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CHELTENHAM.

THE situation is delightful, being in a valley, surrounded by the Cotswold Hills ; the walks, rides, and drives amongst which exhibit some of the most beautiful landscapes along the vale of the Severn, that our Island can boast ; and in the town the Promenade, which gradually rises from the High Street up to the Queen's Hotel, a distance of about half-a-mile, consisting of splendid residences, with a broad foot and carriage road, shaded on each side by a magnificent avenue of trees, like the Boulevards of Paris, with seats at intervals for the use of the weary or the invalid ; and the magnificent villa residences, streets and squares, with the purity and salubrity of the climate, its sheltered position under the Cotswold Hills, preventing that variety of heat and cold to which other portions of our country are subject, all unite to render the attractions of Cheltenham equal, if not superior, to any other town in the kingdom, and it has been termed the "Queen of Watering Places." It is a most remarkable fact that when, some years ago, the neighbouring towns of Gloucester and Tewkesbury were suffering fearfully from the ravages of cholera, not one case occurred at Cheltenham ; nor during the visitation of that epidemic to this country in 1866 did a single case occur. In 1871, the population consisted of 41,923 persons, 7,825 houses, with 3,219 acres of land.

In 1881 the Population was 43,972.

The Cheltenham Corporation.

Hitherto the Town of Cheltenham has been governed by Thirty Commissioners, under the Cheltenham Improvement Act, 1852. The Royal Charter of Incorporation, passed in Sept., 1876, however, has altered all this, and the Borough has now a Corporation of a Mayor, six Aldermen, and 18 Councilmen. The Town is divided into six Wards instead of five, and each Ward has an Alderman and three Councilmen, of which the following is the List :—

HAPPY New Year! This is a wish often enough exchanged with each returning dawn of another year; and although there may be much that is conventional about the expression, there can be little doubt that on the other hand it possesses significance and meaning. The year, unlike the quarter, the month, the week, or the day, is a more strictly-defined dividing line recognised by all nationalities as marking the progress of time and the irresistible march of the waning ages towards the goal of eternity. There is something in a year which can never be associated with any other division of time, and gives it an interest peculiarly its own as

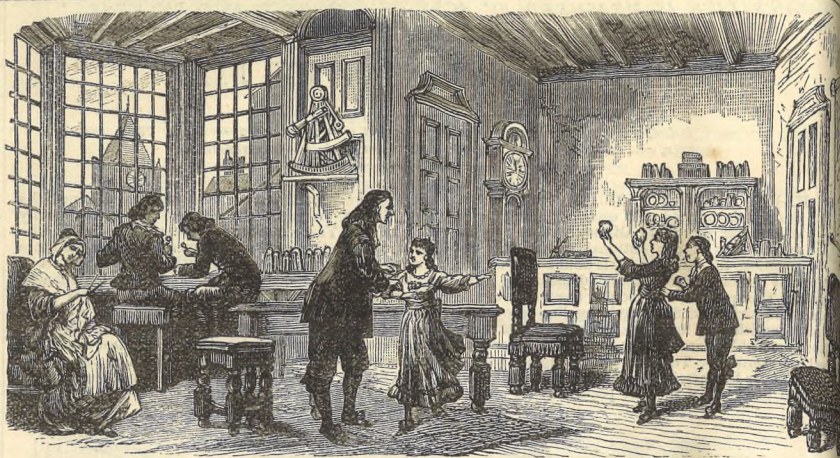

As the bells merrily ring in New Year's morning, there are few indeed who do not form the best resolutions for their guidance during the ensuing twelve months. The impulses of a hasty temper shall be checked, more strenuous efforts shall be made in various directions for good, kindness and affection shall have more play in determining the mental action. No doubt many of these resolves are as evanescent as the breeze, and as fleeting as the wind. But they are beneficial in so far as they have drawn away the mind, even for a short time, from the ordinary subjects upon which it is compelled

It fades, truly, from our ears; but it lingers in the air; and although far away from human sense, or knowledge, or observation, remains unbroken. If that be so, many a new-year's wish is still wafted hither and thither by the wind; and the atmosphere above and around us is constantly though silently circulating the sentiment: "MANY HAPPY RETURNS OF THE DAY!"

NOTE TO THE ABOVE ILLUSTRATION.

IT is said that the TELESCOPE (Gr. *tele-skopos*, seeing) was invented in the year 1600, it is also asserted that the discovery was by chance at Middleburg, in Holland, in the way. The children of a spectacle-maker, while playing in their father's shop one day, got possession of two lenses, accidentally happened to hold them at the right distance from each other. On looking through them, they perceived the weathercock of a church steeple was apparently brought very near them, and appeared much larger. In great astonishment they called their father to witness the sight, and he was greatly surprised at the phenomenon: being of observant turn, he set to work, and produced the first telescope—the wonderful powers of which were soon made known throughout the civilized world.

JAMES GREGORY—the inventor of the reflecting telescope—was born at Aberdeen, in the year 1639. He received his education at Marischal College, on leaving which he devoted himself to optical science. At the age of twenty-four, he published a Latin treatise on Optics, entitled *Optica Promota*, in which he made known his invention of the reflecting telescope, which has since been known by his name. This work immediately attracted the notice of mathematicians both at home and abroad. In 1665 Gregory proceeded to London, in order to get his telescope constructed by a skilled workman; but not finding one equal to the task, he decided to devote his attention to the completion of his work at a time, and went to Padua—the university, which, at that period, held a high reputation in mathematical studies. Here he stayed for many years, during which he published several scientific works, which brought him into correspondence with the greatest mathematicians of age—among these was Sir Isaac Newton; with whom he had a controversy, which was carried on for a long period in the most amicable manner on each side.

A desire to revisit his native land having taken possession of Gregory, in the year 1674 he left with mutual regret the friends who had gathered round him, and returned. Shortly after, he was appointed Professor of Mathematics at Edinburgh; but he held the situation only for a short time, for whilst showing through a telescope the satellites of Jupiter to some pupils, he was suddenly struck blind, and died in a few days after, at the early age of thirty-seven. To render his death the more regrettable, he had only been married a short time.

Gregory left a son, who, equally eminent in science, perpetuated a line of men distinguished in the various sciences of medicine, philosophy and mathematics.

It is related that James Gregory's elder brother was the first man in Scotland who kept a barometer, a circumstance which led to his being tried by the Presbytery as a wizard!

SELECTED ANECDOTES—FOR LEISURE MOMENTS.

HORTLY before he died, **SIR WALTER SCOTT** said—"I have been perhaps the most voluminous author of my day, and it is a great comfort to me to think that I have tried to unsettle no faith, to corrupt no man's principles; and that I have written nothing which on my death-bed I should wish blotted out."

QUEEN ELIZABETH once said to a courtier, "They best over the world who trip over it quickly; for but a bog; if we stop, we sink."

TASSO replied to a proposition that he should take vengeance on a man who had injured him, "I do not deprive him either of his goods, his honour, or life. I only wish to deprive him of his ill-will."

When **DEAN SWIFT** was arguing one day with great coolness with a gentleman who had become exceedingly warm in the dispute, one of the company asked him how he could keep his temper so well. "The reason is," replied the Dean, "I have truth on my side."

POPE ADRIAN VI. (1522) was the son of a barge-sailer of Utrecht. After occupying the papal chair for the short space of two years, he desired the following inscription to be placed on his tomb:—"Here lies Adrian VI., who esteemed no misfortune which happened to him in his life so great as his being called to govern."

It is told of **BISHOP AYLMER** that when he observed his congregation inattentive, he would repeat some verses of the Hebrew Bible, at which the people naturally stared with astonishment. He then addressed them on the folly of eagerly listening to what they did not understand, while they neglected instructions which were readily comprehended.

CLAUDE LORRAINE, the great landscape painter, was originally apprenticed to a pastry-cook. When he first went to Rome, he was so destitute of resources that he was glad to act as cook and colour-grinder to the painter Tassi, and he thus secured the means of pursuing the art in which he afterwards attained so rare an eminence.

The celebrated **DR. CAREY**, who had been brought up as a shoemaker—or *cobbler*, as he once deprecatingly remarked—has left the following record as to the value of perseverance:—"Whoever gives me credit for anything besides being a plodder will do too much. I can plod—I can persevere in any difficult pursuit—and to that I owe everything."

GROTIUS (the celebrated Dutch statesman) used to take for his motto, "*Hora ruit*," to put himself in continual remembrance that he should usefully employ that time which was fleeting away so rapidly; and yet, so great a sense had he of the non-improvement of it, that, with all his learning, when he came to die, he exclaimed, "I have wasted my life in incessant toil, and have done nothing."

DAVID WILKIE (celebrated Scotch painter) was once told by **GRAHAM**, the master of the Trustees' Academy at Edinburgh—"If you have genius, industry will improve it; if you have no genius, industry will supply its place." "So," said Wilkie, "I was determined to be very industrious, for I knew I had no genius."—"Reading the Will," "Distraint for Rent," "The Penny Wedding," and other well-known pictures, show how Wilkie valued and appreciated the above advice.

DR. JOHNSON on one occasion was saying to a friend:—"Accustom your children constantly to tell the truth, without varying in any circumstance." A lady who was present exclaimed, "Nay, this is too much; for a little variation in narrative must happen a thousand times a day if one is not perpetually watching." "Well, madam," replied the Doctor, "and you ought to be perpetually watching. It is more from carelessness about truth than from intentional lying that there is so much falsehood in the world."

"The only true way of assisting the poor," said **ARCHBISHOP SUMNER**, "is to make them agents in bettering their own condition."

When **DR. WOLCOT** (Peter Pindar) lay on his death-bed, one of his friends asked him if he could do anything to gratify him. "Yes," said the dying man, with a touch of that satire which he had so freely used during his life, "give me back my youth!"

The **DUKE OF WELLINGTON**, in reply to a clergyman who was doubting the policy of missionary work in India, said, "What is that to you, sir!—you have received your general orders, 'Go and teach all nations.' Do your duty, sir; never mind the result."

HERODOTUS (the Greek historian) has written—"From the age of five years to that of twenty, the ancient Persians instructed their children only in three things, viz., to manage a horse, to shoot dexterously with the bow, and to speak the truth."

CHARLES V., Emperor of the West, paid great homage to Titian; and one day, when the brush accidentally dropped from the painter's hand, Charles stooped and picked it up, saying, "You deserve to be served by an emperor."

When **GARRICK** showed **DR. JOHNSON** his fine house, gardens, statues, pictures, &c., at Hampton Court, instead of a flattering compliment, which was expected, the Doctor, clapping his hand upon the little man's shoulder, said—"Ah! David, David, David, these are the things which make a death-bed terrible!"

The poet **GOETHE** affectionately cherished the memory of his mother. "*She was worthy of life!*" he once said of her when speaking to a friend. After her death, he visited Frankfurt, and sought out every individual who had been kind to his mother, and thanked them all.

The importance of forming good habits cannot be over-estimated. "Remember," said **LORD COLLINGWOOD** to a young man whom he greatly esteemed, and who was about to embark in life, "before you are five-and-twenty you must establish a character that will serve you all your life."

"Let every man," said **SYDNEY SMITH**, "be occupied, and occupied in the highest employment of which his nature is capable, and die with the consciousness that he has done his best." If the highest employment is not to be found in our ordinary avocations, let us seek it in our leisure.

FUSELI, the painter, in the early part of his life, was vacillating between the palette and the pulpit. About this time he showed some of his sketches to **SIR JOSHUA REYNOLDS**, who encouragingly said, "If I were the author of these drawings and any one offered me ten thousand a year not to practise painting as a profession, I would refuse it with contempt!" This decided Fuseli, and he determined to devote himself to painting.

BISHOP BUTLER, when a friend congratulated him on being made bishop of Durham, said "It would be a melancholy thing at the close of life to have no reflections to entertain one's self with, but that one had spent the revenues of the bishopric in a sumptuous course of living, and enriched one's friends with promotion, instead of having really set one's self to do good and promote worthy men."

The **DUKE OF MARLBOROUGH** and **LORD BOLINGBROKE** were opposed to each other in politics, and consequently, on most occasions, were ranged against each other. Some gentlemen, after the Duke's decease, were canvassing his character with much severity, and particularly charged him with being excessively avaricious (as was the case). At length they appealed for the truth of their statements to Lord Bolingbroke, who was one of the company. This nobleman, with true magnanimity, answered: "The Duke of Marlborough was so great a man that I quite forget his failings."

NOTE TO THE ABOVE ILLUSTRATION.

