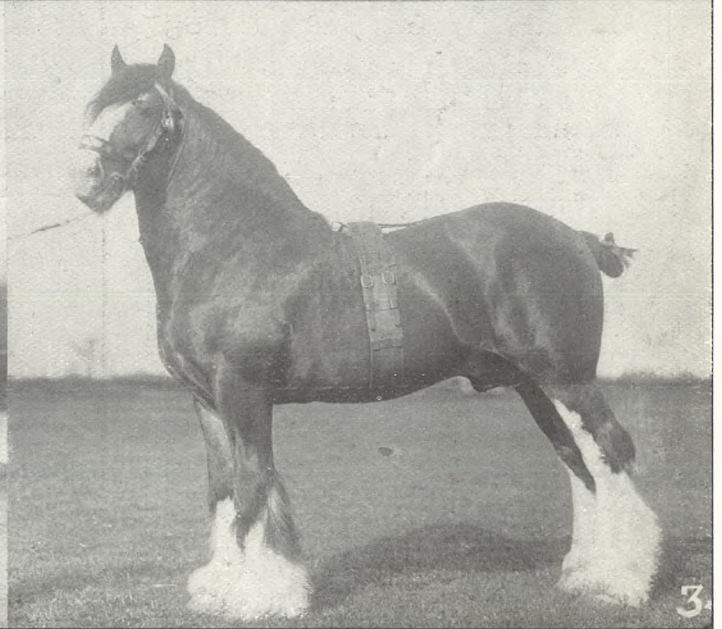

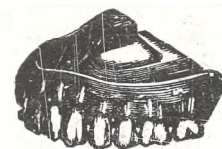

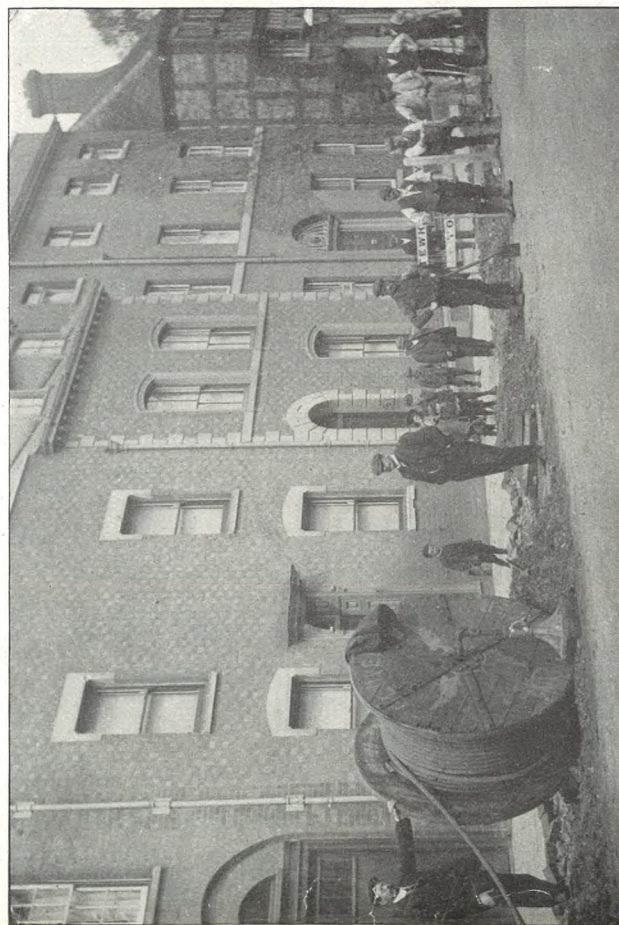

WHO TOOK PART IN A SHORT PEAL OF GRANDSIRE CATERS ON THURSDAY, APRIL 22, 1909, TO CELEBRATE THE TWENTIETH ANNIVERSARY OF THE LONGEST PEAL OF GRANDSIRE CATERS EVER RUNG.

The record peal was rung at Cheltenham Parish Church on Easter Monday, April 22, 1889, and consisted of 15,227 changes of Grandsire Caters, composed by the late Mr. Henry Johnson (Birmingham), and was accomplished in 9 hours 43 minutes, being ably conducted by Mr. W. T. Pates, who at that time had not called a bob in the Grandsire method. Attempts have been made to supersede this performance at Bromsgrove, Wolverhampton, and Appleton, Berks.

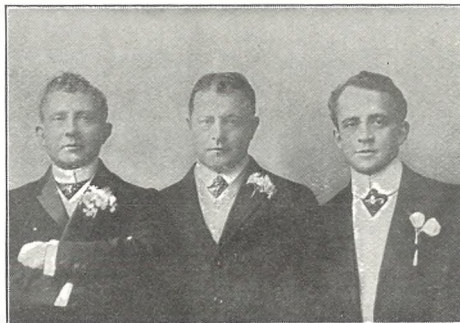
It is remarkable to relate that all the performers are still alive, Messrs. Reeves, Roberts, Humphris, Musty, Pates, and Phillott taking part in Thursday's peal. Miss Phillott, who is photographed with the ringers, was born on the day of the record peal, and stands behind her father. For a fuller account see main sheet of to-day's Chronicle."

