

CHELTENHAM.

Cheltenham has gained such a celebrity on account of the salubrity of its climate, its health restoring springs, and picturesque drives, as to render its past history a matter of interest. Its transformation from an obscure village into the "Queen of Watering Places," attracting the titled and wealthy from all parts of the world, is one of the most striking facts in modern topography. A visitor to Cheltenham sixty-five years ago would have found in the centre of the present High-street a running stream crossed here and there by rude stepping stones. The testimony of persons now living, as well as official documents, unquestionably prove that a century ago the town presented all the appearance of a straggling village. The parish register records at this period but three or four deaths and christenings annually, and even so late as the year 1780, we have traced in the Morning Post, a letter from a visitor descanting upon the beauties of the place, but complaining from the remote nature of the locality that he could not obtain a lodging even for a single night. A more retired, rural, unfrequented part of England was, perhaps, scarcely to be found at that time. In this obsolete condition it would in all human probability have remained had not the mineral waters been discovered. But, notwithstanding that subsequent to the first knowledge of the existence of salubrious springs, Cheltenham was a most insignificant place, yet, prior to that memorable event, it was of historic note and enjoyed important chartered privileges.

Cheltenham is situated in a diversified vale, encircled by the eververdant and romantic Cotswold Hills, covering a space of 1,200 acres, within a circumference of twenty miles. Taking into consideration the rustic and pastoral character of the ancient Britons, we shall not feel surprised to find that our locality was known to them. Their former occupancy of the place is proved by the discovery of a large number of British stone coffins on the land known as "Paradise," near the old workhouse. The frequent disinterment of Roman jars, coins, and pottery, and the existence of extensive and ments on all the surrounding hills, demonstrate perfect encampthe present town was part of the Roman territory that the site of

To Queen Elizabeth, once lady of the manor, we stand indebted for the establishment of the first local public charity. Her Majesty gave a variety of lands to Richard Pates, Esq., to enable him to found the Free Grammar School, in the High-street, and the Alms Houses in Albion-street, which bear his name. During this queen's reign the town appears to have fallen from a state of prosperity, for we learn that W Norwood, Esq., the then lord of the manor, presented to her Majesty a petition humbly praying that the inhabitants might in future be excused from the trouble and expense of sending two members to Parliament, as had been the practice in former times. In consequence of this application the town was disenfranchised, its two parliamentary members were never again sent, and the place was unrepresented until the passing of the Reform Bill, since which event it has returned one member, being now represented by J. T. Agg-Gardner, Esq.

The ancient commercial trade appears to have been corn and tobacco. The old market occupied the site of the Plough Hotel, and on its removal the date 1101 was found on one of the foundation stones. A butter cross stood but a short distance from the Public Offices, on the left, which was blown down by a violent storm, about half a century since.

Tobacco was cultivated to some extent in the seventeenth century. Its growth was at length put a stop to by the Parliament of

Charles I., levying a fine upon all who raised it for traffic.

From the circumstance of Cheltenham being a Royal manor, it became an object of attack during the period of the memorable civil wars in the reign of Charles I. Oliver Cromwell several times drove the royalists from the place, and held possession for several months. The most important engagement appears to have taken place on the spot now occupied by St. James's-square, for at different times various skeletons and "relics of the battle field" have been, and still continue not unfrequently to be exhumed. The population of the place has undergone great vicissitudes. The number who anciently resided here can only be gleaned from historical writers, and they reveal in one reign a state of prosperity, and in a succeeding reign a state of adversity. The only certain data from which we can commence and continue our account of the population with certainty, begins with the reign of Charles II., for at that time the census was first taken, and has since been continued without interruption. In 1666 the number of inhabitants were 1500, in 1821 they were 13,388, in 1,831 they were 22,941, and in 1841, 36,617; in 1851, 39,591; the last time the census was taken, there were 39,590. In all probability, at the period we write, the number of persons residing within the limits of the

Cheltenham Union will exceed 50,000. These figures demonstrate the rapid rise and increase of the town in a far more striking manner than can be done by the most lengthy prose detail. In whatever street the visitor may now chance to turn, elegant shops with plate glass windows meet his eye, and an abundance of tradesmen display their names catering for public support. But 50 years ago there was but one resident physician and apothecary in the town, the justly celebrated Dr. Jenner; and beyond the markets, few opportunities were afforded to the residents of obtaining the necessary commodities of life.

The original cause of this rapid growth was undoubtedly the discovery of the mineral waters and their subsequent patronage by Royalty. For the guidance of visitors the following few remarks may be of service respecting these waters:—They may be advantageously drunk at any season of the year except the middle of winter, the best time being the morning. They should be taken, in almost all cases at the springs. The dose for an adult is from a pint to a pint-and-a-half, taken in two portions, with an interval of about twenty minutes between them, and

that they should be continued for about five weeks.

The only real chalybeate water is to be obtained at the Cambray Spa, whose Pump Room, an octagonal building, is situated at the southern end of Rodney-terrace. The following is an analysis of this Spa's waters:—

The Montpellier waters were discovered in 1808, and, ten years later, the present handsome Pump Room was erected. It measures 70 feet in length by 25 feet in width. A colonnade supplies an agreeable

place for a "constitutional" in wet weather. A new Pump Room, called the Rotunda, was added in 1826. We furnish analyses of three of the springs:—

But Pittville (so called from its owner J. Pitt, Esq., who, on the discovery of the spring in 1822, commenced laying out the estate with great liberality and a refined taste, and who in 1825-30 built the Pump

Room,) is the great glory of Cheltenham. The principal chamber in the Pump Room measures 84 feet by 38 feet, and is 34 feet high. It is 130 feet in length externally, is surmounted by a dome, and encircled by a colonnade.

alkaline; the taste, saline; the smell, that of sulphuretted hydrogen. From carbonic acid, 32.705 cubic inches; specific gravity, at 60° Fah-

renheit, 1.0064.

The arrivals from that time include the principal nobility of the nation, and the beauty and salubrious climate of the district soon made many permanent residents. In later years, the establishment of the Cheltenham Proprietary College, Bath-road, largely augmented the population—the superior educational advantages attracting families from all parts of the United Kingdom. The Ladics' College, Bayshill, offers similar advantages to the daughters of gentlemen. These institutions, together with Church of England Training Colleges, and other large and well-conducted Establishments, have given the town a high position in the educational world.

Having briefly sketched the past, we must ask our readers to judge of the present for themselves, feeling assured that an hour's drive or an afternoon's stroll round its delightful streets will enable them to carry away a better, fresher, and clearer idea of the beauties of Cheltenham, than all the books that can be written; while the matter contained in this Directory will supply the necessary information. Beyond the streets and drives of Cheltenham, however, there are attractions which will afford the visitor a gratification of no ordinary kind, and which, if sought after, will be highly conducive to health, viz., the natural beauties of

its environs.

For an inland place, we think no finer spot for the study of the picturesque can be found, there being every conceivable variety of scenery. This arises from its peculiar geographical position—the town forming a vale surrounded by lofty and craggy hills. These upland situations are at so short a distance that they may be easily visited, and the prospect from their summits is of the most varied and picturesque description.

In order to show how elevated are these miniature mountains, and how distant must be the prospect they afford, we annex the heights of four of the adjacent hills, as decided by the trigonometrical survey, published by Sir R. J. Murchison, Bart., President of the London Geological

Agg's Hill.

"Then Aewlett's see, fronting the western breeze, But from the east well screened by thickest keep, From whence is seen the wide extended dale, With all the beauties of the adjacent vale."

