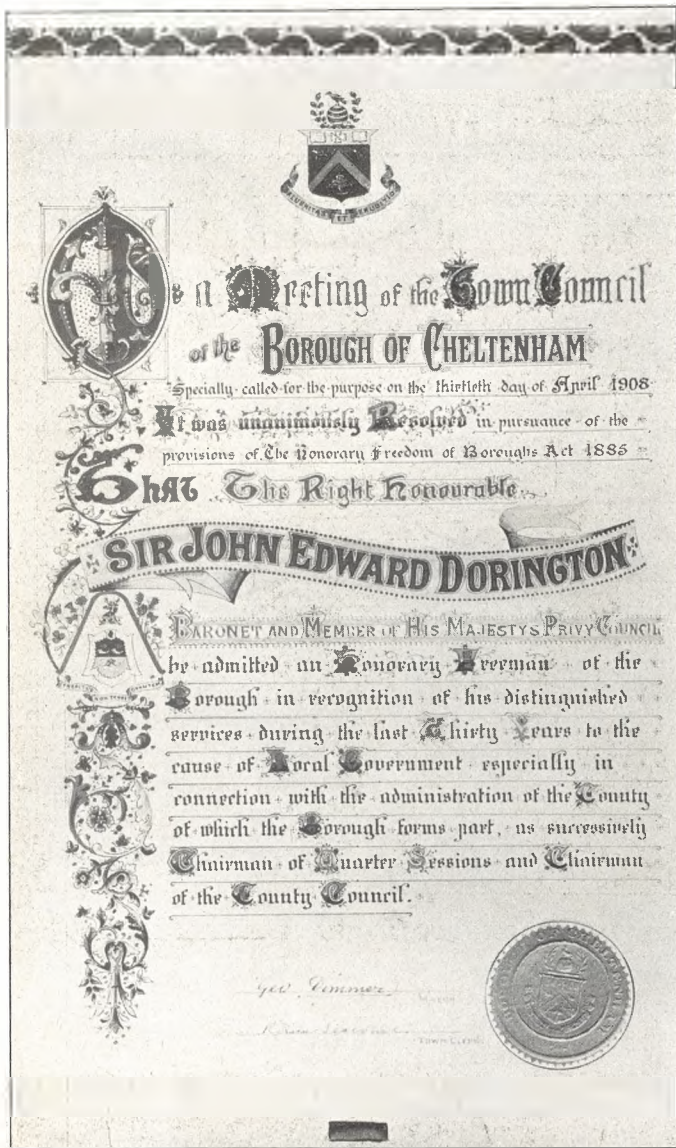

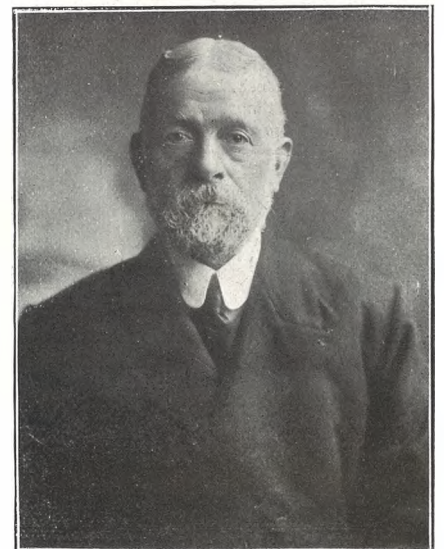

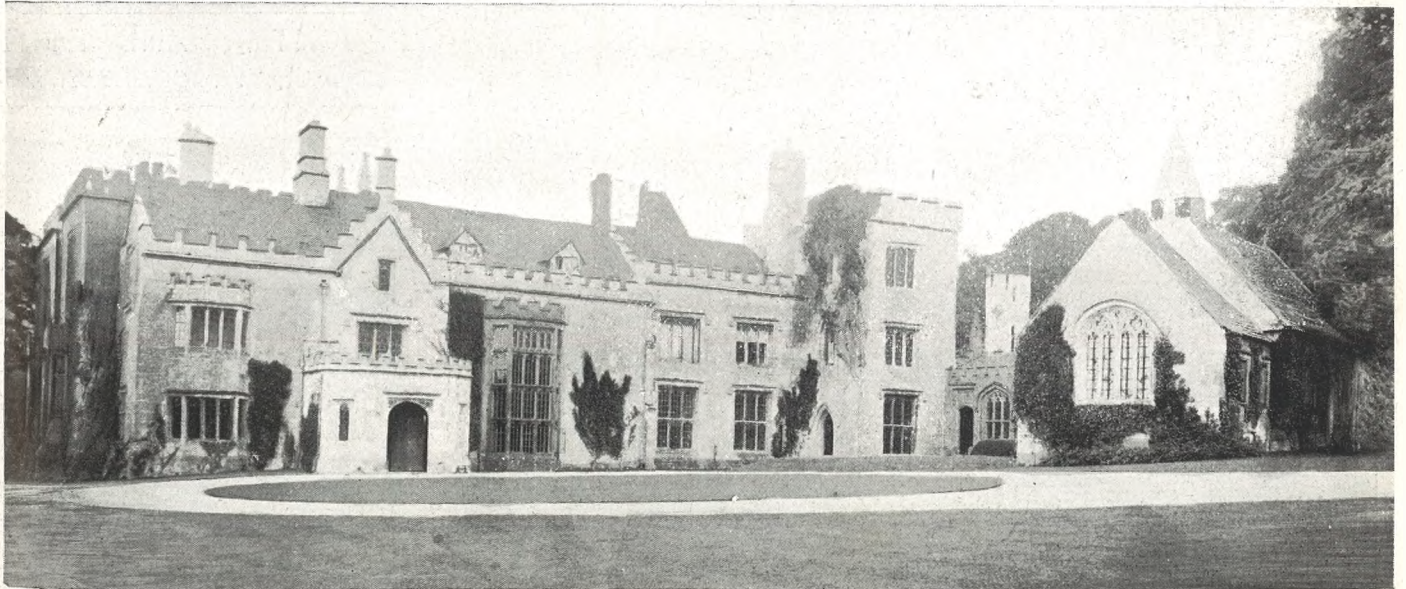

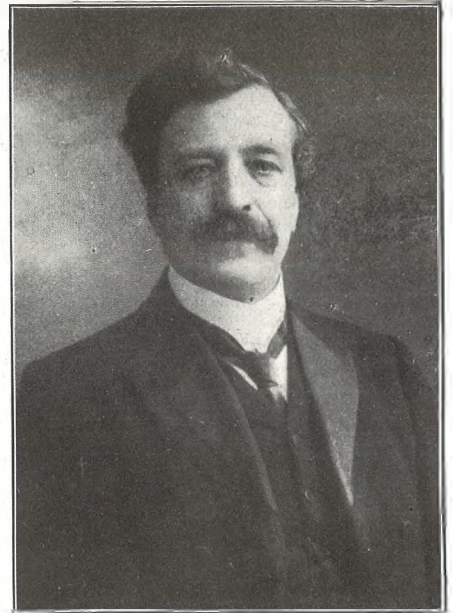

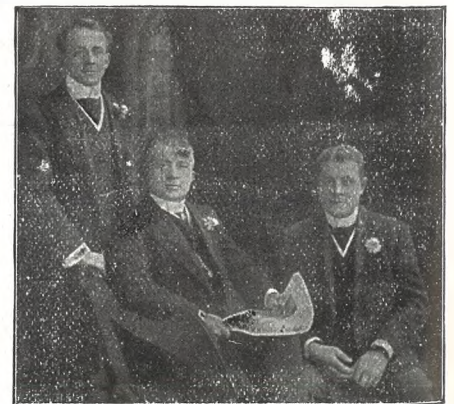
MR. J. A. WILSON,

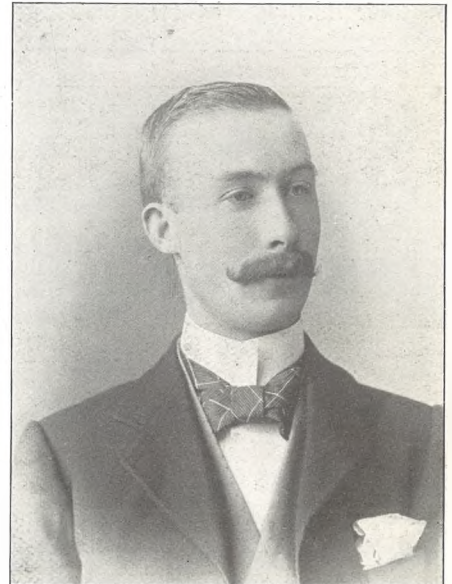

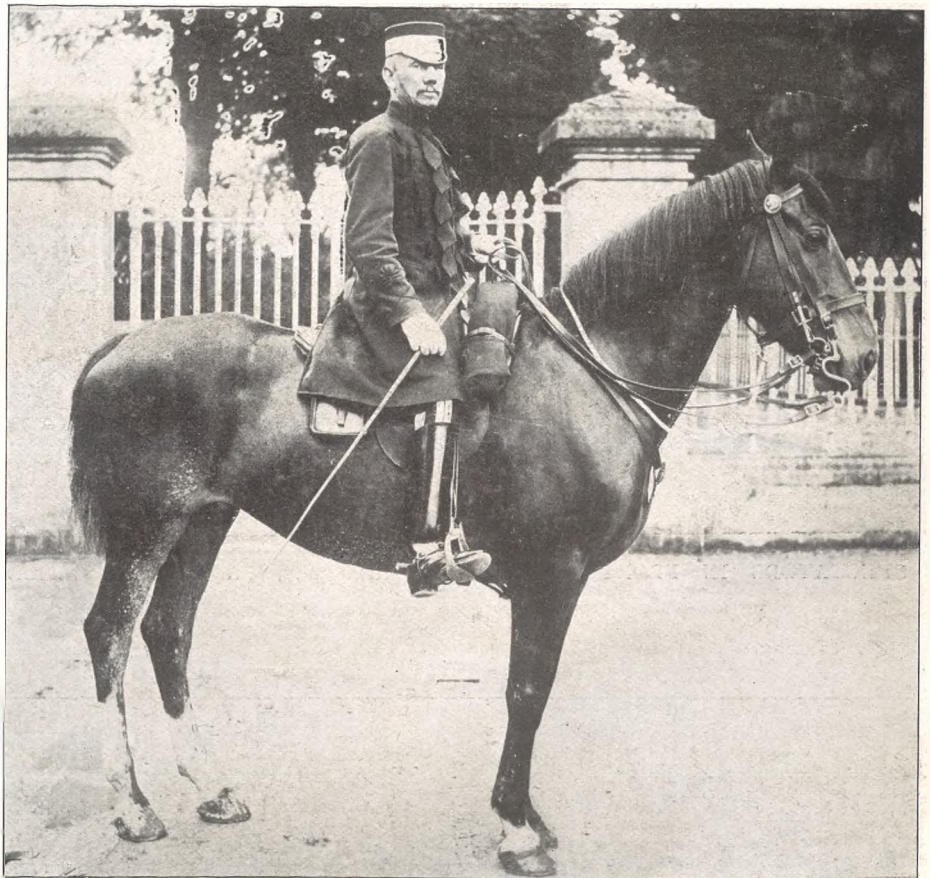

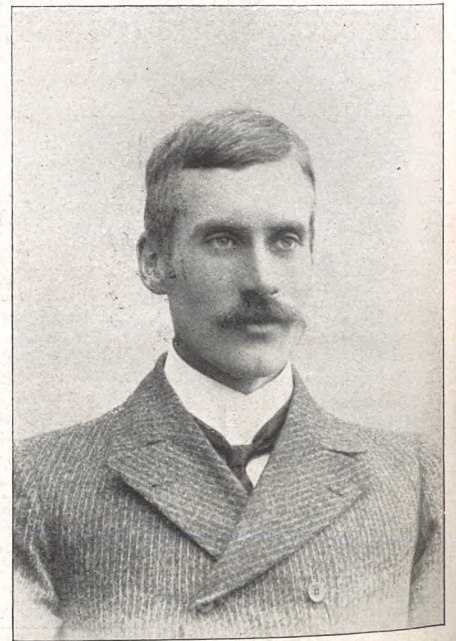