**THE TRUTH ABOUT BEER.**

Our remarks on the value of beer must not be misconstrued; we are quite alive to the tremendous harm done by the abuse of alcohol, and the good done by sympathising with temperance; at the same time with the philanthropist's desire to improve mankind we have the scientist's regard for fact. Upon untruth no enduring fabric, however philanthropic its motive, can ever be securely built. The fact is that good properly made beer is a beverage containing a very small amount of alcohol and a relatively large amount of nutritive material. All beverages because they contain alcohol should not be regarded in the same light. The spirit nipper is committing quite a different act from the beer drinker; in fact, beer is much farther removed from the point of view of its alcohol content from some wines and all spirits than ginger-beer is from beer.—"The Hospital."

While overhauling the library of a gentleman living in an old manor house in the North of England booksellers have discovered a remarkable collection of the productions of England's first printer, William Caxton.



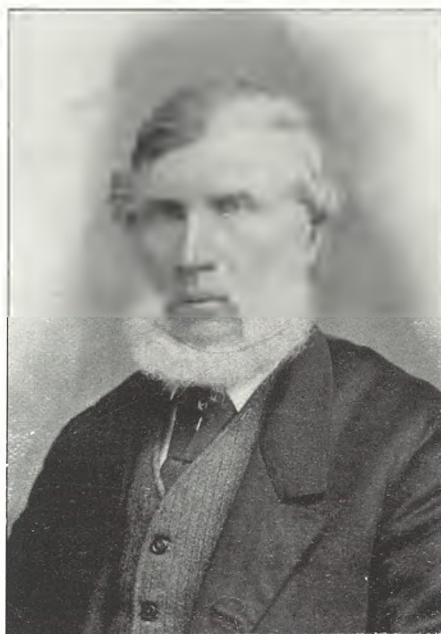

## Cirencester's Pioneer Forester.

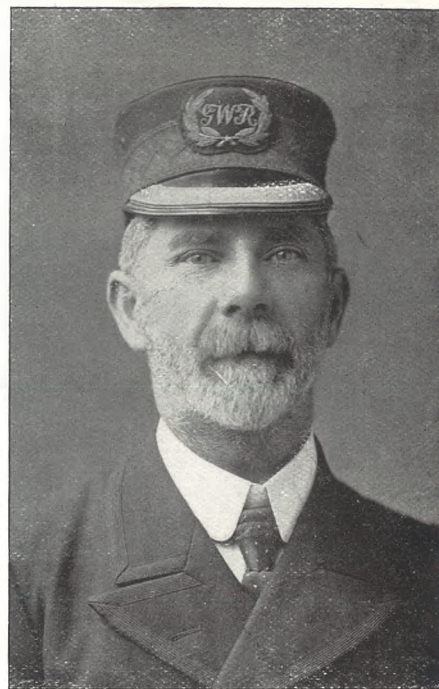


MR. CHARLES PRICE,

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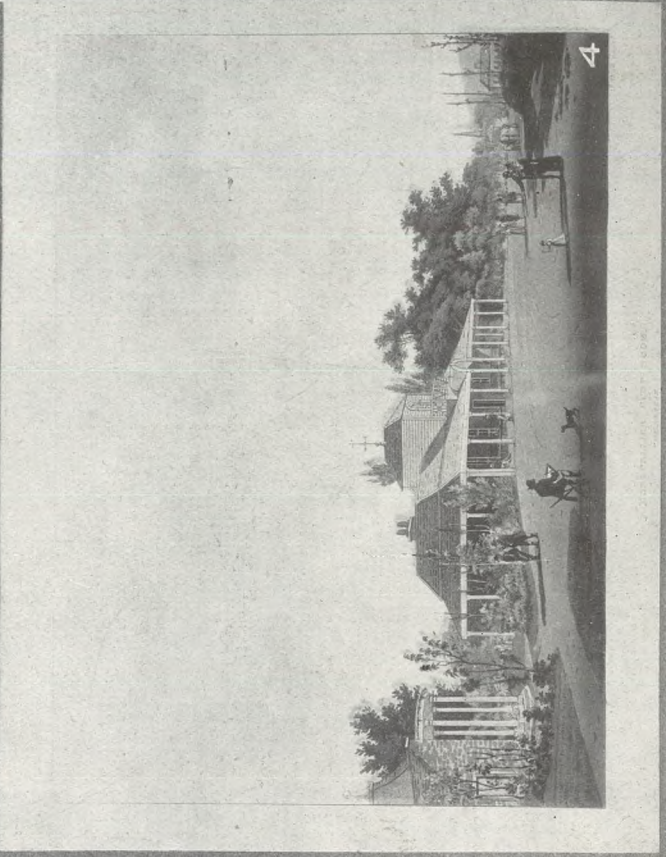

HOW CHELTENHAM LOOKED WHEN THE "CHRONICLE" WAS FIRST ISSUED.

