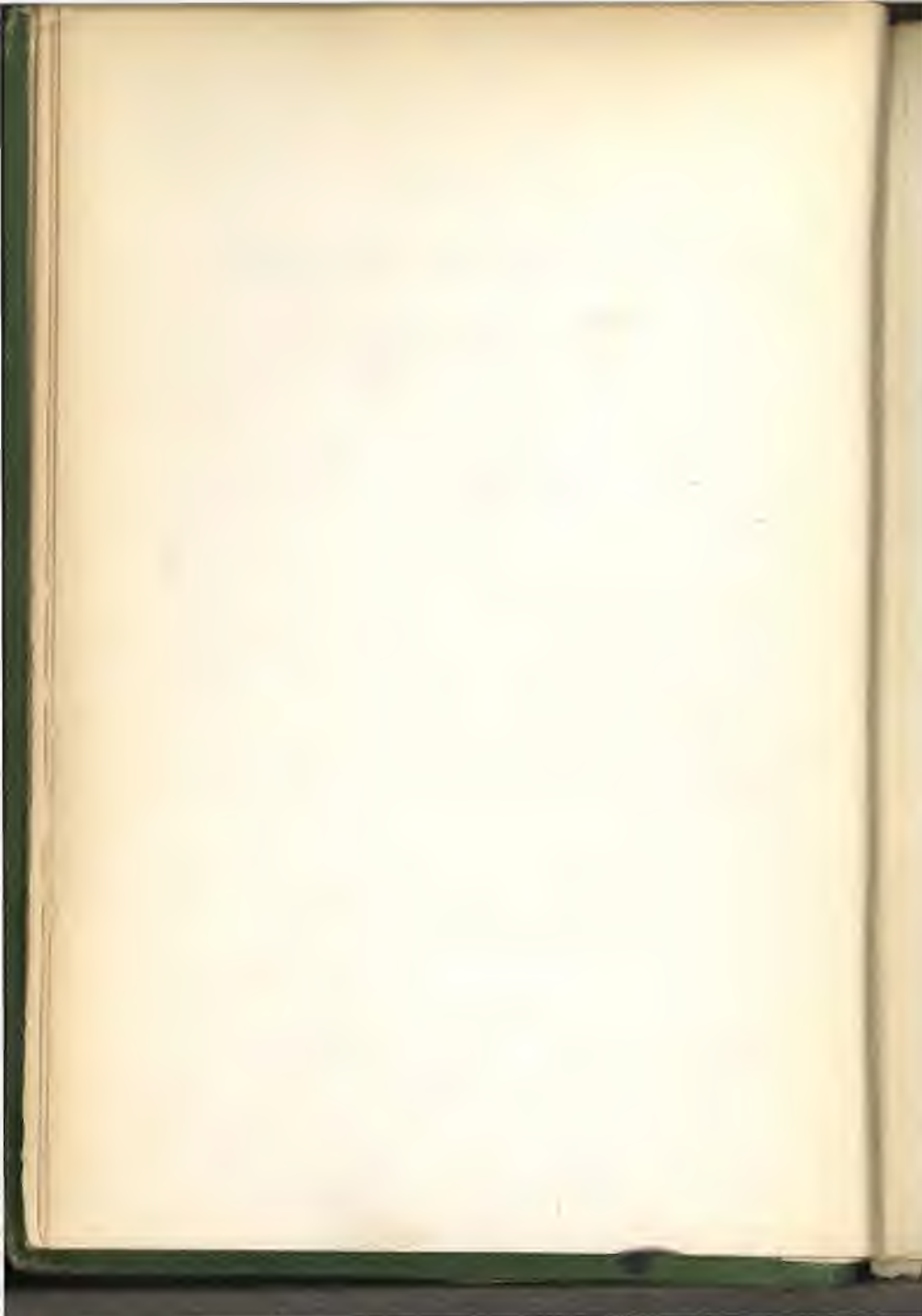

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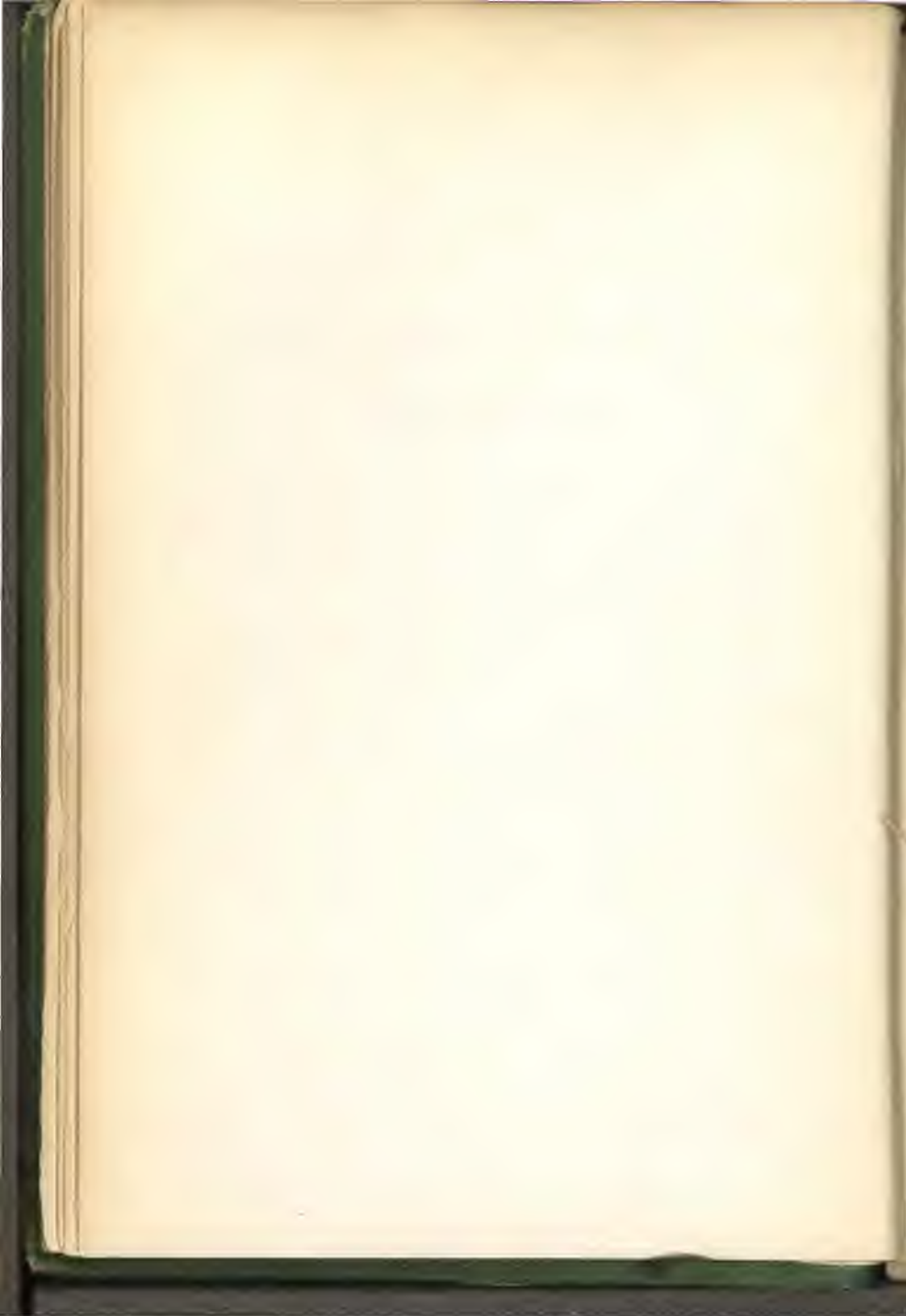

