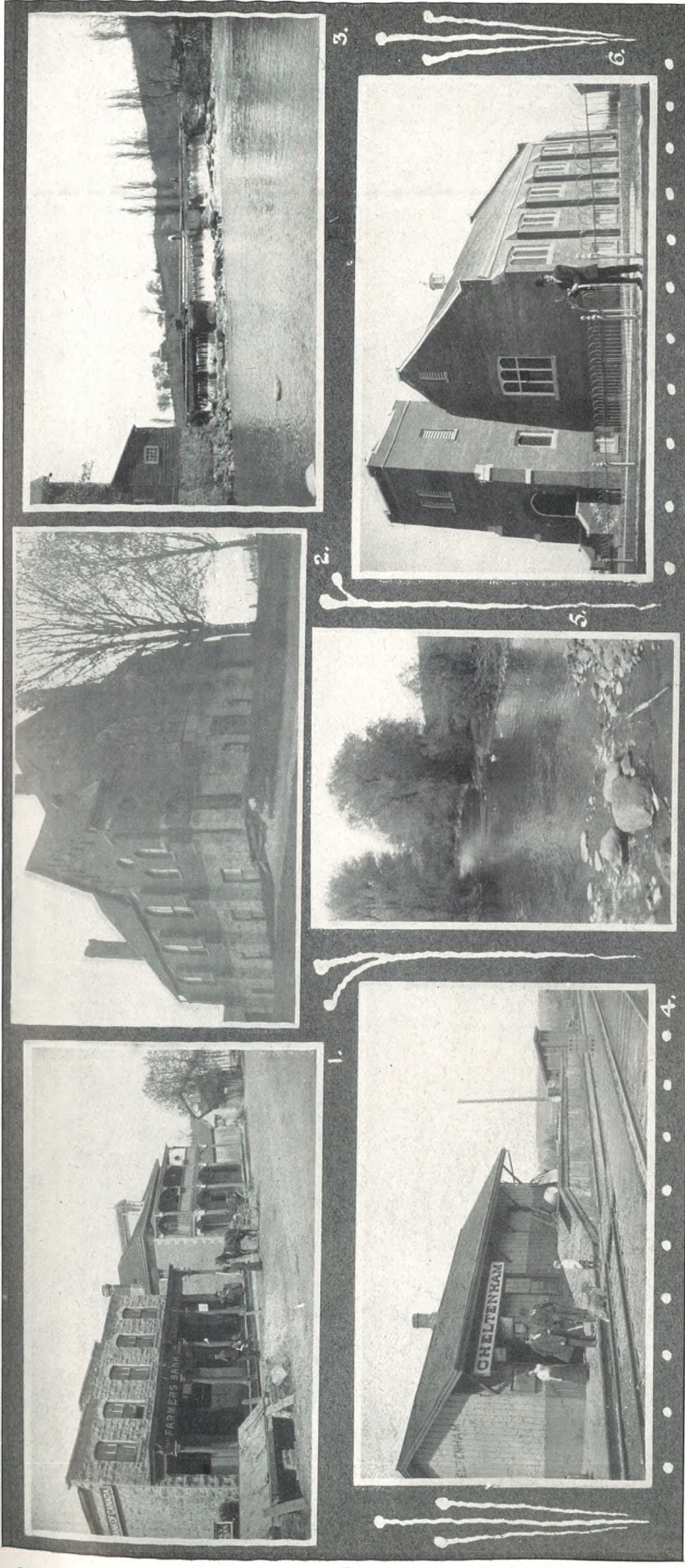

