Notes of the Month.

Symptoms of approaching Spring usually begin to manifest themselves this month at the Spas—many water drinkers making their appearance at the Pump Rooms whenever the mornings happen to prove sufficiently inviting for early exercise.

Earl Fitzhardinge's Fox Hounds arrive in Cheltenham about the 1st of March; and continue to draw the covers of the neighbourhood to the end, when they return to Berkeley Castle. The Spring Steeple Chases usually take place about the latter end of this month.

The Literary & Philosophical Lectures continue as heretofore at the Institution. The Annual Meeting of the Society takes place on the second Tuesday in the month, for the election of Officers and Committee for the year ensuing.

The Board of Guardians for the Cheltenham Union are elected on the first Thursday after the 25th.

Notes of the Month.

The Cheltenham "season" commences on the first of May, though it is not until the arrival of the full summer band at the Montpellier Spa that the gaiety and animation incident thereto attract much attention. This event generally takes place about the second Monday in the month, and within a day or two the evening musical promenades also begin, the band performing from this date thrice, and sometimes even oftener, in each week, from seven to nine p.m., as well as regularly every morning, from eight to ten o'clock. May is always considered one of the best months for taking the waters, and there is, in consequence, usually a large attendance, both of residents and visitors, at the different Pump Rooms.

The second floral and horticultural exhibition of the Cheltenham & Pittville Association takes place towards the latter end of the month.

The session of the Literary and Philosophical Institution concludes on the second Tuesday.

The prevailing winds are S.W. and N.E., the former greatly predominating.

The mean of the thermometer may be estimated at 53°-60°, of the barometer 29°-746.

The quantity of rain which falls in May is 1'601 inches, taking the average of seven years.

The Public Commissioners hold their meetings at the Fleece Inn, the first Friday in every month, at 11 o'clock in the forenoon, for the purpose of taking cognizance of all matters connected with the local government of the town—plenary powers being vested in them for that purpose by an Act of Parliament passed in the year 1821 (2nd Geo. IV.); by which Act they are also empowered to frame such bye-laws and rules as to them shall appear necessary for the peace, security, and general interests of the town. The appointment and direction of the Police and Fire Establishments,* the paving and lighting the streets and highways, the regulation and superintendence of the flies and public conveyances, are therefore comprehended within their peculiar province. Since the establishment in 1840 of the Rural Police, the Commissioners have, however, ceded to that newly constituted power the duty and responsibility of "watch and ward" throughout the town, and have disbanded the constabulary and police forces formerly employed by them, and subject, of course, to their jurisdiction.

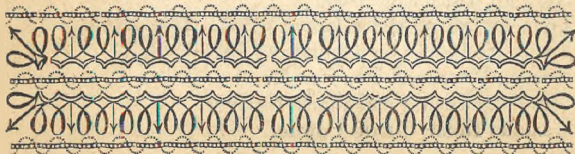

Directions for Use.—Place the bottle or decanter in the cooler, and pour in cold water fresh from the pump, until it reaches the shoulder of the bottle, shake in four table spoonsful of the powder and stir it with a stick till dissolved, in a few minutes the wine will be sufficiently cool for use. As the water impregnated with this powder retains the cold temperature for a long time, several bottles may be cooled with the same water.—If Champagne or other wine requires to be cooled to a very low temperature, the powder used to each bottle must be doubled.

APPENDIX.

The following instructions for preparing the different articles in the foregoing catalogue, as Diet for Invalids, &c. is presumed may be of service for Families.

ARROW ROOT.

To a dessert spoonful of the Powder, add as much Cold Water as will make it into a Paste, then pour on Half-pint of Boiling Water, stir it briskly and boil a few minutes, when it will become a clear smooth Jelly. It may be sweetened with Sugar, and flavoured with Lemon Peel, &c. to the palate; or a little Sherry or other White Wine may be added; Fresh Milk, either alone or diluted with Water, may be substituted for the Water.

HARTSHORN JELLY

Is made by boiling an ounce of Shavings, (in a close vessel) in a Quart of Water down to a Pint; it is a light nutriment for delicate or consumptive habits. The Artificial Asses' Milk is made by boiling two ounces of Hartshorn Shavings, two ounces of Pearl Barley, two ounces of Candied Eringo Root, and a quarter of an ounce of Isinglass, in two quarts of Water, reduced to one; strain through muslin, take a quarter of a pint twice a day, with an equal proportion of new milk.

BARLEY WATER.

Is made by well washing two ounces of Pearl Barley, boil it a few minutes in half-a-pint of Water, which is to be thrown away, then add four pints of Boiling Water; keep it boiling till two pints only are left, and strain; a small quantity of Lemon Juice may be added.

Robinson's Prepared Barley will be found a much more convenient article for the preparation of Barley Water.

SAGO

Should be first soaked in cold Water for an hour, and the liquor then poured off, fresh water added, and allowed to simmer until it is transparent. It may be flavoured with Spices, Wine, &c. and sweetened with Sugar. When made with Milk it is a useful and nutritious Diet for consumptive persons.

TAPIOCA.

Let the Tapioca be first washed two or three times in cold Water then leave it to soak four or five hours in fresh Water; simmer it gently over a slow fire until the Jelly becomes perfectly clear; it may be sweetened as Sago.