CABS AND WHEELCHAIRS.

Cabs and Wheelchairs are under the Control of the Town Council, from whom the Proprietors receive a license annually. They are subject to Bye-laws, which they are bound to produce (on demand) to the hirer. The fares commence at the stand from which the chair or carriage may be called. They may be hired by time or distance, at the option of the hirer.

Ashchurch is a large parish about eight miles from Cheltenham, comprising the tything and hamlet of Aston-upon-Carrant, Fiddington, Northway, and Pamington, also the hamlets of Natton and Newton. It is in the Union of Tewkesbury, and has a population of 725 souls; area, 4,201 acres; in the Deanery of Winchcomb, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, in the lower division of Tewkesbury Hundred.

It is on the main road from Tewkesbury to Winchcomb, and is most easily got at from Cheltenham by the Midland Railway. The Church consisting of nave, chancel, north aisle with porch, and a fine tower with a peal of six bells, is an ancient and commodious edifice, dedicated to Saint Nicholas; in the incumbency of the Rev. H. S. Warleigh. The living is valued at £321 per annum, and is in the patronage of the Rev. C. N. Williams, M.A. There is a school for children of both sexes; about £25 per annum is given to the poor of the village, the income of charities left for that purpose. Mrs. Evans is lady of the manor.

Badgworth is a parish in Cheltenham Union, nearly four miles from Cheltenham, having four hamlets; Bentham, Little Shurdington, Reddings, and Little Whitcomb. It can be reached either by way of

Badgworth

Lansdown and Up-hatherley, or through Shurdington. It contains a population of about 1,200 and has an area of 3,927 acres, in the Deanery of Winchcomb, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, upper division of Dudstone and King's Barton Hundred, East Gloucestershire.

Formerly at Badgworth a monastery existed from the eleventh century to the time of the general dissolution, and a chapel dedicated to Saint Margaret was attached to the church, which is still in existence. A mineral spring exists similar to the waters at Cheltenham. The vicarage, with Great Shurdington annexed, is in the incumbency of the Rev. Alfred William Ellis Viner, B.A. The joint annual value is £295 with residence. The Principal and Fellows of Jesus College, Oxford, are the impropiators of the rectorial tithes. The Church is in the Decorated and Perpendicular style of architecture, and is an ancient structure, dedicated to the Holy Trinity, consisting of chancel, nave, chapel, and a handsome embattled tower, with six bells. There are National Schools for children of both sexes, and there are charitable bequests for the benefit of the poor and apprenticing poor children. Near Up-hatherley, is an independent Chapel.

Barnwood—Beckford

Barnwood is a parish in Gloucester Union, containing about 520 inhabitants and 1,471 acres; it is eight miles distant from Cheltenham. It may be visited either by way of the Gloucester road or by taking the train to Gloucester, and then passing through the village of Wootton. It is about a mile and a half from Gloucester, in the Deanery and Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, the upper division of Dudstone hundred.

The vicarage is in the incumbency of the Rev. Wm. Jas. Kennedy is valued at £300 per annum, and is in the patronage of the Dean and Chapter of Gloucester. The Church, which is dedicated to Saint Lawrence, consists of a double chancel, nave, and narrow aisle, with a low embattled tower; there is a double bell turret on the eastern gable of the nave. It has interesting specimens of Norman, early English, and perpendicular Architecture. Barnwood has a school for children of both sexes, and there are some small charities for the poor.

Barnwood House is an institution for the insane. It was established in 1860, and will accommodate about 50 of each sex. It is under the superintendence and management of Dr. Needham.

Beckford is a parish and village in Winchcomb Union, containing about 486 inhabitants and 2,650 acres; in the Deanery of Campden, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, Hundred of Tibbaldstone, on the river Carrant.

It is about 9 miles from Cheltenham, and is reached by taking the Cleeve road, passing through Bishops Cleeve; if visited by rail, we go to Ashchurch by the Midland Railway, and from thence to Beckford.