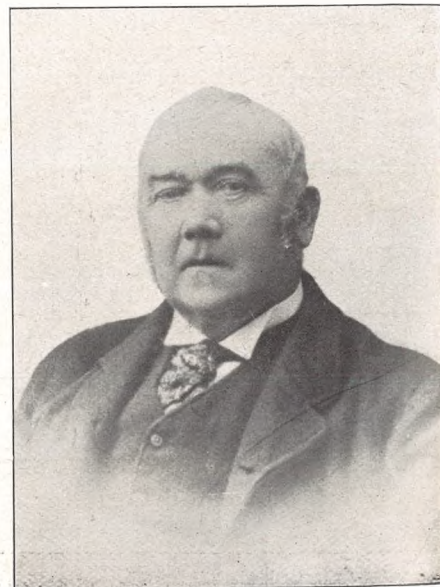

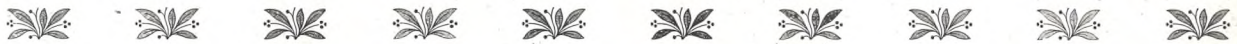

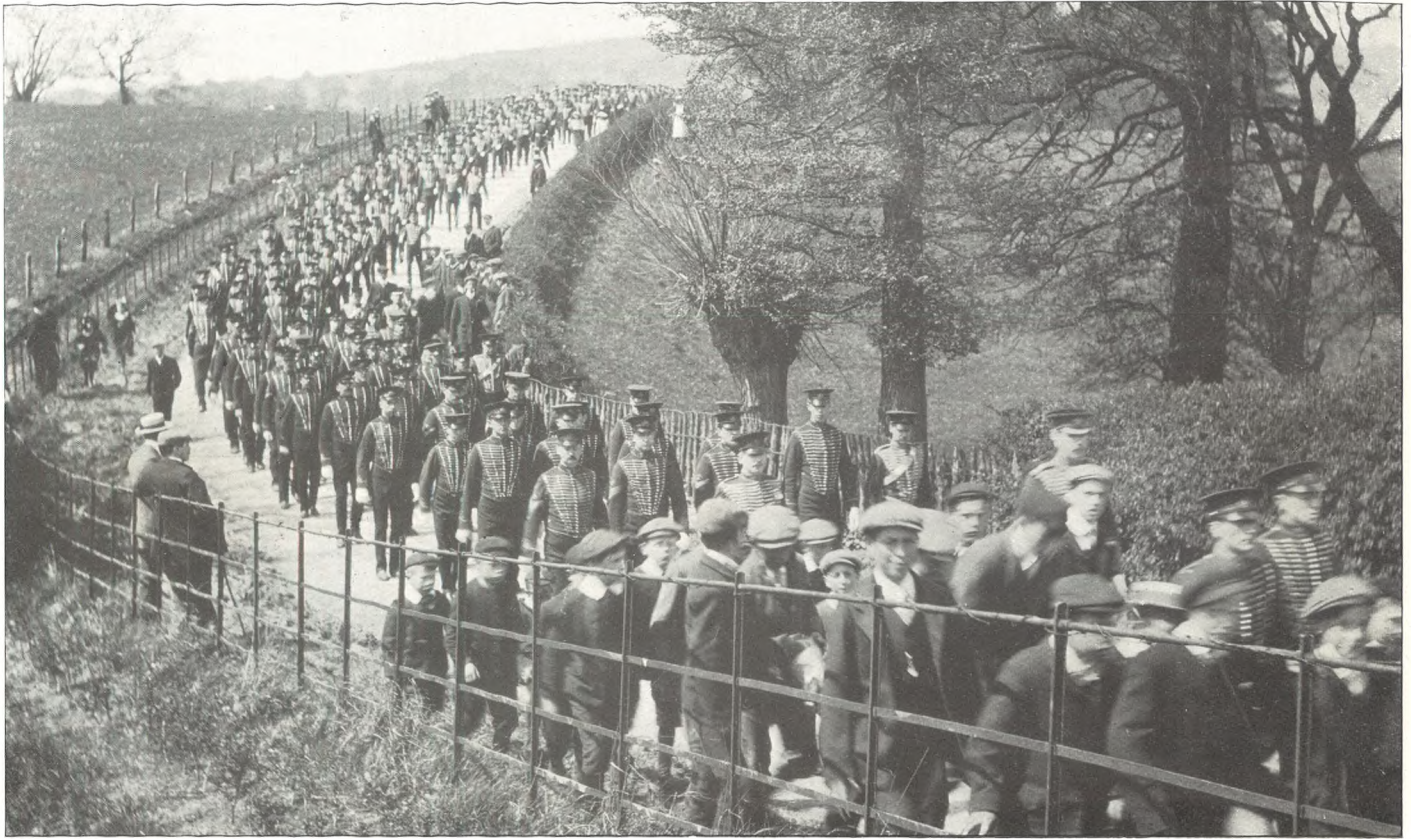

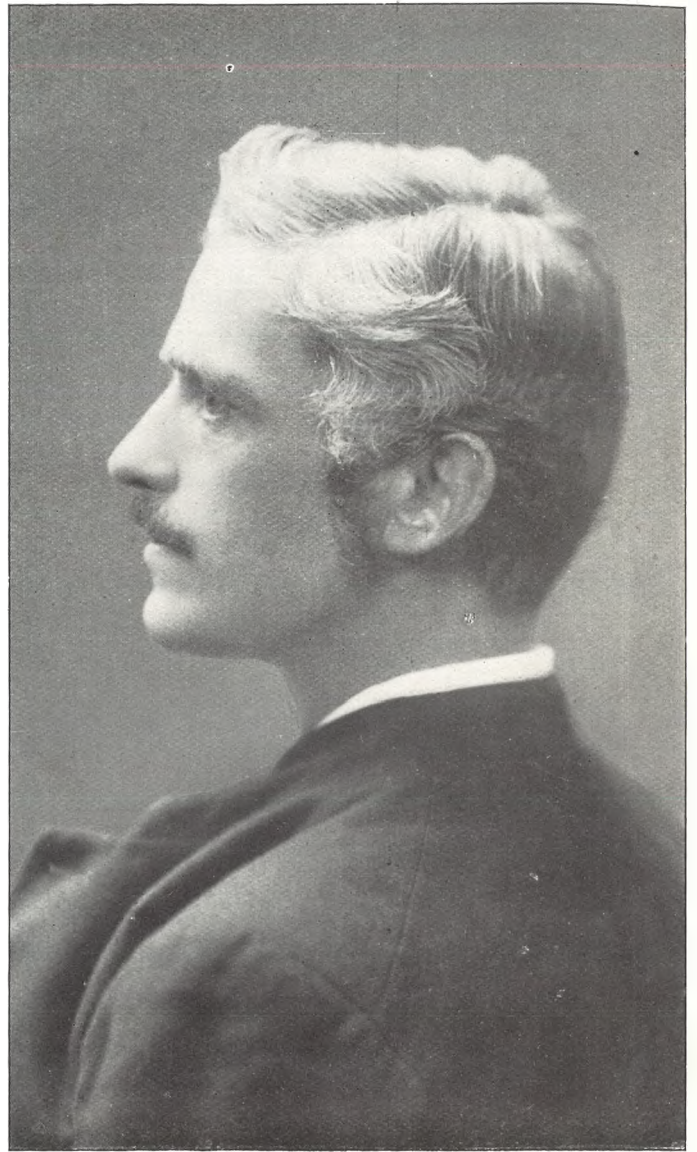

TWIXT STOAT AND HAWK.

No habit of any wild creature exists without cause, and when we know the governing factors of the situation we generally find that birds and