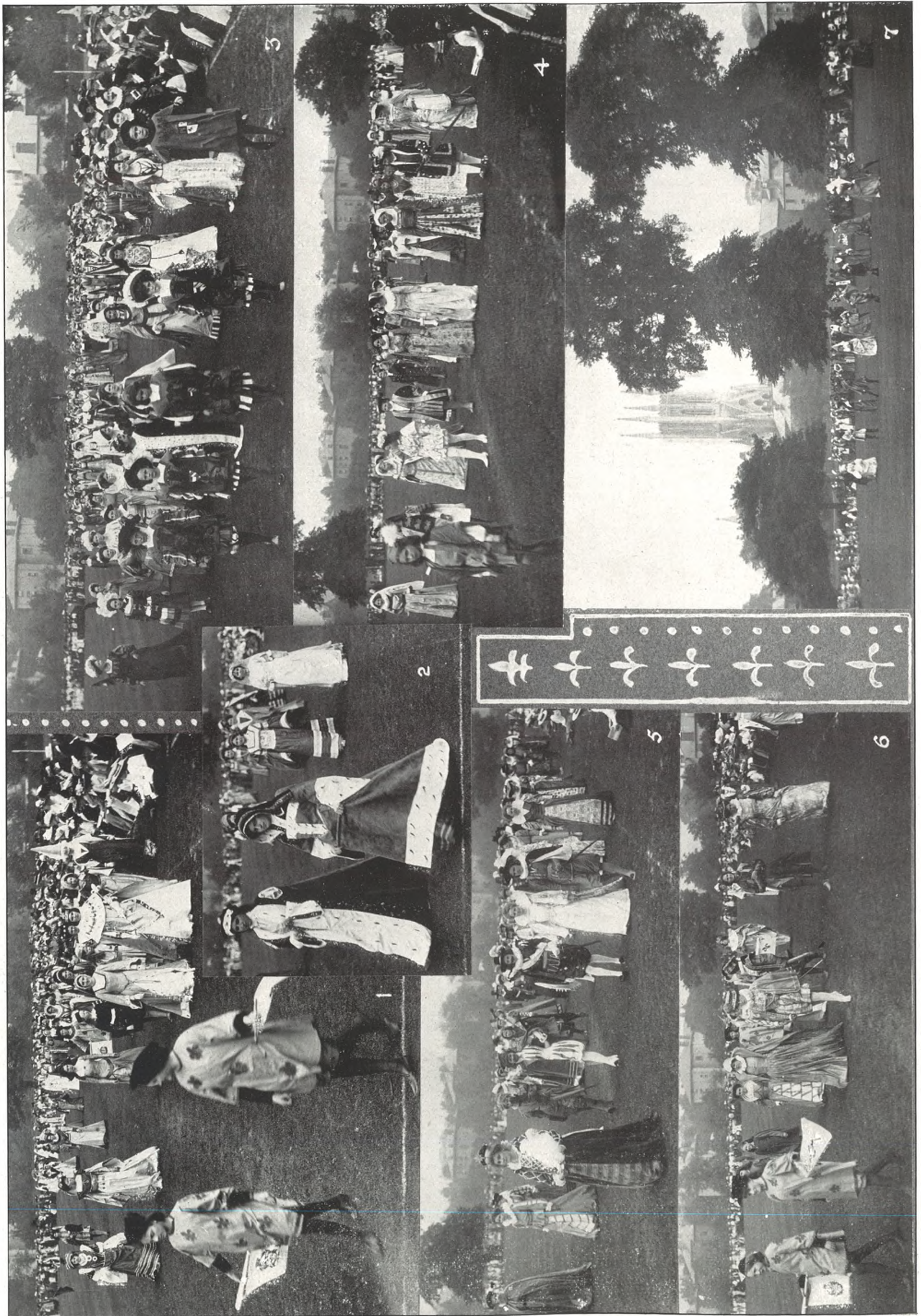