Beckford—Birdlip

The living, with the Chapelry of Ashton-under-Hill annexed, is an endowed vicarage, valued at £400 per annum, with residence and 213 acres of glebe land, and is in the incumbency of the Rev. Joseph Harrison, LL.B., who is patron of the living. The Church is an ancient edifice in the Norman style, dedicated to St. John the Baptist, consisting of nave, chancel, and aisle, with an imposing tower rising from the centre, containing a peal of bells and a clock; the chancel arch and porch are two fine specimens of Norman architecture. There is a National school for children of both sexes. Beckford Hall is the seat of Hattil Foll, Esquire, J.P., who is lord of the Manor; in the grounds is an avenue of box 160 yards in length. Grafton is a hamlet one mile north-east, Bangrone, another hamlet, 1½ miles south, and Didecot, a hamlet 1½ miles east.

Birdlip is a small hamlet formed out of the three parishes of Brimsfield in Cirencester Union, and Cowley and Whitcomb, in Cheltenham Union. It is about six miles from Cheltenham, and is reached by taking the Bath and Leckhampton roads. Situated on the "Lip" or brow of the Cotts-Wolds, 976 feet above the sea, where the ancient British Ermine St. from Southampton, dips down the face of the hills. Many camps and barrows as at Rendcomb, Nettleton, Barrow-Wake hill, Crickley, and Leckhampton, and the Kimbury above Painswick, marked the scenes of battles with the Romans, on their march under Plautius to Gloucester, in the years A.D. 43-44. Mounds showing the site of British Birdlip are seen in the field on the left, at the entrance into the village, as well as a portion of the British Jack-way to Jackbarrow, and by Jackamont bottom, into the Acman Street, to Bath.

Birdlip--Bishops Cleeve

A pleasant walk through Witcomb woods brings the visitor to the Roman villa, in the Sarn-dell under Cooper's-hill, where a large entrenchment crowns the height. From the rudge above the village is seen Swindon Station, Marlborough downs, and the White Horse of Berkshire, and to the west, the Holy Mount or Sugar Loaf, the Hatterills and the Beacons of Brecon, with the Malvern Hills, Worcester Cathedral, Tewkesbury Abbey, and the Clent and Abberley Hills to the north.

The scenery *en route* is of a very varied character, hills, dales, woods, and meadows delightfully intermingle here. Cattle fairs are held annually, on the last Tuesday in April and on the 8th of September. There is a Baptist Chapel, in which services are conducted at 11 a.m. and 2 p.m. on Sundays.

Bishops Cleeve is a parish, including the township of Bishops Cleeve, and the hamlets of Gotherington, Woodmancote, Southam, and Brockhampton, in Winchcomb Union, and Stoke Orchard, in Tewkesbury Union, containing in Winchcomb Union an area of 6,812 acres, and in Tewkesbury Union 1,331 acres, making a total of 8,150 acres; in the Deanery of Winchcomb, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, and, with its hamlets, forming the Hundred to which it gives its name.

BISHOPS CLEEVE is a township and village forming part of the above parish, containing by the last census 704 inhabitants, one mile north-east from the Cleeve Station on the Midland Railway, and $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles north of Cheltenham. The rectory, in the incumbency of the Rev. W. L. Townsend, who is non-resident, is valued at £1,570 per annum, with 240 acres of glebe land, and residence, which was formerly occupied by the Bishop of Worcester. The Church is one of the largest village churches in the county; it is dedicated to St. Michael, and con-

sists of chancel, north and south aisles, with tower having a noble Norman arch, and containing a peal of six bells. There is a Board School for children of both sexes. On the hill are the "Camps," where may be traced the remains of a Roman encampment, 300 yards in extent; a battle is said to have been fought here between the armies of Cromwell and Charles. There is a saline spring in the parish called the Alcester Spa. Joseph Lovegrove, Esq., is lord of the manor.

GOTHERINGTON is a hamlet of the above parish, containing, according to the last census, 408 inhabitants; one mile from Bishops Cleeve, 5 north-west from Winchcomb, and 6 south-west from Tewkesbury.

WOODMANCOTE is a hamlet of the above parish, containing, by the last census, 507 inhabitants; one mile east from Cleeve. Lawrence Lawrence, Esq., is lord of the manor.

SOUTHAM AND BROCKHAMPTON forms another hamlet of the above parish, containing, according to the last census, 264 inhabitants; three miles north-east from Cheltenham. There is a small chapel of ease, the private church of the late Earl of Ellenborough. Southam House, formerly the seat of the Earl of Ellenborough, is an ancient building, which Leland says was built in Henry VIII's reign. It is charmingly situated, commanding exquisite views of the vale of Gloucester and the Malvern hills.

STOKE ORCHARD forms another hamlet of Bishops Cleeve, though in the Tewkesbury Union, containing, according to the last census, 183 inhabitants, and 1,331 acres of land; in the Deanery of Winchcomb, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, hundred of Cleeve, East Gloucestershire, one mile north-west from Cleeve Station, on the Midland Railway, 4 south from Tewkesbury, 6 north-west from Cheltenham, and 10 north-east from Gloucester. It has all the privileges of a separate parish, levying its own poor rate and appointing its own officers. There is a chapel of ease, an ancient stone building with one bell, also an Independent chapel. There is a National school for children of both sexes. Richard Rogers Coxwell Rogers, Esq., is the lord of the manor, and principal land owner.

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Boddington is a parish about three and a half miles from Cheltenham, in Tewkesbury Union, having a population of 445 souls, and contains 1,261 acres; in the Deanery of Winchcomb, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, lower part of Tewkesbury hundred. It is most easily reached from Cheltenham by taking the Tewkesbury road.

The Church (lately restored through the exertions of the Rev. J. E. Waldy) is an ancient edifice, dedicated to Saint Mary Magdalene, consisting of nave and chancel, with low tower containing three bells. Brimpsfield is a parish and village in Cirencester Union, containing about 425 inhabitants and 2,611 acres, in the Rural Deanery of north Stonehouse, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, hundred of Rapsgate, eastern division of the county.

