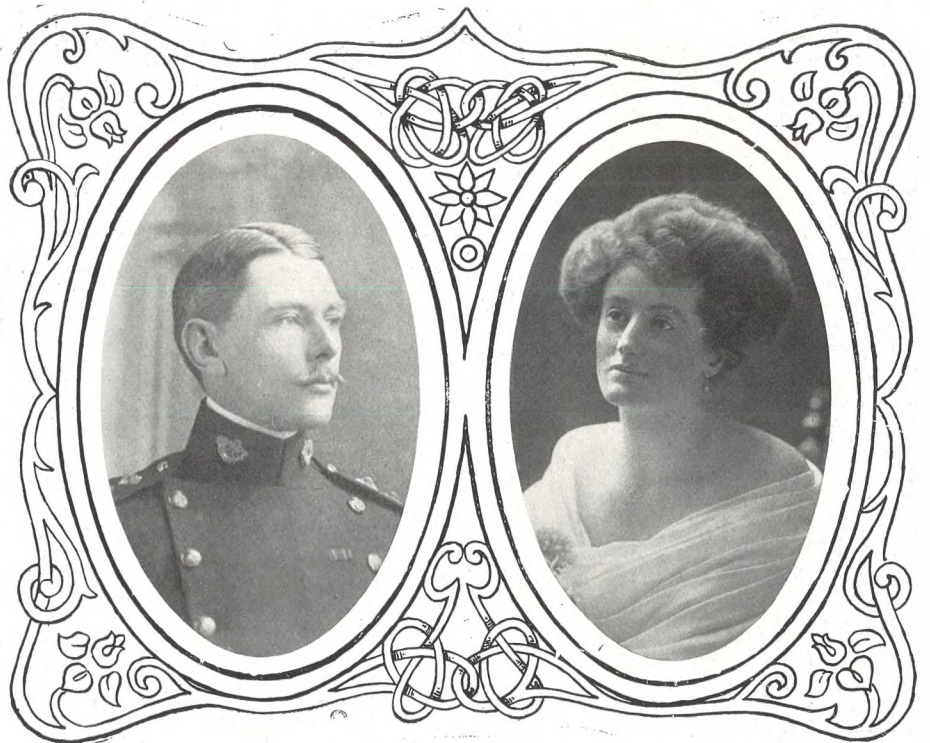

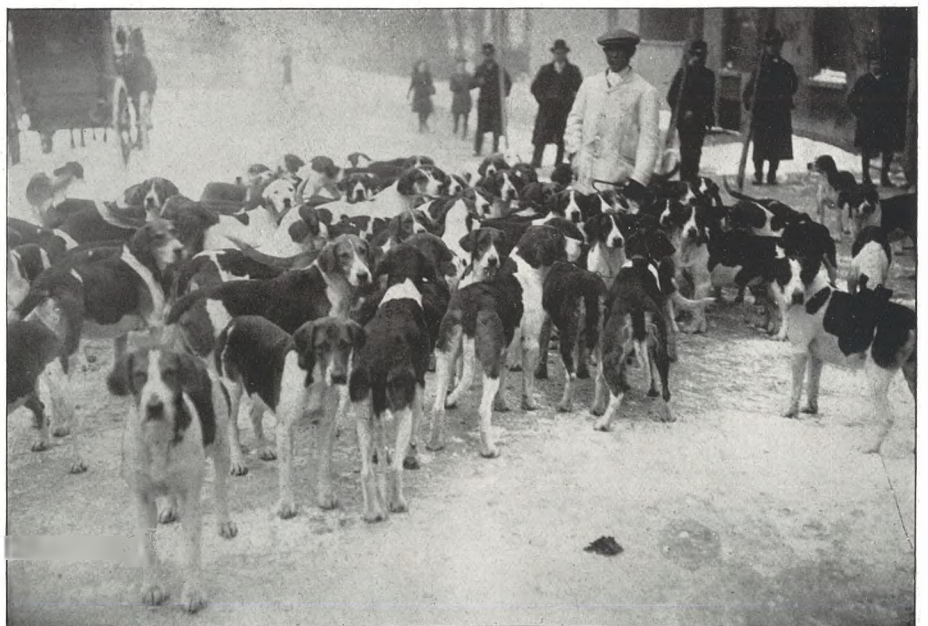

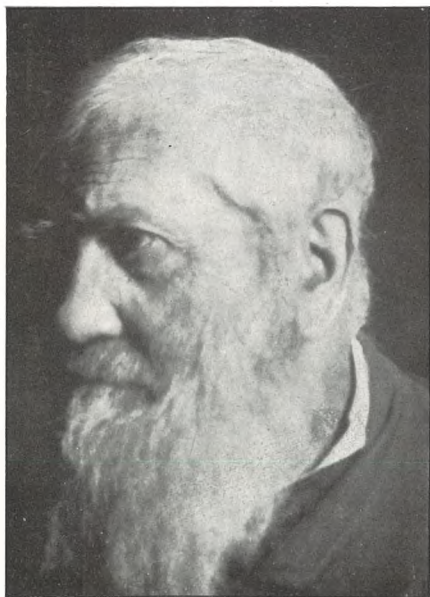

At the commencement of each year the depositors' books sent to the Savings Bank Department of the General Post Office include large numbers which are not then due for annual examination. The Postmaster-General has issued an order that when a depositor applies at a Post Office Savings Bank to transmit his book, the application should be discouraged except when it is made at the anniversary of the account being opened. The Post Office officials are required to point out to depositors that they suffer no disadvantage in this way.

