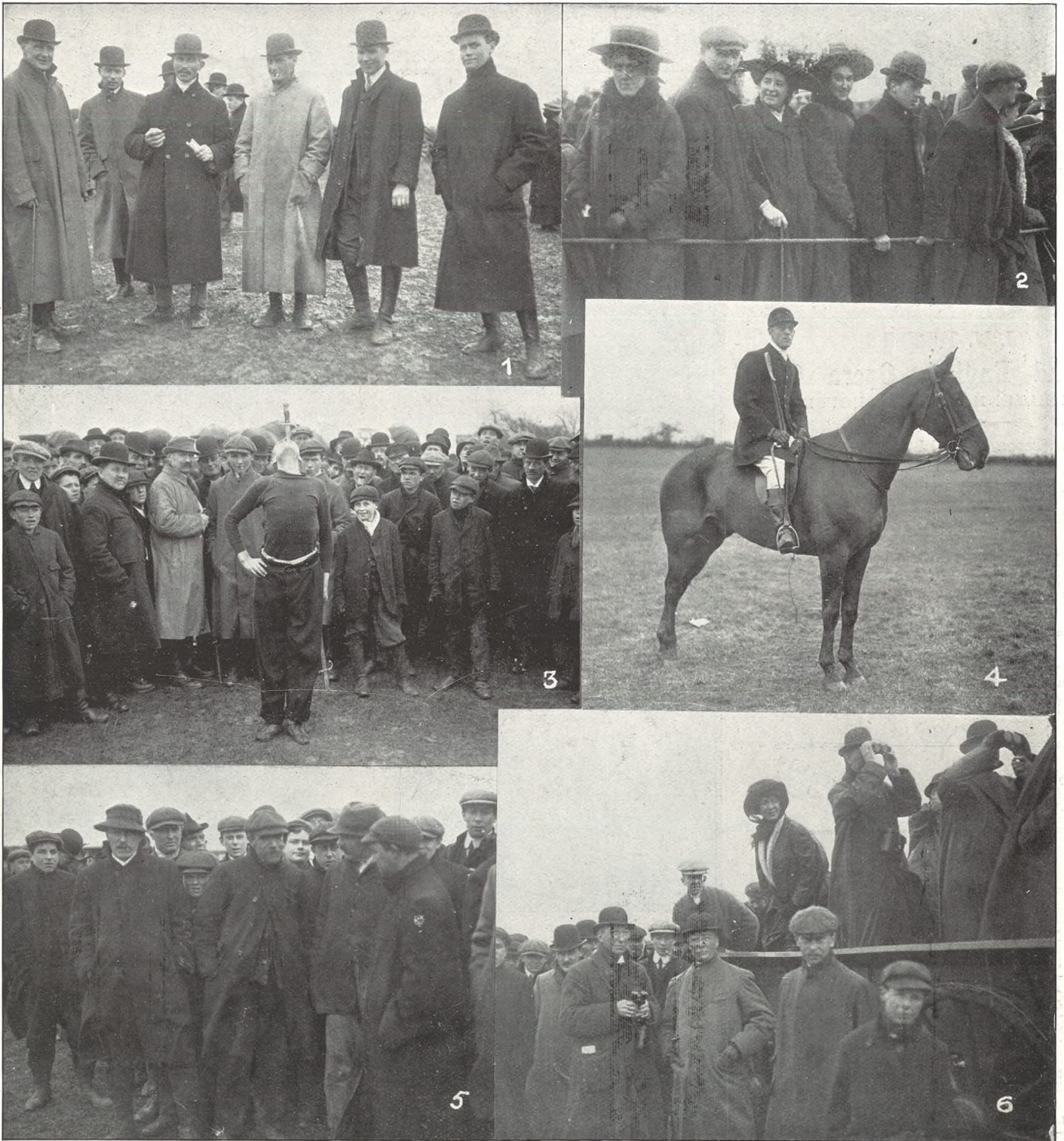

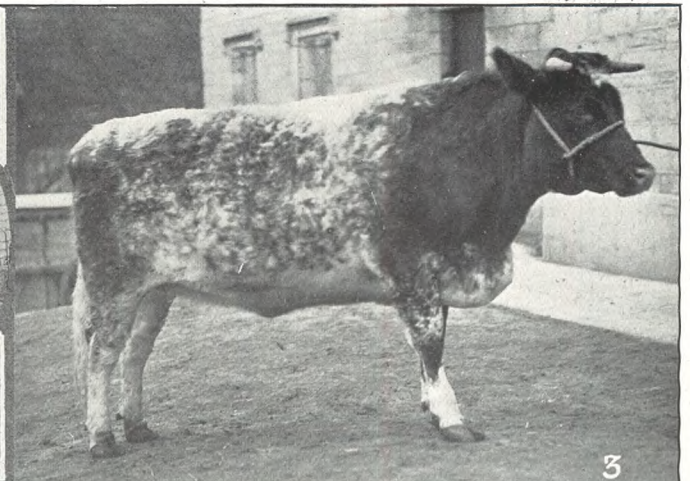