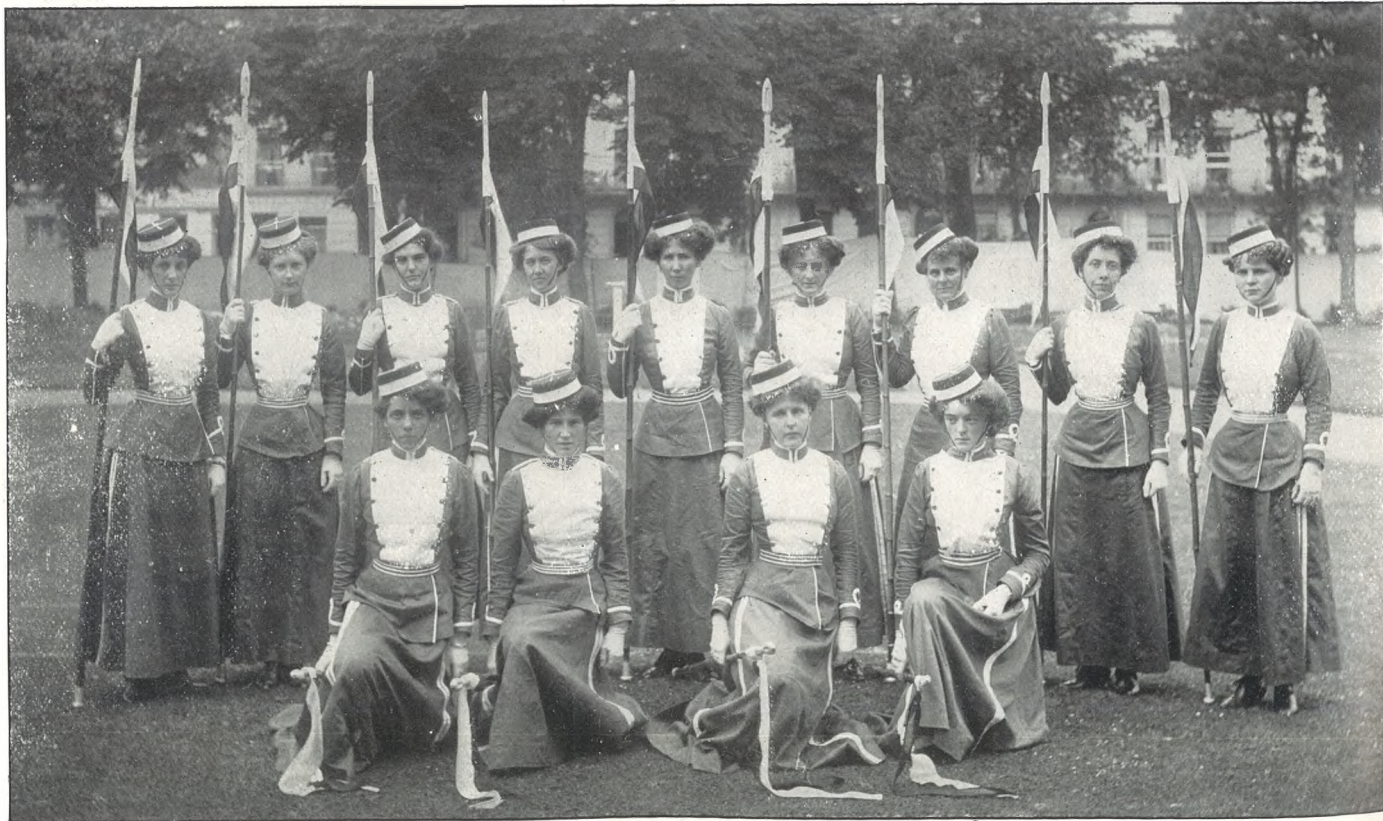

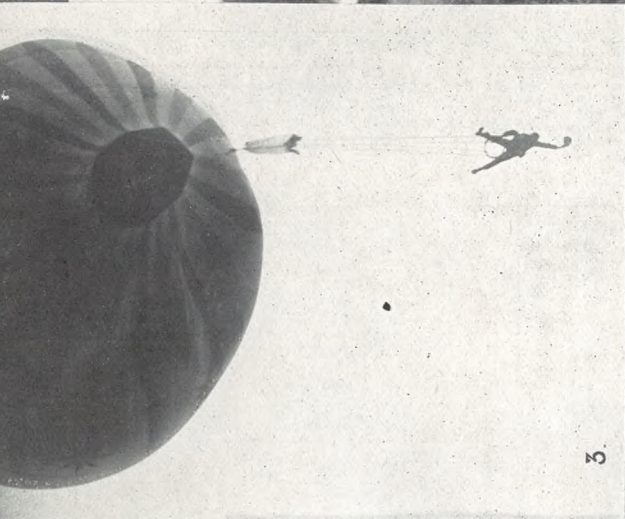