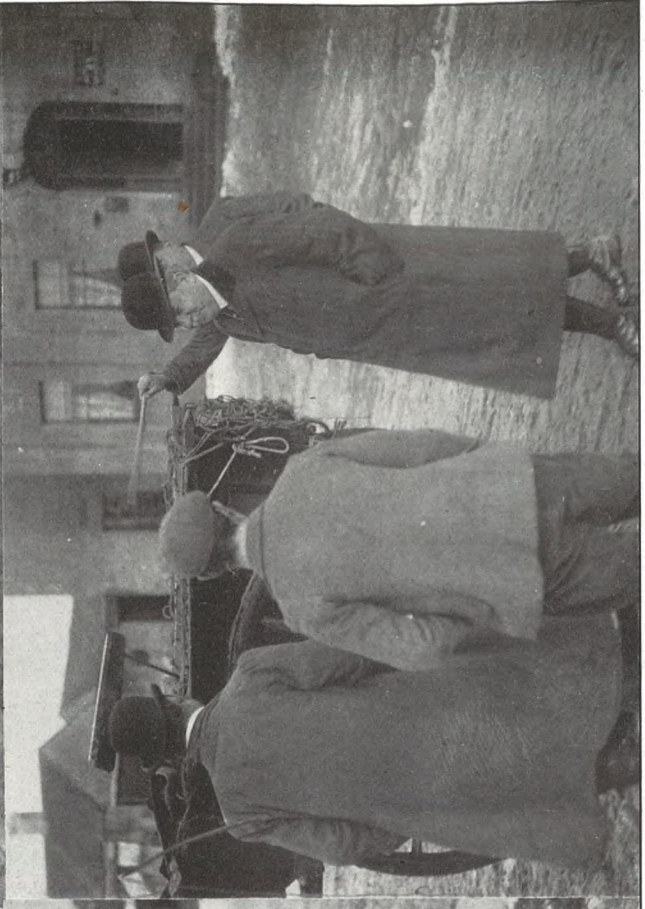

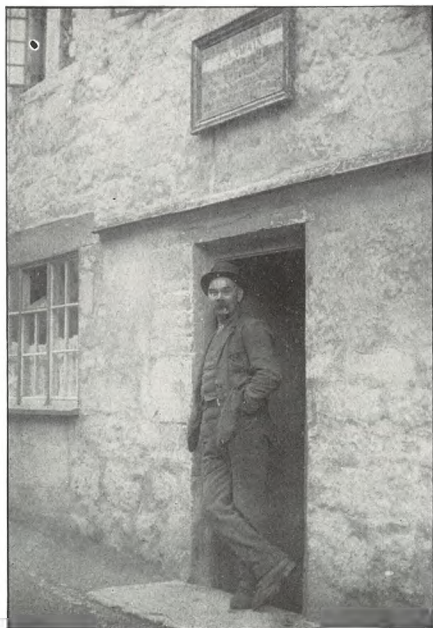