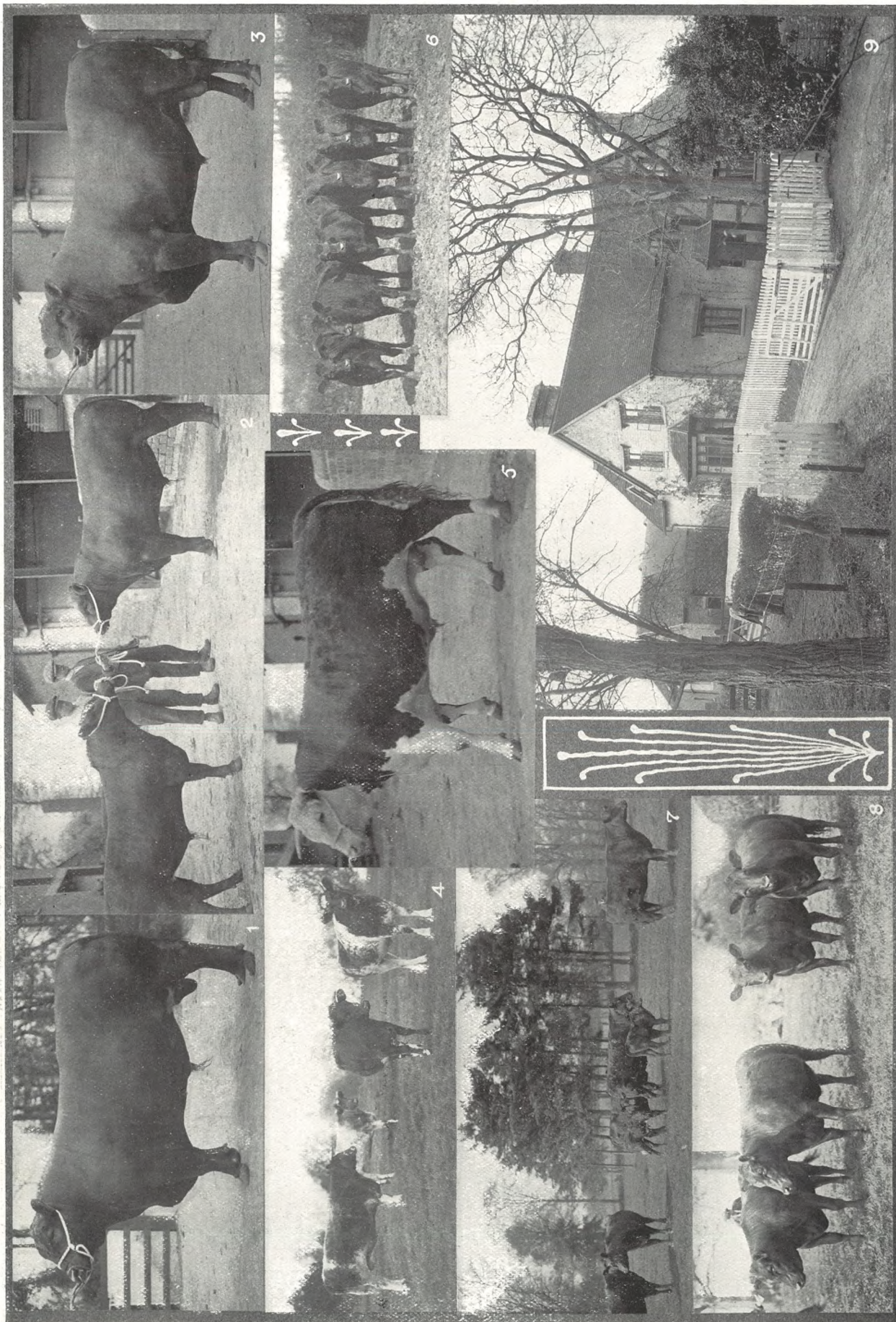
1. The Royal Crescent, in the reign of George III.