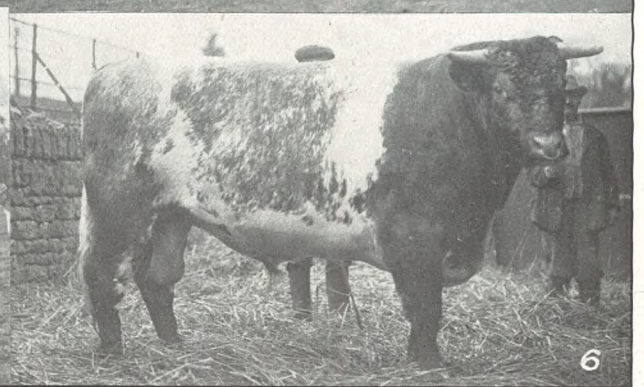

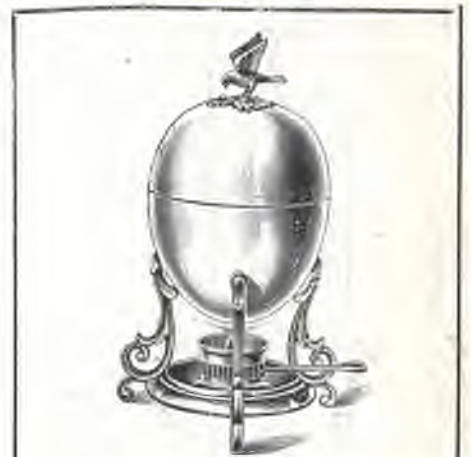

