






On Saturday the employees of Mr. Ernest Crichton, music dealer, of Bristol, Clifton, and Cheltenham, held their annual outing, and on their return from the Lower Lode to Cheltenham were photographed outside Crichton's shop in the Promenade.

A few facts concerning the firm will be interesting to our readers. Mr. Ernest Crichton was formerly connected with Messre. J. and J. 