mammals, insects and fish—even plants—do exactly what our human reason would suggest in similar circumstances. The thrush has to deal with a very slippery creature encased in a shell—a messy and rather prolonged operation—without being caught by its natural enemies while thus engaged. Now, the natural enemies of the thrush are hawks, which might pounce upon it in the open, or stoats, etc., which might seize it in the hedge or thicket. If the thrush, through fear of the hawk retired into the hedge with the snail, the persistent noise of

hammering would surely attract the stoat. If to avoid the stoat the thrush located its breakfast-table away in the open, every distant hawk would see it while engaged in preparing its meal. So the thrush selects a stone about five feet from shelter—just far enough for it to evade the rush of the hidden stoat, and just near enough for it to dash into cover from the shadow of the swooping hawk. —“T.P.’s Weekly.”

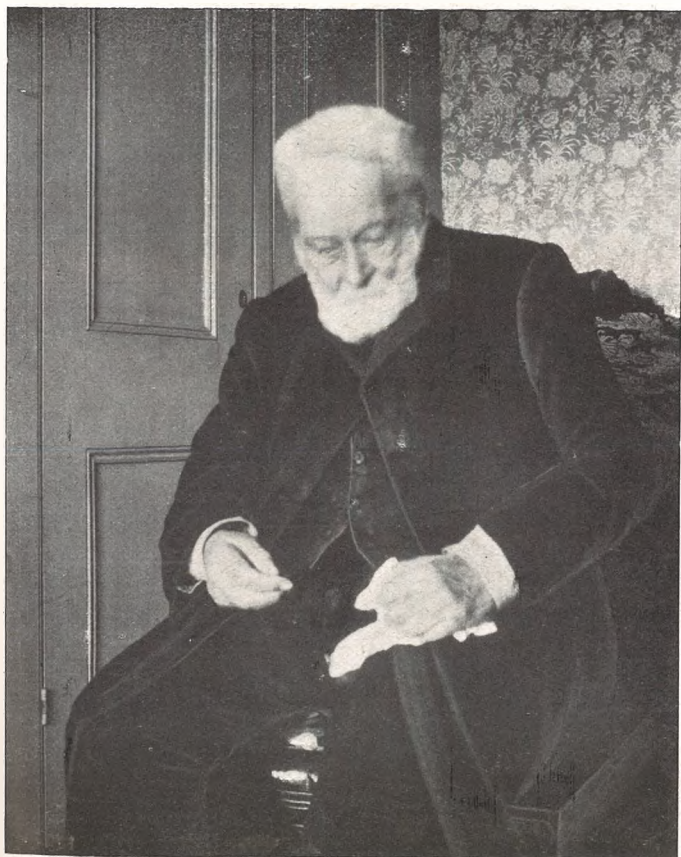

GLOUCESTERSHIRE CENTENARIAN AND HIS WIFE.