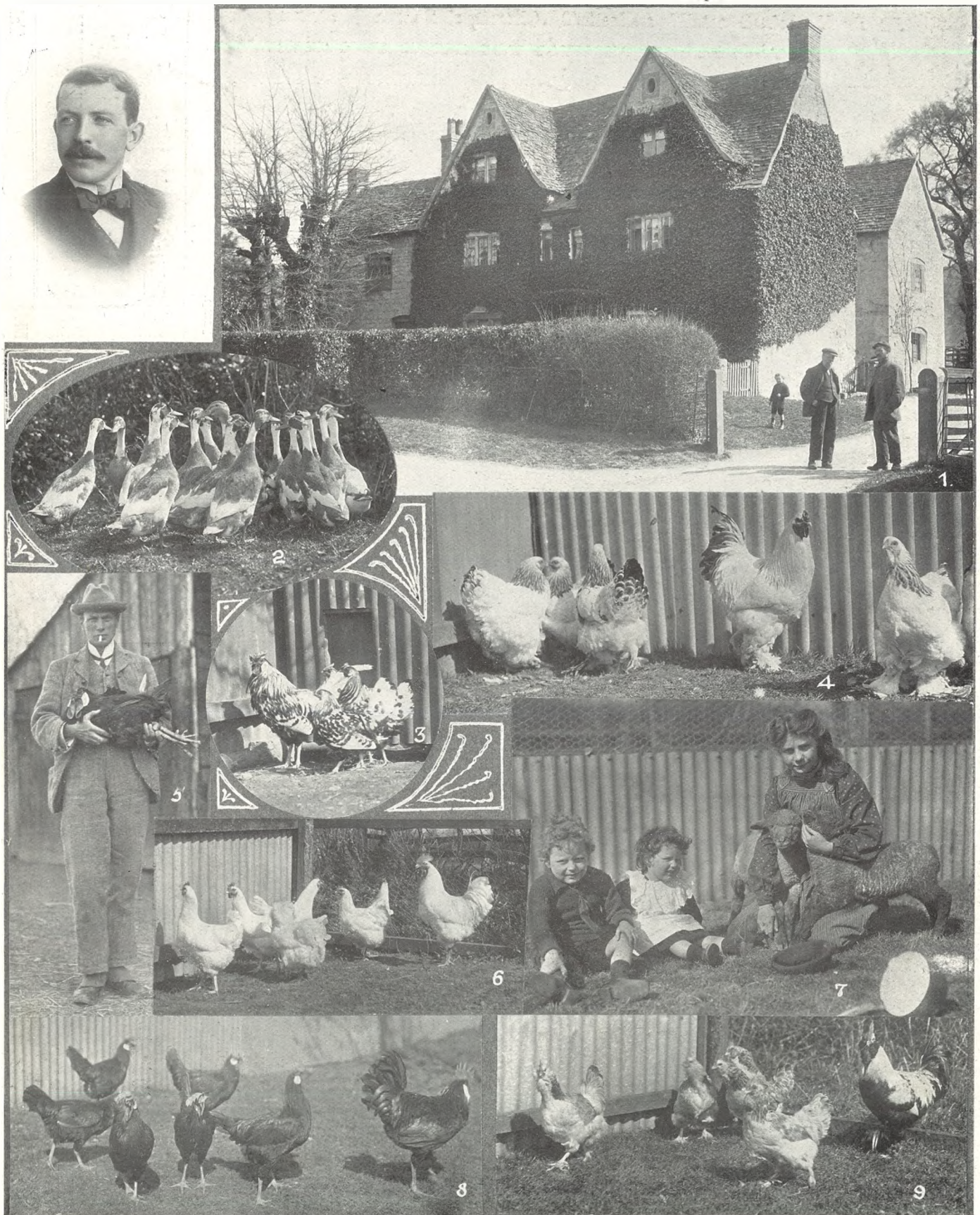

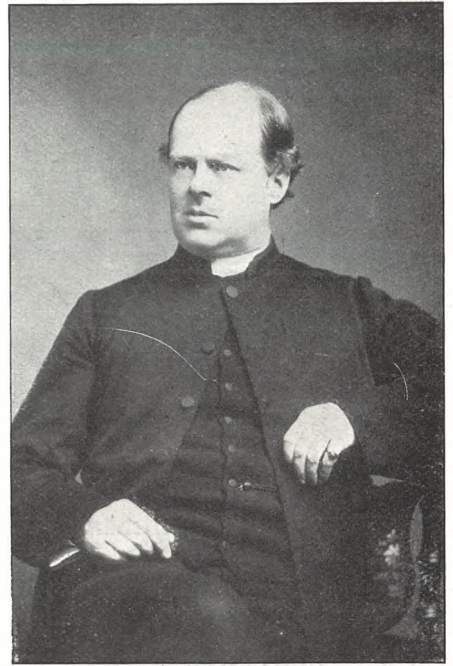

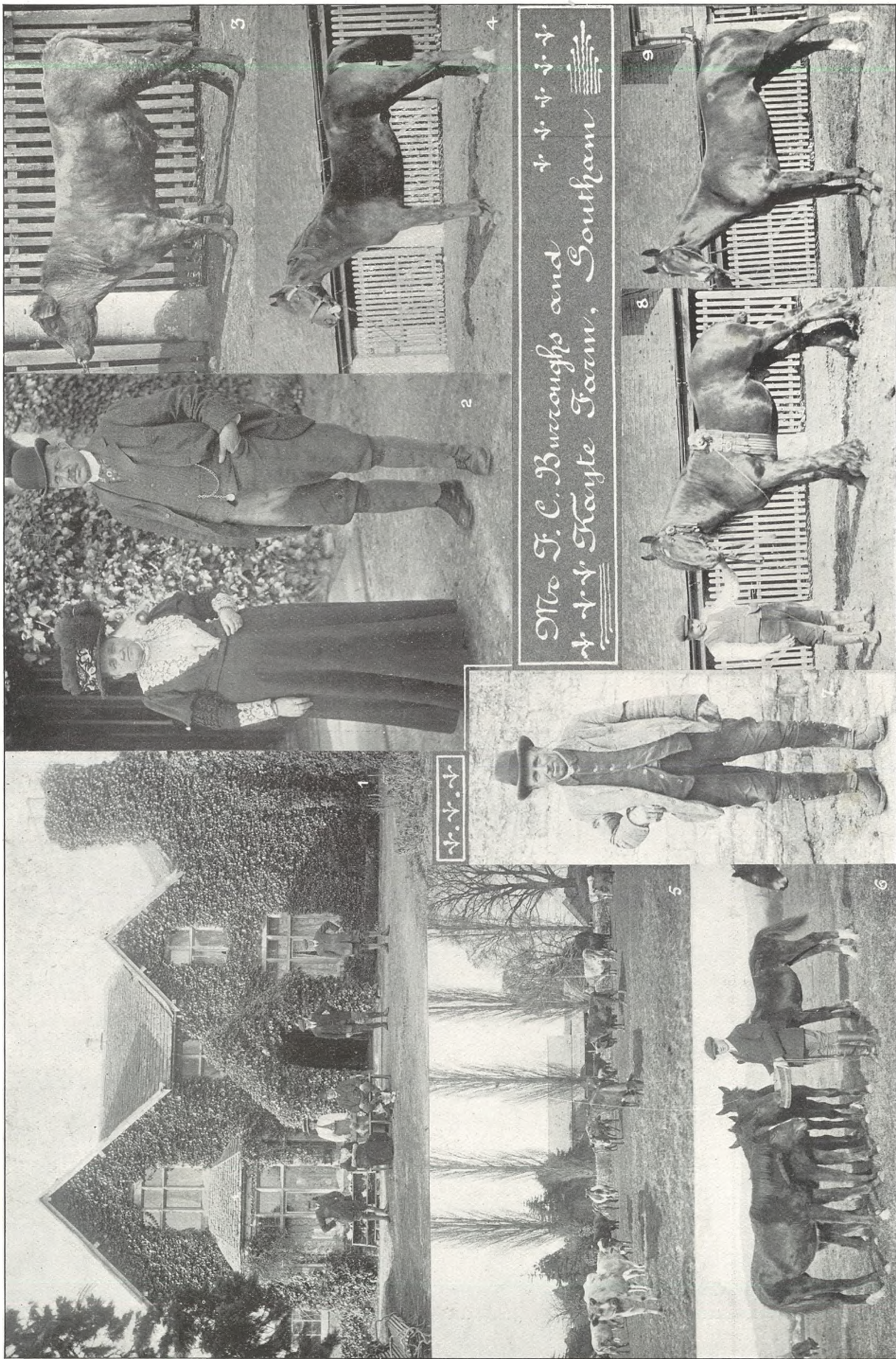

