle Road, at an estimated cost of £150 for one section and L988 for the other section, plus £4 10s. 0d. for each crossing required. RESOLVED, That the same be approved RESOLVED, also, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to approach the developers and abutting owners to ascertain if they are prepared to deposit the cost of carrying out the work, failing which notices be given under Section 150 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and the Cheltenham Improvement Acts 1852 and 1889, to the owners of the premises abutting on these footpaths requiring them to do the specified work within twenty-eight days, and in default of the Notices being complied with the Borough Surveyor be instructed to have the work carried out.

(b) Alstone Lane—The Borough Surveyor submitted plans, specifications and estimates for the making up of the west end of Alstone Lane by the abutting owners, at an estimated cost of £1,436 plus £4 10s 0d. for each footpath crossing required. RESOLVED, That this be approved. RESOLVED, also, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to approach the developers to ascertain if they are prepared to deposit the cost of carrying out the work, but failing this, Notice be given under Section 150 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1889, to the owners of the premises fronting, adjoining or abutting on this portion of the road requiring them within twenty-eight days to carry out the work specified in the plans, specifications and estimates of the Borough Surveyor for making up this road and that in default of the Notices being complied with, the Borough Surveyor be instructed to have the work carried out.

(c) Brooklyn Road—The Borough Surveyor submitted plan, specification and estimate for the paving of the footpath adjoining No. 217-249 Brooklyn Road at an estimated cost of £210, the Corporation to take down and re-erect the fence to the new line at an estimated cost of £75 as previously agreed. RESOLVED, That the same be approved, and that notices be given under Section 150 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and the Cheltenham Improvement Acts 1852 and 1889, to the owners of the premises abutting on this footpath requiring them to do the specified works within twenty-eight days, and in default of the Notices being complied with the Borough Surveyor be instructed to have the work carried out.

10-11 Winchcomb Street—The Town Clerk reported that this shop had been let to Miss Tessier on a quarterly tenancy at a rent of £39 per annum, plus rates, subject to the Corporation carrying out the necessary repairs and certain decoration work at a cost of £40. RESOLVED, That this be approved.

11-103 Promenade—Read, letter of 25th ult., from Messrs. Lear & Lear asking for the trees in front of the premises to be pruned in the Spring. RESOLVED, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to have this done.

12—Blackout—(a) Pillar Boxes—Read, letter of 23rd ult. from the Chamber of Commerce suggesting that the Post Office Pillar Boxes should be marked with a white band. The Town Clerk reported that he had written to the Postmaster who had replied that it was considered that the whitening of the Pillar Boxes was included in the general instructions given to Local Authorities by the Home Office and that the cost should be borne by the Local Authority. RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to communicate with the Home Office thereon.

(b) Promenade Flower Beds—Read, letter of 24th ult. from the Postmaster asking if the railings round the flower beds outside the Post Office could be illuminated at night. The Borough Surveyor reported that red lamps were now placed on the railings. RESOLVED, That this be approved.

(c) RESOLVED, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to paint white the chains on the pedestrian guards at the Promenade Traffic Island.

13--Streamer Across Promenade—Read, letter of 11th inst. from Mr. R. H. Vince asking for permission to erect a streamer across the Promenade advertising his Course of Advent Missions to be held at the Town Hall on Sunday afternoons. RESOLVED, That consent be not granted.

14—Land, Brooklyn Road—Read, letter of 2nd inst. from Mr. I. Maddox, that owing to the war he had to find another situation necessitating his removing to South Wales, in which case he would be unable to proceed with the development of the land which he contracted to purchase in Brooklyn Road and asking whether, in the circumstances, the Corporation would release him from his Contract and return the deposit. The Town Clerk reported that Mr. Maddox had contracted to purchase a frontage of 321 ft. at £3 15s. 0d. per foot, and made a deposit of £240. He had completed the Conveyance of 89 ft. in respect of which £66 15s. 0d. of the deposit had been credited to this portion of the sale leaving the Conveyance of the remaining 232 ft. to be completed in respect of which the Corporation held a deposit of £173 5s. 0d. RESOLVED, That the Committee are prepared to release Mr. Maddox from his Contract to purchase the remaining land, but are not prepared to return the deposit.

1—Prepayment Meters—The Borough Electrical Engineer reported that on the publication of the Fuel and Lighting Order issue of prepayment meters was discontinued but that with the modification of the Order he recommended that these meters should again be issued for lighting but not for power circuits. This would avoid lighting consumers having to pay a deposit. RESOLVED, That these recommendations be approved.

2—Cars—It was reported that two staff cars and the Austin Van used by the Electricity Department, all of which had covered a considerable mileage, were in need of extensive repairs and, in view of the large number of second hand cars which would probably come on the market at the beginning of next year, the Borough Electrical Engineer recommended that it would be more economical to replace the present cars than to incur considerable expenditure in reconditioning them. RESOLVED, That the Chairman and Councillor Grimwade be authorised to purchase two second hand cars of 12 or 14 h.p. and one 10 or 12 h.p. car or chassis on which the body of the present van could be remounted.

3—E.D.A. Area Executive Committee—RESOLVED, That the Borough Electrical Engineer be nominated representative of the Corporation on the Executive Committee for the ensuing year and that Mr. Williams be authorised to attend any Meetings which Mr. Bache is unable to attend.

4—Hire Purchase Appliances---RESOLVED, That application be made to the Electricity Commissioners for consent to charge the cost of hire and hire purchase appliances (to be purchased as required) to Revenue Surplus Account,

2—Inspections—The Borough Engineer reported the work carried out by the Water Inspectors during the month of November.

3—Appeals—The cases entered in the Appeals Book were considered, and the rates settled and adjusted.

4—Supply to Staverton Court, Etc.--The Town Clerk reported that Mr. R. B. Prettejohn had asked that the Agreement with him and Major Cobden for supply of water to Staverton Court, Staverton Lea, and Staverton Court Farm should be cancelled, and that the Corporation should take over the 3 inch main from the road to Staverton Court Farm and supply the three properties through meters and render accounts direct to the consumers. RESOLVED, That, subject to Major Cobden and Mr. Sadler agreeing, this be agreed to, and that the Agreement dated the 6th February 1934 be cancelled.

5—Extensions to Mains—Benhall Farm Site—The Borough Engineer reported that H.M. Office of Works had now commenced the erection of temporary buildings on the Benhall Farm site. The Office of Works were not willing to deposit the full cost of the main and asked that the Corporation should make a contribution towards the cost of the main. RESOLVED, That the Council be recommended to contribute 20 per cent of the total cost estimated at £300 subject to the Corporation's payment not exceeding £60 and that Minute No. 6 passed at the last Meeting of the Committee be varied accordingly.

6—Tewkesbury Water Works—Oil Separator—The Borough Engineer reported negotiations with Messrs. Hathorn, Davey & Co. in regard to the Oil Separator on the engine which had not proved satisfactory The firm recommended that a filter should be installed. RESOLVED, That the Borough Engineer be authorised to purchase this.

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7—Cultivation of Lands Order—The Town Clerk reported that the Gloucestershire War Agricultural Executive Committee had served notices on the tenants of Lower Woodlands Farm and Castle Barn Farm directing them to plough up Fields Nos. Pt. 322 and 95 containing 13 and 14.4 acres respectively.

8—Staverton Water Supply—The Borough Treasurer submitted report on the proposal to take over from the Rural District Council the portion of the District Council's main through which water had been supplied to Gloucester. The main was laid in 1934 by the District Council at a cost of £2,669. The loan debt now outstanding was £909 due to the Public Works Loan Board with interest at 3 ½ per cent repayable by instalments of £53 12s. Od. per annum for the next twenty-five years Income from properties now taking water from the main was £74 3s. 10d. per annum. He recommended that the Corporation should agree to take over the main and to pay the Rural District Council the loan charges of £53 12s. Od. per annum for the remaining period of twenty-five years, and also the sum of £510, being the sum paid by the Rural District Council out of rates towards loan expenses. RESOLVED, That he be instructed to examine the drains and apply any test other than a test by water under pressure, and, if necessary, to open the ground.

3—Houses Unfit for Human Habitation—(a) 86, 87 and 88 Albion Street (now 65, 67 and 69) and 29 and 31 Bath Terrace—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that the owners of these premises had now carried out to his satisfaction the works required to render these premises fit for human habitation. RESOLVED, That their Under-takings be cancelled.

(b) Bruton Cottage, Portland Street—The Committee considered the question of making a Demolition Order in respect of these premises. RESOLVED, That the Council being satisfied that the dwellinghouse, which is occupied or is of a type suitable for occupation by persons of the working classes, is unfit for human habitation, and is not capable at a reasonable expense of being rendered so fit, and no undertaking having been given by the Owner with respect to the carrying out of the work required or the future user of the house, a Demolition Order be now made by the Council in pursuance of Sub-Section (4) of Section 11 of the Housing Act, 1936, requiring that the house shall be vacated within 28 days from the date on which the Order becomes operative, and that the premises shall be demolished within six weeks after the expiration of the above-mentioned period, or if the house is not vacated by that date, within six weeks after the date on which it is vacated.

(c) 5, 6 and 7 Exmouth Street—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that he had discussed the question of further structural alterations to these premises with the Owner who had agreed to carry out the required works. (d) 95 Prestbury Road—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that this house was in need of extensive repairs to make it fit for human habitation. RESOLVED, That it be viewed by the Rota Sub-Committee and that a report be made to the next Meeting of the Committee.

4—Housing Act, 1936—Certificates as to Fitness-21 Queen Street—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that the Owner of this house had carried out to his satisfaction works which in his opinion would with reasonable care and maintenance render it fit for human habitation for a period of at least 10 years. RESOLVED, That a certificate be issued to the Owner under Section 51 of the Housing Act, 1936, that the house is fit for human habitation and will with reasonable care and maintenance remain so fit for a period of 10 years.

5—Surrender of Diseased Meat, etc.—The Medical Officer of Health reported the surrender of 4 cwt. of Pork, 1 qr. 2 lbs. of Mutton, 1 qr. 25 lbs. of eggs and 3 turkeys which together weighed 21 ½ lbs.

6—Analyses of Water—(a) The Medical Officer of Health submitted analyses of water taken since the last Meeting of the Committee.

(b) Ivy Cottage, Hesters Way—The Medical Officer of Health submitted a bacteriological analysis of water from a well at these premises taken in pursuance of a complaint by the tenant that the water had been contaminated by sewage from the adjoining land. The analysis showed that the water was contaminated and was unsuitable for a drinking supply. He also reported that the structure of the well was defective, rendering contamination from the adjoining garden and land inevitable. RESOLVED, That the Owner or Tenant be called upon to reconstruct the well with properly stained walls carried above the surface and that he be informed that failing this being done application will have to be made to the Justices under Section 140 of the Public Health Act, 1936 for an Order closing the well.

7—Health Department Motor Van —Read , letter from the Wicliffe Motor Co. Ltd. stating that it would not be possible to give delivery of the Morris 10 cwt. van before the end of February and giving the Committee the alternative of a Bedford 1042 cwt. van or a Ford 10 cwt. van, each at a cost of £168 less 10 per cent The cost of the Morris van would have been £180 less 10 per cent. RESOLVED, That the 10/12 cwt. Bedford van be purchased at £168 less 10 per cent.

8—Pasteurised Milk—The Medical Officer of Health submitted his quarterly report on the examination of pasteurised milk. One of the samples analysed proved unsatisfactory. He was making investigations as to the cause of this and would report at the next Meeting.

9—Food and Drugs Act—The Chief Sanitary Inspector submitted certificates of the Public Analyst in respect of 6 samples of milk Nod. 11-16, 1 sample of jelly, 1 of sugar, 1 of condensed milk and 1 of whisky, all of which had proved satisfactory.

10—Registered Slaughter Houses—The Chief Sanitary Inspector submitted his report on the various private slaughter houses in the Borough. RESOLVED, That this be referred to the Abattoir Sub-Committee for consideration and report.

11—Abattoir--(a) Read, letter of 3rd inst. from the Ministry of Food stating that the plan of control for meat and livestock would come into force on the 15th inst. and that as from that date the Ministry would be the only slaughterer of stock in the Council slaughter house. The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that the Cheltenham Master Butchers' Association had contracted to carry out the slaughtering.

(b) RESOLVED, That a Meeting of the Farms and Abattoir Sub-Committee be held at the Abattoir to consider various questions with regard to staff and working conditions after the Ministry commence slaughtering at the Abattoir.

12—Disposal of Condemned Meat- -The Committee considered the recommendation of the Street and Highway Committee to dispose of condemned carcases to the Gloucester City Soap Works, with a view to closing down the Refuse Destructor entirely. Reports from the Borough Surveyor and the Chief Sanitary Inspector were read. The proposal to close down the Destructor would deprive the Steam Disinfector of steam and would also leave fish offal etc. still to be dealt with. RESOLVED, That the matter be referred to the Borough Surveyor and Chief Sanitary Inspector for further consideration with a view to submitting a scheme for the installation of a plant which would enable the carcases etc. to be disposed of economically and would also provide steam for the Disinfector and that an estimate be submitted of the income which might be derived from the manufacture and sale of by-products

13—Entry of Coal Gas into Sewers—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported complaints received from several houses in Rosehill Street and Hales Road of a smell of gas in the outside W.C.'s at these houses from which it appeared that gas from a damaged gas pipe was finding its way into the public sewer, The Gas Company were making investigations as to the cause of this. The Owners of the houses concerned had no interceptor traps. Steps had been taken to warn the occupiers of the danger.

14—Tuberculosis of Milk Cow—Mr. Lifely attended and stated that he was not aware that the cow was suffering from Tuberculosis. He sold the cow to Mr. Mudway for £5 Mr. Mudway, who was previously unknown to him, called to enquire if he had a cow for sale, and stated that he did not want a particularly good cow He sold the cow because it suffered from milk fever which was a recurrent disease and it had also had a fall and was slightly lame. The milk had been used for feeding the calf and none had been used for sale. At the last Meeting of the Committee Mr. J. Brain, the Veterinary Surgeon, stated that he had inspected Mr. Lifely's " accredited " herd which included this cow, on the 22nd August last when the herd was quite satisfactory. The cow must have since developed acute Miliary Tuberculosis, otherwise "Galloping Consumption." There would be no outward evidence that it was suffering from this disease except that it would be emaciated, which might be due to other causes than Tuberculosis. The Committee are satisfied that none of the milk had been used for human consumption.

A letter was read from Mr. Mudway, who had been invited to attend the Committee, that he saw no good purpose in attending the Meeting. He had purchased the cow to complete his stock for that week and had taken it to the Abattoir for slaughter and inspection, and had paid all fees. He considered that he had complied with all the regulations respecting the slaughter and saw no reason why this case should be singled out from any other.

RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to write Mr. Mudway that the Committee consider the purchase for £5 of this cow which was in a very emaciated condition and also lame, and, on slaughter, proved to be in a very advanced state of Tuberculosis, required explanation and they therefore considered it fair to him to give him an opportunity of attending the Committee Meeting, and were surprised that he had not thought it desirable to do so in his own interest.

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15—Land at Elmstone Hardwicke—The Town Clerk submitted the District Valuer's report on the land offered by Messrs. Merrett, Halls & Co. He recommended that the land should be purchased at the price of £940 plus Vendors legal costs, which sum the Owner is prepared to accept. RESOLVED, That a provisional contract be entered into for the purchase of the property on these terms and that application be made to the Ministry of Health for sanction to a loan of £969 for the purchase money and costs and stamp duty.

16—Central Council for Health Education—Read, circular letter of 18th ult. from the Central Council for Health Education applying for renewal of the annual contribution to the Council of £2 2s. 0d. RESOLVED, That this be renewed.

17—Sewage Works- -The Borough Surveyor submitted an application from A. Price, employee at these works, for a grant towards the cost of a new set of dentures to replace those which this employee had lost in one of the settling tanks. RESOLVED, That the Committee regret they are unable to accede to this request.

18—Wages of Public Convenience Attendants—The Borough Surveyor submitted an application from the National Union of General and Municipal Workers for an increase in the wages of the two male attendants at the Montpellier Conveniences. RESOLVED, That this be referred to the Labour Sub-Committee.

19—Windsor Street Sewer--The Chairman read a letter from Councillor Miller with regard to the decision of the Committee at their last Meeting to construct a manhole at each end of this sewer and to keep it clear by rodding instead of completely renewing the sewer The Borough Surveyor reported that the manholes, which will in any case be necessary, would be completed before the next Meeting of the Committee. RESOLVED, That he be instructed to report further at the next Meeting as to the condition of the sewer.

### HOUSING COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Thursday, 18th January, 1940. Present—Alderman Pates ; Councillors Addis, Bush, Fisher, Grimwade, Moore and Morris (Alderman Pates in the chair).

1—Housing Manager—(a) The Housing Manager submitted her monthly report on the collection of rents.

(b) Pupil Trainee—The Housing Manager reported that Miss Watson had completed her probationary period and recommended that she be now admitted as Pupil under the training scheme. RESOLVED, That this be agreed to, and that she be paid a wage of 10s per week as from the 1st January for the first six months, to be increased to a week for the first year, and thereafter £1 10s. 0d. per week.

(c) The Committee further considered the application of the Housing Manager for an increase in her car allowance of per annum. RESOLVED, That tier allowance be increased to £32 per annum, as from the 5th February.

2—Keeping of Poultry—The Housing Manager submitted applications from tenants of 43 Kipling Road, 260 Swindon Road and 7 St. Peter's Square for consent of the Council to keep fowls RESOLVED, (a) That the application of the tenant of 43 Kipling Road be granted subject to the fowl house to be erected being first approved, and to this being raised above the ground, and also to no cockerels being kept. (b) That the applications of the tenants of 260 Swindon Road and 7 St. Peter's Square be not granted as the Committee consider the back gardens of these houses are too small to permit of poultry being kept.

3—Repairs Superintendent—(a) The monthly report of the Repairs Superintendent was submitted.

(b) Car Allowance—The Borough Surveyor reported that in January last when the car allowance of £40 for the Repairs Superintendent was fixed, the Committee intimated that they were prepared to review the matter at the end of one year. He now submitted application from the Repairs Superintendent for an increased car allowance together with particulars of the mileage run. RESOLVED, That his car allowance be increased to £52 per annum

4-38 Waterloo Street—The Town Clerk reported that the purchase of this property had been completed. The Chief Sanitary Inspector submitted three tenders for the demolition of the property. RESOLVED, That the tender of Mr. W. Wiggett, amounting to £6, being the lowest, be accepted.

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5—Selection of Tenants Sub-Committee—Read, report of the Selection of Tenants Sub-Committee of their Meetings held on the 22nd ult. and 5th inst.

They recommended (inter alia) as follows :--

(a) That the rents fixed and rebates granted, as set out in the Rents Rebate Book, signed by the Chairman, be approved.

(b) That the tender of Mr. J. H. Newman amounting to £31 for fixing new grates in four houses on the St. Mark's Estate be accepted.

(c) That, in arriving at the rents of tenants who are liable to loss of wages during wet and frosty weather, the percentage of 15 per cent be deducted for the six winter months, October to March, and 5 per cent during the six summer months, instead of 10 per cent throughout the year as at present, and that the income scale be amended accordingly.

(d) Repairs—That the revised schedule of prices for internal decorations submitted by the Repairs Superintendent be approved as now settled by the Sub-Committee.

RESOLVED, That the proceedings of the Sub-Committee be approved and adopted.

## STREET AND HIGHWAY COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, 22nd January, 1940. Present-The Deputy Mayor ; Aldermen Pales and Ward ; Councillors Addis, Fisher, Grimwade and Morris (Alderman Trye in the chair). 1—Road Works, etc.—The Borough Surveyor submitted particulars of road works, etc., proposed to be carried out during the ensuing month. RESOLVED, That these be approved.

2—Superannuation—The Borough Engineer reported that A. Richards, Sweeper, had to retire as he had had his right leg amputated above the knee. He had been in the service of the Corporation for 25 years and his superannuation would be 17s 1d a week. RESOLVED, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to report at the next Meeting as to the financial position of Mr. Richards.

3—Horses, etc.—Harness—The Borough Surveyor reported that the harness sold by Messrs. Pearce, Pope & Sons realised a net sum of £15 19s. 0d., after deduction of cost of advertising and commission.

4—Payment of Wages During Sickness—The Borough Surveyor reported that in reference to the circular letter recently sent out to all the employees in regard to non-payment of wages during illness, four men employed in the capacity of foremen and a Stoker at Alstone Baths had previously been informed in writing on their engagement that they would be paid during sickness tip to two weeks' full pay and two weeks' half-pay less National Health Insurance benefit. RESOLVED, That the men be informed that it is not the intention of the Council to worsen the conditions of employment of any employee, and that the above conditions as to payment during illness may be regarded as unaltered.

5—Coal—The Borough Surveyor submitted letter from J. Williams & Co. that when submitting their fuel tender on the 12th June, they had omitted to insert the variation clause prepared by the South Wales Control Board for all contracts ending at that time. In pursuance of this clause the Control Board sanctioned an increase of 6d. per ton for all coal despatched on or after the 20th October last, and Messrs. Williams & Co. now asked that this increase should be allowed them. RESOLVED, That the increase be allowed for all coal delivered on or after the 1st inst.

6—Junction of Francis Street and Exmouth Street—The Borough Surveyor submitted letter from Mr. A. J. Bettridge, asking if the Committee would consider purchasing the block of condemned property at the junction of these street' in view of the fact that part of the site would eventually be required for Street Widening. RESOLVED, That the District Valuer be asked for his valuation of the property.

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7—Pedestrian Crossing— The Borough Surveyor submitted letters from Mr. E. D. Wynn offering to supply on trial a system of illumination for Pedestrian Crossings patented by him. RESOLVED, That the Borough Surveyor be authorised to accept the offer subject to the approval of the Police being obtained to an experiment being made.

8—Junction Montpellier Terrace and Bath Road—The Borough Surveyor submitted plan showing the rounding off of the footpath on the south side of the junction of these roads, He estimated the cost of carrying out the work at £5. RESOLVED, That he be instructed to have this done.

9—Military Service—The Borough Surveyor reported that two of his senior assistants had received a circular from the Institution of Civil Engineers inviting applications for commissions in the Army from candidates who had had experience in road construction or similar concrete work. The assistants, who were aged 32 and 30 respectively, had asked if they might submit applications, as if they

became liable for military service, they might not then have the opportunity of obtaining these commissions. RESOLVED, That the Committee cannot recommend the General Purposes Committee to consent to their volunteering at present, but that the matter be reconsidered in two or three months' time.

10—Private Improvement Works—Brooklyn Road—The Borough Surveyor submitted plans, specification and estimate for the paving of the footpath adjoining Nos. 191-215 and 186-240 Brooklyn Road, at an estimated cost of £470 plus £2 for each crossing required. RESOLVED, That this be approved RESOLVED, also, That notices be given under Section 150 of the Public Health Act 1875 and the Cheltenham Improvement Acts 1852 and 1889 to the owners of the premises abutting on this footpath requiring them to do the specified works in 28 days and in default of the notice being complied with, the Borough Surveyor be instructed to have the work carried out

11—Refuse Collection Disposal—Salvage—The Borough Surveyor submitted circular on salvage of material from dust-bin refuse which he had received from the Ministry of Supply and an officer of the Department had interviewed him on the matter Local Authorities are urged not to regard the salvage of material as a profit-making scheme, but rather as a national duty. All prices are controlled, and at the present time markets can be found for all materials salvaged, and a monthly return had to be made of all material collected and sold. Local Authorities were specially urged not to incinerate condemned meat but to send this to a firm dealing with the recovery of waste products. A considerable quantity of scrap metal had been collected and sold since the last Meeting, and all timber sorted and materials suitable for re-use put on one side. One man was employed salvaging material from the tip while two others were employed on baling paper and putting together collected material for sale. The four Bedford Freighters had been provided with a separate compartment for the collection of paper. In due course the Borough Surveyor would submit a financial statement showing whether the arrangement was being worked economically or not.

12—Asphalt Plant—The Borough Surveyor reported that he had invited offers for the disposal of the above plant and two offers had been received. RESOLVED, That the offer of J Cashmore of £77 10s. Od. for the plant, but excluding the building, a portable steam engine and one of the bitumen boilers, be accepted.

13—Wages and Conditions of Service—(a) Paviors--The Borough Surveyor submitted application dated 20th inst. from the National Union of General & Municipal Workers for the paviors' rate to be increased by ½ d. per hour as from 1st December last to agree with the Building Trade operatives' wages. RESOLVED, That the application be granted as from 1st December last.

(b) The Borough Surveyor reported that he had received application from the National Union of General & Municipal Workers for an increase in wages for all employees (except the Electricity Department) and an application in respect of employees at Tewkesbury and also an application from an electrician. RESOLVED, That these be referred for consideration of the Labour Sub-Committee and that they be authorised to report direct to the Town Council.

14—National Joint Industrial Council--The Committee further considered the letter from the National Joint Industrial Council asking the Corporation to join the newly established Council for the Local Authorities Non-Trading Service (Manual Workers) for the Counties of Gloucester, Somerset and Wilts. The Town Clerk reported that, as instructed, he had circularised the Boroughs and larger Urban Districts to ascertain their views on the proposals. The following had already agreed to join, namely : Mangotsfield Urban District Council, Trowbridge Urban District Council, Bridgwater, Yeovil and Swindon Boroughs The following had however decided not to join, namely : Bath, Gloucester and Weston-super-Mare. RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to communicate with the Gloucester City Council asking them to appoint representatives to discuss the matter with this Committee, and also to inform Bath and Weston-super-Mare of the proposed conference and to invite them to attend.

15—Streamers Across Promenade and High Street—Read, application from the Local Savings Committee for permission to hang a streamer across the Promenade and also one across High Street advertising the Savings Campaign Week from 5th-IOth February. RESOLVED, That consent be given for two days during the week subject to the usual conditions

16—The Grove—The Town Clerk reported that notice had been given to take over this road and no objection had been received. RESOLVED, That the road be now taken over as repairable by the Corporation.

17—Welland Lodge and Cleevemount Roads—Read, application of 20th ult. from Messrs. Rainger & Rogers applying on behalf of G. A. M. Hall, Ltd. for these roads to be taken over by the Corporation. RESOLVED, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to report thereon at the next Meeting.

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18—Montpellier Terrace—Read, report of damage to "Halt "Sign in Montpellier Terrace by a motorlorry The Town Clerk reported that the cost of making good the damage amounting to £4 15s. 5d. had been settled under a Sharing Agreement with the Insurance Company concerned.

19—Alleged Right of Way, Rear of Brooklyn Road—Read, letter of 28th ult. from Mr. M. A. Blake protesting against the fencing which had been placed over the alleged road way at the rear of Brooklyn Road on the Orchard Estate. The Borough Surveyor submitted plan showing that the alleged right of way was an occupation road leading from Arle Farm to fields at the rear of Brooklyn Road and was not shown on the deposited Map under the Footpaths Act. RESOLVED, That Mr. Blake be informed that it does not appear to the Council that any right of way exists over the occupation road.

20—Pittville Street Improvement—(i) Report of Sub-Committee—Read, report of the Sub-Committee of their Meeting held on the 9th inst Present—The Deputy Mayor (in the chair); Alderman Ward Councillors Fisher and Grimwade. The District Valuer (Mr. Ellis Moore) also attended.

The Sub-Committee recommended (inter alia) as follows:-

(a) Sale of Site—The Sub-Committee had considered enquiries from Messrs. J. Trevor & Sons, Green Shops Ltd., and Messrs. Dudley Samuel & Harrison asking on what terms the Corporation would be prepared to sell or lease the site as they had clients who were interested in the site if they were able to arrange for the building to be erected, and asking if the Corporation could render any assistance in securing a supply of building materials. They recommended that as there was no prospect of their

being able to erect the building during the war, the firms be informed that the Committee think that it is desirable that negotiations should be postponed for the present.

(b) Stead & Simpsons' Property—That, having considered the report by the District Valuer of his negotiations for the acquisition of Stead & Simpsons' property, the District Valuer be authorised to negotiate terms for the purchase of this property for completion on the 31st March next, subject to consent of the Ministry of Health to a loan being obtained, and to the consent of the Capital Issues Committee being given to the raising of the Ioan. Also, That he be instructed to negotiate terms for Messrs. Stead & Simpsons' remaining on after completing the purchase as tenants.

(c) Hoarding—That the application of Wyndham B. Lock to rent space on the hoarding adjoining the Arcade for advertising a Shooting Range in America Passage be not granted.

(d) 11 Pittville Street—That these premises be let to the Cheltenham District Traction Co. for augmenting their offices and waiting room accommodation in North Street on a quarterly tenancy at a rent of £30 per quarter plus rates, subject to the Corporation not being required to expend any money on the premises.

(e) 8 Pittville Street—That these premises be let to Mr. D. Cloak for the sale of cats' and dogs' meat on a quarterly tenancy at a rent of £6 10s. Od. per quarter, plus rates, the Corporation to have the water carried up from the basement to the back room and to provide a sink and to repair the broken window in the back room and fan-light at a cost of about £8.

RESOLVED, That the proceedings of the Sub-Committee be approved and adopted.

(2) 13 Pittville Street and 11 Winchcomb Street—The Town Clerk reported that the tenancies of these premises at a rent of £39 each per annum, plus rates, for Confectioners' shops, had fallen through as the Food Control Committee had refused registration. In coming to this decision, the Committee had presumably considered the large increase of nearly 10,000 in the population in Cheltenham and district since the outbreak of war, and the closing of some of the Hotels, but no grounds have been given for refusing the application and the parties concerned were not given an opportunity of attending. RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to write to the Food Control Committee asking to be informed on what grounds the applications were refused.

(3) British. Home Stores—The Town Clerk submitted Award made by the Arbitrator on the recent arbitration held in regard to the claim made by British Home Stores Ltd. for the sum of £20,000 for their interest under an agreement for lease of the site formerly belonging to Cardigan Estates Ltd. The Arbitrator had awarded the sum of £1,500, each party to pay their own costs and the Corporation to pay the Arbitrator's fees, etc., amounting to £25 1s. 0d.

21—Petrol Pumps, Portland Street—Read, letter from Messrs. A. Williams & Co., asking to be relieved of the payment of 5s per annum wayleave in respect of three out of four of their petrol pump swing arms as they were now only using one pump. RESOLVED, That the payment for three of the swing arms be waived as from the 1st November last for so long as the pumps are out of use, and that the Building Inspector be instructed to see that the pumps are sealed.

22—Malthouse Lane—Councillor Addis reported that this road had not been scavenged for two months. RESOLVED, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to report thereon at the next Meeting.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Thursday, 25th January, 1940. Present—The Deputy Mayor (in the chair); Alderman Ward Councillors Addis, Morris, Green and Grimwade.

1—General Employees--Read, application of 4th inst. from the National Union of General & Municipal Workers for an increase of 3s per week to male manual employees, ½ d. per hour for female manual employees, and 3d. per shift to night-watchmen as from the 1st September last, as recommended by the West Midland Joint Industrial Council on the 2nd inst., the increase to remain in operation until the last pay day in March, 1940. RESOLVED, That the application be granted as follows, all as from the 1st December, 1939, viz. :—

3—Midwives Acts—(a) Medical Assistance—The Medical Officer of Health reported that 51 applications had been received from Midwives for medical help during the period from the 1st October to 31st December, 1939, and that the total amount of doctors' fees claimed for the period from the 1st October to 31st December, 1939, was £98 16s. 6d., of which £55 13s. 5d. was chargeable to patients.

(b) The Medical Officer of Health reported that the following special notifications had been received from Midwives during the quarter ended 31st December, 1939: Still-births 2 ; Deaths of Infants 2 ; Deaths of Mothers 1 ; Commencement of artificial feeding 2 ; Liability to be a source of infection 4.

4—Dentistry—(a) The Medical Officer of Health reported that 50 mothers and infants had attended the School Dentist on Saturday mornings and 70 mothers and 13 infants on Wednesday evenings during the quarter in accordance with the arrangements made with the Education Committee. The number of Wednesday evening sessions held during the quarter was 12.

(b) Small Children—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the Children's Hospital had suggested the following fees for providing accommodation for the School Dentist to carry out the extensive extractions for young children including the provision of an Anaesthetist, namely :—

Services of Anaesthetist ... 7s 6d for each case but not to exceed one guinea for one session of one hour.

Hospital Fee ... 5s for each case to cover cost of Anaesthetist, use of theatre, ward washing, etc. RESOLVED, That these be approved

(c) The Medical Officer of Health reported a case of a necessitous mother requiring a denture at a nett cost of £2, towards which the Charity Organisation Society would pay half. RESOLVED, That this Committee agree to pay the other half.

5—Gynaecological Clinic —The Medical Officer of Health reported that 6 Clinics had been held to date and the total number of attendances was 21, including 11 Borough patients. He submitted the account for payment. RESOLVED, That this be paid.

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6—Orthopaedic Scheme—The Medical Officer of Health submitted report on the work of the Orthopaedic Clinic for the quarter ended 31st ult. The total number of children on the Register was 170, of which 91 were chargeable to the Education Committee, and in respect of which 28 surgeons' consultations had been held; 79 children were chargeable to this Committee, in respect of which 13 surgeons' consultations had been held. He submitted accounts of the proportion of the fees payable by this Committee RESOLVED, That these accounts be paid.

7—Puerperal Pyrexia Cases—The Medical Officer of Health reported three cases of Hospital treatment in respect of which an account of £17 12s. 0d. was due to the General Hospital. Special nurses had also been provided in two cases at a cost of 13s. RESOLVED, That these accounts be paid.

8—Milk Supply—(a) The Medical Officer of Health reported that Mr. Dix of 56 Brunswick Street had made a mis-statement of his income. RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to warn Mr. Dix that if this occurs again, proceedings will be taken against him.

(b) Read, letter of 24th November last from the Ministry of Health that it was never intended that attendance at Clinics should be made a condition of participation in the proposed new Milk Scheme. The Ministry hoped therefore that the Council would re-consider its intention that mothers covered by the Scheme would be expected to attend once a month at the Clinics, unless they plead ill-health or some other reasonable excuse. The Town Clerk reported that he had informed the Ministry that the Committee would agree not to require attendance at the Welfare Clinics as a condition of participation in the Scheme. RESOLVED, That this be approved, and that the Medical Officer of Health be authorised to arrange for those mothers who find it inconvenient to attend a Clinic, to attend at the Municipal Offices on two mornings to be arranged.