One of the many frequented drives and walks which lie contiguous to

the town is that of Hewlett's or Agg's Hill. It is in a line with Hewlett-street and Jersey-place. The road rises very gradually, and as the tourist ascends, his eye on the left is gratified by the prospect of Hewlett's. The situation is commanding, and from the hill may be witnessed a view, rich in the varying tints of nature, and embellished with some worthy efforts of art. From the summit may be seen

"Both Tewks'bury and Glo'ster's ancient towers, Unless the mist or rising tempest lours; With Bredon's huge and British alps, that rise Near Malvern's village, pointing to the skies. Then farther south the Cambrian hills uprear Their lofty heads, and to the eye appear But indistinct, light robed in dusky grey, Or with the sky immingling fade away."

Agg's Hill is celebrated as the spot where a landslip took place in 1839. This event caused a considerable sensation at the time, and attracted, for a long period, a considerable number of spectators. It was similar to the landslip which occurred at Seaton, in Devonshire, about the same time, although we are happy to record, less serious in its effects. Near the base of the hill will be found reservoirs which supply the town with hill water.

Apperley an hamlet of Deerhurst. (See Deerhurst.)

Ashchurch is a large parish about six miles from Cheltenham, comprising the tything and hamle of Aston-upon-Carrant, Fiddington, Northway, and Pamington, also the hamlets of Natton and Newton. It is in the Union of Tewkesbury, and has a population of 725 souls; area, 4,201 acres; in the Deanery of Winchcomb, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, in the lower division of Tewkesbury Hundred.

It is on the main road from Tewkesbury to Winchcomb, and is most easily got at from Cheltenham by the Midland Railway. The Church consisting of nave, chancel, north aisle with porch, and a fine tower with a peal of six bells, is an ancient and commodious edifice, dedicated to Saint Nicholas; in the incumbency of the Rev. T. G. Harwood. The living is valued at £321 per annum, and is in the patronage of the Rev. C. N. Williams, M.A. There is a school for children of both sexes. Mrs. Evans is lady of the manor.

Badgworth is a parish in the Cheltenham Union, pearly 4 miles from Cheltenham, having four hamlets, Bentham, Little Shurdington, Reddings, and Little Witcombe. It can be reached either by way of Lansdown and Uphatherley, or through Shurdington. It contains a population of about 1,200, and has an area of 3,927 acres, in the Deanery of Winchcomb, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, upper division of Dudstone and King's Barton

Hundred, East Gloucestershire.

Formerly at Badgworth a monastery existed from the eleventh century to the time of the general dissolution, and a chapel, dedicated to Saint Margaret was attached to the church, which is still in existence. A mineral spring exists similar to the waters at Cheltenham. vicarage, with Great Shurdington annexed, is in the incumbency of the Rev. Alfred William Ellis Viner, B.A. The joint annual value is £295 with residence. The Principal and Fellows of Jesus College, Oxford, are the impropriators of the rectorial tithes. The Church is in the Decorated and Perpendicular style of architecture, and is an ancient structure, dedicated to the Holy Trinity, consisting of chancel, nave, chapel, and a handsome embattled tower, with six bells. There are National Schools for children of both sexes, and there are charitable bequests for the benefit of the poor and apprenticing poor children. Near Uphatherley, is an Independent chapel.

Barnwood is a parish in Gloucester Union, containing 619 inhabitants and 1,471 acres; it is eight miles distant from Cheltenham, and may be visited either by way of the Gloucester road or by taking the train to Gloucester, and then passing through the village of Wootton. It is about a mile-and-a-half from Gloucester, in the Deanery and Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, the upper division of Dudstone Hundred.

The vicarage is in the incumbency of the Rev. Wm. Jas. Kennedy, is valued at £300 per annum, and is in the patronage of the Dean and The Church, which is dedicated to Saint Chapter of Gloucester. Lawrence, consists of a double chancel, nave, and narrow aisle, with a low embattled tower; there is a double bell turret on the eastern gable of the nave. It has interesting specimens of Norman, early English, and perpendicular architecture. Barnwood has a school for children of both sexes, and there are some small charities for the poor.

Barnwood House is an institution for the insane. It was established in 1860, and will accommodate about 50 of each sex. It is under the superintendence and management of Dr. Needham.

Beckford is a parish and village in Winchcomb Union, containing about 486 inhabitants and 2,650 acres; in the Deanery of Campden, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol,

Hundred of Tibbaldstone, on the river Carrant.

It is about nine miles from Cheltenham, and is reached by taking the Cleeve road, passing through Bishops Cleeve; or if visited by rail, we go to Ashchurch by the Midland Railway, and from thence to Beckford. The living, with the Chapelry of Ashton-under-Hill annexed. is an endowed vicarage, valued at £400 per annum, with residence and 213 acres of glebe land, and is in the incumbency of the Rev. Joseph Harrison, LL.B., who is patron of the living. The church is an ancient edifice in the Norman style, dedicated to St. John the Baptist, consisting of nave, chancel, and aisle, with an imposing tower rising from the centre, containing a peal of bells and a clock; the chancel arch and porch are two fine specimens of Norman architecture. There is a National school for children of both sexes. Beckford Hall is the seat of Hattil Foll, Esquire, J.P., who is lord of the manor; in the grounds is an avenue of box 160 yards in length. Grafton is a hamlet one mile north-east, Bangrone, another hamlet, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles south, and Didcot, a hamlet 11 miles east.

Berkeley Castle. The far famed Castle of Berkeley may be visited from this town, by the Bristol and Birmingham Railway, in three-quarters of an hour. It may be inspected Tuesdays and Fridays by permission from his Lordship, and the entrance door will be found by following the gravel walk at the gateway at the right of the church-yard. The castle is of very great antiquity, and is generally regarded as the only perfect monument of Norman castle

building in England. The rooms are numerous, and are filled with curiosities of value, in endless variety. Among the extensive collection of original paintings which ornament the apartments, are portraits of James I., Queen Elizabeth and Queen Mary, by Sir Peter Leby. Mary Queen of Scots, and Cromwell and others by Salvador Rosa, Holbein, and Claude Lorraine. James I. was a frequent guest at the castle, and the massive oak bedstead, made for his use, is still in excellent preservation. Two cabinets have been much admired, both on account of their antiquity and curious workmanship, one of them is entirely formed of tortoiseshell, and the other of brown oak. In another apartment is the chair, sofa, and bedstead, which formed part of the cabin furniture of Sir Francis Drake during his voyage round the world. But the portion of the edifice which possesses most interest, is the room where Edward II. was murdered, an event which has for ever perpetuated the name of Berkeley Castle. This room is a small square one, to the right of the keep staircase, gloomy to the extreme, and the mind shudders, when viewing it, at the recollection of the scene that was once enacted within its massive walls. It was in the dead of the night on September 21st, 1327, that the assassins entered this apartment, and after smothering the king with a bed, they burnt out his intestines with a red-hot iron. The ancient poet, Drayton, has thus described this atrocious deed:-

"The doors forth a fearful howling cast,
To let those in by whom he was to die;
At whose approach, while there he lies aghast,
Those ruthless villains did upon him fly.
And without human pity or remorse,
With a hot spit they thrust him to the heart."

Birdlip is a small hamlet formed out of the three parishes of Brimsfield in Cirencester Union, and Cowley and Witcombe in Cheltenham Union. It is about six miles from Cheltenham, and is reached by taking the Bath and Leckhampton roads. Situated on the "Lip" or brow of the Cotswolds, 976 feet above the sea, where the ancient British Irmine St. from Southampton, dips down the face of the hills. Many camps and barrows as at Rendcomb, Nettleton, Barrow-wake hill, Crickley, and Leckhampton, and the Kimbury above Painswick, mark the scene of battles with the Romans, on their march under Platius to Gloucester, in the years A.D. 43-44. Mounds showing the site of British Birdlip are seen in the field on the left, at the entrance into the village, as well as a portion of the Welsh (properly Wilt's) way, which beyond Brimsfield unites with the British Jack-way to Jackbarrow, and by Jackament bottom, into the Acman Street, to Bath.