THAT celebrated naturalist, SIR JOSEPH BANKS, was descended from a family of Swiss origin, which had been settled in England for upwards of two hundred years. His career is extremely instructive, as it shows how a man, having a dilection for a particular study, may, by assiduous attention and cultivation, become eminent therein.

SIR JOSEPH BANKS was born, according to some accounts, at Rivesby Abbey, Lincolnshire; but according to others, in London, in the year 1705, and was the only son of a gentleman of fortune. It was not until the age of fourteen that Banks evinced any great love for books; for it is told of him that he was so immoderately fond of play, that it was impossible to fix his attention on those studies which were essential for his future career. But one day having by chance read a few pages of a book on Botany and Natural History, it so greatly interested him that he never rested till he had mastered its contents. From that time forward the bent of his mind was formed, and he resolved that he would be a botanist.

At the age of nine his father sent him to Harrow School, where he remained until he was fourteen, when he went to Eton College. It is related that one day whilst walking through a country lane, the boy was much struck by the beauty of the wild flowers that grew in luxuriant abundance in the hedge-rows. "How beautiful they are!" he exclaimed. "Surely" he thought with boyish simplicity, "it would be better to possess a knowledge of these productions of nature than to devote my time to studying Greek and Latin." But as it was his father's wish that he should learn these languages, he knew it was his duty to obey him; but for his own gratification, he inwardly resolved that he would make himself master of the names and construction of the different plants he saw around him. In those days books were not so plentiful as at the present, and he therefore commenced to teach himself botany, unassisted by the stores of knowledge resulting from the studies of earlier students and professors. In the pursuit of his hobby, it was his constant practice to seek out the women who were employed in "culling simples" for the druggists, and he would frequently give them sixpence for any new piece of information in his favourite science; and when any strange plant was found, knowing they would be well paid for it, they took it to him. It is also related that on one occasion, when in pursuit of botanical specimens, being overcome by fatigue, he lay down under a hedge, and fell into a sound sleep, from which he was rudely awakened by a farmer, who took him before a magistrate on suspicion of being a thief. But after a brief explanation the young botanist was liberated.

Having gone home for his holidays, to his unspeakable delight the boy found, lying about the house, a mutilated copy of a work on Botany. This he perused with the greatest interest and delight. He found in it a description of all the plants he had met with, as well as many others; and in addition, engravings of them! This was a supreme pleasure to the youthful aspirant for

...age! When he went back to Eton, he took the book with him, and continued his collection of plants. He also collected butterflies and other insects. His whole time, at school, was given up to searching after botanical and entomological specimens, which he carefully preserved.

At the age of eighteen Banks left Eton, and proceeded to Oxford, where he continued to pursue, with unvaried ardour, his favourite science of botany. He was so much interested in it, that when he first went to Oxford, if he chanced to be amongst any students who were discussing questions of classical literature, one would call out, "Here is Banks, but he knows little or nothing of the classics, and it is no use asking him." To this he would make no reply, but, to himself, consolingly, "I will very soon excel you in another kind of knowledge—to my mind of infinitely greater importance." He did so; and the result was, that when any of them wanted to clear up a point of natural history, they said, "We must go to Banks to have it settled." But whilst pursuing with unabated zeal his researches in his favourite science of botany, he did not neglect other branches of natural philosophy—the knowledge of which he knew would be essential to his future researches and investigations.

Banks arrived at the age of twenty-two—his father having died four years before—he came into possession of his paternal fortune, which was very considerable—but this event did not alter the inclination of his mind for scientific research; on the contrary, from this time forward he devoted himself to the advancement of knowledge. Five years afterwards he was chosen a member of the Royal Society, and in the same year he made a voyage to Newfoundland and the coast of Labrador, and returned with a valuable collection of plants and insects, and other natural productions.

In 1768, Banks, fired with the love of fame, and excited by the ardour of science, accompanied CAPTAIN COOK on his first voyage as a naturalist, in conjunction with his friend Dr. Solander (the friend of Linnaeus), who had recently been appointed assistant-librarian to the British Museum. Although the government liberally assisted with everything that could make the voyage comfortable, Banks contributed largely from his own private fortune to the general purposes of the expedition, and took with him two draughtsmen—one to delineate views and figures, and the other to paint subjects of natural history. In addition, he also took an amanuensis and four servants.

The object of this voyage was to observe the transit of the planet Venus over the disc of the sun, having landed on the coast of Terra del Fuego, for the purpose of examining the natural productions of that country, the travellers had nearly perished in a snowstorm which overtook them one day; for being seized with a great desire for sleep, as is frequently the case with those who succumb from cold—it was with the greatest difficulty that Dr. Solander was prevented by Banks from going to sleep, and superfluous—which was the sad fate of three of their attendants. Arriving safely at Otaheite, Banks not only cultivated the friendship of the natives (which materially contributed to the success of the expedition), but also surveyed the coasts of the different islands, collecting specimens of the natural productions peculiar to them. He then returned to England, after an absence of three years.

In 1772, with the same friend (Dr. Solander), Banks, equipping a vessel at his own expense, visited Iceland—a country but little known at that period to the rest of Europe.

In the year 1777, Banks was chosen President of the Royal Society (of which he was a very active member), and which position he held till his death. Honours fell thick upon him: he was made a baronet, Knight of the Bath, and privy councillor, whilst every academy and society in Europe elected him as a member. But amidst all the duties which these honours entailed, he devoted considerable attention to agriculture—on which subject he wrote a most valuable work. He was a warm patron of LEDYARD, and other African travellers; and his house in Soho Square was looked upon as the home of science, where distinguished men were entertained with a more than usual degree of hospitality.

Europe was indebted to Sir Joseph for the seeds of many new plants, and it was to his efforts that the bread-fruit tree was transferred from Otaheite to the West Indies. He also brought from New Zealand to England a very superior kind of flax.

Sir Joseph Banks suffered very severely from gout, and ultimately died from its effects in the year 1820. He bequeathed his books and botanical collections to the British Museum.

GRACEFUL WIT!

(9).—EDWARD EVERETT, before he arrived at the age of twenty, was minister of a large congregation at Boston. Relinquishing the pulpit, he was appointed to the chair of Greek Literature in Harvard College, and greatly distinguished himself in the field of literature. Entering the arena of politics, he rose to such eminence that in 1841 he was appointed American minister to England. Before leaving Boston to assume his duties, he was entertained at a public dinner, when the celebrated Judge Story, who was present on that occasion gave a sentiment, "*Genius is sure to be recognised where Everett goes.*" Everett gracefully responded with another sentiment: "*Law, Equity, and Jurisdiction; no efforts can raise them above one Story.*"

Mr. Everett stayed at his post in England for about five years. Returning to America he was elected President of Harvard University, but after filling the chair for some time, relinquished it on the plea of ill health. He died in 1865.

THE GOOD BISHOP KEN.

(24).—THE learned and pious Bishop Ken was the son of a London attorney, and was born in the year 1677, at Little Berkhamstead, Hertfordshire. He received the rudiments of his education at Winchester School, and afterwards went to Oxford, where he took his degrees. His first step in life was an appointment as Chaplain to the Princess of Orange, with whom he went over to Holland, when, by the honest and faithful discharge of his duties, he acquired her confidence, although he seriously offended her consort (afterwards King William), in having obliged one of his favourites to perform his promise of marrying a young lady whom he had seduced. The Prince threatened to discharge him; which Ken warmly resented, and it was only on the persuasion of the Princess that he consented to stay. About a year after he returned to England, and his next appointment was that of Chaplain to the Earl of Dartmouth, who had orders to proceed to Tangiers, to demolish the fortress. On Ken's return he was appointed Chaplain to Charles II., and also promoted by Bishop Morley (through the influence of Ken's brother-in-law,

Isaac Walton, the angler *par excellence*), to a prebendal stall at Winchester. And now occurred another conflict with royalty. Upon the removal of the court to Winchester during the summer, the doctor's prebendal house was selected for the use of the king's favourite, Nell Gwynn. But Ken was too pious to permit such a scandal to take place, and refused to admit her. Charles, to his credit, knowing the doctor's sincerity, was not offended, as he showed by shortly afterwards nominating him to the bishopric of Bath and Wells.

The worthy bishop was most exemplary in performing the duties of his station. He was incessantly devising means for relieving the poor and instructing the ignorant. He built the

first workhouse, at Wells, which served as the model for many others. To these, and kindred objects, he devoted the principal part of his income. He was one of the seven bishops sent to the Tower of London for resisting the despotic power of James II. On his release he lived a life of retirement. But though he had disobeyed his sovereign in the matter of conscience, when the Prince of Orange came over to ascend the English throne as William III., he conscientiously declined to transfer his allegiance to him, and refusing to take the oath, suffered himself to be deprived of his see.

Bishop Ken was the author of several sermons and poems, as well as some devotional books, which are now highly prized by many Churchmen. He wrote the "Morning Hymn":

"Awake, my soul, and with the sun;"

And also the "Evening Hymn":—

"All praise to Thee, my God this night."

Bishop Ken died in March, 1711, in the seventy-fourth year of his age, as he was on a journey to Bath. He had been in the habit of travelling for many years with his shroud in his portmanteau, which he always put on when attacked by illness; of this he gave notice the day before his death in order to prevent his body from being stripped. He was carried to his grave in Frome church-yard by six of the poorest men of the parish, and buried under the eastern window of the church, at sunrise—in reference to the words of his Morning Hymn—

"Awake, my soul, and with the sun."

NOTE TO THE ABOVE ILLUSTRATION.

THE great French mathematician and philosopher, RENÉ DESCARTES, was born at La Haye in Touraine, in the year 1596; and received his education at the Jesuits' College at La Flèche. There he made great progress, being particularly distinguished for his keenness of intellect. On leaving college, at the age of twenty, in obedience to the wishes of his parents (who were persons of high rank) he entered the army, and fought as a volunteer at the siege of Rochelle. He served with the troops of the Prince of Orange, and afterwards with those of Maximilian of Bavaria. He was also present at the battle of Prague, when the Elector-Palatine Frederick was defeated. During Descartes' military career the following incident occurred, and which may be taken as an apt illustration of his mathematical acquirements at this period:—

Happening to be in garrison at Breda, with his regiment, during a truce between the Spaniards and Dutch, he one day observed a crowd of people gathered round a placard posted on a wall. Going up to satisfy his curiosity as to what it could be, he found that it was written in the Dutch language, which he did not understand. Asking a by-stander for an explanation of the document, the young officer was informed that it was a difficult geometrical problem, of which the proposer challenged the solution from the most learned. Descartes asked to be favoured with a translation of the document, upon receiving which he laughingly remarked that he thought he should be able to solve the problem. This observation, as coming from a soldier, greatly amused his informant, who happened to be Professor Beekman, the principal of the University of Dort, and a person of great mathematical acquirements. Going back to his quarters, Descartes gave the problem his attention, and next day astonished the Professor—who had not expected that so much learning could have been found beyond the walls of a university—by presenting him with a correct solution of the wonderful problem!

Quitting the army, Descartes visited Moravia, Siberia, Poland, Pomerania, and the shores of the Baltic. In order to observe the country with advantage he purchased a boat, and embarked on it with one servant. The sailors, thinking he was a foreign merchant, carrying large sums with him to pay for any produce he might purchase, resolved to murder him; and supposing he did not understand their language they conversed very freely as to the best mode of putting him to death. Descartes, however, greatly surprised them by boldly taking the initiative; and drawing his sword, addressed them in their own language, threatening to kill the first man who should offer him any violence. The sailors were overawed at his determination, and giving up their design, the voyage terminated safely.

After a variety of travels, in the course of which he visited England, Descartes returned to

and in order that he might pursue his studies without interruption (being now at the age of thirty), he sold his patrimony, and settled at Amsterdam, where for several years he remained completely shut out from the world—the of his residence being unknown, though he preserved intercourse with many friends in France. During this time he published various works, which obtained for him a reputation as a philosopher; but at the same time theological opinions evoked a great amount of opposition, wishing to escape from the bitter hostility of his enemies, Descartes accepted an invitation from Christina Queen of Sweden, who had invited great scholars from all countries in founding a university. On arriving at Stockholm, he was treated with great distinction by the eccentric queen, who, probably from the desire to differ from every one else, to pursue her studies with him at the unreasonable hour of five o'clock in the morning. As Descartes' health was far from robust, this early rising, combined with the rigour of the climate, brought on pulmonary disease, from which he died in four months after his arrival in Sweden—he being then in his fifty-fourth year. Christina wished to be buried with great pomp in Sweden, but the French ambassador and his remains were conveyed for burial among his own countrymen.

Descartes was the greatest geometrical of the age; and it has been asserted that no man gave a greater impulse to mathematical and philosophical inquiry than he did.