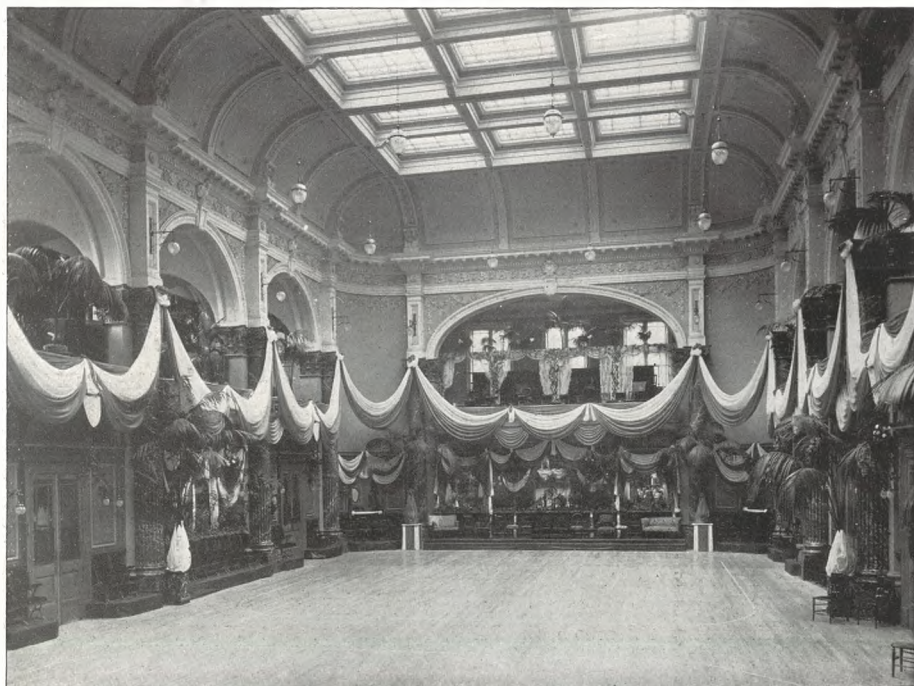

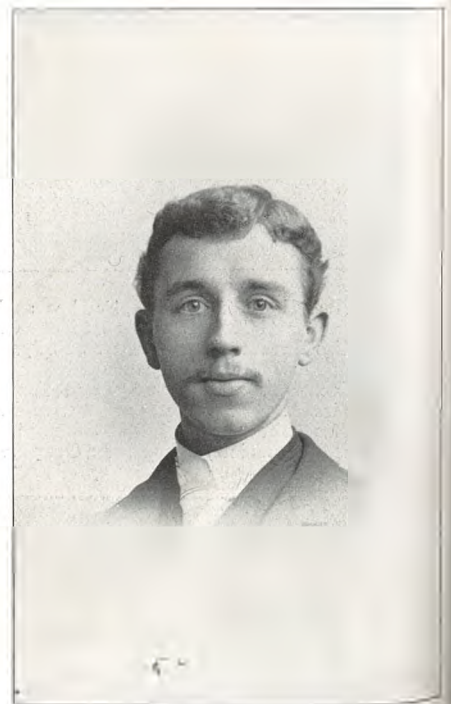

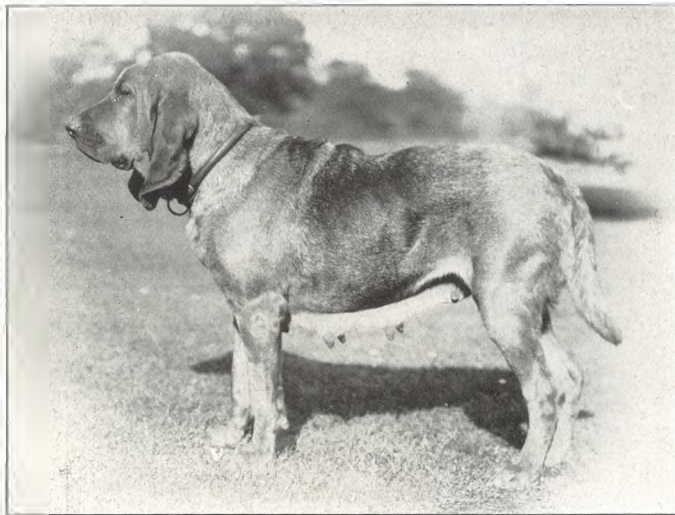