A pleasant walk through Witcombe woods brings the visitor to the Roman villa, in the Sarn-dell under Cooper's hill, where a large entrenchment crowns the height. The White Horse of Berkshire, Swindon and Purton Stations, the Marlborough downs, and Wootten Basset can be seen from the Ridge above the village; and from the

Goorge Gardens are seen in the west the Holy Mount or Sugar Loaf, the Hatterills, the Beacons' of Brecon, with the Malvern and Abberley Hills, Worcester Cathedral, Tewkesbury Abbey, and the Clent Hills, with Hagley monument to the north. The Clee Hills and the Titterstone appear beyond Malvern.

The scenery en route is of a very varied character, hills, dales, woods, and meadows delightfully intermingle here. Cattle fairs are held annually, on the last Tuesday in April, and on the 8th of September. There is a Baptist Chapel, in which services are conducted at 11 a.m.

Bishops Cleeve is a parish, including the township of Bishops Cleeve, and the hamlets of Gotherington, Woodmancote, Southam, and Brockhampton, in Winchcomb Union, and Stoke Orchard, in Tewkesbury Union, containing in Winchcomb Union an area of 6,812 acres, and in Tewkesbury Union 1,331 acres, making a total of 8,150 acres; in the Deanery of Winchcomb, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, and, with its hamlets, forming the Hundred to

which it gives its name

BISHOPS CLEEVE is a township and village forming part of the above parish, containing by the last census 704 inhabitants, one mile north-east from the Cleeve Station on the Midland Railway, and 3\frac{1}{3} miles north of Cheltenham. The rectory, in the incumbency of the Rev. W. L. Townsend, who is non-resident, is valued at £1,570 per annum, with 240 acres of glebe land, and residence, which was formerly occupied by the Bishop of Worcester. The Church is one of the largest village churches in the county, it is dedicated to St. Michael, and consists of chancel, north and south aisles, with a tower having a noble Norman arch, and containing a peal of six bells. Bishops Cleeve has a board school for children of both sexes. On the hill are the "camps," a British encampment with double ramparts 300 yards in

length. A skirmish is said to have been fought here between the forces of Cromwell and Charles as Essex came down over Prestbury to raise the Seige of Gloucester. Skirmishes occured also at Battledown and Andoversford. There is a Saline spring in the parish called Alcester Spa. Joseph Lovegrove, Esq., is Lord of the Manor.

GOTHERINGTON is a hamlet of the above parish, containing, according to the last census, 408 inhabitants; one mile from Bishops Cleeve-5 north-west from Winchcomb, and 6 south-west from Tewkesbury.

WOODMANCOTE is a hamlet of the above parish, containing, by the last census, 507 inhabitants; one mile east from Cleeve. Lawrence Lawrence, Esq., is lord of the manor.

Southam and Brockhampton forms another hamlet of the above parish, containing, according to the last census, 264 inhabitants; three miles north-east from Cheltenham. There is a small chapel of ease, the private church of the late Earl of Ellenborough. Southam House, formerly the seat of the Earl of Ellenborough, is an ancient building, which Leland says was built in Henry VIII's reign. It is charmingly situated, commanding exquisite views of the vale of Gloucester and the Malvern hills.

STOKE ORCHARD forms another hamlet of Bishops Cleeve, though in the Tewkesbury Union, containing, according to the last census, 183 inhabitants. and 1,331 acres of land, in the Deanery of Winchcomb, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, hundred of Cleeve, East Gloucestershire, one mile north-west from Cleeve Station, on the Midland Railway, 4 south from Tewkesbury, 6 north-west from Cheltenham, and 10 north-east from Gloucester. It has all the privileges of a separate parish, levying its own poor rate, and appointing its own officers. There is a chapel of ease, an ancient stone building with one bell, also an Independent chapel. There is a National school for children of both sexes. Richard Rogers Coxwell Rogers, Esq., is the lord of the manor, and principal land owner.

Brimpsfield is a parish and village in Circucester Union, containing about 425 inhabitants and 2,611 acres, in the Rural Deanery of north Stonehouse, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, Hundred of Rapsgate, eastern division of the county.

It is about seven-and-a-half miles from Cheltenham, taking the road through Leckhampton and Birdlip. The living, a discharged rectory, with Cranham attached, is valued at £450 per annum, with residence and 32 acres of glebe land; Rector, the Rev. R. H. Denne, M.A.; is in the patronage of James Goodrich, Esq. The Church is an ancient edifice dedicated to Saint Michael, consisting of chancel and nave, with tower. The tower is thought to be a Priory of the Benedictines which existed here; the tower was afterwards erected at the east end, and the chancel was so added that the tower is nearly in the centre of the building. In the churchyard is an ancient Maltese cross. There is a Government National School for children of both sexes supported by voluntary contributions. The river Frome, or Stroudwater, rises in this landslip. T. Peddlebury, Esq., is lord of the manor, CAUDLE GREEN is an hamlet belonging to Brimpsfield. There was a castle in this parish, of which the moat is still existing, the foundations of which are below the surface. The direct road to it is the London-road. The river Chelt runs through this parish from east to west, its source being in the adjoining parish of Dowdeswell. Chedworth (Roman Villa) is a parish in the hundred of Rapsgate, in the county of Gloucester, four miles north-east of Northleach. its post town, and eleven miles south-south-east of Cheltenham, and seven from Circucester. The direct way from Cheltenham is by Londonroad, and through Dowdeswell and Withington. The drive en route is beautifully varied by hill and dale, copse and woods throughout. The village, with a population of 962, is exceedingly pretty, covering a large area of some four square miles, and being situated on the tableland of the Cotswolds, has a very bracing climate. dedicated to St. Andrew, is of Norman architecture. It possesses nave, western tower, and north aisle, with a gallery over the latter. Its windows on the south side are supposed to be late perpendicular, about 1480. There is a fine sculptured stone pulpit. The living is a vicarage. in the Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, value £450, in the patronage of Queen's College, Oxford. There is a very good National School for children of both sexes, under Government inspection. The Howe family took the title of Baron from Chedworth. The manor formerly belonged to the Earls of Warwick, and then descended to the Earl of Eldon. The Independents have an endowed chapel here. Roman Villa.—In the parish of Chedworth a remarkable discovery was made in the year 1866, by James Farrar, Esq. While digging out a ferret, some tesseræ were brought to light. Mr. Farrar's attention having been called to this, he undertook to prosecute the matter, and has uncovered a large area of land, which was then a coppice wood, and exposed to view the remains of a fine Roman villa. The cost of these

excavations, and the substantial coverings for the protection of this work of antiquity were defrayed by the Right Hon. the Earl of Eldon, upon whose estate it is situated. An interesting museum of objects brought to light during the excavations is attached. These remains are well worthy of inspection, and during the summer months are visited by travellers from all parts of England. There is a large and commodious hotel near, upon the "Foss Way," known as "Foss Bridge;" kept by Brother Berry.

Churchdown, a straggling village and parish, five miles by road and four by rail from Cheltenham, in the eastern division of the county, in the hundred of Dudstone and King's Barton, in the union and county court district of Gloucester, in the Rural Deanery and Archdeaconry of Gloucester and Bristol. The direct road is through Uphatherley and the Reddings. It has a joint station of the Midland and Great Western Railway Companies. The church of St. Bartholomew, which is built on the summit of an outlier of the Cotswolds, is a very ancient structure in the Norman style, with nave, aisle, chancel, Parvise porch, and square tower containing five bells. On the inside of the tower wall there is this remarkable inscription—

THIS BEL HOWS WAS BYYLDEDE IN THE YEERE OF OVE LORD GOD 1601.