9—Victoria Horne—(a) Mr. R. B. Seaton, the Honorary Treasurer of the District Nursing Association, attended and informed the Committee of the financial position of the Association. The Association was for the first time faced with a loss which was wholly in respect of the Maternity Ward. The loss was mainly due (1) to the Association being unable to obtain pupil midwives and having to employ all fully-trained nurses; (2) to the salaries of the nurses having to be increased to the same as the domiciliary midwives in accordance with the scale provided by the Ministry of Health , and (3) to the decline in ward fees in view of the fact that the Home had ceased taking in private patients. The subscriptions to the Association had also declined. As the Maternity Ward was now used solely for cases sent in by the Town Council and the County Council, the Association considered that the two Authorities should come to some arrangement with them to make good the deficit. The Medical Officer of Health reported that the discontinuance of taking in private patients had resulted in adequate accommodation being provided in the Home for Borough cases, and there was now no

need for extended maternity ward accommodation. RESOLVED, That the Committee consider it desirable that a conference of representatives of the two Councils and the Association be held to discuss this matter, and that the County Council be asked to appoint four representatives to attend the Conference and the Association two representatives. RESOLVED, also, That the Chairman (Alderman Leigh James), The Mayor, Councillors Garland and Grimwade be appointed the representatives of this Committee to attend the Conference.

(b) Domiciliary Midwives—RESOLVED, That the Medical Officer of Health be instructed to report at the next Meeting as to whether it is now possible to dispense with the services of one of the midwives under the Midwives Act Scheme.

(c) The Town Clerk reported that, as instructed, he had written to Nurse Boote and Nurse Boston, who had failed to refund to the Association the proportion of the confinement fees due to the Association in respect of two cases for which the Association had supplied nurses as the two nurses booked had been unable to attend. Nurse Boote had duly paid the fees, but no reply had been received from Nurse Boston. RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to report Nurse Boston to the Central Midwives Board.

(d) The Medical Officer of Health reported that the Victoria Home had provided an A.R P. shelter for the patients and staff and had also considerably improved the Ante-Natal Clinic, and they asked the Corporation to contribute £25 towards the cost. RESOLVED, That this be agreed to.

10—Committee—(a) Read, letter from Mrs. Mellersh, Chairman of the Infant Welfare Association that Mrs. Gurney, one of their representatives on the Committee had resigned. They recommended that Miss Tinson should be appointed in her place. RESOLVED, That this recommendation be approved and adopted.

(b) Read, letter of 13th ult. from the Cheltenham Maternity Hospital Scheme Committee asking if they might appoint a representative on the Committee. The Town Clerk reported that the Act required that at least two-thirds of the Committee must be members of the Council and as there was no vacancy on the Committee it was not possible to accede to the application unless the Committee was enlarged by appointing two further members of the Council. RESOLVED, That the applicants be informed that there is no vacancy on the Committee.

11 — Day Creche—Read, letter of 6th lilt, from the Chairman of the Infant Welfare Association that her Committee had considered the question of the necessity of establishing a Day Creche in Cheltenham, but that, after making enquiries, they were satisfied that there was not sufficient demand at present to justify the expenditure for this purpose. If and when any large factory or works were opened in or near Cheltenham employing female labour, the Committee would reconsider the matter as the necessity for establishing some sort of Day Creche near the factory or works might then arise.

3-105 High Street—The Borough Surveyor submitted letters of 11th and 29th ult. from Rotol Airscrews Ltd, pointing out that the second condition attached to the approval of the use of 105 High Street as a factory for war work, namely, no vehicle to enter or leave the premises by the High Street entrance in reverse gear, would seriously affect production at the factory. 6--Licensed Premises—(a) Brooklyn Road—The Borough Surveyor submitted plans of the proposed public-house to be erected by the Cheltenham Original Brewery Company on land off Brooklyn Road. The site was in an area scheduled in the Town Planning Scheme as a shopping centre. RESOLVED, That the Committee approve the proposal subject to detailed plans being submitted for approval in due course.

(b) Hotel Majestic—The Town Clerk reported that he had received notice of the application to be made to the Licensing Justices for a full licence in respect of the Hotel Majestic. RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to inform the owners that, if the Council does not receive a satisfactory undertaking that the exterior Fire Escape will be provided in accordance with the Notice served on them under the Public Health Act, the Council will oppose the application when this is heard by the Magistrates.

(c) Thirlestaine Hall Hotel—The Town Clerk submitted notice of the intention to apply to the Magistrates for a licence to sell intoxicating liquors at Thirlestaine Hall Hotel. The Borough Surveyor submitted letter of 25th inst. from Messrs. Steel, Lane & Yeend that the owner was willing to consent to a restricted licence for the following purposes;

(1) To residents, their guests and visitors.

(2) To non-residents taking a meal at the premises.

1—Medical Baths—(a) The Monthly Report of the Superintendent was submitted. (b) Decontamination Section—RESOLVED, That no charge be made for the use of the accommodation provided at the Spa Baths for three First Aid Parties and temporary Decontamination Section.

2—Alstone Baths—The Borough Surveyor reported that military authorities had now ceased to use the Alstone Baths and he had therefore reduced the staff to the usual winter establishment.

3—Town Hall—The Entertainments Manager submitted letter of 26th ult. from the District Leader of the British Union of Fascists asking for a list of vacant dates as they were now compiling their 1940 list of bookings for Meetings to be addressed by Sir Oswald Moseley. RESOLVED, That the Entertainments Manager be authorised to let the Hall for this purpose subject to a Bond of £500 being entered into in respect of each booking to provide against damage being caused.

4—Entertainments Sub-Committee—Read, reports of the Meetings of the Entertainments Sub-Committee held on the 2nd and 9th inst.

They recommended (inter alia) as follows :--

(a) A.R.P. Cafe Variety--That the free use of the Town Hall be granted for a Cafe Variety for A.R.P. workers to be held on the 13th February.

(b) Chair Storage--That the tender submitted by Messrs. Smith Bros. for a shed to be erected at the rear of the Town Hall for storage of chairs at a cost of £29, plus £4 for drainage etc. (for which provision had been made in the estimates) be accepted, and the Borough Surveyor be instructed to have this erected in the position approved by the Sub-Committee. 3s

(c) That the free use of the Town Hall be granted on the 8th February for a Public National Savings Meeting to be addressed by Lord Elton.

(d) That the free use of the Pillar Room be granted to the Horticulture Committee for Lectures on the 6th February and 5th March to be given by Dr. G. Reddington and Mr. P. G. Clarke, and that the free use of the large Hall be granted on the 4th April for a Lecture to be given by Mr. Middleton.

(e) Medical Baths—That a flat rate of 17s 6d per week be charged for the treatment of war casualties including treatment of civilian casualties due to air raids.

RESOLVED, That the proceedings of the Sub-Committee be approved and adopted.

5—Town Hall—(a) Bar Licences—The Entertainments Sub-Committee reported that they had considered the recommendations of the Magistrates in regard to the Dances at the Town Hall, Councillor Waite reported the interview he had had with Superintendent Hopkins on this matter. The Sub-Committee made the following recommendations :—

(1) That except on special occasions (such as the Pantomime Ball, etc.) the doors of the Town Hall be closed for admissions at 11 p.m., and that between the hours of 10 p.m. and 11 p.m. careful discretion as to admissions be exercised.

(2) That one of the Corporation's uniformed attendants be on duty at the front door, both at Municipal Dances and other Dances, to see that these instructions are carried out.

(3) That the bar be closed on all occasions at least half-an-hour before the end of each Dance. RESOLVED, That the recommendations of the Sub-Committee be approved and adopted.

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(b) The Sub-Committee had considered applications for the booking of the Town Hall for Dances to be given by the Office Staff of Aircraft Components Ltd., and for a Whist Drive and Dance by the Sports Club of Gloster Aircraft Works, and the Entertainments Manager submitted letters from the Secretary of Aircraft Components Ltd , and the Aircraft Components Dance Committee that arrangements had been made to provide stewards throughout the building for the whole evening and to allow no admission after 10 p.m.

They recommended (a) That the application of Aircraft Components be granted, and (b) That the application of the Sports Club of the Gloster Aircraft Works be not granted.

RESOLVED, That the recommendations of the Sub-Committee be approved and adopted.

6—Sandford Park—Read, letter of 10th inst. from Bertram Mill's Circus that, with a view to keeping as many members of their staff in employment as possible, they had decided to run a modified tenting circus this summer within the limits imposed by war time conditions, and asking if they could take Sandford Park for the Circus for three days on dates to be arranged at a rent of £40. They would undertake to leave the ground in a clean and tidy condition. RESOLVED, That the Parks and Recreation Grounds Committee be recommended to let the ground for this sum, subject to the Circus undertaking to pay the cost of making good any damage and to their leaving the ground in a tidy condition.

7—Winter Garden—The Committee further considered whether any steps could be taken to preserve the walls and floor of the Winter Garden from damage by rain, and Mr., T. Overbury attended.

Mr. Overbury reported that he had made an examination of the roof from the ground from which it appeared that about 150 sheets of glass in the roof had either slipped out of position or had broken. The cause of the slipping of the glass was due to defective stops on the ends of the glazing bars ; the panes of glass which had not broken could be put back in position and new stops added to the bars to keep the glass in position. Where the panes of glass were broken, these could be replaced with Asbestos Sheets. With regard to the walls, he suggested that the existing eaves gutters be cleaned out and given a thick coat of a bitumastic mixture which would run into the joints and help to make them water tight, and any cracks in the gutters could be repaired in canvas and treated with the same material.

He recommended that a steeple-jack should be employed to examine the roof and to furnish an estimate of the cost of the work. He considered that a steeple-jack would carry out repairs such as this at a much less cost than a builder, and an estimate would cost very little to obtain.

With regard to provision of a new roof, the revised tender of Messrs. Broads of Malvern for this was £10,910 It was based on their original tender but had been adjusted having regard to the present conditions and to the rise in wages and costs of materials since the tender was accepted and included for the advance in wages expected in the coming month. It provided for raising the walls, clerestory windows and other contingent items as well as the actual re-roofing, also for cost of removing the present roof, also for remodelling of the roofs of the twin towers and the essential repair of the towers, a sum of £100 was also included for electrical work. No sum was, however, included for Architects fees etc.

Mr. Overbury pointed out that if the building was left in its present state for the likely period of the war, the walls and floors would probably be in a ruinous state beyond restoration.

RESOLVED, That the Committee are unable to recommend the Council to spend any money on repairing the existing roof, but that as it is of pressing importance to preserve the building from ruin, application be made to the Ministry of Health for consent to a loan of £10,910 for the cost of re-roofing the building. RESOLVED, also, That if the consent is received, application be made to the Capital Issues Committee of the Treasury for consent to the raising of the loan.

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## ELECTRICITY AND LIGHTING COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, 29th January, 1940. Present—The Mayor; Alderman Leigh James; Councillors Addis, Grimwade, Moore and Rogers (Councillor Rogers in the chair).

1—Public Lighting—Read, application from the Cheltenham & District Gas Company for a payment towards the standing charges incurred by the Company in respect of the 25 street gas lamps in the

Parish of Prestbury now added to the Borough. The charge per lamp was £3 11s. 9d., which the Company stated included £1 10s. 0d. for maintenance and 10s 3d per lamp per annum for capital and interest charges. RESOLVED, That the Borough Electrical Engineer be instructed to negotiate terms.

2—National Savings Committee—The Borough Electrical Engineer submitted an application from the National Savings Committee for a free supply of electricity for lighting and heating to temporary premises for about a fortnight in connection with the local Savings Campaign. RESOLVED, That the application be granted.

3--Electricity Department Staff—The Borough Electrical Engineer reported that 7 members of the technical staff had been obliged to lose one or two weeks of their summer holidays owing to the declaration of war and requested the Committee to authorise the grant of equivalent pay in lieu of the time lost. RESOLVED, That they be paid 75 per cent of their salary for the period of holiday lost.

4—Bulk Supply Stand-by—The Borough Electrical Engineer reported an interview he had had with the General Manager of the S.W. & S. Power Company. The question of a standby supply from the West Gloucestershire Power Company's 33,000 volt line from Gloucester was considered ; to increase the capacity of the line to 8,000 K.V.A. would cost about £14,000 and to increase it to 15,000 K.V.A. would cost about £19,000. The Company were of the opinion that both the cost of the alteration and the cost of the stand-by supply should be brought into the bulk supply terms since the existing terms only take account of apparatus on the existing lines. The Borough Electrical Engineer also reported that the Company will have a direct line of supply from Stourport to Evesham during the coming summer which by providing a third route will contribute greatly towards ensuring continuity of supply to this area. RESOLVED, That the Company be informed that the Corporation are not willing to contribute towards the cost of the alteration of the Gloucester line.

5—H.M. Office of Works Buildings—It was reported that an enquiry had been received as to the terms upon which a supply of electricity could be extended to a block of office buildings for the Office of Works, RESOLVED, That the Borough Electrical Engineer be authorised to negotiate terms with the Office of Works.

6—Special Meter Readings—The Committee considered recommendation from the Finance Committee that consumers should be charged for the reading of meters when required by them in addition to the ordinary readings. RESOLVED, That the Committee consider such a charge would result in a very small increase in the revenue and would be inadvisable as small services like these cost very little but contribute largely towards fostering good relations between the Corporation and consumers.

7—Car Allowances—The Borough Electrical Engineer reported that P. H. Cox, one of the Assistant Engineers, had used his own car for several years almost entirely for his work but had never been granted any allowance and he recommended that an annual allowance of be made in respect of this car as from 1st September last. He also reported that Mr. W. Ball, Public Lighting Assistant, had used his car extensively at his own expense for Corporation work but that the car was at present laid up. He recommended that a grant of £10 be made for the use of this car during the previous year RESOLVED, That the recommendations be approved. 8—Overhead Lines—The Town Clerk reported receipt of the consent of the Ministry of Transport to the erection of overhead lines in Charlton Kings to Welling Hill Farm.

9—Gas Tests—(a) Quarterly Report—Read, report of the Gas Examiner for the quarter ended 31st ult. which showed the average calorific value to be 473.0 B.Th.U.

(b) Periodical Reports—Received, reports of gas tests made on the 13th, 18th, 20th and 27th ult. and the 3rd, 9th, 15th, 22nd and 24th inst., which showed the calorific value on these dates as 462.1, 465.9, 464.7, 462.1, 462.5, 478.7, 461.6, 467.3 and 457.9 B.Th.U. per cubic foot respectively and the pressure at 6.0, 6.8, 8.4, 8.9, 6.9, 6 5, 9.5, 8.5 and 8.7 inches of water respectively.

2—Inspections—The Borough Engineer reported the work carried out by the Water Inspectors during the month of December.

3—Appeals—The cases entered in the Appeals Book were considered, and the rates settled and adjusted.

4—Statistics—The Borough Engineer submitted statement showing the quantity of water pumped and supplied for each month during 1939. The total quantity of water supplied during the year was 783,975,000 gallons of which 0.49 per cent was pumped from Tewkesbury, 0.06 per cent was pumped from Sandford, and 0.45 per cent supplied by gravitation. The quantity of water supplied to Gloucester during the year was 15,803,000 gallons. He also submitted particulars of the rainfall during the year which had been as follows :—Sandford 31.27 in., Hewletts 33.9 in., Dowdeswell 33.94 in., Tewkesbury 26.12 in.

5—Tewkesbury Water Works—The Borough Engineer submitted letter from the District Organiser of the National Union of General & Municipal Workers asking for two employees to be paid as Engine Drivers and three labourers to be paid as Stokers. RESOLVED, That this be referred for consideration of the Labour Sub-Committee.

6—Salts Farm—The Borough Engineer submitted letter from Messrs. C. C. Castle & Son in regard to the repairs required to this property. He estimated the total cost of the work to be £26. RESOLVED, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to carry out such work as the Corporation are responsible for under the Lease, and with regard to the gates and fencing required he be instructed to provide timber in the rough for this purpose. RESOLVED, also, That the application of the tenant to plant six new trees in the Orchard be granted subject to no claim for compensation being made for these at the expiration of the tenancy.

7—Staverton Water Supply—Read, letter of 4th inst. from the Clerk to the Cheltenham Rural District Council that his Council had agreed to the proposal of the Corporation for the taking over of the Staverton Main.

8—Parish of Swindon—The Medical Officer of Health reported that, as instructed, he had obtained analyses of the water supplied to Swindon Village in respect of which a memorial had been received from the residents. RESOLVED, That the residents be informed that the analyses are satisfactory, and that the Borough Engineer has been instructed to have the main, which was a dead end, flushed out at regular intervals.

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9—Cheltenham and Gloucester Joint Water Board—The Town Clerk reported that the Cheltenham and Gloucester Joint Water Board had agreed to make application to the Ministry of Health for consent to a loan of 127,008 for the Board's share of the expenses in increasing the size of the pumping station at Tewkesbury to provide for pumping a supply of an additional 4,000,000 gallons per day instead of an additional 2,000,000 gallons per day as originally proposed under the Water Board Act. The amount of the loan was made up as follows :—

## GENERAL PURPOSES AND WATCH COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Tuesday, 23rd January, 1940. Present—The Deputy Mayor; Aldermen Margrett, Pruen and Ward; Councillors Green, Smith and Waite (Alderman Margrett in the chair).

1—Diseases Amongst Animals—(a) Superintendent Hopkins reported that, with the exception of one case of Swine Fever, the Borough was free from contagious diseases amongst animals. (b) The Town Clerk submitted the Regulation of Movement of Swine (Amendment) Order, 1940 which made certain alterations in the existing regulations in regard to the licencing and marking of fat pigs which are sent for immediate slaughter. The Order had been published as required by the Ministry,

2—Numbering of Houses—The Borough Surveyor submitted plans for the numbering of the houses on the Cleevemount Estate RESOLVED, That these be approved and that the Borough Surveyor be instructed to serve the necessary notices requiring the occupiers to number the houses.

3-Promenade Car Park—The Borough Surveyor reported on the receipts taken by the additional Car Park attendant. RESOLVED, That he be instructed to report thereon again at the March Meeting.

4—Municipal Offices—The Borough Surveyor reported that the Emergency Committee had been considering the provision of hollow concrete blocks in substitution for the sandbags which required replacement at frequent intervals, and they recommended that he be authorised to experiment with a short length of walling at the rear of the Offices at a cost of six guineas. RESOLVED, That this be approved.

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5—Cinematograph Licences—(a) RESOLVED, That the applications for renewal of the Cinematograph Licences in respect of the Gaumont Palace, Coliseum, Regal Cinema, Theatre & Opera House, Daffodil Picture House, St. Gregory's Schools, the Palace Cinema and the Ritz, be granted for the ensuing year expiring on 5th February, 1941.

(b) The Town Clerk submitted circular of 30th ult. from the Home Office enclosing Order made under the Defence Regulations which provided a simplified procedure for the opening of Cinemas on Sundays. The procedure applied to areas in which opening of Cinemas on Sundays was considered to be expedient owing to the presence of large numbers of His Majesty's Forces and in respect of which a certificate to that effect has been given by the competent naval, military or air force authority. When a Local Authority receives such a certificate, it was open for the Local Authority to make a draft Order after giving prescribed notice of such intention. The Order would then be submitted to the Secretary of State for approval and would become operative when approved by both Houses of Parliament. The receipt of a certificate from a competent naval, military, or air force authority did not impose any obligation on the Council to submit an Order.

(c) Read, letter of 18th inst. from Lt.-Col. E. P. Butler of the Royal Gloucester Hussars at the Race Course that if the Cinemas could be opened in Cheltenham on Sundays it would be very popular with the troops and he thought it would be of great benefit to them and asking if something could be done in the matter. RESOLVED, That Col. Butler be informed that before the Committee can consider this matter a certificate in the prescribed form by the competent army authority must be sent to the Council.

6—Petrol Licences—RESOLVED, That the application of Messrs. Martin Bros, for a licence to store 500 gallons of petrol at their garage off Swindon Road in an underground tank be granted.

7—Domestic Servants Agencies—Read, report of Supt. Hopkins that all the books of the Domestic Agencies had been inspected and found in order with the exception of one where the Proprietor was out on each occasion the Agency was visited. The Agency opened by Mrs. Smollen at 3 Montpellier Walk had now been closed.

8—Military Service—The Committee considered application from Mr. A. L. Jones (District Sanitary Inspector) for permission to enlist. Mr. Jones was aged 23 and was therefore not in a reserved occupation and would probably be called up shortly with his age group, but if he enlisted now there was a possibility of his being able to join the Sanitary Section of the R.A.M.C. RESOLVED, That consent be given.

9—Salary, Conditions of Service—Read, letter of 28th ult. from the Cheltenham District Ratepayers Association that the Executive Committee of the Association had passed a resolution that the scales of pay and conditions of recruitment and service of Local Government employees are of public interest and should be discussed in open Council. The Town Clerk reported that he had informed the Association that such matters are always considered in open Council, and that the Resolution relating to this matter only required that all questions relating to salaries, wages and superannuation matters of individual officers and workmen be first considered by the Council in Committee.

10—Superannuation—(a) RESOLVED, That the services of the Town Clerk be extended for one year from 31st March next

(b) RESOLVED, on the recommendation of the Street and Highway Committee, That the services of W. Hooper (General Labourer) and S. Young (Sweeper) be extended for one year from 8th March next and 23rd January inst respectively.

11—Montpellier Rotunda—Read, letter of 18th inst. from Messrs. Haddock & Pruen that the Montpellier Rotunda Co. Ltd. were prepared to sell this property to the Corporation at a price of £2,100 plus Surveyor's fee of £26 12s. Od. in connection with the recent claim and the vendors' Solicitors' scale costs in connection with the conveyance. RESOLVED, That the Council be recommended to purchase the property on the above terms subject to the consent of the Ministry of Health to a loan being obtained and to the consent of the Capital Issues Committee to the raising of a loan. RESOLVED, also, That application be made to the Ministry of Health for consent to a loan of £2,183 for the purchase of the property, including Surveyors' fees, Solicitors' costs and stamp duty on the Conveyance, Also that application be made to the Capital Issues Committee of the Treasury for consent to the raising of the loan.

2—Leyland Fire Engine—The Committee considered the question of having the old Leyland Fire Engine overhauled for which the sum of £270 had been provided in the estimates RESOLVED, That the Acting Chief Officer be instructed to arrange for the machine to be sent to Messrs. Leyland's Works for complete overhaul.

3—Sandbags—The Acting Chief Officer reported that a number of Sandbags used for the protection of Fire Stations now needed replacement as they were not sprayed with protective fluid. RESOLVED, That he be instructed to have these replaced with new sandbags dipped in creosote.

4—Fireman—The Acting Chief Officer reported that Fireman Pike had resigned his appointment on his obtaining a post in the Hendon Fire Brigade. Advertisements had been issued inviting applications for the vacant post, and the Town Clerk submitted four applications received which were considered by the Committee. RESOLVED, That Mr. L. Hasted at present professional fireman, Sutton Coldfield Fire Brigade. be appointed Fireman at a wage of £182 per annum, subject to his passing a medical examination, the appointment to be subject to the provisions of the Fire Brigades Pension Acts and to be terminable by either party by 14 days' notice in writing.

5—Auxiliary Fire Service—(a) The Town Clerk submitted the following circulars from the Home Office :—

No. 98. re Alteration of Road Traffic Legislation affecting Fire Brigades.

No. 99. re Uniform and Equipment for Personnel.

No. 2. Appeal for Volunteers for A.F.S.

No. 15. A.R.P. Practice—Incendiary Bombs.

No. 7. Reinstatement, etc. of whole-time members of A.F.S. whose normal employment is in a reserved occupation.

No. 98. Rubber Boots for Personnel.

RESOLVED, That these be referred to the Chief Officer for attention.

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(b) Indicator Masks—Read, circular No, 4 of 15th inst. from the Home Office that a "Fire indicator disc conforming to the present lighting restrictions had been designed for use with head lamps. The price of the masks would be approximately 2s each. RESOLVED, That 25 masks be ordered.

(c) Read, letters of 16th and 25th inst. from the Home Office that one 500 gallon Canvas Dam, one Pyrene No. 2 Branch Pipes, and 10 gallons of foam compound had been issued to the Brigade and delivery would be made as and when supplies became available from the manufacturers.

(d) Personnel—The Acting Chief Officer reported that he had now received another resignation from the whole-time Auxiliary Fire Service, which was now three below the minimum number authorised by the Home Office, namely 49. All the trained part-time Volunteers had been approached, but none of them were prepared to accept a position as whole-time Auxiliary Fireman. RESOLVED, That he be instructed to interview the Manager of the Labour Exchange to ascertain if there are three unemployed men who would be suitable for these positions in which case he be authorised to arrange for intensive training of the men with a view to their being appointed. RESOLVED, also, That a supply -of posters and leaflets be ordered, and advertisements inserted in the " Echo " with a view to recruiting more volunteers for the Auxiliary Fire Service so as to bring this up to a total strength of 250.

(e) Auxiliary Fire Stations—(i) 10 Lansdown Terrace—The Acting Chief Officer reported that possession had been taken as from the 1st January of the garage premises at the rear of 10 Lansdown Terrace and that the Auxiliary Fire Station was removed to these premises from Roman Road on the 11th January. The Town Clerk reported that the owners of 10 Lansdown Terrace had agreed to let the premises to the Corporation at a rent of £39 per annum, plus rates, electricity and

gas, and this had been agreed to by the Emergency Committee. RESOLVED, That subject to the approval of the Home Office the Town Clerk be instructed to enter into a quarterly agreement for tenancy of the premises but not to be terminated by the owner until the end of the war.

(ii) Garage, Roman Road—The Town Clerk reported that as the owner of the above was unable to accept a rent of £55 per annum offered by the Corporation, the Auxiliary Fire Station had been removed from these premises RESOLVED, That subject to the approval of the Home Office, the owner be paid the rent asked by him, namely at the rate of £78 per annum for the period this was used from the 2nd September to the 11th January.

(iii) Windsor Street—Read, letter from Mrs Lucy agreeing to accept a rent of £75 per annum for the use of the portion of the premises belonging to New-Mek Ltd. RESOLVED, That subject to the approval of the Home Office the Town Clerk be authorised to enter into a tenancy Agreement terminable by a quarter's notice but not to be determined by the owner before the end of the war.

6-52, 52a and 59 St. George's Place—Read, letters offering these properties for sale. RESOLVED, That the purchases be not entertained.

7—Drill Tower—The Acting Chief Officer reported that it was essential that a Drill Tower should be provided for the training of personnel. He estimated the cost of purchasing a steel tower between £70 and £80 plus the cost of erection. RESOLVED, That the Acting Chief Officer be instructed to obtain tenders for the supply and delivery of a Tower and that application be made to the Home Office for approval of this expenditure for the purposes of grant. RESOLVED, also, That the Street and Highway Committee be recommended to allow the tower to be erected in a suitable position in the yard at the Central Depot.

# PARKS AND RECREATION GROUNDS COMMITTEE.

1—Sandford Park—New Offices—The Borough Surveyor reported that the Public Works Construction Co had completed this work and the keys had been handed over to the Gardens Superintendent.

2—Pittville Pump Room—Foreman's Living Quarters—The Borough Surveyor reported that he had inspected the Foreman's living quarters and it appeared that the dampness complained of was the result of condensation on the walls. He also reported that the bedrooms were extremely cold in winter time. He suggested that two-bar gas fires in the two bedrooms would prevent condensation. RESOLVED, That he be authorised to purchase these at a cost of £8.

3—Alstone Croft Playing Field—The Gardens Superintendent reported that Clubs using this field had asked for the use of the Pavilion for changing. RESOLVED, That the Gardens Superintendent be instructed to inform the Clubs concerned that they must make application to the Education Committee for the use of the Pavilion and that the Clubs also be informed that they must themselves undertake the marking of the pitches.

4—Seed Potatoes—RESOLVED, That the Gardens Superintendent be instructed to obtain quotations for approximately 25 tons of seed potatoes required for the various grounds, Schools etc.

5—Tank, Montpellier Gardens—RESOLVED, That in view of the urgent need for providing scrap metal, the Council be recommended to dispose of the Tank in Montpellier Gardens for this purpose.

## PUBLIC HEALTH COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, 12th February, 1940. Present-Aldermen Leigh James and Pruen; Councillors Rev. de Courcy Ireland, Garland, Dr. Curling Hayward, Moore, Morris and Waite (Alderman Pruen in the chair).

1—Statutory Nuisance—Kingsditch Cottage, Kingsditch Lane—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that the drains of these premises were in such a state as to be prejudicial to health and a nuisance, RESOLVED, That notices be served under Section 93 of the Public Health Act, 1936, on the owner and occupier of the said premises requiring them to abate the nuisance and to execute such works and take such steps as may be necessary for that purpose.

2—Surrender of Diseased Meat, etc.—The Medical Officer of Health reported the surrender of 9 cwt. 0 qrs. 14 lbs Beef ; 1 cwt. 3 qrs. 10 lbs. Mutton ; 2 cwt. 2 qrs. 3 lbs. Pork ; 19 Fowls weighing 56 lbs and 77 doz. Eggs weighing 93 lbs.

3—Health Department Van—The Medical Officer of Health reported delivery of the Bedford Van and that a detachable galvanised iron tray for carrying infected articles was needed for this at a cost of about £5. RESOLVED, That he be authorised to have the tray made.

4—Analyses of Water—The Medical Officer of Health submitted his report of analyses of water taken since the last Meeting of the Committee.

5—Pasteurised Milk—The Medical Officer of Health submitted his monthly report of analyses of Pasteurised Milk all of which analyses were satisfactory.

6—Food and Drugs Act, 1938—The Chief Sanitary Inspector submitted Certificates of the Public Analyst in respect of one sample of cheese, one of peppermint cordial, one of butter, six of milk Nod. 21-26, one of margarine, two of grape-fruit squash and one of Blaud's Pills.

7—Staff—RESOLVED, That, owing to shortage of staff in the Health Department, the Medical Officer of Health be authorised to retain the temporary typist at present engaged there for one month at £1 per week.

8—Delancey Hospital—The Committee considered the question of the admission to this Hospital of cases of measles from the General Hospital, hotels and private houses. RESOLVED, with regard to cases from the General Hospital, That the Medical Officer of Health be authorised to admit these cases when there is accommodation and staff available, the Corporation to pay for patients who reside in the Borough, subject to any claim which may be made against the patients, and the local authority in whose area the patient normally resides to be asked to pay for patients from their district; with regard to cases from hotels, That these be admitted subject to the hotel proprietor or the patient entering into an undertaking to pay the charges; and with regard to cases from private houses, That these be admitted when the Medical Officer of Health, in his discretion, considers it desirable owing to the unsuitability of the patient's home conditions.

9—Sewage Works—Heating of Pump House—The Borough Surveyor recommended the installation of heating apparatus in the pump house in order to safeguard the pump against damage from frost. RESOLVED, That an electric tubular heating system operating automatically when the temperature falls below a pre-arranged level be installed at an estimated cost of £24.

10—Duke Street Sewer—The Borough Surveyor reported completion of work on this sewer.

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11—Surface Water Culvert, Lower Arle—The Borough Surveyor reported that the construction of a portion of this culvert between properties owned by Mr. J. A. Pye and The Bucks. & Middlesex Estates was about to be commenced and would leave a portion unculverted for which the Corporation is responsible. The estimated cost of culverting this latter portion was £230 He also reported that the length about to be constructed would not have a satisfactory outlet as the owner of the land next down the stream was not prepared to undertake the work of culverting his portion at the present time and the water would flow into a pool on this land. RESOLVED, That the portion of the culvert for which the Corporation is responsible be constructed and that the owner of the land down the stream be required to fence in the pool and to erect a barrier to prevent the water flooding the adjoining land, this latter work to be regarded as a temporary construction until such time as the Corporation require the owner to construct the culvert in pursuance of the notice served upon him. RESOLVED, also, That a notice be served under Section 262 of the Public Health Act, 1936, requiring the owner of the land opposite that owned by Messrs. Pye Bros., before any building operations are begun. or while such operations are in progress, wholly to fill up the water course or

ditch and to substitute therefor a pipe, drain or culvert with all necessary gullies and other means of conveying surface water into and through it.

12—Disposal of Condemned Meat, etc.—As instructed at the last Meeting of the Committee the Borough Surveyor submitted a report prepared in conjunction with the Chief Sanitary Inspector containing alternative schemes for the disposal of condemned meat etc. The first proposal was to purchase a plant at a cost of £1,450, exclusive of building charges, and to house this in a new structure adjoining the abattoir, or else, on the assumption that the destructor would remain in operation, at the slab factory. A new building at the abattoir would be expensive and the slab factory site was undesirable because the destructor cost over £1,000 to operate during last year, and owing to the success of controlled tipping there would appear to be no justification for the continuance of this expenditure provided other means are available for raising steam for the steam disinfector. There would be a possible income of £230 if this scheme were adopted, but as the Government are in possession of all waste products from the abattoir and can dispose of these in any way they wish and it would, therefore, appear possible that the plant might be left idle by a change in Government policy. The view of the Ministry of Supply was that all waste material from the abattoir should be disposed of to[?] firms handling this material and not destroyed.

The alternative scheme was to close down the destructor and to dispose of all condemned meat etc. to the Gloucester Soapery and to sell fish offal to fertilizer manufacturers. Dead dogs etc. could well and safely be disposed of by burying at the bottom of a controlled tip. To maintain the steam disinfector at the destructor a small vertical boiler could be purchased at an estimated cost of £225, erected in a disused stable and operated by the workman in charge of the storage depot at the destructor site. The annual running cost of this boiler would be about £54 for fuel, one-third of the workman's wages, viz. £52, and £26 for running repairs, water, etc. The Borough Surveyor recommended the adoption of this second scheme which would be advantageous to the Street and Highway Committee, involve a much smaller capital outlay, meet the wishes of the Ministry of Supply and also obviate the establishment of an objectionable industry in the town.

RESOLVED, That the recommendation of the Borough Surveyor be approved, and that he be instructed to install a boiler for the disinfector and to make all necessary arrangements for the disposal of meat, offal, etc. as recommended.

13—Montpellier Conveniences—The Committee further considered the application of 4th ult. from the National Union of General & Municipal Workers for the rates of wages and overtime conditions of service of the attendants at these conveniences to be placed on the Joint Industrial Council scale referred back by the Labour Sub-Committee for consideration in relation to the takings at the conveniences- The Borough Surveyor reported that the increase granted by the Council to all other Corporation departments were in the main 3s a week for men and 2s a week for women. RESOLVED, That the Council be recommended to grant an increase as from the 1st December last of 3s a week to the male attendants and 2s a week to the female attendants, and that the Borough Surveyor be authorised to arrange for a proportionate increase in the wages of the Dart time attendants

14—Damage to Spouting at Abattoir—The Town Clerk reported that a lorry belonging to the Great Western Railway Co. damaged spouting at the abattoir on the 25th ult. The cost of repairing the damage amounted to 15s. RESOLVED, That he be instructed to claim this amount from the owners of the lorry.