It is about seven and a half miles from Cheltenham, taking the road through Leckhampton and Birdlip. The living, a discharged rectory, with Cranham attached, is valued at £450 per annum, with residence and 32 acres of glebe land; Rector, the Rev. Wm. Moore, M.A.; it is in the patronage of James Goodrich, Esq. The Church is an ancient edifice dedicated to Saint Michael, consisting of chancel and nave, with tower. The nave is thought to be a Priory of the Benedictines which existed here; the tower was afterwards erected at the east end, and the chancel was so added that the tower is nearly in the centre of the building. In the churchyard is an ancient Maltese cross. There is a Government National School for children of both sexes supported by voluntary contributions. The poor have the interest of £50 distributed annually on Easter Monday, also the interest of £200 recently left by Mrs. Mary Ann Ockwell, of Caudle Green. The river Frome or Stroudwater rises in this landslip. T. Pendlebury, Esq., is lord of the manor. Birdlip is a hamlet partly in this parish, and partly in those of Cowley and Whitcomb.. Caudle Green is another hamlet belonging to Brimpsfield. There was a castle in this parish of which the moat is still existing. The foundations are below the surface. It is supposed to have been built by Stephen, and demolished in the Baron's wars.

Winchcombe, Gloucestershire, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, and Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The direct road to it is the London-road. The river Chelt runs through this parish from east to west, its source being in the adjoining parish of Dowdeswell. St. Mary's Church is a large stone edifice in the early English and perpendicular styles. It is now in process of restoration, by re-building and enlargement of nave. It consists of nave, aisles, chancel, and contains an organ. It has a tower with clock and six bells, and a new burial ground has been added to it. The date of the register is from 1535. The living, a vicarage, is £130 per annum, and is in the gift of the Principal and Fellows of Jesus College, Oxford. Large new Schools for boys and girls have recently been erected. The Vicar is the Rev. Chas. L. Dundas.

The new church of the Holy Apostles has lately been built at the expense of C. C. Higgs, Esq. It is a good specimen of the Geometrical or First Decorated period, and consists of chancel, north and south chancel aisles, nave and aisles, with apsidal termination, at the east end. The decorations of the roofs are rich, and throughout the carving is good. The groups of angelic worshippers, the Redeemer, apostles, saints, martyrs, and reformers, have a most pleasing effect. Curate-in-Charge, Rev. F. G. S. Potter, M.A. The boys' and girls' National schools, which have recently been added, are in the geometrical Middle Pointed style. The chapel is that of the Methodist Free Church; service, Sundays 2.30 and 6 p.m., Battledown Knoll, a handsome edifice, is the seat of Samuel Higgs Gael, Esq., J.P. Near here are some remains of an ancient Roman camp. The charities for various objects amount to £150 yearly. There is no district and the church is not consecrated or licensed. Area, 3,120 acres; population, 3,680.

Chedworth—Roman Villa

Chedworth (Roman Villa), a parish in the hundred of Raps-gate, in the county of Gloucester, four miles north-east of Northleach, its post town, and eleven miles south-south-east of Cheltenham, and seven from Cirencester. The direct way from Cheltenham is by London-road, and through Dowdeswell and Withington. The drive *en route* is beautifully varied by hill and dale, copse and woods throughout. The village, with a population of 962 at last census, is exceedingly pretty, covering a large area of some four square miles, and being situated on the table-land of the Cotswolds, has a very bracing climate. The church, dedicated to St. Andrew, is of Norman architecture. It possesses nave, western tower, and north aisle, with a gallery over the latter. Its windows on the south side are supposed to be late perpendicular, about 1480. There is a fine sculptured stone pulpit. The living is a vicarage, in the Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, value £350, in the patronage of Queen's College, Oxford. It is usually bestowed upon one of the Fellows of Queen's. There is a very good National School for children of both sexes, under Government inspection. The Howe family took the title of Baron from Chedworth. The manor formerly belonged to the Earls of Warwick, and then descended to the Earl of Eldon. The Independents have an endowed chapel here. **Roman Villa.**—In the parish of Chedworth a remarkable discovery was made in the year 1866, by James Farrar, Esq. While digging out a ferret, some tesserae were brought to light. Mr. Farrar's attention having been called to this, he undertook to prosecute the matter, and has uncovered a large area of land, which was then a coppice wood, and exposed to view the remains of a fine Roman villa. The cost of these excavations, and the substantial coverings for the protection of this work of antiquity were defrayed by the Right Hon. the Earl of Eldon, upon whose estate it is situated. An interesting museum of objects brought to light during the excavations is attached. These remains are well worthy of inspection, and during the summer months are visited by travellers from all parts of England. There is a large and commodious hotel near, upon the "Foss Way," known as "Foss Bridge," the proprietor is Brother Berry.

Churchdown

Churchdown, a straggling village and parish, five miles by road and four by rail, in the eastern division of the county, in the hundred of Dudstone and King's Barton, in the union and county court district of Gloucester, in the Rural Deanery and Archdeaconry of Gloucester, and in the Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. Direct road is through Uphatherley and the Reddings. It has a joint station of the Midland and Great Western Railway Companies, and also a Telegraph Station. The church of St. Bartholomew, which is built on the summit of an outlier of the Cotswolds, is a very ancient structure in the Norman style, with nave, aisle, chancel, Parvise porch, and square tower containing five bells. On the inside of the tower wall there is this remarkable inscription—

THIS BEL HOWS WAS BYYLDEDE
IN THE YERE OF OVR LORD GOD 1601.

The hill upon which it is built is called Chosen Hill, from which the village is supposed to have derived its name. There is an ancient Roman encampment on the summit of this hill. The register dates from 1563. The living is a vicarage of the annual value of £300, and is in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Bristol. The Rev. F. Smithe, M.A., LL.D., F.G.S., &c., vicar. There is an endowed school for boys and girls; master, Mr. Swift. The lord of the manor is Joseph Lovegrove, Esq. Area, 2,559 acres. Hucclecote is an ancient hamlet of Churchdown, but is now a separate parish.