The hill, 580 feet high, upon which it is built is called Chosen Hill, from which the village is supposed to have derived its name. There is an ancient Roman encampment on the summit of this hill. The register dates from 1563. The living is a vicarage of the annual value of £300, with 30 acres of glebe land and a residence, and is in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Bristol. The Rev. F. Cirencester. This very ancient borough returns one member to Parliament, and by the main road is 16 miles distant. The Church is a much admired editice, in the early English style, and abounds in monuments of brass. The Park, belonging to the Earl Bathurst, adjoining the town, is open to the public. It is 16 miles in circumference, and contains the finest Roman Villa in the county, a lofty pillar surmounted with a statue of Queen Anne, and a stone house where the poet Pope composed several of his poems. Cirencester contains 6,000 inhabitants.

Coberley is a village and parish in Cheltenham Union and County Court district, four-and-a-half miles south-by-east from Cheltenham, in the eastern division of the county, partly in Bradley hundred and partly in that of Rapsgate, rural Deanery of Stonehouse, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, and Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The direct way to it is by the Cirencester-road, through Charlton Kings. The ancient stone church of St. Giles contains some interesting monuments of Crusaders and mural tablets. There is a chapel attached to the church in which is a leper window. The church was rebuilt in 1869. The register dates from 1539. The living is a rectory, value £450 per annum, with residence and 17 acres of glebe land, in the gift of John Henry Elwes, Esq. The rector is the Rev. Charles Henry Wilson, A.M. There is a day and Sunday School. The Baptists have a chapel here; services, Sundays, 11 a.m. and 2.30 p.m. The Seven Springs, one of the sources of the river Thames, are in this parish. Population 328: area 3,418 acres.

Wilson, M.A.; curate-in-charge, the Rev. F. R. Steavenson, M.A. There is a National School built and maintained by Mr. and Mrs. Elwes. The lord of the manor is John Henry Elwes, Esq., who resides at Cowlesbourne Park, a handsome building in the Elizabethan style. Area, 2,174 acres; population, 270.

St. Mary's Church—a good example of a small and simple Early English Church—consists of nave and chancel, with an embattled tower in which are six bells. Against the north wall of the chancel is a monumental tomb of a male figure, and a lion couchant at his feet; the inscription is quite lost. The living (with 73 acres of glebe land) is a rectory of the annual value of £330, with residence; and is in the gift of the Lord Chancellor. R. Richardson-Gardner, Esq., M.P. for Windsor, who is lord of the manor, resides in a handsome and spacious stone mansion, delightfully situated on the side of a hill; the pleasure grounds are very judiciously laid out, and beautified by an ornamental trout stream. Population, 293; area, 1,918 acres. STOCK-WELL and a part of BIRDLIP are hamlets in this parish. There is a good hotel, The George, at Birdlip, kept by Mr. R. H. Johnston.

The living is a vicarage of the annual value of £145, with residence. There is a National school. The Wesleyans have a chapel in the hamlet of Apperley. The manorial rights are held by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners. Area, 2,883 acres. Population, 910.

APPERLEY is a large hamlet, one-mile-and-a-half from Deerhurst. Here is a chapel of ease for Deerhurst, and a private school for the poor, supported by Miss Strickland.

Dowdeswell is a village and parish, four miles east-south-east from Cheltenham, in the eastern division of the county, in the Hundred of Bradley, in the union of Northleach, in the county court district of Cheltenham, in the Rural Deanery of Winchcomb, in the Archdeaconry of Gloucester, in the Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The direct way to it is the London-road. The church of St. Michael is a handsome cruciform edifice, erected in 1577. It contains nave, chancel, two transepts, tower, and spire, with three bells. The date of the register is from 1575. The living, in the gift of R. R. C. Rogers, Esq., is a rectory of the gross annual value of £422, with glebe land of 22 acres and residence. R. R. C. Rogers, Esq., D.L., is lord of the manor, and resides at Dowdeswell Court, a mansion built on an eminence surrounded by woods, from which is to be seen a beautiful ornamental piece of water in the valley below. Elmstone, (anciently Almondeston) incorrectly called Elmstone Hardwicke, is a parish containing the three hamlets of Elmstone, Hardwicke, and Uckington (anciently Orkington). Uckington, where is the vicarage, is two-and-a-half miles from Cheltenham; Elmstone, which for civil purposes, is now included in Uckington, is a mile further; whilst Hardwicke straggles away from the Church to within two miles of Tewkesbury. The whole parish is in the eastern division of the county, the rural deanery of North Winchcomb, the archdeaconry of Gloucester, and the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. Elmstone and Uckington are in the lower division of the Hundred of Deerhurst, Cheltenham union, and county court district. Hardwicke is in the lower part of Westminster hundred, Tewkesbury union, and county court district. William Buckle, Esq., of Cheltenham, and others, are lords of the manor of Elmstone; Benjamin Gibbons, Esq., of the manor of Uckington; and the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, of the manor of Hardwicke.

The Church of St Mary Magdalene, at Elmstone, was built in the beginning of the twelfth Century, and served by the Monks of Deerhurst. The style was very early Norman, of which some few traces, including two arches in the nave, part of a doorway, and the base of the village cross, are still in existence. Late in the thirteenth, or early in the fourteenth century, there seems to have been an early English restoration: whilst the tower, a remarkably fine specimen of perpendicular work, was added in the fifteenth century. The church contains chancel, nave, south aisle, and embattled tower. There are several ancient carved heads, and figures of persons playing on musical The chancel screen, a fine example of old and instruments. rich carving, has been carefully restored. The church was re-seated and restored during the Rev. John Byron's incumbency, at a cost of about £1,500. The communion plate, dated 1516, was destroyed by fire at the vicarage, in 1869. The "register book of the parish of

Elmiston," dates from 1564. The living, yearly value about £300, is in the gift of Mrs. Bayfield Roberts, for her life, and then reverts to the Southam Estate in perpetuity. The Rev. George Bayfield Roberts. A. of Oriel College, Oxford, is Vicar. There is a charity, yielding about £100 per annum, administered by the churchwardens, and a large how of trustees, but at present only a small balance is available, barely ufficient to pay the current expenses of the church. Gloucester. The city of Gloucester is within a quarter-of-anhour's ride of this town by either railway, being about nine miles distant. Gloucester is of high antiquity, and has all the local privileges connected with a corporate city—governed by a mayor; has aldermen, common council, chamberlain, and sword bearer. It is represented in Parliament by two members, and forms a portion of the Oxford circuit—the assizes being held three times, and the sessions six times during the year. The corporation is an endowed one, and the income arising from property bequeathed, for the past year, amounted to £1,763. As might be anticipated, from a place numbering upwards of 30,000 inhabitants, and forming the central depot of the commerce of the county, this city contains many public buildings of a substantial character.

The County Hall, where the assizes and sessions are held, is in the Westgate-street, and was built from a design by Smirke. Four Ionic columns grace the principal entrance, which is 100 feet in length. Avenues branch off in the interior to various apartments, and such as are usual to a criminal court. At the end of the central corridor, flights of stone steps lead up to one of the largest public rooms in the county. It is 87 feet in length, 54 wide, and 34 in height. In the interior, on a large scale, are displayed the Royal Arms, and opposite to them, King John in the act of signing the Magna-Charta; each of these are sculptured

in bas-relief, and are 40 feet in length.