2—Road Works, etc.—The Borough Surveyor submitted particulars of road works, etc., proposed to be carried out during the ensuing month. RESOLVED, That these be approved.

3—Refuse Collection and Disposal—Salvage—(a) Read, circulars from the Ministry of Supply emphasising the importance of the necessity of salvaging all possible material and asking local authorities to urge upon householders the importance of bundling their waste paper and handing it to the Refuse Collectors. The Borough Surveyor reported that the return submitted to the Ministry for January showed salvage to the value of as £88 12s. 6d. Read also, circular letter of 15th inst from the Clerk of the County Council suggesting that a careful watch should be kept by all local authorities upon refuse tips and elsewhere and that any apparent waste of food however caused should be noted and details of any instance reported to the County Council who would take further steps in appropriate cases.

The Borough Surveyor submitted draft circular he proposed to distribute to every householder in the Borough giving particulars of the materials which should be salved and asking that all waste food, such as table and kitchen scraps, potato and apple peelings, should be kept dry and separate from other refuse and handed to the Refuse Collectors each week.

The Borough Surveyor also reported that the Thames Board Mills Ltd., the Contractors who were taking the waste paper, were forwarding a supply of leaflets and posters for publicity purposes. RESOLVED, That the draft letter to the householders be approved as now settled by the Committee.

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(b) Read, letter of 14th inst. from the General Manager of the Gloucestershire "Echo" that several correspondents bad suggested that the Corporation should insert an advertisement in the "Echo" instructing householders what to do with salvaged material. RESOLVED, That the Committee do not consider an advertisement necessary in view of the proposal to circularise each householder.

(c) Destructor—The Borough Surveyor reported the decision of the Public Health Committee with regard to the disposal of condemned carcases, foul and condemned meats. With regard to fish offal, separate bins had now been provided for this and he hoped to arrange with a merchant at Dudley Port to receive the material. RESOLVED, That the Committee agree with the arrangements made by the Public Health Committee and that the Borough Surveyor be instructed to re-organise the staff at the Destructor as may be necessary.

3—Private Improvement Works—Arle Road, Alstone Lane and Brooklyn Road—The Borough Surveyor reported that he had circularised the abutting owners in this road to ascertain if they were prepared to deposit the cost of carrying out the paving works, etc., required, but the majority of the owners were not prepared to do so. RESOLVED' That the Town Clerk be instructed to proceed with the service of the notices on the abutting owners in accordance with Minute No. 9 of the Meeting of the Committee held on the 18th December last.

4—Traffic Census—The Borough Surveyor submitted particulars of the Traffic Census taken in High Street near the town centre for ten hours on the 18th January, 1940. The total down traffic, including cycles, was 5,670 vehicles as against 10,475 last year and up traffic 3,553 as compared with 7,424 last year.

5—Borough Surveyor's Department—The Borough Surveyor submitted report on the re-organisation of the clerical staff in his department consequent on the death of the Wages Clerk, Mr. E. Savory, the calling up of other members of the staff and the resignation of a shorthand typist. Mr. Savory, who had been a very efficient Wages Clerk for 36 years, died on the 25th ult. RESOLVED, That the proposed re-arrangement of the staff be approved and that Mr. G. H. K. Parkes, Accounts and Order Clerk, be also put in charge of the Wages Office and transferred from Grade "D" (at present £208 per annum) to Grade "E" (at £225 per annum). RESOLVED, also, That the Committee desire to record

their sympathy with Mrs. Savory and her family in the sad loss they have sustained by the death of Mr. Savory.

6---Welland Lodge and Cleevemount Roads--The Borough Surveyor reported that, as instructed, he had inspected these roads again in respect of which the Architects had made application to the Corporation to take over the same. He did not consider that the work had been carried out in such a manner as to justify the Corporation acceding to the application. RESOLVED, That consideration be adjourned to the next View Meeting.

7—White Lines—The Borough Surveyor submitted particulars of three types of machines for painting white lines on highways, one of which had been demonstrated in Cheltenham. He recommended that a machine be purchased at a cost of £49. RESOLVED, That this recommendation be approved and adopted.

8—National Joint Industrial Council—The Committee further considered letter from the National Joint Industrial Council asking the Corporation to join the newly established Council for Local Authorities Non-Trading Services (Manual Workers) for the Counties of Gloucester, Somerset and Wilts. The Town Clerk reported that, as instructed, he had endeavoured to arrange a Conference with representatives of the Bath and Gloucester City Councils and Weston-super-Mare Borough Council. Bath was unwilling to attend a Conference as they intended to adhere to their present practice of applying the Building Trades Operatives conditions but Weston-super-Mare was willing to attend to discuss the matter. With regard to Gloucester City Council, representatives of the City Council had recently attended an informal Conference of representatives of the Somerset and Gloucester County Councils and the Bristol and Bath City Councils. In view of the attitude of the representatives to this Conference, from which it appeared that they were not willing to join the Joint Industrial Council, Gloucester City Council did not consider that any useful purpose would be served by their being represented at another Conference in the near future. RESOLVED, That the Council be recommended to join the Joint Industrial Council for the Western area and that Councillor Grimwade be appointed the Council's representative on the Employers side.

9—Wages and Conditions of Service—Read, circular of the 1st inst. from the National Federation of Building Trades Operatives that the National Joint Council for the Building Industry had granted a further 1d. per hour rise in wages to all building trades operatives as from the 1st inst. The Borough Surveyor reported that, in accordance with the Resolution of the Committee, this increase had been given to the Corporation employees engaged in the Building Industry, including Builders' labourer's.

10—St. George's Road—Read, letter of 2nd inst. from Miss Alice Gardiner offering to give up a piece of the garden of No 29 St. George's Road so as to enable the junction of this road and St George's Place to be rounded off. RESOLVED, That consideration be adjourned for view.

11—Projecting Sign—RESOLVED, That the application of Mr. Wyndham B. Lock for permission to erect a projecting sign near America Passage be granted, subject to the usual conditions.

12—Nos. 2 and 3 Winchcomb Street—Read, letter of 30th ult. from the Ministry of Transport that while the Minister was not in a position to anticipate the Government's policy with regard to the raising of loans on the cessation of. hostilities, there did not appear to be any objection to the Council entering into a Contract to purchase this property at the conclusion of the War, if the

Contract was made subject to the Ministry of Health consenting to the necessary loan. The Town Clerk reported that he had now asked the owners to submit provisional Contract for approval.

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13—Eldon Avenue and Beechhurst Avenue—The Town Clerk reported that notices of the intention of the Corporation to take over these roads had been duly posted on the 5th inst. RESOLVED, That the roads be taken over as from the 5th prox.

14—National Safety First Association—Read, circular from this Association asking the Council to continue to subscribe to their funds as hitherto. RESOLVED, That the annual subscription made by the Council be continued.

15—Black-out—Pillar Boxes—Read, letter from Councillor Garland with regard to the painting of white bands on Pillar Boxes. RESOLVED, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to paint such Pillar Boxes as in his discretion he considers desirable, having regard to their position.

16--View Committee—Read, report of a Meeting of the View Committee held on Wednesday, 14th February, 1940. Present—The Mayor ; The Deputy Mayor ; Councillors Addis, Fisher, Green and Morris (The Deputy Mayor in the chair), They recommended as follows :—Central Depot—That the erection of a Drill Tower for the Fire Brigade on a site in the Depot Yard near the Men's Club Room, be approved. RESOLVED, That this recommendation be approved and adopted.

17—Witcombe Place—Read, report of damage to paving by Demolition Contractors. RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to make a claim for making good the damage, amounting to £3 7s. 1d.

18—College Road and High Street Traffic Island—Read, report of damage to a bollard at this Island by an Army Convoy Lorry RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to make a claim for making good the damage, amounting to £15 7s. 8d.

19-1 Suffolk Parade—Read, letter from Messrs. G. H. 21—Pittville Street Improvement—(a) Nos. 2 and 3 Pittville Street—The Town Clerk reported that these premises had been let for a temporary period of six weeks at an inclusive rent of £30 for the purpose of providing temporary accommodation for two tenants on the opposite side of the street during the time new shop fronts were being fitted to their existing shops. RESOLVED, That this be approved.

(b) 5 Pittville Street—Read, letter of 14th inst. from Messrs. Cornelius & Boulter that they had a Client who was interested in this shop which was at present occupied by the Women's Voluntary Services of the Cheltenham Rural District The Town Clerk reported that Mrs. Lipson, the local Organiser of the Women's Voluntary Services, considered it was desirable, if possible, that the Women's Voluntary Services for the Rural District should be allowed to retain this shop as the Women's Voluntary Services for the Borough, who occupied No 7 Pittville Street, were in constant communication with them. The Town Clerk also reported that the County Council were not prepared to pay rent for any Corporation properties occupied for Civil Defence purposes unless the Corporation actually lost rent by so granting the use of premises. 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# ELECTRICITY AND LIGHTING COMMITTEE.

**At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, 26th February, 1940**. Present-The Mayor; Alderman Taylor; Councillors Addis, Bendall, Bettridge, Grimwade, Rogers and Waite (Councillor Rogers in the chair),

1—Public Lighting—(a) War-time Lamps—The Borough Electrical Engineer reported that the experimental war-time street lighting had proved satisfactory and recommended that a further 121 fittings be purchased during the current financial year making a total of 184. The estimated cost of these was about £1 per lamp. RESOLVED, That this recommendation be approved and that the lamps be erected in the positions settled by the Committee. RESOLVED, also, That the question of the further extension of war-time street lighting be reviewed at the May Committee Meeting after some experience has been gained of the effect of the lighting under varying weather conditions and in different positions.

(b) Public Lighting Charge—The charge to be made for public lighting for the 12 months ending 31st March, 1940 was considered and it was reported that the cessation of lighting since the declaration of war would reduce the charge from £6,798 estimated for the full year to £4,138. The sum of £1,500 provided for improvements and new work would also be reduced as the expenditure incurred was only £241 to which must be added £185, the estimated cost of the war-time lamps. The total charge for the current year would therefore be £4,564 against the estimate of £8,289, RESOLVED, That the Finance Committee be recommended to approve of this charge.

2—Oakley Farm Estate—The Borough Electrical Engineer recommended that the extra high tension feed to Hales Road Sub-station should be improved by laying a new cable from Sandford Park Substation at an estimated cost of £633 and installing additional switchgear in the two Sub-stations at a further estimated cost of £706, making a total of £1,339. RESOLVED, That this be approved and that application be made to the Electricity Commissioners for consent to a loan of £1,339 to cover the cost of the work.

3—Accounting Machine—It was reported that the Burroughs Accounting Machine purchased seven years ago would shortly require a complete overhaul at the maker's works and the Borough Electrical Engineer and the Borough Treasurer recommended that a new machine providing greater facilities should be purchased at the price of £791 in order to deal with the expanding business of the undertaking and to ensure the rapid issuing of customers' accounts. RESOLVED, That this recommendation he approved and that upon receipt of the new machine the present machine be thoroughly overhauled by the makers.

4—Land, Brooklyn Road—RESOLVED, on the recommendation of the Borough Electrical Engineer, That the piece of land at the back of the transformer kiosk in Brooklyn Road, in respect of which an offer to purchase made by Mr. Brown, the adjoining owner, had been refused by the Corporation in view of the fact that the land may be required at a future date, be offered at a nominal rent to Mr. Brown for cultivation subject to his entering into an agreement to be prepared by the Town Clerk, -

5—District Joint Industrial Council--RESOLVED, That the Borough Electrical Engineer be reappointed as the Council's representative on the No. 6 Joint Industrial Council for the ensuing 12 months.

6—Gas Tests—Read, reports of Gas Tests made on the 30th ult. and 5th, 7th, 19th and 21st inst., which showed the Calorific value on these dates to be 468.7, 490.2, 480.6, 481.0 and 477.6 B.Th.U. respectively and the pressure to be 9.2, 6.1, 9.5, 10.2 and 9.2 inches of water respectively.

2—Inspections—The Borough Engineer reported the work carried out by the Water Inspectors during the month of January.

3—Appeals—The cases entered in the Appeals Book were considered, and the rates settled and adjusted.

4—Extension to Mains—The Borough Engineer reported that he had agreed to provide a supply of water in the event of a fire occurring at the Rotol Airscrews Works or the Airport by means of a 6 inch connection to be made to the rising main where it crossed Gloucester Road, RESOLVED, That this be approved subject to an Undertaking being given that the water will only be taken for firefighting purposes.

5—Pipe Contract—The Borough Engineer submitted circular of 1st inst. from the Stavely Coal, Iron & Steel Co. stating that the Ministry of Supply had authorised an increase varying from 1d. to 10d. a yard in the price for straight pipes, and 3s 6d. a ton in the price of standard special castings as from the 1st inst.

6—Tewkesbury Waterworks—RESOLVED, That the Borough Engineer be authorised to hire a Gas Heater from the Gas Co. at a rent of 11s per quarter so as to provide facilities at the works for workmen to clean themselves after boiler chipping and flue cleaning.

7—Water Supply—The Borough Engineer submitted report on the water supply generally during the recent severe weather. The only case of a frozen main occurred on the Railway Bridge at Moorend Crescent where, owing to lack of cover, the main was exposed to the air beneath the bridge decking. This had to be thawed out on one or two occasions. In all other cases the complaints of frozen pipes were a result of freezing of pipes indoors and in service pipes where these had been laid with insufficient cover.

8—Water Undertaking—A.R.P.—Read, letter of 6th inst. from the Ministry of Health approving for grant at the rate of 50 per cent the estimated cost of £125 of making the two inter-connections between the 27 inch Water Board rising main and the 18 inch Cheltenham main, and the latter main and the 6 inch Gloucester main respectively. The Ministry also approved for the same grant the purchase of an 18 inch sluice valve unit estimated to cost £80. RESOLVED, That the Borough Engineer be instructed to proceed with the work.

9—Supply to Staverton Court, etc.—RESOLVED, That the Common Seal be fixed to the Agreement with Mr. R. V. Prettejohn for the taking over by the Corporation of the main laid by him in accordance with Minute No. 4 passed at the Meeting of the Committee held on 12th December last

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## GENERAL PURPOSES AND WATCH COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Tuesday, 20th February, 1940. Present—The Deputy Mayor; Aldermen Clara Winterbotham, Margrett, Pruen and Ward Councillors Rev. de Courcy Ireland, Green, Rogers and Smith (Alderman Margrett in the chair).

1—Naming of Roads—The Borough Surveyor submitted application for the name of a new road constructed at right angles off Orchard Way in Brooklyn Road. RESOLVED, That the road be named Hawthorn Road. RESOLVED, also, That the proposed numbering of houses in the road be approved,

2—Market—The Borough Surveyor submitted report on his inspection of the Market Hall. The front part of the building was not satisfactory from a structural point of view, and his attention had now been called to roof leakages and wall settlement. The recent severe weather had still further weakened the structure, and the Borough Surveyor recommended that the defects should be made good without delay. ## PUBLIC HEALTH COMMITTEE.

**At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, 11th March, 1940**. Present—Aldermen Leigh James, Pruen and Clara F. Winterbotham ; Councillors Barnett, Rev. de Courcy Ireland, Garland, Dr. Curling Hayward and Morris (Alderman Pruen in the chair).

1—Houses Unfit for Human Habitation—(a) 95 Prestbury Road—The Committee considered the official representation of the Medical Officer of Health in regard to this house and the Rota Sub-Committee reported their inspection of the premises. RESOLVED, That the Council being satisfied that the above mentioned premises are unfit for human habitation and are not capable at a reasonable expense of being rendered so fit, notices be given under Section 11 of the Housing Act, 1936, to the Owner, to the persons having control of the house, and to the Mortgagees, if any, that the condition of the said house and any offer with respect to the carrying out of works or the future user of the house will be considered at a Meeting of this Committee to be held on the 8th April, 1940.

(b) 1 and 2 Lower Park Street and 16 Clare Place—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that the owners of these houses had now carried out to his satisfaction the works required to render them fit for human habitation. RESOLVED, That their Undertakings be cancelled.

(c) Bruton Cottage, Portland Street—Read, letters from two of the persons interested in these premises requesting the Committee to allow an extended time for demolition. RESOLVED, That they be informed that the Committee cannot see their way to allow any extended time and that, if the house is not demolished within a reasonable time after the coming into operation of the Demolition Order, the Chairman be authorised to accept a tender for the demolition thereof.

2—Housing Act, 1936--Certificates as to Fitness-5 Marlborough Place, Townsend Street ; and 15 and 16 Clare Place—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that the Owners of these houses had carried out to his satisfaction works which in his opinion would with reasonable care and maintenance render them fit for human habitation for a period of at least 10 years, RESOLVED, That certificates be issued to the Owners under Section 51 of the Housing Act, 1936, that the houses are fit for human

habitation and will with reasonable care and maintenance remain so fit for a period of at least 10 years.

3—Statutory Nuisance-30 Montpellier Spa Road—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that the W.C. at these premises was in such a state as to be prejudicial to health and a nuisance RESOLVED, That notices be served tinder Section 93 of the Public Health Act, 1936, on the owner and occupier of the said premises requiring them to abate the nuisance and to execute such works and to take such steps as may be necessary for that purpose.

4—Surrender of Diseased Meat, etc.—The Medical Officer of Health reported the surrender of 1 qr. 7 lbs Mutton ; 1 qr. Pork ; 12 lbs. Bacon ; 2 cwt. 6 lbs, Eggs and 1 cwt. 3 qrs. Cod fillets.

5—Milk and Dairies Order, 1926—RESOLVED, That the application of Mr. Roy Prewett of 62 Winchcomb Street, Cheltenham for registration as a Retail Purveyor of milk in the Borough from premises at 67 Winchcomb Street be granted subject to compliance with the provisions of the Order. 6—Analyses of Water—The Medical Officer of Health submitted his report of analyses of water taken since the last Meeting of the Committee.

7—Immunisation Clinic—The Medical Officer of Health recommended that a cupboard be purchased for the Clinic at a cost of about 3. RESOLVED, That this be approved.

8—Food and Drugs Act, 1938—The Chief Sanitary Inspector submitted Certificates of the Public Analyst in respect of 1 sample of Cod Liver Oil, 1 sample of Cream Buns, 1 of Pork Sausage, 1 of Honey and 6 samples of Milk No. 35-40.

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9—Health Department Staff—(a) The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that Mr. A. L. Jones, District Sanitary Inspector had enlisted in the Royal Army Medical Corps and he hoped in the meantime to be able to carry on the duties of the Department with the assistance of a member of the Rural District Council staff for meat inspection

(b) Typist—RESOLVED, on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health, That the typist at present temporarily engaged in the Health Department be placed on the staff in Grade A, the appointment to be terminable by one month's notice on either side.

10—Offensive Trade, Fish Frying —Read, letter from the Ministry of Health stating that the Ministry was not prepared to agree to a new Order declaring the trade of fish frying to be an offensive trade unless it can be shown that the powers of the Council relating to Statutory nuisances under the Public Health Act, 1936, are insufficient and suggesting that the Council should defer making any proposals with regard to controlling the trade by Byelaws. The Town Clerk reported that the present Byelaws would expire on the 30th September next. RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to urge the Ministry to make an Order under Section 107 of the Public Health Act, 1936.

11—Abattoir—a) Read, report of the Meeting of the Farms and Abattoir Sub-Committee held on the 11th January with regard to the taking over of the Abattoir under the Government Scheme. The Sub-Committee recommended (inter alia) that a charge of £1 1s. Od. per quarter should be made for the

office accommodation used by the contractors. RESOLVED, That the report be approved and adopted.

(b) Read, letter of 7th inst. from the Ministry of Food with regard to the terms on which the Ministry have taken over the Abattoir. RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to suggest a Meeting between representatives of the Ministry and representatives of the Corporation to discuss the matter.

(c) Trolleys—The Chief Sanitary Inspector recommended that to prevent edible offal being wasted as a result of being heaped together on the trolleys, each of the five trolleys should be fitted with hooks round the sides at a cost of £3 4s. Od. each to enable the air to get to the meat The Town Clerk advised that as the Ministry of Food had now taken control of the Abattoir their attention should be called to this matter and to the recommendation of the Chief Sanitary Inspector but as this might involve delay and consequent waste it was RESOLVED That the Chief Sanitary Inspector be authorised to have the trolleys equipped with hooks as recommended by him.

12—Slaughter House Licences—The Farms and Abattoir Sub-Committee reported their inspection of slaughter houses in the Borough and their recommendation with regard to the granting of licences. RESOLVED, That licences be granted under Section 57 of the Food and Drugs Act, 1938, in respect of the following premises subject in each case to the undermentioned conditions being carried out to the satisfaction of the Chief Sanitary Inspector.

(a) 3 Commercial Street. Owner : Mr. T. James—Defective roof to be repaired, yard to be repaired, and eaves, spouts and downpipes to be fixed to the building over the entrance.

(b) Rear of 5 Suffolk Parade. Owner : Mr. C. Waltham—Cover to be provided over part of yard to prevent premises being overlooked.

(c) Grosvenor Terrace, Albion Street. Owners : Exors. of H. Cuss, deceased—Defective floor of adjoining room to be repaired.

(d) Beulah Place, Prestbury Road. Owners : Messrs.. Waghorne Bros.

(e) Dunalley Street. Owners : Mr. W. A. Davis—Artificial lighting to be improved and rear window screened.

(f) Dunalley Parade. Owners Messrs. Holliday & Page Ltd.—Defective floor to be repaired and artificial lighting to be improved.

(g) Victoria Street, St. Paul's. Owner : Mr. G. F. Tarr.

13--Refuse Tip, Brooklyn Road—The Chairman read Memorial which he had received signed by 116 residents in Brooklyn Road complaining of flies and smells coming from this tip. RESOLVED, That the tip be viewed.

14—Sewer, Hatherley Road—The Borough Surveyor reported that the cellar of No. 180 Hatherley Road was flooded on the 8th ult. as a result of a broken pipe in the sewer which caused a manhole to be filled to ground level with sewage and that he had received an account for £2 18s. 0d. from the builder called in to pump out the cellar. RESOLVED, That an ex-gratia payment of £2 18s. 0d. be made.

15—Sewer between Clarence Road and Wyman's Brook—The Borough Surveyor reported that as a result of a subsidence it had been necessary to carry out certain works of repair to this sewer. RESOLVED, That this be approved.

16—Windsor Street Sewer—The Borough Surveyor reported that the two manholes of this sewer had now been completed and the length of sewer thoroughly rodded and cleared so that no further trouble was anticipated. He proposed to examine this sewer from time to time and to carry out rodding if and when necessary. He also submitted two claims for compensation from occupiers of houses in Windsor Street who had suffered inconvenience as a result of manholes being constructed in their gardens. 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## HOUSING COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Thursday, 14th March, 1940. Present—Alderman Pates ; Councillors Bush, Rev. de Courcy Ireland, Fisher, Garland, Grimwade and Morris (Alderman Pates in the chair).

1—No. 2 Jersey Street and 31 Sherborne Street—The Committee considered the complaints received from the nuisance caused by children getting into these premises and throwing bricks and debris about. The Borough Surveyor recommended that the site should be cleared and that a short length of wall adjoining the premises of the Brewery Co should be re-built to prevent trespass on to their premises. He estimated the total cost of this work to be £20. RESOLVED, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to have the work carried out

2—Moors Estate—The Borough Surveyor reported that the footpath slabbing near the junction of Yarnold Terrace with Tewkesbury Road was not completed owing to the intended widening of the Railway Bridge, but, as this was not likely to be proceeded with, he recommended that the slabbing should be completed as originally approved. RESOLVED, That this be agreed to.

3—Whaddon Estate—Land in Dart Road—The Borough Surveyor reported that there was a small triangular plot of undeveloped land adjoining the last house in Dart Road. He recommended that the land should be fenced in and offered to one of the tenants on the estate as an allotment. RESOLVED, That this be agreed to and that the Housing Manager be instructed to offer it to one of the tenants on the estate at a rent of 2s 6d per annum.

4—Collection of Rents—The Report of the Housing Manager on the collection of rents was submitted and the Committee went through the list of tenants in arrear and gave instructions thereon. RESOLVED, That arrears amounting to £21 17 11 due from former tenants as set out in the list signed by the Chairman be written off as irrecoverable.

5—Land, Tennyson Road----The Town Clerk reported that the tenants of houses in Tennyson Road were complaining of the nuisance caused by children obtaining access to the orchard land at the rear now let out in allotments RESOLVED, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to put a padlock on the entrance gate and supply the tenants of the allotments with keys.

6—Repairs Superintendent—The Monthly Report of the Repairs Superintendent was submitted. RESOLVED, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to proceed with the external painting of the 124 houses erected under Scheme " A " on the Whaddon Estate. RESOLVED, also, That the tenants be required to provide their own clothes-line posts-when the posts provided by the Corporation need replacing,

7-32 Brook Road—RESOLVED, That the application of the tenant of this house for permission to keep fowls be not granted as the Committee consider the garden is not large enough for this purpose

8—St. Mark's Estate—RESOLVED, That the applications of 4 tenants for the replacement of Kitchen Ranges with open grates be not granted at the present time.

9—Whaddon Avenue and Pilley Estates—The Housing Manager reported that some of the tenants on these Estates had asked if the Corporation would have chain-link fencing erected between the back gardens in place of the present post and wire fence which allowed dogs to wander from one garden to another. RESOLVED, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to report on the cost of providing this, and also what the cost would have been had the work been carried out before the war.

10—Stop Taps--The Housing Manager reported that a number of the houses on the various Estates were not provided with inside Stop Taps. RESOLVED, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to submit estimate of the cost of providing these.

11—New Houses—Read, letter of 19th ult. from the Cheltenham Branch of the National Federation of Building Trades Operatives urging the Town Council to press the Minister of Health to allow the Council to proceed with the erection of new houses. They were of opinion that there was a great need for houses at the present time, and that there will be an increased demand in the near future when some of the factories that are now being erected commence production.

The Town Clerk reminded the Committee that on the 8th September last the Ministry of Health circularised Local Authorities that the Minister would not be prepared for the time being to approve of the erection of further houses unless he was satisfied that there were exceptional circumstances which rendered the work of importance in the national interest, and that no further circular on the matter had yet been issued.

RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to forward a copy of the letter to the Ministry of Health, and to inform the Ministry that the Council are prepared to resume negotiations with the 1933 Housing Society Ltd. for the erection of houses to let by the Company with the Corporation and Building Society's Guarantee tinder the Housing Act if the Ministry of Health are prepared to approve of the proposals and authorise the supply of the necessary building materials.

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### STREET AND HIGHWAY COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, 18th March, 1940, Present—The Deputy Mayor; Aldermen Pates, Ward and Clara F. Winterbotham ; Councillors Addis, Fisher, Green, Grimwade and Morris (The Deputy Mayor in the chair).

1—Road Works, etc.—The Borough Surveyor submitted particulars of road works, etc., proposed to be carried out during the ensuing month. RESOLVED, That these be approved.

2—Refuse Collection and Disposal—Salvage—(a) The Borough Surveyor submitted letter from the Chamber of Commerce, also from Col. Biggs suggesting that a central depot should be opened to which the public could take their waste paper, etc. As requested by the Chamber he had arranged to give an Address at their Meeting to be held on the 9th April. RESOLVED, That the Committee do not think it is advisable to accumulate waste paper at one of the empty shops in Pittville Street owing to danger from fire, and that, as there is a daily collection of trade refuse in the principal shopping streets, and householders have been requested to hand all their waste paper and other salvage material to the Ashmen when they call each week, the Committee do not consider there is any need to open up a Receiving Depot in the centre of the town.

(b) The Borough Surveyor reported that the Boy Scouts had collected 38 tons of waste paper during the three months ended the 31st December. During the month of February a total of 48 tons 18 cwt.
56 lbs. of waste material had been salvaged. This included over 17 tons of waste paper and over 31 tons of scrap metal ; the total value was £132 which included £85 for obsolete asphalt plant.

(c) Refuse Vehicles—RESOLVED, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to have a suitable slogan painted on the refuse freighters.

(d) Brooklyn Road Tip—The Borough Surveyor submitted report on the complaints made to the Public Health Committee of the alleged nuisance from this tip. With regard to sub-soil seepage from the tip the Borough Surveyor reported that he had arranged to construct a drain along the whole length of the tip with a small underground filter at an estimated cost of £70. The covering of the tip had been unavoidably delayed owing to the difficulty experienced during the recent heavy frost when it was impossible to excavate the necessary covering material. The covering of the tip was now being proceeded with all speed. The practice of depositing the abattoir waste at the tip had now been discontinued, and he did not anticipate that there would be any further cause for complaint. The first terrace of the tip would be completed in about six weeks' time and seeded down before the end of the summer. RESOLVED, That the steps taken by the Borough Surveyor be approved.

3—Transport—(a) The Borough Surveyor submitted letter of 12th inst. from Mark Williams & Co. Ltd., that the charge for the hire of 1 ton lorries would be increased from 4s 6d to 5s 2d per hour, and for the 4-5 ton lorries from 6s 3d to 7sper hour.

(b) Overhaul of Vehicles—The Borough Surveyor reported that owing to the increase in price of motor repairs and the possible shortage of spare parts, it was advisable that the lorries belonging to

the Corporation should be overhauled. RESOLVED, That he be instructed to see if he could arrange for the mechanics of the Fire Brigade to undertake this work.

4—Brooklyn Road—The Borough Surveyor reported that the work of widening Brooklyn Road involved the removal of the hedge in front of the improvement line, but that the builders had not yet erected their fences to the new line and they now stated that there was a difficulty in obtaining the necessary timber for this work. RESOLVED, That in these circumstances the Borough Surveyor be instructed not to proceed with the widening until the builders are able to arrange for the erection of the front fences behind the hedge.

5—Central Depot—Store-keeper—RESOLVED, That the application of Mr. F. C. Horlock, Chief Storekeeper, for an increase in salary be granted. RESOLVED, That he be transferred from Grade E (present salary £225) to the maximum of Grade F (£250 per annum)..

6—Borough Surveyor's Department—The Borough Surveyor submitted application from E. F. Hayling, Wages and Cost Clerk, to be transferred from Grade B to Grade C The transfer would not involve any immediate increase apart from the ordinary increment on 1st April. RESOLVED, That the application be granted.

7—View Committee—Read, report of the Meeting of the View Committee held on the 13th inst. Present—The Deputy Mayor (in the chair) ; Alderman Clara Winterbotham ; Councillors Grimwade and Morris.

They recommended as follows :--

Williams & Co., Gloucester, had damaged a lamp standard at the junction of Ashford Road and Tivoli Road, RESOLVED, That a claim be made against the owners of the lorry for £12 11s. 10d. being the estimated damage to the lamp, but the replacement of the lamp be deferred for the present.

2—Auxiliary Fire Service—(a) Exercise—The Acting Chief Officer reported that 100 personnel took part in the Exercise in Cheltenham on 10th March. 17 Trailer pumps and towing vehicles were brought into action, and 27 seventy-five foot lengths of hose were used. 1 large Trailer pump and crew also attended the combined Exercise at Bristol on the 17th inst.

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(b) Canvas Dams—The Acting Chief Officer reported that recently wilful damage had been caused to the Canvas Dam situate at the entrance to Smith's Systems' premises by cutting the canvas with pocket knives. The matter had been reported to the police who were making further enquiries. In accordance with Circular No. 20 of 6th inst. from the Home Office, he had now given instructions for all canvas dams to be dismantled, dried and stored where they would be accessible for immediate transportation to any part of the Borough when required.

(c) Steel Dam—RESOLVED, That when the 5,000 gallon steel dam is received, the Acting Chief Officer be instructed to arrange for this to be placed on the land adjoining Martyn's works.

(d) Equipment — Read, circular No. 31 of 23rd ult. enclosing copy of the Air Raid Precautions (Storage and Loan of Equipment) Regulations. RESOLVED, That this be referred to the Acting Chief Officer.

(e) Military Service—The Town Clerk submitted Circulars No. 15 and 17 from the Home Office in regard to military service of Auxiliary Fire Service Personnel. RESOLVED, That these be referred to the Acting Chief Officer.

(f) Food—Read, circular No. 16 of 27th ult. from the Home Office that a single meal should be provided free of charge to whole-time personnel whilst on night duty at Auxiliary Fire Stations at a cost not exceeding 1s per head. RESOLVED, That the Acting Chief Officer be instructed to see what arrangements can be made for the provision of this meal, and that the Chairman be authorised to approve of any arrangements made provided the cost does not exceed the amount authorised by the Home Office. RESOLVED, also, That it be left to the Chairman to accept a tender if he thinks it advisable for two days supply of emergency rations for personnel in case of serious fires involving long periods of fire fighting in accordance with Circular No. 8.

3—Winchcomb Fire Brigade—Read, letter of 4th inst. from the Cheltenham Rural District Council asking if the Council would allow the Acting Chief Officer to visit Winchcomb and give a course of instruction to the Winchcomb Fire Brigade RESOLVED, That the Committee are prepared to undertake this training at a charge of £2 per man, subject to the District Council arranging for the conveyance of the Officer to and from Winchcomb.

4—The late Mr. Haslam's Premises—The Committee further considered the question of the purchase of these premises which would make convenient stores for Fire Brigade equipment in view of their close proximity to the Fire Station. The Town Clerk submitted letter of 12th inst. from the District Valuer in regard to the price at which the property might be purchased. RESOLVED, That the question of the purchase of this property be not proceeded with at present.

5—Mutual Assistance Scheme—Read, letter of 12th inst. from the Town Clerk, Swindon, that his Council was considering their obligations under the Fire Brigades Act which required Fire Authorities to enter into mutual assistance arrangements with other Fire Authorities, and asking whether the Council would be prepared to enter into an arrangement for mutual support with his Council in respect of the Borough of Swindon and the Rural Districts of Highworth, Cricklade and Wootten Bassett. RESOLVED, That consideration be adjourned until the next Meeting of the Committee and that the Acting Chief Officer be instructed to submit report on the question of mutual assistance to neighbouring Fire Authorities.

1—Allotments Inspection—The Gardens Superintendent reported a marked improvement in the cultivation of the allotments during the last month, but the following allotments were still in an unsatisfactory state of cultivation, viz. Nos. 24 and 38 Alma Road, Nos. 3 and 20 Creamery Piece, No. 20 Baglin's Piece, Nos. 27 and 28 North Ward, Nos. 78, 92 and 96 Marle Hill and Nos. 19 to 23 Hatherley Road, The Town Clerk reported that Nos. 24 and 38 Alma Road, No, 20 Creamery Piece and No. 78 Marle Hill had just been re-let, No. 3 Creamery Piece and Nos. 19-23 Hatherley Road were vacant and Nos. 92 and 96 Marle Hill were let to the Unemployed Allotment Association. RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to write to the Tenants of No. 20 Baglin's Piece, Nos. 27 and 28 North 1,Vard and also the Unemployed Allotment Association calling their attention to the necessity for the cultivation of the land.