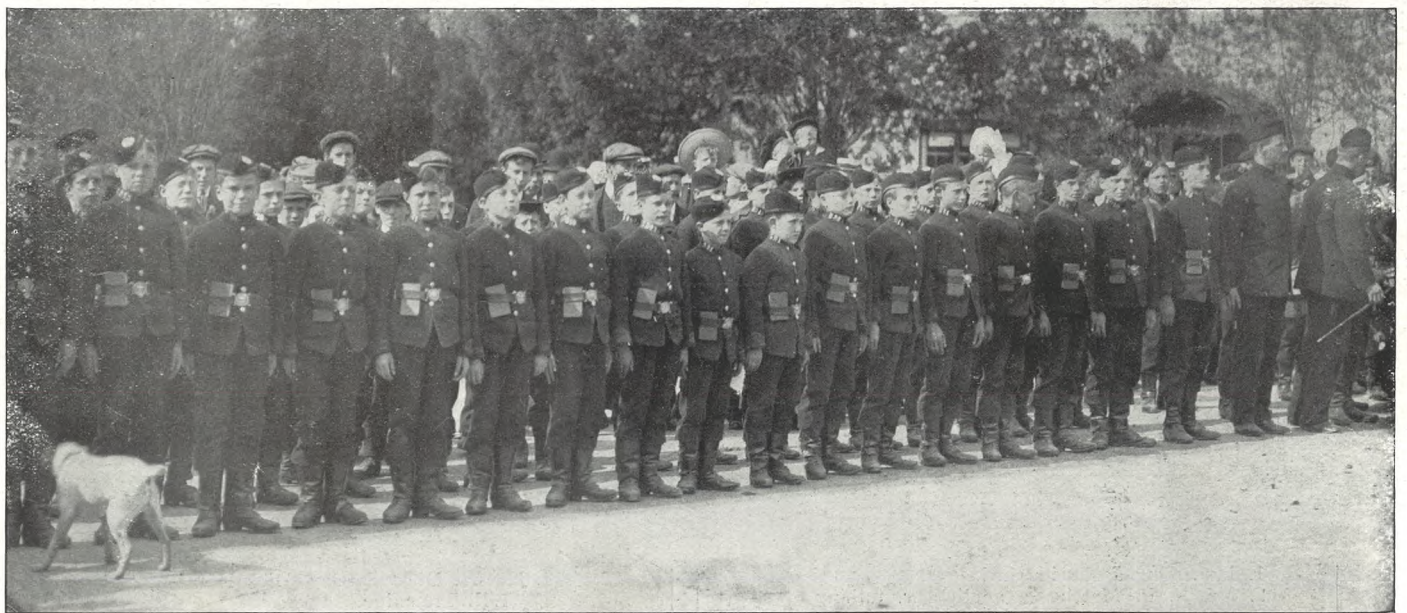

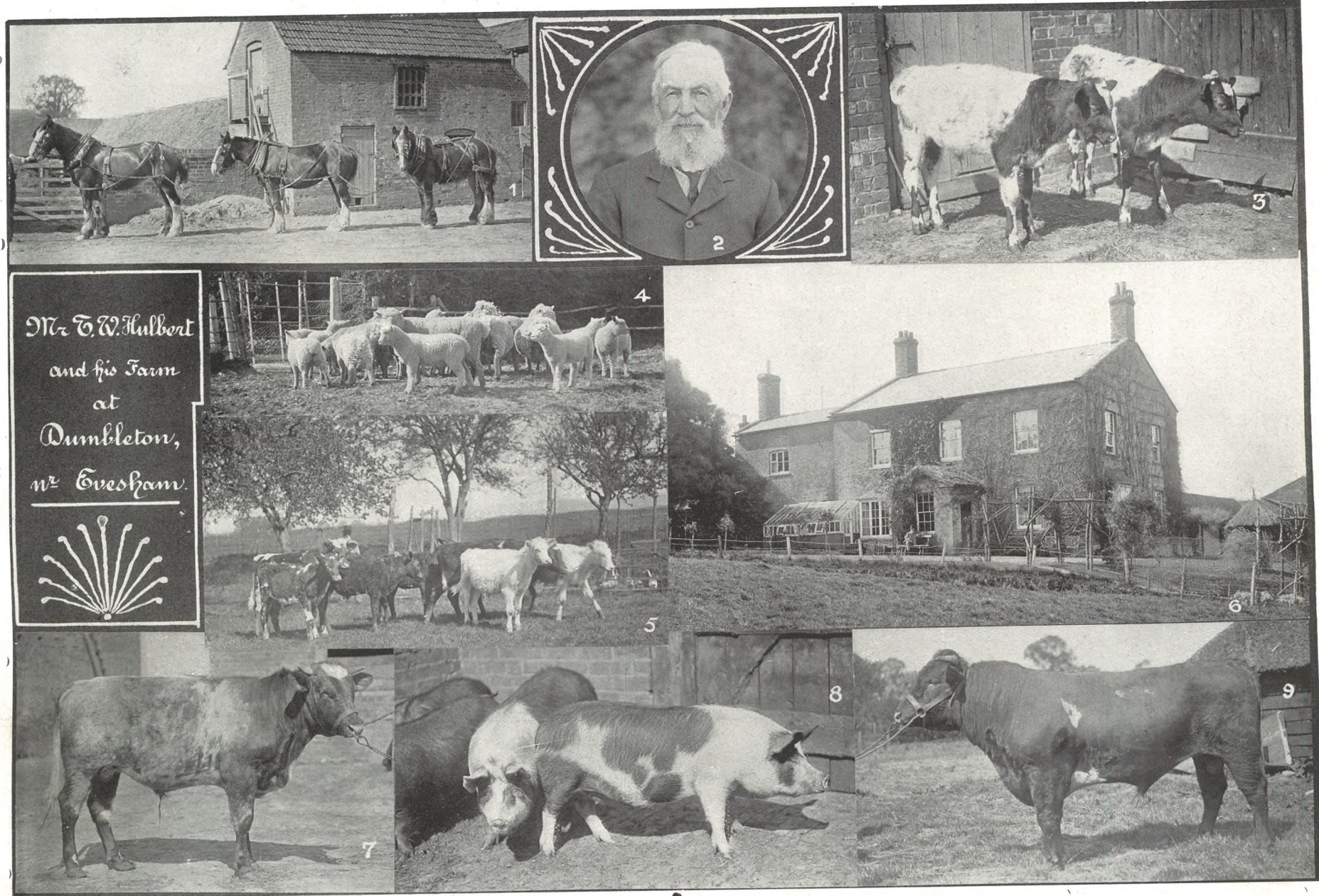

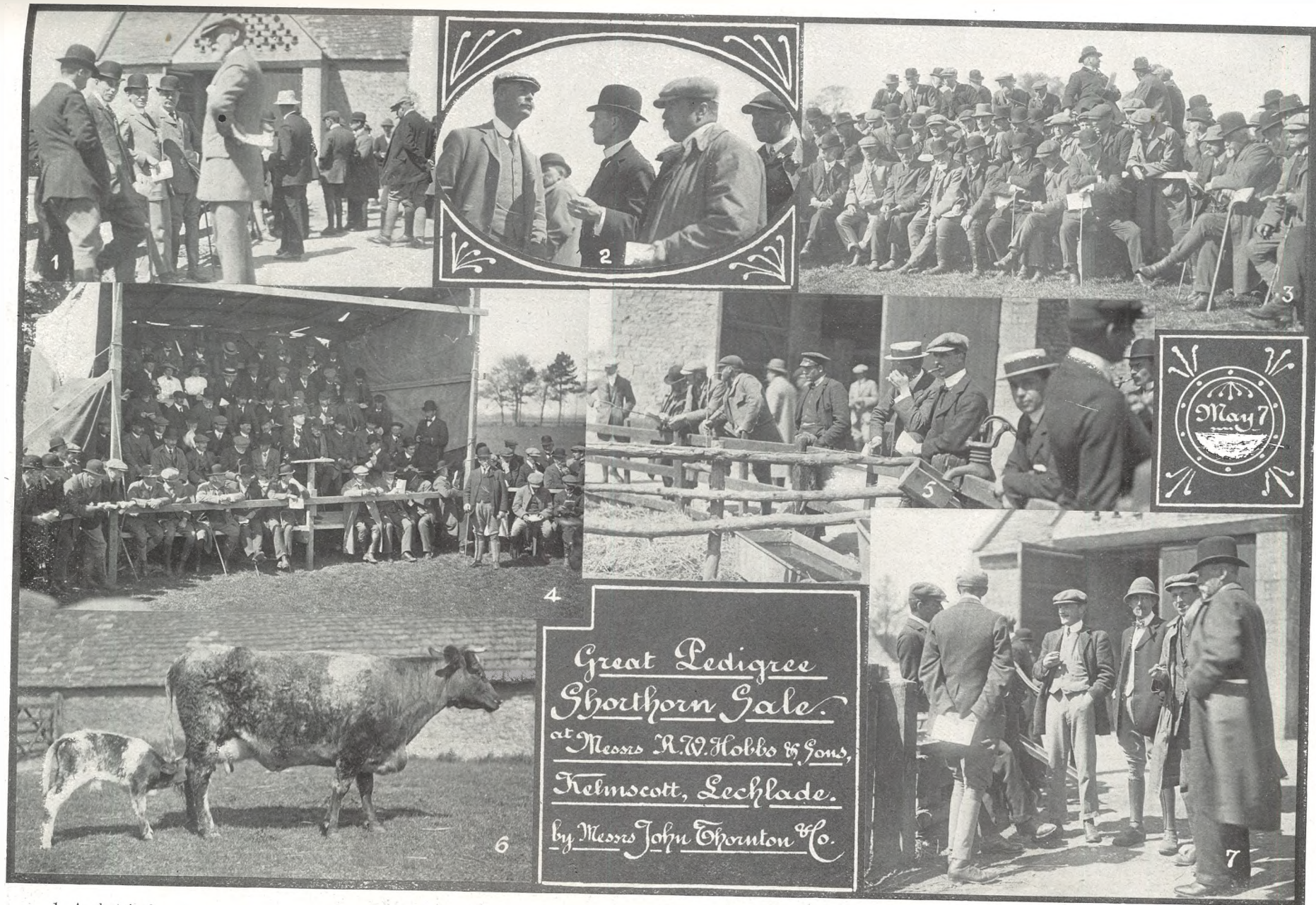

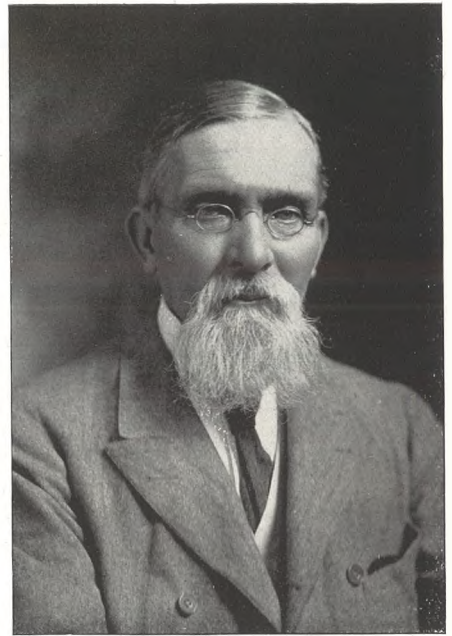

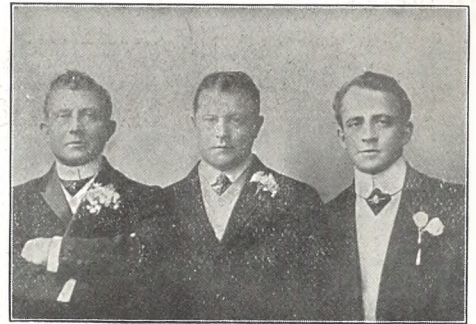

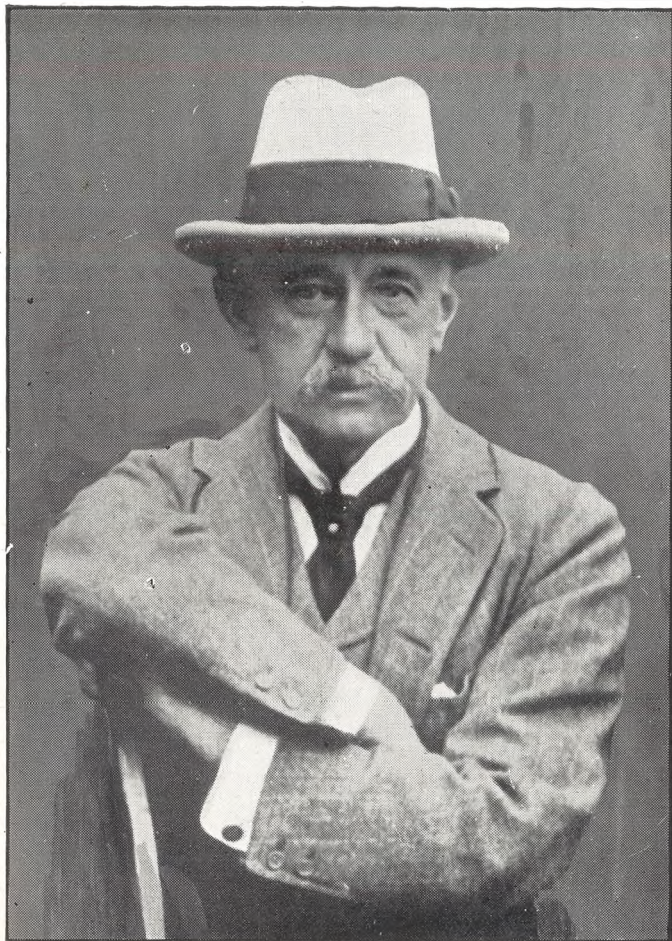