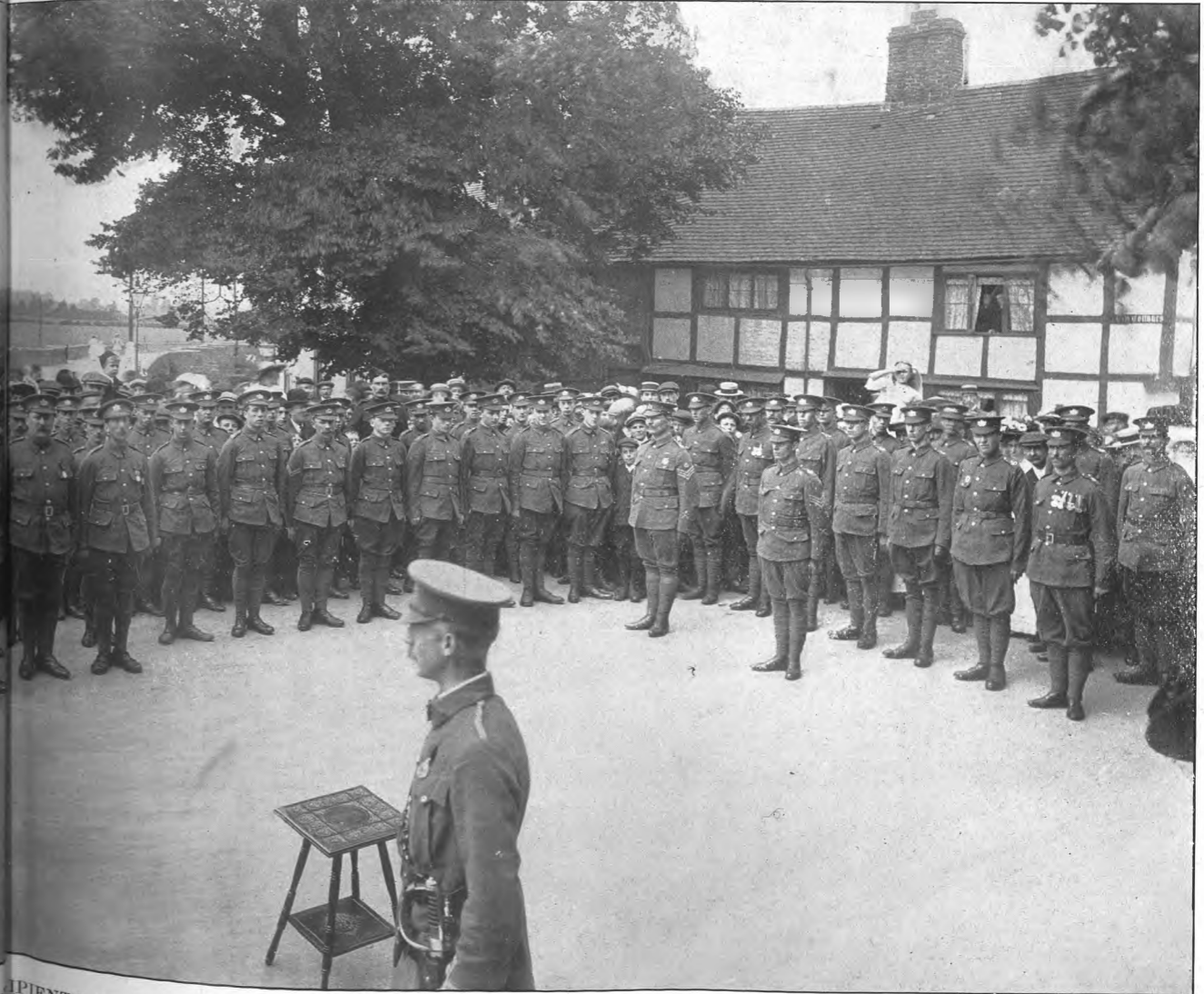