Thomas Lambert Hinton, son of William and Elizabeth Hinton, was born on the 30th of April, 1808, at the Manor House, Daglingworth, Gloucestershire, being the fourth son. His parents had six sons and one daughter.

His father, Mr. William Hinton, lived at Daglingworth many years, and married Elizabeth Hall, daughter of William Hall, of the parish of Arlington, near Bibury.

Four generations lived at Daglingworth, and received the great tithes, being lay rectors of the parish of South Cerney, under the See of Gloucester.

Mr. Thomas Hinton's elder brother, the late Mr. William Hall Hinton, was a magistrate for Gloucestershire.

Mr. Thomas Hinton is a retired Army surgeon, of the old East India Company's Service, the 1st Bengal Fusiliers, now the 101st Foot. He was a student at St. Bartholomew's Hospital, and is the oldest member of the Royal College of Surgeons except one (Sir Henry Pitman). He studied surgery also in Paris, and was apprenticed to Mr. Wingfield, the noted surgeon, of Oxford, and also practised in Limerick and Reading for his Queen and the old East India Company's service during the Crimean War and Indian Mutiny. He was at Sevanto during the outbreak of cholera in India in 1845.

In the year 1810 he was shipwrecked off the coast of Spain, near Cape Finisterre, in the ship named the "Great Liverpool," when the captain and many passengers were lost. Being a strong swimmer, Mr. Hinton was saved, and was instrumental in saving a baby girl who was thrown into his arms, and whom he placed in her mother's arms. All his papers were lost in the wreck, including his diploma.

After his return from India, he married Ann Lake, second daughter of Mr. William Lake, of Woodstreet House, near Sittingbourne, Kent, and widow of Captain John Mercer, of the Royal Marines. They settled in Cheltenham, and three daughters and one son were born to them. They have since resided at St. Leonards-on-Sea, Sussex.

His mind, though he is so advanced in years, is perfectly clear, and he retains all his faculties, among his memories being the declaration of the result of the Battle of...