WASHINGTON'S FILIAL AFFECTION.

(1.)—A very slight incident often proves a turning-point which changes the whole course of a life. History presents many instances in which the entrance upon a career of fame has been owing to an accidental occurrence. GEORGE WASHINGTON, in all probability, would never have played his great part in establishing the independence of the United States, if it had not been for a simple episode which may be thus related. In his youth he had set his heart on going to sea as a midshipman. When everything was arranged and the boat had come ashore to take him off, his determination was changed by the following incident:—After his trunk had been carried down to the boat, he went to bid his mother farewell, and saw the tears bursting from her eyes. However, he said nothing to her; but he saw that his mother would be thus distressed if he went, and perhaps never be happy again. Turning round to the servant, he said—"Go and tell them to fetch my trunk back." I will not go away to break my mother's heart." His mother was struck with this mark of filial affection, and said to him—"George, God has promised to bless the children that honour their parents, and I believe He will bless you!"

Dismissing from his mind all idea of a sea-faring life, Washington applied himself to the study of mathematics with a view of following the profession of a land-surveyor, in which capacity he obtained a public appointment. At the age of nineteen, he was made adjutant-general over one of the military districts of Virginia, and shortly afterwards served his first campaign against the French. His career thenceforward is well known.

On the acknowledgment of American independence, Washington resigned his commission as commander-in-chief; and having received the warmest thanks of Congress, retired into private life. In 1793, however, he was elected first President of the United States; and at the expiration of the term of office, he was re-elected. Declining to serve for a third term, he again withdrew from public life in 1797, and died in 1799, universally lamented.

THE STRUGGLES OF DR. PRIESTLEY.

(2.)—DR. PRIESTLEY was born at Fieldhead, near Leeds, in the year 1733—his father being a woollen-cloth manufacturer. His mother dying when he was six years of age, he was adopted by a paternal aunt, by whom he was sent to a free grammar school, where he was taught Latin and the rudiments of Greek. At the age of nineteen he entered the Dissenting Academy at Daventry, where he stayed three years. He then became minister to a small congregation at Needham Market, in Suffolk, with a salary of £30 a year; and by adding a little to his income by teaching, he not only contrived to live, but was also enabled to purchase several scientific instruments to help him in his philosophical studies, in which, even at that early age, he had evinced considerable interest.

Continuing to pursue his vocation of dissenting minister with varying degrees of success until the year 1761, Priestley removed to Warrington, where he succeeded Mr. afterwards Dr. Aikin, as teacher of languages. Deeming that his circumstances warranted him in "marrying and settling down," he was united in marriage to Miss Wilkinson, the daughter of an ironmaster near Wrexham. In speaking of his marriage, Dr. Priestley said—"This proved a very suitable and happy connection, my wife being a woman of an excellent understanding, much improved by reading, of great fortitude, and strength of mind, and of a temper in the highest degree affable and generous; feeling strongly for others, and little for herself. Also, greatly excelling in everything relating to household affairs she entirely relieved me of all concern of that kind, which allowed me to give all my time to the prosecution of my studies, and the other duties of my station. And though, in consequence of her father becoming impoverished, and wholly dependent on his children in the latter part of life, I had little fortune with her, I unexpectedly found a great resource in her two brothers, who had become wealthy, especially the elder of them." And there is no doubt but that his marriage had the effect of giving a zest to Dr. Priestley's pursuits, for from this time his literary career may be said to have commenced. When on a visit to London he had the good fortune to make the acquaintance of Dr. Franklin, who supplied him with several books on Electricity, which were of the greatest use to him.

In the year 1767 Dr. Priestley settled in a pastorate at Leeds, and shortly afterwards entered upon that course of chemical research which has rendered his name famous. He was near upon forty years of age when he began the study of Chemistry; and it is said his attention was first drawn to this science by observing the gases arising from the process of fermentation in a brewery near which he lived, and which he sometimes visited. He then commenced various experiments, which gave a new direction to his versatile and energetic mind; and it is to Dr. Priestley that the world is indebted for the knowledge of oxygen, binoxide of nitrogen, sulphurous acid, ammonia, carburetted hydrogen, and several other important discoveries in Chemistry.

When residing at Leeds, a proposal was made to Priestley that he should accompany Captain Cook in his second voyage to explore the South Seas; but the arrangement was not carried out—for certain clergymen objecting to the liberal tendency of Priestley's theological views, the Board of Longitude declined to sanction the arrangement.

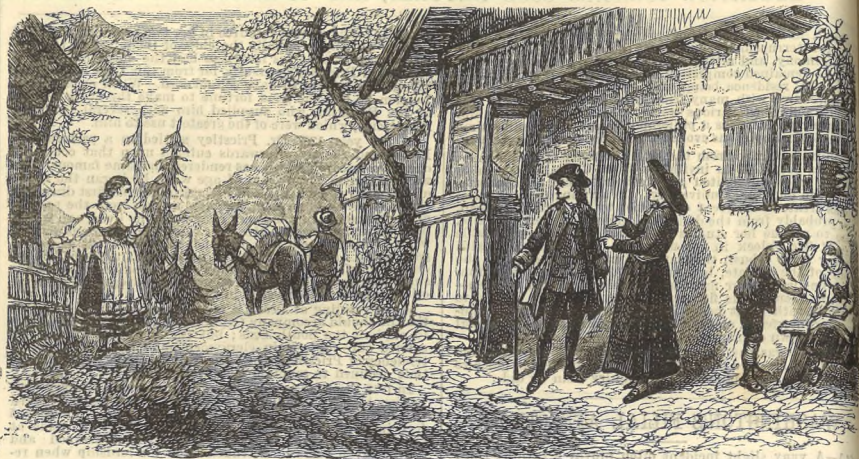
In 1773 Priestley was appointed a literary companion to Lord Shelburn, upon terms which, having regard to the future provision for an increasing family, he did not feel justified in refusing. He therefore went to reside at Calne, in Wiltshire, near his lordship's seat at Bowood; and during seven years he attended upon his lordship when residing in London; and also accompanied him on a continental tour in the year 1774, staying at Paris a month. In speaking of this journey, Priestley said—"This little excursion made me more sensible than I should otherwise have been of the benefits of foreign travel, even without the advantage of meeting and conversing with foreigners. The very sight of new countries, new buildings, new customs, &c.; and the very hearing of an unintelligible new language, gives new ideas, and tends to enlarge the mind." He adds, however, that he was soon tired of Paris. And perhaps this was owing to the fact that he was laughed and sneered at as a believer, whilst at home he was stigmatised as an atheist. Having been told by certain Parisian savans whom he met that he was the only man of any understanding whom they had ever known who believed in Christianity, he wrote in reply the *Letters to a Philosophical Atheist*; and to escape the odium arising from the imputation of being an atheist, he published his *Disquisition Relating to Matter and Spirit*.

On leaving Lord Shelburn, Dr. Priestley became minister of a dissenting chapel in Birmingham. When the French Revolution broke out, he displayed a warm sympathy with it; and having written a reply to Burke's *Reflections on the French Revolution*, it greatly exasperated the populace. On July 14th, 1791, a public dinner having been given by the friends of the cause in celebration of the anniversary of the taking of the Bastille (1789)—but at which dinner Priestley himself was not present—the excited mob rose, and after demolishing the house in which the guests were assembled, they broke into his house, destroyed a valuable collection of books, as well as his philosophical apparatus and all his manuscripts, and afterwards attempted to burn the house. Priestley and his family found safety in flight. The compensation which he obtained for the injury was far short of the amount of his losses; but there were many admirers of his virtues and talents who regarded him as a sufferer for his principles, and exerted themselves to support him under his great calamity; and as far as money went individual generosity made amends—one of the instances of which was his brother-in-law making over to him the sum of £10,000, in addition to an annuity of £200 a year.

Having been chosen minister to a congregation at Hackney, Dr. Priestley was now enabled to resume his usual occupations of every kind, and passed some time in comfort and tranquillity. But party dissension was not only malignant but persistent, and he found himself and family so much molested by its attacks, that he resolved to quit a country so hostile to his person and principles, and in 1794 embarked for America, and took up his residence at Northumberland, in Pennsylvania. By some he was received with coolness and distrust, but many welcomed him with respect and enthusiasm.

Shortly after he had arrived in America Priestley lost his youngest son; and in 1796 he suffered a further bereavement by the death of his wife, to whom he was most tenderly attached. These sorrowful events, combined with other domestic calamities, were severe trials of his fortitude, but his excellent temper and exalted principles enabled him to bear all his troubles with pious resignation; and he frequently expressed his satisfaction that he had been enabled to spend his life in such useful and beneficial pursuits. He also spoke of the greatest confidence of those cherishing views of future existence which his theological convictions opened to him. In January, 1804, it became manifest to his friends, and also to himself, that his earthly labours were drawing to a close; and he therefore lost no time in finishing a work on which he was engaged. Continuing his literary and scientific pursuits with unexampled calmness and serenity on the 6th of February, 1804, when in the seventy-first year of his age, he expired so quietly, that they who sat by his bedside in anxious solicitude did not perceive his last struggle.

Dr. Priestley was a man of irreproachable moral and domestic principles; and whilst fearless in proclaiming his convictions, whether theological, political, or scientific, he was distinguished by great simplicity of manners.

NOTE TO THE ABOVE ILLUSTRATION.

THE learned and famous historian of "The Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire" EDWARD GIBBON, was born at Putney in the year 1737—his father being a gentleman of fortune who had sat in two Parliaments. Edward was the first-born of his parents, and the only one of seven children that survived infancy; and his constitution was so infirm that in his childhood his life was often despaired of. But in his after life he became very corpulent, and the small bones of the large-headed delicate boy were later years hardly adequate to sustain their load. He spent a sickly childhood under the care of his mother's sister, a lady of strong understanding and warm heart, whom he called "the mother of his mind," and to whose care and tenderness he ascribed not only the preservation of his fragile life, but also the development of his intellectual functions.

At the age of fifteen his father sent him to Magdalen College, Oxford, where he became engrossed in controversial theology, which ended in his becoming a convert to the Church of Rome. This greatly displeased his father, who immediately sent him to reside with a Protestant pastor at Lausanne, Switzerland, hoping that he might change his opinions—a hope which was subsequently realised.

During his stay at Lausanne, Gibbon made himself perfectly master of the French and Latin languages, and applied himself most diligently to regular habits of study. But in the midst of these occupations love found an entrance into his heart; for having made the acquaintance of Mademoiselle Susan Curchod, the daughter of a Burgundian pastor, who was at that time on a visit at Lausanne, her personal and mental acquirements made a deep impression on him. Gibbon has left on record the history of his first and only love-spell, in the course of which he said—"I hesitate, from the apprehension of ridicule, when I approach the delicate subject of my early love. . . . I need not blush at recollecting the object of my choice; and though my love was disappointed of success, I am rather proud that I was once capable of feeling such a pure and exalted sentiment. The personal attractions of Mademoiselle Susan Curchod were embellished by the virtues and talents of her mind. Her fortune was humble, but her family was respectable. Her mother, a native of France, had preferred her religion to her country. The profession of her father did not extinguish the moderation and philosophy of his temper, and he lived, contented with a small salary and laborious duty, in the obscure lot of minister of Cras, in the mountains that separate Pays de Vaud from the county of Burgundy. In the solitude of a sequestered village he bestowed a liberal and even learned education on his only daughter. She surpassed his hopes by her proficiency in the sciences and languages. . . . I saw and loved! I found her learned without pedantry; lively in conversation, pure in sentiment, and elegant in manners; and the first sudden emotion was fortified by the habits and knowledge of a more intimate acquaintance." After a few interviews

the young lady, Gibbon told his love, and obtained permission to visit her, with the approval of her parents, who were young Englishmen, and being pleased with the notion of having him for their son-in-law, for a time allowed him to do so. On Gibbon's return to England, however, he found his father resolutely opposed to the match. In vain he implored him to re-consider the decision to which he had come, but the father was firm, and Gibbon says—“After a struggle, I yielded to my fate: I sighed as a lover, and obeyed as a son; my wound was insensibly healed by time, absence, and the habits of a new life. My cure was accelerated by a faithful report of the tranquillity and cheerfulness of the lady herself, and my love subsided in friendship and esteem.” Whether Gibbon cherished his old love in his bosom till his death, is unknown. Certain it is that he never married, and always spoke of Susan Churchod with the greatest tenderness.