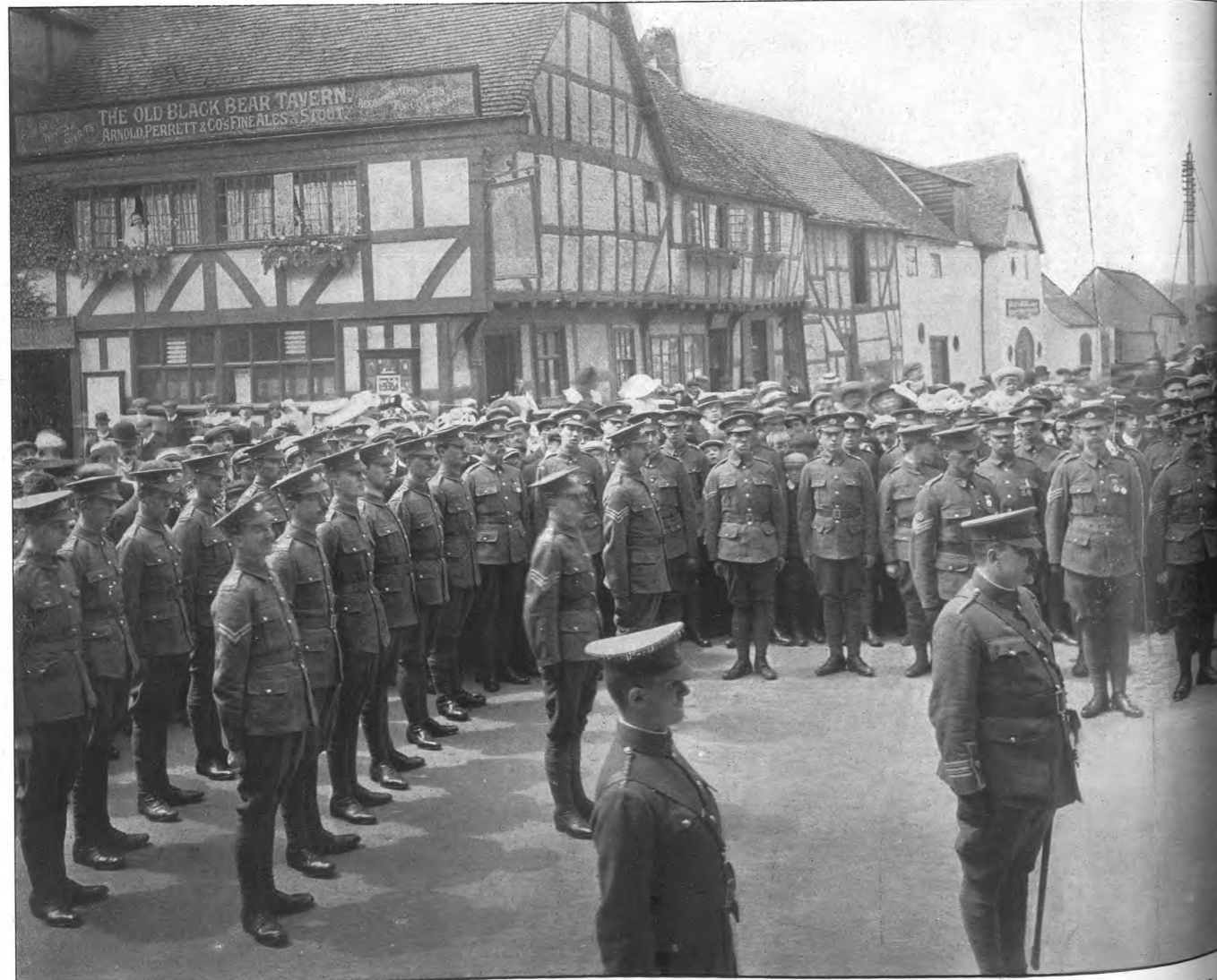