2—Arrears of Rent —The Borough Treasurer submitted statement of the arrears outstanding. RESOLVED, That he be instructed to write off the arrears in respect of No 15 Baglin's Piece, Nos. 76, 77, 98 and 109 Asquith Road, Nos. 14 and 80 Marle Hill and No. 89 North Ward, RESOLVED, also, That the Town Clerk be instructed to write to other Tenants in arrear and to take proceedings against them if necessary.

3—re Well on Allotment No. 35 North Ward—The Borough Surveyor reported that as instructed he had inspected this well, which he found to be 16 ft. deep with 9 ft. 3 ins. depth of water at present: It was situate in the corner of this allotment, approximately 4 ft. to the centre of the well from the roadway. From information he obtained it appeared that the well dries up in the Summer. The Tenant of the allotment had been interviewed and stated that the well was originally covered by a stone slab at a depth of about 3 ft. and the pump was fixed adjacent to the road. The pump gave trouble continuously and was removed about six years ago and the well was not used until the Tenant opened it up about 12 months ago by removing the stone slab and fixing an old barrel on the top of the brickwork. The Tenant raised no objection to Tenants of neighbouring allotments making reasonable use of the well RESOLVED, That no action be taken at the present time.

4—Rebates in Rent—RESOLVED, That the Tenants of No. 8 Wasley's Field, Nos. 24 and 38 Alma Road, Nos. 167 and 168 North Ward, Nos. 89 and 91 Asquith Road and No 20a Creamery Piece be granted the use of these allotments rent free to 29th September next in view of their bad condition.

5—Nos. 19 and 20 Hatherley Road Allotments—The Town Clerk reported that the Tenant of these allotments had never cultivated the same although he signed the Tenancy Agreement in August 1939. He had found the allotments too far away and was under the impression that he had given verbal notice to quit. RESOLVED, That in the circumstances the arrears amounting to 8s be written off and the allotments re-let.

6—Allotment No. 7 Tennyson Road--The Town Clerk reported that he had been unable to let this allotment The Gardens Superintendent also reported that it was low-lying, frequently flooded and in a very bad condition. RESOLVED, That the allotment be let rent free if a Tenant can be found.

7—Allotment No. 124 Marle Hill Estate—RESOLVED, That this allotment be let at the reduced rent of 9s per annum in view of the existence of a well on the same which precluded an area being cultivated.

8—War-Time Food Production in Allotments and Private Gardens—Read, letter of 7th inst. from the Clerk of the County Council asking for an estimate of expenditure for the period commencing 1st April, 1940 and ending 31st March, 1941 and stating that the Agricultural Education Sub-Committee considered that the establishment of five demonstration plots might be undertaken by the Parks staff as suggested by the Ministry of Agriculture and the estimated cost of £15, previously submitted, be off-set by sales of produce. RESOLVED, That the estimate of the Gardens Superintendent amounting to £50 for providing lectures, advertising, fencing of demonstration plots etc. be approved. RESOLVED, also, That the Parks and Recreation Grounds Committee be asked to bear the cost of cultivating the five demonstration plots, taking proceeds from any sales of produce.

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# PARKS AND RECREATION GROUNDS COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, 11th March, 1940. Present—Councillors Addis, Bush, Bendall, Fisher, Green, Grimwade and Smith (Councillor Green in the chair).

1—New Recreation Ground, Whaddon Road—It was reported that this Ground was ready to be taken over from the Contractors on 1st April. RESOLVED, That the Ground be opened on Thursday, 20th March so as to be available for the Easter holidays. RESOLVED, also, That Mr. W. G. Ives be appointed Custodian at a wage of £2 13s. 2d. per week, to commence his duties on the day of opening.

2—Demonstration Allotments—(a) Cultivation—RESOLVED, on the recommendation of the Allotments Committee, That this Committee undertake the cultivation of the five demonstration plots in various parts of the town and that no charge be made for cultivation, this Committee to take proceeds of sale of produce.

(b) Notice Boards, Labels, Fencing etc.—The Gardens Superintendent reported that the plots in Sandford Park and Winter Gardens would require fencing off and also the provision of five large Notice Boards and a considerable quantity of wood labels. He estimated the cost of this at approximately £9s 10s. RESOLVED, That this sum be included in the estimate to be submitted to the County Council for the period 1st April, 1940 to 31st March, 1941.

(c) Seed Potatoes—The Gardens Superintendent reported that the Cheltenham Agricultural Traders Ltd. had given, free of cost, the seed potatoes required for the demonstration plots. RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to convey the thanks of the Committee to the Company for their gift.

3—Collection of Scrap Iron—The Gardens Superintendent reported that during the last month a considerable quantity of scrap iron was collected from the Parks and Recreation Grounds and from the store at Sandford Nursery and removed to the Depot.

4—Royal Crescent Garden—The Gardens Superintendent reported that he had received an enquiry on behalf of the occupiers of the houses in Royal Crescent Garden as to when the planting of bulbs and flowers would commence. RESOLVED, That he be instructed to have the Garden kept tidy, the lawns and mounds cut and, the gardens planted to the same extent as they have been in the past.

5—Ploughing of Fields—(a) The Gardens Superintendent reported that with the exception of a very small area at Whaddon the ploughing had been completed and the fields would be inspected in the course of a few days by the officials of the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries. He also reported that Mrs Rees was still grazing horses on the land in Brooklyn Road, although the notice to quit had expired. RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to write to Mrs. Rees asking her to cease grazing horses on the land as otherwise damage would be caused to the ground.

(b) Field off Shelley Road—Read, letter of 22nd ult. front Mrs. Holtam asking if a small path could be left in this field so that the children could obtain access from Shelley Road to the Playing Field. The Gardens Superintendent reported that this was one of the fields inspected and passed by the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries as suitable for cultivation and the formation of a footpath might prejudice the grant from the Ministry, RESOLVED, That Mrs. Holtam be informed that the Committee are unable to grant her request.

6—Damage to Roundabouts—The Gardens Superintendent reported that considerable damage had been caused to the Roundabouts both by clogs and trespass.

7—Death of Mr. W. H. Hamblin—The Gardens Superintendent reported that Mr. W. H. Hamblin, who prior to his retirement had been in the service of the Corporation for about 30 years and for many years had been Custodian at Whaddon Road Recreation Ground, died on the 7th inst. RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to convey to his widow and family the sympathy of this Committee with them in their bereavement.

2—Grants of Grave Spaces—RESOLVED, That the Common Seal be affixed to Grants Nos. 10155 to 10173

3—Designs—RESOLVED, That the Designs Nos. 2506 to 2576, as set out in the Designs Book, signed by the Chairman, be approved.

4—Civilian War Deaths Scheme—The Town Clerk reported that, as instructed, he had enquired of the Ministry of Health as to whether provision should be made for the interment of unclaimed bodies in coffins or shrouds. He now submitted letter of 27th ult. from the Ministry that, in the event of coffins being unprocurable, burial in shrouds could not be avoided, and that some of the Local Authorities in more vulnerable areas had included a suitable number of shrouds in their mortuary equipment. The shrouds should be strong enough to carry the weight of the body and should be provided with handles.

The Ministry expected that in most areas relatives and friends would take charge of bodies and make their own arrangements for burial, but where the responsibility fell upon the Local Authority, Local Authorities should make reasonable arrangements with local undertakers for burial or themselves inter the bodies. If arrangements are made with local undertakers, they should not involve a charge for burial of more than £5 per body.

RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be now instructed to submit the estimates for equipping the three emergency Mortuaries as previously approved, and that provision be included in the estimates for 20 shrouds for each Mortuary.

5—Maintenance of Graves 10472 and 10473, Section Q—The Town Clerk reported that Miss E. M. Conder's relatives in South America had agreed to pay the sum of £100 to the Corporation for the maintenance of these graves in perpetuity, but that owing to the international situation, only £50 could at present be paid. Miss Conder asked that the Corporation should accept this sum on an undertaking to pay the balance as soon as the money could be transferred. RESOLVED, That, in the circumstances, this be agreed to.

#### PUBLIC HEALTH COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, 8th April, 1940. Present—Aldermen Pruen and Winterbotham ; Councillors Barnett, Rev. de Courcy Ireland, Garland, Moore, Morris and Rogers (Alderman Pruen in the chair).

1—Houses Unfit for Human Habitation—(a) 95 Prestbury Road—RESOLVED, That consideration of making a Demolition Order in respect of this house be adjourned to the next Meeting of the Committee.

(b) 34 and 34a North Place—The Committee considered the official representation of the Medical Officer of Health in regard to this house and the Rota Sub-Committee reported their inspection of the premises. RESOLVED, That the Council being satisfied that the above mentioned premises are unfit for human habitation and are not capable at a reasonable expense of being rendered so fit, notices be given under Section 11 of the Housing Act, 1936, to the Owner, to the person having control of the house, and to the Mortgagees, if any, that the condition of the said house and any offer with respect to the carrying out of works or the future user of the house will be considered at a Meeting of this Committee to be held on the 15th May, 1940.

2—Housing Act, 1936—Certificates as to Fitness-24 Hanover Street; and 1 and 2 Lower Park Street— The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that the Owners of these houses had carried out to his satisfaction works which in his opinion would with reasonable care and maintenance render them fit for human habitation for a period of at least 10 years. RESOLVED, That certificates be issued to the Owners under Section 51 of the Housing Act, 1936, that the houses are fit for human habitation and will with reasonable care and maintenance remain so fit for a period of at least 10 years.

3—Surrender of Diseased Meat, etc.—The Medical Officer of Health reported the surrender of 3 cwt 1 qr. 15 lbs Beef 2 qrs. 12 ½ lbs Bacon and 5 lbs. Fowls.

4—Analyses of Water—The Medical Officer of Health submitted his report of analyses of water taken since the last Meeting of the Committee.

5—Nuisances from Drains, etc.-11, 12, 13, 15, 17, 19, 20, 22, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, 29, 31, 32, 33, 34, 37, 37a, 39, 55, 59 and 61 Duke Street—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that he had examined the drains etc. on or belonging to the above premises and found the same to be defective and to require amendment and alteration. He submitted specifications of the work required to be done. RESOLVED, That the same be approved, and that notices be given under Section 39 of the Public Health Act, 1936 to the Owners requiring them to do the specified works within 28 days.

6—Health Department Staff—Read, application from Mr. S. Woodman, temporary disinfecting Inspector for an increase in salary. He was at present receiving £3 a week and the Medical Officer of Health reported that he was satisfactory and recommended an increase. RESOLVED, That he be given an increase in salary of 3s a week

7—Land at Elmstone Hardwicke—Read, letter from the Ministry of Health pointing out that capital expenditure should be restricted within the narrowest limits and that consent to borrowing can only be given to projects of pressing necessity, either by reason of public need or of war requirements, and asking that if, in the present circumstances, the Council are desirous of proceeding with the

purchase of the land for sewage disposal purposes, evidence should be submitted of the urgency for this. RESOLVED, That the purchase be not proceeded with at the present.

8—Sewers in High Street—Read, letter from the London Midland & Scottish Railway Company agreeing to the laying of twin sewers under the railway and to the taking out of an existing sewer near the point where the railway crosses High Street, subject to the Corporation entering into an Agreement to indemnify the Company against any costs incurred as a result of the laying of the sewer. RESOLVED, That the Common Seal be affixed to this Agreement.

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9—Sewage Filter Media—The Borough Surveyor submitted a letter from Jees Hartshill Granite & Brick Co. Ltd in connection with the Contract entered into with them for the supply of sewage filter media, stating that owing the increased costs of war materials and wages the additional costs of haulage would be 1s 4d. per ton making the new price 16s 1d. per ton. As this was a moderate figure he had accepted it for further deliveries before the end.. of the financial year and also for the remaining quantity to be delivered during the new financial year. RESOLVED, That his action be approved and confirmed.

10—Hayden Lane Cottages—The Borough Surveyor submitted letter from Miss Rymer asking for the cottages occupied by herself and Mr. Iliffe to be provided with the water carriage system of drainage which would necessitate the construction of a considerable length of drain, together with a septic tank, at a cost of about £30—£40. RESOLVED That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to obtain estimates of the cost of installing portable chemical closets.

11—Abattoir—The Committee considered the reference back by the Council of Minute No 11 (a) of the last Meeting. RESOLVED, That the Cheltenham Butchers' Buying Committee be charged 2s 6d a week, plus the cost of electricity supplied in respect of the Office accommodation used by them and that the above Minute No. 11 (a) be varied accordingly.

12—Regal Cinema—RESOLVED, Thot the Borough Surveyor be instructed to report as to the drainage of the water closets in the basement of the Regal Cinema and as to what steps he considers the proprietors should take to improve this.

# HOUSING COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Thursday, 18th April, 1940. Present—Alderman Pates ; Councillors Bush, Compton, Grimwade, Moore and Morris (Alderman Pates in the chair).

1—Whaddon Farm Estate—(Scheme "A")—The Borough Surveyor reported that he estimated the cost of the exterior painting of the 124 houses erected under Scheme "A" at £421 12s. 0d. RESOLVED, That he be instructed to have this painting executed.

9 — Stop Taps—The Borough Surveyor submitted estimates for fixing stop taps inside the houses which were at present without these. In the case of 33 houses in Spenser Road and Spenser Avenue,

the water fittings were upstairs and if a leakage occurred considerable damage to the property might result. RESOLVED, That he be instructed to have stop taps inserted in these houses at an estimated cost of £29, and that the question of providing stop taps in various other houses on other Estates be deferred for the time being.

3—Housing Manager—The Housing Manager submitted her monthly report on the collection of rents.

4—Repairs Superintendent—The monthly Report of the Repairs Superintendent was submitted.

5—Land off Arle Road--Read, letter of 28th ult. from Mr. J. K. Troughton offering to sell to the Corporation the cottage, outbuildings, and land containing about 6 ½ acres off Arle Road. RESOLVED, That the purchase of the land be not entertained.

6—Garden Competition—RESOLVED, That the Garden Competition be held this year, that tenants be informed that the planting of vegetables in front gardens will now be permitted, and that, in awarding the prizes, regard will be had to the cultivation of vegetables. RESOLVED, also, That the sum of £23 be awarded in prizes at the discretion of the Sub-Committee as last year.

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7-13 Wordsworth Avenue—RESOLVED, That the application of the tenant to erect a shed in accordance with the plan submitted be approved.

8—46 Wymans Road—RESOLVED, That the application of the tenant of this house to keep fowls be granted subject to not more than eight fowls being kept, to no cockerels being kept, and to the fowl-house and run being constructed to the satisfaction of the Housing Manager.

9—Selection of Tenants Sub-Committee—Read, reports of the Meetings of this Sub-Committee held on 22nd February, 8th March and the 5th inst.

They recommended (inter alia) as follows :--

(a) That the rents fixed and the rebates granted, as set out in the Rents Rebate Book, signed by the Chairman, be approved.

(b) That the application of the tenant of 11 Windrush Road for permission to keep rabbits be not granted.

(c) Rent Rebates Scale—That the increase of 1s a week in the rent of tenants in the Forces in respect of their maintenance etc. be discontinued where the allowances made to the wife are less than £2 per week. RESOLVED, That the proceedings of the Sub-Committee be approved and adopted.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, 22nd April, 1940. Present-The Deputy Mayor ; Aldermen Ward and Clara F. Winterbotham Councillors Addis, Fisher, Grimwade, Morris and Rogers (The Deputy Mayor in the chair).

1—Footpath, Jersey Avenue to All Saints' Church—The Committee further considered the request from Colonel Tarrant that the Corporation should take over the footpath leading from Jersey Avenue to All Saints' Church, RESOLVED, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to report thereon at the next Meeting.

2—Regal Cinema, Promenade—The Town Clerk reported on the negotiations with Mr. L. C. Norton, Architect, in regard to the balance of the account in respect of altering the pump chamber supplying the Fountain and other works to give access to the Regal Cinema amounting to £47 18s. 7d. The total cost of the work had amounted to £157 18s. 7d. towards which the Cinema had agreed to contribute £75. RESOLVED, That the outstanding balance be borne by the Corporation.

3-217 Bath Road—Read, letter of 1st inst. from Messrs. Leishman & Copeland that their client, Mr. C. Dennis of 4 Tivoli Place was willing to take these premises at a rental of £30 per annum, inclusive of rates, as a repair depot for certain machines, Mr. Dennis was prepared to do all the interior decorations but asked that the Corporation should replace all broken glass, paint exterior window-frames, provide the necessary keys, repair the roof, and make good the floor in the front shop. The Borough Surveyor estimated the cost at £21 7s. Od. RESOLVED, That the Committee recommend that the premises be offered to Mr. Dennis at an inclusive rent of £25 per annum, subject to Mr. Dennis carrying out all the repairs and renovations required.

4-215 Bath Road—Read, letter of 19th inst. from Mr. H. Boreham offering this property for sale, RESOLVED, That the purchase be not entertained.

5—National Safety First Association—Read, circular from this Association inviting the attendance of delegates to a one-day Congress to be held in London on the 17th May next. RESOLVED, That the Chairman be appointed to attend.

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6-54 Promenade—The Town Clerk reported a claim made by Messrs. Steel, Lane & Yeend on behalf of Mrs. Cooper in respect of damage to a water main belonging to these premises alleged to have been caused by the roots of a tree in the Promenade. RESOLVED, That this be referred to the Town Clerk for consideration and report.

7-11 Winchcomb Street Read, letter of 3rd inst. from Mrs. D. M. Harper offering to take these premises at a rent of £1 10s. 0d. per month plus rates. RESOLVED, That this offer be accepted subject to all the repairs decorations required being carried out by Mrs. Harper.

8—Pittville Street improvement. Scheme—(a) Read, letter of 2nd inst. from Messrs. Dudley, Samuel & Harrison that their clients were willing to consider the acquisition of the site on the basis of a 99 years' building lease subject to payment of a nominal rent until such time when arrangements could

be made for the erection of a building on the site. RESOLVED, That the Committee are unable to entertain this proposal at the present time.

(b) 5 Pittville Street-Chairman reported an interview he had had with Mrs. Colchester-Wemyss of the Women's Voluntary Services in in regard to the renting of these premises by the Women's Voluntary Services of the Cheltenham Rural District Council. He informed Mrs Colchester-Wemyss that the Corporation were willing for the Women's Voluntary Services to continue to use these premises subject to the payment of a rent of £60 per annum, plus rates, or. in the alternative, were prepared to allow them to use other premises in the street in respect of which no offer for the tenancy had been made, rent free until such time as an offer to rent the same is received. RESOLVED, That this be approved.

9--Streamers across Promenade and High Street—Read, letter of 8th inst. from Bertram Mills' Circus for permission erect a streamer across the Promenade and High Street on the occasion of the visit of the Circus to Cheltenham next month. RESOLVED, That permission be given to display the banners for two days, subject to the usual conditions.

10—Refuse Collection Disposal—(a) The Borough Surveyor reported that the following had been salvaged during the 1cast month :--

Sacking	6 ½ cwts.

In view of the increased quantity of paper collected, the Borough Surveyor had obtained a second baling press from the Thames Board Mills Ltd. He was also endeavouring to obtain the Anti-Waste Film on loan again.

(b) Bones—The Chairman reported that, at the Conference held at Gloucester, Local Authorities were particularly urged by the Ministry of Supply to organise a collection of bones and he had arranged with the Education Secretary to write to the Head Teachers of the Schools to see if arrangements could be made to organise a collection of bones by the schoolchildren.

(c) Waste Paper—The Borough Surveyor reported that the ashmen were still finding a considerable quantity of waste paper in some of the dust-bins. RESOLVED, That where the ashmen find that waste paper has been put in the dust-bin they be instructed to deliver to the householders concerned a further copy of the leaflet dealing with the importance of salvaging waste paper in clean condition,

(d) Salvage—Read, circular of 10th inst. from the Women's Voluntary Services that they were prepared to assist with the Anti-Waste Campaign by making house-to-house visitations and giving publicity to the scheme, RESOLVED, That the Committee consider that if the Women's Voluntary Services can arrange to canvas householders urging them to collect all waste materials it would be of great assistance.

(e) Waste Food Stuffs—The Town Clerk submitted memorandum received from the Ministry of Supply in regard to the utilisation of waste food stuffs for pig and poultry feeding. The Borough Surveyor reported that the amount of waste food found amongst the refuse was not very large as quite a number of the larger premises were disposing of their waste foods to pig-keepers and others, but he had arranged for the time being for any waste food found at the tip or handed to the ashmen to be sold to one of the Corporation employees who kept pigs, at a charge of 15s per month. RESOLVED, That this be approved.

(f) Fish Offal—The Borough Surveyor reported that he had now been able to arrange for a farmer at Bourton-on-the-Water to take any fish offal for a payment of 7s 6d per week. RESOLVED, That this be approved.

(g) Scrap Iron and Old Metals—RESOLVED, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to submit proposals for the organisation of a scrap iron and old metal Week to be held in Cheltenham with a view to stimulating interest in the importance of salvaging old metals. RESOLVED, also, That he be instructed to inspect the various privately owned tips in the Borough with a view to arranging with the owners to salvage any old metals found in these tips.

11—Road Works, etc.—The Borough Surveyor submitted particulars of road works, etc , proposed to be carried out during the ensuing month. RESOLVED, That these be approved.

12—Tree, Promenade—RESOLVED, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to have the Elm tree opposite Dale, Forty's premises, reported to be dying, removed.

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13—Tewkesbury Road Clearance Order—The Borough Surveyor submitted memorial from 11 residents in Tewkesbury Road complaining of the condition of the site of the demolished cottages near the Gas Works. RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to require the owners to complete the clearance and tidying up of the site to the satisfaction of the Corporation and that, failing this, the Public Health Committee be recommended to carry out the work in default of the owners.

14—Arle Road—The Borough Surveyor reported that the footpaths in this road were now being made up and the carriage-way would shortly be re-surfaced. When the work was completed it would no longer be possible to drain the surface water into the ditches and he submitted a scheme for surface water drainage at an estimated cost of £506 for which provision had been made in the estimates. RESOLVED, That this be approved and the Borough Surveyor be instructed to have this work carried out.

15—Orchard Avenue—The Borough Surveyor submitted memorial from 47 residents in Orchard Avenue asking if a footpath could be constructed at the end of Orchard Avenue to give access to Brooklyn Road. RESOLVED, That it be suggested to the developers, Messrs. Pye Bros., that they should approach the Grammar School Governors to see if they would permit of an entrance being provided from their footpath leading from Brooklyn Road to the Grammar School playing field so as to connect with the proposed extension of Orchard Way. 16—Land, Junction Alstone Lane and Alstone Croft—The Borough Surveyor submitted offer from Mr. W. Jardine to pay £15 for the small piece of surplus land at this junction subject to the Corporation erecting the necessary fencing. RESOLVED, That this offer be accepted

17--Borough Engineer's Department—The Borough Engineer reported that Mr. Rust, Chief Architectural Assistant, had now been accepted as a Licentiate member of the Royal Institute of British Architects. RESOLVED, That Mr. Rust be granted an increment of £10 in respect of this qualification in accordance with the Grading Scheme.

18—Conference—Read, circular from the Institution of Municipal and County Engineers inviting the attendance of delegates to the Annual Conference of the Institution to be held in London on 20th and 21st June. RESOLVED, That the Chairman and the Borough Engineer be appointed to attend.

7—Midwives Acts—(a) Medical Assistance—The Medical Officer of Health reported that 69 applications had been received from Midwives for medical help during the period from the 1st January to 31st March, 1940, and that the total amount of doctors' fees claimed for the period from the 1st April, 1939, to 31st March, 1940. was £141 19s. 0d., of which £81 7s. 2d. was chargeable to patients. RESOLVED, That the Sub-Committee be asked to meet and interview patients who are in arrear with their repayments.

(b) The Medical Officer of Health reported that the following special notifications had been received from Midwives during the quarter ended 31st March, 1940: Still-births 3 ; Deaths of Infants 5 Commencement of artificial feeding 4.

8—Dentistry—(a) The Medical Officer of Health reported that 30 mothers and 21 infants had attended the School Dentist on Saturday mornings and 58 mothers and 7 infants on Wednesday evenings during the quarter in accordance with the arrangements made with the Education Committee. The number of Wednesday evening sessions held during the quarter was 11.

(b) The Medical Officer of Health reported that four sessions had been held at the Children's Hospital when 17 cases were treated and 86 teeth extracted. The Anaesthetist's fees amounted to 4 guineas and the Hospital fees to £4 5s. Od. RESOLVED, That these be paid.

(c) RESOLVED, That the Committee bear half the cost of £2 in the provision of dentures for a necessitous mother as now reported to the Committee.

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9—Children Act—The Medical Officer of Health submitted name of a foster mother who had sent in notification, and he recommended that the maximum number of children allowed should be fixed as follows:-

10—Gynaecological Clinic—The Medical Officer of Health reported that 6 Clinics had been held to date and the total number of attendances was 21, including 14 Borough patients.

11—Orthopaedic Scheme—(a) The Medical Officer of Health submitted report on the work of the Orthop2edic Clinic for the quarter ended 31st ult. The total number of children on the Register was 111, of which 66 were chargeable to the Education Committee, and in respect of which 22 surgeons' consultations had been held ; 45 children were chargeable to this Committee, in respect of which 9 surgeons' consultations had been held.

(b) The Medical Officer of Health submitted application from the Cripples Aid Society for a grant towards the cost amounting to £2 19s. 0d. of instruments, boots and repairs for children under five. RESOLVED, That a grant of 50 per cent, namely £1 9s. 6d. be made.

12—Puerperal Pyrexia--The Medical Officer of Health reported that there had been two cases where special Nurses had been provided at a cost of £2 3s. 6d. The Victoria Home now charged 1s 6d. per visit instead of 1s as hitherto. RESOLVED, That this be approved.

13—Home Helps—The Medical Officer of Health reported that Home Helps had been provided in four cases during the past quarter at a cost of £6 2s. 6d. RESOLVED, That this be approved. RESOLVED, also, That it be suggested to the District Nursing Association that they should consider the desirability of effecting a policy insurance to cover the Home Helps.

14—Milk Supply—The Medical Officer of Health reported that he had approached the Milk Distributors in the Borough to ascertain whether they were prepared to take part in the new Milk Scheme to enable the Scheme to be put into operation at an early date. He had received replies that they were not prepared to undertake the distribution of milk under the Scheme in view of the fact that retailers would not be compensated sufficiently by the allowance granted to them under the Scheme to cover the cost. The Medical Officer of Health reported that the Scheme involved considerable clerical work and the compilation of written records at each daily delivery and that the amount allowed to the retailer was only 1d. per pint, which included the provision of bottles. RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to inform the Ministry of Health that the Milk Distributors in the Borough are not prepared to take part in the Scheme and that, therefore, the Council are unable to put the Scheme into operation and, further, that the Committee are of opinion that the reasons given by the Milk Distributors are reasonable and that, in the opinion of the Committee, a modified and simpler distribution is desirable if the Ministry's Scheme for the supply of milk is to be put into operation.

15—Midwives Acts—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the County Council had decided that, where a patient from outside the Borough came into a Nursing Home in the Borough for confinement and required a Doctor under the Act, the fees for such Doctor should be paid by the Borough and that the County did not regard themselves responsible for the payment of such fees.

16—Health Visitor—RESOLVED, That Nurse Powell be authorised to attend the week-end course for Health Visitors to be held by the Women Public Officers Association at the College of Nursing, London, in June.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Friday, 26th April, 1940. Present—The Mayor ; Aldermen Pates and Ward ; Councillors Bush, Rev. de Courcy Ireland, Green, Grimwade, Lipson, Rogers, Smith and Waite ; Messrs. Davies and Seaton (Councillor Waite in the chair).

1—Entertainments Sub-Committee—Read, reports of the Entertainments Sub-Committee at their Meetings held on the 18th and 27th March, and the 9th and 23rd April.

They recommended (inter alia) as follows:-

(a) That Billy Gammon and his Band be granted the free use of the Town Hall on the evening of the 4th May for their annual Benefit Dance.

(b) That the terms arranged for the appearance of Lydia Kyasht and her ballet at the Town Hall for two days in May, the Corporation to receive 15 per cent of the gross receipts in lieu of hire charges, be approved.

(c) Summer Programme—That the revised summer programme of Concerts submitted by the Entertainments Manager be approved, and that in place of an Orchestra of 10 players on Tuesday evenings, an Orchestra of 6 be engaged which will reduce Mr. Arthur Cole's tender from £50 a week to £46 4s. 0d. per week.

(d) Conference—That the free use of the Town Hall be granted for the Conference of the Institute of British Foundrymen on 7th and 8th June,

(e) Whitsuntide Fete—That the Entertainments Manager be authorised to engage the Aircraft Components Band to give two performances at Marle Hill Annexe on Whit Monday at a charge of about £10 and that admission to the Concerts be free

(f) Musical Festival—That the free use of the Town Fall be granted for the Musical Festival Concert to be held on 13th June subject to the payment of £2 10s. 0d. to cover out-of-pocket expenses.

(g) That the free use of the Pavilion in Montpellier Gardens be granted to the Blackout Club for use in connection with their activities when the use of this is not otherwise required, subject to the payment of lighting and cleaning and any out-of-pocket expenses and to the right of the Corporation to terminate the arrangement at any time on short notice.

(h) That the free use of the Pillar Room be granted for a Meeting of the Western Centre of the Sanitary Inspectors Association on 6th April.

(i) Bar Refreshments—(a) That hirers of the Town Hall be required to submit the names of the proposed Licensee for the bar refreshments to the Entertainments Manager for approval.

(b) That next Winter season hirers of the Hall be required to charge not less than 2s 6d. admission for Whist Drives and/or Dances when a bar is provided.

(c) That Mrs. Stephens' tender for the right to provide bar refreshments at the Town Hall be accepted for the remainder of the Summer season on the same terms as accepted up to the end of May.

RESOLVED, That the proceedings of the Sub-Committee of the above Meetings be approved and adopted.

2-Baths Sub-Committee—Read, report of the Meeting of the Baths Sub-Committee held on the 18th inst.

They recommended (inter alia) as follows :--

Sandford Park Swimming Pool—(a) Staff—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to engage and provide the minimum staff necessary for conveniently running the Pool this season, and that on busy occasions arrangements be made to transfer one of the male and female attendants at the Town Hall to assist in the tray stores (except on Saturdays, Bank Holidays and other special occasions when other arrangements will have to be made), the proportion of their wages being charged to the Pool.

(b) Catering—That the Superintendent, Mr. R. T. Cosgrove, be appointed to be responsible for the catering this season and that he be paid an extra wage of 10f- per week for the season, also that Miss M. Ballinger, Waitress at the Pool in past seasons, be appointed Head Waitress at an extra wage of 10s per week.

(c) That the Pool be opened on Whit Saturday unless the Chairman considers it desirable to open this earlier.

(d) H.M. Forces—That members of His Majesty's Forces be admitted to the Pool at a reduced charge of 4d. or a charge of 6d. to include hire of costume and towel.

(e) Montpellier Baths—That members of H.M. Forces be admitted to these Baths at a reduced charge of 4d. or a charge of 6d. to include hire of costume and towel.

RESOLVED, That the proceedings of the Sub-Committee be approved and adopted.

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3—Marle Hill Annexe—Boating Rights—The Entertainments Sub-Committee reported that they had considered the application of Mr. Higgins for consent to sub-let his lease of the boating rights for the remainder of his term up to March application 1942. Mr. C. Maisey of St. Margaret's Parade, Bennington Street, and they recommended that consent be given. Mr. Maisey attended the Committee with Mr. H. T. Blake of Messrs. Eckersall & Watterson and informed the Committee that they had arranged terms with the representatives of the late Mr. Griffiths, the previous Sub-tenant, for the purchase of the boats and goodwill. RESOLVED, That the Committee consent to Mr. Higgins sub-letting his lease to Mr. Maisey.

4—Town Hall Catering—The Entertainments Manager reported that he had attended the sale of Messrs. Georges' catering plant and equipment, and in consultation with the Chairman had purchased equipment etc for the Swimming Pool and Town Hall at a cost of £46 17s. 0d. RESOLVED, That this be approved.

5—Town Hall—(a) Summer Programme—RESOLVED, That in view of the contracts entered into with Mr. Arthur Cole and Mr. Billy Gammon for the provision of their Orchestra and Dance Bands for the Summer season, persons wishing to book the Town Hall for Dances during the Summer season be only allowed to book the Hall on Monday and Wednesday evenings and that it be made a condition of the letting that they engage Billy Gammon's Dance Band on the terms arranged by the Corporation.

(b) The Entertainments Manager submitted application from the Y.M.C.A. asking if they could book the Town Hall every Saturday evening during the Summer season for their weekly Dance. RESOLVED,

That the Committee are unable to entertain this as they have themselves arranged to provide a Popular Dance on Saturday evenings, as last year, and have accepted Mr. Billy Gammon's tender for the Dance Band accordingly.

6—Sandford Park Swimming Pool and Alstone Baths—Read, applications from the Cheltenham Girl Guides and Cheltenham Boy Scouts Association asking for their members up to and including the age of 18 to be admitted to these Baths at the same rate as charged to children, namely 3d. per head, as granted to the members of the Y.M.C.A. and Blackout Club. RESOLVED, That the application be granted subject to the Girl Guides producing their Tenderfoot Badge and the Boy Scouts producing their Fleur-de-Lys Badge.

7-Montpellier Baths-The Monthly Report of the Superintendent was submitted.

8—Montpellier Gardens—(a) Y.M.C.A.—Read, application of 19th inst. from the Y.M.C.A. for the free use of the Band Stand at these Gardens on say one Sunday evening a month for a short evening Concert concluding with prayers RESOLVED, That they be granted the free use of the Band Stand on one Sunday evening during the months of May, June, July, August and September, subject to the payment of any lighting and out-of-pocket expenses and to the Concerts not commencing until after Church hours.

(b) Amateur Exhibition Tennis—RESOLVED, That the Entertainments Manager be authorised to make arrangements for amateur Exhibition Tennis Matches at these Gardens on Saturday, 29th June when Matches will be played by well-known players, the proceeds after payment of expenses (estimated at £40) to be devoted as to 25 per cent to the Local Red Cross Society and the remainder to the "Daily Sketch " War Relief Tennis Fund and the Lord Mayor's Red Cross and "St John Fund.