The subsequent interesting fate of the object of Gibbon's love is worth recording. When her father died, his estate ceased, and Susan then went to Geneva, where, by great diligence, she earned a meagre subsistence for herself and mother. Accident having thrown her across the path of the celebrated Necker, a rich banker of Paris who, under Louis XVI., had been twice Director-General of the Finances of France, he had the good fortune to discover her estimable qualities, and proposing to her, was accepted. They lived happily, and Gibbon, in alluding to their married life, says:—“In every change of prosperity and disgrace, M. Necker has remained on the bosom of a faithful friend.”—[It may be mentioned that their daughter, who married Baron de Stael Holstein, the Swedish Ambassador at the Court of France, is the celebrated MADAME DE STAEL.]

Gibbon was a faithful friend; easy in society, and fond of life. He was pleasant, and had no rival in conversation; not disliked by anyone who came near him. Vanity, perhaps, was his only failing. He affected the manners of the first gentleman of the day, and these were in strange contrast with his unwieldy body and massive mind.

Gibbon died on the 16th of January, 1794, in the fifty-ninth year of his age. Shortly before his death it transpired that for the period of thirty-two years he had concealed the fact from every one but his servant that he had been afflicted with a rupture, and it was only when it became essentially necessary that he should avail himself of surgical aid, that he was induced to disclose his malady to a physician; but it was then too late, and, succumbing to the affliction, he died calmly, without fear or apprehension.

THE REV. ROWLAND HILL.

(1792.) The truly amiable, though eccentric minister, the Rev. ROWLAND HILL, was born at Hawkstone, Salop, and was the son of Sir Richard Hill, the first baronet of the name. He was educated at Eton and Cambridge, and it was at the former place he embraced the views of the Calvinistic Methodists. Family influence, however, prevented him from joining this body, his avowed predilection for which rendered it extremely difficult for him to obtain ordination in the Church of England. The Bishop of Wells was at length induced to admit him to deacon's orders, which was the highest step he was allowed to attain in the hierarchy. At this time the celebrated GEORGE WHITEFIELD was in the zenith of his popularity, and so congenial to Hill's nature was that gifted preacher's manner and doctrine, that he adopted both, and became his devoted disciple—proclaiming the Gospel to listening crowds in barns, in meeting-houses of humble pretensions; and when these were too small, or too distant, or not to be procured, in streets and fields, by the highways and hedges.

About the year 1780 Mr. Hill projected the building of the SURREY CHAPEL, the first stone of which was laid in 1782, and the building was completed early in 1783. It was opened for public worship on Whit Sunday, June 8, 1783,* on which occasion he delivered a discourse; and from this time to the period of his death—an interval of fifty years—he continued to preach during the winter months to congregations which were always numerous, and spent the summer in visiting the various parts of the kingdom, preaching in places of worship of almost every denomination which would accept of his services. Once, when preaching at Edinburgh, the congregation was so great that he was compelled to ad-

ourn to the Calton Hill, when upwards of fifteen thousand persons listened with profound attention to his address.

At the time when Mr. Hill was in the height of his fame and popularity, there was also another preacher who excited a remarkable degree of attention. This was WILLIAM HUNTINGTON, the son of a farm-labourer in Kent. His early life had been passed in menial service and other humble occupations. After indulging in dissipation and vice for several years, whilst following the occupation of a coal-heaver, he was converted, and became, amongst a certain class, a popular preacher, and was regarded as the head of a peculiar sect. As I cannot,” he said, “get D.D. at the end of my name, for want of cash; nor M.A. for lack of learning, therefore I am compelled to fly for refuge to S.S., by which I mean—*Sinner Saved.*”

Mr. Hill was greatly opposed to Huntington's preaching and also his publications, which were very numerous; and it is said that one day he took up with the songs one of his books, and desired the servant to take it downstairs, and put it on the fire. Amongst other things he also said that if he preached such doctrines as Huntington did, he should expect horns to grow out of his head, and his feet to become cloven. Huntington was not slow to retort, and in alluding to a reproach cast on him for the sins of his early days, he said, “If you were left free and pure from every vice in your youth, all the better. Glory in this! I neither covet nor envy either your purity or happiness, any more than the prodigal son envied his elder brother, who had never trespassed the commandment.” At another time Huntington said, “That you may discover less pepper and more purity, less temper and more holiness; that you may perform more good works, and say less about them; that you may part with your tea-table stories for heavenly tidings, and your old wives' tales for Gospel doctrines; that you may sound the Gospel trumpet more, and your own trumpet less, is the prayer of him who freely forgives you all that is past: and trusts to take patiently all that is to come.” In the above, there is an allusion to Mr. Hill's frequent practice of introducing anecdotes into his discourses, and it is said that he often selected his wife as an illustration; and an instance is given, that on one Sunday, while she was sitting in her pew, he pointed her out to the congregation as a living exemplification of the fleeting nature of feminine beauty, and commented in very homely terms on the change which the Gospel had wrought in her personal appearance.—“Ladies love fine caps,” said he on another occasion; “and so does my wife. The other day there came home a five-guinea one; but she will never wear it, for I put it into the fire, bandbox and all!” One Sunday morning, as she was proceeding to her seat, he exclaimed—“Here comes my wife with a chest of drawers on her head! She went out to buy that requisite article of furniture, but instead of doing so, she spent all the money in that hoity-toity bonnet!”—“In justice to Mr. Hill, it must be said that whilst being amused with the apocryphal stories related about himself, he was highly indignant at its being supposed he could utter the speeches ascribed to him in reference to Mrs. Hill, for he said it would be derogatory to him as a Christian and a gentleman to do so.

Mr. Hill also carried into private life the singularities he at times exhibited in the pulpit—it is told that one morning he by chance heard two of his domestics disputing as to which of them should wash the hall, each declaring that it was not her business.” Sending them both out on an improvised errand, he took up the mop himself, and when, upon returning, they found him busy at his self-imposed work, they each warmly protested against his being engaged in so menial an occupation. “Pooh! pooh!” said he, “it is not your business, Peggy; nor yours, Jane; so it must be mine, I suppose, as the hall must certainly be cleaned by someone!” [It scarcely needs to be mentioned, that the hall was regularly cleaned after this without any dispute.]

Rowland Hill was married in the year 1773 to Miss Mary Tunbur, of Somersetshire, with whom he lived happily for the long period of sixty years. She died in 1830, and in less than three years was followed to her grave by her husband—he being then in the eighty-ninth year of his age. He maintained his mental vigour almost to the close of his life, and preached his last sermon in Surrey Chapel a week previous to his decease.

Mr. Hill was the author of several works, one of which, entitled *Village Dialogues*, became very popular, and is considered to be his ablest work. The scenes are laid in rural life, and its pages are pervaded by a delightful spirit of Christian simplicity. He also published (anonymously) a satirical pamphlet against the ministers of the Established Church, under the title of *Spiritual Characteristics*, by an Old Observer.

NOTE TO THE ABOVE ILLUSTRATION.

THE successful artistic career of ANTONIO CANOVA, the eminent Italian sculptor, is extremely instructive, as it furnishes a remarkable example of a comparatively self-taught man rising to honour and fame.

Canova was born at Passagno, a village in the Venetian territory, in 1759; his father was a sculptor. His mother, being left a widow, married again, and this circumstance led to his being placed with his grandfather, Pasino, who followed the humble occupation of a stonecutter. Here the boy began to develop a taste for the art in which he afterwards became renowned—his artistic propensities being greatly encouraged by his grandfather, who gave him small pieces of marble on which to employ his "prentice hand." He also instructed him as far as he was able in the art of modelling in clay. The boy, one day, whilst engaged at work, was so fortunate as to attract the attention of a Venetian nobleman, Faliero by name, who took him into his house, and gave him the benefit of a good education. He also apprenticed him to Bernardi Torretto, a sculptor residing in the neighbourhood, with whom he remained nearly four years, during which time he acquired considerable skill in the mechanical processes of the studio. And it is related that his master was greatly astonished one day, on returning home, to find two exquisite figures of angels which had been modelled in clay in his absence by his gifted pupil.

When Canova began the serious study of the art in which he was destined to be famous, he made it a rule never to allow a day to pass which did not mark some progress, and in his desire to qualify himself thoroughly for his profession he made himself master of several branches of general knowledge, in order that he might attain greater proficiency. All this time he was, as he says, "labouring for a pittance," never thinking of wealth, but pursuing his art for its own sake.

Steadily progressing in his profession, it was a proud day for Canova when a Venetian nobleman, who had heard of the rising fame of the young artist, paid a visit, accompanied by his wife, to the studio of the young artist, and after an inspection of his work, gave him his first commission, and which was for two baskets containing fruit and flowers. (These, it may be remarked, are still preserved in Venice as specimens of Canova's early skill.) But it was not until he had exhibited a group of *Orpheus and Eurydice* (in 1786) that the sculptor's name and fame became known and appreciated. This led to several orders; but what was of far greater value to the rising artist, the Venetian Senate awarded him a small pension for the term of three years, to enable him to complete his studies at Rome. In connection with Canova's visit to this city the following anecdote is told:—

Having designed and executed with great care a beautiful group of *Dionysus and Icarus*, the young sculptor presented himself with it at the door of the Venetian ambassador, who was at dinner when he called. After a period of trembling expectation to the young artist, an *attache* was sent out to criticise and pass sentence on the

group of sculpture. Examining it with much pretended reserve—during all which time Canova underwent tortures of suspense—the critic spoke of it in disparaging terms. This was a grievous blow to the hopes of Canova, and on leaving the place he was overwhelmed with chagrin. Fortunately, Sir W. Hamilton—who was then the English ambassador at the court of Naples—heard of this rejected piece of statuary, and sent a request to see it. Greatly pleased, not only with the artist but with his work, the generous Englishman exerted himself in his behalf; and in addition to pecuniary assistance gave Canova that which was perhaps of more value—kindly words of encouragement—and advised him to persevere. He did so, and the merits of the struggling artist ultimately became fully acknowledged and recognised.

In 1802 Canova was appointed superintendent of the Roman Works of Art, and Knight of the Golden Spur. In the same year he was invited to Paris by Bonaparte to execute the model of his colossal statue. He was frequently asked by Bonaparte to make Paris his home, but his attachment to his native country was too great to be overcome by considerations of worldly distinction. When Canova was in the zenith of his fame he visited England for the purpose of seeing the Elgin marbles, the sight of which, he said, was sufficient to recompense him for his journey.

Canova was of a most amiable disposition. Though his fame was spread throughout Europe, he entertained a modest opinion of his own merits; nor was he anxious of the success of others. As an instance of his modesty, it may be mentioned that, having received an Italian patent of nobility, with the title of Marquis of Ischia, he never assumed it, but with the last was plain Antonio Canova. This title of nobility had been given him (accompanied by a suitable pension) as an acknowledgment in recovering—after the fall of the French Empire in 1815—the works of art which had been taken to Paris. Pius VII. also, with his own hand, inscribed his name in the Golden Book of the Capitoline and declared him "to have deserved well of the City of Rome."

Canova was a man of the noblest benevolence, and made a generous use of his riches. It is told that one winter, after he had harvest, he maintained the poor of his native village entirely at his own expense. And his thoughtful manner in relieving the necessities of an indigent painter, who, with Canova knew that the man was so proud that he would refuse a charitable gift. He therefore requested him to paint a picture, and fixed the price to be paid for it at four hundred scudi—a sum the artist had never received for one of his works before—and gave him half the amount, promising him the other half when the work was finished, urging him (knowing how welcome the money would be) to get it done quickly.

After enjoying the reputation of being in the first rank of his art for more than twenty years, Canova died at Venice, the city which he loved so well—on the 12th of October, 1822. A splendid monument was erected to his memory in the Cathedral of St. Mark, the sculptor's heart being placed in a vase.

THE LAST DAYS OF BONAPARTE.

5).—AFTER the defeat at Waterloo BONAPARTE was the first to arrive in Paris from the field of battle; and, alighting at the Elysée Bourbon, was received by Caulaincourt (Duke of Vicenza). After a brief

recital of the disaster that had befallen him, the defeated emperor retired to his room, where he continued many hours without taking any refreshment. One of the grooms of the chamber at length ventured to send up some coffee by the hands of a young page, whom Bonaparte had occasionally distinguished by his notice. He found the Emperor sitting listless, with his hands spread over his eyes. The page stood patiently before him, gazing with child-like curiosity on an image which contrasted so strongly with his own simple and peaceful figure; at last he ventured to offer his tray, exclaiming, with the airless confidence of youth and innocence, "Eat, sire; it will do you good." The Emperor looked at him, and asked, "Are you a native of Paris?" "No, sire, I come from a village at some distance from here." "Where your parents have a cottage and some acres of land?" "Yes, sire." "There is happiness!" replied the man who had dethroned kings and distributed kingdoms at pleasure. A few days more, and Bonaparte was no longer emperor of France and king of Italy. Having abdicated, he retired to Malmaison, the scene of his early happiness with JOSEPHINE.