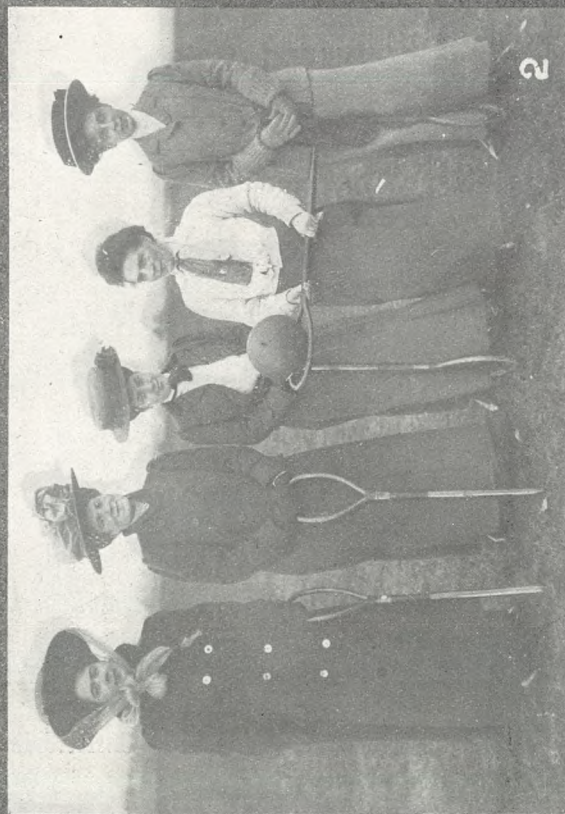

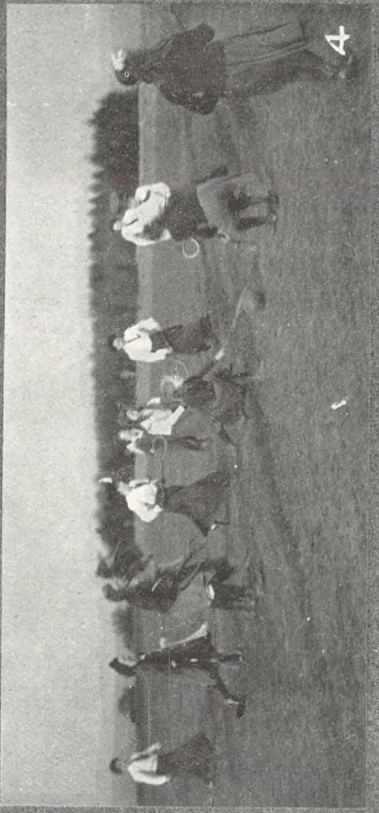