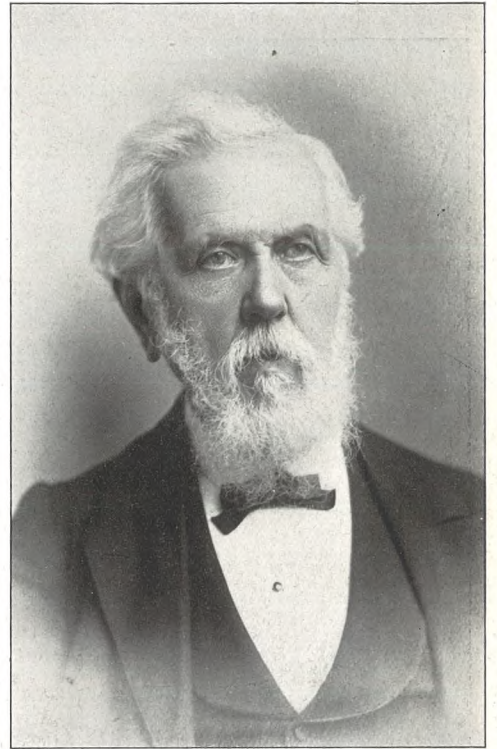

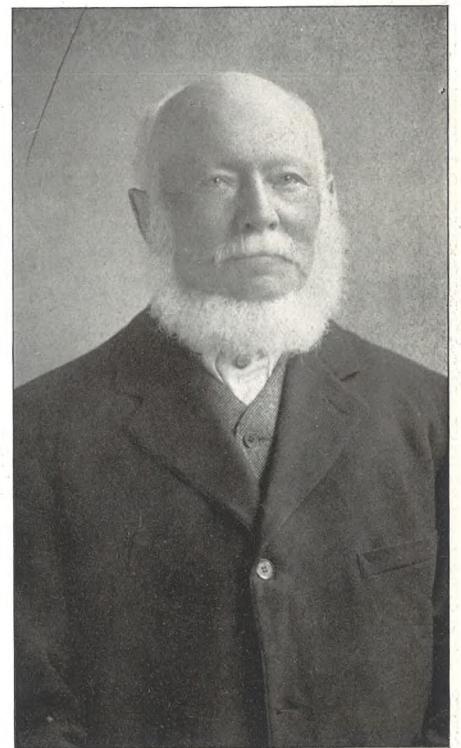