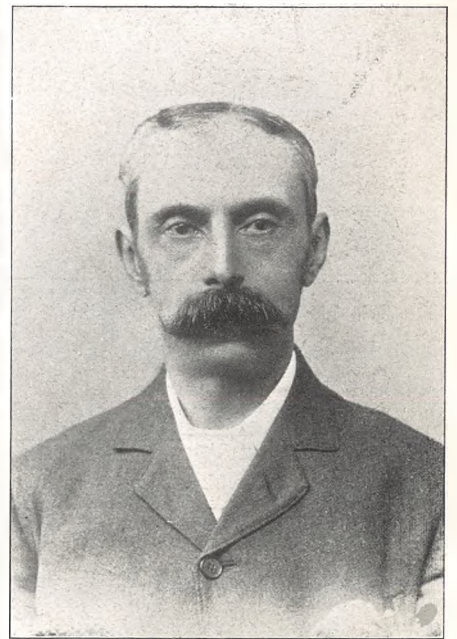

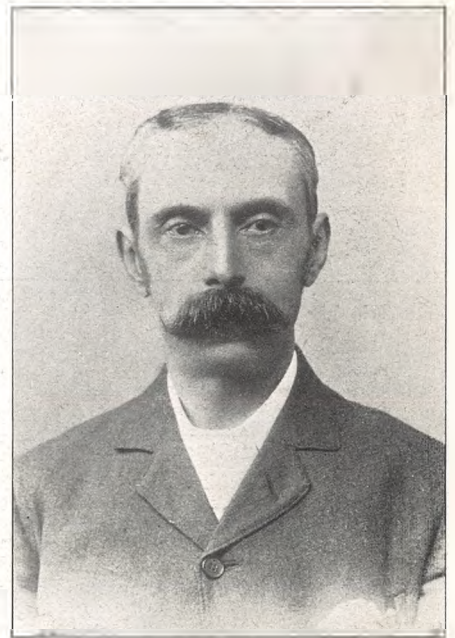

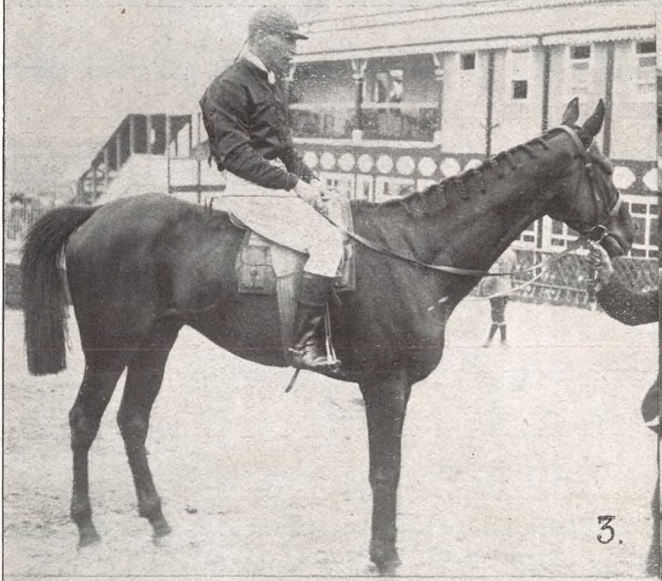

The deceased gentleman was educated at Oriel College, Oxford, and was a Greek and Latin scholar of no mean order.

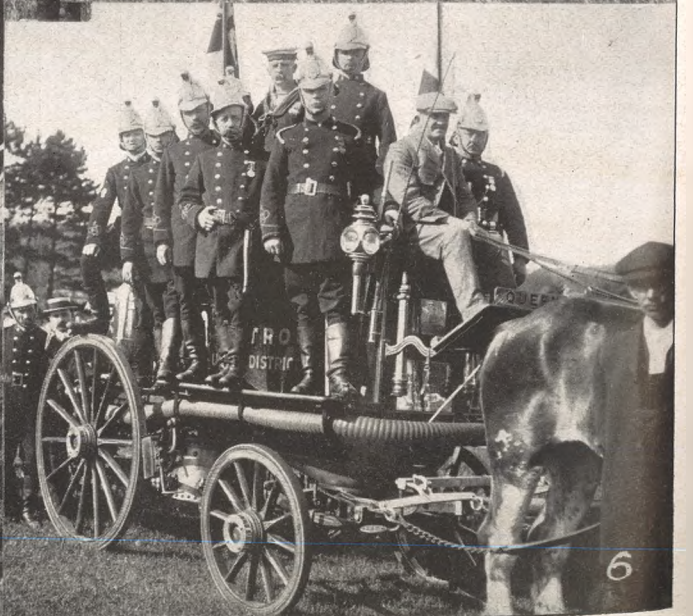
He was a prominent athlete at Oxford, and in his younger days a regular follower of hounds.

As a county magistrate he was for many years chairman of the Winchcombe Bench, and as an alderman of the County Council was chairman of the Finance Committee of that body.

He was, indeed, a keen business man and financier, but his benefactions were widespread, and distributed with that kindness that left most of the recipients unaware who was the donor, so that altogether he was a fine type of the English gentleman.

He was laid to rest in the family vault at Lower Guiting.