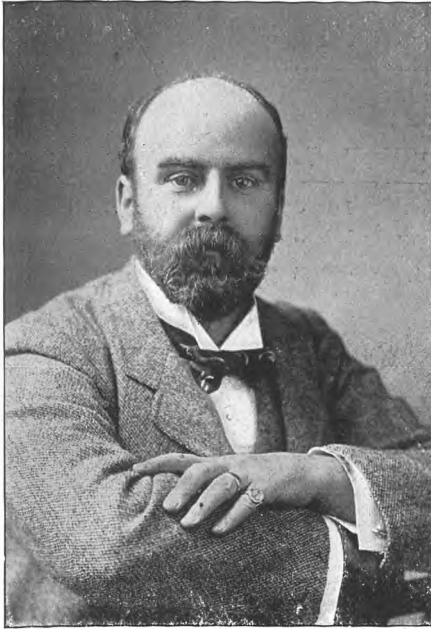

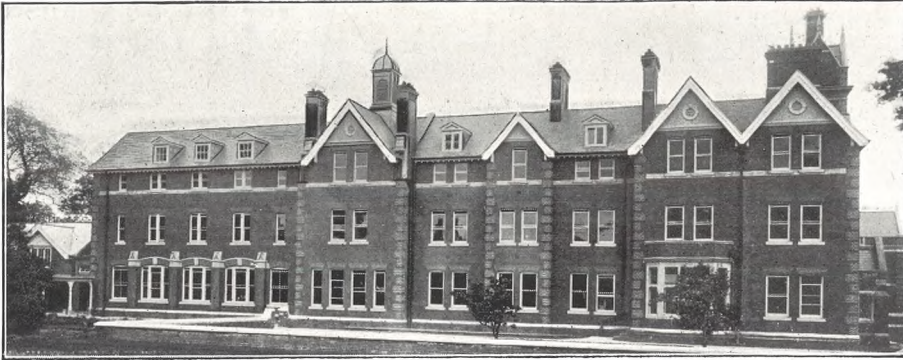

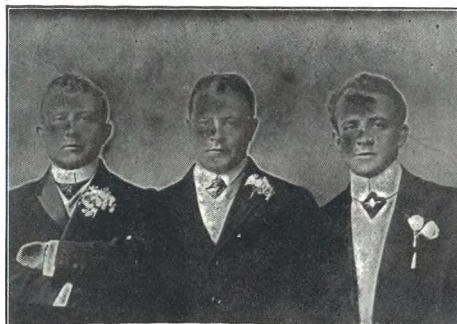

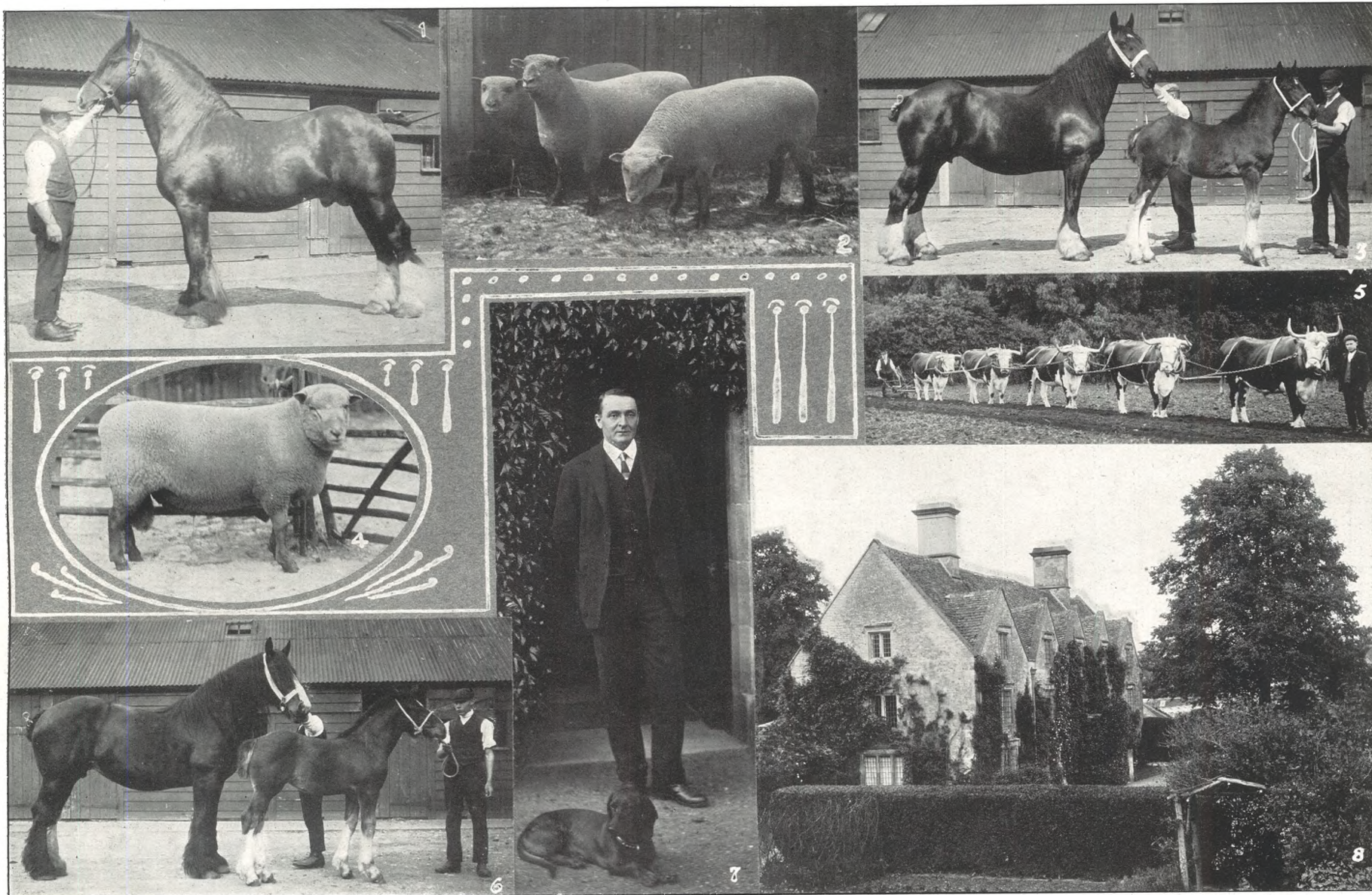

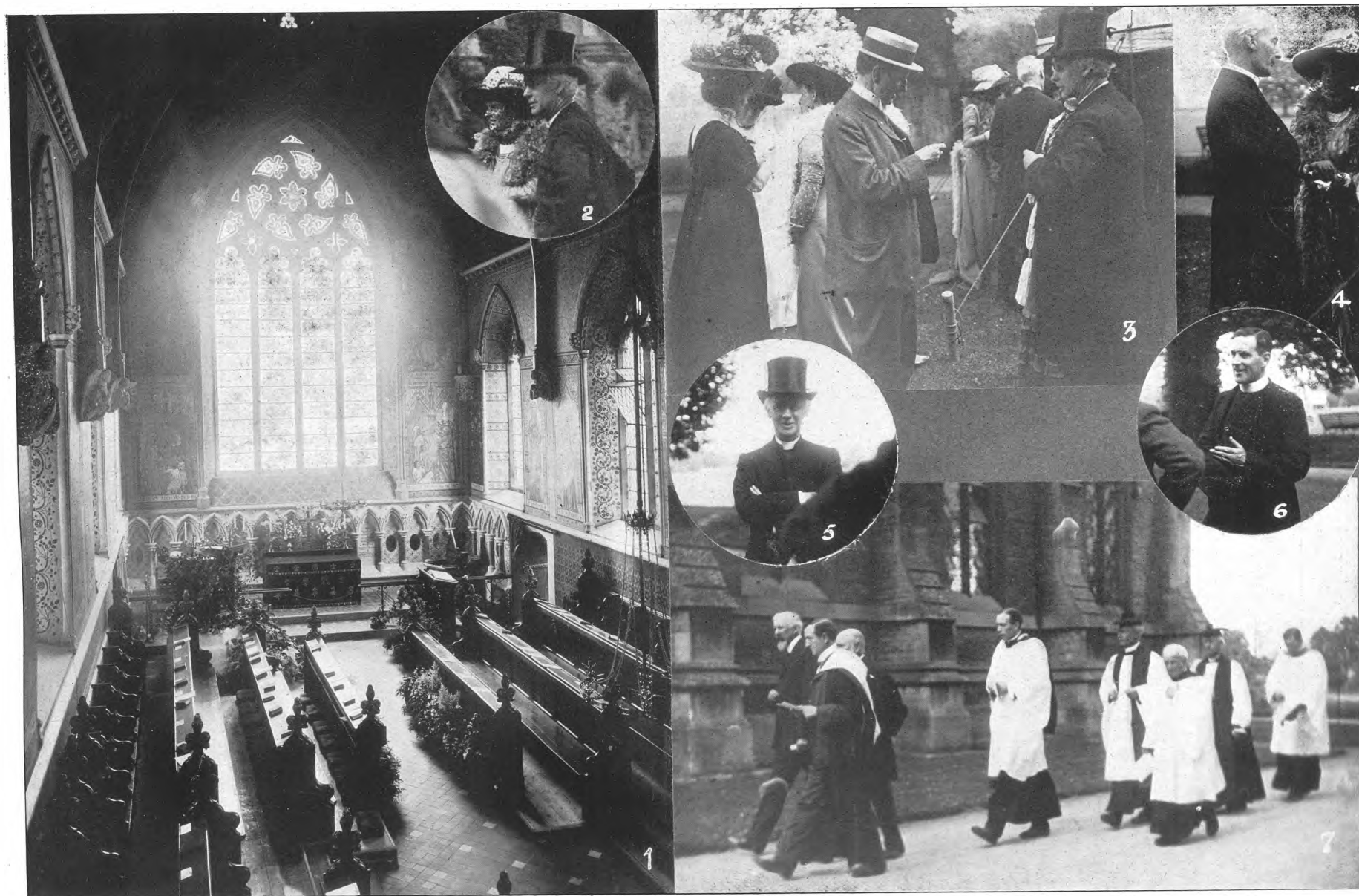