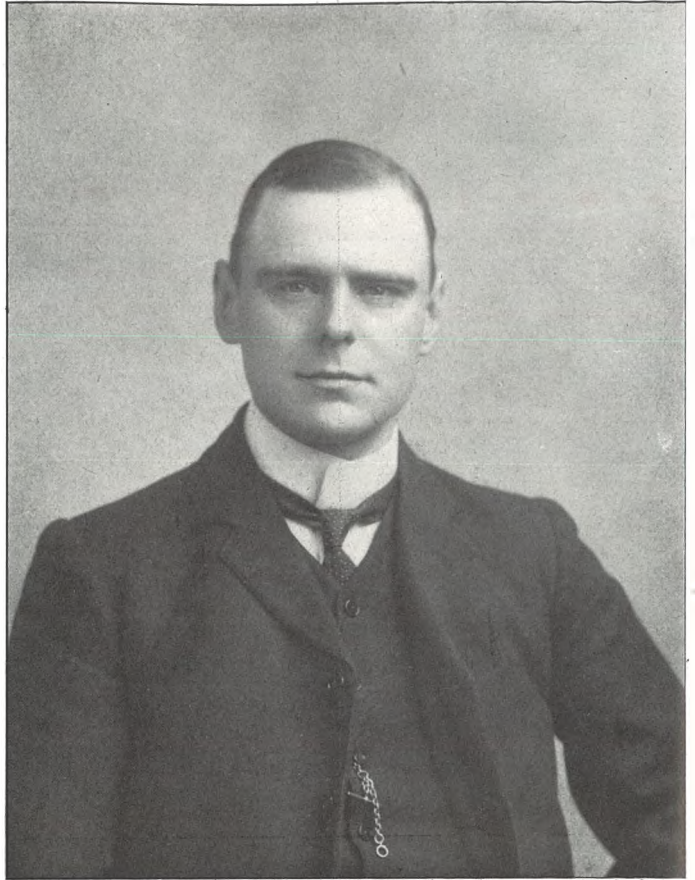

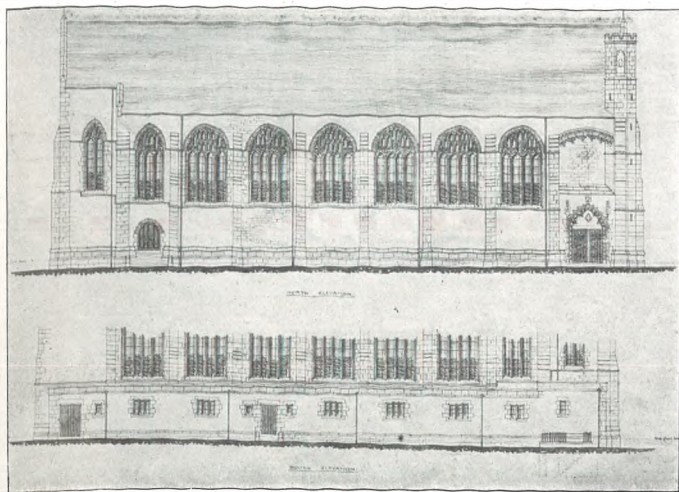

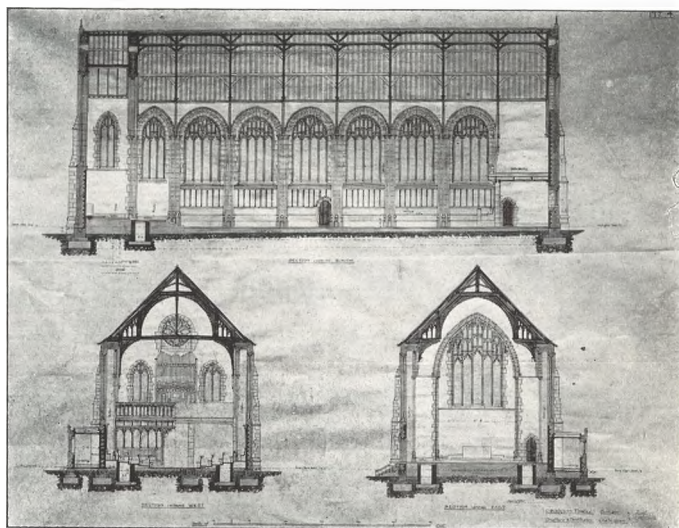

