CHELTENHAM.



CHELTENHAM has gained such a celebrity on account of the salubrity of its climate, its health restoring springs, and picturesque drives, as to render its past history a matter of interest. Its transformation from an obscure village into the "Queen of Watering Places," attracting the titled and wealthy from all parts of the world, is one

of the most striking facts in modern topography. A visitor to Cheltenham seventy years ago would have found in the

centre of the present High Street a running stream crossed here and there by rude stepping stones. Official documents unquestionably prove that a century ago the town presented all the appearance of a straggling village. The parish register records at this period but three or four deaths and christenings annually, and even so late as the year 1780, we have traced in the *Morning Post* a letter from a visitor

descanting upon the beauties of the place, but complaining from the remote nature of the locality, that he could not obtain a lodging even for a single night. A more retired, rural, unfrequented part of

England was, perhaps, scarcely to be found at that time. In this obsolete condition it would in all human probability have remained had not the mineral waters been discovered. But, notwithstanding that subsequent to the first knowledge of the existence of salubrious springs, Cheltenham was a most insignificant place, yet, prior to that memorable event, it was of historic note and enjoyed important chartered privileges.

Cheltenham is situated in a diversified vale, encircled by the ever verdant and romantic Cotswold Hills, covering a space of 1,200 acres, within a circumference of twenty miles. Taking into consideration the rustic and pastoral character of the ancient Britons, we are not surprised to find that our locality was known to them. The former occupancy of the place is proved by the discovery of a large number of British stone coffins on the land known as "Paradise," near the old workhouse. The frequent disinterment of Roman jars, coins, and pottery, and the existence of extensive and nearly perfect encampments on all the surrounding hills, demonstrate also that the site of the present town was part of the Roman territory.

From the first establishment of religious institutions in the county this place enjoyed a Priory. So early as the year 803, we are informed that there existed an extensive monastic institution which continued to flourish until the general destruction of such places by the Danes. The manorial records relate that Cheltenham Priory stood on the spot now occupied by the houses 403, and 404, High Street.

The first landed proprietor of Cheltenham, of whom there is any trace, was King Edward the Confessor, who owned it in the eleventh century. This monarch imposed on the then inhabitants a hunting tax, and compelled them to supply him annually with "three thousand loaves for his dogs." William the Conqueror, next held possession, and in his days the inhabitants consisted of twenty copyholders, ten border servants, and seven slaves. For successive generations the manor was royal property, and was either granted to some monastic body, or sold or leased to persons of quality. Henry III. gave it to the Earl of Salisbury, a natural son of that celebrated but unfortunate beauty, Fair Rosamond, who was born at the village of Frampton-on-Severn, sixteen miles from this town. About this era there existed several eminent natives. These were branches of the De Cheltenham family, a title allotted by royal patent. The last of them, Richard de Cheltenham, was celebrated for his literary and theological acquirements. He died Abbot of Tewkesbury in the reign of Henry the VII., and a monument was raised to his memory, which still exists in the Abbey Church at Tewkesbury. Cheltenham, from the fact of its possessing a Church and Priory before the Conquest, became a religious station from the earliest period. This induced various monarchs, who were its owners by hereditary right, to annex it to some wealthy monastery. Henry I. placed the rectory at the disposal of Cirencester Abbey, at which time it was worth £24 annually. The manor for some time was held by the Norman Abbey of Fescamp, when it passed into the possession of the richly endowed Abbey

of Sion, at Brentford, delightfully situated on the banks of the Thames. It was held by this body until the dissolution of the monasteries in the reign of Henry VIII., since which period it has remained private property. The manor was purchased by the Prince of Wales (afterwards the unfortunate Charles I.), and sold by him in 1628 to John Dutton, Esq., of Sherborne. Mr. Dutton was an early ancestor of the Sherborne family, and in their possession the manor was vested for 250 years successively. In March, 1843, Lord Sherborne disposed of his manorial rights and interest to Mrs. Mary Gardner and James Agg-Gardner, Esq., the late lady and lord of the manor. In order to show the change which has taken place in the value of local property, we need only to direct attention to the fact that the first purchase of the Cheltenham Manor by the Sherbornes, a little more than two centuries ago, was effected for £1,200, but when it was sold to the above proprietors the purchase money was £39,000. The present owner is J. Tynte Agg-Gardner, Esq., M.P.

To Queen Elizabeth, once lady of the manor, we stand indebted for the establishment of the first local public charity. Her Majesty gave a variety of lands to Richard Pates, Esq., to enable him to found the Free Grammar School, in the High Street, and the Alms Houses in Albion Street, which bear his name. During this Queen's reign the town appears to have fallen from a state of prosperity, for we learn that W. Norwood, Esq., the then lord of the manor, presented to her Majesty a petition praying that the inhabitants might in future be excused from the trouble and expense of sending two members to Parliament, as had been the practice in former times. In consequence of this application the town was disenfranchised, its two parliamentary members were never again sent, and the place was unrepresented until the passing of the Reform Bill in 1835, since which time it has returned one member, being now represented by J. T. Agg-Gardner, Esq., J.P.

The ancient commercial trade appears to have been corn and tobacco. The old market occupied the site of the Plough Hotel, and on its removal the date 1101 was found on one of the foundation stones. A butter cross stood but a short distance from the Public Offices, on the left, which was blown down by a violent storm about half a century ago. Tobacco was cultivated to some extent in the seventeenth century. Its growth was at length put a stop to by the Parliament of Charles I. levying a fine upon all who raised it for traffic.

From the circumstance of Cheltenham being a royal manor, it became an object of attack during the period of the memorable civil wars in the reign of Charles I. Oliver Cromwell several times drove the Royalists

from the place, and held possession for several months. The most important engagement appears to have taken place on the spot now occupied by St. James's Square, for at different times various skeletons and "relics of the battle field" have been, and still continue not unfrequently to be exhumed. The population of the place has undergone great vicissitudes. The number who anciently resided here can only be gleaned from historical writers, and they reveal in one reign a state of prosperity, and in a succeeding reign a state of adversity. The only data from which we can commence and continue our account of the population with certainty begins with the reign of Charles II., for at that time the census was first taken, and has since been continued without interruption. In 1666 the number of inhabitants was 1,500; in 1821, 13,388; in 1831, 22,941; in 1841, 36,617; in 1861, 39,693; in 1871, 44,519; and in 1881, 46,844. These figures demonstrate the rapid rise and increase of the town in a far more striking manner than can be done by the most lengthy prose detail. In whatever street the visitor may chance to turn, elegant shops with plate glass windows meet his eye, and an abundance of tradesmen display their names catering for public support. Sixty years ago there was but one resident physician and apothecary in the town, the justly celebrated Dr. Jenner; and beyond the markets, few opportunities were afforded to the residents of obtaining the necessary commodities of life.

The original cause of this rapid growth is undoubtedly attributable to its mineral springs, the first of which was discovered in 1716.

In 1788 H.M. George III., with the Queen and Princesses, visited the town and partook of the waters, since which it has been steadily rising into celebrity as a place of fashionable resort, and is at the present time eminent for the elegance of its buildings, the extent and variety of its accommodation, and the rank and number of its visitors, of whom in the course of the season there are generally not less than 15,000.

For the guidance of visitors, the following few remarks may be of service respecting these waters:—They may be advantageously drunk at any season of the year except the middle of winter, the best time being the morning. They should be taken in almost all cases at the springs. The dose for an adult is from a pint to a pint-and-a-half, taken in two portions, with an interval of about twenty minutes between them.

The only real chalybeate water is to be obtained at the Cambray Spa, whose Pump Room, an octagonal building, is situated at the southern end of Rodney Road.

The Montpellier waters were discovered in 1808, and ten years later a handsome Pump Room was erected. A Colonnade supplies an

agreeable place for a "constitutional" in wet weather. A new Pump Room, called the Rotunda, was added in 1826.

Pittville, so called from its owner J. Pitt, Esq., who, on the discovery of its spring in 1822, commenced laying out the estate with great liberality and refined taste, and in 1825-30 built the Pump Room, at a cost of nearly £20,000. The building is of the Ionic Order, with the addition of a Dome and is surrounded by a noble colonnade, 20 feet wide, formed by Ionic Pillars. The front is adorned with statues of Hygeia, Æsculapius and Hippocrates. The principal chamber is 34 feet high, and 130 feet long. The extensive grounds, with the ornamental lake and charmingly laid out walks and drives are great attractions to visitors. The property has recently been purchased by the Cheltenham Corporation.

The depth of the main well is estimated at 90 feet; the temperature of the water at 57° Fahrenheit. When tested with litmus, the reaction is alkaline. Taste of the water, pleasantly saline; smell, slightly of sulphuretted hydrogen. There are about 16,254 cubic inches of free carbonic acid (at 50° Fahrenheit) in the gallon. Amount of fixed residue, 645·6053.

Lastly we have to notice the oldest of the Spas, the one which first drew attention to the town, the Royal Old Wells, and which recently formed part of the Theatre.

The temperature of the water is estimated at 57° 2' Fahrenheit. The reaction, when the water is tested with litmus, is distinctly alkaline; the taste, saline; the smell, that of sulphuretted hydrogen. Free carbonic acid, 33·705 cubic inches; specific gravity, at 60° Fahrenheit, 1·0064.

The arrivals from that time include the principal nobility of the nation, and the beauty and salubrious climate of the district, soon made many permanent residents. In later years, the establishment of the Cheltenham Proprietary College, Bath Road, largely augmented the population—the superior educational advantages attracting families from all parts of the United Kingdom. The Ladies' College, Bayshill, offers similar advantages to the daughters of gentlemen. These institutions, together with the Dean Close Memorial School, Church of England Training College, and other large and well-conducted Establishments, have given the town a high position in the educational world.

A Charter of Incorporation was granted in 1876, and under its provision the town is governed by a mayor, 6 aldermen and 18 councillors.

During the last few years, several very great improvements have

been effected in the formation of new thoroughfares and the widening of others, thereby adding very considerably to the attractions of the town.