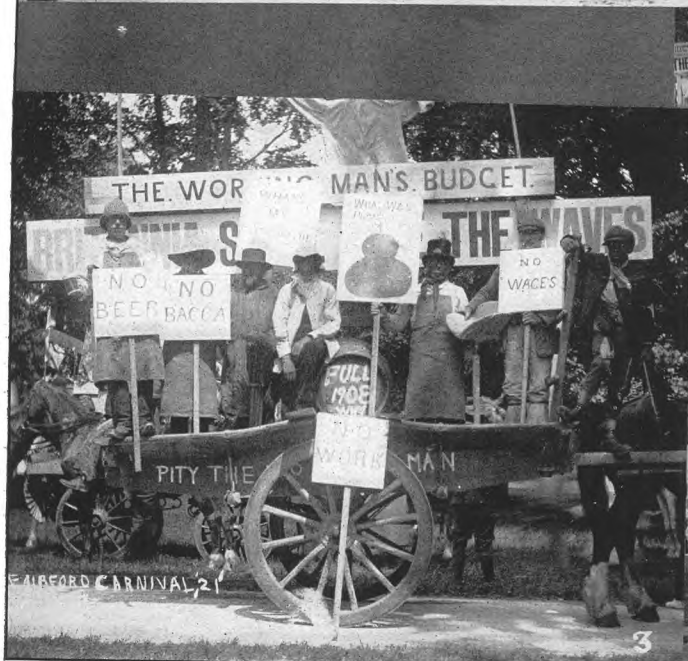

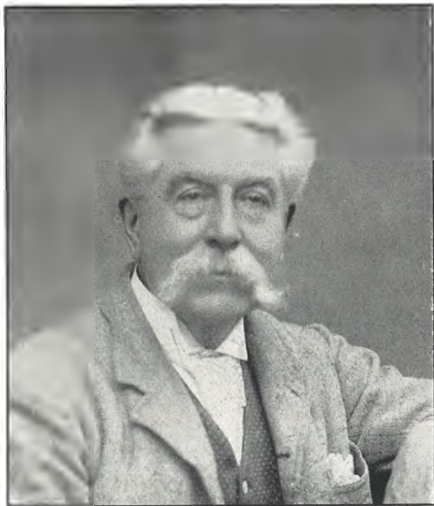




**MR. ERNEST CRICHTON'S STAFF OUTING, JULY 10, 1909.**

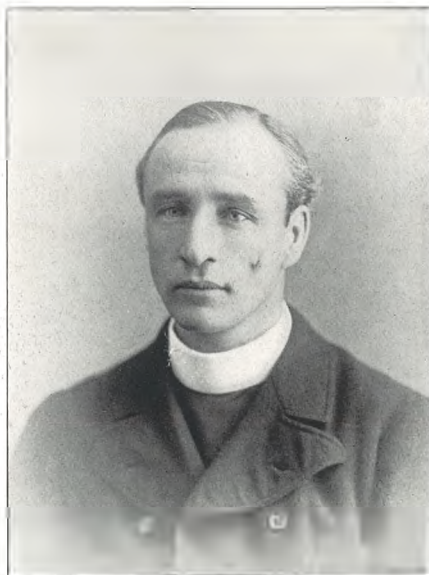
On Saturday the employees of Mr. Ernest Crichton, music dealer, of Bristol, Clifton, and Cheltenham, held their annual outing, and on their return from the Lower Lode to Cheltenham were photographed outside Crichton's shop in the Promenade.