The County Gaol is situate a little distance behind the last-named edifice, and is of very considerable extent. It was built on Howard's plan, under the direction of Sir G. O. Paul, Bart., in 1791, at an expense of nearly £30,000.

The Spa was accidently discovered by some men while engaged in

sinking a well, in 1814.

The County Infirmary stands at the lower end of Southgate-street, and is a very noble building, and extends its usefulness throughout the entire county.

The Lunatic Asylum is much admired, both for its style, airy situation, and judicious arrangements. It is situated on the London-road.

The Blue Coat Hospital or School, is in Eastgate-street, and is a substantial building, endowed by bequest from Sir T. Rich.

In the number and extent of Alms Houses, Public Schools, Poor Bequests, and endowed charities generally, Gloucester stands without a rival in the county. Here the celebrated music meetings are held—forming what is termed the meeting of the three choirs of Gloucester, Hereford, and Worcester. The proceed, which are generally considerable, are applied to the relief of the widows and orphans of clergymen. At the Bell Inn, was born the celebrated preacher Whitfield; and another eminent native was Robert Raikes, whose name has been im mortalized as the first person who established Sunday schools. Gloucester is of very ancient date, and was a city within the first half-century of the Christian era. It was the chief local abode of the Romans, and many are the relics extant of that curious race, and scarcely a month passes away without something connected with the being found. As a place of extensive trade this city has long been well-known; the contiguity of the river enabling it to carry on an unlimited traffic, which may be seen by paying a visit to

THE DOCKS.

These nearly adjoin the back of the county gaol, and are generally crowded with vessels from all parts of the globe. Contiguous to the docks is the Gloucester and Berkeley Canal, sixteen miles in extent, which communicates with the Severn at a very romantic spot called Sharpness Point. The Severn runs into Gloucester; but the canal was formed in consequence of the river not being navigable for large vessels within several miles of the city. Gloucester contains a very large

number of churches and chapels, and we presume that the visitor will not be long in the ancient city without discerning the tower of that pile which has identified the name of Gloucester with one of the proudest works of skill and ingenuity in the county. We allude to

THE CATHEDRAL.

"View the Cathedral! built in Gothic style, A large and truly venerable pile; Whose turrets stately high in air are raised, Whose choir and cloisters each are justly praised."

The Cathedral of Gloucester has enjoyed a celebrity of so long standing, that we are sure that every visitor to this "Queen of Watering Places" must be familiar with its name, and will not fail to pay it a visit. Vergers are in attendance continually, and divine service is performed each morning, so that full opportunity is afforded for inspection. cathedral, in its original parts, is 800 years old, and it displays every order of architecture, from the rude Saxon and Norman down to the highly-finished Gothic of the reign of Henry VII. The nave was built in 1104, and is 147 feet in length, by 84 in breadth. The cloisters are the most perfect of their kind known, and are 141 feet in length. The choir is in the decorative Gothic style, and is ornamented with antique carved stalls, and the bishop's seat. The east stained glass window was put up in the reign of Edward II., and is the largest antique window in England, and contains 2,798 square feet of glass. The whispering gallery is formed like an octagon, and has five sides. It is of stone, 76 feet in length, eight feet high, and three broad. In the centre of this celebrated gallery are the following lines, inscribed on the wall in old English characters:

"Doubt not but God, who sits on high,

Thy secret prayers can hear; When a dead wall thus cunningly Conveys soft whispers to the ear,"

The tower is a prominent object for many miles around, and is 225 feet in height. In its interior is a bell weighing 7,000lb. A gate, in the centre of the cloisters, leads to the library, which contains a valuable collection of books, and was used as a Parliament House, by William the Conqueror, Henry III., and Richard II. Near the principal entrance door is that great rarity "the forbidden fruit tree," and at St. Mary's-square, adjacent, is the spot where Bishop Hooper was burned at the stake. The interior of the cathedral abounds with monuments of great beauty and historic interest. Among them will be found those erected to the memory of Edward II., who was murdered in Berkeley Castle; Judge Powell, who acquitted the seven bishops from the tower: Robert Curthose, brother to Rufus, in curious oak and painted, who was a prisoner in Cardiff Castle for 29 years; Jenner, the discoverer of vaccination; Raikes, the founder of Sunday schools, and many others of equal note.

Recently this church has been restored and re-seated, with open seats, the chancel with stalls, and the east window filled with stained glass. The date of the register is from 1597. The living, a rectory, with the chapelry of Yanworth, values £500 per annum, with residence. It is in the gift of the Lord Chancellor. Rector, the Rev. William Henry Stanton, M.A. There is a day and Sunday school. Edmund Waller, Esq., is lord of the manor. Area, including Yanworth, 2,530 acres. Population, including Yanworth, 345. is a parish partly in the borough and wholly in the union of Cheltenham. The original village is distant about two miles (which is most easily got at from the Bath-road) from Cheltenham, of which it now forms one of the most important suburbs. The population is reckoned at about

3,265, and the area occupies some 1,330 acres, in the Deanery of Winchcomb, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, Hundred of Cheltenham. The rectory is in the patronage of the Rev. Charles Brandon Trye, M.A., J.P., Hon. Canon of Gloucester and Rural Dean, who is also lord of the manor, chairman of the Leckhampton Local Board, and chairman of the Board of Guardians of the Cheltenham Union; it is valued at £500 per annum, with residence.

The church is an ancient edifice, dedicated to St. Peter, consisting of nave, chancel, north and south aisles, and porch, with a tower, surmounted by a spire, containing a peal of six bells. The oldest part of the structure dates from the early part of the fourteenth century. Within the sacred edifice is a beautiful tablet of white marble, surmounted with a globe and a ship sailing round it erected to the memory of the last male descendent of Drake, the circumnavigator of the globe. Formerly the living was in the possession of the Norwoods, a family of historic interest, one of whom, a Colonel Norwood, sacrificed his life and property on behalf of the ill-fated Charles. To Charles Brandon Trye, an eminent surgeon, connected with the Norwood family, a handsome monument was built in Gloucester Cathedral. The church. dedicated to St. Philip and St. James, built 1840, is in the incumbency of the Rev. William Henry Hutchinson, M.A. A small Baptist chapel is found in Leckhampton. There are two National schools, one in each church district. The hills in the neighbourhood rise to the height of 925 feet above the level of the sea; from thence we are gratified by a beautiful prospect of the vale, extending from Worcestershire, bounded by the Shropshire and Malvern hills on one side, and the Somersetshire on the other. In the front, Gloucester, Tewkesbury, and Upton, appear with the majestic meandering Severn.

Bounding the horizon in the far distance, may be seen on a clear day, the Welsh Mountains.

Leigh, a village and parish, includes the hamlet of Evington. It is five-and-a-half miles north-west from Cheltenham; is in the union and county court district of Tewkesbury, in the eastern division of the county, lower division of the Hundred of Deerhurst, in the Rural Deanery of Winchcomb, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, and Diocess of Gloucester and Bristol. The direct route is by the Tewkesbury-road to Coombe Hill, thence turn to the left. The population number 395; area, 1,403 acres. The canal, which formerly joined the Severn $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles lower down, is now closed. The lower meadows of the parish are

subject to frequent inundations. The church, an edifice of some interest, has recently been much improved and restored; it consists of chancel, nave, and a small cross aisle on the south side; an embattled tower at the west end contains five bells; on the exterior of the walls are some ancient tablets. The date of the register is from 1570. The living is a vicarage of the annual value of £260, with good residence, and is in the gift of the Lord Chancellor. Vicar, the Rev. John Southgate Austin, A.M. There is a National school, which was erected in 1862. The manorial rights are held by the Dean and Chapter of Westminster. The Wesleyans have a neat and comfortable chapel here. Evington is in the lower division of Westminster hundred.

