




The record peal was rung at Cheltenham Parish Church on Easter Monday, April 22, 1889, and consisted of 15,227 changes of Grandsire Caters, composed by the late Mr. Henry Johnson (Birmingham), and was accomplished in 9 hours 43 minutes, being ably conducted by Mr. W. T. Pates, who at that time had not called a bob in the Grandsire method. Attempts have been made to supersede this performance at Bromsgrove, Wolverhampton, and Appleton, Berks.

It is remarkable to relate that all the performers are still alive, Messrs. Reeves. Roberts, Humphris, Musty, Pates, and Phillott taking part in Thursday's peal. Miss Phillott, who is photographed with the ringers, was born on the day of the record peal, and stands behind her father. For a fuller account see main sheet of to-day's Chronicle."






MAP OF CHELTENHAM IN 1809, WHEN THE "CHRONICLE WAS FIRST ISSUED.



















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



GIGANTIC LINERS

GIGANTIC LINERS. The White Star Company are having two enormous liners constructed at Belfast by Harland and Wolff. The vessels, which will be the largest afloat, will journey between Southampton and New York. A feature of the design is that they will each have four funnels and only one mast. The total cost for the two will, it is estimated, be something like £4,000,000, and they will both be ready

for their maiden voyages early in 1912. The two gantrys, which had to be specially built at the shipyard, cost £2,000,000. The passen-ger accommodation will be for at least 2,500, and the crew will number nearly 1,000. The gross tonnage will be 45,000, as against the 32,500 of the Lusitania. The funnels of the boats will be so large that two double-decked tramway cars could easily pass through each.