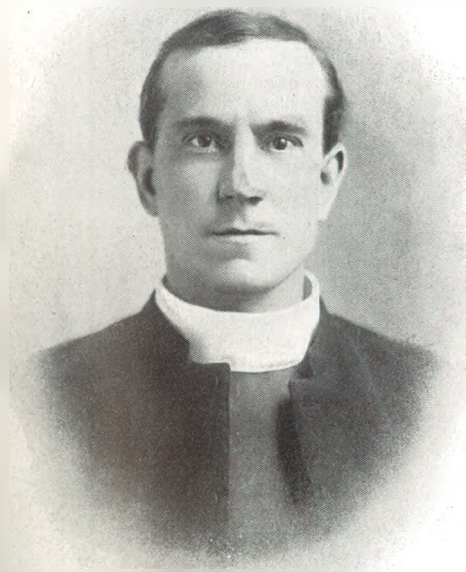

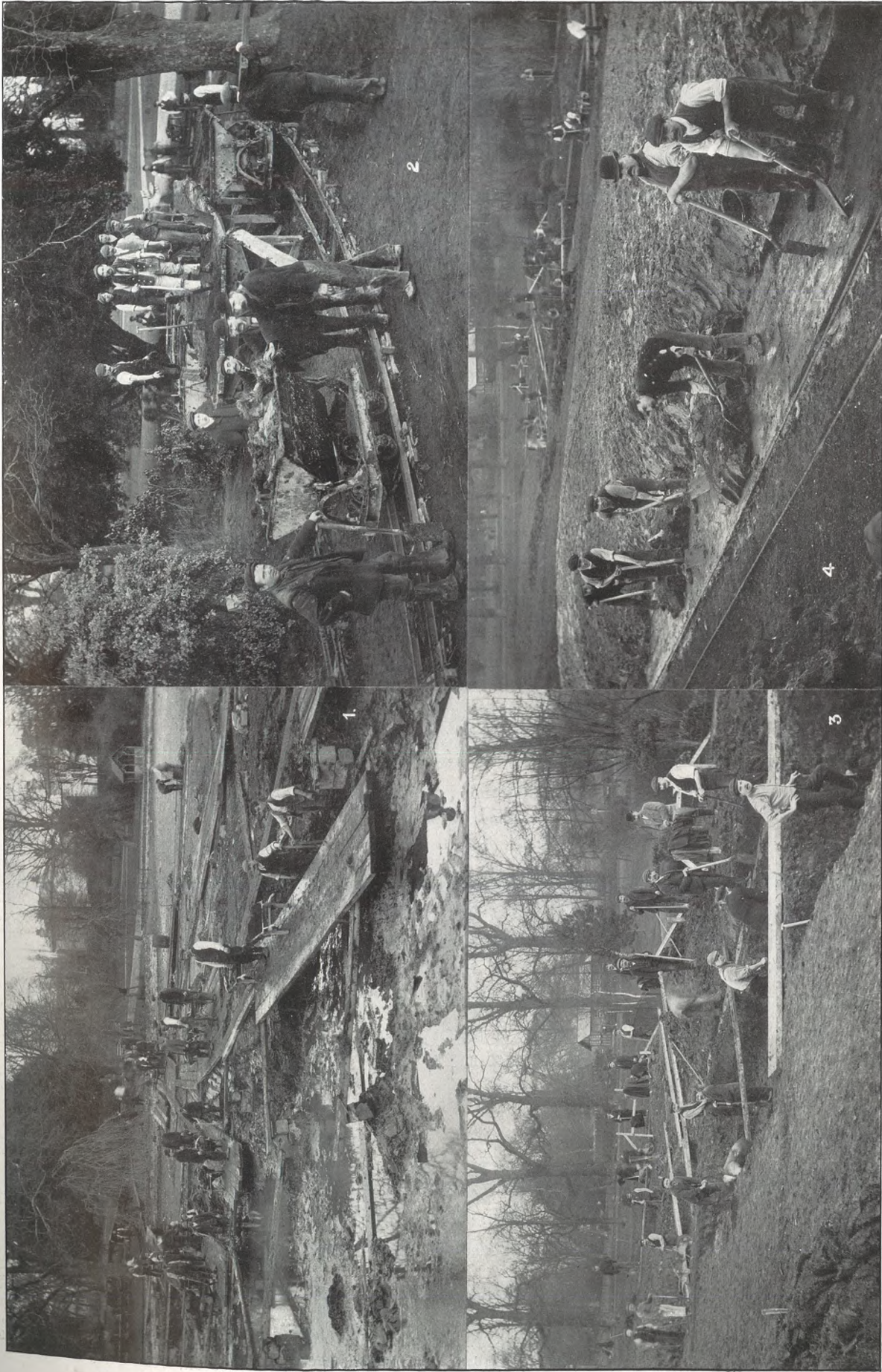