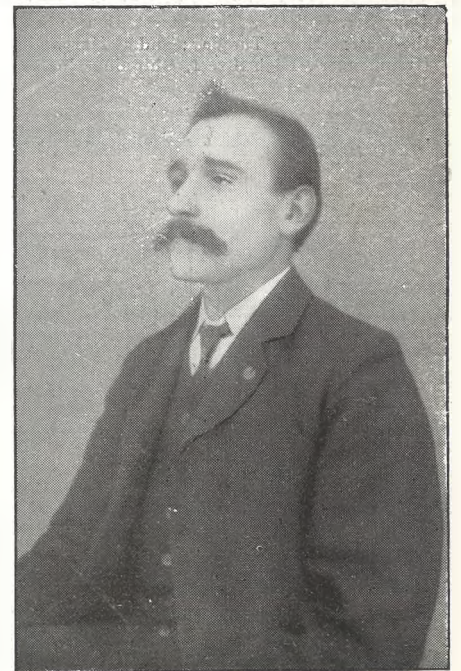

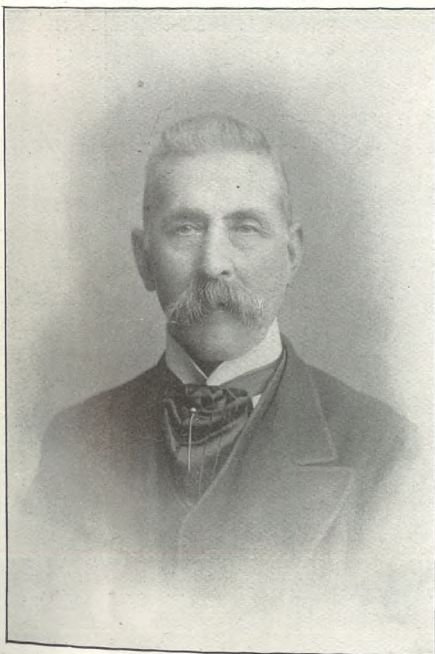