9—Alstone Baths—(a) Read, letter of 27th ult. from the Y.M.C.A. asking for the use of Alstone Baths on Monday evenings from 8 to 9.30 p.m. at a charge of 15s per night as last season. The Superintendent reported that the numbers attending last year did not justify this reservation and staff overtime as only an average of 14 attended. RESOLVED, That the application be granted subject to the Superintendent being satisfied that sufficient numbers will be attending, but if not it be suggested to the Y.M.C.A. that they should combine with another organisation such as the Church Lads Brigade to justify the Bath being kept open:

(b) Read, application from Pate's Grammar School for Girls for the grant of 23 full season tickets for scholars who have obtained the Instructor's Certificate, Bronze Medallion and 24 half-season tickets for scholars who have obtained the Intermediate Certificate of the Royal Life Saving Society. RESOLVED, That the application be granted.

(c) Read, letter of 23rd inst. from Mr. F. G. Moss, Swimming Instructor of the Education Committee, that as the Intermediate Certificate of the Royal Life Saving Society could only be awarded to children who had reached the age of 12, it prevented the children in the Junior Department from gaining the award of a free season ticket to the Baths. During the 1939 season over 100 of the juniors gained an Elementary Life Saving Certificate and he asked that the Corporation should grant three free half-season tickets to each of the 25 Junior Departments. RESOLVED, That the Committee agree to give one free half-season ticket to each of the 25 Junior Departments to be awarded at the

discretion of the Swimming Instructor to one child in each Department who has gained the Elementary Life Saving Certificate.

10—Borough Meteorologist—The Report of the Borough Meteorologist for the year 1939 was submitted RESOLVED, That this be printed as last year.

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11—Montpellier Gardens—RESOLVED, That the free use of Hard Tennis Courts at Montpellier Gardens be granted to Alderman Pates for his annual General Hospital Tennis Tournament on 15th June, subject to the number of Courts to be used and times of play being arranged with the Entertainments Manager.

12—Winter Garden—Mr. T. Overbury attended and submitted report on his examination of the Winter Garden roof together with estimate from Messrs. Helliwell & Co. Ltd., for carrying out the necessary repairs (a copy of Mr. Overbury's report and estimate accompanies the Minutes). Mr. Overbury estimated that to put the structure into sufficiently good state of repair to last four or five years would cost approximately £1,625, made up as follows :—

Mr. Overbury considered that if the walls and foundations were preserved by carrying out the repairs to the roof, or providing a new roof to the building, the value of the walls and foundations in connection with the new scheme previously approved by the Council would be about £15,000. RESOLVED, That the Committee adhere to their previous decision that they are unable to recommend the Council to spend any money on repairing the existing roof which would only last a few years, but that, as it is of pressing importance to preserve the building from ruin, they recommend that the revised tender of Messrs. Broads of Malvern of £11,256 for providing the new roof, raising the walls and provision of clerestory windows and other contingent items be accepted, subject to consent to borrowing and raising of loan being obtained, and to contract and bond, prepared by the Town Clerk, being entered into. RESOLVED, also, That application be made to the Ministry of Health for consent to a loan of £11,256 for the cost of the work and to consent to the raising of a loan.

# ELECTRICITY AND LIGHTING COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, 29th April, 1940. Present—The Mayor; Councillors Addis, Avery, Bendall, Bettridge, Grin-made, Rogers and Waite (Councillor Rogers in the chair). 1—Supply to Y.M.C.A. Premises in Promenade—The Committee received a deputation consisting of Messrs. Dye, Reddings and Naylor requesting that, in view of the large amount of electricity being consumed as a result of the all-night service being provided at these premises, they be supplied at a lower rate for the duration of the war. RESOLVED, That this be referred to the Borough Electrical Engineer for consideration.

2— Public Lighting—The Committee further considered the extension of wartime street lighting. The cost of installing each lamp would be about and the cost of cleaning and maintenance would also be about £1. RESOLVED, That the present number of wartime lamps erected, namely 185, be increased by 867 to 1052 and that these be erected in the positions now settled by the Committee.

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3—Electricity Department Demonstrator—The Borough Electrical Engineer reported that the Lady Demonstrator had joined the W.A.T.S. at the outbreak of war and her absence had caused considerable inconvenience He therefore proposed that a temporary demonstrator be appointed for the duration of the war. He also pointed out that Electricity Undertakings throughout the country had been asked by the Minister of Food to co-operate in the National Food Economy Campaign by giving demonstrations on the preparation of war-time foods, This Committee could assist the national effort by arranging such demonstrations not only in their own demonstration room but also in schools and halls throughout their area of supply, RESOLVED, That the proposal to engage a temporary demonstrator he approved.

4—Loan for Switchgear—The Borough Electrical Engineer reported that, in view of the increase in consumption it had become desirable to replace a number of switches and current transformers before heavier loads are reached. RESOLVED, That application be made to the Electricity Commissioners for their consent to the installation of 4 new switches at Rowanfield Road Substation and the replacement of 39 current transformers on existing switchgear in 13 other Substations at a total cost of £1539 and that application be made to the Electricity Commissioners for a loan for this amount.

5—Sub-Station Inspector—The Borough Electrical Engineer reported that Mr. S. B. Frostad, Sub-Station Inspector had applied for an increase in salary owing to the increased amount of responsibility as a result of the heavier loads of electricity passing through the sub-stations. He was receiving £213 4s. 0d. per annum and was not in the Grading Scheme. RESOLVED, That he be put into the National Joint Board Schedule, Class E, Grade 9 at a commencing salary of £244 per annum.

.6—Gas Tests—(a) Quarterly Report—Read, report of the Gas Examiner for the quarter ended 31st ult. which showed the average calorific value to be 472.1 B.Th.U.

(b) Periodical Reports—Received, reports of gas tests made on the 26th and 30th ult. and the 3rd, 8th, 15th, 17th and 24th inst. which showed the Calorific value on these dates to be 471.6, 450.6, 479.4, 462.5, 462.0, 477.0 and 472.6 B.Th.U. per cubic foot respectively and the pressure to be 9.0, 10.3, 9.0, 8.2, 8.2, 8.5 and 8.0 inches of water respectively.

3—Inspections—The Borough Engineer reported the work carried out by the Water Inspectors during the month of March,

4—Appeals—The cases entered in the Appeals Book were considered, and the rates settled and adjusted.

5—Water Charges—The Committee further considered the application of H.M. Office of Works for a reduction in the water charges for the unoccupied premises requisitioned by the Government at the outbreak of war, and the Borough Engineer reported that, as authorised at the last Meeting, he had agreed that the charge should be at the reduced rate of 80 per cent of the normal sum and that with regard to the unoccupied College Boarding Houses where meters were not installed, the rate should be SO per cent of the standard charge based on estimate but excluding charge for pupils. RESOLVED, That these arrangements be approved.

6—Water Fittings--The Borough Engineer submitted circular from the British Waterworks Association stating that, in view of the need for economy in the use of non-ferrous metals, the Association suggested that in order to make a contribution towards the prosecution of the war, " Country " type of fittings should be accepted as a war-time measure.

The Borough Engineer reported that these fittings were tested for pressure at 300 lbs. per square inch which left a good margin of safety in most parts of the area of supply, and each fitting was stamped with the makers' identification number so that a faulty fitting could be traced to the responsible manufacturer. He recommended that the suggestion of the Association should be adopted. RESOLVED, That the Committee approve of the recommendation to approve of the "Country" type of fitting being provided for the duration of the war.

7—Tewkesbury Waterworks—Coal Supple—RESOLVED, That the Borough Engineer be instructed to accumulate a stock of coal at these Works up to about 600 tons.

8—Supply to Gloucester—The Borough Engineer reported that at the last Meeting of the Joint Water Board, the Gloucester representatives asked for permission to erect temporarily one of the new electrical pumping units so as to give them a supply of 2,000.000 gallons per day from Churchdown Reservoirs. The necessary pipe laying and the erection of the pumping unit and the supply of electricity for pumping would be provided by the Gloucester Corporation, The Borough Engineer was of the opinion that 2,000,000 gallons per day would place too great a strain on the filtration plant, and he recommended that the application be acceded to, subject to the quantity of water being limited to approximately 1,000,000 gallons per day. RESOLVED, That this recommendation be approved and adopted and that the question of the charge to be made to Gloucester Corporation for the supply be adjourned until the supply is-in operation to enable the Borough Engineer to obtain experience of the working conditions with a view to arriving at the working costs.

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9—Joint Industrial Council—The Borough Engineer submitted letter of 10th inst. from the Local Secretary of the National Union of General & Municipal Workers asking the Corporation to become members of the South Western National Joint Industrial Council for Waterworks Undertakings. The Borough Engineer reported that it had always been the practice to pay the same rate of wages to the employees of the Water Undertaking as for the Highways Department with the appropriate adjustments for fitters and other craftsmen, RESOLVED, That consideration of the application be adjourned for the present.

10—Home or Lower Farm—Eight Gabled House—Read, letter of 14th ult. from Mr. F. J. Pope that he was not interested in the purchase of this property,

11—Shooting Rights—The Town Clerk reported that he had written to Mr. Clutterbuck enquiring if he wished to renew his Agreement to take the shooting rights for next Season, but had not yet received a reply. RESOLVED, That consideration be adjourned until the June Meeting of the Committee,

The Street and Highway Committee had considered the application and recommended that this be granted, the Corporation to employ a workman to remove the stone from the quarry face and to drop it on the bed of the quarry, Mr. Coke to remove the stone and clear the rubbish and to pay for all material removed at approximately 1s 6d. per ton or such higher price as the Borough Surveyor considers reasonable. RESOLVED, That this be approved, subject to the right of the Council to determine the arrangement at any time on one month's notice.

4—National Service—RESOLVED, on the recommendation of the Street and Highway Committee, That the Committee consent to L. Harmer (Pavior), aged 30, enlisting in H.M. Forces.

5—Diseases Amongst Animals—Superintendent Hopkins reported that the Borough was free from contagious diseases amongst animals.

6—Domestic Agencies—Superintendent Hopkins reported that all the Agencies in the Borough had been visited and the books examined and found to be in order for the Quarter ended 25th March last.

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7—Police Force—Read, letter of 19th inst. from the Chief Constable that as a result of the war there were now 56 vacancies in the Force in the County and that with the approval of the Standing Joint Committee several youths had been engaged as Junior Clerks and one of them is employed in Superintendent Hopkins Office. The salary paid was the County Council scale commencing at £50 per annum with annual increments of £12 10s. 0d. ; the youths would probably join the force as Constables when they were old enough to do so in about two years' time, The employment of these clerks avoided the necessity of bringing a constable into the Office from street duty to take the place of a man absent on rest day etc., and resulted in an extra constable being available for patrol. RESOLVED, That the Committee agree to the employment of the junior clerk for the duration of the war and for such additional period as may be necessary to recruit and train enough men to fill the vacancies then existing

8—Local Government Staff (War Service) Act, 1939—Read, Circular 1994 of 17th inst. that the Ministry of Health was prepared to recognise as War Service for the purposes of this Act, the

employment on armament production, including the building and repair of ships, of employees of Local Authorities who undertake such employment with the consent of their authority with a view to preserving the superannuation rights of such employees, Such recognition would normally be subject to the following conditions.

(1) The men are surplus to the essential requirements of the local authority.

(2) Arrangements for their transfer are made with the concurrence of the local branch of the Ministry of Labour and National Service.

The Minister called the attention of the local authorities to the urgent need in the national interest to secure that the skilled labour available in the country shall be used to the best advantage, and asked if local authorities would consider this matter particularly in relation to those of their employees who are skilled workers in engineering or shipbuilding industries. RESOLVED, That the Circular be considered if and when any applications are received from employees for consent to transfer to armament production works but that the Committee do not consider that the Council should be called upon to continue superannuation payments and promise re-instatement for such employees who wish to transfer to the armament industry on account of the higher rates of wages payable in these industries.

9—Rooks—Read, letter of 22nd inst. from the District Executive Officer of the Gloucestershire War Agriculture Committee calling attention to the desirability of destroying rooks in order to prevent damage to the corn crops. RESOLVED, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to destroy any nests built in the trees on the shopping side of the Promenade as hitherto

10—Shops Act, 1934—Read, letter of 15th inst. from the Education Secretary that during the past few months 401 visits have been made to the shops in the Borough when it was found that the majority of the employers were carrying out the provisions of the Act. In 29 cases the required records were not being kept and in 3 cases juveniles were being employed for excessive hours. The employers concerned had been warned and satisfactory replies had been received and the Education Secretary did not recommend that legal action should be taken as each employer had given an undertaking that the regulations under the Act will be strictly complied with in the future.

11—Provincial Council for Administrative Staffs etc.—Read, letter of 8th inst. from the National Joint Council for Local Authorities' Administrative, Technical and Clerical Services asking the Council to become a constituent member of the Provincial Council to be established for the South Western Area. RESOLVED, That the Committee do not recommend the Council to join.

12—House to House Collections Act—RESOLVED, That the application of Mr. W. B. J. Brown for a licence to permit house to house collections in aid of the Gloucester Diocesan Association for the Welfare of the Deaf and Dumb be granted for one year from 1st May, 1940 subject to compliance with the House to House Collections regulations.

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#### FIRE BRIGADE COMMITTEE.

**At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, 29th April, 1940**. Present—Councillors Bush, Fisher, Green and Grimwade (Councillor Grimwade in the chair).

1—Monthly Report of Acting Chief Officer—The Acting Chief Officer reported that since the last Meeting the Brigade had attended 7 calls to fire, as follows :—

2-Mutual Assistance Scheme—The Acting Chief Officer submitted draft Mutual Assistance Scheme which the Council were required to make under the Fire Brigades Act, 1938. He recommended that reciprocal mutual assistance schemes should be entered into with the Fire Brigade Authorities of Gloucester City, Tewkesbury Borough, Stroud and Cirencester Urban Districts, and the Cheltenham and North Cotswold Rural Districts with a scheme of payment in accordance with the scale laid down by the Home Office in their Circular dated 28th July last. RESOLVED, That the recommendations of the Acting Chief Officer be adopted and that the Town Clerk be instructed to approach the above-mentioned local authorities asking them to join in the scheme.

3—Leyland Fire Engine—The Acting Chief Officer reported that the old Leyland Fire Engine had now been sent to the Leyland works for complete overhaul. The Manufacturers estimated the cost of the work at £176 13s. 5d. as compared with the sum of £290 0s. 0d. provided for this in the Committee's Estimates. He recommended that the opportunity should be taken of having the machine repainted at an estimated cost of £60 0s. 0d. RESOLVED, That consideration of having the machine painted be deferred until it is received back from the works.

4—Auxiliary Fire Service--(a) RESOLVED, That the Acting Chief Officer be authorised to purchase four double-headed ball hydrant standpipes and keys, the cost of which would rank for grant.

(b) Exercises—The Acting Chief Officer reported that three trailer pumps and crews took part in an exercise at Gloucester on the 14th April and four trailer pumps and crews attended an exercise at Stroud on the 21st April. A large pump and crew also attended the Regional Exercise at Swindon on the 28th inst.

(c) The Town Clerk submitted the following Circulars from the Home Office. No. 37, Steel Control. No. 36, Timber Control. No. 26, Anti-Gas protective clothing. No. 29, Instructions to Air Raid Warnings for reporting fires. No 34, Travelling Expenses for unpaid volunteers. No. 31, re Auxiliary Fire Stations. RESOLVED, That these be referred to the Acting Chief Officer for attention.

(d) Foam Compound—Read, circular No. 33a of 13th inst. from the Home Office setting out the arrangements made for obtaining cheaper foam by central purchase. RESOLVED, That 40 gallons be purchased at a cost of 9s 10d, per gallon, the cost of which will rank for grant.

(e) Supplementary Fire Parties—Read, Circular of 19th inst. from the Home Office enclosing Memorandum of a Scheme for the issue of stirrup hand-pumps to fire parties for the use of informal fire parties and asking if the Council were prepared to co-operate in this scheme. The number of pumps which will be allocated to the Borough is 25. The primary condition of supply is that fire authorities should undertake to organise and train fire parties consisting of at least three persons per pump. The pump should be stored at premises, preferably those occupied throughout the 24 hours, but not at premises for which firefighting precautions are required to be provided by the Civil Defence Act, In the selection of fire parties care should be taken to choose reliable persons who will command the confidence of their neighbours. RESOLVED, That the Council are prepared to cooperate in the scheme and that the Acting Chief Officer be instructed to report as to the recruitment of personnel and the districts where hand-pumps should be allocated.

(f) Military Service—Read, Circular No. 35 of 25th inst. from the Home Office in regard to the deferment of the calling up of men in the 26 and 27 age groups who were engaged on whole time Auxiliary Fire Service. The Acting Chief Officer reported that application had already been made for the deferment of the calling up of two men in the 26 age group and he recommended that application be made for the deferment of the calling up of two men in the 27 age group. RESOLVED, That this be approved.

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(g) Read, letter of 19th inst. from the Home Office that instructions had been given to issue 1,500 feet of 3 ½ in. unlined delivery hose as soon as supplies become available.

(h) Stores—The Acting Chief Officer reported that it was imperative that further accommodation should be provided for storing the large amount of clothing and equipment etc. being delivered from time to time for the Auxiliary Fire Service, RESOLVED, That the Acting Chief Officer be instructed to inspect the vacant premises in Pittville Street and Albion Street and that, if one of these premises appear suitable, the Street and Highway Committee be recommended to approve of it being used for the purpose of stores and that application be made to the Home Office for approval to the rent of the premises ranking for grant.

(i) Auxiliary Fire Stations—Read, letters of 23rd inst. from the Home Office that they were prepared to recognise for grant a rent of £16 0s. 0d. for the use of Mr. Horsman's garage from the 1st September, 1939 to the 11th January, 1940 a rent of £30 0s. 0d. per annum as from the 11th January in respect of the garage at the rear of 10 Lansdown Terrace ; and £40 0s. 0d. per annum in respect of the premises belonging to Newmek Ltd. from the 2nd September, 1939.

(j) The Acting Chief Officer reported that, if another room could be found for a recreation room for the Auxiliary Fire Service, the room in the Fire Station at present used by them could be used for storage purposes. RESOLVED, That the Chairman be authorised to see what terms can be arranged for renting the Parish Church Young Men's Club Room at the rear of the Parish Hall.

(k) The Acting Chief Officer reported that Volunteers were urgently needed for the Auxiliary Fire Service to bring this-up to the full strength of 250, and that the resignations received from time to time exceeded the number of new volunteers. RESOLVED, That a selection of appliances be displayed on the broad pavement in front of the Post Office on the 4th May and also that a

demonstration of firefighting appliances be given at Marle Hill Annexe on Whit Monday with a view to attracting Volunteers to the Service.

5—Professional Firemen—Read, application from four of the regular firemen and the Acting Third Officer who had completed 12 months service for an increase in wages owing to the increase in the cost of living Their wages were at present £3 10s. 0d. a week plus uniform. The Acting Chief Officer recommended that the application be granted. Most Corporations of the size of Cheltenham had adopted the Middlebrook Scale of pay which was £3 10s. 0d. a week rising by annual increments of 2s to £4 10s. 0d. a week in addition to which each man was provided with free living accommodation or equivalent rent allowance. RESOLVED, That the application be not granted

6—Acting Deputy Chief Officer—Read, application from the Acting Deputy Chief Officer for an increase in his salary RESOLVED, That, in view of the extra work carried out by this Officer owing to the absence of the Chief Officer, his salary be increased by £25 to £250 per annum.

7—Acting Chief Officer—Read, application from the Acting Chief Officer for an increase in salary. RESOLVED, That, in view of the increased duties carried out by him in the absence of the Chief Officer and the work in connection with the Auxiliary Fire Service, his salary be increased by £50 to £300 per annum rising to £325 per annum in one year's time.

8—Chief Officer—The Chairman reported an interview he had had with the Chief Officer who had not yet been able to-obtain other accommodation. RESOLVED, That, in the circumstances he be allowed to remain in possession of the house at 6 St. George's Parade until the 24th June when the Corporation's tenancy of the flat occupied by the Acting Chief Officer expires.

9—The Fire Brigades Regional Order—The Town Clerk submitted this Order which came into force on the 18th inst and revoked the former Order dated 1st September last. RESOLVED, That this be referred to the Acting Chief Officer.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Wednesday, 15th May, 1940. Present—Aldermen Pruen and Clara F. Winterbotham ; Councillors Barnett, Rev. de Courcy Ireland, Garland, Dr. Hayward, Morris and Rogers(Alderman Pruen in the chair).

1—Houses Unfit for Human Habitation—(a) 95 Prestbury Road—Mr. Osborne, representing the Owner of this house, attended and reported that the Owner was prepared to enter into an Undertaking to render the house fit for human habitation. RESOLVED, That consideration be adjourned for one month to enable the Owner to give this Undertaking.

(b) 34 and 34a North Place—The Committee considered the question of making a Demolition Order in respect of these premises. RESOLVED, That the Council being satisfied that the dwellinghouse, which is occupied or is of a type suitable for occupation by persons of the working classes, is unfit for human habitation, and is not capable at a reasonable expense of being rendered so fit, and no undertaking having been given by the Owner with respect to the carrying out of the work required or the future user of the house, a Demolition Order be now made by the Council in pursuance of Sub-Section (4) of Section 11 of the Housing Act, 1936, requiring that the house shall be vacated within 28 days from the date on which the Order becomes operative, and that the premises shall be demolished within six weeks after the expiration of the above-mentioned period, or if the house is not vacated by that date, within six weeks after the date on which it is vacated.

(c) 30 and 32 Marle Hill Road—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that the Owner of these houses had not carried out to his satisfaction the works required to render them fit for human habitation. RESOLVED, That the Undertakings be cancelled.

(d) Bruton Cottage, Portland Street—It was reported that this house had not been demolished in accordance with the Demolition Order and the Chairman had accordingly accepted the tender of Mr.W. M. Wiggett for the demolition of this house for the sum of £15 0s. 0d. less £2 10s. 0d. allowance for the value of the materials.

2—Housing Act, 1936—Certificates as to Fitness—(a) 30 and 32 Marle Hill Road—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that the Owner of these houses had carried out to his satisfaction works which in his opinion would with reasonable care and maintenance render them fit for human habitation for a period of at least 10 years RESOLVED, That certificates be issued to the Owner under Section 51 of the Housing Act, 1936, that the houses are fit for human habitation and will, with reasonable care and maintenance, remain so fit for a period of at least 10 years.

(b) 4 Victoria Street—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that the Owner of this house had in accordance with the provisions of Section 51 (1) of the Housing Act, 1936, submitted lists of proposed works with a request in writing that the Council should inform him whether in their opinion the house would, after the execution of these works or of these works and any other works, be in all respects fit for human habitation and would with reasonable care and maintenance remain

so fit for a period of at least 10 years. RESOLVED That the Chief Sanitary Inspector be instructed to submit to the Owner a list of any additional works which he considers should be carried out before a certificate could be given.

3—Notices not complied with—(a) 3 Moorend Road—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that the Notice served under Section 9 (1) of the Housing Act, 1936 in respect of this house had not been complied with. RESOLVED, That tenders be obtained for carrying out the repairs necessary and that the expenses be recovered from the Owner under Section 10 of the Housing Act, 1936. (b) 11, 13, 15, 17, 24, 27, 28 Duke Street—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that the Notices served under Section 39 of the Public Health Act, 1936 on the Owners of these houses had not been complied with. RESOLVED, That tenders be obtained for carrying out the work and that the expenses incurred be recovered from the Owners under Section 390 of the Public Health Act, 1936.

4—Surrender of Diseased Meat, etc.—The Medical Officer of Health reported the surrender of 1 cwt. 20 lbs Beef ; 2 qrs. 10 lbs. Pork ; 1 qr. 14 lbs. Fish and 1 qr. 24 lbs. Poultry.

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5—Slaughter House Licences—It was reported that the number of licences renewed by slaughter house men for 1940 was 43 and 9 new licences were issued. 13 licences in operation for 1939 were not renewed. All the slaughter house men at the public abattoir had taken out the necessary licences.

6—Food and Drugs Act, 1938—(a) The Chief Sanitary Inspector submitted Certificates of the Public Analyst in respect of 12 samples of milk Nod. 45-50, 54, 56-59 and 62 ; 1 sample of baking powder 3 samples of raspberry jam ; 1 sample of coffee extract ; 1 sample of malt extract and cod liver oil ; 4 samples of lard and 4 samples of sausage. Two samples of raspberry jam guaranteed by the makers to comply with the Lower Fruit Standard of the Food Manufacturers' Federation were found deficient in raspberries by 25 and 45 per cent respectively. RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to report this to the Town Clerk, Birmingham, where the makers' factory was situate.

(b) The Quarterly Report of the Public Analyst was submitted for the Quarter ended on the 31st March last.

His present wages were £3 10s. 0d. a week. RESOLVED, That he be granted an increase of 10s a week while he is working these extra hours.

(b) Weighing Machine—The Borough Surveyor reported that he had received from Messrs. W. & T. Avery Ltd. a quotation for the maintenance of the two weighing machines supplied by them at the Abattoir at £2 0s. 0d. per quarter which included the replacement of various parts which might prove defective or wear out. RESOLVED, That he be authorised to enter into an Agreement with the makers on these terms

9—Brook, Alma Road—Read, letters from Miss L. Cook and S. J. Evans complaining of the nuisance arising from the brook in Alma Road. 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# ELECTRICITY AND LIGHTING COMMITTEE.

2—Cable Contracts—The Borough Electrical Engineer reported that the Hackbridge Cable Co. Ltd. were willing to extend their contract for the supply of cables for another year up to 30th June, 1941 at prices approximately 4 per cent above their current prices. He also submitted an offer from Aberdare Cables to extend their contract for one year on revised terms. RESOLVED, That the offer of the Hackbridge Cable Co. Ltd. be accepted and that the Borough Electrical Engineer be authorised to arrange terms with Aberdare Cables.

3—Overhead Lines—The Town Clerk reported that the Ministry of Transport had consented to the erection of an overhead line at Staverton.

4—Power Supply—The Borough Electrical Engineer submitted an application from a power consumer for a considerable increase in his supply, and he reported on the extensions which would be necessary. RESOLVED, That the supply be given on his entering into an agreement to take the supply on the same terms as other large consumers and subject to payment of the cost of the extensions to the cable etc.

5—Gas Tests—Read, reports of gas tests made on the 2nd, 5th, 8th, 13th, 22nd and 27th inst. which showed the calorific value on these dates to be 478.3, 477.8, 470.5, 474.7, 467.4 and 475.6 B.Th.U. respectively and the pressure to be 8.6, 9.1, 5.9, 6.8, 8.8 and 8.6 inches of water respectively.

# GENERAL PURPOSES AND WATCH COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Tuesday, 21st May, 1940. Present—Me Mayor ; The Deputy Mayor; Aldermen Margrett, Pates, Pruen, Ward and Winterbotham ; Councillors Rev. de Courcy Ireland, Green, Grimwade and Waite (Alderman Margrett in the chair).

1—Diseases Amongst Animals—Superintendent Hopkins reported that the Borough was free from contagious diseases amongst animals.

2—Hackney Carriage Licences—Read, report of the Annual Licensing Meeting of the Committee held at the Central Depot on the 8th inst. Present—Aldermen Clara F. Winterbotham and Pates ; Councillors Rev. de Courcy Ireland and Green. The Committee had inspected all the Motor Hackney Carriages (with the exception of 4) and 1 Pony Carriage and recommended that all the applications for the renewal of licences for tie ensuing year be granted, subject to the 4 Taxis not produced for inspection being passed by Supt. Hopkins, and also that all the applications. for Drivers' Licences be granted. RESOLVED, That this recommendation be approved and adopted.

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3—Licences to Deal in Game—RESOLVED, That the applications of D. Barnett, Liptons Ltd., MacFisheries Ltd., W. H. Iddles, H. F. Barnett, N. C. Olive, Gloucester Marketing Society, C. Barnett, W. Dean and H. Reynolds for renewal of their licences to deal in game be granted for one year, up to 1st July, 1941.

4—Petroleum Licences—(a) RESOLVED, That the application of Pool Petroleum Board to open existing tanks at the Tewkesbury Road Depot of Shell Mex and B.P., be granted and that a Licence be granted to store 20,000 gallons of petroleum.

(b) RESOLVED, That the application of Messrs. Kirk & Kirk for a Licence to store 500 gallons of petroleum in a temporary underground installation on the site of new building works at Priors Road for use during building operations be granted.

5—Factories Act, 1937—Mr. G. G. C. King, the Inspector under Section 34 of the Factories Act 1937 reported that in company with the Factory Inspector he had inspected the premises of Spirax Manufacturing Co in St. George's Road and the U.C.A.L. works in Keynshambury Road and found that adequate means of escape in case of fire had been provided and these means of escape are kept free from obstruction. He recommended that a Certificate under Section 34 of the Factories Act 1937 be issued. RESOLVED, That Certificates be issued under Section 34 of the Act.

6—Winter Garden Railings and Tank—The Committee considered the resolution of the Council authorising them to dispose of the Winter Garden railings and tank at Montpellier Gardens. The Borough Surveyor reported that the total length was approximately 423 yards including the gates and he estimated the weight of the metal at about 30 tons. Each upright was securely leaded into a heavy stone plinth. One method of taking them out was to cut out each vertical and make good the stone plinth at an estimated cost of 7s 2d. per yard, or a total cost of £171 11s. 6d. including making good the damage to footpaths and gardens. The railings would probably fetch a sum of £82 10s. 0d. being £2 15s 0d. per ton. Messrs. John Such & Sons had suggested they could burn through all the uprights at a cost of 1s 4d. a yard in which case it would be necessary to cover the short cut-off ends with a covering of concrete and he estimated the cost of this method at 4s 6d. a yard, namely £112 3s. 6d. Mr. Such also suggested that he might be able to draw out the railings from the stone plinth at considerably less cost.

Before deciding to dispose of the railings, the Borough Surveyor suggested that the Committee should consider the desirability of keeping these for erection along the Dowdeswell Reservoir in place of the timber fence which was now nearing the end of its life and would shortly have to be replaced. RESOLVED, That the Committee decide to dispose of the railings forthwith (except the

portion of the railings along the east side adjoining the Drawing Room Terrace), and that an experiment be made with drawing them out as suggested by Mr. Such, but if this is not satisfactory Messrs John Such & Sons Ltd. be instructed to burn through the railings at a cost of 1s 4d. per yard, and that the short cut-off ends be covered with concrete and the plinth and footpaths made good.

RESOLVED, also, That a temporary wire fence be placed along the south side of the gardens to prevent persons falling over the embankment. RESOLVED, also, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to obtain tenders for the demolition and removal of the tank.

7—Marle Hill House Estate—(a) Read, letter from Col. Whitmore Jones asking if in view of the present situation and the difficulty of obtaining other accommodation, he might be allowed to withdraw his notice to terminate his tenancy.

RESOLVED, That this be agreed to.

(b) Read, letter from Mr. W. H. Horsley asking if the Corporation would consider selling the house with about 5 acres of ground for the purpose of a first-class Club. RESOLVED, That the Committee are not prepared to entertain the sale of the property,

(c) Fields—RESOLVED, That the grazing on the field fronting Evesham Road containing about 6 acres be let to J. P. Pates & Co. for grazing their horses at weekends at a rent of 16s 8d per month, subject to the Corporation also retaining the right to graze their own horses on the field as at present. RESOLVED, also, That Messrs. C. C. Castle & Sons be instructed to obtain offers for the mowing grass in the adjoining field containing about 10 acres

8—Leckhampton Hill Estate—(a) Custodian's Cottage—The Borough Surveyor reported that the lean-to structure adjoining the Custodian's cottage in Daisybank Road had settled and resulted in a fracture of the stonework. It was also found that the drainage to the house was not adequate. RESOLVED, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to have the lean-to structure repaired and also provide an adequate drainage system for the cottage.

(b) Read, letter of 24th ult. from Ivens, Thompson & Green asking for consent to Mr. A E. Gardner underletting the land formerly let to Mr. Murray Linder by agreements dated 15th October, 1934 and 31st May, 1937 to a new company known as the Bresson Aircraft Ltd. of 17 Bennett's Hill, Birmingham. The present under-tenant (Mr. A. Gardner) would remain responsible for the rent. RESOLVED, That consent be given to the further under-letting.

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9—Rodney Road Car Park----Read, letter of 27th ult. from the Commanding Officer of the Cheltenham Division of the Cotswold Sea Cadet Corps asking for permission to drill the cadets in this car park during the summer months RESOLVED, That the application be granted so far as this does not interfere with the use of the ground as a car park.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, 27th. May, 1940. Present—Alderman Ward ; Councillors Bush, Green and Grimwade; and Mr. W. S. F. Harris (Councillor Grimwade in the chair).

1—Monthly Report of Acting Chief Officer—The Acting Chief Officer reported that since the last Meeting the Brigade had attended 4 calls to fire, as follows :—May 1st, Bottomley Farm, Woodmancote (Cheltenham R.D.C.) ; May 10th, 2 St. Margaret's Terrace ; May 19th, Cranley Lodge, Wellington Square ; and May 22nd, 254 High Street.

2—Leyland Fire Engine—The Acting Chief Officer reported that this fire engine had now been received back from its overhaul by the makers. RESOLVED, That the Acting Chief Officer be authorised to have this repainted by members of the Fire Brigade Staff at an approximate cost of £15 for materials etc.

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3—Auxiliary Fire Service-7(a) Uniforms-17 tenders were received for the supply of the uniforms, overalls and caps required for the Auxiliary Fire Service. RESOLVED, That the following tenders (being the lowest in each case) be accepted :—

Messrs. Huggins, Son & Co. Ltd., Bristol 128 Firemen's tunics with badges at 29s 11 ¾ d. each ; 15 Messengers' tunics with badges at 21s 1 ¾ d. each ; 2 Officers tunics with badges at 49s 6d. each ; 155 Firemen's trousers at 10s 9d. each; and 2 Officers' trousers at 22s 10d. each.

Messrs. Manclark & Son, Edinburgh : 78 Overalls at 7s 5d. each.

Messrs. Dillingham & Edwards, Luton : 95 Firemens' caps at 3s 11d. each.

Rego Clothiers, London : 4 Officers' caps at 6s 5d. each ; 1 Officer's cap at 17s 5d. ; and 1 Officer's cap at 14s 11  $\frac{1}{2}$  d.