Having briefly sketched the past, we must ask our readers to judge of the present, for themselves, feeling assured that an hour's drive or an afternoon's stroll round its delightful streets, will enable them to carry away a better, fresher, and clearer idea of the beauties of the town than can be obtained from the perusal of all the books that are written; while the matter contained in this Directory will supply the necessary information. Beyond the streets and drives of Cheltenham, however, there are attractions which will afford the visitor a gratification of no ordinary kind, and which, if sought after, will be highly conducive to health, viz., the natural beauties of its environs.

For an inland place, we think no finer spot for the study of the picturesque can be found, there being every conceivable variety of scenery. This arises from its peculiar geographical position—the town being situated in a vale surrounded by lofty and craggy hills. These upland situations are at so short a distance that they may be easily visited, and the prospect from their summits is of the most varied and picturesque description. In order to show how elevated are these miniature mountains, and how distant must be the prospect they afford, we annex the heights of four of the adjacent hills, as decided by the trigonometrical survey, published by Sir R. J. Murchison, Bart., President of the London Geological Society:—

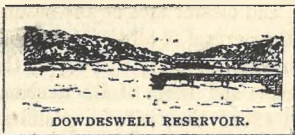
Agg's Hill.

“Then Hewlett's see, fronting the western breeze,
But from the east well screened by thickest keep,
From whence is seen the wide extended dale,
With all the beauties of the adjacent vale.”

One of the many frequented drives and walks which lie contiguous to the town is that of Hewlett's or Agg's Hill. It is in a line with Hewlett Street and Jersey Place. The road rises very gradually, and as the tourist ascends, his eye on the left is gratified by the prospect of Hewletts. The situation is commanding, and from the hill may be witnessed a view, rich in the various tints of nature, and embellished with some worthy efforts of art. From the summit may be seen

“Both Tewk'sbury and Glo'ster's ancient towers,
Unless the mist or rising tempest lours;
With Bredon's hugh and British alps, that rise
Near Malvern's village, pointing to the skies.
Then farther south the Cambrian hills appear
Their lofty heads, and to the eye appear
But indistinct, light robed in dusky grey,
Or with the sky immingling fade away.”

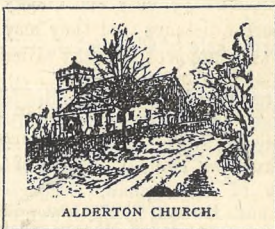
Agg's Hill is celebrated as the spot where a landslip took place in 1839. This event caused a considerable sensation at the time, and attracted for a long period a large number of spectators. It was similar to the landslip which occurred at Seaton, in Devonshire, about the same time, although, we are happy to record, less serious in its effects. Near the base of the hill will be found the reservoirs which supply the town with water. The extension waterworks for and with the previous existing supply affords upwards of 1,000,000 gallons a day.

supplementing the supply were begun in October, 1883; the reservoir is situated in the Dowdeswell Valley,

Alderton is a village and Parish in Winchcomb Union, eight miles north-east of Cheltenham, pleasantly situated in the midst of hills, from which there are some beautiful views of the surrounding country. There are several charities for the benefit of the poor, and schools for children of both sexes, supported by the Rector. The Church is an ancient Gothic edifice, dedicated to St. Margaret, consisting of nave, south aisle, and tower with six bells. The Rectory is in the patronage and incumbency of Rev. Chas. Covey, LL.B. and is valued at £350 per annum, with residence. The Wesleyans have a place of worship here. Population 415.



ALDERTON CHURCH.

DIXTON is a small hamlet of this parish, two miles south-west; in which are the remains of a Saxon encampment. The Manor House, formerly the residence of the ancient family of Highford, is now occupied by F. R. Malleson, Esq., and has the date of 1555 over the entrance gate.

Alstone.—Hamlet on the west side of Cheltenham. (Residents, see general list.)

Andoversford is a hamlet in the parishes of Dowdeswell and Whittington, about six miles south-east of Cheltenham, on the main road to Oxford. It has a station on the Banbury and Cheltenham branch of the Great Western Railway; also on the Midland and South Western Railway; and a Cattle Market, where sales are conducted first and third Friday in each month by Mr. J. G. Villar and Messrs. Acock and Tayler. About a mile from here, on the old Gloucester Road, in Shipton parish, is an ancient hostelry, known as the "Frog Mill" Inn, kept by Mr. J. Robins.

Ashchurch is a large parish about six miles from Cheltenham, comprising the tything and hamlet of Aston-upon-Carrant, Fiddington, Northway, and Pamington, also the hamlets of Natton and Newton. It is in the Union of Tewkesbury, and has a population of 725, area 420½ acres; in the Deanery of Winchcomb, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, in the lower division of Tewkesbury Hundred. It is on the main road from Tewkesbury to Winchcomb, and is most easily got at from Cheltenham by the Midland Railway. The Church, restored in 1888, and consisting of nave, chancel, north aisle, with porch, and a fine tower with a peal of six bells, is an ancient and commodious edifice dedicated to St. Nicholas, and is in the incumbency of the Rev. H. Leach. The living is valued at £250 per annum, and in the gift of Sir G. A. Cayling, Bart. There is a school for children of both sexes.

Aston Blank, or **Cold Aston**, is a Parish in the Northleach Union, in the Deanery of Northleach, Archdeaconry of Cirencester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. It has an area of 2,261 acres with 271 inhabitants. It is nearly fourteen miles from Cheltenham, three miles from Bourton-on-the-Water, and about two miles from the Notgrove Station on the Banbury and Cheltenham Railway. At present the Vicarage is without an Incumbent. It is in the patronage of the Lord Chancellor. The Curate in charge is the Rev. D. F. Vigers, Rector of the adjoining parish of Notgrove.

Badgeworth is a parish in the upper division of the Hundred of Dudstone and King's Barton, four miles (S.W. by W.) from Cheltenham, in the Union of Cheltenham. With the adjoining hamlets there is a population of 1,004, according to the last census; area, 3,760 acres; and rateable value in 1889, £8,845. It can be reached by two roads, viz.: the Gloucester Road, the Lansdown Road or through Shurdington. In the 13th century the vicarage of Badgeworth and Scher-
 enton belonged to the Priory of Usk, almost certainly given to that Priory by the de Clares. According to Atkins, Gilbert de Clare was possessed of this manor in 1314, and it is probable that the beautiful Chapel of St. Margaret, together with the decorated portions of the Church, are owing to the munificence of the de Clares. Gilbert de Clare, the last of the line, was killed at Bannockburn, June 23, 1314. On the apex of the west window of St. Margaret's Chapel is the sculptured head of Edward II., and on either side of it the heads of Gilbert de Clare and his wife. The present Church was consecrated in July, 1315. The Priory of Usk possessed a College here, but at the dissolution, the whole property of

the Priory being less than £200 per annum, was suppressed by the Act of Henry VIII., in 1536, and the property for the most part passed into lay hands. In 1889 a Church capable of holding 225 worshippers was built and endowed by Mrs. Strangways, as a memorial to her son Edmund Lawrence Strangways, and of her brother, William Edward Lawrence, of The Greenway, in this parish. At the same time the parishes of Badgeworth and Shurdington were for ecclesiastical purposes separated, and both parishes are in the gift of the Vicar of Badgeworth. The present Incumbent is the Rev. A. W. Ellis Viner, B.A., University College, Oxford.

Barnwood is a parish in Gloucester Union, containing 619 inhabitants and 1,471 acres; it is eight miles distant from Cheltenham, and may be visited either by way of the Gloucester Road, or by taking train to Gloucester, and then passing through the village of Wotton. It is about two miles from Gloucester, in the Deanery and Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, the upper division of Dudstone Hundred. The vicarage, in the incumbency of the Rev. W. J. Kennedy, is valued at £300 per annum, and is in the patronage of the Dean and Chapter of Gloucester. The Church, which is dedicated to Saint Lawrence, consists of a double chancel, nave, and narrow aisle, with a low embattled tower; there is a double bell turret on the eastern gable of the nave. It has interesting specimens of Norman, early English, and perpendicular architecture. Barnwood has a school for children of both sexes. Barnwood House and the Second County Asylum are institutions for the insane. Barnwood House is under the superintendence and management of Dr. Needham. The population, according to last census was 761, but at least one third of this population consists of inmates of the two Asylums.

Beckford is a parish and village in Winchcomb Union, nine miles north from Cheltenham, and has a station on the Ashchurch and Evesham Branch Railway. The living, with the Chapelry of Ashton-under-Hill annexed, is an endowed vicarage, valued at £400 per annum, with residence, and is the gift of and held since 1865 by the Rev. Joseph Harrison. The Church is an ancient edifice, in the Norman style, dedicated to St. John the Baptist, consisting of nave, chancel, and aisle, with a handsome tower, rising from the centre, containing a clock and a peal of six bells. The porch and the chancel arch are two fine examples of Norman work. There is a national school for children of both sexes. Beckford Hall was the ancient mansion of the Wakeman family, but is now the residence of Captain H. A. Case-Walker, J.P. A private Catholic Chapel is attached to Beckford Hall. Population of Beckford 461, and of Ashton-under-Hill 359.

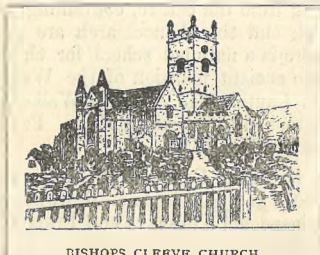
Berkeley.—The far famed Castle of Berkeley may be visited from this town, by the Bristol and Birmingham Railway, in three-quarters of an hour. It may be inspected Tuesdays and Fridays by permission from his Lordship, and the entrance door will be found, by following the gravel path at the gateway, to the right of the church-yard. The Castle is of very great antiquity, and is generally regarded as the only perfect monument of Norman castle building in England. The rooms are numerous, and are filled with curiosities of value in endless variety. Among the extensive collection of original paintings which ornament the apartments, are portraits of James I., Queen Elizabeth and Queen Mary (by Sir Peter Lely). Mary Queen of Scots, Cromwell and others by Salvator Rosa, Holbein and Claude Lorraine. James I. was a frequent guest at the castle, and the massive oak bedstead, made for his use, is still in excellent preservation. Two cabinets have been much admired, both on account of their antiquity and curious workmanship, one of them is entirely formed of tortoiseshell, and the other of brown oak. In another apartment is the chair, sofa, and bedstead, which formed part of the cabin furniture of Sir Francis Drake during his voyage round the world. But the portion of the edifice which possesses most interest, is the room where Edward II. was murdered, an event which has for ever perpetuated the name of Berkeley Castle. This room is a small square one, still retaining its original furniture, to the right of the keep staircase, gloomy to the extreme, and the mind shudders, when viewing

it, at the recollection of the scene that was once enacted within its massive walls. It was in the dead of the night on September 21st, 1327, that the assassins entered this apartment, and after smothering the king with a bed, they burnt out his intestines with a red-hot iron. The ancient poet Drayton, has thus described this atrocious deed :—

“The doors forth a fearful howling cast,
To let those in by whom he was to die ;
At whose approach, while there he lies aghast,
Those ruthless villains did upon him fly,
And without human pity or remorse,
With a hot spit they thrust him to the heart.”