Coberley, a village and parish in Cheltenham Union, and County Court district, four and a half miles south-by-east from Cheltenham, in the eastern division of the county, partly in Bradley hundred and partly in that of Rapsgate, rural Deanery of Stonehouse, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, and Diocese of Gloucester and Bistol. The direct way to it is by the Cirencester-road, through Charlton Kings. The ancient stone church of St. Giles contains some interesting monuments of Crusaders and mural tablets. There is a chapel attached to the church in which is a leper window. The church was rebuilt in 1869; there are three bells. The register dates from 1539. The living is a rectory, value £450 per annum, with residence and 17 acres of glebe land, in the gift of John Henry Elwes, Esq. The rector is the Rev. Charles Henry Wilson, A.M. There is a day and Sunday School. The Baptists have a chapel here; services, Sundays, 11 a.m. and 2.30 p.m. The Seven Springs, one of the sources of the river Thames, are in this parish. Coberley Court is a farm. Population 328; area 3,418 acres.

Compton Abdale is a village and parish in Northleach Union, containing about 180 inhabitants, and has an area of 2,215 acres, in the Deanery of Northleach, Archdeaconry of Bristol, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. It is about nine miles from Cheltenham, and may be reached by taking the London-road and passing through the village of Charlton Kings, by Andoversford, thence to the right. The visitor's direct way is by the Cirencester road, through Charlton Kings. The river Churn courses through this parish. St. Mary's Church—a good example of a small and simple Early English Church—consists of nave and chancel, with an embattled tower in which are six bells. Against the north wall of the chancel is a monumental tomb of a male figure, and a lion couchant at his feet; the inscription is quite lost. The living is a rectory of the annual value of £330, with residence; 73 acres of glebe land are included in this valuation. It is in the gift of the Lord Chancellor. Rector, the Rev. W. W. Liddell. R. Richardson-Gardner, Esq., M.P. for Windsor, lord of the manor, resides in a handsome and spacious stone mansion, delightfully situated on the side of a hill; the pleasure grounds are very judiciously laid out, and beautified by an ornamental trout stream. Elmstone Hardwicke is a village and parish, two and a half miles from Cheltenham. Its ancient name was Almondeston. It is in the eastern division of the county, in the lower part of the hundred of Westminster, in the union and county court district of Tewkesbury, in the Rural Deanery of Winchcombe, in the Archdeaconry of Gloucester, and in the Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The direct way to it is by the Tewkesbury-road. The ancient church of Mary Magdalene is in the Norman style, and was built about 1125; it has nave, chancel, south aisle, and an embattled tower, with grotesque heads projecting from the angles, and four bells. There are dates on the church bells, 1618, 1675. There are two carved figures on the west side, supposed to be playing on musical instruments. The date on the communion plate is 1516. The date of the register is 1564. The living, a vicarage, value £233 per annum, is in the gift of the Lord Chancellor. Vicar, the Rev. John Byron, A.M. The church has been re-seated and restored at a cost of about £1,500. The advowson of the vicarage was purchased by the late Lord Ellenborough shortly before his death, and the value annually is now increased to £300. The lords of the manor are the Ecclesiastical Commissioners. Area, 2,513 acres. Population, 440. Uckington is a hamlet in this parish, anciently belonging to the church of St. Dennis. The Earl of Oxford, at the beginning of the last century, held the manor, and at his death in 1742, it passed to Joseph Berwick, Esq., of Worcester.

Gloucester

Gloucester, an ancient city and county in itself, is the seat of a bishopric and capital of Gloucestershire, situated locally in the hundred of Dudstone and Kings Barton; it is distant 114 miles from London, *via* Great Western Railway, and nine miles south-west from Cheltenham.

The modern part of the city occupies a pleasant situation on an eminence on the banks of the Severn, and it has an easy descent every way towards the suburbs from the Cross, where the principal streets intersect each other at right angles, as in most cities of Roman origin.

The city is one of the most ancient in England, and the Iberians, who named it Glevum, made a settlement here; the ancient Britons called it *Caer Glow*. When the Romans arrived, it became a strongly fortified military station, that the Silures, a powerful Iberian people, who occupied the western side of the Severn, might be effectually resisted. It was one of the cities which formed part of the kingdom of the Middle Angles or Mercia in 584, and it was a post of importance, being situated on the banks of the navigable river Severn. The beauty and situation of this ancient stronghold were soon appreciated by the Normans, for the Conqueror often held his court and spent his festive season here, in the company of many of the nobles and clergy of the nation. The Empress Maude took refuge here in 1141, on her escape from Devizes Castle, and this city took part with her when she endeavoured to take the crown from the usurper Stephen. Here, in 1216, Henry III., then ten years old, was crowned. Parliaments have been held there—once in 1378 by Richard II., and another in 1407, by Henry IV. Richard III., in 1483, after his coronation, came to this city, and thence issued the order for the murder of his two nephews. In the time of the Civil Wars, Gloucester early declared for the Parliament, and resolved to defend the place when summoned to surrender on the 10th of August, 1643; and though the King made use of every effort to reduce the city, he was successfully resisted. James II. visited Gloucester in 1687, George III. in 1788, George IV., when Prince of Wales, in 1807, and her present Majesty, when Princess Victoria, abode one night at the late King's Head Hotel, which stood then in Westgate-street.

The Cathedral is a magnificent structure, and gives fine examples of various styles of Saxon, Norman, and English Church Architecture. Formerly this Cathedral Church was a Benedictine convent, dedicated to St. Peter, but at the dissolution of the abbey by Henry VIII., in 1541, it was founded as a cathedral, and consecrated to the Holy and Undivided Trinity, and made the see of a bishop; now, however, it is united to that of Bristol. This cathedral stands in and occupies one side of the College-green; it is 421 feet long by 144 feet wide, built on the site of a former monastery, which was destroyed by fire 1088; part of the present edifice, it is supposed, was built in 1089, but it was not

completed until some time in the fifteenth century. The entire shell of this structure, it is thought, was erected by the Saxons, but altered and cut about by the Normans and their successors—therefore it exhibits several various styles, from the period of the Norman accession down to our own times. Upon entering the cathedral by the great western door, the whole length of the nave appears to the view; the aisles are separated from it by fourteen large circular pillars, each about 21 feet in circumference. The choir is a very fine specimen of the perpendicular style, extending to the first column in the nave. The tower is over the centre of the choir, and from the ground to the top of the pinnacles is 225 feet high. The transept presents some excellent specimens of the Early Norman style. The "Ladye Chapel," in a line with the choir, is entered under a richly ornamented arch, and is judiciously attached to the choir, so that the light from the great east window is not much obstructed. This cathedral for many years has suffered much from neglect and great dilapidation. Recently very considerable efforts have been made to remedy this neglect. The restorations already effected are very extensive, including the interior of the nave, its north and south aisles, the exterior of the west end of the nave, the north and south clerestories, and an entirely new roof to the north aisles. These and many other parts have been beautifully restored. The expenses of these external and internal repairs are calculated at £45,000. A new reredos, from designs of Sir G. Scott, has been erected by the Freemasons of the Province, at a cost of £1,200.

The Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol comprises the county of Gloucester, the Deaneries of Malmesbury, Cricklade (in Wiltshire), the city of Bristol, and the parishes of Bedminster and Abbots Leigh, in Somerset, and is divided into two Archdeaconries, Gloucester and Bristol, and 18 Deaneries, containing 459 benefices and 1,000,503 acres.

The King's or College School, near the cathedral, was founded by Henry VIII. It is maintained by the Dean and Chapter, by whom the head and second masters are appointed. It is not free, but open to all who desire a first-class education.

The Crypt Grammar School was founded in 1539, by Alderman John Cooke, of Gloucester.

The Blue Coat Hospital, Eastgate-street, was founded by Sir Thomas Rich; in 1666.

The Gloucester Poor School, Northgate-street, was opened in 1813, for 200 boys.

There is a National School in the London-road, and British schools in Hampden-place. There are schools on the National system connected with the several churches in the city. Sunday schools were originated and put into practical operation by Mr. Raikes, a printer, an intelligent and philanthropic gentleman of the city, in the year 1781.

Gloucester

The County Gaol, built in 1791, at a cost of £35,000, stands in the north hamlet, on the site of the old castle. It is a penitentiary as well as a separate prison. It was erected on a plan suggested by Howard.

The Docks.—Gloucester possesses a command of much inland navigation, and employs a large number of boat and barge men. It has been an inland port for centuries, but the Severn was not navigable for large vessels. Therefore the Gloucester and Berkeley Ship Canal was constructed. This canal extends 17 miles on a dead level, and terminates in two commodious docks, surrounded by extensive wharves and lofty and roomy warehouses. The rails of the Midland and Great Western Railway Companies are laid to the dock side. There are two spacious dry docks, and extensive slips for the construction of vessels of large tonnage. Gloucester has a considerable foreign trade, particularly with the Baltic. It imports largely corn, timber, wines and spirits; and exports iron, salt, malt, coal, culm, bricks, and pottery.

Kemerton is a village and parish 11 miles from Cheltenham. It is in the eastern division of the county, in the lower division of the hundred of Tewkesbury, in the Rural Deanery of Campden, in the Archdeaconry of Gloucester, and in the Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The direct way to it is by the Evesham-road, or by the Midland Railway to Ashchurch, three miles from Kemerton. St. Nicholas' church is a fine edifice in the Decorated style, and consists of nave, aisles, chancel and porch, rebuilt in 1847; the old square tower contains six bells and a clock. Leckhampton—Leigh

Leckhampton is a parish partly in the borough and wholly in the union of Cheltenham. The original village is distant about two miles (which is most easily got at from the Bath-road) from Cheltenham, of which it now forms one of the most important suburbs. The population is reckoned at about 3,265, and the area occupies some 1,330 acres, in the Deanery of Winchcomb, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, hundred of Cheltenham. The rectory is in the patronage of the Rev. Charles Brandon Trye, M.A., J.P., Hon. Canon of Gloucester and Rural Dean, who is also lord of the manor, chairman of the Leckhampton Local Board, and chairman of the Board of Guardians of the Cheltenham Union; it is valued at £400 per annum, with residence.

The Church is an ancient edifice, dedicated to St. Peter, consisting of nave, chancel, north and south aisles, and porch, with a tower, surmounted by a spire, containing a peal of six bells. The oldest part of the structure dates from the early part of the fourteenth century. Within the sacred edifice is a beautiful tablet of white marble, surmounted with a globe and a ship sailing round it erected to the memory of the last male descendent of Drake, the circumnavigator of the globe. Formerly the living was in the possession of the Norwoods, a family of historic interest, one of whom, a Colonel Norwood, sacrificed his life and property on behalf of the ill-fated Charles. To Charles Brandon Trye, an eminent surgeon, connected with the Norwood family, a handsome monument was built in Gloucester Cathedral. The church, dedicated to St. Philip and St. James, built 1840, is in the incumbency of the Rev. William Henry Hutchinson, M.A. A small Baptist chapel is found in Leckhampton. There are two National schools, one in each church district. The hills in the neighbourhood rise to the height of 925 feet above the level of the sea; from thence we are gratified by a beautiful prospect of the vale, extending from Worcestershire, bounded by the Shropshire and Malvern hills on one side, and the Somersetshire on the other. In the front, Gloucester, Tewkesbury, and Upton, appear with the majestic meandering Severn.

“The village stream swelled to a river,
And the river was a kingdom's wealth.”

Bounding the horizon in the far distance, may be seen on a clear day, the Welsh Mountains.

North Cerney is a village and parish in Cirencester Union, containing 4026 acres, and having a population of about 688 souls, in the hundred of Rapsgate, Deanery of Cirencester, Archdeaconry of Bristol, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. It is about 11 miles from Cheltenham, on the Cirencester road. From remains which at one time and another have been found, North Cerney is believed to have been a Roman station. Like Cirencester, it derives its name from the stream, locally called the Churn, which, rising at the Severn springs, is really the beginning of the river Thames. The church is a cruciform structure dedicated to All Saints, the architecture representing both the Norman and the Gothic styles: it has a tower and six bells. A sum of £23 per annum is the income of a bequest left for the repair of the church. A National school exists here for children of both sexes. Woodmancote and Calmsden are small hamlets of this parish, the latter, which possesses a beautiful wayside cross, about two miles east near the old Roman Foss Way.