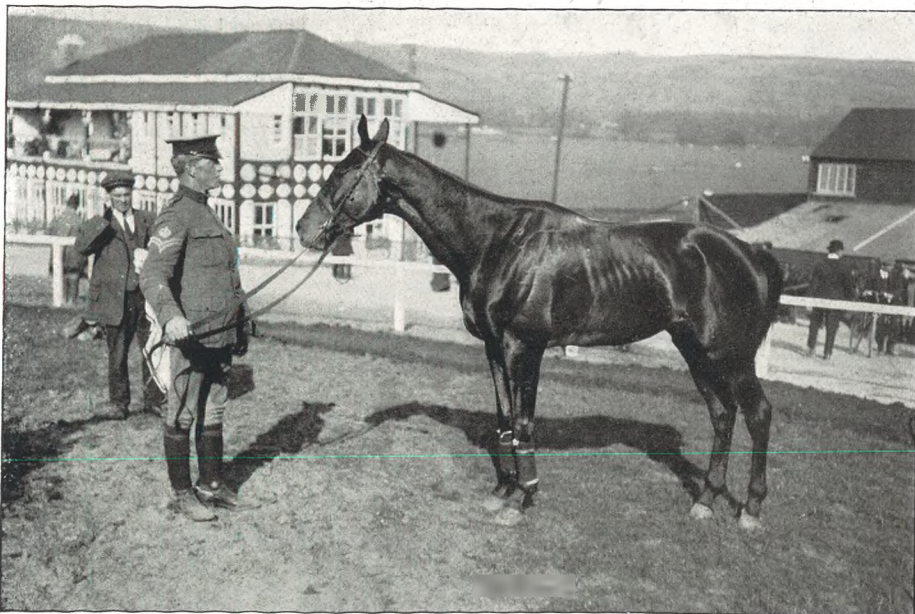

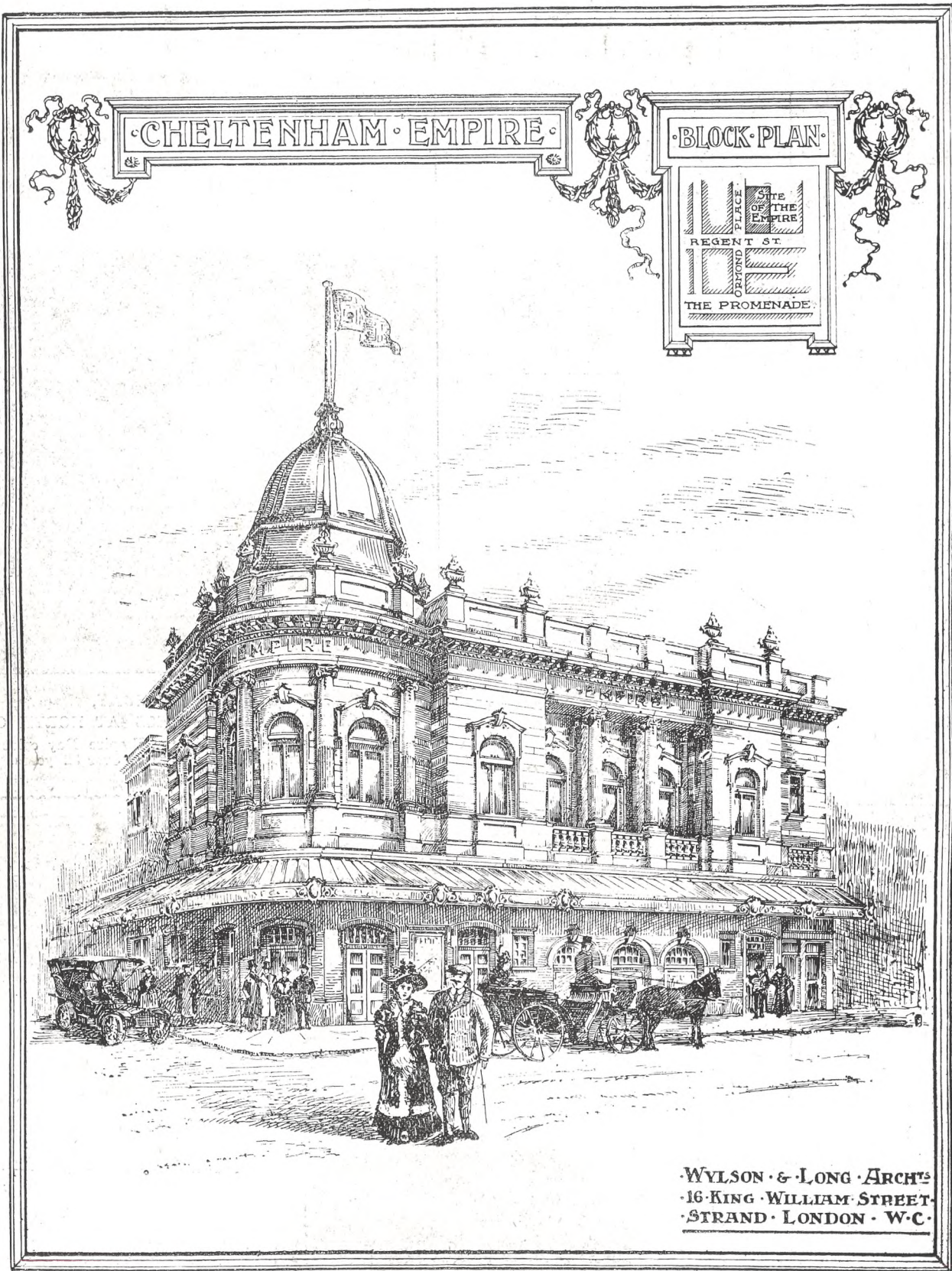