The Castle was besieged by the parliamentary forces in 1645, and surrendered upon honourable terms, but was afterwards given back to George Lord Berkeley on condition of its being rendered incapable of defence ; it is now surrounded by terraces bright with flowers, and a beautiful lawn studded with majestic Scotch fir trees and cedars.

Bishops Cleeve is a parish, including the township of Bishops Cleeve, and the hamlets of Gotherington, Woodman-cote, Scutham, and Brockhampton, in Winchcomb Union, and Stoke Orchard in Tewkesbury Union, containing in Winchcomb Union an area of 7,290 acres by last to which it gives its name.

BISHOPS CLEEVE is a township and village forming part of the above parish, containing by the last census 650 inhabitants, one-mile-and-a-half north-east from the Cleeve Station on the Midland Railway, and $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles north of Cheltenham. The rectory, in the incumbency of the Rev. B. F. Hemming, is valued at £1,570 per annum, with about 447 acres of glebe land and residence, which was formerly occupied by the Bishop of Worcester. The Church is one of the largest village churches in the county, it is dedicated to St. Michael, and consists of chancel, north and south aisles, with a tower, containing a peal of six bells. The tower fell in some 200 years ago, and was rebuilt in a somewhat debased style ; the south porch and west front of the church are fine specimens of Norman architecture. Bishops Cleeve has a board school for children of both sexes. On the hill are the “camps,” a British encampment with double ramparts 300 yards in length. A skirmish is said to have been fought here between the forces of Cromwell and Charles, as Essex came down over Prestbury to raise the Siege of

Gloucester. Skirmishes occurred also at Battledown and Andoversford. There is a saline spring in the parish called Alcester Spa. Captain Richmond is lord of the manor. The parish is at a considerable level above sea as ascertained at ordnance survey, varying in its heights from 630 feet at Rising Sun to 71 feet in Stoke Orchard.

WOODMANCOTE is a hamlet of the above parish, containing by the last census, 381 inhabitants, one mile east from Cleeve, situated on the slope of the Cotswold hills.

SOUTHAM AND BROCKHAMPTON form another hamlet of the above parish, three miles north-east from Cheltenham, containing, according to the last census, 238 inhabitants. There is a small chapel of ease, private church of the late Earl of Ellenborough. Southam House, formerly the seat of the Earl of Ellenborough, is an ancient building, which Leland

It was attacked during the civil wars, and behind the knocker at the principal entrance door may be traced a bullet perforation. The hill which is seen directly to the right is called "Cleeve Clouds," and may be ascended by various easy circuitous footpaths. The prospect from the summit will well repay the fatigue of the tourist. Here may be

There is a board school for children of both sexes. STOKE ORCHARD forms another hamlet of Bishops Cleeve, though in the Tewkesbury Union, containing, according to the last census, 150 inhabitants and 1,378 acres of land, in the Deanery of Winchcomb, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, Hundred of Cleeve, East Gloucestershire, one mile north-west from Cleeve

Birdlip is a small hamlet formed out of the three parishes of Brimpsfield, in the Cirencester Union, and Cowley and Witcombe, in Cheltenham Union. It is about six miles from Cheltenham, and is reached by taking the Bath and Leckhampton roads. Situated on the "Lip" or brow of the Cotswolds, 976 feet above the sea, where the Ancient British Ermine Street from Southampton dips down the face of the hills. Many camps and barrows, as at Rendcombe, Nettleton, Barrow-wake Hill, Crickley, and Leckhampton, and the Kimbury, above

Painswick, mark the scene of battles with the Romans, on their march under Plautius to Gloucester, in the years A.D. 43-44. Mounds showing the site of British Birdlip are seen in the fields on the left, at the entrance into the village, as well as a portion of the Welsh (properly Wilt's) Way, which beyond Brimpsfield unites with the British Jack Way to Jack Barrow, and by Jackament Bottom, into the Acman Street, to Bath. A pleasant walk through Witcombe woods brings the visitor to the Roman Villa, in the Sarn Dell under Cooper's Hill, where a large entrenchment crowns the height. The White Horse of Berkshire, Swindon and Purton Stations, the Marlborough Downs, and Wootten Bassett can be seen from the ridge above the village; and from the George Gardens are seen in the west the Holy Mount, or Sugar Loaf, the Hatterills, the Beacons of Brecon, with Gloucester and the Cathedral being prominently in the foreground, the Malvern and Abberley Hills, Worcester Cathedral, Tewkesbury Abbey, and the Clent Hills, with Hagley Monument to the North. The Cleve Hills and the Titterstone appear beyond Malvern. The scenery *en route* is of a very varied character, hills, dales, woods, and meadows delightfully intermingle here. Cattle sales are held about every second Friday in every month. There is a Baptist Chapel, in which services are conducted at 11 a.m. 2.30 and 6 p.m. on Sundays.

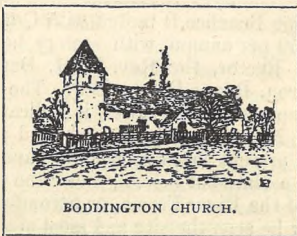

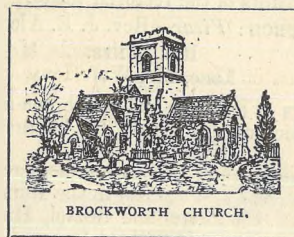

It is about five miles from Cheltenham; the best way to it is by the Painswick Road as far as the "Cross Hands" Inn, turning then to the right along the Gloucester and Cirencester roads (the ancient Ermine Street of the Romans); in the and in the incumbency of the Rev. J. Herbert Seabrook, K.C.L., is valued at £200 per annum, with residence. The church contains nave, chancel, and north aisle, with a low tower, and is dedicated to St. George; the interior arches are early Norman. There is a National School; also a Baptist Chapel, which is at present unused. Several Roman remains have been discovered at Brockworth Court, the ancient Manor House, a portion of which dates from the beginning of the fifteenth century. It was for more than a century the residence of the Guises. In the church is a finely sculptured monument to Sir Christopher Guise, the first baronet of the family.

On the south side of the chancel is erected a stained glass window to commemorate the death of Lieutenant C. W. H. Newport, of this parish, who fell at the battle of Kandahar in the year 1820. There are six bells. The churchyard was enlarged in 1854. The registers date from 1535. The living is a Vicarage, value £120 per annum, with house. The vicar is the Rev. W. J. Mayne, and the Lord Bishop of the Diocese is the patron. There is a school board. Population, 2,400. Area, 3,120 acres

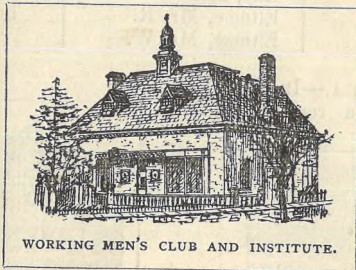

Chedworth is a parish in the hundred of Rapsgate, in the county of Gloucester, four miles north-east of Northleach, (its post town) and eleven miles south-south-east of Cheltenham, and seven from Cirencester. The direct way from Cheltenham is by the London Road, through Dowdeswell and Withington. The drive *en route* is beautifully varied by hill and dale, copse and woods throughout. The village, with a population of 816, is exceedingly pretty, covering a large area of some four square miles, and being situated on the table-land of the Cotswolds, has a very bracing climate. The Church (dedicated to St. Andrew) is of Norman architecture, and has been restored and improved under the direction of F. Waller, Esq., of Gloucester. It possesses nave, western tower, and north aisle. Its windows on the south side are supposed to be late perpendicular, about 1480. There is a fine sculptured stone pulpit. The living is a vicarage, in the Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, value £300, in the patronage of Queen's College, Oxford. There is a very good National School for children of both sexes, under government inspection. The Howe family took the title of Baron from Chedworth. The manor is now in the possession of the Earl of Eldon. The Independents have an endowed chapel here.

covery was made in the year 1866 by James Farrar, Esq. While digging out a ferret, some tesserae were brought to light. Mr. Farrar's attention

having been called to this, he undertook to prosecute the matter, and has uncovered a large area of land, which was then a coppice wood, and exposed to view the remains of a fine Roman villa. The cost of these excavations and the substantial coverings for the protection of this work of antiquity, was defrayed by the Right Hon. the Earl of Eldon, upon whose estate it is situated. An interesting museum of objects brought to light during the excavations is attached. These remains are well worthy of inspection, and during the summer months, are visited by travellers from all parts of England. There is a large and commodious hotel near, upon the "Foss Way," known as "Foss Bridge," kept by Brother Berry.

Churchdown, a straggling village and parish, five miles by road and four by rail from Cheltenham, in the eastern division of the county, in the hundred of Dunstone and King's Barton, in the Union and County Court district of Gloucester, in the Rural Deanery and Archdeaconry of Gloucester and Bristol. The direct road is through Up Hatherley and the Reddings. It has a joint station of the Midland and Great Western Railway Companies. The Church of St. Bartholomew, which is built on the summit of an outlier of the Cotswolds, is a very ancient structure, containing pre-Norman traces, with arcade separating the south aisle from the nave of semi-Norman work, chancel, porch with three storeys, and square tower containing five bells. On the inside of the tower wall there is this remarkable inscription—

THIS BEL HOWS WAS BYYLDEDE

IN THE YEERE OF OVR LORD GOD 1601.