Norton is a village and parish, comprising two distinct hamlets, formerly distinguished as Bishops Norton and Priors Norton, seven miles north-west from Cheltenham. It is in the eastern division of the county, in the Hundred of Dudstone and King's Barton, in the union and county court district of Gloucester, in the Rural Deanery and Archdeaconry of Gloucester, and in the Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The river Severn courses through the parish on the western side. Direct way to it is by the Tewkesbury-road, thence by Coombe Hill. St. Mary's (Priors) Norton Church, which consists of a nave, chancel, embattled tower, containing six bells and poren, has lately been restored, and in a great measure rebuilt, at a cost of over £1,000, and the vicarage house much enlarged. The register dates from 1686. The living is a vicarage, of the annual value of £120 and five acres of glebe. It is in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Bristol. North Cerney is a village and parish in Circucester Union, containing, 4,026 acres, and having a population of about 688 souls, in the Hundred of Rapsgate, Deanery of Circnester, Archdeacoury of Bristol, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. It is about 11 miles from Cheltenham and four from Cirencester. From remains which have been found, North Cerney is believed to have been a Roman station. The church, which has been recently restored, is a cruciform structure, dedicated to All Saints, the architecture representing both the Norman and the Gothic styles; it has a tower and six bells. A sum of £23 per annum is the income of a bequest left for the repair of the church. A National school exists here for children of both sexes. WOODMANCOTE and CALMSDEN are small hamlets of this parish, the latter about two miles east near the old Roman fossway.

It is about six miles from Cheltenham, and may be visited by taking the Evesham road and passing through the villages of Bishops Cleeve and Woolstone. The living is a perpetual curacy attached to the rectory of the adjoining parish of Woolstone, valued at £86 per annum, in the incumbency of the Rev. Gilbert Coventry, and the patronage of the Harl of Coventry. The Church is a small ancient building, dedicated to St. John the Baptist. There is a school for children of both sexes. erected in 1862, by the late Earl of Ellenborough, who was lord of the manor and chief land owner; also a place of worship belonging to the Countess of Huntingdon's connexion.

Painswick. The road to Painswick lies through Shurdington, and the distance is about eleven miles. It has a population of about 4,000, and is of great antiquity. The Church has been long famed for its peal of bells, which send forth their "sweet and silvery tones" on stated occasions, and the "Painswick Ringers," take precedence over others of their profession in the locality. The churchyard is one of the most attractive in the county, and is planted out with venerable yew trees, nearly an hundred in number. The Church is made conspicuous by a wide space of land which surrounds it—a practice which it would be desirable to adopt generally. The "Castles" is a local name for the lofty hill on the right of the town, which has been used for military intrenchments from the days of the ancient Britons, down to the last period of the Civil wars in the Commonwealth era.

Postlip Hall. This extensive abode, etc., was once the favoured place where Queen Elizabeth and her retinue paid a visit to Sir T. Broadwood. To the left, will be found Postlip Chapel, a considerable This sacred pile was built by the Normans, and is worthy of inspection. Religious worship was conducted in it until the reign of George I., since which time it has been used as a barn, and is generally filled with farming implements. The country around this spot is extremely rural, the chief characteristic being a clear streamlet, which if followed for about a quarter-of-a-mile, will lead to the

POSTLIP PAPER MILL.

The change from the field to the work of art is striking, and the visitor is agreeably surprised to find in the centre of a retired vale, steam, with all its wonderful powers, applied with as much effect as is to be seen in the heart of a great manufacturing district. Writing paper, and also some fancy coloured sorts are manufactured at this mill, which is in continual working; and the greatest courtesy is shown to the stranger. Having inspected the various branches of the paper making establishment, the tourist may, by a left hand road, return to Cheltenham.

Prestbury is a parish in Cheltenham Union, to which it sends two Guardians; it is situated a mile-and-a-half from Cheltenham, and contains 1,373 inhabitants, with 3,022 acres; in the Deanery of Winchcomb, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, Hundred of Deerhurst, East Gloucestershire. Formerly an important market town, it was burnt down in Henry the Seventh's reign. The name indicates that it was formerly a dwelling place for priests, and local historians tell us a college for their education once existed here. The vicarage, in the incumbency of the Rev. J. Baghot-De la Bere, jun., M.A., is valued at £230 per annum, with residence, and 23 acres of glebe land, and is in the patronage of the Rev. J. Baghot-De la Bere. M.A., J.P. The Church is an ancient gothic edifice, dedicated to St. Mary, of the style of the thirteenth and fifteenth centuries, and contains nave, chancel, north and south aisles, with a high embattled tower. and a peal of six bells, and some handsome mural tablets to the De la Bere, Capel, and other families; also some beautiful stained glass windows. There is a National school for children of both sexes. The poor have charitable bequests, and an Almshouse was given in 1720, by Ann Goodrich. A Chapel was opened here on the 16th of May, 1866, by the Independents, which will seat about 250. The principal Inn is the King's Arms.

THE ROMAN VILLA.

The most important relic of the Roman era in this locality, is the Roman Villa, at Witcombe, not quite seven miles distant from this The road to it lies to the right of the base of Leckhampton Hill and the quantity of woody scenery that is passed en route, make it both a delightful and pleasant ride. The visitor has permission to inspect this valuable and perfect monument of Roman art daily. The Roman Villa, at Witcombe, was the seat of one of the principal officers of the Government, and had baths, or hypocausts, attached; the most perfect of their kind known. The means by which it was brought to light were truly remarkable. It was accidentally discovered in 1818, by some labourers while in the act of rooting up a decayed oak tree. At the felling of the tree, a stone, six feet in length, was exposed to view which, on further examination, proved to be the portico of a door lead. ing into a room, 19 feet by 13, the walls of which remained in a perfect state to the height of six feet. On further search being made a Roman villa, with many articles of its furniture, was exposed to view. Amono the things found upon the floor, was a steel yard, with its weights; a plough-share of iron, a flint hatchet, a very large iron axe, used for the slaving of beasts destined for sacrifices; and a large quantity of building tools. The walls bear evident marks of having been pannelled. The payement is all mosaic work, and enriched with a great variety of ornaments. In the first apartment the tesserea is formed, in the centre of the pavement; into the figure of an urn with ivy leaves entwined Another room has its pavement formed with figures of fish and sea monsters. Baths surround the editice in every direction. In one apartment is the remains of a seat formed with tiles. Fragments of columns and cornices of white marble are also scattered about. The baths are both cold and hot, laid with square tiles, and further secured with stucco. Dressing and ante-rooms are attached to them. The present owner is Lady Croomey, who resides at Witcombe House, nearly adjoining.

Salperton is a village and parish in Northleach Union, containing about 120 inhabitants and 1,210 acres. It is distant about nine miles from Cheltenham on the main road to London. Leaving Cheltenham, we arrive there after passing through the villages of Charlton Kings, Andoversford, and Hampen. The living is a perpetual curacy, in the incumbency of the Rev. William Peachey Mellersh, M.A., valued at £130 per annum, and in the patronage of Thomas Beale Browne, Esq. J.P. and D.L., who is lord of the manor and sole owner of the soil. The church, which is built in the Norman style, consists of nave, chancel and tower. There is a National school for children of both sexes.

It is about seven miles from Cheltenham. If we proceed for about five miles along the London-road, and then turning to the left pass through Whittington, we arrive at Sevenhampton. The living is a vicarage, valued at £78 per annum, in the alternate patronage of Mrs. Lawrence and G. C. Colquitt Craven, Esq. The church is an ancient edifice, dedicated to Saint Andrew, consisting of nave, transepts and chancel, with tower and three bells. There is a National school for children of both sexes. Brockhampton is a namlet of this parish. The Baptists have a chapel here, in which services are held on Sundays, at 10.30 a.m. and 6 p. m. Lawrence from Cheltenham viâ Andoversford, where is a telegraph office.