(b) Supplementary Fire Parties—Read, letter of 10th inst. from the Home Office that instructions had been given for the issue of 6 stirrup hand pumps for the training of supplementary fire parties, The Acting Chief Officer reported that he had been in touch with some of the Senior Wardens in the Borough who had kindly offered to recruit the personnel to man these pumps and that the training of the personnel (about 4 hours) would be done by members of the Auxiliary Fire Service. He suggested that the 25 stirrup pumps earmarked for the Borough should be allocated as follows :--St. Mark's Estate, 6 pumps ; Folley Lane Estate, 4 pumps ; Selkirk Street district, 1 pump ; The Moors Estate and Lower High street, 7 pumps ; Whaddon Estate, 5 pumps ; Tivoli, 1 pump ; and Piney Crescent, 1 pump. Most of the Head Wardens were of opinion that more stirrup hand pumps were necessary and that if these were supplied they would probably be able to obtain the additional personnel to act as fire parties. RESOLVED, That the proposals of the Acting Chief Officer be approved and that the Town Clerk be instructed to make application to the Home Office for a further allocation of stirrup hand pumps for use by supplementary fire parties. RESOLVED, also, That the attention of the public be drawn to the fact that those members of the public who can afford to do so should purchase stirrup hand pumps and that the Acting Chief Officer of the Fire Brigade will be glad to train members of the public in the use of these.

(c) RESOLVED, That the Acting Chief Officer be authorised to purchase a supply of new sparking plugs and new tyres when necessary for the towing vehicles.

(d) Action Station—The Acting Chief Officer reported that he had arranged with Messrs. Walker, Crosweller & Co. Ltd, to form an Action Station at their works on the Whaddon Estate where two trailer pumps would be stationed. Messrs. Walker, Crosweller & Co. Ltd. had agreed to provide accommodation for the pumps and towing vehicles and 15 of their workmen had already enrolled so that the Station would be manned day and night. RESOLVED, That this be approved.

(e) The Town Clerk submitted the following circulars from the Home Office Nos. 38, Issue of Anti-Gas Ointment ; 39, Pressure Calculator ; 41 and 51, Enrolment of unemployed men formerly in reserved occupations ; 42, Timber Control ; 43, Operational Control at Air Raid Incidents; 44, Deferment of Military Service of personnel ; 47, Repairs and Replacement of fire appliances; 48, Rubber Boots; 49, Development of Emergency Arrangements; 50, Insurance of Part-Time Vehicles ; 96, Batteries and Bulbs ; 54, Aeroplane Crash Fires ; and 101, Replacement of Equipment damaged during Air Attack. RESOLVED, That these be referred for the attention of Acting Chief Officer.

(f) Food for Personnel—Read, letter of 1st inst. from the Home Office that they were not prepared to approve of the payment of 1s per day to the personnel in lieu of the provision of food. The Acting Chief Officer reported that arrangements had now been made to instal cooking stoves at the Auxiliary Fire Stations, the Corporation to provide the food in accordance with the requirements of the Home Office.

(g) Section Officer---The Acting Chief Officer recommended that one of the whole-time Auxiliary Firemen should be promoted to Section Officer to arrange for the purchase of the food for the personnel and superintend the messing arrangements, and the Town Clerk reported that the Home Office had approved of the proposal to appoint a Section Officer at a wage of £3 10s. 0d. per week. RESOLVED, That this be approved.

(h) Leading Firemen—Read, Circular No. 40 of 1st inst. from the Home Office that as from 1st May the pay of Auxiliary Fire Service Personnel holding the rank of Leading Fireman may be increased to £3 5s. 0d. per week and the expenditure of the Fire Authorities will be reimbursed accordingly, provided that the number of Leading Firemen does not exceed the approved number of first line units, which in Cheltenham were 7. The Acting Chief Officer reported that the pay of 7 Leading Firemen had been increased accordingly.

(i) Aliens—Read, Circular No. 55 of 24th inst. that having regard to the conditions existing at the present time it is considered desirable that fire authorities should review the position of any aliens who may have enrolled as Members of the Auxiliary Fire Service. In particular, steps should be taken that no alien, whether of enemy nationality or otherwise, is employed in a key position. The Acting Chief Officer reported that there were no aliens in the Auxiliary Fire Service occupying key positions.

(j) Auxiliary Fire Service Recreation Room—Councillor Bush reported that the Parish Church Young Men's Club were willing to let their premises, including the Billiard Tables and equipment, to the Auxiliary Fire Service for the use of the Social Club, at a rent of £50 per annum, including rates RESOLVED, That this offer be accepted and that application be made to the Home Office for the approval of this rental for the purposes of grant,.

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4—Fire Brigades Act, 1938—Read, Circular No 46 of 14th inst. from the Home Office pointing out that the provision of Emergency Fire Brigade appliances and equipment by the Government and the arrangements for Fire Brigade reinforcements under Regional Schemes did not relieve Fire Authorities of their statutory obligations under this Act to provide efficient local fire services and to enter into Mutual Assistance Schemes with neighbouring authorities , and also pointing out that it is no longer lawful for any Fire Authority to require any owners or occupiers of properties on which fires have occurred to make any payment in respect of local fire services other than through the general Rates.

5—Third Officer—Read, letter of 1st inst. from the Home Office extending for a further six months up to 30th September, 1940, the approval to the salary of the Third Officer ranking for exchequer grant The Acting Chief Officer reported that it would considerably facilitate training if the Third Officer was sent to the Anti-Gas School at Falfield for training as an Anti-Gas Instructor, RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to make application to the Home Office for a vacancy to be allotted to the Third Officer and that, if granted, the Third Officer be appointed to attend the course and that his expenses be borne by the Corporation.

6—Hose Drying and Drill Tower—Read, letter of 1st inst. from the Home Office that the Ministry were prepared to take into account for grant under the Air Raid Precautions Act, 1937, the sum of £80, representing 75 per cent of the estimated cost of this tower. RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to enter into a Contract for the erection of the tower.

7—Mutual Assistance Scheme—Read, letters from the Town Clerk, Tewkesbury, and the Clerk to the Cirencester Urban District Council that their respective Councils were prepared to enter into Mutual Assistance Schemes as requested by the Corporation. RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to prepare the necessary Agreements and the Common Seal be affixed thereto.

(b) The Gardens Superintendent submitted an application from the National Union of General and Municipal Workers for an increase of 5s a week in the wages of L. Turner, one of the gardeners. RESOLVED, That this be referred to the Labour Sub-Committee.

2-Alstone Croft Playing Field—Store at Pavilion—The Borough Surveyor reported that proper use of the Pavilion at this playing field could not be made as the Custodian's equipment was at present stored therein. He reported that he was making a temporary erection out of secondhand corrugated iron to use as a tool store until the new store already authorised is constructed. RESOLVED, That this be approved.

RESOLVED, That the Council being satisfied that the dwellinghouse, which is occupied or is of a type suitable for occupation by persons of the working classes, is unfit for human habitation, and is not capable at a reasonable expense of being rendered so fit, and no undertaking having been given by the Owner with respect to the carrying out of the work required or the future user of the house, a Demolition Order be now made by the Council in pursuance of Sub-Section (4) of Section 11 of the Housing Act, 1936, requiring that the house shall be vacated within 28 days from the date on which the Order becomes operative, and that the premises shall be demolished within six weeks after the expiration of the above-mentioned period, or if the house is not vacated by that date, within six weeks after the date on which it is vacated.

(c) 40 Queen Street—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that the Owner of this house had now carried out to his satisfaction the works required to render it fit for human habitation. RESOLVED, That the Undertaking be cancelled.

2—Housing Act, 1936—Certificate as to Fitness-40 Queen Street—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that the Owner of this house had carried out to his satisfaction works which, in his opinion, would with reasonable care and maintenance render it fit for human habitation for a period of at least 10 years. RESOLVED, That a certificate be issued to the Owner under Section 51 of the Housing Act, 1936, that the house is fit for human habitation and will, with reasonable care and maintenance, remain so fit for a period of at least 10 years.

3—Notices not complied with-3 Moorend Road and 24 and 28 Duke Street—RESOLVED, That the Chairman be authorised to accept tenders for the carrying out of works at these premises and that the expenses be recovered from the Owners in accordance with Minute No 3 of the last Meeting of the Committee.

4—Surrender of Diseased Meat, etc.—The Medical Officer of Health reported the surrender of 1 cwt 11 lbs. Beef ; 18 lbs. Bacon ; 1 qr. 5 lbs. Kidneys ; 1 Fowl and 1 cwt. Mackerel.

5—Analyses of Water—The Medical Officer of Health submitted his report of analyses of water taken since the last Meeting of the Committee.

6—Smoke Nuisance, Sunshine Laundry—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that he had received a complaint of a nuisance caused by smoke from this laundry. He had ascertained that the Owners were experiencing great difficulty in obtaining proper fuel at the present time. RESOLVED, That no further action be taken at present. 7—Rat Destruction—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported the serious situation arising out of the number of rats which were coming out of the sewers in various parts of the town. RESOLVED, That the Borough Surveyor and the Chief Sanitary Inspector be instructed to take such steps as they may deem necessary to reduce these RESOLVED, also, That the Chief Sanitary Inspector be authorised to permit two men now employed in rat destruction to work overtime when necessary, and that the public be asked to co-operate in securing the destruction of the rats

8—Better Health Magazine—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the annual grant of £6 which is made towards the cost of producing this magazine was now due. RESOLVED, That this grant be discontinued.

Jee's Hartshill Granite & Brick Co, Ltd. stating that they would be unable to deliver the filter media to the works by road owing to petrol rationing, and that the cost of conveying it by rail would be 16s 4d per ton instead of 16s 1d per ton by road. 3—Transfer of Skilled Labour to War Industry—The Committee further considered circular of the 30th May from the Ministry of Health appealing to Local Authorities to take the initiative in reviewing their staffs and appealing individually to such skilled workers who could be released to transfer to essential war industries. The Borough Surveyor reported that six employees had already volunteered to be transferred. While he was finding it difficult to obtain sufficient unskilled labour, there were, -however, three or four skilled men who might be released. RESOLVED, That all employees who transfer, or have transferred to essential war industries with the consent of the Council, be promised reinstatement on their return, and that the Corporation agree to continue to pay the employers' portion of the Superannuation contributions provided the employee also pays his contribution so as to preserve his superannuation rights, and that Minute No. 8 passed at the Meeting of the Committee on the 23rd April be varied accordingly. RESOLVED, also, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to approach such skilled men as he is able to release with a view to appealing to them to register at the Labour Exchange to transfer to essential war industries

4—Corporation Buildings—The Committee considered the desirability of protecting the windows of the various Corporation buildings from damage by blast by covering the windows with cellophane paper. RESOLVED, That the Committee do not consider this is necessary in view of the fact that the majority of the buildings will be vacated during an air-raid.

5—Holidays- -RESOLVED, That the regular holidays be cancelled this year, but that the Chief Officers be authorised to arrange, where possible, for staffs and employees to have short periods of holiday whenever circumstances permit.

6—Montpellier Rotunda—Read, letter of 13th inst. from the Ministry of Health that, after careful consideration, the Minister did not appear justified, in the present circumstances, in sanctioning the loan for the purchase of these premises. RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to proceed with the purchase by way of advance from the Bank as previously authorised by the Finance Committee.

7—Bye Laws—Read, letter of 28th ult. from the Education Secretary asking the Council to make application to the Secretary of State for approval of the following Byelaw :—

" Any person other than a teacher, child, manager or other duly authorised person, being in or on the buildings, playgrounds or other premises of any public elementary school who, being requested to depart therefrom by the Head Teacher or the Teacher acting as Head Teacher of such school, refuses to depart therefrom and makes use of any violent abusive, profane, indecent or obscene

language or otherwise behaves in a disorderly manner, shall be guilty of an offence, and shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding five pounds.

This Byelaw shall extend to all public elementary schools in the Borough of Cheltenham."

8—Marle Hill House Estate—RESOLVED, on the recommendation of the Parks Committee, That the mowing grass and grazing on the large field adjoining Marle Hill House be let to Mr. J. R. Birt up to the 25th December next at a rent of £1 10s. 0d. per acre.

9—Committee Meetings—RESOLVED, That the sending of Agenda of the regular monthly Meetings of the Committee be discontinued for the duration of the War.

2—Cultivation of Vacant Land—The Gardens Superintendent reported that the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries had forwarded grant, amounting to £39, in respect of the ploughing of the grass land.

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3—Arrears of Rent—The Borough Treasurer submitted statement showing arrears due from tenants. RESOLVED, That these be left in the hands of the Town Clerk for collection.

4—Ditch at Baglin's Piece—The Borough Surveyor reported that, as instructed, he had had this ditch inspected and it had been cleaned out by the Gardens Superintendent. The invert of the ditch was now about 15 inches below the 4 inch outlet drain. **At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, 8th July, 1940.** Present—Aldermen Pruen and Clara F. Winterbotham ; Councillors Barnett, Rev. de Courcy Ireland, Garland, Grimwade, Dr Hayward, Moore, Morris, Rogers and Waite (Alderman Pruen in the chair).

1—Houses Unfit for Human Habitation—(a) 5, 6 and 7 Exmouth Street—Read, letter from Messrs. Bubb & Co., on behalf of the Owner, asking that enforcement of the Demolition Order in respect of these premises might be postponed for the duration of the War. RESOLVED, That the Owner be allowed a further six months to carry out her Undertaking to recondition the premises, provided she makes the premises safe to the satisfaction of the Chief Sanitary Inspector.

(b) 34 and 34a North Place--The Town Clerk reported that all efforts to persuade the Owner— Occupier of this house to leave it had been unavailing. RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to take proceedings to obtain possession of the house.

(c) Bruton Cottage, Portland Street—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that this cottage had now been demolished by the Corporation, but that as a result of this, a bricked-up doorway had been exposed in the wall of the adjoining house which was now in a dangerous condition. RESOLVED, That the Owner of the adjoining house be offered £5 as the cost of effectively making good this wall.

(d) 9aHewlett Place ---The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that this house, in respect of which a Demolition Order was made on 4th June, 1934 was now vacant. RESOLVED, That the Owner be not required to carry out the demolition of the house at present, subject to his carrying out the necessary boarding up of the entrance to the satisfaction of the Chief Sanitary Inspector

2 –Surrender of Diseased Meat, etc.—The Medical Officer of Health reported the surrender of 1 cwt, 2 qrs. 20 lbs Beef; cwt 7 lbs Mutton, 18 lbs. tinned Ham; 3 cwt. 2 qrs. 8 lbs. Potatoes; 2 cwt. Sugar; and 5 ½ lbs. Poultry.

3--Analyses of Water —The Medical Officer of Health submitted his report of analyses of water taken since the last Meeting of the Committee

4--Diphtheria Immunisation—The Medical Officer of Health reported that during the last quarter 218 cases had been treated.

5—Health Department Staff—Temporary Clerk—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the services of the temporary Clerk had been dispensed with and that she was now employed in the Food Control Office.

6—Public Health Services Handbook—Read, letter from Messrs. Ed. J. Burrow & Co. Ltd, offering to publish a new and revised edition of this Handbook free of cost to the Corporation. RESOLVED, That their offer be accepted with thanks.

7—Brooklyn Road Tip—Read, further letters complaining of the plague of flies coming from this tip. The Chairman reported that he had inspected the tip in the company of the Medical Officer of Health and that he was quite satisfied that controlled tipping was being efficiently carried out and that there were no grounds for complaint.

8—Notices Not Complied With—(a) 24 and 28 Duke Street—Read, letter from Mr. A. C. Long, the Owner of No 24 Duke Street that he was obtaining estimates for the work required to be carried out RESOLVED, That the Chief Sanitary Inspector be instructed to interview the Owners of these houses with a view to expediting the carrying out of the work by them and that, if the work is not completed within four weeks, tenders be invited for carrying out the work.

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(b) 4 Gloucester Place—The Committee having considered the representation of the Medical Officer of Health in regard to this house are satisfied that this house is occupied or is of a type suitable for occupation by persons of the working classes and is unfit for human habitation in the respect mentioned in the said official representation and that it is capable at reasonable expense of being rendered fit for human habitation. The Chief Sanitary Inspector read a letter from the Owner of the house requesting the Corporation to carry out the work required to be done and offering to pay in instalments. The estimated cost of the work was £10 16s. 6d. RESOLVED, That in pursuance of Sub-Section 1 of Section 9 of the Housing Act, 1936, Notice be given to the Owner of the house requiring the execution of the works to be specified in the Notice which will, in the opinion of the Committee, render the house fit for human habitation. RESOLVED, also, That, subject to her agreeing to deposit the deeds of the house with the Corporation, the Corporation agree to carry out the work and to her paying off the cost incurred in instalments of 5s per week. 9—Byelaws re Offensive Trades—Read, letter of 20th ult. from the Ministry of Health suggesting that the making of Byelaws should be postponed for the present. RESOLVED, That this be agreed to.

10—Milk (Special Designations) Order, 1936—RESOLVED, That the following applications for licences be granted to the 31st December, 1940, subject to the provisions of the Order : Mr. G. F. Gratton of 249 Swindon Road, Cheltenham, for Licences to use the designation "Pasteurised" in relation to milk treated by him at 249 Swindon Road and in relation to milk retailed by him in the Borough.

11—Public Abattoir--Air Raid Protection—The Borough Surveyor reported that he had inspected these premises and recommended that steps should be taken to protect the glazing above the covered roadway so that there would be no risk of splintered glass falling on the carcases of sheep and cows stored beneath. He recommended that the glazing be removed and stored and replaced by asbestos sheets at an estimated cost of £40. This would also obviate the necessity of painting the glass in winter as a black-out precaution. The Town Clerk reported that he had drawn the attention of the Ministry of Food to this and asked for their instructions but had not yet received a reply. RESOLVED, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to carry out the necessary alterations and that application he made to the Ministry of Food for the cost of the same.

12—Hayden Sewage Works—Filter Media—The Borough Surveyor reported that as instructed at the last Meeting of the Committee, he had requested Messrs. Jees Hartshill Granite & Brick Co. Ltd. to bear half the increased cost of delivering the granite to the sewage works, namely 4s 3d per ton. The Contractors replied that they were not permitted to supply direct transport to the site from their works owing to the shortage of petrol and that they had offered to deliver it by rail at current railway rates. The Town Clerk reported that in the circumstances he had agreed to pay the additional cost of haulage to the sewage works. The Contractors were endeavouring to deliver the 100 tons urgently required at the sewage works, but, as a result of urgent Government demands consuming the whole of their output, they were doubtful whether they would be able to do so. RESOLVED, That the action of the Town Clerk be approved and that in view of the shortage of supply from this source the Borough Surveyor be authorised to obtain suitable filter media from another firm, if the Contractors are unable to deliver the supply required.

13—Slaughterhouse Licences—(a) Grosvenor Terrace—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that the repairs required to be done at this slaughterhouse had been carried out to his satisfaction. RESOLVED, That a licence be granted under Section 57 of the Food and Drugs Act, 1938.

(b) Dunalley Parade—RESOLVED, That a licence be granted under Section 57 of the Food and Drugs Act, 1938, in respect of the slaughterhouse owned by Messrs. Holliday & Page Ltd., subject to the Owners entering into an Undertaking not to use the premises until satisfactory artificial lighting is installed,

14—Convenience Attendants— Wages—The Committee considered the wages of the attendants at Ambrose Street Convenience referred to them by the Labour Sub-Committee. RESOLVED, That the services of these attendants he continued and that the wages of the permanent attendant be increased by 3s per week to 50s, and the wages of the Sunday relief be increased by 1s - a week to 12s, to bring them into line with other attendants

In addition to the above, several hundred tons of metal collected during Salvage Week will be disposed of during July.

(b) Slab-making Plant—RESOLVED, That the offer of A. Pearce & Sons to pay 51s per ton for the old Slab-making Plant material be accepted. RESOLVED, also, That the Borough Surveyor be authorised to advertise for sale the scrap bundling press, intensifier and valves, etc., from the hydraulic press.

(c) Central Midwives Board—Read, circular of 18th ult. from the Central Midwives Board in regard to an amendment of the rules. The Medical Officer of Health reported that he had notified the midwives practising in the Borough of the alterations made.

4—Dentistry—(a) The Medical Officer of Health reported that 33 mothers and 21 infants had attended the School Dentist on Saturday mornings and 67 mothers and 8 infants on Wednesday evenings during the quarter in accordance with the arrangements made with the Education Committee. The number of Wednesday evening sessions held during the quarter was 12.

(b) The Medical Officer of Health reported that five sessions had been held at the Children's Hospital when 22 cases were treated and 73 teeth extracted. The Anaesthetist's fees amounted to £4 19s 0d. and the Hospital fees to £5 5s. 0d. RESOLVED, That these be paid.

(c) The Medical Officer of Health reported that the cost of the Dental Services for the year ended 31st March last was £91 10s. 4d.

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5—Children Act—(a) The Medical Officer of Health submitted names of 3 foster mothers who had sent in notification, and he recommended that the maximum number of children allowed should be fixed as follows:-

6—Gynaecological Clinic—The medical Officer of Health reported that 6 Clinics had been held to date and the total number of attendances was 22, including 16 Borough patients.

7—Orthopaedic Scheme—(a) The Medical Officer of Health submitted report on the work of the Orthopaedic Clinic for the quarter ended 30th ult. The total number of children on the Register was 124, of which 72 were chargeable to the Education Committee, and in respect of which 27 surgeons' consultations had been held ; 32 children were chargeable to this Committee, in respect of which 11 surgeons' consultations had been held.

(b) The Medical Officer of Health submitted application from the Cripples Aid Society for a grant towards the cost amounting to £1 3s. 0d. of instruments, boots and repairs for children under five. RESOLVED, That a grant of 50 per cent, namely 11s 6d. be made.

8—New Milk Scheme—Read, circular No. 2053 of 19th ult. from the Ministry of Health drawing attention to the new Milk Scheme which came into operation on the 1st inst. Under the Scheme one pint of liquid milk (or in special circumstances for children under one year of age an equivalent amount of dried milk) would be supplied daily to all expectant and nursing mothers and children under five years of age at 2d. a pint A free supply would, however, be made if the joint income of the parents falls below £2 a week, together with 6s for each non-earning dependant. The Ministry anticipate that the Council would not think it necessary to continue other arrangements made by them for the supply of milk to mothers and children, but that it was still open for the Council to supplement the provision made under the new Scheme in cases where such a course appeared desirable on medical grounds The Ministry asked that Local Authorities should co-operate with Milk Officers in bringing this Scheme to the notice of the public. The Medical Officer of Health reported that the Application Forms were provided at all the Welfare Centres. RESOLVED, That the sum of £2 12s. 6d. be spent in advertising this Scheme and that the Medical Officer of Health be instructed to take such steps as he is able to bring the Scheme to the notice of the public.

9—Victoria Nursing Home—The Committee considered letter of the 5th April last from the Cheltenham District Nursing Association in regard to the further remuneration of the medical staff, mainly in respect of attention before birth as follows (a) For any ante-natal manipulation or operation where an anaesthetic is required, e.g. external version, £1 1s. 0d., with £1 1s. 0d. anaesthetic fee.

(b) For attendance at ante-natal emergencies, e.g. toxaemia or ante-partum haemorrhage when no operative interference is required, fees should be 5s per visit by day, or 10s by night, with a maximum of £2 2s. 0d.

(c) For attendance at anti-partum haemorrhage when operative interference is required, a fee of  $\pm 2$  2s. 0d., irrespective of whether the doctor is present at birth or not.

(d) A fee of £1 1s. 0d. should be payable to the doctor attending the ante-natal clinic. RESOLVED, That a Sub-Committee consisting of the Chairman, Mrs. Wood and Mrs. Mellersh be appointed to meet the Victoria Home Doctors to discuss the matter and to report thereon to the Committee

10—Health Department—The Medical Officer of Health reported that Miss Ellis, Chief Assistant Clerk in his Department had now reached the maximum of Grade B, and he recommended that she be placed in Grade C as from the 1st April, 1941. RESOLVED, That this be approved.

11--unmarried Mother—The Medical Officer of Health submitted particulars of a case of an unmarried expectant mother for whom St. Catherine's Home were endeavouring to make arrangements to send to a Home for her confinement RESOLVED, That if this can arranged the Council be recommended to agree to contribute a sum not exceeding 10s a week for a period not exceeding six months.

(b) That the offer of Aircraft Components Silver Band to play in the Promenade on one evening in the week in aid of the Red Cross Fund be approved, and that, in the event of wet weather, and the Town Hall being free on the date arranged, they be granted the free use of accommodation at the Town Hall.

(c) That, owing to the cancellation of the Monday Dances, as from the 3rd July Billy Gammon and his Band be paid £8 0s. 0d. for a Dance from 8 p.m. to 12 midnight and £12 10s. 0d. for the Saturday Tea Dance and Evening Dance from 8 p.m. to 12 midnight, being a total increase of £1 3s. 0d.

(d) That the use of the Town Hall be granted to the Y.M.C.A. on one evening, free of charge, for the promotion of a Concert in aid of their War Fund.

(e) That the Drawing Room be let to the Cheltenham Council of Federated Youth Organisations free of charge for their Monthly Meetings on the first Thursday in each month.

(f) That a flat rate of 7s 6d per week be charged for electricity used in connection with the A.R.P. Post in the Town Hall basement.

(g) That the application of Messrs. Orton, Grey and Morris for the free use of Montpellier Pavilion for four weeks commencing on the 8th July (£20 having been paid for the first two weeks' rent) be granted, the Corporation also to pay the electricity charges for these four weeks.

(h) The Sub-Committee reported that the Tennis Exhibition Matches held on the 29th ult. would show a profit of approximately £80 for the Red Cross, 25 per cent of which will be handed to the Ambulance and Hospital Fund of Cheltenham and District Combined Sports Association.

RESOLVED, That the proceedings of the Sub-Committee be approved and adopted.

2---Sandford Park Swimming Pool—(a) RESOLVED, That members of H.M. Forces in uniform be admitted to the Swimming Pool at a reduced charge of 3d. with 1d for towel and 1d. for hire of costume, and that Minute No 2 (d) passed at the Meeting of the Committee held on the 26th April, 1940, be varied accordingly.

(b) Read, letter from Mr. W. H. Brasher suggesting that the loggias on each side of the Cafe should be curtained off and used as open-air dressing rooms until 2 p.m., and that access should be made to the flat roofs of the loggias so that these may be used for sun-bathing. RESOLVED, That the Committee do not consider that there is any need for either of these proposals.

3—Alstone and Montpellier Washing Baths—The Committee considered as to what arrangements could be made for providing further washing-bath accommodation for the troops. RESOLVED, (a) That the Superintendent of the Montpellier Baths be instructed to use these Baths during the time they are open except on two afternoons a week when it is necessary to carry out Vichy Bath Treatment for Medical Bath patients. Also, That the Superintendent be instructed to engage such additional labour as he considers necessary.

(b) That the Education Committee be requested to close forthwith the School bath at Alstone to enable this to be used as a washing bath for troops and that, until the end of term, classes of school children attending these Baths be admitted to Sandford Park Swimming Pool free of charge.

(c) That the Military Authorities be recommended to make application to the Colleges for the use of their washing baths out of term time

4-Medical Baths-(a) The Monthly Report of the Superintendent was submitted.

(b) The Superintendent reported that when the Swimming Bath was open Mrs. Hudson was paid an honorarium of £1, but as the Bath had now been closed to provide accommodation for an A.R.P First Aid Post the Superintendent asked that the honorarium to Mrs. Hudson should continue in view of the work she carried out in supervising the cleaning and laundry work. RESOLVED, That Mrs. Hudson be paid a reduced honorarium of 10s a week as from the date the Swimming Bath was closed up to the 30th September next.

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5—Sunday Concerts—RESOLVED, That members of H.M. Forces be admitted to Sunday Concerts at a reduced charge of 3d. each and that the other arrangements made by the Chairman for catering for the troops in Cheltenham of Sundays be approved.

6—Winter Garden—Read, letter of 25th ult. from the Ministry of Health conveying the Ministry's gratitude to tip Corporation for offering these premises to the Government but that it did not appear that there was any purpose for which the building could advantageously be used.

7—Alstone Baths—RESOLVED, That no charge be made to the Swimming Club for the use of Alstone Baths on the 5th July in connection with the Gala held in aid of the Sportsmen's War Charity Effort.

# ELECTRICITY AND LIGHTING COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, 22nd July, 1940. Present—The Mayor ; Alderman Leigh James; Councillors Addis, Bendall, Lt:-Col. Biggs, Grimwade, Moore and Rogers (Councillor Rogers in the chair).

1—Scrap Lamp Posts—It was reported that the Chairman of the Salvage Committee had suggested that the old cast iron lamp posts in High Street should be scrapped as they will eventually have to be replaced by steel lamp posts when the new scheme of lighting is installed after the war. All these posts are now carrying war time lighting fittings and if they are scrapped, either the war time lighting must be discontinued or new steel posts at present in stock must be erected in their place which would involve an expenditure of £236, while the value of the scrap recovered would only be £63 10s.0d. RESOLVED, That the Committee do not agree to the suggestion.

2—Rating and Valuation Acts, Cheltenham Electricity Undertaking—The Town Clerk reported that a total rateable value of £11,550 had been agreed between the respective Valuers for the County Council and the Corporation for the whole Undertaking, compared with the existing total rateable value of £12,053.

3—Sanctions to Loans—The Town Clerk reported the receipt from the Electricity Commissioners of sanction to the borrowing of £2,614 for Sub-Stations, mains and plant.

4....Agreements for Supply—RESOLVED, That the Common Seal be affixed to Agreements for supply to —The Gas Company, H.M. Office of Works, Aircraft Components, Ltd., V.P. Airscrews, Ltd., and Rotol Airscrews Ltd.

5—Land, Gloucester Road—The Borough Electrical Engineer reported that the Gas Company were anxious to acquire a small portion of the land owned by the Electricity Undertaking at the junction of Gloucester Road and Church Road, St. Mark's for the erection of a Booster Station. RESOLVED, That the District Valuer be asked to value this land and that the Chairman and Borough Electrical Engineer be authorised to accept a suitable offer.

6—Gas Tests—(a) Quarterly Report—Read, Report of the Gas Examiner for the Quarter ended 30th ult. which showed the average calorific value to be 470.6 B.Th.U.

(b) Periodical Reports—Read. Reports of gas tests made on the 26th ult., and the 3rd, 10th, 14th and 18th inst. which showed the Calorific value on these dates to be 462.5, 470.5, 475.4. 467.7 and 458.6 B.Th. 3—Appeals—The cases entered in the Appeals Book were considered, and the rates settled and adjusted.

4—Conservation of Supplies—The Borough Engineer reported a rapid fall in the level of Dowdeswell, the inflow was negligible, the consumption in the town was still high and there was a tendency for waste to continue. The Town Clerk read a circular letter from the Ministry of Health requesting Local Authorities to restrict undue consumption of water before the position becomes acute and stating that there should be no hesitation in putting restrictions on supply into operation somewhat sooner than would be done in normal conditions. RESOLVED, That the Borough Engineer be authorised to issue a further appeal to consumers to reduce consumption and warn them that if a reduction is not effected in the near future, it will be necessary to reduce the pressure during certain hours.

5—Tewkesbury Waterworks—Electric Cables—The Borough Engineer submitted notice from the Shropshire, Worcester-shire and Staffordshire Electric Power Company that they intended to lay a cable under the north west arch of King John's Bridge and also an overhead line over land belonging to the Corporation. RESOLVED, That permission be given to lay the cable over Corporation land subject to the requirements of the Borough Engineer being fulfilled.

6— Dowdeswell Reservoir—Damage to Wall—Read, report of damage to the wall at this Reservoir on the 12th June by a car driven by Sergeant Pilot E. L. Wood. RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to make a claim for the cost of making good the damage estimated at £3 10s. 0d.

7—Lower Hewletts Farm—Read, letter of 5th inst. from Messrs. C. C. 1—Diseases Amongst Animals—(a) Superintendent Hopkins reported that the Borough was free from contagious diseases amongst animals.

(b) Brucellosis Melitensis Order of 1940—The Town Clerk submitted copy of this Order which empowered the Ministry to cause to be slaughtered any cattle, sheep, goats, or swine affected with this disease which in humans was commonly known as Malta Fever.

2—Hackney Carriage Licences—(a) RESOLVED, That the application of Mr. F. Tysac for the transfer of the Licence formerly held by Mr. J Tarling in respect of Car BDF 226, and for a Driver's Licence be granted.

(b) RESOLVED, That the application of Mr. R. Wheatcroft for the transfer of his Licence to Taxi VC 9794 be granted

3—Petroleum Licences—(a) RESOLVED, That the application of Messrs. T. W. Smith & Sons for renewal of Licence (temporarily lapsed) to store 500 gallons of petroleum in an existing underground installation, be granted.

(b) RESOLVED, That the application of Messrs. H. Dare & Sons for a Licence to store 100 gallons of petroleum in a can store on the site of new building works at Gloucester Road be granted.

4—Town Clerk's Department—The Town Clerk reported that Mr. J. Atkinson, Legal Assistant, would shortly be called up and that Miss Trye was resigning to join the W.R.N.S. RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to engage such staff as he considers desirable to enable him to carry on the work of the Department.

5-77 Promenade—(a) The Town Clerk reported that an Agreement had now been entered into with the Office of Works for the payment of a rent of £4 per week as from the 27th November last including rates and cleaning, but excluding heating and lighting, in respect of the occupation of these premises by the Food Office and National Registration Office.

(b) RESOLVED, That Debenham Longman & Co, be allowed to park six bicycles at the rear of the above premises at a charge of 5s per cycle per annum, the arrangement to be terminated at any time by one week's notice.

6—Superannuation—RESOLVED, on the recommendation of the Electricity Committee, That the services of Pates, Mains Foreman, be extended for one year to the 28th June, 1941.

7—Administrative Staff—War Bonus—Read, Circular of 4th inst. from the Ministry of Home Security that the Minister was prepared to recognise for grant under the Civil Defence Acts additions by way of cost of living bonus to the salaries or wages of members of the staffs of Local Authorities who are engaged in work connected with Air Raid Precautions provided that the Local Authority is paying the same cost of living bonus to members of its staff generally, and not merely to the members engaged on A.R.P. work.

Read, also, Circular of 10th inst. from the National Association of Local Government Officers asking if the Council had yet adopted the war bonus recommended by the National Joint Whitley Council of 6 per cent to officers whose salary does not exceed £300 per annum, plus 3 per cent of salary in excess of £300. or 3 per cent of £200, whichever is the less.

It was reported that the Gloucester County Council adopted, as from the 1st April last, a war bonus for their Officers.