The hill, 580 feet high, upon which it is built is called Churchdown Hill,—from *Church-on-the-Hill*, whence the name of the parish is supposed to have been derived. There is an ancient Roman encampment on the summit of this hill. The register dates from 1563. The living is a Vicarage of the annual value of £300, with thirty acres of glebe land and a residence, and is in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Bristol. The Rev. F. Smithe is the vicar. There is an endowed day school for boys and girls; master, Mr. Swift. The Lord of the Manor was the late Joseph Lovegrove, Esq. Area, 4,559 acres; population last census, 686. Hucclecote is an ancient hamlet of Churchdown, part of which is now made into a separate parish. The meets for foxhounds at the "Hare and Hounds" (run in the lower part of this parish) are always advertised in the *Times* newspaper.

Cirencester is 16 miles distant: The church is a much admired edifice, in the early English style, and abounds in monuments of brass. The Park, belonging to the Earl Bathurst, adjoining the town, is open to the public. It is 16 miles in circumference, and contains the finest Roman Villa in the County, a lofty pillar surmounted with a statue of Queen Anne, and a stone house where the poet Pope composed several of his poems. The principal avenue is about five miles in length. The Agricultural College (under the presidency of His Grace the Duke of Richmond and Gordon, K.G.) is situated about a mile from the town, for the instruction of young men in agricultural science and management.

there being a large staff of professors in various branches, and a farm of nearly 500 acres in connection with the College. The population in 1891 was 7,737.

The Church of St. John the Baptist is a fine structure in the early English, early decorated and perpendicular styles, consisting of chancel, north and south and two north chapels, a restored nave of six bays, north aisle, with chapel, south porch or gate house and an embattled western tower of perpendicular date, with pinnacles, and containing a peal of twelve bells, with a chiming apparatus, which strikes the £14,000, and decorations have since been added to the extent of about £2,000. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £400, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, and held since 1881 by the Venerable H. R. Hayward, M.A.

The living is a rectory, value £450 per annum, with residence and 17 acres of glebe land, in the gift of John Henry Elwes, Esq. The rector is the Rev. Cowley is a village and parish in the Cotswold district, five and a half miles from Cheltenham, built on the slope of a hill. It is in the eastern division of the county, in the Hundred of Rapsgate, in the Union and County Court district of Cheltenham, in the Rural Deanery of Cheltenham, in the Archdeaconry of Gloucester, and in the Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The visitor's direct way is by the Cirencester Road, through Charlton Kings. The river Churn courses through this parish. St. Mary's Church—a good example of a small and simple early English Church—consists of a nave and chancel, with an embattled tower, in which are six bells. Against the north wall is the stone figure of a priest of the 14th century, with a lion couchant at his feet; the inscription is quite lost. The living (with 73 acres of glebe land) is a rectory of the annual value of £306 (gross) with residence, and is in the gift of the Lord Chancellor. There are two schools in this parish for the children of the poor, supported by voluntary contributions—one at Cowley and one at Birdlip. W. Baring Bingham, Esq., who is Lord of the Manor, resides in a handsome and spacious stone mansion, delightfully situated on the side of a hill; the pleasure grounds are very judiciously laid out, and beautified by an ornamental trout stream. Population, 300; area, 1,918 acres.

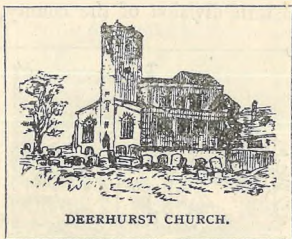

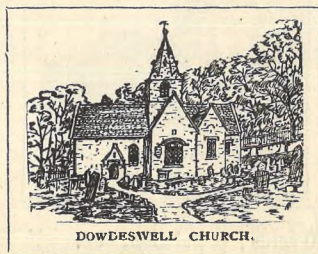

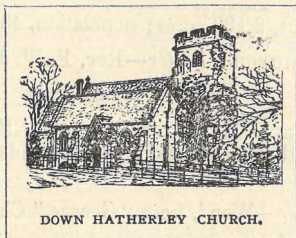

In this church there are four monuments, and the coat of arms of Sir Matthew Wood, Bart., Alderman, twice Lord Mayor of London, who is buried in a vault in the churchyard at the east end of the church. The date of the register is from 1563. The living is a rectory of the value of £210 annually. Rector, the Rev. Canon H. William Maddy, M.A. The school for boys and girls, endowed by Lord Hatherley, is conducted on the National system. Hatherley Court, beautifully situated and finely timbered, was formerly a moated residence. Area, 858 acres; population, 196. The late Lord Hatherley took his title from this place.

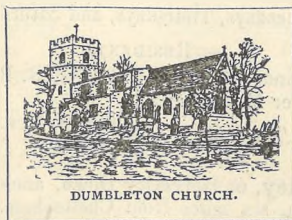

Dumbleton is a village and parish, twelve miles from Cheltenham, in the eastern division of the county, the lower division of the Hundred of Kiftsgate, the Union and County Court district of Winchcomb, the Rural Deanery of Campden, the Archdeaconry of Cirencester, and the Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. It may be visited by the Midland Railway, and is distant three miles from Beckford station. The old stone Church of St. Peter is in the mixed style, and has a nave, aisle, chancel, and square tower with six bells and a clock. Here are several monuments of the Cocks' family, and one to the son of the Earl of Northumberland. The date of the register is from 1738. The living is a rectory of the annual value of £350, including the glebe, with a handsome residence. Rector, the Rev. F. W. Jones, M.A. There is a school, on the National plan, for children of both sexes. Area, 2,100 acres; population, 439.

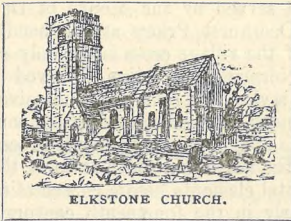

Elkstone is a village and parish in the district of Cotswold, seven miles south of Cheltenham; it is in the eastern division of the county, in the Hundred of Rapsgate, in the Union and County Court district of Cirencester, in the Rural Deanery of Stonehouse, in the Archdeaconry of Gloucester, and in the Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The direct way to it is through Charlton Kings, along the Cirencester Road, then turn off to the right through Cockleford. St. John the Evangelist's Church has a high square tower with four bells; the chancel, which is double, with door case, are supposed to have been built about A.D. 1100.

The sculpture in the chancel is very old. The date of the register is from 1592. The living, a rectory, is valued at £410 per annum. The hamlets of Cockleford and Coombe End are each one mile and a quarter from Elkstone Church. Area, 2,190 acres; population, 200. Stone coffin slabs, of very early date, point to the existence of a religious house of some kind. The north wall and a blocked doorway bear traces of Saxon work. The church is well worth a visit by the antiquary.

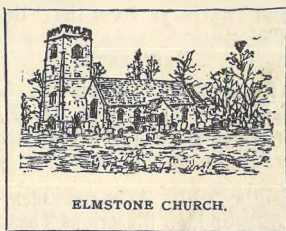

Elmstone (anciently spelt Aylmund-esden, in Domesday Book Aylmundestan, after Ælmmund, an illustrious Thane, who lived A.D. 664.) incorrectly called Elmstone Hardwicke, is a parish containing the three manors and hamlets of Elmstone, Hardwicke, and Uckington (anciently Orkington). The vicarage is at Uckington, two-and-a-half miles from Cheltenham; Elmstone (for civil purposes now included in Uckington) is a mile further; whilst Hardwicke straggles away from the church to within two miles of Tewkesbury. The whole parish is in the eastern division of the county, the Rural Deanery of North Winchcomb, the Archdeaconry of Gloucester, and the Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. Elmstone and Uckington are in the lower division of the Hundred of Deerhurst, Cheltenham Union, and County Court district. Hardwicke is in the lower part of Westminster Hundred, Tewkesbury Union, and

County Court district. William Buckle, Esq., of Cheltenham, and others, are lords of the manor of Elmstone; J. S. Gibbons, Esq., of the manor of Uckington; and the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, of the manor of Hardwicke. The Church, dedicated to St. Mary Magdalene, was built in Saxon times, and served by the Monks of Deerhurst. Possibly it shared the fate of Deerhurst Priory at the hands of the Danes, as the mutilated pedestal of the village cross is the only surviving specimen of Saxon work. A Norman restoration followed early in the twelfth century, and of this style there remain two massive pillars and arches in the nave, (the remainder having been destroyed some years ago to let in more light), part of a doorway and two square recesses in the east wall of the chancel, on the north and south sides of the altar, for the reception of the sacramental elements before consecration at mass. Late in the thirteenth, or early in the fourteenth century, there seems to have been an early English restoration, including a fine specimen of the Piscina, whilst the tower, a remarkably fine specimen of perpendicular work, was added in the fifteenth century. The church contains chancel, nave, south aisle, and embattled tower. There are several ancient carved heads, and figures of persons playing on musical instruments. The chancel screen, a fine example of old and rich carving, has been carefully restored. The church was resealed and restored during the late Rev. John Byron's incumbency, at a cost of about £1,500. In 1856 a new reredos was erected under a faculty issued by the Chancellor of the Diocese, and by the munificence of two parishioners (the Misses Holt), at a cost of £150. The reredos consists of three principal and six subsidiary compartments. The central compartment springs from a base on which, in the midst of rich diaper work, are carved the sacred letters "I.H.S." Above this base, and deeply recessed, is a crucifix in bas-relief, with at its foot, figures of St. Mary and St. John, also in an image of the Blessed Virgin, holding the Divine Child; that on the south by an image of St. George, the treatment of which is strikingly original and effective, a sword taking the place of the conventional spear, and the convolutions of the dragon exhibiting great vigour of treatment. The six subsidiary compartments are occupied, on the south side of the central compartment, by images of St. Augustine, of Hippo; St. Mary Magdalene, the patron saint of the Church, and St. Ambrose: on the north side by the images of St. Gregory, St. Alphege of Deerhurst (Elmstone Church being an offshoot of that religious house), and St. Jerome. The images and the crucifixion group are of Seaton stone, the

pure white of which contrasts most effectively with the deeper tint of the
 the Corsham stone of which the rest of the reredos is composed. Each
 image stands upon a carved capital, and the pillars of the arcading are of
 red Mansfield stone. The general line of the top of the reredos consists
 of perforated and richly-carved cresting. The gradines are of white
 alabaster, capped with Sicilian marble, and exquisitely carved with
 passion flowers, ears of corn, vine leaves, and grapes. The bases of the
 two extreme compartments are richly diapered. The altar walls,
 presented by the churchwardens, are of alabaster, combined with Seaton
 stone, and supported by alabaster bases, shafts, and capitals. The whole
 was designed and executed by Mr. A. B. Wall, of Cheltenham, who is to
 be congratulated upon a work of religious art, which, independently of
 the stately beauty of the design as a whole, is remarkable for the unusual
 excellency of its carving, the expression and pose of the images, and a
 conscientious care, even in the most minute details, which deserves the
 highest praise. The communion plate, dated 1516, was destroyed by fire
 at the vicarage, in 1869. The parish was formed subsequently to A.D.
 1290. The register book of the parish of Elmstone, dates from 1564.
 The living, yearly value about £280, is in the gift of Mrs. Bayfield
 Roberts, for her life, and then reverts to the Southam Estate in
 perpetuity. The Rev. George Bayfield Roberts, B.A., of Oriol College,
 Oxford, is Vicar. There is a charity, of which the income is derived
 from land in Cheltenham, granted in the 40th year of Elizabeth, yielding
 about £100 per annum, administered by a large body of trustees.
 There are four bells, one bearing date 1618, another 1675. The third
 was cast by Rudhall in 1775. Population, 318; acreage, 2,613. A
 School Board was formed in 1875, of which the Vicar is chairman.