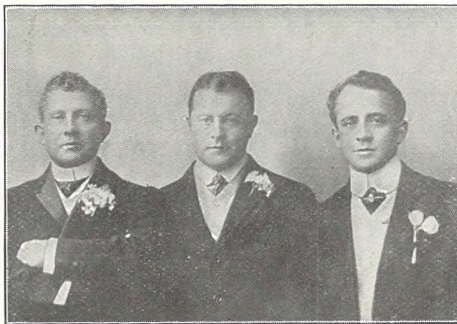

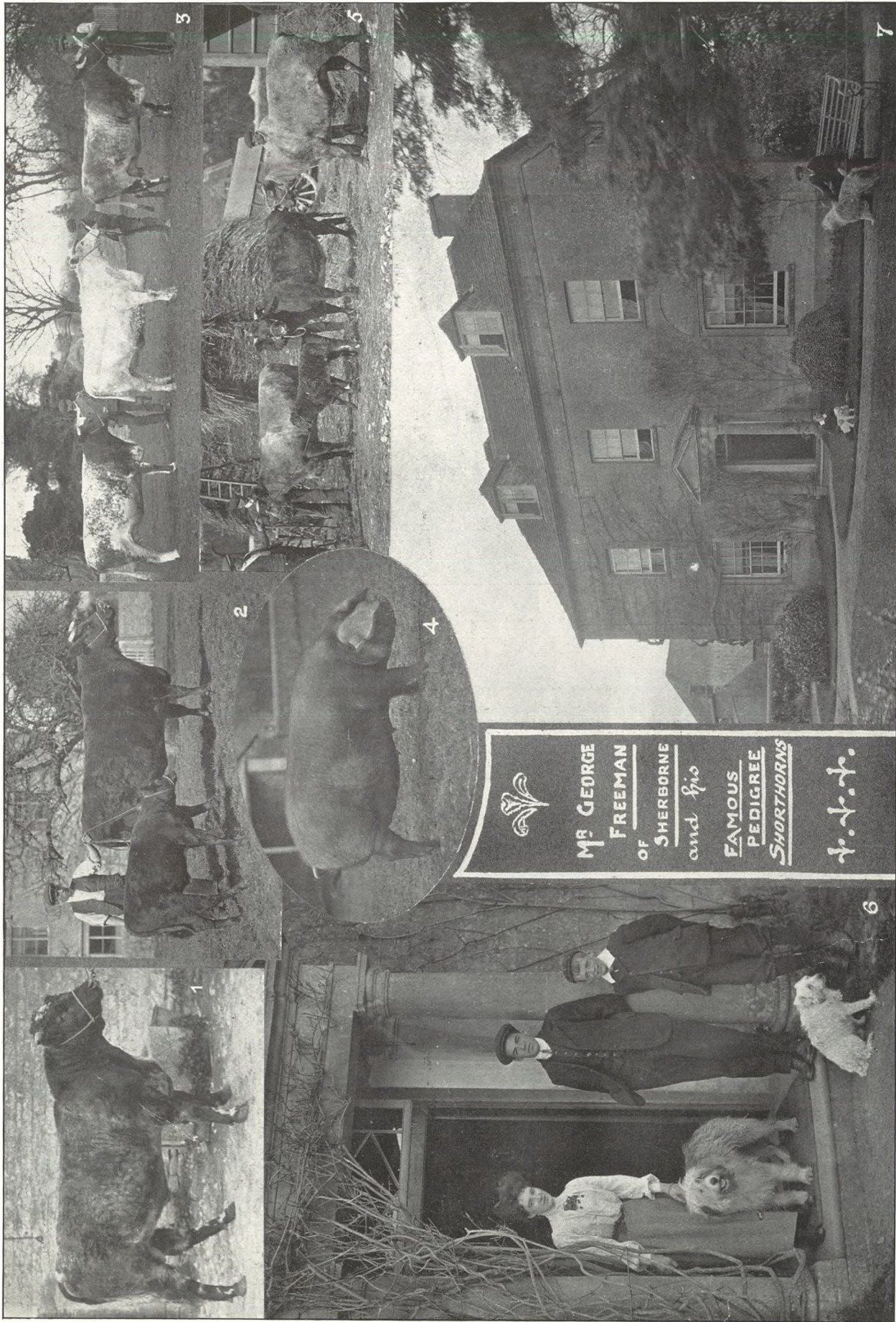