After a melancholy sojourn there of six days he set out for Rochefort, with the intention of sailing for America, taking with him an immense number of carriages laden with valuables. Arriving at Rochefort on the 3rd of July, 1815, he was afraid to sail, fearing capture by the English cruisers; he therefore resigned himself into the hands of Captain Maitland, on board the *Bellerophon*, and claimed the protection of England. The English cabinet, however, decided that he was a prisoner to the Allies, and he was dispatched to his island prison of St. Helena, where he arrived on the 13th of October of the same year. The glory of his greatness had departed; and there he lingered out the remainder of his days, dying on the 5th of May, 1821.—

"Though more than half the world was his,
He died without a rood his own;
And borrow'd from his enemies
Six foot of ground to lie upon."

"THE LEARNED CARPENTER."

(14).—THE career of DR. SAMUEL LEE furnishes a very remarkable example of what perseverance may accomplish under the most adverse circumstances—the more especially as when receiving the rudiments of his education at the charity school at Longnor (near Shrewsbury), his schoolmaster pronounced him one of the dullest boys he had ever seen; but despite this adverse judgment the dull boy eventually became Professor of Hebrew at Cambridge University!

At the age of twelve Lee was apprenticed to a carpenter in his native place. After he left school a change had come over him, for he became extremely studious, and instead of acquiring knowledge. All his leisure time was spent in reading, and some of the books he obtained containing Latin quotations, he became desirous of knowing their meaning. He therefore bought a Latin Grammar, and by extraordinary diligence, before the end of his apprenticeship, made himself master of that language. A copy of the Greek Testament having by chance fallen into his hands, he determined to make himself acquainted with that language also, and contrived, out of his straitened means, to purchase a Greek Grammar and Lexicon, and in a very short time accomplished his task. Hebrew, Chaldean, and Syriac next engaged his attention, with all of which he became perfectly familiar.

During this time Lee had been following his occupation of carpenter, and had arrived at the age of twenty-eight when he married; and probably thinking that he could afford to the maintenance of his household, he decided that he could no longer indulge in literature as a luxury. He might probably have continued working as a carpenter all his life had it not so happened that a fire took place, when his chest of tools, and the little household furniture he had scraped together, were destroyed, and he was reduced to complete poverty.

He then thought of teaching children the first rudiments of education; but although he knew several languages he found himself totally deficient in the common branches of learning. Resolutely setting to work, he taught himself arithmetic and writing, and, having accomplished this, was enabled to teach the children who came to his school. This gave him a capital opportunity of further prosecuting his study of languages, of which he fully availed himself—making rapid progress in Arabic, Persian, and other Eastern languages; as also in French, German, and Italian.

Lee had earned for himself the reputation of the "learned carpenter," and the fame of his acquirements having reached Archdeacon Corbett, he obtained for him, in the year 1810, the mastership of Bowdler's Foundation School in Shrewsbury.

In the year 1813 another kind friend enabled Lee to enter Queen's College, Cambridge, and after a course of study, in which he greatly distinguished himself by his mathematical acquirements, in 1819 he was elected Professor of Arabic; and in 1813 Regius Professor of Hebrew in Cambridge University. He died in the year 1850.

Dr. Lee's *Grammar of the Hebrew Language*; his *Book of Job*, translated from the Original Hebrew; his *Hebrew, Chaldean, and English Lexicon*, and his translation from the Arabic of the *Travels of Ibn-Batutta*, have secured for their author a lasting reputation—his profound scholarship exciting the greater admiration when it is remembered that he commenced life as a carpenter's apprentice.

NOTE TO THE ABOVE ILLUSTRATION.

AMONGST those names which would probably have passed into oblivion if Pope had not in return for their adverse criticisms on his writings—been provoked to transmit them to posterity in his *Dunciad*, stands that of JOHN DENNIS, who was known in the literary world of his time as "the Critic."

Dennis was the son of a saddler and citizen of London, and was born in the year 1657. He was sent first to Harrow School, and afterwards to Caius College, Cambridge, and became well read in ancient and modern literature; but his overweening vanity and self-importance—which amounted to a disease—his irritable temper, and the want of literary success, seem to have led him into great absurdities, and rendered his whole life a scene of turmoil and strife. He was the author of a tragedy, entitled *Liberty Asserred*, which became extremely popular on account of the virulent abuse of the French nation. In connection with this work the following amusing anecdote is related:—

Dennis, thinking that the severity of his satire against the French had so incensed that nation as to create a serious obstacle to diplomatic intercourse, fancied that, in consequence, Louis XIV. would never make peace with England unless the author was given up as a sacrifice to the national resentment! And he carried his apprehensions so far that, when the negotiation of the Peace of Utrecht was in contemplation, he waited on the Duke of Marlborough to entreat the intercession of his Grace with the plenipotentiaries, that they should not consent to his surrender to France being made one of the conditions of the treaty! The Duke, with an assumed gravity, told the dramatist that he was sorry to be unable to do this service, as he had no influence with the ministry of the day; but, he added, that he thought Dennis's case not quite so desperate as he seemed to imagine, "for," said his Grace, "I have not taken any care to get myself protected in the articles of peace; and yet I cannot help thinking that I have done the French almost as much damage as you have, Mr. Dennis!"

It is also related that at another time, when Dennis was visiting at a friend's house on the Sussex coast, and was walking on the beach, he saw a vessel, as he imagined, sailing towards the shore. Supposing he was betrayed, he made the best of his way to London, without even stopping to take leave of his host, for he believed he had lent himself to a plot for delivering him up as a captive to the French, and had accordingly sent a vessel on purpose to capture him, and carry him off to France!

Dennis originally had a considerable fortune, which he dissipated; but the Duke of Marlborough—who had given him one hundred guineas for a poem on the Battle of Blenheim—obtained for him the place of land-waiter at the Custom-house, which brought him in one hundred and twenty pounds a-year; but this place Dennis mortgaged; and his latter days were spent in poverty, aggravated by blindness.

NOTE TO THE ABOVE ILLUSTRATION.

IT has not infrequently happened, that men of extraordinary genius, great mental capacity, and profound learning, have been remarkable for eccentricities of character that have excited the wonder of their contemporaries; and of these, LORD STOWELL—brother of the celebrated Lord Eldon—is a notable example. It has been related that he would loiter about the streets of London for hours, enjoying, amongst other absurdities, that most ancient but amusing of all street spectacles—the "Punch and Judy" show. What even show could be visited for a shilling, or even less, was patronised by Lord Stowell! He became so well known at many of these places of diversion that the exhibitors frequently excused him paying the entrance fee, for they well knew he would praise the exhibition amongst his friends, who in their turn would pay it a visit. It is told that on one occasion a "green monster serpent" was announced by an enterprising showman, who had issued hand-bills giving full particulars of this *monstrum*. Lord Stowell hastened to see it; but on presenting himself at the door of the exhibition, and whilst pulling out the shilling for admittance, the man whose duty it was to take the money recognised him, and said—"We can't take your shilling; it's the same old serpent what you have seen before, my lord; she's been repainted—but you shall go in and see her!" And go in again he did, and once more enjoyed a sight of his old friend.

It is also related that his lordship having been twice to see an animal called a "Donassus," the exhibitor presumed so far upon his lordship's good-nature, as to announce the entertainment "Under the patronage of Lord Stowell"—a liberty which, instead of creating resentment, seemed to tickle the fancy of the astute lawyer.

Lord Stowell's favourite dish, when his intimate friends dined with him, was a pie, composed of beef-steaks and layers of oysters. (Lord Eldon's favourite dish was liver and bacon.) Lord Stowell was extremely fond of port, of which he drank copiously; but he was not intemperate, for what he drank never impaired his health, nor disturbed his intellect, and his mode of living suited his constitution, for he enjoyed good health to extreme old age. He had a reputation as a table-talker, and was regarded as one of the most agreeable of men.

Lord Stowell's early necessities had taught him habits of prudence; but as he grew older, the frugality of youth degenerated into the avarice of age. Consequently, he became a very rich man (as did also his brother, Lord Eldon). In his early career he had met with some unprofitable investments; but in his later life he frequently said that he admired above all other investments, "the beautiful simplicity of the three per cents." At his death, he left personal property amounting to £200,000, but as his only son died a few months before him, the riches which he had heaped up were divided among collaterals.

Lord Stowell was an accomplished scholar, a profound reasoner, and an uncompromising supporter of established institutions in church and state, although he rarely attended church. His domestic life was marked by great amiability.

NOTE TO THE ABOVE ILLUSTRATION.

ANDREW MARVELL, distinguished by his integrity as a patriotic member of Parliament at a time when nearly every one was open to bribery, was born in the year 1630, at Kingston upon-Hull, where his father was master of the grammar school, and lecturer of Trinity Church. The following romantic and melancholy story is related of the circumstances attending the death of the elder Marvell:—

A young lady, whose mother resided on the opposite side of the Humber, had been paying the Marvell family a visit on the occasion of the christening of one of his children. On the day fixed for her return, the weather was extremely boisterous, and she was urged to postpone her departure to the next day. But having promised her mother that she would return home on that particular day, she could not be dissuaded from her purpose. Mr. Marvell, with the minister who had performed the ceremony, therefore resolved to accompany her, but as the boat pushed off from the shore he felt a presentiment of impending danger—a feeling which is often experienced by individuals when about to undertake an enterprise outside their usual sphere of duty. In the case of Mr. Marvell, the force of the gloomy anticipations was such that he hurriedly called to one of the spectators standing on the shore whom he knew, and threw him his walking-stick—desiring, in case anything should happen to him, that it should be given to his son, with the injunction that he should never forget his father. The parent's mournful fears were verified, for when about half way across, the boat went down in the storm, and the whole of the crew perished. The mother of the young lady, with a kindness which is pleasurable to record, provided for the orphan child of the deceased minister who had perished with her daughter, and at her death left him a sum of money.

Young Marvell received his education at Trinity College, Cambridge. He afterwards spent several years in travel; was appointed secretary to the British legation at Constantinople; and on his return, in 1657, he became assistant to Milton, as Latin secretary. Shortly before the Restoration Marvell was elected a member of Parliament for Hull, with a salary from his constituents (as was then sometimes the custom in the case of needy members); when he obtained a high character for diligence, ability, and integrity. His pay, however, proved insufficient, and he was often reduced to great pecuniary straits.

Marvell was a great favourite with the "merry monarch," Charles II., who delighted in his conversation, but could never prevail on him to support his measures; consequently he was obnoxious to the ministry then in power. Persuaded that he might be brought over if properly asked, his old school-fellow, Lord-treasurer Danby, was sent one day to find out his lodgings, which were up two pairs of stairs in a court in the Strand.

NOTE TO THE ABOVE ILLUSTRATION.

THOMAS BEWICK, the celebrated wood engraver, was born in the year 1753, at Cherryburn, near Newcastle-on-Tyne. Uniting the talents of the draughtsman and engraver with the knowledge of the naturalist, it is to Bewick that the world at large owes the great improvement in the ancient art of wood-engraving. The following is a brief sketch of the gifted artist's career.

His father had held a colliery for many years and the boy's youthful days were spent as a worker in the coal-pit. At a very early age he evinced a considerable talent in drawing, and was in the habit of exercising his skill by covering the walls, window-shutters, and every available vacant space in the village with chalk sketches of birds and animals—much to the delight of an admiring circle of companions, who favourably criticised and heartily applauded his efforts. These rude essays displayed so much genius, that they attracted the notice of Mr. Beilby, a copper-plate engraver at Newcastle, when he was passing through the village. He immediately sought out the young artist, and eventually arranged with his father that he should be apprenticed to him.

Although his master was a copper-plate engraver, Bewick's attention was particularly directed to engraving on wood. One day when a gentleman wished his master to engrave him a set of diagrams for a mathematical work, Mr. Beilby suggested that they should be executed on wood, so that they might be worked with the type; and this was accordingly done by Bewick, and gave great satisfaction. His master was thus induced to recommend that he should devote himself to wood-engraving; and the young artist followed the advice, and with the happiest results.

On the expiration of Bewick's apprenticeship, he returned to his father's house, and executed any engraving his master required, being paid at so much per block. In the year 1776, Bewick made a tour on foot through the Lake district—making sketches by the way of any object that took his fancy. After he had completed this pleasurable task he proceeded to London, where he stayed about a year, working at his profession; but he added little to the knowledge which he already possessed of his craft. Finding for his native air and rural scenery, where he could indulge in his observations on Nature, he returned to Newcastle—to the neighbourhood of which he was always strongly attached. Shortly after his return, he entered into partnership with his former master, and from that time forward devoted himself unreservedly to his work.