It is about six miles from Cheltenham, and may be visited by taking the Evesham road and passing through the villages of Bishops Cleeve and Woolstone. The living is a perpetual curacy attached to the rectory of the adjoining parish of Woolstone, valued at £86 per annum, in the incumbency of the Rev. Gilbert Coventry, and the patronage of the Earl of Coventry. The Church is a small ancient building, dedicated to St. John the Baptist. There is a school for children of both sexes, erected in 1862, by the late Earl of Ellenborough, who was lord of the manor and chief land owner; also a piece of worship belonging to the Countess of Huntingdon's connexion.

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Prestbury is a parish in Cheltenham Union, to which it sends two Guardians; it is situated a mile and a half from Cheltenham, and contains 1,373 inhabitants, with 3,022 acres; in the Deanery of Winchcomb, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, hundred of Deerhurst, East Gloucestershire. Formerly an important market town it was burnt down in Henry the Seventh's reign. The

name indicates that it was formerly a dwelling place for priests, and local historians tell us a college for their education once existed here. The vicarage, in the incumbency of the Rev. J. Edwards, jun., M.A., is valued at £230 per annum, with residence, and 23 acres of glebe land, and is in the patronage of the Rev. J. Edwards, M.A., J.P. The church is an ancient gothic edifice, dedicated to St. Mary, of the style of the thirteenth and fifteenth centuries, and contains nave, chancel, north and south aisles, with a high embattled tower, and a peal of six bells, and some handsome mural tablets to the De la Bere, Capel, and other families; also some beautiful stained glass windows. There is a National school for children of both sexes. The poor have charitable bequests, and an Almhouse was given in 1720, by Ann Goodrich. A Chapel was opened here on the 16th of May, 1866, by the Independents: it will seat about 250. The principal Inn is the King's Arms, near to which is the Post Office, kept by Mr. T. Liddiard.

The road leading to the church is very prettily adorned with a fine avenue of trees, and the sacred edifice itself, situated as it is on an elevated spot, commanding a fine view of the surrounding country, is well worthy of a visit.

The church is in the Norman and Early English styles, dedicated to Saint Lawrence, having a hexagonal tower of unequal sides containing four bells. The living is valued at £496 per annum, including residence, and 33 acres of glebe land; in the patronage of the Rev. John Gilbert Day. There is a National school for children of both sexes, under the management of the Rector. There are charitable bequests for the poor, producing about £18 per annum. Hugh S. Tewkesbury

Tewkesbury is an ancient borough market town and parish, the principal town in the Union from which it derives its name. It contains about 5,800 inhabitants and 2,353 acres of land; in the Deanery of Winchcombe, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, hundred of Tewkesbury, on the banks of the Avon, near the confluence with the Severn, and between the small rivers Carron and Swilgate, which are feeders of the Avon. It is about nine miles from Cheltenham by road or rail; if we go thither by rail we use the Midland railway, if by road we proceed till we arrive at Coombe Hill and then turn to the right. The history of Tewkesbury carries us back to Saxon times; the first lords of the manor and founders of the town were two Saxon dukes of Mercia, Dodo and Odo; the present lord of the manor is John Martin, Esq., of Ledbury.

The borough since passing of the last Reform Act, sends but one member to Parliament, formerly it sent two. The present member is Captain Price. The corporate body consists of a mayor, four aldermen, and twelve common councillors; the manufacture of hosiery, brewing and malting are carried on here. Though many have been pulled down, there are yet several old houses left which makes the visit to Tewkesbury one of interest. The neighbourhood of Tewkesbury is liable to be inundated, hence one of the causes of its stationary character. The Abbey Church, dedicated to St. Mary the Virgin, was originally founded in 715. The present church was built by Fitz Hannon, and consecrated in 1121. It exhibits some of the finest specimens of architecture in the Norman and decorated styles; it consist of nave, choir, transept, and several chapels, with north and south aisles, in length from east to west it is 300 feet, the transept being 120 feet in length, the height 66 feet, 70 feet wide in the choir, 100 feet at the west front, and the tower 152 feet high. The living is a vicarage, valued at £400 per annum with residence, in the incumbency of the Rev. Heming Robeson, M.A., in the patronage of the Lord Chancellor. The church of the Holy Trinity, erected by public subscription in 1837, is capable of accommodating 600 worshippers, one-third of the sittings being free; the living is a perpetual curacy in the incumbency of the Rev. Francis J. Scott, M.A., valued at £340 per annum, in the patronage of trustees.

Whittington is a village and parish five miles east-south-east from Cheltenham, in the eastern division of the county, hundred of Bradley, union of Northleach, county court district of Cheltenham, Rural Deanery of Winchcombe, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, and Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The way to it is the London-road, to the left opposite Sandywell-park. The church, name unknown, is a small ancient edifice in the Norman style, with late additions, consisting of nave and chancel. Here are several figures of Crusades, and mural tablets to the memory of the Tracey and other families. The register dates from 1538. The living is a rectory and valued at £350 per annum, with residence. It is in the gift of Christian William Lawrence, Esq. Rector, the Rev. Anthony C. Lawrence, B.A. There is a school for boys and girls, endowed by the late Mrs. Lightbourne, of Sandywell-park. Walter Lawrence Lawrence, Esq., is lord of the manor. Area, 1,422 acres; population, 217. Sireford is a hamlet of this parish.