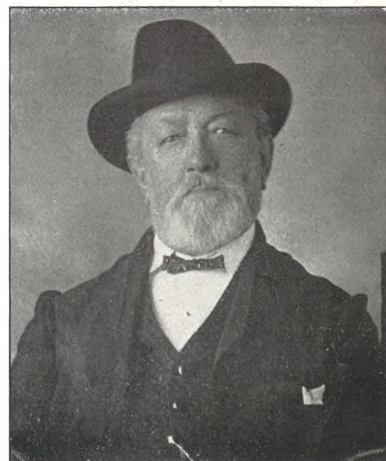

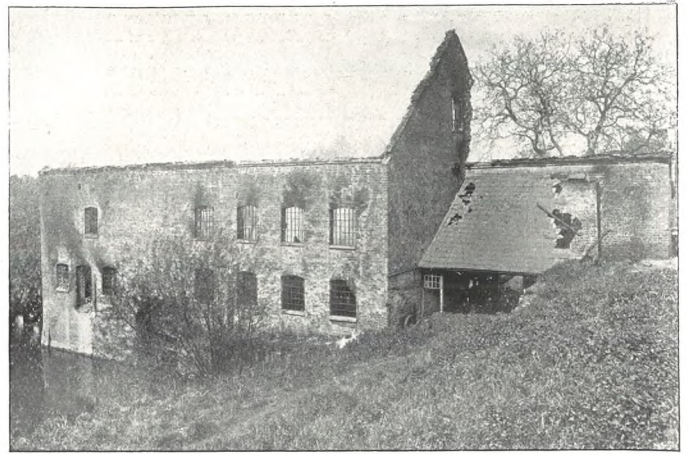

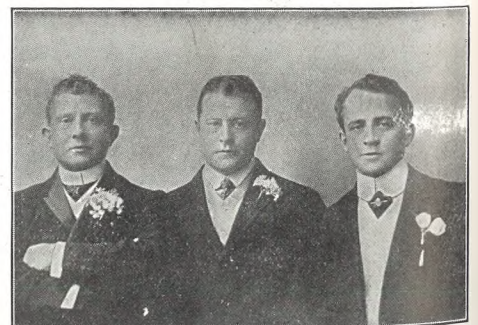

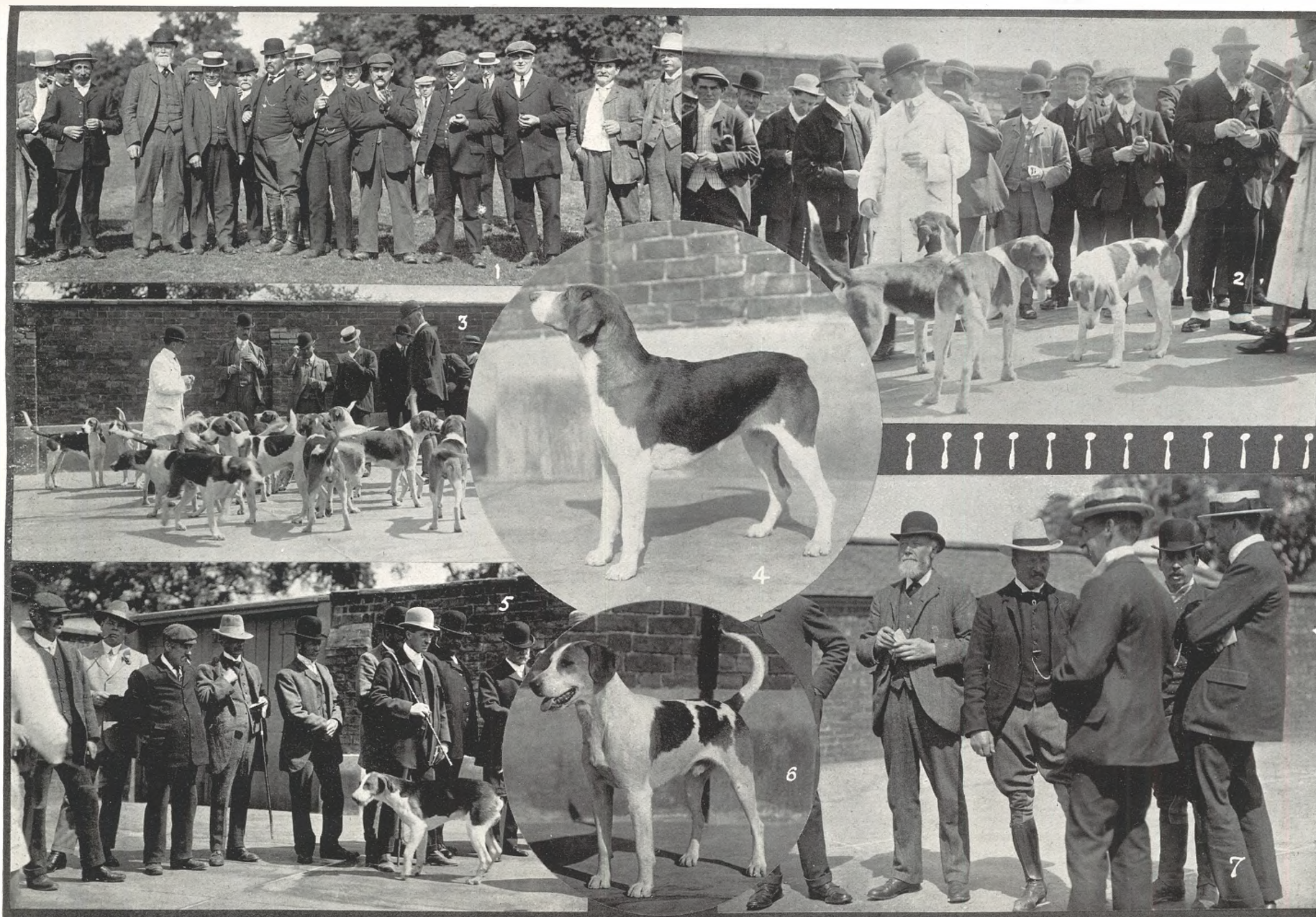

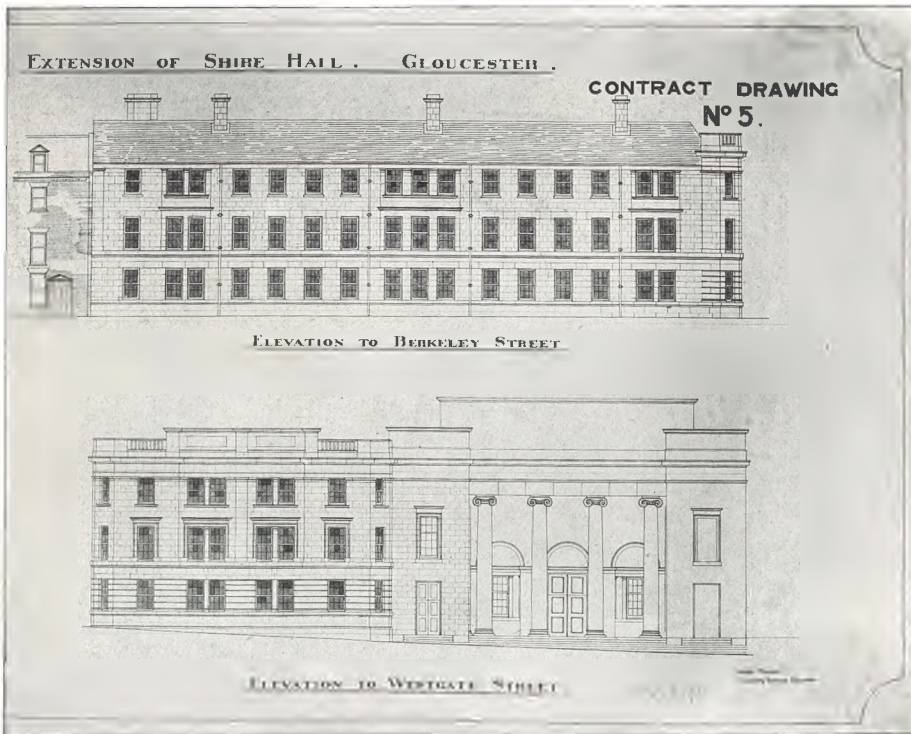

**GIGANTIC LINERS.**

The White Star Company are having two enormous liners