A few facts concerning the firm will be interesting to our readers. Mr. Ernest Crichton was formerly connected with Messrs. J. and J. Hopkinson, the well-known pianoforte manufacturers, and settled in business at Clifton seventeen years ago. In 1898 he opened a City Depot at 22 Bridge-street, Bristol, and in March, 1904, opened the Cheltenham branch, which has made such rapid progress that extensive additions to the premises are contemplated. This is the local depot for Messrs. John Broadwood and Sons' celebrated pianos. The most recent addition has been a Central Establishment in Bristol at 76 Park-street, the most important shopping quarter of the city, a fine corner block containing fourteen handsome showrooms and offices, professors' studios, etc. A number of the staff have been with Mr. Crichton since the commencement—a fact which speaks well for both employees and employer. It is also interesting to note that the tuning connection extends over a large area of England (including London) and Wales, and has been mainly built up upon the fact that only the most competent tuners are engaged.



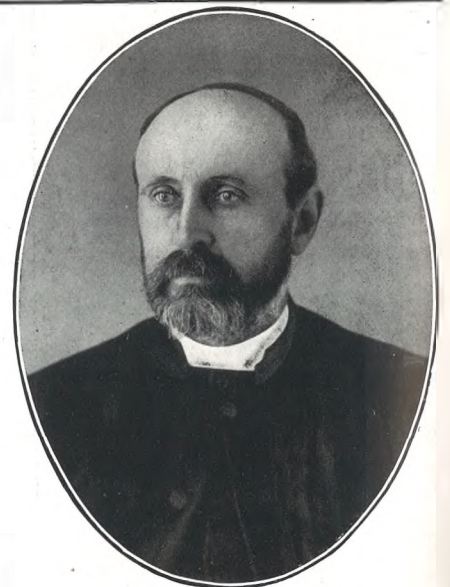

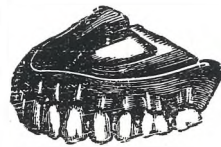

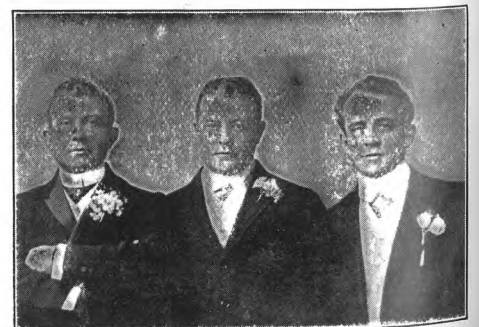

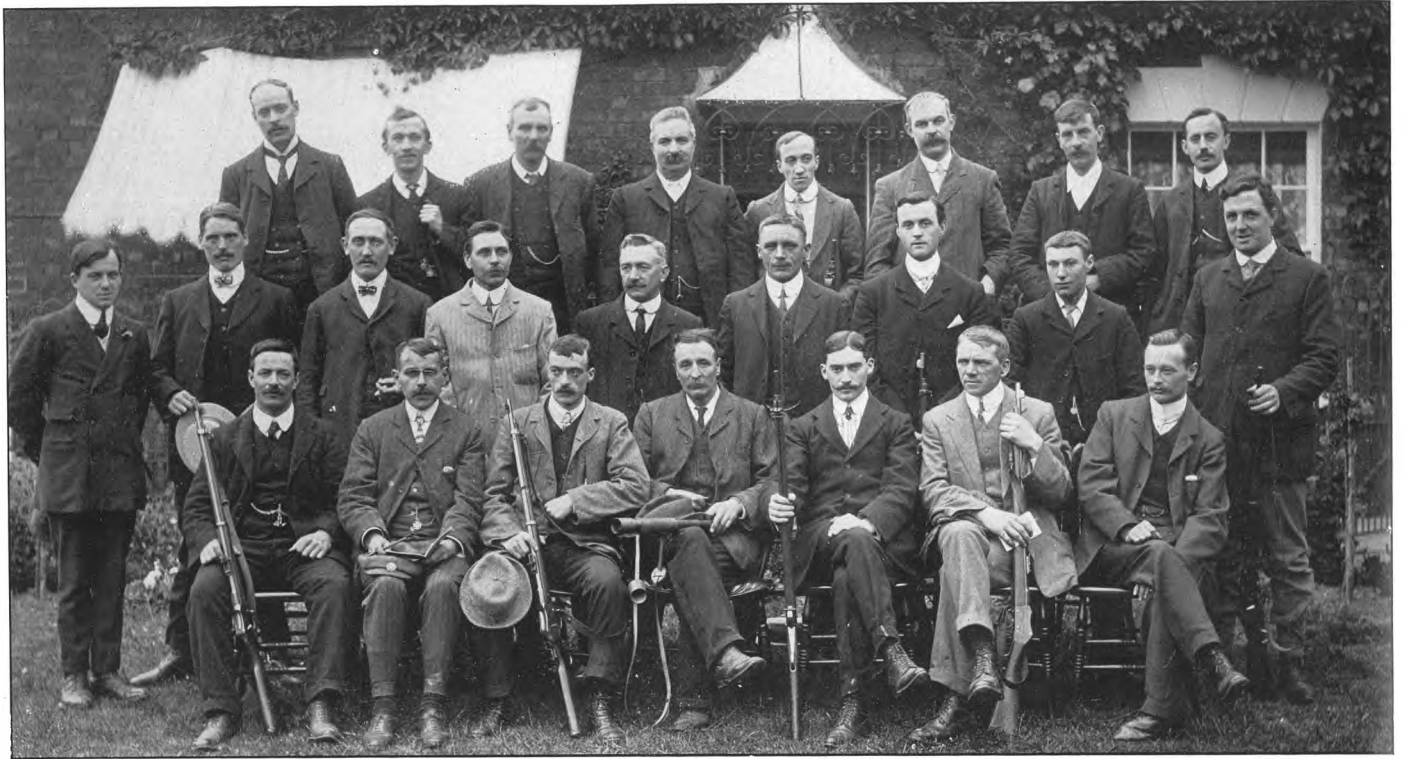

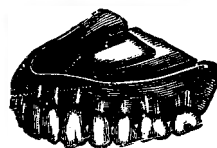

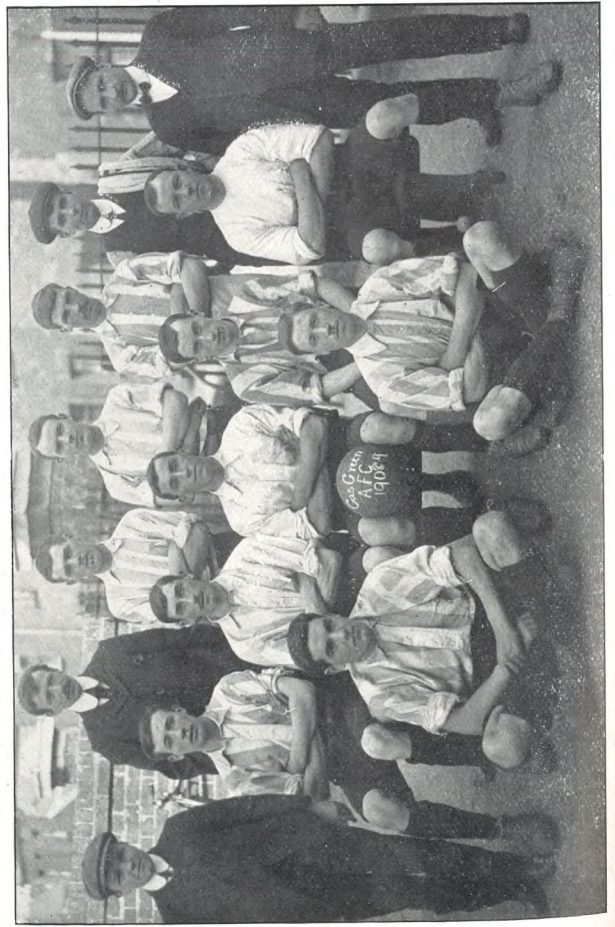