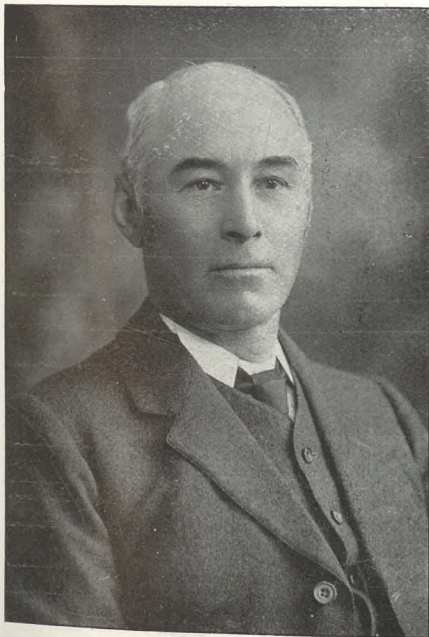

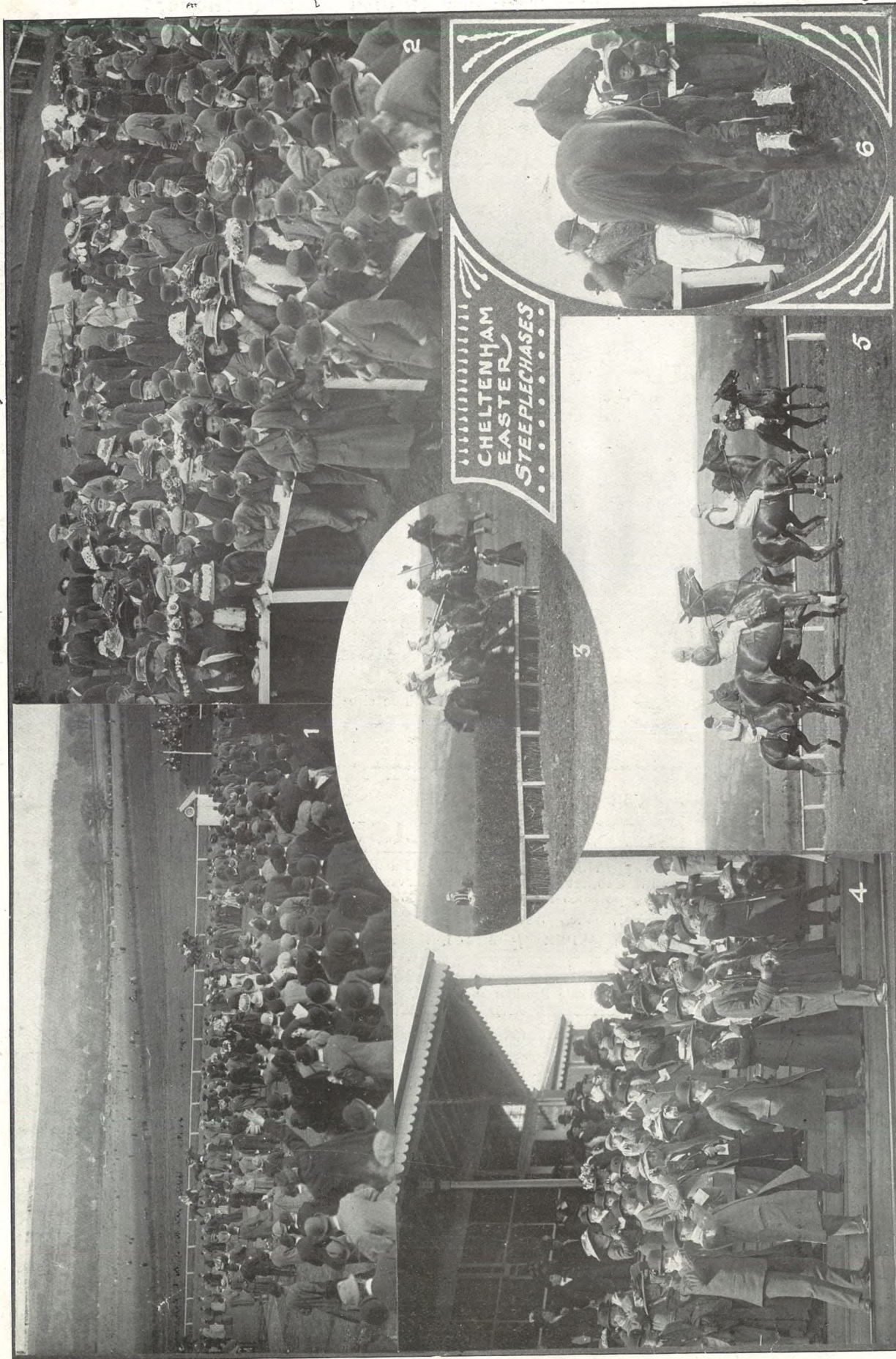