constructed at Belfast by Harland and Wolff. The vessels, which will be the largest afloat, will journey between Southampton and New York. A feature of the design is that they will each have four funnels and only one mast. The total cost for the two will, it is estimated, be something like £4,000,000, and they will both be ready

for their maiden voyages early in 1912. The two gantrys, which had to be specially built at the shipyard, cost £2,000,000. The passenger accommodation will be for at least 2,500, and the crew will number nearly 1,000. The gross tonnage will be 45,000, as against the 32,500 of the Lusitania. The funnels of the boats will be so large that two double-decked tramway cars could easily pass through each.

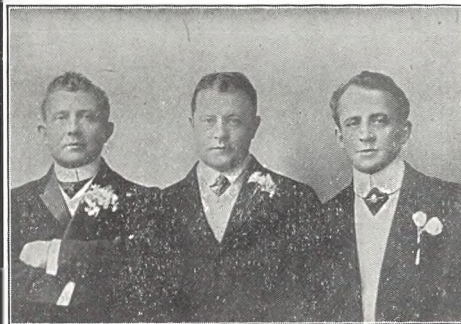

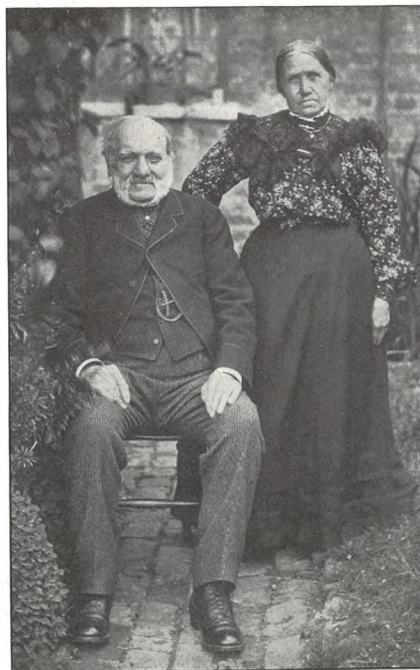