GLOUCESTER.—The city of Gloucester is within a quarter of an hour's ride of Cheltenham by either railway, being about nine miles distant. Gloucester is of high antiquity, and has all the local privileges connected with a corporate city—governed by a Mayor, has Aldermen, Common Council, Chamberlain, and Sword Bearer. It is represented in Parliament by one member, and forms a portion of the Oxford Circuit the Assizes being held three times, and the Sessions six times during the year. The Corporation is an endowed one, and derives a considerable income from property bequeathed. As might be anticipated, from a place numbering upwards of 40,000 inhabitants, and forming the central depot of the commerce of the county, this city contains many public buildings of a substantial character. The Shire Hall, where the Assizes and Sessions are held, is in Westgate Street, and was built from a design by Smirke. Four Ionic columns grace the principal entrance, which is 100 feet in length. Avenues branch off in the interior to various apartments, and such as are usual to a criminal court. At the end of the central corridor, flights of stone steps lead up to one of the largest public rooms in the county. It is 87 feet in length, 54 wide, and 34 in height. In the interior, on a large scale, are displayed the Royal Arms, and opposite to them, King John in the act of signing the Magna Charta; each of these are sculptured in bas-relief, and are forty feet in length. Her Majesty's Prison is situated a little distance behind the last-named edifice, and is of very considerable extent. It was built on Howard's plan, under the direction of Sir G. O. Paul, Bart., in 1791, at an expense of nearly £30,000. The Spa was accidentally discovered by some men while engaged in sinking a well in 1814. The County Infirmary stands at the lower end of Southgate Street, and is a very noble building, and extends its usefulness throughout the entire county. The Lunatic Asylum is much admired, both for its style, airy situation, and judicious arrangements. It is situated on the London Road. The Corn Exchange, erected in 1856, is situated in Southgate Street, and the General Market in Eastgate Street. There are also Schools of Science and Art, and a Public Museum in Brunswick Road.

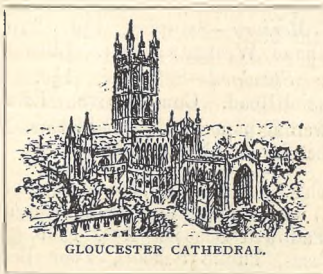

Sir Thomas Rich's School in Eastgate Street (formerly the Blue Coat
Hospital or School) was re-constituted by the Charity Commissioners in
1882, under the Endowed Schools' Act, 1869. In the number and
extent of Almshouses, Public Schools, Poor Bequests, and endowed
charities generally, Gloucester stands without a rival in the county.

Here the celebrated music meetings are held, forming what is termed the meeting of the three choirs of Gloucester, Hereford, and Worcester. The proceeds, which are generally considerable, are applied to the relief of the widows and orphans of clergymen. At the "Bell" Inn was born the celebrated preacher Whitfield; and another eminent native was Robert Raikes, whose name has been immortalized as the first person who established Sunday Schools. Gloucester is of very ancient date, and was a city within the first half-century of the Christian era. It was the chief local abode of the Romans, and many are the relics extant of that curious race, and scarcely a month passes away without something connected with them being found. As a place of extensive trade the city has long been well known, the contiguity of the river enabling it to carry on an unlimited traffic, which may be seen by paying a visit to the Docks. These are surrounded by large warehouses, principally for the storage of grain. They are connected with the sea by the Gloucester and Berkeley Ship Canal (which has its entrance at Sharpness Point, some sixteen miles south of Gloucester, where there are also extensive docks and warehouses), and by the River Severn, the Midland and Great Western Railways, with all parts of the interior. The Severn runs into Gloucester, but the canal was formed in consequence of the river not being navigable for large vessels within several miles of the city. Gloucester contains a very large number of churches and chapels, and we presume that the visitor will not be long in the ancient city without discerning the tower of that pile which has identified the name of Gloucester with one of the proudest works of skill and ingenuity in the county. We allude to the Cathedral.

* View the Cathedral! built in Gothic style,
A large and truly venerable pile;
Whose turrets stately high in air are raised,
Whose choir and cloisters each are justly praised."

The Cathedral of Gloucester has enjoyed a celebrity of so long standing that we are sure that every visitor must be familiar with its name, and will not fail to pay it a visit. Services are held in attendance continually, and divine service is performed each morning and afternoon, so that full opportunity is afforded for inspection. The Cathedral, in its original parts, is eight hundred years old, and it displays every order of architecture, from the rude Saxon and Norman down

to the highly finished Gothic of the reign of Henry VII. The nave was built in 1104, and is 147 feet in length, by 84 in breadth. The cloisters are the most perfect of their kind known, and are 141 feet in length. The choir is a

the decorative Gothic style, and is ornamented with antique carved stalls, and the Bishop's seat. The east stained glass window was put up in the reign of Edward III., and is the largest antique window in England, and contains 2,798 square feet of glass. The Whispering Gallery is formed like an octagon, and has five sides. It is of stone, 75 feet in length, eight feet high, and three broad. In the centre of this celebrated gallery are the following lines, inscribed on the wall in Old English characters :—

“ Doubt not but God, who sits on high,
Thy secret prayers can hear ;
When a dead wall thus cunningly
Conveys soft whispers to the ear.”

The tower is a prominent feature for many miles around, and is 225 feet in height. In its interior is a bell weighing seven thousand pounds. A gate, in the centre of the cloisters, leads to the library, which contains a valuable collection of books. The interior of the Cathedral abounds with monuments of great beauty and historic interest. Among them will be found those erected to the memory of Edward II., who was murdered in Berkeley Castle ; Judge Powell who acquitted the seven bishops from the Tower ; Robert Curthose, brother to Rufus, in curious oak, and painted, who was a prisoner in Cardiff Castle for twenty-nine years ; Jenner, the discoverer of vaccination ; Raikes, the founder of Sunday Schools ; and many others of equal note. The reredos was erected by the Freemasons of the province, at a cost of £1,200, from designs by Sir Gilbert Scott, and in 1889 it was embellished by a judicious use of colours and gold. The organ, which is very old and mellow toned, was restored in 1890, at a cost of over £1,000, by Messrs. Jones and Willis. The nave has been entirely seated with chairs, and some very chaste needle-work as well as new and costly altar furniture has lately been presented to the Cathedral. One of the two suspended Residentiary Canonries has lately been re-endowed, and the suspension removed, by the munificence of the late Mr. John Walker, of Cheltenham, in memory of the late Mr. Gambier Parry, of Highnam Court ; the holder of the stall to have the superintendence of the Gloucester and Bristol Diocesan Mission, of which Mr. Walker was the first Treasurer. In St. Mary's Square, adjacent to the Cathedral, is a statue erected by public subscription to the memory of Bishop Hooper, who suffered martyrdom on this spot in the reign of Queen Mary. At the Museum in Brunswick Road can be seen a portion of the stake to which he was chained. It bears the following inscription, engraved on a silver plate :—“ This is a portion of the stake to which Bishop Hooper was chained when he was burned to death in Gloucester in 1555.” It is identified by the position in which it was found, rammed round with stone below the surface, on the spot described in Foxe's Martyrology as that on which Hooper suffered, and on which the monument to him now stands. It was purchased for presentation to the Museum of Gloucester, in 1877, by W. P. Price, Esq., W. K. Wait, Esq., C. J. Monk, Esq., and Charles H. Hooper, Esq.

Guiting Power or **Lower Guiting** is a parish and village situated on the road from Tewkesbury to Stow-on-the-Wold, 11 miles east from Cheltenham, on the Cheltenham and Banbury section of the G.W.R. in the northern division of the county, Winchcomb Petty Sessional division and Union and County Court district, Rural Deanery of Stow, Archdeaconry of Cirencester, and Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol.



GUITING CHURCH.

The Church of St. Michael is an ancient building of stone, in the Norman style, consisting of chancel, nave of two bays, aisles south porch, and embattled western tower containing five fine bells, which after lying disused for a century, were replaced in the belfry in 1869. The north and south doorways (the former of which is bricked up) and the chancel arch are magnificent specimens of the Norman style. There are 300 sittings. The register dates from the year 1560. The living is a vicarage, with the chapelry of Farmcot annexed; gross yearly value £200, net £124, with residence, in the gift of Mr. John Walker, and held since 1865 by the Rev. R. A. Walker, who is non-resident. The Rev. Henry Hall, M.A., has been Curate in sole charge since 1874. There is a Baptist Chapel, built in 1835. Guiting Grange, a handsome building in the Italian style, is the residence of John Waddingham, Esq., J.P., and is pleasantly situated in the midst of very beautiful scenery. The population in 1881 was 619.

Recently this church has been restored and re-seated, with open seats, the chancel with stalls, and the east window filled with stained glass. The date of the register is from 1597. The living, a rectory, with the chapelry of Yanworth, valued at £280 per annum, with residence. It is in the gift of the Lord Chancellor. There is a day and Sunday School. Edmund Waller, Esq., is lord of the manor. Area, including Yanworth, 2,530 acres; population, including Yanworth, 337. Yanworth is a hamlet and chapelry of this parish. It is the sole property of the Earl of Eldon. Here also is a day and Sunday School. Cheltenham is the post town.