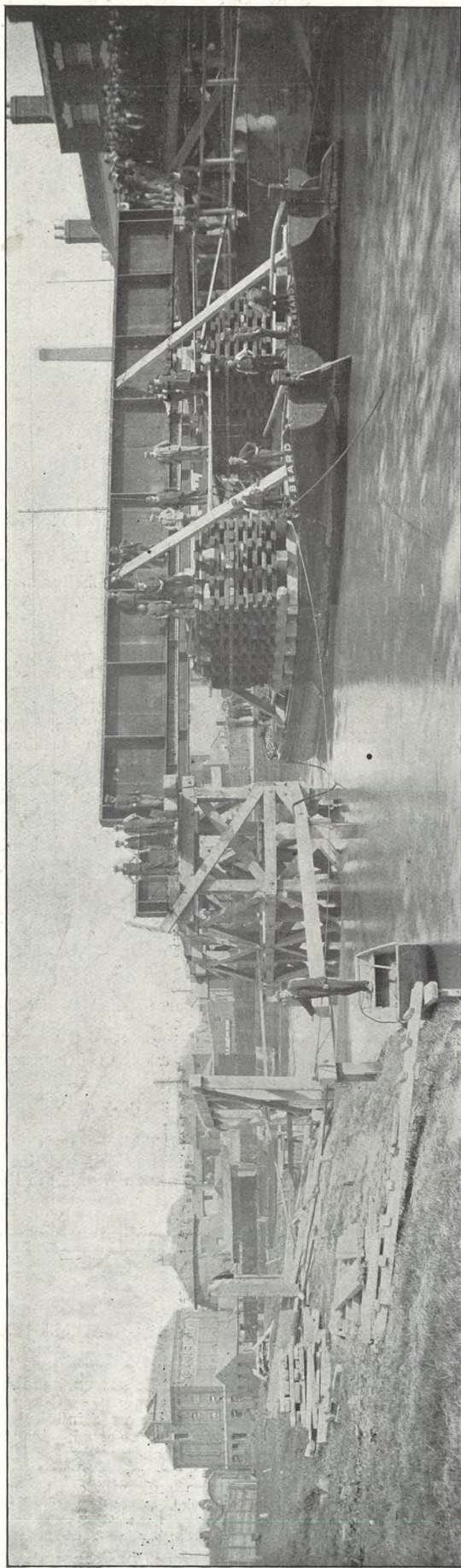
**LADY DAIRYMAIDS.**

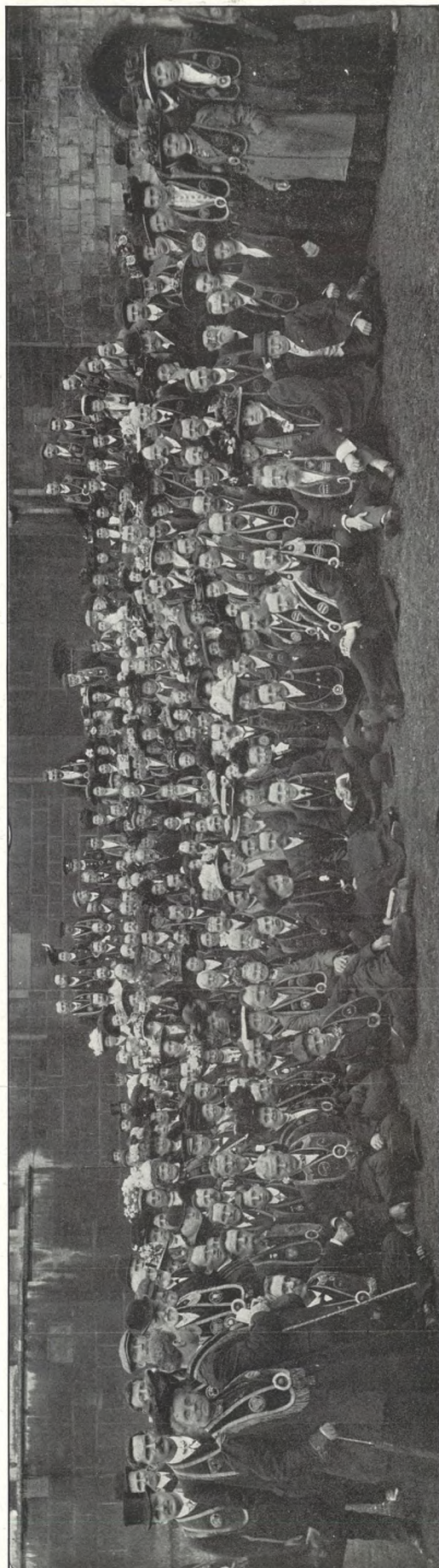