In 1775, Bewick gained the prize for the best specimen of wood engraving from the Society of Arts for one of the illustrations, "*The Huntsman and the Old Hound*," in Gay's *Fables*. This book, which appeared some four years later, attracted much attention from the superiority of the engravings, which were all executed by Bewick and his younger brother John, who had been apprenticed to him.

To Bewick belongs the merit of having revolutionised the art of wood-engraving. The method which he adopted of producing those delicate effects of light and shade which are so essential to a good and truthful picture is the same in principle as that which is now practised by our engravers, and it was Bewick that first discovered the method of achieving them. The chief works which he illustrated were, among numerous others, *Select Fables*; and *Fables of Æsop*. But the work that brought him his greatest fame was his *History of Quadrupeds*, which, with unwearied industry, he had been several years in preparing for publication. From his earliest youth he had been a close observer and delineator of animal qualifications, and in which he took an especial delight. In addition to the careful study of animal life which the country around him afforded, he made a point of visiting all the menageries which came into Newcastle for the purpose of making sketches from life of the animals they contained.

Bewick was one of those men who brought an uncommon degree of energy to his work. No man was ever more devoted to his profession, the labours of which were as much his enjoyment as his business; and it is to this fact mainly, in conjunction with his undoubted genius, that his great success must be attributed, and which placed him in the highest rank of his profession. He had, moreover, the merit of educating several talented pupils, from whom he received considerable assistance in his many productions.

The number of engravings that Bewick executed was very large. Fine copies of his birds and quadrupeds command large prizes at the present day; and the impressions of an elephant, a lion, a tiger, and a zebra, which he executed on a large scale to adorn the handbill of a menagerie, are now very rare. As much as twenty guineas has been given for an impression of his celebrated "Bull" (dated 1789), which is considered as Bewick's *chef-d'œuvre*.

Bewick was of a happy disposition, his pleasures being very simple, caring for little beyond his work and the duties of family life. He was early riser; fond of walking, and of muscular sports and exercises. Temperate in his eating and drinking, scornful of luxury, and with the indifference of a philosopher for money, his life was passed in happy simplicity. Throughout his career he was thoroughly devoted to his art, his last days being occupied with a project, the object of which was to improve not only the morals but the taste of the humbler classes by a series of prints on a large scale for the adornment of cottage walls. His last attempt at engraving was a cut, "Waiting for Death," representing an old horse, which was intended to figure in an address on "Cruelty to Animals," the proof of which was only brought to him a few days before he breathed his last. This was executed with great pathos and truth.

When too old to work with the vigorous zeal of former times, Bewick busied himself with writing an Autobiography, which he composed with much minuteness of detail.

Bewick died of gout, at his house near Gateshead, on November 6th, 1825, at the age of 75, and was buried at Ovingham.

A CHARITABLE PHYSICIAN.

(4).—Few names in biography will bear comparison with that of JOHN FOTHERGILL, an eminent and charitable physician of the last century, whose moral character cannot better be summed up than was done by his friend Dr. FRANKLIN, who, in a letter to a friend, wrote:—"If we can estimate the goodness of a man by his disposition to do good, and his constant endeavours and success in doing it, I can hardly conceive that a better man has ever existed." The following is a brief sketch of Dr. Fothergill's life:—

He was born in the year 1712, at Carr End, Yorkshire, where his father, residing upon a family estate, was a member of the Society of Friends. Having received a liberal education, at the age of sixteen he was placed with an apothecary at Bradford, Yorkshire; and on the expiration of his apprenticeship he went to Edinburgh, where, in 1736, he took his doctor's degree. Shortly afterwards he became a pupil in St. Thomas's Hospital, London. In 1740 he made a tour of the Continent, and on his return, settled in London, when he devoted himself with great zeal and energy to the serious business of his profession. In 1748 he acquired much reputation both at home and abroad, by a tract entitled *An Account of the Sore Throat attended with Ulcers*—this disease, at that time, being very prevalent and fatal. He also supplied a monthly account of the weather and diseases of London to the *Gentleman's Magazine*, which is considered as the parent of all statements of the kind.

Having acquired considerable means, in 1762 Dr. Fothergill entered into a project which had long existed in his mind, and purchased an estate at Upton, Essex, where he formed a botanic garden, containing a remarkable collection of rare plants; and as during his life he was continually receiving donations, his collection became the most extensive in the world. Devoting himself with great zeal and perseverance to the healing art, for thirty years he may be said to have stood at the head of the medical profession; but he was equally celebrated for his charity—which was the prominent feature in his character—for he made a most liberal use of the large fortune he acquired. It is told of "Quaker Doctor Fothergill," that when he paid his last visit to patients whom he knew were in straitened circumstances, he would, when feeling the pulse, slip into their hands a sum of money or a bank-note. This, in many cases, doubtless, effected more good than a prescription. To one patient whose circumstances

excited his compassion, he gave notes to the amount of one hundred and fifty pounds. To spare the susceptible feelings of those who had been reduced to indigence, he would endeavour to invent some ingenious excuse for his bounty. He was always ready to assist the clergy, not only with his advice, but with his purse. And when on one occasion he was gently reproved by a friend for declining a fee from a divine who could well afford to give one, the considerate doctor said: "I would rather return the fee of a gentleman with whose pecuniary position I am not perfectly acquainted, than run the risk of taking it from a man who ought, perhaps, to be the object of my bounty." It was Dr. Fothergill's common expression when he found his favours misapplied, or himself imposed upon—"I had much rather that my favours should fall upon many undeserving objects, than that one truly deserving should escape my notice."

It has been computed that during his lifetime Dr. Fothergill gave away upwards of £200,000. One of his kindly actions was the giving to ANTHONY PURVES* the sum of one thousand pounds for his version of the Scriptures, which had been the labour of thirty years of his life.

Dr. Fothergill conferred great benefits on the Society of Friends, projecting and carrying into effect the institution of a large public school for the needy of Acworth, in Yorkshire. He was also the associate of the philanthropic John Howard in his attempt to alleviate the condition of poor prisoners. Extremely zealous for the political interests of England, Dr. Fothergill, by all the means in his power, earnestly endeavoured to prevent that fatal breach with the American colonies which eventually produced their separation from the mother country.

This charitable physician died on the 26th of December, 1780, admired by the public, beloved by his friends, and at peace with all the world.

Dr. Fothergill's works, chiefly upon medical subjects, were printed in three volumes, with his life prefixed.

It may be mentioned that Dr. Fothergill's brother, SAMUEL, was a prominent preacher among the Quakers.

GUIDO'S LOVE OF GAMBLING.

(16).—RENI GUIDO, the celebrated Italian painter, was born near Bologna, in 1575. Evincing, at an early age, a decided taste for painting, he was placed with Calvart, the Flemish painter; and in his twentieth year entered the school of Caracci, the Italian painter. Guido was at that time so handsome that Caracci made him the model for his angels. After pursuing his studies for some time, Guido's works became extremely popular, and his reputation as a great painter was established. Pope Paul V. chose him to paint his private chapel, and frequently came to see him work. Being discontented with the sums paid him by the Pope's treasurer, Guido left Rome, and proceeded to Bologna, where he exercised his art for some time. But the Pope adopted measures to bring him back to Rome, and on his return most of the Cardinals sent their carriages to meet him—his reception being more like that of an ambassador than an artist.

Guido might have accumulated wealth as well as fame had it not been for an unfortunate propensity to gaming, to which he was addicted to so great a degree, that although money was constantly flowing in from the produce of his works, he was frequently reduced to great embarrassment. In these straits, according to one of his biographers, (Malvasia,) Guido sold his time to certain dealers and money-lenders at a stipulated sum per hour; and it is said that one of them, more rapacious than the rest, tasked the painter so rigidly as to stand by him, watch in hand, while he worked. And thus were produced numbers of heads and half figures, which though executed with the facility of a master, had little else to recommend them. Malvasia relates that such works were sometimes completed in less than three hours. Thus, for the sake of the money to satisfy the requirements resulting from the indulgence of a most baseful habit, a great genius was under the necessity of prostituting the inestimable talents with which he had been endowed. The constant excitement caused by his persistence in the fatal practice at length reduced him to such distress, that a languishing disease ensued, of which he died on the 18th of August, 1642.

There are several of Guido's works in the National Gallery.

* It may not be uninteresting to notice that ANTHONY PURVES, who became so eminent as an orientalist, had been apprenticed to a shoemaker. Finding the occupation too irksome, he left it, and became a shepherd, obtaining thus considerable leisure for reading and study; when he acquired, by great diligence, and with but little assistance, a considerable knowledge of Latin, Greek, and Hebrew. He next settled as a schoolmaster at Andover, and having accidentally perused a book in which some errors were pointed out in the common translation of the Bible, it awakened in him a burning desire to make himself acquainted with the two sacred tongues; and when he had accomplished this, he set himself to the task of translating the Bible into English, which occupied him thirty years. He first attempted to publish it in numbers, but being unable to carry out his project, Dr. Fothergill came to his assistance, and the work was completed.

NOTE TO THE ABOVE ILLUSTRATION.

THAT eminent British novelist, **TOBIAS SMOLLETT**, was born in the year 1721, at Dalquhurn, Dumbartonshire. He was descended from an old and distinguished family in that county his grandfather being Sir James Smollett, one of the consistorial judges of Edinburgh.

Smollett lost his father while very young, and the care of his tuition devolved upon his grandfather, who gave him a moderate education, and afterwards apprenticed him to a surgeon in Glasgow—his indentures terminating when he was nineteen. His grandfather having died without making any provision for him, Smollett determined to leave Scotland, and, as so many have done before and since, went to London, "to seek his fortune." He was only provided with a small sum of money, but, as a compensation, he carried a large number of letters of recommendation, which proved to be of little use to him. He also took with him a tragedy which he had written, entitled *The Regicide*, founded upon the murder of James I. of Scotland, which affecting circumstance he had read in Buchanan's *History of Scotland*, and it had not only made a deep impression upon Smollett's imagination, but had greatly incited him to study and attain a knowledge of the Latin language. Smollett hoped to get the tragedy performed at one of the theatres, and he anticipated it would produce him not only the means of subsistence, but also literary distinction; but in both these expectations he was disappointed. He was at last glad to accept the post of surgeon's-mate on board an eighty-gun ship, which shared in the unfortunate expedition to Carthage in 1741. Having quitted the service in disgust—but not before he had acquired a knowledge of naval life and character—Smollett, after residing for some time in the island of Jamaica, returned to London in 1745, just after the Scotch rebellion had been suppressed by the battle of Culloden. Smollett was greatly excited by the stories told of the excessive severity exercised in the Highlands by the royal troops, and yielding to those patriotic feelings which he ever entertained for his native country, he wrote the pathetic verses entitled, *The Tears of Caledonia*, commencing—

"Mourn, hapless Caledonia, mourn
Thy banished peace, thy laurels torn!
Thy sons, for valour long renowned,
Lie slaughtered on their native ground,
Thy hospitable roofs no more
Invite the stranger to the door;
In smoky ruins sunk thy lie,
The monuments of cruelty."

Smollett now made repeated attempts to obtain practice as a physician, but failed, chiefly owing to his hasty and irritable temper. He then commenced the profession of an author, but in his literary career he was not much more successful than in his other attempts, and had frequently to endure many privations, and the want of those worldly comforts on which the happiness of life so much depends. Owing to the adverse circumstances which pursued him he was compelled to undertake the work of a literary drudge;

and, in addition, became involved in endless quarrels and personalities. For an article on Admiral Knowles, one of the commanders at Carthage, he was fined a hundred pounds, and sentenced to three months' imprisonment. It was whilst undergoing this sentence that he wrote his novel, *Sir Launcelot Greaves*.

In speaking of the troubles and disappointments he met with, which were neither "few nor far between," Smollett wrote—"Had some of those who were pleased to call themselves my friends, been at any pains to deserve the character, and told me ingeniously what I had to expect in the capacity of an author when first I professed myself of that venerable fraternity, I should in all probability have spared myself the incredible labour and chagrin I have since undergone." And on another occasion he wrote—"Of praise and censure both I am sick, indeed; and wish to God my circumstances would allow me to consign my pen to oblivion!"