RESOLVED, That, as from the 1st April, 1940, the Council do pay a war bonus, similar to that paid by the County Council, namely 6 per cent to all their Officers whose salaries do not exceed £300 a year (including those on war service as defined in the Local Government Staffs (War Service) Act 1939)

except those who are unmarried and have no dependents to whom a bonus of 4 per cent be paid. Also that Officers receiving by virtue of their grade a salary exceeding £300 and not exceeding £312 or £318 as the case may be, be paid such war bonus as will bring their salary with bonus up to £312 and £318 as the case may be.

8—National Service—RESOLVED, That the Committee consent to R. Tortonese, Student Gardener, enlisting in H.M. Forces.

9—Telephones—RESOLVED, That the Committee approve of internal extensions being provided to the private telephones of the Town Clerk, the Borough Electrical Engineer, and the Assistant Town Clerk.

10—Shops Acts—Read, memorial signed by 90 per cent of the Proprietors and Managers of Hairdressers and Barbers Shops requesting the Council to make an Order requiring such shops to be closed at 7 p.m. on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays and 8 p.m. on Fridays and Saturdays, and at 1 p.m. on Wednesdays or Saturdays. RESOLVED, That consideration be adjourned and the Town Clerk be instructed to suggest to the memorialists that in view of the war and the large increase in population of Cheltenham, that it is desirable to postpone the making of an Order for the present.

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11—Air Raid Shelters in Specified Areas—The Sub-Controller, Councillor Grimwade, reported that the Emergency Committee had considered Circular of the Ministry of Home Security No. 163 of 6th inst. in regard to the provision. of domestic shelters in places where there are aggregations of population in unspecified urban areas or in the neighbourhood of factories or other likely objectives of enemy attack.

The Circular pointed out that Local Authorities should do everything possible to assist persons eligible for the provision of free shelters, namely, persons whose occupations are compulsorily insurable under the National Health Insurance Act, and persons not so compulsorily insured who mainly depend on earnings not exceeding £250 which may be increased by £50 for each child not over i school age in excess of two. The cost of materials would be reimbursed by the Exchequer, and other costs involved should be included in claims for grant. The Circular further recommended that Local Authorities should in the case of denser aggregations of population, endeavour 10 provide a certain number of communal shelters. These communal shelters would assist to meet the case of houses where any sort of adaptation presented difficulties The proposals to erect such shelters should be reported to the Regional Technical Adviser, and the cost of the materials used would, subject to certain limits, be reimbursed and the balance of the cost rank for grant.

Councillor Grimwade reported that the County Council had decided that this work should be carried out and the cost met by District Councils. RESOLVED, That the Emergency Committee be authorised to proceed with the erection of communal shelters for 3,000 persons in the congested areas in the Borough, the Emergency Committee to select the sites for these shelters

12—Waste Paper—Read, Circular No. 2073 from the Ministry of Health asking Local Authorities to take urgent steps to release as many papers and books as possible. The Town Clerk reported that he had sent copies to all Heads of Departments who had, previous to the Circular, handed over a large quantity of waste paper and books

13—Holidays--The Committee further considered the question of holidays for the administrative staff and for employees. RESOLVED, That the Committee adhere to the resolution passed at the last meeting that regular holidays be cancelled this year but that all Chief Officers be authorised to arrange where possible for staffs and employees to have short periods of holiday as and when circumstances permit

2-6 St. George's Parade --The Acting Chief Officer reported that Mr. Jones vacated these premises on the 24th June and that he vacated his flat at 14 Royal Crescent and took up residence at 6 St. George's Parade on the 8th July.

3—Professional Firemen—(a) The Acting Chief Officer submitted application from Acting Third Officer Brooking and also application from the five professional firemen on the permanent staff for re-consideration of the applications made in April for increase in their wages. RESOLVED, That their wages be increased by 5s per week as from the 1st inst.

(b) Uniform—The Acting Chief Officer reported that some of die professional Brigade's Uniform would shortly require replacement. (c) Read, letter from the Home Office that instructions have been issued for delivery of 4 Type-B Towing Attachments, 8 Hose Ramps, and one 50 ft. length 2 inch Delivery Hose.

(d) Recreation Room—Read, letter of 27th ult. from the Home Office that they were unable to approve for the purpose of grant the expenditure of £20 subscription made to the Auxiliary Fire Service Club in August last. 1—Winter Garden—The Committee considered the recommendation of the Emergency Committee that it was desirable to take steps to salvage the glass, iron and timber, etc., of the Winter Garden as they were advised that there was likely to be a shortage of glass. RESOLVED, That Mr. T. Overbury be instructed to obtain alternative tenders for (1) Demolition of the whole building, except that a low wall be left round the basement in the northern transept to protect this, the Corporation retaining the timber ; (2) Demolition of the whole building as in No. 1, the Corporation retaining the glass and timber (3) Removal of the roof only, the Corporation retaining the timber and glass, and also for certain work as specified by the Architect to be carried out to protect the walls from deterioration.

RESOLVED, also, At a Special Meeting of the Committee be held on the morning of the 2nd September to consider the tenders received.

2—Montpellier Rotunda—The Town Clerk submitted contract for the purchase of the Rotunda. The seating and electrical fittings and some other furniture was not included in the sale. The Town Clerk reported that these had been inspected by the Borough Electrical Engineer and the Entertainments Manager who recommended that the seating and other furniture, old grand piano, and electrical fittings (excluding the large central electrolier and bracket lamps of similar design) be purchased for the sum of £10. RESOLVED, That this recommendation be approved and adopted.

3—Water Supply—The Borough Engineer reported as to the water supply and of the steps taken to conserve supplies. He also reported as to the supply being afforded to Gloucester. The pumping from Tewkesbury was now done via Churchdown and since this commenced an average of two million gallons a day had been delivered and to amplify the supply to Gloucester a temporary pumping unit had been installed at the expense of the Gloucester Corporation. This greater demand had exceeded the capacity of the filters in their present condition, and he had therefore arranged for the filtering media to be dug out and replaced by new material at the cost of the Gloucester Corporation by which means it was anticipated that it would be possible to deal with an increased quantity through the filters. RESOLVED, That the steps taken by the Borough Engineer he approved. Also, that he be instructed to circularise the Garages that car washing must be discontinued. RESOLVED, also, That a statement be inserted in the press giving suggestions to householders as to how water can he saved, and that the Town Clerk be instructed to prosecute all persons found misusing or wasting water.

7—Housing Revenue Account—The Borough Treasurer reported that the balance at credit of the Revenue Account on the 1st April, 1939, was £1,619 8s. 2d., which was carried forward. During the year ended 31st March last a further surplus of £1,541 12s. 10d. was made, bringing the total credit to £3,161 1s. 0d. This was the first quinquennium under the Housing Act, 1936. 1—Sunday Entertainments Act, 1932—The Town Clerk reported that the notices required to be given of the decision of the Council to submit to the Secretary of State for approval of both Houses of Parliament, the draft Order extending Section 1 of the Sunday Entertainments Act, 1932, to the Borough of Cheltenham had been given and he submitted the representations received in respect of this. He had received the following Resolution passed by the Free Church Council :— " That the Free Church Council are not opposed to any step for the welfare of the soldiers and for that reason do not raise objection at this stage to the desire of the Military Authorities and the Town Council to open some of the Cinemas on Sundays. At the same time they suggest that such conditions be attached to the Licences as to make it quite clear that this step is in the interests of the soldiers and not merely for the financial gain of the Cinema proprietors, and that the position to be reviewed six months hence in the light of experience gained during the winter months." He had also received a Memorial from the Church Association signed by 124 persons ; a Memorial from the Cambray Baptist Church signed by 125 persons and Memorials from other residents and religious bodies signed by 569 persons against the opening of the Picture Houses on Sundays and Memorials signed by 707 persons in favour of the proposal.

After consideration of these representations it was RESOLVED, That the Council confirm the decision to submit the said draft Order to the Secretary of State for approval of both Houses of Parliament. It was also RESOLVED, That this Council declares that approval of the draft Order shall not be taken as in any way approving of Cinemas being opened on Sundays after the War. (An Amendment moved by Councillor Garland that the permitted hours of opening Cinemas be fixed at 3.30 p.m.-8.30 p.m. was ruled out of Order).

2—Storage of Hides and Skins—Application was made by Messrs. A. H. Taylors Butchers' Hide, Skin, Fat and Wool Co. Ltd. who were acting as Agents for the Government for consent to the Registered Slaughterhouse of Messrs. Williams Co., situate in Albion Street, being used as temporary accommodation for the storage of hides and skins. Messrs. Taylor's representative explained that this was only required for storage of hides and skins which had been cleaned and conditioned. 1—Surrender of Diseased Meat, etc.—The Medical Officer of Health reported the surrender of 6 cwt, 2 lbs Beef ; 1 qr. 26 lbs. Mutton ; 14 lbs. Veal ; 2 qrs. 14 lbs. Tinned Ham ; 4 cwt. Pig Livers ; 2 qrs. 24 lbs. Sausages ; 3 cwt. 1 qr. 14 lbs. Fish 23 Fowls 4 Ducks 2 Rabbits ; 84 Tins Fruit, Fish, etc. ; 106 Cakes, etc. ; 4 ¼ lbs. Biscuits ; 14 lbs. Vegetables ; 2 cwt. Sugar.

2--Analyses of Water—The Medical Officer of Health submitted his report of analyses of water taken since the last Meeting of the Committee

3—Water Course, Knightsbridge to Deans Ford—The Borough Surveyor reported that the County Land Drainage Officer had asked the Corporation to co-operate in a scheme for cleaning out this length of water course ; the amount payable by the Corporation would not exceed £4 and as the County Council desired to do the work at once, he had agreed to this being done RESOLVED, That this be approved.

4—Arle Outfall Sewer—The Borough Surveyor recommended that a new cast iron pen stock with step irons should be provided at this outfall at an estimated cost of £7 5s. 0d. RESOLVED, That this be approved.

5—Barn Farm—Supply of Sewage—The Borough Surveyor submitted application from Mr. Merrett who had recently purchased land adjoining the farm for sewage to be discharged on two of his fields- Mr. Merrett was prepared to open up an old carrier for this purpose. be served under Section 93 of the Public Health Act, 1936, to the owner and occupier of the said premises requiring them to abate the nuisance and to execute such works and take such steps as may be necessary for that purpose.

## HOUSING COMMITTEE.

**At a Meeting of this Committee held on Friday, 20th September, 1940**. Present—Alderman Pates: Councillors Addis, Bush, Fisher, Grimwade, Hayward, Morris and Lipson (Alderman Pates in the chair)

1—Selection of Tenants Sub-Committee—Read, reports of the Selection of Tenants Sub-Committee at their Meetings held on the 2nd August, the 6th and 19th September.

They recommended (inter alia) as follows:-

(a) That the rents fixed and the rebates granted, as set out in the Rents Rebate book, signed by the Chairman, be approved.

(b) Old Age Pensioners—That the rents of flats occupied by single old age pensioners be reduced to 4s 1d as from the date these were increased to 5s and that, with regard to the nine cases where two persons are living together, the rent be left at 5s and that the tenants be advised to apply to the Assistance Board for the additional ltd., also that the rents of individual tenants receiving supplementary pensions he fixed according to the scale of income.

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(c) That with a view to fixing a maximum rent for each type of house, the Borough Surveyor be instructed to prepare statements showing what economic rent for each type of house should be.

RESOLVED, That the proceedings of the Sub-Committee be approved and adopted, also that the old age pensioners living together be informed that the Committee will be prepared to re-consider reducing their rents if their applications for additional allowances are not granted. RESOLVED, also, That having regard to the increase in the cost of living, the Sub-Committee be asked to review the rents of all tenants having four or more dependent children.

2—Arrears—The Housing Manager submitted her monthly statement on the collection of rents.

3—Housing Manager's Department—Trainee—RESOLVED, That the Committee approve of Miss Joan Lloyd, age 24, being employed as Pupil Trainee in the Department at a salary of 10s a week plus cycle allowance.

4 —Land , rear of Spencer Road—RESOLVED, That this Committee approve of the small triangular piece of land lying at the rear of houses in Spencer Road being let for allotments, and it be left to the Allotments Committee to fix the rent and let the land.

5—Land, rear of Orchard Terrace—The Town Clerk reported that the tenant of this Orchard land was willing to give it up at Christmas. RESOLVED, That the Committee approve of the land being let as

allotments subject to preference being given to the tenants of houses backing on to the land, and it be left to the Allotments Committee to fix the rents.

6—Shop Site, Whaddon Road—RESOLVED, That this vacant shop site in Whaddon Road be offered to the Allotments Committee to let as an allotment.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, 30th September, 1940. Present—The Mayor : Councillors Addis, Bendall, Grimwade, Moore, Rogers and Waite (Councillor Rogers in the chair).

1—War Supplies—The Borough Electrical Engineer reported that since the last Meeting he had had to deal with a number of applications for special supplies for purposes connected with the war, upon which immediate action was necessary. RESOLVED, That the terms he had arranged be approved.

2—Direction Signs—RESOLVED, That the application of the Y.M.C.A. for permission to erect 12 Direction Signs in various parts of the town indicating the route to the Y.M.C.A, in the Promenade, Baker Street Institute and the Canteen at St. Andrew's Church, be not granted.

3—Cooker Wiring—The Borough Electrical Engineer reported that the Contractors had asked for a revision in the allowance-of wiring which was at present 10s plus 6d. per foot for a maximum of 30 feet. After considerable discussion the-Contractors had agreed to a revised charge of 8s plus 9d. per foot with a maximum allowance of 24 feet free. RESOLVED, That these revised terms be approved.

4—Land, Gloucester Road—The Town Clerk reported that terms had now been arranged with the Gas Company for the-purchase by them of a small portion of the land at the junction of Gloucester Road and Church Road for the erection of a gas Booster Station, at the price of £30. RESOLVED, That this be approved, and that the Common Seal be-affixed to the Conveyance.

5--Public Lighting Assistant—RESOLVED, That Mr. Ball, the Public Lighting Assistant, be allowed a car allowance of £30 per annum.

6—Public Lighting—The Borough Electrical Engineer reported that he was still awaiting delivery of the remaining 112 war-time lighting fittings which were ordered in May last. These were required for important positions and he-recommended that an order should be placed with another firm who would be able to deliver in a few days. RESOLVED, That the Borough Electrical Engineer be instructed to order 112 fittings from another firm but not to cancel the other order.

7—Damage to Lamp Standards—Read, reports of damage to lamp standards, on the 15th August to a lamp post at the junction of Park Place and Andover Road ; on the 4th September to a lamp post at the junction of Andover Road and Casino Place, and on the same date to a lamp standard in High Street, opposite Pittville Street, and on the 18th inst. to a switch pillar at the junction of St. Stephen's Road and Andover Road. RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to make claims for the cost of making good the damage.

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8—Alstone Lane Sub-Station—Read, letter of 10th ult. from the Electricity Commission that the Commissioners had further considered the application of the Corporation for the cost of providing an alternative electric sub-station at Alstone Lane to rank for A.R.P. grant, but they regretted they

were unable to agree to the cost being regarded as an approved expense under the Civil Defence Act.

He recommended that, in view of the continuance of the drought, the Committee should consider whether it is possible to provide additional sources of supply. He thought that it might be possible to sink a well in the River Chelt gravels. RESOLVED, That the Borough Engineer be authorised to instruct a firm specialising in well sinking to investigate the possibilities of sinking such a well and to submit an estimate of the cost. RESOLVED, also, That the Borough Engineer be authorised in his discretion to reduce the pressures and turn off the water supply if and when he considers this is necessary

5—Maintenance of Pipes--(a) RESOLVED, That the Borough Engineer be authorised to purchase from Messrs. Bugbird & Sons a Kut-out machine for use on steel pipes at a cost of £36 10s. 0d.

(b) The Borough Engineer recommended that he be authorised to purchase a small pump for pumping out chamber: and excavations when repairing burst mains at an estimated cost of £63 19s.Od. RESOLVED, That this be approved

6—Tewkesbury Water Works—The Borough Engineer submitted report on the steps taken for the protection of these Works. He had arranged to erect an additional building for the Home Guard and to provide sleeping bunks. RESOLVED, That this be approved. RESOLVED, also, That the Town Clerk be instructed to obtain the approval of the C.R.E. before carrying out the recommendations of the Commander of the Municipal Section of the Home Guard in regard to further protective measures.

7—Extension to Main, Leckhampton Lane—Read, letters of 23rd and 30th ult. and 2nd inst. from the Cheltenham Rural District Council asking the Corporation to extend the mains to supply 10 houses at the Western end of Church Road, including Leckhampton Farm and the Red Bungalow as the present water supply to these houses had been condemned as unfit for consumption. RESOLVED, That these proposals be agreed to subject to the District Council agreeing to re-pay the estimated cost of laying a 4 inch main along Church Road as far as the Red Bungalow and then as to the District Council as and when the water charges on the extension show a return of 10 per cent.

8—Woodlands Farm—Read, letter of 13th ult. from Mr. S. J. Hobbs complaining of the damage caused to his crops by rabbits in the Dowdeswell Wood. RESOLVED, That he be allowed the sum of £5.

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# GENERAL PURPOSES AND WATCH COMMITTEE.

At a Special Meeting of this Committee held at the Winter Garden on Monday, 2nd September, 1940. Present—Aldermen Clara F. Winterbotham, Margrett Pates and Ward ; Councillors Green, Grimwade, Rev. de Courcy Ireland and Rogers (Alderman Margrett in the chair).

1—Montpellier Walk Parking Place—The Town Clerk reported that the police had received complaints of the nuisance caused by the parking of cars belonging to the Picket of the L. D. V. at the Montpellier Rotunda, in the road of Montpellier Walk after 11 p.m., contrary to the Parking Byelaws, and he submitted letter from Major Stanley Clarke suggesting that the Pickets should be allowed to park their cars just inside the gates of Montpellier Gardens. RESOLVED, That, for the time being, the L.D.V., be allowed a key of the gates of Montpellier Gardens and that they be given permission to park their cars there after 11 p.m., subject to the condition that they see that the gates are kept locked.

2—Sunday Entertainments Act, 1932—The Town Clerk submitted Certificate dated the 21st August, 1940, from Brigadier C. G. Woolner, Commander of the 8th Infantry Brigade, being a competent military authority authorised in that behalf by the Army Council, that he was of the opinion that having regard to the large numbers of His Majesty's Forces quartered in, or in the neighbourhood of Cheltenham it is expedient that places licensed under the Cinematograph Act, 1909, should be opened on Sundays for the purpose of cinematograph entertainments in the said area

RESOLVED, (a) That the following Draft Order be submitted to the Secretary of State :—

" In accordance with the provisions of the Sunday Entertainments Act, 1932, I, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State hereby order that as from the date on which this Order has been approved by resolutions passed by both Houses of Parliament, Section One of the said Act shall extend to the Borough of Cheltenham."

(b) That the Town Clerk be instructed to give the required Public Notices of the draft Order and of the intention of the Council to submit the same to the Secretary of State.

(c) That on receipt of approval of the Order the Cinemas be allowed to open on Sundays between the hours of 2 p.m. and 10 p.m., subject to the following conditions :—

(1) To compliance with the Conditions of the Cinematograph Licence granted by the Council.

(2) That no person shall be employed by any employer on any Sunday in connection with a cinematograph entertainment or any other entertainment or exhibition given therewith who has been employed on each of the six previous days either by that employer in any occupation or by any other employer in connection with similar entertainments or exhibitions, provided that it shall not be deemed to have been a contravention of this condition if any person is employed on any Sunday contrary to the condition if either—

(a) it is proved—

(i) that the employment was solely due to an emergency caused by a mechanical breakdown, or to the unavoidable absence of a skilled worker due to attend on that Sunday for whom no substitute could readily have been obtained and

(ii) that the emergency was notified, within twenty-four hours after it occurred, to the Council ; and

(iii) that the person employed on that Sunday contrary to the said conditions received a day's rest in lieu of that Sunday ; or

(b) it is proved—

(i) that the person was employed contrary to the said conditions only by reason of his having been employed on each of the six days previous to that Sunday in connection with similar entertainments or exhibitions by an employer other than the employer who employed him on that Sunday ; and

(ii) that the last-mentioned employer had, after making due enquiry, reasonable ground for believing that he had not been so employed as aforesaid.

(3) That for each Sunday on which the Cinema is opened, the Licensee shall contribute to the undermentioned charities a sum calculated at the rate of one halfpenny per seat on the total seating capacity of the Cinema, up to a maximum of £2 10s, 0d. per Sunday, subject to a deduction of 5 per cent of that sum for transmission to the Cinematograph Fund as referred to in the next condition :—

First Sunday	The Cheltenham General Hospital.
Second Sunday	The Cheltenham Children's Hospital.
Third Sunday	The Local Branch of the British Red Cross Society.
Fourth Sunday	The St. John's Ambulance Brigade, Cheltenham.
Fifth Sunday	The Local Y.M.C.A. Canteen Fund.
Sixth Sunday	The Cheltenham Soldiers', Sailors' and Airmen's Families' Association.

The said contribution for subsequent Sundays to be paid to the above charities in the abovementioned order ; Also That, the Licensee shall send or deliver to the Town Clerk, Municipal Offices, Cheltenham, a statement at the end of each month showing the amount paid to each charity during the month, together with the respective charities' official receipts therefor. (4) That a percentage of 5 per cent of the above-mentioned sum as prescribed by the Cinematograph Fund Regulations, 1933, shall be paid to the Corporation for transmission by them to the Cinematograph Fund Privy Council Office such sum to be paid to the Borough Treasurer at the end of each month.

(5) That audited accounts relating to the Sunday opening shall be furnished to the Corporation at the end of each quarter.

(6) The right of the Corporation to cancel or vary these conditions from time to time as they think fit upon giving reasonable notice to the Licensees, but in any case the conditions shall be reviewed when the annual application for renewal of Cinematograph Licences are considered in January of each year.

(7) The grant of permission to open on Sundays is liable to be withdrawn in the event of any contravention of the above conditions, RESOLVED, also, At a Special Meeting of the Council be held on Thursday, the 19th September, at 3 p.m. to consider representations that may be made in respect of the Order and to consider confirming the Order.

3—Winter Garden—Mr. T. Overbury attend and reported that, as instructed, he had invited alternative tenders for the demolition of the Winter Garden as follows:—

ESTIMATE No. 1—To demolish whole building including towers except :—

(a) The north-eastern wall adjoining Town Hall.

(b) The lower storey of the northern tower about 26 feet high to the top of the coping.

(c) The north-western and south-eastern walls.

(d) The front and back walls of the north transept which are to remain standing to a height of 6 feet to form protection to basement.

All timber and joinery to be removed and stacked on site and to remain the property of the Corporation.

The windows to become property of demolisher.

All whole bricks to be neatly stacked on site, and broken bricks to be left in heaps and to remain the property of Corporation.

All other materials to be the property of the Contractor who must clear the same off the site, and the whole of the site to be left in a clean and tidy state.

Fill in 4 windows in front wall and 4 windows in back with 9 inch brickwork about 6 feet high from the ground with some of the existing bricks.

Build across southern end of north transept a 9 inch wall on existing basement wall with 4 piers to a height of 6 feet.

Block up one opening in the basement at the southern end and 7 openings in the basement at the northern end with 18 inch brickwork.

Provide 9 inch circular gulley with 4 inch outlet and iron grating, and insert new junction in existing drain, and lay about 15 feet of 4 inch stone ware drain pipes to new gulley and provide new drain to drain off surface water to prevent this accumulating in the basement.

The Contractor to include the sum of £20 as provisional sum for re-roofing the room at the northeast corner of the basement.

Cut off and seal up water, gas and electric services to the satisfaction of the Corporation.

ESTIMATE No. 2—All the above work with the exception that the Corporation would retain the glass in the roof in addition to the timber and joinery. At the commencement of the work, whole sheets to be counted and the Contractors to hand over at least 75 per cent of such whole sheets in good condition. All glass to be stacked on site and taken over by the Corporation in instalments.

ESTIMATE No 3—All the work set out in Estimate No. I with the exception that all the walls to be left standing.

New wall across the southern end of north transept not to be built, nor windows bricked in.

The buttresses to remain to support the walls.

The Corporation to retain timber and glass as in Estimates Nos. 1 and 2.

Seven tenders were received and opened. RESOLVED, That the tender of The Reading Demolition Company, Victoria Works, Orts Road, Reading, for estimate No, 2 amounting to the sum of £397 be accepted, subject to Contract and Bond prepared by the Town Clerk being entered into. RESOLVED, also, That the question of treating the wall of the Town Hall which will be exposed when the demolition is completed, be deferred until the contract is complete.

5—Shops Acts--Read, letter of 20th inst. from the President of the Cheltenham District Hairdressers Association asking the Committee to re-consider complying with the memorial sent in by proprietors and managers of Hairdressers and Barbers' Shops in Cheltenham requesting the Council to make an Order requiring such shops to be closed at 7 p.m. on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays and at 8 p.m. on Fridays and Saturdays, and 1 p.m. on Wednesdays or Saturdays RESOLVED, That the Association be informed that the Committee while being in sympathy with this application, do not consider it is expedient to make the Order at the present time especially in view of the fact of the large influx of population into Cheltenham, and the fact that many men engaged on war industries are unable to get their hair cut until the evenings. 2—Fire Tender—The Acting Chief Officer reported that the box body on the old Chevrolet Tender purchased in 1931 had proved to be unsuitable for Fire Brigade work and that a second-hand van body had been given to the Brigade by Messrs. Challis and Shepherd of Arle, which the members of the Brigade were now fitting to the tender and painting. He proposed to equip the vehicle with foam producing apparatus and use the same as an emergency and crash tender. RESOLVED, That this be approved.

4—Mobile Water Supplies—Read, circular of 4th inst. from the Home Office asking the Council to give serious consideration to the question whether the transport arrangements for carrying the canvas dams are adequate. The Acting-Chief Officer reported that he had made enquiries as to the purchase price of second-hand lorries for transporting the dams, but had been informed that it was impossible to purchase these at a price which the Home Office would allow to rank for grant. He had accordingly made arrangements with Messrs. Bendall & Sons, Elliott Bros., and W. D. Farrar Ltd., to place certain of their lorries at his disposal should the emergency arise, and to pay for the hire of the lorries when used in accordance with Circular 116. He had obtained the approval of the Ministry of Transport to the use of these vehicles and for them to be earmarked for this purpose. RESOLVED, That these arrangements be approved and that the Borough Treasurer be instructed to effect the necessary insurance of the vehicles under Circular 276.

5—Auxiliary Fire Service—The Town Clerk submitted the following circulars from the Home Office :—

RESOLVED, That these be referred to the Acting-Chief Officer for attention.

6—Cheltenham Rural District Council—Read, letters of 6th and 12th inst. from the Clerk of the Cheltenham Rural District Council asking the Committee to instruct the Chief Officer not to attend fires in the Council's district on receiving a call from the police or any other person unless the Chief Officer is satisfied that there is a risk of damage to life or property, and that in any case where it is found upon arrival at a fire that there is no risk of damage to life or property, that the Brigade should return to the Fire Station and not spend time in extinguishing such fires at the expense of the Rural District ratepayers. Outbreaks of fire on open land such as Cleeve Hill had occurred during the summer and were attended by the Brigade at considerable cost to the ratepayers of the District concerned. RESOLVED, That the Committee are unable to give the Chief Officer the instructions suggested by the Rural District Council and that they be informed that while the Council must leave this matter to the discretion of the Chief Officer, they are of the opinion that all calls to fires should he responded to at once by the Brigade, especially having regard to the necessity of extinguishing any fires during blackout hours.

7—Mutual Assistance Scheme—Read, letter of 6th inst. from the Cheltenham Rural District Council approving the draft Agreement for the Mutual Assistance Scheme. RESOLVED, That the Common Seal be affixed to the Agreement between the two Councils.

8—Stirrup Pumps—Read, letter of 4th inst. from the Home Office that the Office of Works had been requested to dispatch as soon as possible the remaining 38 pumps allocated to the Council for supplementary fire parties under Circular No. 62. The Town Clerk reported that no advice had yet been received from the Home Office as to the proposed issue of stirrup pumps for sale by the Corporation.

9—Chief Officer—The Town Clerk submitted letters from the Home Office in regard to the Chief Officer, Mr. J. R. Jones. Mr. Jones had asked leave to resign his appointment as Fire Brigade Inspector, and his resignation had been accepted and took effect on the 30th inst. Mr. Jones would therefore resume his duties as Chief Officer of the Corporation Fire Brigade on the 1st October. The Committee considered the question of living accommodation for the Chief Officer in view of the fact that his former residence was now occupied by the Acting-Chief Officer. RESOLVED, That the Chief Officer he instructed to endeavour to find suitable accommodation and to report thereon to the Committee.

10—Fire Watchers Order, 1940--The Town Clerk submitted copy of this Order which required all occupiers of premises in which more than 30 persons worked and also any building which was used as a warehouse of a greater capacity than 50,000 cubic feet and any saw mill or timber yard containing more than 50,000 cubic feet of timber, to provide a fire watcher to be present on the premises at all times and during the period a hostile attack was in progress or an air-raid warning in operation to be in readiness to check outbreaks of fire and to summon assistance and to use such firefighting appliances as may be available.

Under Article 4 of the Order its enforcement devolved on the Council who were empowered to authorise any of their Officers or Servants to enter and inspect any of the premises to which the Order applies for the purpose of seeing whether the Order is being complied with. The Town Clerk reported that he had advertised the Order and sent copies to all premises in the Borough to which it was thought that the Order might apply RESOLVED, That the Chief Officer, Officers and members of the personnel of the regular and Auxiliary Fire Service be empowered to enter and inspect any premises to which the Order applies, and that the Chief Officer be instructed to report any case where the Order is not being complied with.

11—Fire Extinguishers—Read. circular from the South Western Regional Commissioner's Office that the Council should refuse to comply with any request to participate in demonstrations of the application of special extinguishers for incendiary bombs or allow official premises to be used for such demonstrations as it was most undesirable for any official encouragement to be given to the sale of special extinguishers for use on incendiary bombs. The proper course for any firm which considers that it has an extinguisher of special value for this purpose, is to communicate with the Research and Experiment Department of the Ministry of Home Security. The official view was that no liquid extinguisher so far examined was more effective than water and that powder extinguishers were no better than sand, and further that some chemical extinguishers are actually dangerous since they are liable to give off poisonous gases.

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#### ALLOTMENTS COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, 9th September, 1940. Present—Councillors Bendall, Fisher, Green, Grimwade and Smith: and Mr. Ball (Councillor Smith in the chair).

1—Allotments Inspection—The Gardens Superintendent reported that Nos. 12 Hatherley Road, 12 Marle Hill and 48 Asquith Road were still in a bad state of cultivation; Nos. 68, 70 and 155 North Ward, 63 and 78 Marle Hill and 23 Creamery Piece were overgrown with weeds and Nos. 8 and 147 Marle Hill were overgrown with small weeds all of which would require cutting. The hedge at No. 18 North Ward had not been cut back and the gate post at Baglin's Piece had not yet been replaced, The Town Clerk reported that No. 12 Hatherley Road was vacant and that he had written to all the other tenants with regard to the bad state of cultivation of their allotments. RESOLVED, That in view of the fact that no reply had been received from the Secretary of the Unemployed Allotments Association with regard to Nos. 8, 63 and 147 Marle Hill, the Town Clerk be instructed to write to Mr. Paterson, the Chairman of the Association, informing him that the Committee cannot allow the allotments to remain in this condition and suggesting that the Association should give up the tenancy of these allotments.

2—Additional Land for Allotments—The Gardens Superintendent recommended that the following additional land should be taken for allotments:-

Strip of St. Mark's temporary Playing Field, about 11 acres. Approximately 20 allotments of 10 perches each.

Land rear of Shelley Road adjoining Benhall Gardens. 2 Plots of 10 perches each.

Two uncultivated strips of frontage to Old Bath Road. 5 Plots of 10 perches each.

Three Plots of land in Prior's Road, one owned by Cheltenham Shopfitting Co. Ltd., and two by Prior's Estate (Cheltenham) Ltd. Approximately 20 allotments of 10 perches each.

RESOLVED, That this be approved and that the Town Clerk be instructed to communicate with the Owners of the land and to take the necessary steps for obtaining possession of the same.

3—Land, Prior's Road—The Town Clerk reported offer received from Mr. G. T. Cluer for the tenancy of a small piece of land for grazing adjoining Palace Builders site. RESOLVED, That the Housing Committee be recommended to let the land to him for £3 per annum subject to his entering into an Agreement to be prepared by the Town Clerk.

4—Injurious Weeds—Read, letter of 3rd ult. from the Clerk of the County Council drawing attention to the great importance attached by the Minister of .Agriculture and Fisheries to the destruction of injurious weeds which are likely to be prejudicial to the vital task of food production and asking the Corporation to inform him of owners of land with injurious weeds growing thereon. RESOLVED, That

the Town Clerk be instructed to draw the attention of the County Council to complaints which had been received in respect of the garden at Blenheim Villa, land rear of Orchard Terrace, St Mark's, and to the allotments reported by the Gardens Superintendent.

5—Land at Leckhampton—The Gardens Superintendent reported that the County Council had asked if he could arrange to clean the piece of land purchased for the proposed By-pass Road and also stating that they were quite willing that the portion of the land suitable for allotments should be let by the Corporation rent free for the first year if the Corporation thought this desirable. RESOLVED, That the offer of the County Council be accepted and that the Borough Surveyor be instructed to mark out the portion of the land suitable for allotments, and that these be let rent free for 12 months and then at the rate of 7s 6d per chain.

6—Allotments Nos. 128 and 129 Marle Hill—The Town Clerk reported that he had had difficulty in letting these allotments owing to the trees overhanging the same but that he had now let the two allotments to a tenant at half rent, namely 10s 9d. per annum for the two. RESOLVED, That this be approved

7—Reservation of Gardeners in Private Employment—Read, letter of 12th ult. from the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries asking the Council to co-operate, through their Horticultural Committee, or Allotments Committee, in connection with the reservation of Gardeners in private employment which was being entrusted to the County War Agriculture Executive Committee. The Town Clerk reported that he had written to the County War Agricultural Executive Committee stating that the Corporation would be pleased to assist in investigating individual cases arising within their area. RESOLVED, That this be approved.

8—Allotment No. 19 Gappers Field—RESOLVED, That Mr. F. Pinchin who had cultivated this allotment in error, be allowed to rent the same to the 25th December next, subject to payment of rent forthwith.

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9-Allotment No. 70 North Ward-The Town Clerk reported that the tenant of this allotment, which was badly cultivated, - had now given notice to terminate his tenancy on the 29th inst., but he had asked £6 for the pig sties thereon. The Gardens Superintendent had inspected the same and reported that they were in bad condition. RESOLVED, That the tenant be asked to remove the pig sties and to make good the proem] before the end of the tenancy and that the allotment be divided into two and re-let.

