

















THE PIANO'S RIVAL.

The dulcitone, the latest musical instrument, has the keyboard of a piano, but the key-hammers produce sound by striking steel forks instead of wire. A semi-circular steel spring carries the vibrations from each fork to the sounding board. The tone is softer than that of the piano, but it has great clearness and carrying power, and is adapted for solo-playing as well as for accompanying other instruments or the voice. Important advantages are the lack of necessity of tuning and the portability, for a dulcitone of five octaves weighs but 45 pounds.

Paper clothes are said to be one of the possibilities of the near future. It is a German invention, and has been successfully used to take the place of cloth in many directions. Composed of wood fibre, it is spun into a material which, although essentially paper, has a soft surface and is not readily crushed or dented. When bleached it is of a snowy whiteness, and at first glance is not to be distinguished from cotton. It forms are excellent rugs and cornets and as weeking are excellent rugs and carpets, and as wearing apparel has the advantage of being warmer than cloth, is more easily dyed, cheaper, and lighter.