Winchcombe

Winchcombe is an ancient borough and market town, on the banks of the small river Isborne, which joins the Avon at Evesham, the principal town in the union to which it gives its name, containing 2,997 inhabitants, and having an area of 5,700 acres, in the Deanery of Winchcombe, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, the lower division of Kiftsgate hundred. It is about seven miles from Cheltenham, on the Prestbury-road through Southam. The scenery after passing Southam is very beautiful. It is pleasantly situated in a valley near the base of the northern portion of the Cotswold hills, and was formerly the metropolis of the kingdom of Mercia, and by our Saxon forefathers was called *Wincelcombe*. It has been a borough by prescription from an early date, and the municipal body consists of two bailiffs and ten burgesses, who are appointed at the court leet of the lord of the manor; their jurisdiction is very limited, and the offices may be considered as nearly obsolete, the principal governing body now being the county magistrates, who hold petty sessions at the Town-hall on the last Friday in each month. The Town-hall, in the centre of the town, is a handsome Elizabethan edifice lately rebuilt. The lord of the manor is John Coucher Dent, Esq. The vicarage, with the chapelry of Gretton annexed, is valued at £400 per annum with residence, in the incumbency of the Rev. Robert Noble Jackson, M.A., and the patronage of Lord Sudeley. The church is a large handsome edifice in the Perpendicular style, dedicated to Saint Peter, and was erected by the parishioners, assisted by Ralph, Lord Boteler, Baron of Sudeley, in the reign of Henry VI. It consists, of nave, chancel, north and south aisles, with an embattled tower containing a peal of six bells. The church has recently been thoroughly restored, at an expense of more than £3,000. There is also a beautiful church at Sudeley Castle, and the Rev. R. N. Jackson is the rector. There are excellent schools for children of both sexes, also an Infant school holding 150, and the use of a Reading-room, provided at the cost of W. Smith, Esq. Lady Chandos, in the reign of James I., founded a Grammar school for fourteen boys, natives of the town, to which the Trustees have added ten more as supernumeraries, who enter on their foundation in their turn. A new school-room has been built, calculated to hold about 70 boys. The Master is Mr. T. C. Webb. The King's School for ten boys, which was founded by Henry VIII., and Townshend's Charity School for seventy children, which was founded in 1683, have been merged by the Trustees into one. The Baptists and Wesleyans have places of worship here; Baptist Minister, Rev. R. Salt; Wesleyan Minister, Rev. T. Harbottle. Ten alms-houses, for persons in reduced circumstances, five men and five women, poor tradespeople, have been erected out of funds left by John and William Dent, Esqrs., as well as a school for children of both sexes. The market day is on Saturday; a cattle fair is held on the 6th May, and extensive horse fairs on the last Saturday in March and the 28th July, which are attended by dealers from all parts of the kingdom.

Sudeley Manor—Witcombe

Sudeley Manor is a parish in Winchcombe Union, containing 78 inhabitants, and having an area of 2,622 acres, in the Deanery of Winchcombe, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, hundred of Kiftsgate. It is about eight miles from Cheltenham, south-east from Winchcombe. The rectory is in the incumbency of the Rev. R. Noble Jackson, M.A., of Winchcombe, and is valued at £45 per annum, and in the patronage of John Coucher Dent, Esq. The church is a Gothic edifice, dedicated to St. Mary, consisting of nave and chancel, and contains an elegant and costly monument to the memory of Queen Catherine Parr. John Coucher Dent, Esq., is lord of the manor and chief landowner.

Sudeley Castle is a place of great historical interest, it was built by Ralph de Boteler, treasurer and lord high admiral of England, in the time of Henry VI. It was here that Queen Catherine Parr, widow of Henry VIII., who afterwards married the high admiral Lord Seymour, of Sudeley (brother to the Duke of Somerset, the Protector) died in childbed, 5th of September, 1584, and was buried in the parish church of Sudeley with great pomp, Miles Coverdale preaching the funeral sermon. It was sadly mutilated and disfigured by the Parliamentarians under Cromwell, but has since been restored, and is now the residence of John Coucher Dent, Esq.

Witcombe, or Witcombe Magna, is a parish in Cheltenham Union, containing 165 inhabitants, and with an area of 918 acres; in the Deanery and Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, hundred of Dudstone and Kings Barton. It is six miles from Cheltenham. The best way to it is by the Bath road, Stroud road through Shurdington to Horseferry bridge, thence to the left for nearly a mile on the Cirencester road. The scenery *en route* is very varied. The rectory, in the incumbency of the Rev. John Rawlin Trye, M.A., is valued at £100 per annum, with residence, and is in the patronage of Lady Cromie. The church is an ancient edifice; dedicated to Saint Mary, consisting of chancel and aisle, with tower containing two bells. There is a school for children of both sexes. Lady Cromie is lady of the manor and principal landowner.

Withington is a village and parish $7\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Cheltenham, in the eastern division of the county, hundred of Bradley, union and county court district of Northleach, Rural Deanery of Winchcombe, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, and Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The direct way to it is through Charlton Kings and Dowdeswell. The church of Saint Michael is an ancient lofty edifice in the Norman style, with additions of late date. It was restored in 1872 and 1873, and consists of nave, chancel, embattled tower, with clock and chimes: on the south side of the nave, is a handsome monument to Sir John Howe, his wife, and eight children, and a number of tablets on the walls: this was formerly the burial place of that family. The register dates from 1609. The living is a rectory, and valued at £650 per annum, with residence. It is in the gift of the Bishop of the Diocese. Rector, the Hon. Rev. George Gustavus Chetwynd Talbot, A.M. A beautiful stained glass east window, by Messrs. Heaton, Butler, and Baine, has lately been put up as a memorial to the Hon. Woolstone is a small village and parish five and a half miles north from Cheltenham, the eastern division of the county, lower division of the hundred of Deerhurst, union and county court district of Tewkesbury, rural Deanery of Winchcombe, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, and Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, on the Cotswold range of hills. The way to it is by the Evesham road, from whence it lies half a mile to the right. St. Martin's church is an ancient stone edifice, beautifully restored by the present Rector, and consists of nave, chancel, and square tower, with three bells, and a porch, a recumbent stone figure is in the chancel. The date of the register is from 1650. The living, a rectory, valued at £160 annually and 33 acres of glebe land, is in the gift of the Earl of Coventry. Rector, the Rev. Gilbert George Coventry, B.A., vicar of the adjoining parish of Oxenton. A clock has been presented to the church by Miss Shapland, made by Benson and Co. The rectory house is most beautifully situated and commands extensive views. At the back of the rectory, upon the hill, are the remains of an old Roman encampment. Earl of Coventry is lord of the manor. Area, 787 acres; population, 81.