10—Allotment No. 41 Creamery Piece—Rebate Rent—RESOLVED, That the tenant of this allotment be granted the use of the same rent free to the 25th December next in view of its bad condition.

11—Orchard, Marsh Lane—The Gardens Superintendent reported that he had viewed the trees in this Orchard and agrees with the tenant that a number should he removed as many of them were cankered and others affected with Silver Leaf.

12—Elmfield Park Estate—Read, letter of 1st inst. from the Cheltenham Allotment and Gardens Association stating that this land was uncultivated. The Town Clerk reported that he had written to the Agents but they informed him that the land on the Estate not built on had been let for the duration of the War for fruit and garden purposes.

13—Horticulture Committee—The Chairman intimated that owing to pressure of work he would like to be relieved of his Chairmanship of the Horticulture Committee. RESOLVED, That he be asked to continue in office and that the Horticulture Committee be recommended to appoint a Vice-Chairman to act in the absence of the Chairman.

14—War Time Food Production in Allotments and Private Gardens—Read, letter of 8th July from the Clerk of the County Council stating that the Agricultural Education Sub-Committee had agreed to the payment of a grant of £40 for the period April, 1940 to March, 1941, in respect of the work of the Horticulture Committee.

15—Arrears of Rent—RESOLVED, That the arrears of rent of F. H. Jones for 19 North Ward and J Brushneen for 150 North Ward be written off.

16—Mr. E. M. Yeend—RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to convey the sympathy of this Committee with Mr. E. M. Yeend in his serious illness and their best wishes for his speedy recovery.

3—Accounts Rota Committee—Reported Meeting on the 1st inst. Present—Alderman Taylor (in the chair), and Councillor Garland.

The Accounts were examined and recommended for payment. RESOLVED, That this recommendation be approved and adopted.

4—Electricity Charges—The Borough Treasurer reported on the collection of Electricity charges since the last Meeting.

5—Housing Bonds--RESOLVED, That the terms proposed for the renewal of Housing- Bonds, etc., amounting to £10,090 be approved.

6—Loans—RESOLVED, That the terms proposed for the renewal of the Debenture with the Independent Order of Oddfellows amounting to £70,000 for 10 years be approved, and that the Debenture be endorsed accordingly.

7—Superannuation—(a) The Borough Treasurer reported that G. T. Fletcher (Sweeper) retired on the 14th ult. RESOLVED, That he be paid a pension of £1 6s 11d. per week in respect of 41 years' service.

(b) Child Guidance Clinic—The Borough Treasurer reported that the Cheltenham & County Child Guidance Clinic in making a new appointment of Psychiatrist had met with a difficulty in that the person proposed to be appointed was an officer from another Local Authority and would not accept

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the post without the continuance of her superannuation rights. The Committee therefore asked that the Corporation should enter into an Agreement with the Clinic for the admission of the following employees to the Superannuation Scheme of the Corporation :—

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It would be necessary to obtain an actuarial valuation but the fee for this would be quite small. The Borough Treasurer estimated that the annual deficiency cost would be about £65 per annum for 40 years, plus the contribution of 5 per cent of the salaries paid.

RESOLVED, That the Committee are prepared to recommend the Council (subject to the approval of the Ministry of Health) to enter into an Agreement and to pay their proportion of the cost subject to the County Council and the Gloucester City Council also agreeing to pay their respective proportion of the cost.

(c) The Town Clerk reported that as instructed he had communicated with the Ministry of Health asking for their approval to the Corporation increasing the pensions of the 14 old employees who had asked for their superannuation allowance to be re-considered, by calculating these on the basis of 80ths for each year of non-contributory service instead of 120ths. He now submitted letter of 7th ult. from the Ministry of Health that the Minister was advised that the Council's discretion under the Act is exercisable only in relation to a particular case and only at the time when the person becomes entitled to a superannuation allowance. ## PUBLIC HEALTH COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Monday, 14th October, 1940. Present—Aldermen Leigh James, Pruen and Clara F. Winterbotham ; Councillors Barnett, Rev. de Courcy Ireland, Garland. Dr Hayward, Moore, Morris and Rogers (Alderman Pruen in the chair).

1—Analyses of Water—The Medical Officer of Health submitted his report of analyses of water taken since the last Meeting of the Committee.

2—Surrender of Diseased Meat, etc.—The Medical Officer of Health reported the surrender of 1 cwt. 1 qr. 2 lbs. Beef ; 1 cwt. 21 lbs. Fish ; 1 qr. 2 lbs. Ham ; 5 Fowls (21 lbs) ; 1 qr. 2 lbs. Ducks ; 1 qr. 12 lbs. Cheese ; 1 ¼ lbs. Tea ; 10 lbs. Biscuits and Cake ; 120 Fish Cakes ; 17 tins, jars, etc. of Pickles, Vegetables, Cheese, Brawn, Fish, etc.

3—Milk and Dairies Order—Abbotts Stores, Norwood Road—The Medical Officer of Health reported that Mr. Willis of these premises was registered as a retail purveyor of milk provided this was sold in bottles. He now submitted application from Mr. Willis to sell milk out of cans as he had difficulty in obtaining bottles. RESOLVED, That the application be not granted as the premises are not suitable for registration as a Dairy.

4—Houses Unfit for Human Habitation-75 Prestbury Road—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that the owner of this house, in respect of which a Demolition Order had been made, had asked for permission to allow the premises to remain occupied for the present in view of the shortage of housing accommodation RESOLVED, That no steps be taken at present to enforce the vacation of the premises in compliance with the Demolition Order subject to the owner agreeing to demolish a chimney stack and to keep the roof in repair ; and that the matter be reviewed in six months.

5—Housing Act, 1936—Certificate as to Fitness-35 Queen Street—The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported that the Owner of this house had carried out to his satisfaction works which, in his opinion, would with reasonable care and maintenance render it fit for human habitation for a period of at least 10 years. RESOLVED, That a certificate be issued to the Owner under Section 51 of the Housing Act, 1936, that the house is fit for human habitation and will, with reasonable care and maintenance, remain so fit for a period of at least 10 years.

6—Rats and Mice Destruction Act—(a) Councillor Grimwade attended in reference to the supply of poison to ratepayers for killing rats and as to the assistance given by the Health Department in the destruction of rats. RESOLVED, That the Chief Sanitary Inspector be instructed to take steps to ensure that all poison supplied by him is supplied in sealed containers and labelled " Poison."

(b) The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported on the desirability of keeping before the public the importance of the destruction of rats, RESOLVED, That he be authorised to spend the sum of £7 10s.Od. in advertising, etc

7—Health Department—(a) District Sanitary Inspector—The Committee further considered the question of obtaining an additional Sanitary Inspector to take the place of two who had joined H.M. Forces, especially in view of the large amount of meat inspection now required to be carried out at the Abattoir, RESOLVED, That the Council be recommended to authorise this Committee to appoint a temporary District Sanitary Inspector at a salary of £275 per annum, rising to £300 by two annual increments, and that the Town Clerk be instructed to issue advertisements inviting applications for the appointment, also that application be made to the Ministry of Health for approval of this temporary appointment.

(b) Clerk—The Medical Officer of Health submitted application from Miss Richards to be placed in the next Grade She was at present in the maximum of Grade C, at £182 per annum. RESOLVED, That Miss Richards be placed in Grade D at £195 per annum, rising to £208 per annum on the 1st April next.

8—Condemned Houses—The Committee considered the Minute of the Housing Committee in regard to Circular 2156 from the Ministry of Health as to the licensing of condemned houses for reoccupation. RESOLVED, That this Committee approve of the recommendation of the Housing Committee to circularise owners of condemned houses as therein mentioned.

9—Annual Statistics—The Medical Officer of Health submitted his Annual Report together with a Report from the Chief Sanitary Inspector for the year 1939. The following statistics were based on the Registrar General's estimate for 1939:—

Population	Normal estimate for mid-1939 was 53,170. Average population during 1939 which made allowance for the temporary war-time residents in the last quarter of the year was 54,130.
Birth Rate	802 live births ; a rate of 15.08 per 1,000. The highest total since 1921 and the highest rate since 1923, In addition to this figure, 25 births were ascribed to temporary war residents during the last quarter of the year.
Death Rate	831—a rate of 15.34 per 1,000 which when corrected for the regularities of distribution as regards age and sex so as to be comparable with other districts in the country was reduced to 11.36 as compared with 12.1 for the whole country.

Death Rate of Children

Under 1 Year ... 41.1 per 1,000 births, compared with 50 for the whole country.

10—Typhoid Fever—The Medical Officer of Health reported further on the recent circular from the Ministry of Health in regard to the immunisation of population against Typhoid Fever. RESOLVED, That the question of organising a scheme of immunisation for the public be not undertaken at the present time,

11—Purity of Water Undertaking—The Medical Officer of Health reported on Circular 2172 of 8th inst. from the Ministry of Health drawing attention to the need for taking all possible precautions during repairs to damaged water mains against the risk of pollution of the supply. If the damage was so intensive and the interruption of supply so serious that consumers are likely to resort to casual water from rivers, streams, ponds, etc., the consumers in the particular localities affected should be warned as to safeguards to be taken against bacterial pollution. RESOLVED, That the Medical Officer of Health be instructed in conjunction with the Town Clerk and Borough Engineer to prepare a supply of leaflets setting out the steps to be taken by the public for purifying the water and so that these may be available for distribution if, and when, necessary.

12—Pig Food—Read, letters from Mr. W. J. Rogers and Mr. G. F. Hawling complaining of the nuisance caused by the boiling of pig food on the Brooklyn Road tip, and the Borough Surveyor and Medical Officer of Health reported thereon. The Medical Officer of Health was of opinion that no nuisance was being caused by the boiling plant. RESOLVED, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to arrange for the boiling plant to be moved further away from the hacks of the houses.

13—Barn Farm-Supply of Sewage—The Committee considered the complaint of Mr. Rymer as to the proposed supply of sewage to land adjoining the Farm belonging to Mr. Merrett, RESOLVED, That the Farms Sub-Committee, with the addition of Councillor Dr, W. Curling Hayward, be asked to inspect the land, and, meanwhile, the Town Clerk be instructed not to enter into an Agreement with Mr: Merrett for the supply of sewage.

14—Montpellier Conveniences—The Borough Surveyor reported that recently both male attendants had given notice and had left the employ of the Corporation. He had now engaged another attendant on the J.I.C. scale of 55s per week of 47 hours, to be on duty at the Conveniences on weekdays from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., and engaged the former Sunday attendant to be on duty on Sundays from 8 a.m. to 12 noon and from 2 p.m. to 6 p.m. He had arranged for the Montpellier Gardens Custodian to lock up the Conveniences at 11 p.m.. on weekdays and 10 p.m. on Sundays. RESOLVED, That this be approved.

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#### HOUSING COMMITTEE.

At a Meeting of this Committee held on Thursday, 10th October, 1940. Present—Alderman Pates Councillors Addis, Bush, Rev. de Courcy Ireland, Fisher, Garland, Grimwade, Moore and Morris (Alderman Pates in the chair):

1—Arrears--The Housing Manager reported on the collection of rents since the last Meeting. RESOLVED, That the sum of £23 13s. 1.d. due from former tenants, as set out in the book signed by the Chairman, be written off as irrecoverable

2—Housing Manager's Department—RESOLVED, That the car allowance of the Deputy Housing Manager (Miss Dudin) be increased from £5 to £7 10s. 0d. per annum.

3—Condemned Houses—Read, Circular 2156 of 24th ult. from the Ministry of Health that where the Council were satisfied that there are or likely to be within their area a number of persons who have been rendered homeless by enemy action and that the ordinary accommodation by way of voluntary lodgings or of billets or of requisitioning property was not reasonably practicable, the Council could issue a licence authorising the re-occupation of condemned premises which could be put into such condition of cleanliness and repair as to be reasonably capable of being used as a temporary war-time measure of housing purposes without detriment to health. The Licences could specify conditions under which re-occupation could be allowed, including conditions as to rent to be charged, and was not to be operative for more than six months.

The Chief Sanitary Inspector reported on the houses which had not yet been demolished under Clearance Orders or Demolition Orders. With the exception of some property in Edward Street and Edward Terrace, most of the houses were in too bad a condition to permit of them being occupied without considerable expenditure. RESOLVED, That the Public Health Committee be recommended to circularise the owners of such houses as they consider can be made reasonably fit for habitation, and that, in the case of the Edward Street properties, the Chief Sanitary Inspector be instructed to inform the owners that, if desired, the Committee are prepared to consider an offer from the owners to allow the Corporation to take over the properties for the duration of the war in which case the Committee would be prepared to carry out the necessary cleansing work and let the premises to homeless families. RESOLVED, also, That the Chief Sanitary Inspector be instructed to report to the Tenants Sub-Committee as to the possibility of letting 143 Tewkesbury Road belonging to the Corporation.

4-Rent Restriction Acts-Read, Circular 2164 of 30th ult. from the Ministry of Health that representations had been made to the Minister that exorbitant charges are sometimes being demanded by way of rent with a result that persons whose own homes have been destroyed or rendered unusable by enemy action have difficulty in obtaining accommodation. The Ministry hope that Local Authorities would keep a close watch for anything of this kind in their district and take such action as the circumstances indicate to prevent advantage being taken of the exceptional demand for accommodation in certain areas. The Acts did not, in general, apply to furnished lettings but contained provisions empowering Courts to order that rents for such lettings so far as they yield more than normal profit shall be irrecoverable and that any payments of rent which may have been made in excess thereof shall be repaid to the lessee. Landlords charging extortionate rents for furnished lettings are liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding £100, Local Authorities are empowered to institute proceedings for any offence under the Acts and the Minister hoped that they would not hesitate to make use of their powers when circumstances warrant, RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to issue a notice in the "Echo" drawing attention to these provisions and that the General Purposes and Watch Committee be recommended to take appropriate action if any contraventions of the Act are reported to the Council.

5-Repairs Superintendent — The Monthly Report of the Repairs Superintendent was submitted.

6—Selection of Tenants Sub-Committee—Read, reports of the Selection of Tenants Sub-Committee at their Meeting held on the 4th inst.

They recommended (inter alia) as follows :--

That the rents fixed and the rebates granted, as set out in the Rents Rebate Book, signed by the Chairman, be-approved.

RESOLVED, That the proceedings of the Sub-Committee be approved and adopted. .

3—Salvage of Waste—(a) The Borough Surveyor reported that the following had been salvaged during the month of September : (the amounts salvaged during the previous month are shown in brackets) :—

(b) The Borough Surveyor reported that the Salvage Sub-Committee had ordered two additional trailers from Siddall's Caravans Ltd. at a cost of £60 each. RESOLVED, That this be approved.

(c) Lorry--The Salvage Committee recommended the purchase of a lorry to be used for the collection of salvage, including pig food. The lorry would enable pig food to be collected in the day time and avoid the work being done during the black-out which would not be satisfactory. RESOLVED, That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to advertise for offers of a second-hand lorry and the Salvage Committee he authorised to purchase a suitable second-hand vehicle.

4—Central Depot Siding—The Borough Surveyor reported that the G.W.R. had drawn attention to the condition of the siding into the Central Depot. RESOLVED, That they be instructed to have the work carried out as soon as possible at the cost of the Corporation.

5—Cleevemount Road, Overbrook Drive and Welland Lodge Road—The Borough Surveyor submitted letter of 1st inst. from Messrs. Rainger & Rogers stating that their clients had now carried out the repairs required for these roads, and renewing their former application for the Corporation to take over these roads The Borough Surveyor submitted details of various defects which still needed to be remedied before he could recommend the Committee to adopt the roads. RESOLVED, That the Committee are unable to recommend the Council to take over the roads until all the defects have been remedied in accordance with the Borough Surveyor's recommendation.

6— Halt Sign, Libertus Road—The Borough Surveyor submitted letter from Mr. R. A. Phillips asking that a " Halt " Sign should be placed in this road near its junction with Gloucester Road. RESOLVED, That this be not agreed to.

7—Borough Surveyor's Department—The Borough Surveyor recommended that Mr. J Verney who was put on the staff on the 1st August, 1939, for a temporary period at a salary of £104 per annum, should be retained on the staff as a temporary Clerk at a salary of £156 per annum. RESOLVED, That this recommendation be approved and adopted.

8—Pittville Street Scheme—(a) 7 Albion Street and 6 Pittville Street—The Town Clerk reported that these properties had been let to Messrs. Greenhouse & Co. 3—Midwives Act—(a) Medical Assistance—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the total amount of doctors' fees claimed for the period from the 1st April, 1940, to 30th September, 1940, was £59 10s. 6d., of which £35 17s. 6d. was chargeable to patients.

(b) Doctors' Fees—The Medical Officer of Health reported that the revised regulations fixing the scale of fees paid to Doctors called in by midwives provided that if the Doctor intended to claim an inclusive fee, his account must be submitted on the conclusion of his attendances on the patient and the Medical Officer of Health asked the Committee to decide what period should be allowed from the date of the last attendance before the submission of the account. RESOLVED, That he be instructed to inform Doctors that, where an inclusive fee is claimed, the account most be rendered within seven days after the conclusion of attendances on patients.

(c) The Committee further considered the letter of 5th April last from the District Nursing Association in regard to the payment of Doctors' fees for patients in the Home. The Town Clerk reported that, as instructed, he had enquired of the County Council what fees were paid by the Doctors to Nursing Homes in the County, and he now submitted letter of 24th July from the County Council that no Doctors' fees were paid by the County Council to any Nursing Homes in the County. RESOLVED, That, in these circumstances, the Committee are unable to pay a Doctor's fee in addition to the fees paid to the Home, but that the Association be informed that the Committee are prepared to pay one guinea to the Doctor for each ante-natal session held at the Victoria Home.

7—Orthopaedic Scheme—(a) The Medical Officer of Health submitted report on the work of the Orthopaedic Clinic for the quarter ended 30th ult. The total number of children on the Register was 134, of which 80 were chargeable to the Education Committee, and in respect of which 20 surgeons' consultations had been held; 54 children were chargeable to this Committee, in respect of which 17 surgeons' consultations had been held. He submitted accounts of the proportion of the fees payable by this Committee. RESOLVED, That these be paid.

(b) Hospital Charges—The Medical Officer of Health submitted account for treatment of outpatients, amounting to £1 3s 6d., which included 23 attendances at 6d. RESOLVED, That this be paid.

8—Puerperal Pyrexia—The Medical Officer of Health reported one case where a special Nurse had been provided at a cost of 16s. RESOLVED, That this account be paid.

9—Supply of Dried Milk—Read, circular of 5th August from the Ministry of Health that war time conditions of supply have made it necessary to provide, for the purposes of the National Milk Scheme, a single type of milk powder known as National Dried Milk, The milk was a full cream powder with fat content of about 26 per cent. It was supplied in packets containing a week's supply, namely 20 ounces, the cost to the family being 1s 2d. a packet, or free, according to income. The Ministry asked that the National Dried Milk should be available at Welfare Centres to supply on payment of 1s 2d., or free, in accordance with a quarterly permit which would be issued by the Milk Officer. Mrs. Mellersh reported that there was no demand at the Centres for the standard composition as all infants on dried milk attending the Centres were put on this form of feeding, because they required a half-cream milk whereas the National Dried Milk was a full cream powder. This penalised the mother as she had to buy another make of dried milk. RESOLVED, That the Medical Officer of Health be instructed to issue dried milk at less than cost, or free, according to the income of the family, and, that for the purpose of calculating the income, the scale adopted by the Government for the National Milk Scheme be adopted. RESOLVED, also, That the Town Clerk be instructed to communicate with the Ministry of Health and Ministry of Food suggesting that, where the National Dried Milk was not suitable for the infant, arrangements should be made to issue vouchers up to 1s 2d. per week, according to income, to be applied towards the purchase of a suitable milk powder.

RESOLVED, That the proceedings of the Sub-Committee (except (a)) he approved and adopted, and that with regard to (a) that the reduced charge for admission of members of the Forces to dances, when there is a bar, be discontinued.

2—Town Hall—The Borough Surveyor reported on the proposal to fix panic bolts on two of the main entrance swing doors at the Town Hall which he estimated would cost £10. RESOLVED, That he be instructed to have this work carried out,

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## ELECTRICITY AND LIGHTING COMMITTEE.

1—Sub-Meters—The Borough Electrical Engineer reported that hitherto it had not been the practice to allow consumers to have Sub-Meters when they let off part of their premises to temporary residents, but, in view of the large number of evacuees and refugees now in the town, he recommended that he should be allowed to install Sub-Meters in approved cases, and also that in such cases the meter rent should be increased to 1s 6d. a quarter for meters up to 5 amperes and to

2s a quarter for meters over 5 amperes, and that also a connection charge of 5s should be made for each sub-tenant. RESOLVED, That: this be approved and adopted.

2—Accounts for the Year ended 31st March, 1940—The Borough Electrical Engineer submitted a report on the Accounts of the Undertaking for the year ended 31st March, 1940. The nett surplus for the year was £8,774 from which had to be deducted £2,984 for apparatus on hire, etc., and £1,000 contribution to General Rate Fund. The surplus was therefore £4,790 which added to the balance of £1,652 brought forward from last year, gave a total balance to carry forward of £6,442. RESOLVED, That this surplus be retained in the Nett Revenue Appropriation Account for the present. RESOLVED, also, That the Borough Treasurer be asked to report on the Accounts at the next Meeting of the Committee and, in particular, in regard to the Public Lighting Account.

3—Damage to Lamp Post, Lansdown Road and Switch Pillar at Junction of St. Stephen's and Andover Roads—Read, report of damage on the 30th September last to a lamp post in Lansdown Road by a lorry belonging to the Globe Haulage Company of Brentford High Street, London. and to a Switch Pillar at junction of St. Stephen's and Andover Roads by Messrs. Hutchly & Collumbell. RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to make claims for the net cost of making good the damage amounting to £31 19s. 3d. and £12 12s 3d. respectively

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# WATER COMMITTEE.

At a Special Meeting of this Committee held on Saturday, 5th October, 1940. Present—Aldermen Margrett, Pates and Ward Councillors Dr. Hayward, Moore and Morris (Alderman Margrett in the chair).

1—Water Supply—The Borough Engineer reported that owing to the prolonged drought and the great increase of population in the Area of supply, the Water Undertaking was now scarcely holding its own and reserves had been seriously depleted unless relief could be found either by a substantial reduction in the consumption of water, or an emergency supply, the position would become serious. No greater quantity could be obtained from Tewkesbury as already two million gallons a day were being pumped to Cheltenham, and a further million gallons were being pumped to Gloucester by means of the pumping plant put in by Gloucester Corporation at their own expense. The yield from

the springs was still declining and after a break in the drought several weeks would lapse before the yield could be expected to increase.

With reference to Minute No 4 passed at the last Meeting, the Borough Engineer reported that he had been in negotiation with Messrs. Le Grande, Sutcliffe & Bell, Ltd., well sinkers and hydraulic engineers, and had had an interview with their representative. They had visited land adjoining Copt Elm Road belonging to Colonel Eagar to consider the proposition of obtaining water from the River Chelt gravels, and he now submitted letter from the firm with alternative estimates. Any work carried out must, in the first instance, be of an exploratory nature and could best be done by sinking a 6 inch diameter Bore and driving three Abyssinian Tubes. These Tubes which consist of a perforated tube of about 2 inches in diameter were suitable for use in clean gravels and had the advantage of being rapidly placed in position and quickly brought into use. Any subsequent procedure would be governed by the result of the test after regard had been given to the quality of the water obtained. The estimates were only approximate as there had not been sufficient time to submit firm prices.

# PROPOSAL 2.

An alternative to the Tube Well Scheme is a Dug Well with a shaft 8 feet 0 ins. diameter and depth 25 feet 0 ins. Such a well would be partly lined with Perforated Cast Iron Cylinders and the upper portion with Brick Rings. The Yield of such a Well would doubtless be increased by the drilling of four Boreholes horizontally from the periphery of the Well. These bores would be 6 inches in diameter, 30 feet 0 ins. in length and lined with Perforated Steel Tubes.

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The Borough Engineer reported that if either scheme was proceeded with, it would probably be possible to obtain a supply in two months provided the necessary materials could be obtained on priority.

The Town Clerk suggested with a view to affecting an immediate reduction in consumption, that the Railway Companies (who were the largest consumers in the area), might be approached to see if it was possible for them to obtain a portion of their supply at other Railway Stations not in the area of supply ; also that other large consumers. who use water for industrial purposes might be asked to consider whether they could not obtain water from wells or adjacent stream courses,

RESOLVED, That in view of the uncertainty of obtaining sufficient supply from the River Chelt gravels to justify incurring the large expense and the time which would be taken to obtain this supply, the proposal to extract water from the Chelt gravels be deferred for the present.

RESOLVED, also, That the Borough Engineer be instructed to approach the Railway Companies and ask them if, as a temporary measure, they could arrange to obtain a portion of their supplies from other areas through which their trains pass, and also that the Borough Engineer be instructed to consider whether there are any other large industrial consumers who might be asked to consider the possibility of obtaining a supply from wells or stream courses.

2—Supply to Gloucester—The Borough Engineer submitted letter from the City Engineer at Gloucester for permission to take steps to pump a further million gallons per day from the Tewkesbury Waterworks. The Borough Engineer reported that he considered the suggestions made by Gloucester to enable this increased output to be produced were not practicable, as the present filtering capacity of the works was not sufficient to deal effectively with any larger quantity than at present being treated. The proposal would also involve using the standby boiler and also the standby engine which it is always desirable to maintain in view of the possibility of breakdown.

He reported that if it had been possible to increase the output from Tewkesbury without risk to the whole supply, he would have recommended this as an alternative to endeavouring to obtain an emergency supply from wells and, while he appreciated the serious position of the Gloucester supply, he regretted that he could not advise the Committee to agree to the proposals of the Gloucester City Engineer.

RESOLVED, That the Committee regret they are unable to entertain the Gloucester proposals.

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2—Inspections—(a) The Borough Engineer reported the work carried out by the Water Inspectors during the month of September.

(b) It was reported that the following members of the Committee met on the 17th September, namely, The Mayor; Aldermen Margrett, Pates and Ward; Councillors Dr. Hayward, Moore and Morris, and inspected the Water Works at Churchdown, Tewkesbury, Hewletts and Dowdeswell.

3—Appeals—The cases entered in the Appeals Book were considered, and the rates settled and adjusted.

4—Hewletts Reservoir--RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to proceed with negotiations with the Office of Works for a wayleave for the drainage of the Custodian's house through land, part of Oakley Farm, belonging to the Office of Works.

5—Stoke Orchard—The Borough Engineer submitted letter of 26th ult. from the Cheltenham Rural District Council with plan showing the proposed route of a new water main to be laid by the District Council for supply to new premises at Stoke Orchard, about 400 yards of the main being in the Cheltenham Area of supply. RESOLVED, That no objection be raised to the laying of this length of main.

6—Water Supply--The Borough Engineer reported that, as instructed he had interviewed the representatives of Great Western and L.M.S. Railway Companies at Worcester and Birmingham respectively. As a result of the interviews both Companies had agreed as a temporary measure, to arrange, where possible, for engines to draw their supplies from other stations outside the Cheltenham Area of supply with a view to assisting the Corporation to conserve supplies as much as possible during the present shortage. RESOLVED, That the thanks of the Council be conveyed to the two Companies for their assistance.

7—South Midlands J.I.C.---(a) The Borough Engineer submitted letter from the South Midlands District Council J.I.C. in regard to the payment for August Bank Holiday. While they agreed it was a matter for local practice, at a recent Meeting of the J.I.C. it was decided to recommend that national holidays should be paid for at time and a half rate plus a day in lieu of national holidays making 2 ½ days pay for a day's work. RESOLVED, That the Committee adhere to the decision of the Labour Sub-Committee to pay one day's pay plus a day's holiday on full pay.

(b) The Borough Engineer reported that the South Midland J.I.C. had decided that as from the 3rd inst. an additional 11d. a week should be paid on account of cost of living increase to waterworks employees and that he was accordingly giving effect to this decision.

(c) Sick Pay--The Borough Engineer reported that one of the employees had made an application for sick pay. The working conditions of the South Midland J.I.C. contained a recommendation to District Councils to adopt a sick pay scheme providing for payment of half wages during the first five weeks of sickness and for quarter wages during the next five weeks' sickness, such payments to be irrespective of benefits under the National Health Insurance Acts. RESOLVED, That the Committee are unable to recommend the Council to adopt a sick-pay scheme for their employees at the present time.

8—Castle Barn Farm—Read, letter of 18th ult. from the tenant of this farm drawing attention to the repairs required to boundary fences, roof and spouting of farm buildings, and spouting round the new farm house, etc. RESOLVED, That Mr. Castle and the Borough Engineer be instructed to report thereon

9—Lower Hewletts Farm—RESOLVED, That Mrs. Weston be provided with some second-hand boarding for the repair of the mangers of the cowsheds and some distemper for painting the walls of the bathroom, living room, hall and staircase. RESOLVED, also, That the Borough Engineer be instructed to have the damaged spouting made good

10—Shooting, Dowdeswell Wood and Woodlands Farm—The Committee considered offers for the shooting at Dowdeswell Wood and Woodlands Farm. RESOLVED, That the offer of Mr. H. M. Avery of £5 for the current season be accepted.

11—Field 268—Read, letter of 17th ult. from Messrs. Castle & Son that this field which was formerly let to Captain Hext at £4 per annum and given up by him in December, 1938, had been occupied since that date by Messrs. Chandler Bros., by an arrangement with the late Mr. Castle. The Town Clerk reported that this was not reported to the Committee at the time and that no rent had been paid for this extra field. RESOLVED, That Messrs. Chandler Brothers be required to pay the extra rent.

(b) Foot and Mouth. Disease (Boiling of Animal Foodstuffs) (Amendment) Order, 1940—The Town Clerk submitted copy of this Order amending the Foot and Mouth Disease (Boiling of Animals Foodstuffs) Order, 1932, which required any person having possession of any pig swill to boil this before being fed to animals, by adding a proviso that the Article should not apply to swill obtained from premises in respect of which the occupier holds an effective Certificate from the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries or the Local Authority certifying that all swill supplied therefrom is subject on such premises to a process of boiling within the meaning of the Order. RESOLVED, That application be made to the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries for a certificate under the Order in respect of the swill collected by the Corporation and boiled on their premises so as to render it unnecessary for such swill to be boiled. again before it is fed to animals.

2—Domestic Agencies—Read, report of 15th inst. from Superintendent Hopkins of the quarterly inspection of the Agencies. All the books were examined and found to be in order.

3—Petroleum Licences—The Petroleum Inspector submitted a list of persons who had not renewed their petrol licences. RESOLVED, That the Town Clerk be instructed to inform them that, if they continued to store petrol without a licence, proceedings will be taken against them without further warning.

4—Pawnbroker's Licence—RESOLVED, That the application of Mr. Harry Higgins for renewal of his certificate under the Pawnbrokers' Act be granted for one year up to the 9th November, 1941.

5—Health Education Film—The Birth of a Baby—Read, letter of 2nd inst. from Health Education Films asking for permission to show this film in the Borough Permission had already been granted for the exhibition of the film in other important towns. The film would only be shown subject to the conditions which accompanied their letter. RESOLVED, That permission be granted for the exhibition of the film, subject to compliance with the conditions laid down by the Joint Council and also to compliance with the conditions of the Cinematograph Licence and to no child under the age of 16 years being admitted.

6—Athletic Ground—Hoarding—Read, letter of 1st inst. from the Cheltenham District Billposting Co, Ltd., asking for a. reduction in the rental of this hoarding on the ground that the Paper Control Order prohibited the printing or exhibition of large posters. RESOLVED, That a reduction of 25 per cent be made in the rent for one year.

7—Sunday Entertainments Act, 1932—Read, letter of 9th inst. from the Cheltenham District Nursing Association asking that they might be included in the list of Local Charities to whom a contribution would be made by the Cinemas in respect of Sunday opening. RESOLVED, That the Association be

informed that the Committee will give their application consideration when settling list of charities for next year.

8—Superannuation—RESOLVED , on the recommendation of the Cemetery and Crematorium Committee, That the services of Mr. T. H. K. Woolhouse be extended for one year from the 31st March, 1941.

9—Rent Restrictions Act—The Town Clerk reported Circular 2164 of 30th ult. from the Ministry of Health stating that representations had been made to the Minister that exorbitant charges are sometimes being demanded by way of rent with a result that persons whose homes have been destroyed or rendered unusable by enemy action have difficulty in obtaining accommodation, and that this circular had been considered by the Housing Committee and referred to this Committee for consideration. RESOLVED, That the Housing Committee be asked to undertake this work and to take the necessary appropriate action if any contraventions of the Act are reported.

1—Monthly Report of Chief Officer—The Chief Officer reported that since the last Meeting the Brigade had attended 10 calls to fire, as follows :-----28th September, Refuse Tip, Hudson Street ; 29th September, 109 Promenade ; 30th September, 28 Bennington Street, and Whithorn Quarry, Charlton Kings ; 3rd October, Rose and Crown Passage ; 6th October, Greenway Lane, Charlton Kings ; 7th October, 5 Lansdown Place ; 8th October, 26 Imperial Square : 13th October, 124 Bath Road and "Strathmore," Sandford Mill Road.

2—Secondment of Chief Officer--The Chief Officer reported that on resuming his duties, he had found the efficiency of the Fire Brigade and Auxiliary Fire Service had reached a very high standard which was largely due to the efforts of the Second Officer (Mr. R. J. Cox), who had been ably assisted by the Third Officer (Mr. J. W. Hasted) and the A.F.S. Commandant (Mr. Cassini). He expressed his

appreciation to these officers for the valuable assistance given during his absence. RESOLVED, That the Committee desire to place on record their appreciation of the efficient manner in which the Second Officer (Mr. R. J. Cox) carried out the duties of the Chief Officer during the time that the Chief Officer was seconded for work as Regional Fire Inspector.

3—Officers' Salaries—(a) The Committee considered the re-adjustment of the Officers' salaries consequent on the return of the Chief Officer. Prior to Mr. Jones being seconded for work at Bristol, the salaries were as follows :—

Chief Officer ...£300.Second Officer (Mr. R. J. Cox)...£225.Third Officer (Mr. J. W. Hasted)£208.

On Mr. Jones' departure, the salaries were increased as follows :--

Second Officer (as Acting Chief Officer) £250, subsequently increased to 4300 with a further increment of £25 payable on the 1st May, 1941.