It has been related by his biographer, Dr. Moore, that when Smollett had finished his translation of *Don Quixote*, to which he had assiduously devoted himself, he experienced a longing desire to re-visit his native country, and to see his mother. He therefore proceeded to Scotland, and it was arranged between him and his sister (Mrs. Telfer), who was married to a gentleman of considerable fortune in Clydesdale, that he should be introduced to his mother as a gentleman from the West Indies who was intimately acquainted with her son, and would tell her much about him that would interest her. On the introduction taking place, Smollett tried to alter his features by putting on a very severe countenance, which, in his case, would have been a complete disguise. Unfortunately, however, for the success of the innocent plot, while the old lady was looking at him with wondering and eager eyes, her darling son could not help smiling at the joke that was being perpetrated. Perceiving this, the old lady, jumping from her chair with unwonted activity, threw her arms around his neck, exclaiming, "Ah, my son! I have got you at last!" Smollett's filial tenderness was very great, and this meeting was a most happy one. The old lady afterwards said that if he had only preserved his assumed austere look, he might for a time have escaped being found out; but, she added, it was his roughish and well-remembered smile that betrayed him, and brought his features back so readily to her recollection.

When at last the versatile writer had worn himself out in the service of the public and the booksellers, his health gave way, and he was ordered to Italy; but, sad to say, there was scarce left enough of the sleeper remuneration he had received for his literary toil to defray his expenses there. Gradually perishing in a foreign land, neglected by the public that admired the productions of his pen, deriving no resources from the booksellers who were drawing large profits from his works, Smollett threw out his injured feelings in the character of Bramble, in *Humphrey Clinker*. His friends had endeavoured to procure him an appointment as consul in some port in the Mediterranean, so that he might be the better enabled to contend with the troubles which surrounded him; but their efforts were unsuccessful, and after a long and painful illness, he died at Leghorn in 1771, being then his fifty-first year. Had he but lived four years longer, he would have succeeded to the ancestral estate in the beautiful vale of the Leven, where, at his death, a kinsman placed a column in commemoration of him, amid the scenery he had loved, and which he has described in the following Ode:—

"On Leven's banks, while free to rove,
And tune the rural pipe to love,
I envied not the happiest swain
That ever trod the Arcadian plain.
Pure stream, in whose transparent wave
My youthful limbs I wont to lave;
No torrents stain thy limpid source,
No rocks impede thy dimpling course,
That sweetly warbles o'er its bed
With white, round, polished pebbles spread;
While, lightly poised, the scaly brood
In myriads cleave thy crystal food;
The springing trout in speckled pride;
The salmon, monarch of the tide;
The ruthless pike, intent on war;
The silver eel, and mottled par;
Devolving from thy parent lake,
A charming maze thy waters make,
By bowers of birch, and groves of pine,
And edges flowered with eglantine.
Still on thy banks so gaily green,
May numerous herds and flocks be seen:
And lasses chanting o'er the pail,
And shepherds piping in the dale;
And ancient faith that knows no guile,
And industry embrowned with toil;
And hearts resolved and hands prepared,
The blessings they enjoy to guard!

Smollett's widow survived him twelve weary years, existing solely upon the bounty of a few merchants resident in

Leghorn, and of a few friends in England; yet, out of her slender means, she contrived to erect, at Leghorn, a monument to the memory of her deceased husband.

Smollett was of an extremely generous disposition, and it is related that one day a beggar in the street having asked him for alms, he gave him, through mistake, a guinea. The poor fellow on perceiving it hobbled after him to restore it; upon which Smollett returned it to him with another guinea, as a reward for his honesty, exclaiming at the same time, "What a lodging honesty has taken up with!"

The principal works of Smollett are—*Peregrine Pickle*, *Roderick Random*, *Ferdinand Count Fathom*, *Sir Launcelot Greaves*, *Humphrey Clinker*, *Travels Through France and Italy*. He also wrote some poems, compiled a collection of voyages and travels, and translated *Gil Blas* and *Don Quixote* into English.

Perhaps the most profitable of Smollett's many works was his *History of England*, which he published in 1757, and afterwards issued in weekly numbers; it attained in both forms a large circulation. He is said to have made a profit of two thousand pounds by this work; whilst the bookseller with whom he made his first arrangement cleared one thousand pounds on the day he made the bargain, by transferring it to a brother in the trade.

In Smollett's works there is much to regret and condemn, but it must be remembered that he lived in a coarse age, in which great latitude was accorded to the pen of the novelist.

In his earlier days—after he had retired from the navy, and was staying in Jamaica—Smollett had married a young lady, Miss Lascelles, who bore him one child—a daughter—who died at the age of fifteen, leaving her parents overwhelmed with the deepest sorrow. It was to dispel the grief her death occasioned that the disconsolate father undertook a tour through France and Italy, and was absent two years. On his return he published an account of his travels, which, although distorted by great prejudice, is interspersed with many gleams of humour and genius.

THE GREAT PHYSICIAN BOERHAAVE.

"A wise physician, skill'd our wounds to heal,
Is more than armies to the public weal."—POPE.

(27).—HERMAN BOERHAAVE was the most celebrated physician of the eighteenth century. He was born near Leyden, in the year 1668, and received from his father a liberal education which, in after years, was extremely useful to him. It is said that before he was eleven years of age he was well acquainted with Latin and Greek. At the age of fourteen he was sent to Leyden to study theology—his father intending him for the church; but an obstinate ulcer on his left leg, which for several years resisted all medical remedies, was the means of directing his whole attention to the study of medicine.

At the age of twenty, Boerhaave delivered an academical oration at Leyden, for which he was awarded a gold medal. He now commenced his public career as a lecturer, and was extremely successful. Though mainly self-educated in medicine, such was his perseverance that at the age of twenty-five he gained his doctor's degree; and after a few years only he became rector of the University which he had entered in poverty as a boy. He was also admitted as a member of the French Academy of Science; and later on, to the Royal Society of London. Boerhaave's fame became world-renowned, and patients came from all parts of the world to consult him. It is told that a Chinese mandarin, who wished to have his advice on a disease from which he suffered, wrote to him, and not knowing his precise address, directed the letter to "*Boerhaave, celebrated Physician, Europe*." Peter the Great was also one of his patients.

In 1722 an attack of gout, accompanied with a stroke of apoplexy, obliged Boerhaave to desist from his active pursuits. In the ensuing year he had a repetition of the seizure, and such was the high estimation in which he was held by his fellow-townsmen, that, on his recovery, the city was illuminated to celebrate the event.

At the commencement of the year 1738 a return of his disorder, with increased violence, warned Boerhaave that his end was drawing nigh. In a few months the great physician who had restored health to so many of his fellow-creatures was numbered with the dead! When the worldly possessions he had left behind were summed up it was found that for a man of his profession, he had left an extraordinary fortune—his property amounting to two millions of florins—which he bequeathed to his only son. But, though possessing so great an amount of wealth, Boerhaave lived with the greatest simplicity. He was of a most patient disposition, especially under provocation. He was once asked by a friend who admired this admirable trait in his character, "Whether he knew what it was to be angry, and by what means he had so entirely suppressed that impetuous and ungovernable passion?" Boerhaave answered with the utmost frankness and sincerity, that "he was naturally quick of resentment, but that he had, by daily prayer and meditation, at length contrived to obtain the mastery over himself."

The city of Leyden erected a monument to his memory with his favourite motto upon it—*Simplex Sigillum Veri*.

NOTE TO THE ABOVE ILLUSTRATION.

IN the year 1643, MILTON—the most eminent of English epic poets—married Mary Powell, the daughter of an Oxfordshire gentleman and magistrate. In more than one respect this was an unsuitable connection, for while his wife's father was a most zealous Royalist, Milton entertained strong Republican opinions, which he took no pains to conceal; and was strongly opposed to the roystering conviviality of the cavaliers. After his marriage, Milton took his wife to London, where he resumed his studious habits—to which, doubtless, he fondly dreamed this domestic quietude would add a charm. In the brief space of a month, however, Mrs. Milton found that this philosophical seclusion of her husband was so much at variance with the habits of her former life—in which she had been surrounded by jovial cavaliers, and had little else to do but to listen and to be amused by them—that she became completely dissatisfied with her married lot. She therefore procured a request from her friends to pay them a visit, and turning a deaf ear to all his entreaties that she would return to him, she left her husband's house, smarting under the pain and annoyance this unfortunate circumstance had occasioned him, Milton—who had exalted notions respecting the prerogatives of a husband and the supremacy of the male sex, resolved to repudiate his wife—as he considered that her desertion of him had broken the nuptial contract. He therefore published several tracts on Divorce, to vindicate his intention of marrying another wife. This reached his wife's ears, with the addition that he was paying his addresses to a young and accomplished lady. The rumour effected that which Milton's remonstrances had failed to do—his wife's jealousy was aroused, and she proceeded to London, with the view of seeking a reconciliation. This was happily brought about by a mutual well-wisher in the following manner—

The poet was invited to make a brief stay at the house of a friend and relative, and while there his wife, who had been purposely stationed in an adjoining apartment, was suddenly brought into the room. Milton was, as may be imagined, greatly surprised at this unexpected meeting with one whom he scarcely expected to have ever seen again; while his astonishment increased when his wife threw herself on her knees before him, and humbly asked for his pardon and forgiveness. Though at first reluctant to excuse what he doubtless considered a serious breach of conjugal duty, Milton, after a brief struggle with his resentful feelings, yielded to the better impulses of his generous nature, and—

"Soon his heart relented
Towards her, his life, so late, and sole delight,
Now at his feet submissive in distress."

The reconciliation between Milton and his wife was sincere and lasting. And it is stated that when the Republicans were in the ascendancy,

Cavaliers in the greatest despondency, Milton behaved with great generosity to those of his wife's family who had been driven from their homes—opening his house to them, and extending to them that protection which his influence with the dominant party enabled him to do.

Milton and his wife lived happily together until her death in 1632. She bore him three daughters, two of whom used to read to him in eight languages—though they understood only their own—it being a common saying of the poet, *"longue was enough for a woman!"*

A few months after his wife's death, Milton connected himself in marriage with the daughter of a Captain Woodcock; but his happiness was of brief duration, for the widow died in the year following—leaving him childless about a year after. But the poet's infirmities rendering a more intimate necessary to his comfort—he being then in his fifty-third year—he again entered the married state—his third wife being Elizabeth Minshull, a lady of good family.

Milton, who had suffered greatly from repeated attacks of the gout, died in 1674, when he had nearly completed his sixty-sixth year. He was buried in the church of St. Giles, Cripplegate, London, where a monument has been erected to his memory; in addition to the one in Westminster Abbey.

In his youth Milton is said to have been extremely handsome. His hair was of a light brown, and parted in the middle, hanging down in curls upon his shoulders. His features were regular, and when he had turned the age of forty, he was generally allowed to have the appearance of being ten years younger. His eyes were of a greyish colour, which were deprived of sight, did not betray their loss; and it was difficult for any one at first sight to know that he was blind. His domestic habits were sober and temperate. Of wine, or any strong liquors, he drank little. In his life he was afflicted in walking exercise, but after he was confined by blindness, he used a machine to swing in for the benefit of his health. Milton was exceedingly fond of music, and no poet has more frequently or more powerfully commended its charms.

WHAT PERSEVERANCE CAN ACCOMPLISH!

(11).—The career of HENRY BICKERSTETH was a most remarkable one, and illustrates in a high degree how any one who is determined to succeed, may by patience, perseverance, and a conscientious discharge of his duties, reach the highest honours of his adopted profession. And it may be remarked that it was to the moral and religious feelings impressed on his mind by his mother that Bickersteth ascribed what was praiseworthy in his after career.

Henry Bickersteth was the son of a medical practitioner at Kirby-Lonsdale, and was intended for his father's profession. To perfect himself in the science of medicine and surgery, he proceeded to London, where he walked the hospitals under the guidance of his uncle. He became a member of the Royal Medical Society, and greatly distinguished himself by his eloquence and energy. His father being taken ill, he went home for the purpose of taking his place, but greatly disliking a country practice, on his father's restoration to health he declined his offer to give up the business to him, and returned to London with the intention of preparing himself for the practice of a physician. But the application he paid to his studies was so great, that a serious illness overtook him, and total relaxation became necessary. On his recovery his uncle procured for him the office of medical attendant to the family of the Earl of Oxford, then on a tour in Italy, and he set off in the beginning of the year 1803 to join them. After remaining with the noble lord for some time, Bickersteth found his dislike to the profession still existed, and he decided to abandon it. Turning his attention to the law, he now entered Caius College, Cambridge, where he took his degree as Senior Wrangler in 1805, competing with Bishop Blomfield and Professor Sedgwick.