Seven Springs. It is an interesting fact that the highest source of the Thames is situated within three miles of Cheltenham. This first streamlet of the mighty Thames gushes out of a little rocky dell, surmounted by a ragged hedge, in a retired and picturesque spot. This simple and unassuming stream winds itself through interesting vales for upwards of twenty miles, forming a rivulet called the Corin or Chunn.

In its career onwards it receives many tributary streams. About two miles from Cirencester it is joined by one called Thames Head. at Salperton, ten miles farther, it receives one called the Isis, an artificial junction formed in the year 1786; and at Cricklade in Wilt shire, it falls into the main river. The visitor who has read and heard so much of this "birth-place of the Thames," will be greatly surprised at the retired and simple character of the spot. The visit was formerly enlivened by the presence of an antiquated dame, who generally sauntered out of a cottage adjoining, offering her services to pic-nic parties. and telling many marvellous tales withal connected with the spot Whilst the old lady was in waiting on a party, she was ignorantly asked by one of the number if it were clear that the stream had any connection with the Isis? "Ices!" exclaimed the dame, "Nothing to do with that, the water never freezes, and I will tell you for why: you may put a snowball or a piece of ice in the water and it always melts directly." Although these springs are commonly styled "seven," it is but rarely they can all be seen at the same time gushing out of the rock, the only period being after an unusual fall of rain.

Shipton Oliffe with Sollars, now consolidated into one parish by Act of Parliament, is a small village in Northleach Union, containing about 370 inhabitants and 2,210 acres. It is seven miles distant from Cheltenham, on the London road, through Andoversford; in the Deanery of Northleach, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The living is in the incumbency of the Rev. John Auby Carr, B.A., and the alternate patronage of William Peachy. Esq., lord of the manor of that part, formerly of Shipton Sollars. George Fletcher, Esq., is lord of the manor of Shipton Oliffe. The income is \$410 per annum, with residence. The church of Shipton Sollars is a small edifice standing on unconsecrated ground, but is not now used for public worship, the parishioners attending service at the church in Shipton Oliffe, which is a Norman edifice, with beautiful east window, and has an unique bell turret, containing two bells. The church is dedicated to St. Oswald. The Cheltenham and Banbury line passes through the parish. The post town is Andoversford, which has also a telegraph office, and post office orders are granted. There is a mixed school for the united parish.

Shurdington or Great Shurdington is a parish in Cheltenham Union having a population of about 197 inhabitants, and an area of 383 acres, in the Deanery of Winchcomb, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, and of Gloucester and Bristol, Hundred of Dudstone and King's Barton It is about three miles from Cheltenham, on the Stroud road. Barton proceed to it, on our right we get views of the Leckhampton hill and on our left of the vale of Gloucester. The living, which is annexed to the vicarage of Badgworth, is the incumbency of the Revalred William Ellis Viner, B.A., and the patronage of Joseph Ellis Viner Esq., J.P., joint annual value £295. The pretty church is dedicated to St. Paul. It is in the decorated perpendicular style, and emissts of chancel, nave, aisle, vestry, and porch, with a tower surounted by a handsome lofty spire. In 1839 a National school was built for children of both sexes.

Southam-

"View Southam prominent and grand; In state her ancient portals open stand, Which well may boast of high antiquity— To this the antiquary will agree."

Southam is the property of Earl Ellenborough, and its many his torical associations render it a place of peculiar interest. generally regarded as the oldest mansion of its kind known, having been erected in the palmy days of Henry VI. From that period down to a comparatively recent date, it was occupied by the De-la-Beres. The first of this family came over with William the Conqueror, and the most eminent of them, was Sir R. De-la-Bere who had the honour of rescuing Edward the Black Prince, at the Battle of Cressy. The family having become extinct, their estate was purchased by the father of the present noble owner. The mansion is curious and unique. It is most delight. fully situate at the base of the Cotswolds, while its frontage commands a most extensive view, far beyond the limits of the county. It was attacked during the civil wars, and behind the knocker at the principal entrance door may be traced a bullet perforation. The hill which is seen directly to the right is called "Cleeve Clouds,"-and may be ascended by various easy circuitous footpaths. The prospect from the summit will well repay the fatigue of the tourist. Here may be traced the remains of a Roman encampment 300 yards in extent, and here also was fought a severe battle between the rival armies of Oliver Cromwell and Charles I. The ground on the top is remarkably level for milesa circumstance which led to its transformation into a Race Course, and for which it was used for a number of years.

Stanway is a parish in Winchcomb Union, with a population of 335 inhabitants and an area of 3,390 acres; it is ten miles from Cheltenham, on the main road from Stow-on-the-Wold to Tewkesbury, in the Deanery of Campden, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, the upper division of Tewkesbury Hundred. The living is valued at £225 per annum with residence, in the incumbency of the Rev. F. R. Traill, M.A., and is in the patronage of the Earl of Wemyss and March. The church is dedicated to St. Peter, and has a tower and five belis. There is a National school for children of both sexes. The Earl of Wemyss and March is lord of the manor and chief landowner.

Staverton is a village and parish in Cheltenham Union, containing bout 290 inhabitants and 776 acres, in the Deanery of Winchcomb, Archdeacoury of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, Hundred of Deerhurst. It is about four miles distant from Cheltenham, on the nain road between Cheltenham and Gloucester. The vicarage, with the chapelry of Boddington annexed, is valued at £436 per annum, and is in the incumbency and patronage of the Rev. T. Purnell. The church dedicated to St. Catherine, is an ancient edifice in the Early English style, with an embattled tower containing three bells. There was another church, St. Peter's, built of wood, and not consecrated, on the main road from Cheltenham; but the service is at present carried on, at 6-30 p.m., by the Vicar, in a Mission room built by G. Sudeley Castle is a place of great historical interest, it was built by Ralph de Boteler, treasurer and lord high admiral of England, in it time of Henry VI. It was here that Queen Catherine Parr, widow of Henry VIII., who afterwards married the high admiral Lord Seymour of Sudeley, (brother to the Duke of Somerset, the Protector) died in childbed, 5th of September, 1584, and was buried in the parish church Sudeley with great pomp, Miles Coverdale preaching the funeral sermon. It was sadly mutilated and disfigured by the Parliamentarians under Cromwell, but has since been restored, and is now the residence of John Coucher Dent, Esq.

Sudeley Manor is a parish in Winchcomb Union containing 78 inhabitants, and having an area of 2,622 acres, in the Deanery of Winchcomb, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, Hundred of Kiftsgate. It is about eight miles from Cheltenham, south east from Winchcomb. The Rectory is in the incumbency of the Rev. R. The church is a Gothic edifice, dedicated to St. Mary, consisting of nave and chancel, and contains an elegant and costly monument to the memory of Queen Catherine Parr. Swindon is a parish near Cheltenham, containing about 300 inhabitants and 721 acres; in the Deanery and Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, Hundred of Cheltenham. It is about two miles from Cheltenham, and is reached by turning out of the High-street before arriving at the turning to the High-street station of the Great Western Railway, down any of the streets on the right leading to Maud's Elm, and then pursuing your course to the first or second turning on the right, either of which leads to the village. The

road leading to the church is very prettily adorned with a fine avenue of trees, and the sacred edifice itself, situated as it is on an elevated spot commanding a fine view of the surrounding country, is well

worthy of a visit.