Kemerton is a village and parish, ten miles from Cheltenham. It is in the Tewkesbury or northern electoral division of the county, in the lower division of the Hundred of Tewkesbury, in the Rural Deanery of North Winchcomb, in the Archdeaconry of Gloucester, and in the Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The direct way to it is by the Evesham Road, or by the Midland Railway to Bredon, one-and-a-half miles from Kemerton. The parish Church, dedicated to St. Nicholas, is a fine edifice in the decorated style. The chancel, nave, south aisle, and south porch, were rebuilt in 1847, and the north aisle in 1850 from designs by the late R. C. Carpenter, Esq., replacing an older dilapidated church, the northern arcade of which was Norman, and the southern pointed. The ancient tower, early English in its lower stages, late perpendicular in the upper part, was completely restored in 1879 in memory of the late Rector, Archdeacon Thorp, by his brother Dr. D. L. Thorp. It contains six bells, by Abel Rudhall, 1754, and an excellent clock by Howlett, of Cheltenham. The lower portion is used as the ringing chamber, and is separated by an open carved oak screen from the nave. The chancel is highly decorated; has some good carved oak stalls, and is separated from the nave by an elegant oak screen. In a recess in the north wall, is the monument of Archdeacon Thorp, a life-sized figure, incised in a slab of fawn-coloured marble, surrounded by a diaper work of inlaid marbles. Most of the windows in the church are filled with painted glass by Williment, Hardman, Clayton, and Bell, the

east window of the north aisle, also placed to the memory of Archdeacon Thorp, by his brother, being particularly fine. The living, a rectory with residence, valued at £450 per annum. Rector, the Rev. Jerome J. Mercier. There is a National School for boys, girls, and infants. The Roman Catholics have a Chapel and School here. The Wesleyans have a Chapel here also. The Girls' Friendly Society's Home of Industry provides a place where G.F.S. members, especially invalids, may learn needlework and embroidery. An ancient British or Roman Camp, surrounded by a deep trench, is found on the summit of Bredon Hill; at a somewhat lower level is a piece of ground evidently intended for military purposes. The lord of the manor is John Hopton, Esq., of Canonffrome Court, Herefordshire. Area, 1,627 acres. Population, 490.

is a parish partly in the Borough and wholly in the Union of Cheltenham. The original village is distant about two miles (which is most easily got at from the Bath Road) from Cheltenham, of which it now forms one of the most important suburbs. The population is 3,265, and the area occupies some 1,330 acres, in the Deanery of Cheltenham, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, Hundred of Cheltenham. The rectory is in the patronage of H. Norwood Trye, Esq., M.A., J.P., who is also lord of the manor; it is valued at £500 per annum, with residence. The church is an ancient edifice, dedicated to St. Peter, consisting of nave, chancel, north and south aisles, and porch, with a tower, surmounted by a spire, containing a peal of six bells. The oldest part of the structure dates from the early living was in the possession of the Norwoods, a family of historic interest, one of whom, a Colonel Norwood, distinguished himself on behalf of the ill-fated Charles. To Charles Brandon Trye, an eminent surgeon, connected with the Norwood family, a handsome monument was erected in Gloucester Cathedral. The new church (to which a separate district was assigned in 1869 by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners), dedicated to St. Philip and St. James, erected in the Park district in 1840 and re-built in 1882, is in the incumbency of the Rev. William Henry Hutchinson, M.A., who was appointed in 1864. A small Baptist Chapel is also here. There are two National schools, one in each church district. There is a Sanatorium here in connection with the Cheltenham College, and one in connection with the Ladies' College. Ascending the steep acclivity, on the precipices of which are the rude traces of a deep entrenchment, which secured this important station by an impregnable fortress in the Roman era, many curious fragments of rock present themselves to the eye, of which "The Devil's Chimney," standing out from the brow of the

The hills in the neighbourhood rise to a height of 925 feet above the level of the sea; from thence we are gratified by a beautiful prospect of the vale, extending from Worcestershire, bounded by the Shropshire and Malverna hills on one side, and the Somersetshire on the

other. In the front, Gloucester, Tewkesbury, and Upton appear, with the majestic meandering Severn,—

Bounding the horizon in the far distance, may be seen on a clear day the Welsh Mountains.

Matson is a small parish eight and a half miles south of Cheltenham, in the eastern division of the county. Dudstone and King's Barton Hundred, in the Rural Deanery and Archdeaconry of Gloucester, and the Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The Manor of Matson (formerly two manors, in the hands of St. Peter's Abbey and Llanthony Priory) belonged to the Selwyn family for many years, and passed with the heiress of that family to the Townshends. Earl Sidney is now the owner. The present Church (name unknown) was built in 1739, with funds left for the purpose by Albinia Selwyn, widow of Major-General Selwyn, and ancestress of the late Bishop of Lichfield. It contains monuments to George Augustus Selwyn, and other members of the Selwyn family, and there is a memorial brass in the school stating that it was built by the Hon. Misses Rice, in memory of their two deceased sisters, the Hon. Caroline and Harriet Rice. There are traces of two earlier churches, one built on the site of the present church, and another founded by the De Mattesdon family in the eleventh century. Painswick.—The road to Painswick lies through Shurdington, and the distance is about eleven miles. It has a population of 2,000, and is of great antiquity. The church has been long famed for its peal of bells, which send forth their "sweet and silvery tones" on stated occasions, and the "Painswick Ringers" take precedence over others of their profession in the locality. The historical interest of this beautiful church and neighbouring "Court House" attracts many archæologists, and affords pleasant occupation and study to the large number of visitors who go to Painswick as "The Sanatorium of Gloucestershire," and artists who find abundance of subjects in the unsurpassed beauty of the country round, and the quaint old buildings. The churchyard is one of the most attractive in the county, and is planted out with venerable yew trees, more than a hundred in number. The church is made conspicuous by a wide space of land which surrounds it—a practice which it would be desirable to adopt generally. The "Castles" is a local name for the lofty hill on the right of the town, which was used for military intrenchments from the days of the ancient Britons down to the last period of the civil wars in the commonwealth era.

Pitchcombe is a parish and village, two miles south-west of Stroud Railway Station, seven from Gloucester, eleven from Cheltenham, and two from Painswick, in the Hundred of Dudstone and King's Barton, in the Stroud Union and County Court District, in the Deanery of Gloucester, and in the Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. It is included in the Parliamentary Borough of Stroud, and is situated on the high road from Stroud to Gloucester. The church, which it is thought is dedicated to St. John the Baptist, was built in 1819, on the site of an ancient church, erected about 1327. It was restored in 1870. It has south porch, chancel, nave, and western tower, with one bell, with the legend in Lombardic characters, "Johannes vocabitur." A fragment of the ancient stone pulpit (decorated period), has been built into the south wall of the chancel; this, with the font, may be seen in Lyson's "Gloucestershire Antiquities." The present register dates from 1709. The benefice is a rectory, annexed to that of Harescombe, value £49, with three and a half acres of glebe, in the gift of the Rev. William Melland, of Port Eynon, Glamorgan, and held by the Rev. John Melland Hall, M.A., of Worcester College, Oxford. There is a National School. J. C. Little, Esq., J.P., is Lord of the Manor. The charities are £1 15s. yearly. The soil is clay, and the subsoil is stone brash. The area is 217 acres, and the population 157. Gross estimated rental, £615; rateable value, £542.

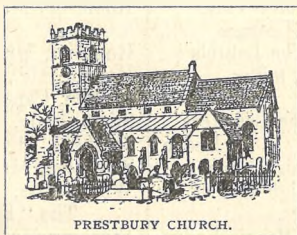

Postlip Hall—This extensive abode, etc., was once the favoured place where Queen Elizabeth and her retinue paid a visit to Sir T. Broadwood. To the left will be found the interesting remains of a small chapel, in the Norman style, built by William de Solers in the twelfth century, at the request of his tenants, and dedicated to St. James: religious worship was conducted in it until the reign of George I., since which time it has been used as a barn, and is generally filled with farming implements. The country around this spot is extremely rural, the chief characteristic being a clear streamlet, which if followed for about a quarter of a mile, will lead to the Postlip Paper Mills of Messrs. Evans, Adlard, and Co. The change from the field to the work of art is striking, and the visitor is agreeably surprised to find in the centre of a retired vale, steam, with all its wonderful powers, applied with as much

effect as is to be seen in the heart of a great manufacturing district. Writing paper, and also some fancy coloured sorts are manufactured at this mill, which is in continual working, and the greatest courtesy is shown to the stranger. Having inspected the various branches of the paper making establishment, the tourist may, by a left hand road, return to Cheltenham

Prestbury is a parish in Cheltenham Union, to which it sends two Guardians; it is situated a mile-and-a-half from Cheltenham, and contains 1,402 inhabitants, with 3,022 acres; in the Deanery of Winchcomb, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, Hundred of Deerhurst, East Gloucestershire. Formerly an important market town, it was burnt down in Henry VII.'s reign. The name indicates that it was formerly a dwelling place for priests, and local historians tell us a college for their education once existed here. The vicarage is valued at £300 per annum, with residence, and 23 acres of glebe land, and is in the patronage of the Rev. J. Baghot De la Bere, tower; a peal of eight bells, and some handsome mural tablets to the De la Bere, Capel, and other families; also some beautiful stained glass windows. There is a National school for children of both sexes. The poor have charitable bequests, and an Almshouse was given in 1720, by Ann Goodrich. A chapel was opened here on the 16th of May, 1866, by the Independents, which will seat about 250. The principal inn is the "King's Arms."

Rendcombe is a parish in the Hundred of Rapsgate and Union of Cirencester, with a population of 211 (last census), and is situate five miles from Cirencester, and ten miles from Cheltenham. It comprises 2,532 acres, the property of James Taylor, Esq. The church, which is dedicated to St. Peter, stands on the site of a much older edifice. It was built by Sir Edmond Tame, about the middle of the sixteenth century, and contains a very handsome chancel screen of carved oak. The tower, which is capped by a battlement and four pinnacles, is of three storeys and contains a peal of six bells. The mansion, which is built after the fashion of an Italian palace, stands in a beautifully wooded park, which was a much coveted possession even before the Conquest. The village school, lately enlarged, is capable of accommodating about fifty children.