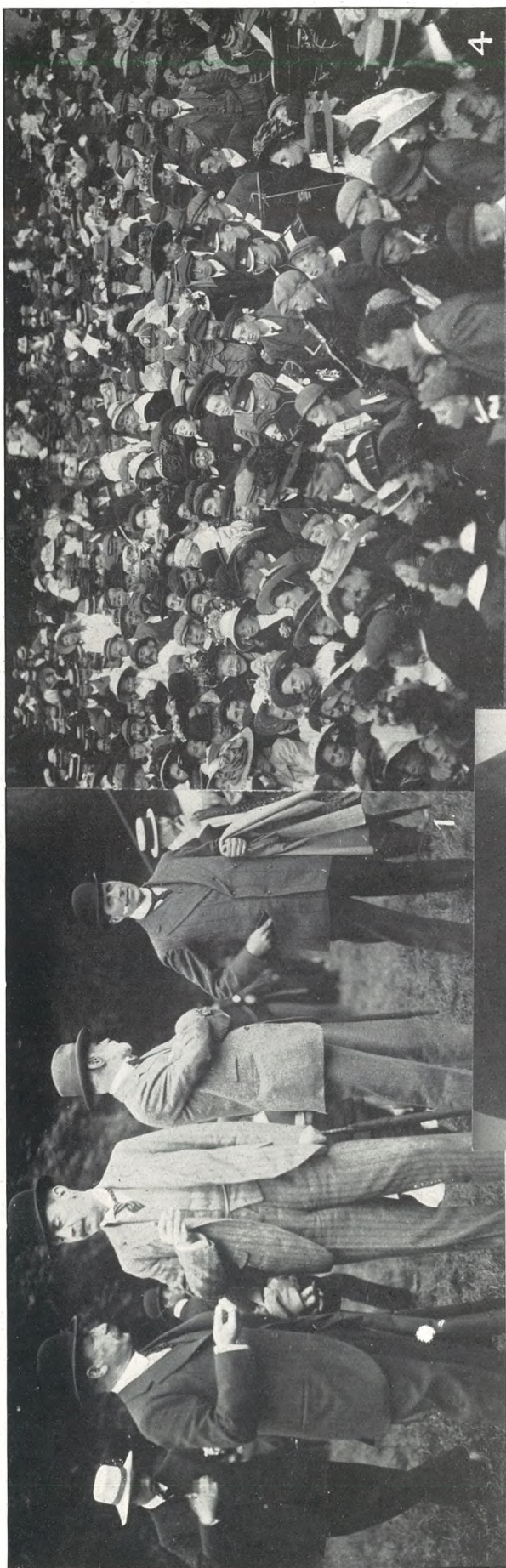