Three years afterwards Bickersteth was called to the bar, and for several years he had to contend with the difficulties that frequently attend the early career of a young barrister; it is told that, rather than put his father to further expense, he meditated giving up his new profession and returning to the one he had forsaken. Whilst struggling with great hardships and straitened means, he wrote home—

"Everybody says to me, 'You are certain of success in the end—if you only persevere!' Though I do not understand how it is to happen, I try to believe it, and shall do everything in my power to succeed." Stinting himself even in the necessities of life, he indefatigably persevered, and at length business gradually came to him. As his practice increased day by day so did his reputation, and in 1827 he was appointed King's counsel. In this capacity he was so fully employed that he eventually resolved to give up practice in all other courts, and to confine himself to the Rolls Court. It is recorded that in pursuance of this resolution he declined a brief of three thousand guineas offered him in a case in another court.

After twenty-four years' unswerving application at the bar, Henry Bickersteth was (in 1851) made Master of the Rolls, and created "BARON LANGDALE, of Langdale, in the county of Westmoreland." A few years later on, he declined the office of Lord Chancellor, which, on the resignation of Lord Campbell, was pressed upon him; for although eminently qualified for the post, his exertions in connection with the reform of the Court of Chancery had so much impaired his health that he was under the conviction that he could not

adequately perform the multifarious duties attached to the high office.

Lord Langdale died at Tunbridge Wells in the year 1851, having continued to discharge his official duties to within a month of his death.—He left no son to inherit his honours.

FEARLESS TO THE LAST!

(12).—THE celebrated astronomer, JEAN SYLVAIN BAILLY, was one of the many victims who perished by the guillotine during the French Revolution. At an early age he had sedulously applied himself to astronomical calculations and observations, and so particularly distinguished himself that he was admitted to the Academy of Sciences, and also the French Academy. His peaceful and honoured career, however, was rudely changed by the Revolution. In 1789 he had been chosen deputy for Paris to the States-General, and was chosen president of the first National Assembly. He also became mayor of Paris. But he lost the great popularity he had hitherto enjoyed from the day that he commanded a turbulent assembly in the Champ-de-Mars to disperse, and on their refusal, gave orders to the soldiers to fire upon them, when several were killed.

In November following Bailly retired from his office and from Paris, when his friend LAPLACE, who was equally famous in the field of astronomical science, gave him an asylum in his home at Melun. He now devoted himself again to his studies. On the triumph of the Jacobins, in 1793, Bailly was arrested and taken to Paris. He was examined as a witness on the trial of Marie Antoinette, and soon after was himself condemned to death by the revolutionary Tribunal, his sentence being carried out with every accessory of barbarity which his enemies could invent. Bareheaded and clothed in the usual red shirt, he was placed in a cart, and, with his hands tied behind his back, was driven to the usual place of execution; but the mob, with hideous yells, insisted that he should meet his doom on the spot where he had ordered the military to fire upon the people. Thither he was accordingly led, while the populace, whose idol he had once been, threw mud at him, and followed him with the most insulting reproaches. Having arrived at the fatal spot, Bailly was taken from the cart, and made to walk round the square formed by the brutal populace, in order to gratify their insatiable cruelty. After three hours' exposure to the execrations and violence of the mob, as well as to the inclemency of a bitter winter's day, he was at length permitted to ascend the platform, where the executioner prepared to perform his odious task. "You tremble, coward!" shouted one of the jeering crowd, as Bailly, with great composure, awaited the final blow. "It is only with cold, my friend," replied the victim; and calmly submitting himself to the executioner, in a few moments he was no more.

THE AUTHOR OF "HOLY LIVING AND DYING."

(14).—THAT gifted divine, JEREMY TAYLOR, was born at Cambridge, where his father was a barber. He was educated in the free school of Cambridge, and at thirteen years of age entered Caius College, of which he was soon chosen fellow. At a very early period he began to preach, and his preaching afforded great pleasure to the then Archbishop of Canterbury, who, however, declined to ordain him on account of his extreme youth. "But the youth," says one of his biographers, "humbly begged his Grace to pardon that fault, and promised, if he lived, he would mend it." The Archbishop encouraged and advised Taylor to pursue his studies; and his subsequent career and great usefulness show that he profited by the good advice, for eventually he became Bishop of Down and Connor, and of Dromore.

About 1638 Taylor was presented by Bishop Juxon to the rectory of Uppingham; and having been appointed Chaplain-in-ordinary to Charles I., Taylor attended the king in some of his campaigns. After the defeat of the royalists, his living was sequestered, and he was imprisoned by the Commonwealth. On his release, he retired to Carmarthenshire, where he opened a school and taught therein for his livelihood. And it was while he was so employed that he wrote those works which have immortalized his name. At the Restoration Charles II. preferred him to the bishopric of Down and Connor.

The worthy bishop employed the greatest part of his income in alms and works of public utility, and at his death at Lisburne, in 1667, he left only moderate portions for his three daughters by his second marriage.

Dr. Rust, who preached Jeremy Taylor's funeral sermon, passed the following splendid panegyric on him:—"He had the good humour of a gentleman, the eloquence of an orator, the fancy of a poet, the acuteness of a schoolman, the profoundness of a philosopher, the wisdom of a chancellor, the sagacity of a prophet, the reason of an angel, and the piety of a saint. He had devotion enough for a cloister, learning enough for a university, and wit enough for a college of virtuous; and had his parts and endowments been parcelled out among his clergy that he left behind him, it would, perhaps, have made one of the best dioceses in the world."

Bishop Taylor was a most voluminous writer, his principal works being *Holy Living and Dying*; a *Life of Christ*; and *Ductor Dubitantium, or Rule of Conscience in all her General Measures*.

THE most famous mathematician of his time WILLIAM EMERSON, was born on the 14th of May, 1701, at Hurworth, a village near Darlington. His father kept a school, and perceiving that his boy displayed a fondness for and a marvellous ability in mathematics, he sent him to study under able masters.

Emerson's first start in life was as a school-master, but finding his temper unsuited for the occupation, he very wisely abandoned it. A little later, an event happened which, bringing out his energies, gave a direction to his future career. Shortly after he had opened his school, he had fallen in love with a niece of Dr. Johnson, rector of Hurworth, and with his entire consent married her. The doctor had promised his niece five hundred pounds as a marriage portion, but as he showed no disposition to pay it, Emerson, some time after the marriage, reminded him of his promise; but the uncle said there must be some mistake, and positively refused to pay the money. Emerson—whose independence was great, though his means of subsistence were small—became exceedingly nettled at this treatment, and immediately packing up the clothes his wife had brought with her on her marriage, sent them back to her uncle, declaring he would never be beholden to him for a single farthing. His spirit of independence was roused, and he immediately set to work and wrote a *Treatise on Fluxions*; but his newly-awakened energy was defeated, for the book was unsuccessful. He now became very despondent, but fortunately for him, at this particular time, a great admirer of his works came forward, and introduced him to Mr. Nourse, a bookseller and optician, who not only gave him encouragement, but employment.

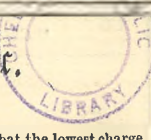
From this time Emerson began to gain fame and fair pecuniary success as a mathematician, and produced several works which to this day are held in high estimation.

It is told that Emerson always walked to London when he had anything to publish, and carefully revised each sheet himself. These journeys were with him a delightful recreation, and no doubt was a healthful restorative to his active brain, giving him time to think over the philosophy of Sir Isaac Newton, of whom he was a devoted admirer.

As this talented mathematician grew older, he became extremely eccentric. His hats, of which he purchased very few in his lifetime, were curiosities of shabbiness; his wigs, which it was then the fashion to wear, were dirty, neglected, uncombed; while for a coat he wore a waistcoat with sleeves to it. He was as odd with regard to his meals as with respect to his dress. He bought all his own provisions—and sometimes would, instead of taking them home, carry them to be cooked at a public-house, where he could enjoy the advantages of a gossip with his neighbours. In conversation he was as peculiar as in everything else—blunt and contentious, yet displaying great versatility of talent.

The eccentric mathematician died in 1729, at the advanced age of eighty-one, and was buried in the churchyard of his native village.

Any letter exceeding the weight of 15 oz. will be liable to a postage of One Halfpenny for every ounce, or fraction of an ounce, beginning with the first ounce.

A letter, for example, weighing between 14 and 15 ounces must be prepaid fifteen pence. A letter posted unpaid will be charged on delivery with double postage, and a letter posted insufficiently prepaid will be charged with double the deficiency.

An Inland Letter must not exceed one foot six inches in length, nine inches in width, or six inches in depth.

INLAND BOOK-POST.

The Book-Post rate is One Halfpenny for every 2 ozs. or fraction of 2 ozs.

A Book-Packet may contain not only books, paper, or other substance in ordinary use for writing or printing, whether plain or written or printed upon (to the exclusion of any written letter or communication of the nature of a letter, photographs, when not on glass or in frames containing glass or any like substance, and anything usually ascertainable to such articles in the way of binding and mounting, or necessary for their safe transmission by post, but also Circulars when these are wholly or in great part printed, engraved, or lithographed.

Any Book-Packet which may be found to contain a letter or communication of the nature of a letter, not being a circular letter or not wholly printed, or any enclosure sealed or in any way closed against inspection, or any other enclosure not allowed by the regulations of the Book-Post, will be treated as a Letter, and charged with double the deficiency of the Letter postage.

Every Book-Packet must be posted either without a cover or in a cover open at both ends, and in such a manner as to admit of the contents being easily withdrawn for examination; otherwise it will be treated as a letter.

A packet posted wholly unpaid will be charged with double the Book-Postage; and if posted partially prepaid, with double the deficiency.

No Book-Packet may exceed 5 lbs. in weight, or one foot six inches in length, nine inches in width, and six inches in depth.

POSTAGE ON INLAND REGISTERED NEWSPAPERS.

Prepaid Rate.—For each Registered Newspaper, whether posted singly or in a packet.—One Halfpenny; but a packet containing two or more Registered Newspapers is not chargeable with a higher rate of postage than would be chargeable on a Book-Packet of the same weight, viz., One Halfpenny for every 2 ozs., or fraction of 2 ozs.

Unpaid Rates.—A Newspaper posted unpaid, or a packet of Newspapers posted either unpaid or insufficiently paid, will be treated as an unpaid, or insufficiently paid Book-Packet of the same weight.

The postage must be prepaid either by an adhesive stamp or by the use of a stamped wrapper. Every Newspaper or packet of Newspapers must be posted either without a cover or in a cover open at both ends, and in such a manner as to admit of easy removal for examination; if this rule be infringed, the newspaper or packet will be treated as a letter.

No Newspaper, whether posted singly

or in a packet, may contain any enclosure except the supplement or supplements belonging to it. If it contain any other, it will be charged as a letter.

No packet of Newspapers may exceed 14 lbs. in weight, or two feet in length by one foot in width or depth.

REGISTRATION.

By the prepayment of a fee of two pence, any letter, newspaper, or book-packet may be registered to any place in the United Kingdom or the British Colonies. The Post-Office will not undertake the safe transmission of valuable enclosures in unregistered letters; and letters found to contain coin, will, on delivery, be charged with a registration fee of 8d.

POST CARDS.

Post-Cards, bearing an impressed Halfpenny stamp, can be obtained at all Post Offices, at the rate of 8½d. per half-dozen. A thicker Card is also issued at 4d. per half-dozen. They are available for transmission between places in the United Kingdom only.

Patterns, same as for Printed Papers, except that the lowest charge is 1d.

Letters not prepaid will be charged double rates on delivery. Registration fee, 2½d., which, in addition to the postage, must be prepaid.—No money, jewellery, nor articles of saleable value, may be enclosed.—Patterns not to exceed 8 ozs.; but for Belgium, France, Greece, Luxembourg, and the United States, it is limited to 12 ozs.—Newspapers, Commercial Papers, Printed Papers, or Books, must not exceed 4 lbs. in weight.

POST-OFFICE SAVINGS BANKS.

Deposits of one shilling upwards will be received from any depositor at the Post-office Savings Banks, provided the deposits made by such depositor in any year ending the 31st day of December do not exceed 30l., and provided the total amount does not exceed 150l. exclusive of interest. When the principal and interest together amount to the sum of 200l., all interest will cease.

The interest (2 per cent.) is calculated to the 31st December in every year, and is then added to, and becomes part of the principal.

POST-OFFICE ORDERS.

Money Orders are granted in the United Kingdom, as follows:—

For sums under 10s., 2d.; for 10s. and under £2, 3d.; and an extra 1d. for each extra pound up to £10, which is 1s. Above which none are granted, but orders can be multiplied to any amount.

FOR SCOTLAND.

An infant must be registered within 21 days after its Birth.—A Marriage must be registered within three days after the occurrence.—A Death must be registered within eight days after the demise.