Salperton, or Cold Salperton, is a parish in the Northleach Union containing 120 inhabitants, with an area of about 1,600 acres; it is in the Deanery of Northleach and the Archdeaconry of Cirencester. Sandhurst, a parish three miles north from Gloucester, on the River Severn, in the eastern division of the county, in the Hundred of Dudstone and King's Barton, in the Rural Deanery and Archdeaconry of Gloucester, and in the Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The church, dedicated to St. Laurence, is in the incumbency of the Rev. T. Holbrow. It consists of chancel, nave, north aisle, porch, and a tower at the west end containing six bells, and was restored and considerably enlarged in 1858. The register dates from the year 1537. It is about seven miles from Cheltenham. If we proceed for about five miles along the London Road, and then turning to the left pass through Whittington, we arrive at Sevenhampton. The living is a vicarage, value £60 per annum, in the patronage of W. Lawrence, Esq. The church is an ancient edifice, dedicated to St. Andrew, consisting of nave, transepts, and chancel, with tower and three bells. There is a National school for children of both sexes.

BROCKHAMPTON is a hamlet of this parish. The Baptists have a chapel here, in which services are held on Sundays, at 11 a.m. and 6 p.m.

HAMPEN is a hamlet partly in this parish and partly in Shipton. Letters from Cheltenham via Andoversford, where there is a telegraph office.

Seven Springs.—It is an interesting fact that the highest source of the Thames is situated within three miles of Cheltenham. This first streamlet of the mighty Thames gushes out of a little rocky dell, surmounted by a ragged hedge, in a retired and picturesque spot. This simple and unassuming stream winds itself through interesting vales for upwards of twenty miles, forming a rivulet called the Corin. In its career onward it receives many tributary streams. About two miles from Cirencester it is joined by one called Thames Head; at Salperton, ten miles further, it receives one called the Isis, an artificial junction formed in the year 1786; and at Cricklade, in Wiltshire, it falls into the main river. The visitor who has read and heard so much of this "birth-place of the Thames," will be greatly surprised at the retired and simple character of the spot. The visit was formerly enlivened by the presence of an antiquated dame, who generally sauntered out of a cottage adjoining, offering her services to pic-nic parties, and telling many marvellous stories withal connected with the spot. Whilst the old lady was in waiting on a party, she was asked by one of the number if it were clear that the stream had any connection with the Isis. "Ices!" exclaimed the dame, "Nothing to do with that, the water never freezes, and I will tell you for why: you may put a snowball or a piece of ice in the water, and it melts directly." Although these springs are commonly styled "seven," it is but rarely they can all be seen at the same time gushing out of the rock, the only period being after an unusual fall of rain.

Shipton Oliffe with Sollars, now consolidated into one parish, by Act of Parliament, is a small village in Northleach Union, containing about 330 inhabitants and 2,210 acres. It is seven miles distant from Cheltenham on the London Road, through Andoversford; in the Rural Deanery of Northleach, in the Archdeaconry of Cirencester, and in the Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The Church of St. Oswald is in the early English style; the living is in the incumbency of the Rev. Charles Pugh, and the patronage of William Peachey, Esq., who is Lord of the Manor of that part, formerly Shipton Sollars. George Fletcher, Esq., is Lord of the Manor of Shipton Oliffe. The income is £313 per annum, with residence. The Church of St. Mary the Virgin is a small building of stone, in the perpendicular style, consisting of chancel and nave, and a small western bell turret containing one bell; it was restored in 1884, after having been closed for twenty years. The Cheltenham and Banbury line passes through the parish. The post town is Andoversford, which has also a telegraph office, and post office orders are granted. There is a mixed school for the united parish.

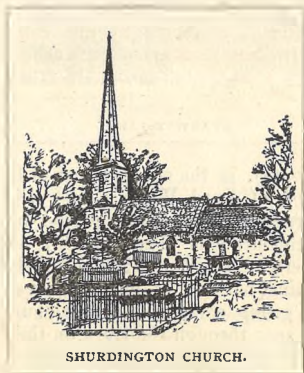

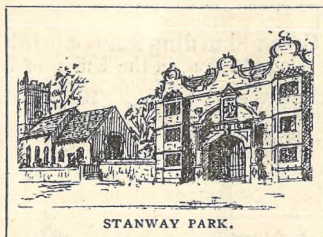

The church is a simple edifice of no particular date, but there are traces of 12th and 15th Century work to be found in it; it contains nothing of much interest, but is charmingly situated—indeed, the group composed of the church, house, park, and wooded hills above, as seen through the trees on the left by the traveller from Tewkesbury to Stow, present a picture of rural beauty rarely to be seen even in England.

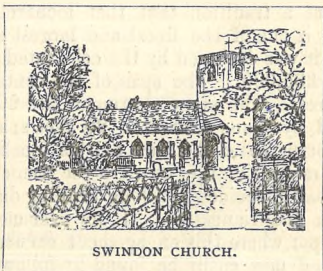

Swindon is a parish near Cheltenham, containing about 239 inhabitants and 721 acres; in the Deanery and Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, Hundred of Cheltenham. It is about two miles from the town, and is reached by turning out of the High Street before arriving at the High Street station of the Midland Railway, down any of the streets to the right leading to Maud's Elm, and then pursuing your course to the first or second turning on the right, either of which leads to the village. The road leading to the church is very prettily adorned with a fine avenue of trees, and the sacred edifice itself, situated as it is on an elevated spot, commanding a fine view of the surrounding country, is well worthy of a visit. The church is in the

Norman and Early English styles, dedicated to St. Lawrence, having a hexagonal tower of unequal sides containing four bells. There are also five painted windows to the memory of the Surman and Goodlake families.

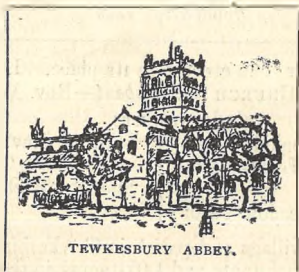

Tewkesbury.—The ancient Borough of Tewkesbury is not quite nine miles distant from this town, and may be visited in twenty minutes by the Bristol and Birmingham Railway. The population of this place is 5,409, and the staple trade is stocking making, but has much declined of late years. It is scarcely possible to visit a more antiquated town—a large portion of the houses in the main streets being constructed jointly of wood, bricks and stones, not unlike many parts of the City of Chester. It is a chartered borough, is governed by a mayor and council, returns one member to Parliament, and has many other peculiar privileges. The descendants of the immortal Shakespeare have regularly lived here, and a head-stone to the memory of William Shakespeare Hart, the sixth descendant, may be seen in the churchyard. At the termination of Barton-street, and near the road to Worcester, is the Royal Mythe Tute. This is a hill formed on a “barrow,” or burial place, and from which, on a clear day, the naked eye may see objects connected with the four adjoining counties. To the right are the ruins of a castle, called “King John’s,” from a tradition that that monarch once took refuge therein. On the left is one of the finest and largest suspension bridges in Gloucestershire; it was designed by the celebrated engineer Telford, and its erection cost £35,000. The span of the centre arch is 170 feet, and the breadth 24 feet. The stone abutments are 20 feet in thickness, which are supported by stone arches of 20 feet span. But the event which has for ever perpetuated the fame of this locality, and stamped it with a national character, is the ever to be remembered Battle of Tewkesbury. This battle decided the long pending disputes between the rival houses of York and Lancaster. It for ever closed the “Wars of the Roses.” The spot where this engagement occurred is called “The Bloody Meadow,” and may easily be found by following the right hand lane, nearly opposite the Workhouse, at the entrance to the town from Cheltenham. It was on the morning of Saturday, May 4th, 1471, that the rival armies were in fierce contest near this place, and when the Lancastrians were defeated they fled to the “meadow,” where they were overtaken and three thousand of them slaughtered; and tradition adds, “that their blood flowed in a stream down the hill.” The Yorkists were headed by the Duke of Gloucester, afterwards Richard III., and the unfortunate Lancastrians by the brave Margaret Anjou, Queen to Henry VI., and also by her youthful son, the Prince Edward. After the battle, the two latter were taken prisoners; the young Prince was dragged to a house, still standing in Church Street, where the Duke of Gloucester and others formed a camp. The Prince on being asked why he entered the field in battle array, boldly replied, to maintain his royal father’s right to the Crown, and also his own. This reply so excited “Crooked-back Dick,” that he immediately plunged a dagger into the heart of Prince Edward, an example which was followed by the dukes around him, and the future heir apparent of England’s throne fell at their feet covered with blows. The Queen was ransomed by her brother, the King of France, and afterwards ended her

days, greatly dejected, in a monastery. The other nobles who defended her on this memorable occasion, were either retained prisoners or beheaded in the Market-place. Shakespeare, in several of his plays, has faithfully delineated all the leading transactions of this great event. With what feeling does he speak of the happy disposition and amiable qualities of the Prince Edward, who (at the time he was cruelly assassinated) had but just entered on his eighteenth year. Speaking of the Prince in his play of Henry VI., he remarks :—

A sweeter and a lovelier gentleman
 Framed in the prodigality of nature,
 Young, valiant, wise, and no doubt right royal,
 The spacious world cannot again afford.

THE ABBEY CHURCH is situated in Church Street, and is the largest parish church in England; being of the dimensions and form of a cathedral. It is called the Abbey Church on account of its forming a portion of the once extensive and richly endowed Abbey of Tewkesbury, the gateway of which, and other portions of the pile, may be seen contiguous to the Church. The style of the architecture of the principal parts of Tewkesbury Abbey Church is in the highly decorative Norman; while the choir and saints' chapels are of the early English, or pointed style. A number of stained glass



of the original copies of Magna Charta. Amongst the very many tombs of interest, occurs one to the memory of Allan (erected by himself), the biographer of Thomas à Becket; who was present at the shrine at Canterbury when that eminent individual was murdered. A mural tablet to Mrs. Craik, the well-known authoress of "John Halifax, Gentleman," has recently been placed here. The Vicar is the Rev. H. Robeson.