The church is in the Norman and Early English styles, dedicated to S int Lawrence, having a hexagonal tower of unequal sides containing for the living is valued at £496 per annum, including and 33 acres of glebe land; in the patronage of the Rev. In Gilbert Day. There is a school for members of the Church of meland only, supported by subscriptions, for children of both sexes, unler the management of the Rector. Hugh S. Stratford, Esq., is the lord of the manor, who with John Surman Surman, Esq., are the principal landowners.

Tewkesbury. The ancient borough of Tewkesbury is not quite nine miles distant from this town, and may be visited in twenty minutes by the Bristol and Birmingham Railway. The population of this place is 6,000, and the staple trade is stocking and lace making. It is scarcely possible to visit a more antiquated town-a large portion of the houses in the main streets being constructed jointly of wood bricks and stones, not unlike many parts of the city of Chester. It is a chartered borough, is governed by a mayor and council, returns two members to Parliament, and has many other peculiar privileges. The descendants of the immortal Shakespeare have regularly lived here, and a head-stone to the memory of William Shakespeare Hart, the sixth descendant, may be seen in the churchyard. At the termination of Barton-street, and near the road to Worcester, is the Royal Mythe Tute. This is a hill formed on a "barrow," or burial place, and from which, on a clear day, the naked eye may see objects connected with the tour adjoining counties. To the right are the ruins of a castle, called "King John's," from a tradition that that monarch once took

refuge therein. On the left is one of the finest and largest suspension bridges in Gloucestershire; it was designed by the celebrated engineer, Telford, and its erection cost £35,000. The span of the centre arch is 170 feet and the breadth 24 feet. The stone abutments are 20 feet in thickness, which are supported by stone arches of twenty feet span. But the event which has for ever perpetuated the fame of this locality, and stamped it with a national character, is the ever-to-be-remembered

BATTLE OF TEWKESBURY.

This battle decided the long-pending disputes between the rival houses of York and Lancaster. It for ever closed the "Wars of the Roses." The spot where this engagement occurred is called "The Bloody Meadow," and may be easily found by following the right hand lane nearly opposite the Workhouse, at the entrance to the town from Cheltenham. It was on the morning of Saturday, May 4th, 1471, that the rival armies were in fierce contest near this place, and when the Lancastrians were defeated they fled to the "meadow," where they were overtaken and three thousand of them slaughtered; and, tradition adds. "that their blood flowed in a stream down the hill." The Yorkists were headed by the Duke of Gloucester, afterwards Richard III, and the unfortunate Lancastrians by the brave Margaret of Anjou, Queen to Henry VI., "murdered in the Tower," and also by her youthful son, the Prince Edward. After the battle, the two latter were taken prisoners; the young Prince was dragged to a house, still standing in Church-street, where the Duke of Gloucester and others formed a camp. The Prince, on being asked why he entered the field in battle array, boldly replied, to maintain his royal father's right to the Crown, and also his own. This reply so excited "Crooked-back Dick," that he immediately plunged a dagger into the heart of Prince Edward, an example which was followed by the dukes around him, and the future heir apparent of England's throne fell at their feet covered with blows. The Queen was ransomed by her brother, the King of France, and afterwards ended her days, greatly dejected, in a monastery. The other nobles who defended her on this memorable occasion, were either retained prisoners or beheaded in the Market place. Shakespeare, in several of his plays, has faithfully delineated all the leading transactions of this great event. With what feeling does he speak of the happy disposition and amiable qualities of the Prince Edward, who, at the time he was so cruelly assassinated, had but just entered on his eighteenth year. Speaking of the Prince in his play of Henry VI., he remarks :-

> A sweeter and a lovelier gentleman Framed in the prodigality of nature, Young, valiant, wise, and no doubt right royal, The spacious world cannot again afford.

THE ABBEY CHURCH.

This is situate in Church-street, is the largest parish Church in England; being of the dimensions and form of a Cathedral. It is called the Abbey Church, on account of its forming a portion of the on e extensive and richly endowed Abbey of Tewkesbury, the gateway of which, and other portions of the pile, may be seen contiguous to the Church. The style of the architecture of the principal parts of Tewkesbury Abbey Church is in the highly decorative Norman; while the choir and the saint chapels are of the early English, or pointed style. A number of stained glass windows, of antiquity, are to be seen in various parts of the building. The organ is one of great power, and celebrated from the circumstance of its having been in the possession of Oliver Cromwell. In this Church was deposited one of the original copies of Magna Charta. Amongst the very many tombs of interest. occurs one to the memory of Allan (erected by himself), the biographer of Thomas a Becket; and who was present at the shrine at Canterbury when that eminent individual was murdered. The Clerk of this Church resides but a short distance from it, and is ever in readiness to exhibit it to the visitor. The Vicar is the Rev. H. Robeson.

Winchcomb is an ancient borough and market town, on the banks of the small river Isborne, which joins the Avon at Evesham, it is the principal town in the union to which it gives its name, containing 2,997 inhabitants, and having an area or 5,700 acres, in the Deanery of Winchcomb, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, the lower division of Kiftsgate Hundred. It is about seven miles from Cheltenham, on the Prestbury road through Southam, the scenery of which, after passing Southam, is very beautiful. It is pleasantly situated in a valley near the base of the northern portion of the Cotswold hills, and was formerly the metropolis of the kingdom of Mercia, and by our Saxon forefathers was called Wincelcombe. It has been a borough by prescription from an early date, and the municipal body consists of two bailiffs and ten burgesses. who are appointed at the court leet of the lord of the manor; their jurisdiction is very limited, and the offices may be considered as nearly obsolete, the principal governing body now being the county magistrates, who hold petty sessions at the Town-hall on the last Friday in each month. The Town-hall, in the centre of the town, is a handsome Elizabethan edifice lately rebuilt. The lord of the manor is John Coucher Dent, Esq. The vicarage, with the chapelry of Gretton annexed, is valued at £400 per annum with residence, in the incumbency of the Rev. Robert Noble Jackson, M.A., and the patronage of Lord Sudeley. The church is a large handsome edifice in the Perpendicular style, dedicated to Saint Peter, and was erected by the parishioners, assisted by Ralph, Lord Boteler, Baron of Sudeley, in the reign of Henry VI. It consists of nave, chancel, north and south aisles, with an embattled tower containing a peal of six bells. The church has recently been thoroughly restored, at an expense of more than £3,000. There is also a beautiful Church at Sudeley Castle, of which the Rev. R. N. Jackson is the rector. There are excellent schools for boys, girls, and infants—those for boys and infants being under the management of the Winchcomb School Board. There is a good reading room provided at the cost of W. Smith, Esq. Lady Chandos, of Sudeley Castle, founded a Grammar School, in the reign of James I., A.D., 1621. It was reconstituted under a scheme of the Endowed Schools Commissioners, A.D., 1876, whereby there are six foundation scholars, who pay two guineas each yearly, (in the place of the fourteen free boys as formerly) and the other pupils are charged four guineas each annually. A capital room has been erected, capable of containing eighty scholars. The Head Master, who is allowed to receive boarders, is Mr. Thomas C. Webb. The endowment of the King's School, which formerly existed in this town, has been assigned, by the Endowed Schools Commissioners, to the Grammar School. The Baptists and Wesleyans have places of worship here; Baptist Minister, Rev. R. Salt; Wesleyan Minister, Rev. John Wilson. Ten alms-houses, for persons in reduced

circumstances, five men and five women, poor tradespeople, have been erected out of funds left by John and William Dent, Esqrs., as well as a school for girls. The market day is on Saturday; a cattle fair is held on the 6th May, and extensive horse fairs on the last Saturday in March, and the 28th July, which are attended by dealers from all parts of the kingdom.