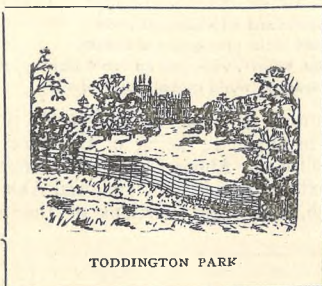

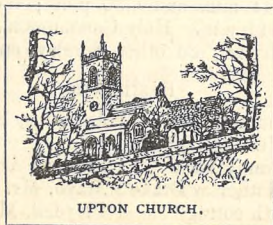

Up-Hatherley is an ancient parish in Cheltenham Union, Badgeworth. The new church of SS. Philip and James was built by Mrs. Gretton, Coney Gree, Up-Hatherley, and consecrated in 1896 previous to which time the parishioners attended Shurdington. The church will seat 100, and is a building of stone, in the early English style, consisting of nave and apsidal chancel, north porch, and a bell-turret with one bell. The living is a vicarage, £130 yearly value, in the gift of Mrs. Gretton, and held since 1886 by the Rev. E. L. Jennings, M.A.. The tithes are supposed to have belonged to the Benedictine Monastery at Usk, Monmouthshire, and were granted to John Fernham in the 22nd year of Elizabeth. The ancient chapel became a ruin, and eventually disappeared altogether; its site is supposed to be immediately contiguous to the place where Hatherley Manor now stands. Acreage, 538; population, 94.

WHITTINGTON.

Wainloade Hill is a small hamlet of Norton, pleasantly situated on the banks of the River Severn, nine miles north-west of Cheltenham. This is one of the most charming districts within easy access of the town, by way of Tewkesbury Road and Coombe Hill. From the Hill on a clear day magnificent views of the surrounding country may be obtained; the churches of Cheltenham, Gloucester Cathedral, and the Broad-water at Sharpness being plainly visible. Large numbers of visitors are attracted here on account of its lovely scenery. It is a favourite resort for anglers and local artists, the River Severn affording capital sport for the one, the beauties of the hills and dales, lanes and hedges, ample scope for displaying the abilities of the other. This is a famous spot for picnic parties, and the best time to visit it is during the salmon season. Salmon teas and suppers are supplied by Host James, of the "Red Lion" Inn, and have obtained a justly deserved popularity.

Walton Cardiff—a village half a mile south-east of Tewkesbury.

Washbourne, Great, is a parish and village in Winchcomb Union, pleasantly situated near the Vale of Evesham, nine miles north-east of Cheltenham. The rectory, in the patronage and incumbency of the Rev. C. R. Covey, is valued at £62 per annum, with thirty-three acres of glebe. The church is a small building dedicated to St. Mary. There is a school for both sexes. The Lord of the Manor is Rooke France, Esq., of Hampstead, London.

Whittington is a village and parish five miles east-south-east from Cheltenham, in the eastern division of the county, Hundred of Bradley, Union of Northleach, County Court district of Cheltenham, Rural Deanery of Winchcomb, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, and Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. Whittington may be reached by way of the London Road, turning off to the left opposite Sandywell Park. The Church, name unknown, is an ancient edifice, partly in the Norman style, with late additions, consisting of nave, chancel, and large south aisle: there are several figures of crusaders, and mural tablets to the memory of the Tracy and other families. The register dates from 1538. The living is a rectory and valued at £300 per annum with residence; it is in the gift of Christian William-Lawrence, Esq., who is lord of the manor, and held since 1868 by the Rev. Anthony C. Lawrence, B.A. There is a school for boys and girls, endowed by the late Mrs. Lightbourne, of Sandywell Park. Area, 1,422 acres. Population, 183.

SIREFORD is a hamlet of this parish.

Winchcomb is an ancient borough and market town, on the bank of the small River Isborne, which joins the Avon at Evesham. It is the principal town in the Union to which it gives its name, containing 2,993 inhabitants, and having an area of 5,700 acres, in the Deanery of Winchcomb, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, the lower division of Kiftsgate Hundred. It is about seven miles from Cheltenham, on the Prestbury Road through Southam, the scenery of which, after passing Southam, is very beautiful. It is pleasantly situated in a valley near the base of the Cotswold Hills, and was formerly the metropolis of the Kingdom of Mercia, and by our Saxon forefathers was called Wincelcombe. This was a borough by prescription from an early date, possessing a charter from Queen Elizabeth incorporating the town, and the municipal body consisted of two bailiffs and eight burgesses, but the Corporation, by the Municipal Corporation Acts, 1883, is now extinct; the principal governing body now being the county magistrates, who hold petty sessions at the Town Hall on the last Friday in each month. The Town Hall, in the centre of the town, is a handsome Elizabethan edifice lately rebuilt. The Lady of the Manor is Mrs. Dent, widow of the late John Coucher Dent, Esq. The vicarage, with the chapelry of Gretton annexed, is valued at £143 with residence, in the incumbency of the Rev. Fred. Binyon, M.A., and the patronage of Lord Sudeley. The church is a handsome edifice in the Perpendicular style, dedicated to St. Peter, and was erected by the parishioners assisted by Ralph, Lord Boteler, Baron of Sudeley, in the reign of Henry VI. It consists of nave, chancel, north and south aisles, with an embattled tower containing a peal of six bells. The church has recently been restored at an expense of more than £3,000. There are excellent schools for boys, girls, and infants—those for boys and infants being under the management of the Winchcomb School Board. There is a good reading room. Lady Chandos, of Sudeley Castle, founded a Grammar School in the reign of James I., A.D., 1621. It was reconstituted under a scheme of the Endowed Schools Commissioners, A.D., 1876, whereby there are six foundation scholars, who pay two guineas each yearly (in the place of the fourteen free boys as formerly), and the other pupils are charged four guineas each annually. A capital room has been erected, capable of containing eighty scholars. The Head Master, who is allowed to receive boarders, is Mr. Thomas C. Webb. The endowment of the King's School, which formerly existed in the town, has been assigned by the Endowed Schools Commissioners to the Grammar School. The Baptists, Congregationalists, and Wesleyans have places of worship here: Baptist Ministers, various; Congregational Minister, Rev. W. Bailey; Wesleyan Minister, Rev. J. E. Harlow. Ten alms houses, for persons in reduced circumstances (five for men and five for women) have been erected out of funds left by John and William Dent, Esqrs., as well as a school for girls. The market day is Saturday; a cattle fair is held on the 6th of May, and extensive horse fairs on the last Saturday in March and the 28th of July, which are attended by dealers from all parts of the kingdom.

Witcombe, or Witcombe Magna, is a parish in Cheltenham Union, containing 120 inhabitants, and with an area of 918 acres; in the Deanery and Archdeaconry of Gloucester, Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, Hundred of Dudstone and Kings Barton. It is six miles from Cheltenham. The best way to it is by the Bath Road, turning off by the "Norwood Arms," down the Stroud Road, through Shurdington at Horseferry Bridge, thence to the left for nearly a mile on the Cirencester Road. The scenery *en route* is very varied. The rectory is valued at £80 per annum, with residence, and is in the patronage of W. F. Hicks-Beach, Esq. The Church is an ancient edifice, dedicated to Saint Mary, consisting of chancel and aisle, with tower containing two bells. There is a school for children of both sexes. W. F. Hicks-Beach, Esq. is Lord of the Manor and principal landowner.

THE ROMAN VILLA.—The most important relic of the Roman era in this locality is the Roman Villa. The visitor has permission to inspect this valuable and perfect monument of Roman art daily. The Roman Villa, at Witcombe, was the seat of one of the principal officers of the Government, and had baths, or hypocausts, attached: the most perfect of their kind known, and was accidentally discovered in 1818, by some labourers, while in the act of rooting up a decayed oak tree, when a stone six feet in length was exposed to view, which on further examination proved to be the portico of a door leading into a room, 19ft. by 13ft., the walls of which remained in a perfect state to the height of six feet. On further search being made, a Roman villa, with many articles of its furniture, was exposed to view. Among the things found upon the floor, was a steelyard, with its weights; a plough-share of iron, a flint hatchet, a very large iron axe, used for the slaying of beasts destined for sacrifices; and a large quantity of building tools. The walls bear evident marks of having been panelled. The pavement of mosaic work is enriched with a great variety of ornaments. In the first apartment, the tessera is formed into the figure of an urn with ivy leaves entwined. Another room has its pavement formed with figures of fish and sea monsters. In one apartment is the remains of a seat formed with tiles. Fragments of columns and cornices of white marble are also scattered about. The baths are laid with square tiles, and further secured with

stucco. Dressing and ante-rooms are attached to them. The present owner is W. F. Hicks-Beach, Esq.

Withington is a village and parish $7\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Cheltenham, in the eastern division of the county, Hundred of Bradley, Union and County Court district of Northleach, Rural Deanery of Winchcomb, Archdeaconry of Gloucester, and Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The direct way to it is through Charlton Kings and Dowdeswell. The church of St. Michael is an ancient lofty edifice in the Norman style, with additions of late date. It was restored in 1872, and a beautiful memorial east window, in memory of the Hon. Mrs. Talbot and two daughters, was added in 1876. It consists of nave, chancel, and embattled tower, with clock and chimes, on the south side of the nave is a handsome monument to Sir John Howe, his wife, and eight children, and a number of tablets on the walls; this was formerly the burial place of that family. The register dates from 1609. The living, a rectory valued at £650 per annum, with residence, is in the gift of the Bishop of the Diocese. There is a National school for boys and girls. The Wesleyans have a commodious chapel here, and the Baptists have a chapel at Foxcote. The Dean and Chapter of Gloucester are lords of the manor. Area, 6,071 acres; population, 768.

FOXCOTE is a hamlet in this parish, five miles from Cheltenham.

George Coventry, B.A., is valued at £180 per annum, with residence, and thirty-three acres of glebe land, in the patronage of the Earl of Coventry. The church, an ancient edifice, dedicated to St. Martin, consists of nave, chancel, and porch, with tower and three bells, also a clock by Benson, presented by Miss Shapland. Upon the hill at the back of the rectory are the remains of a Roman encampment, and from this point a beautiful and extensive view of Gloucestershire and Worcestershire is obtained, with the Bredon and Broadway Hills on one side, and the Welsh Mountains on the other. The Earl of Coventry is Lord of the Manor and principal owner.