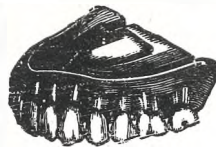

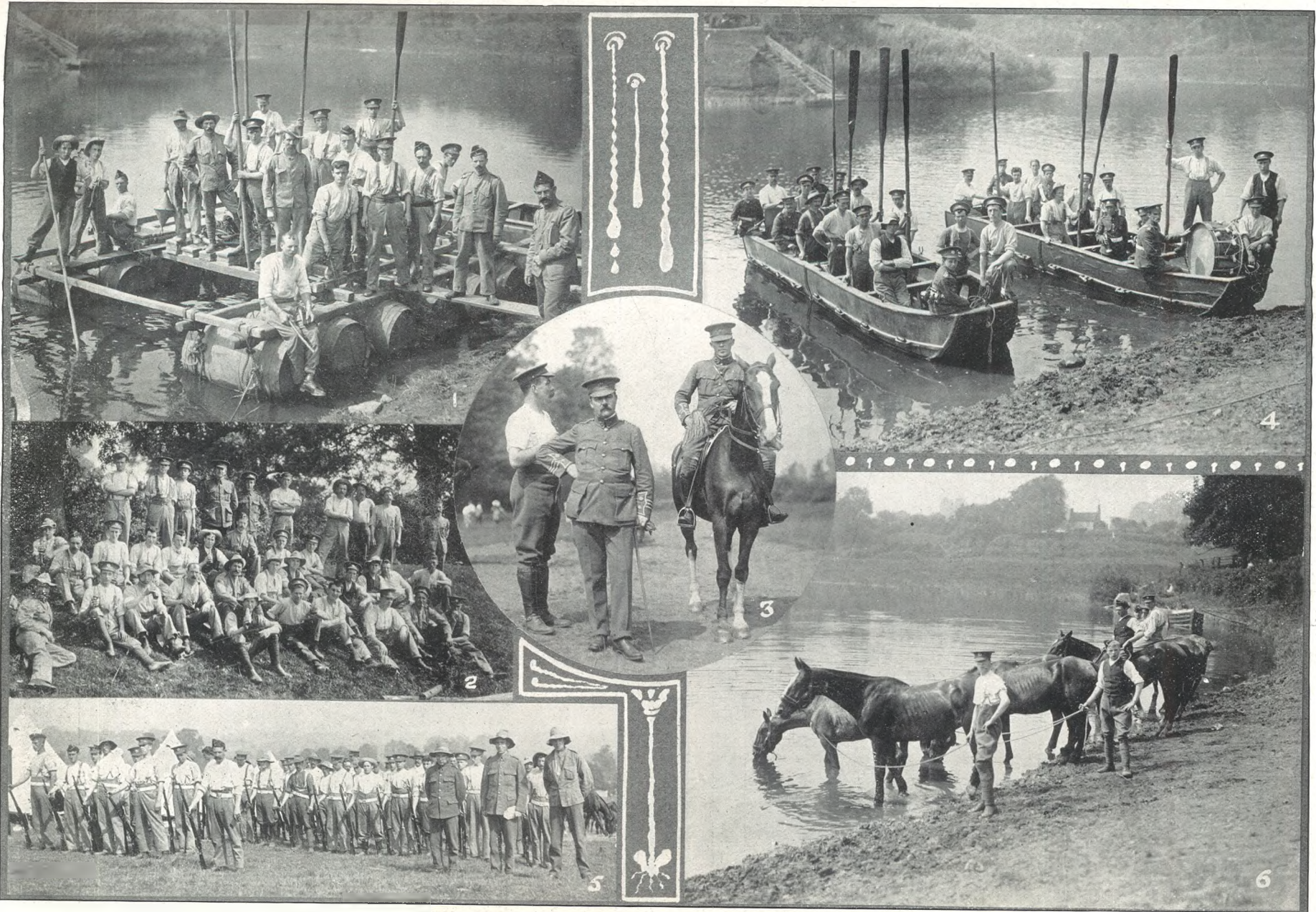

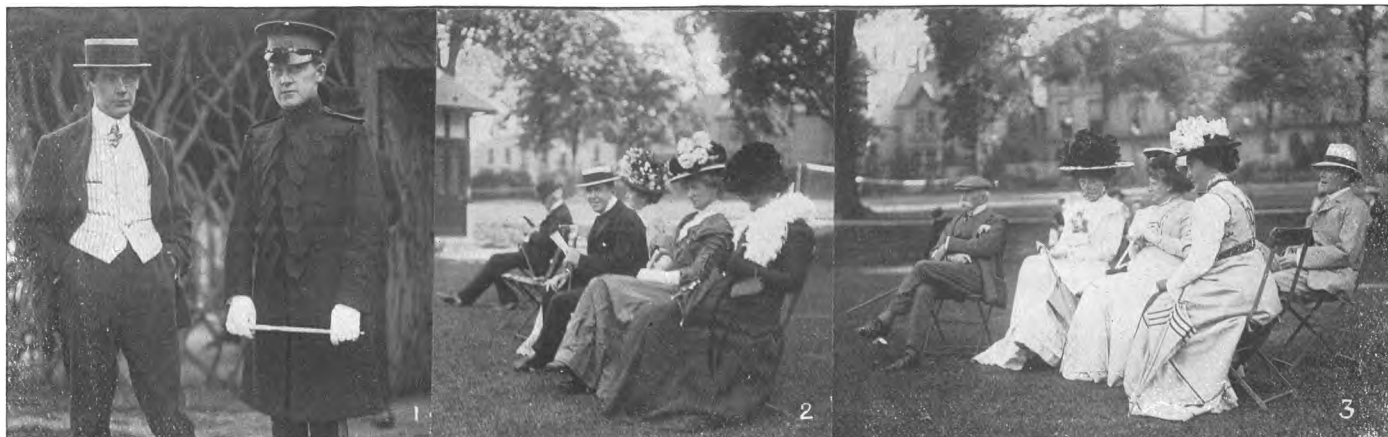

By the will of Mr. Martin Carey, of Newport, co. Mayo, £10,000 is left for the erection of a Roman Catholic Church in Newport.

General Booth, addressing a meeting at Wolverhampton on Sunday, said there was still enough waste humanity to form 100,000 more Salvation Armies.

Miss Mansfield, the poetess and novelist, has returned to London after an adventurous journey from the Cape to Cairo. She was accompanied by a band of natives and visited many places where no white person had previously set foot.

By order of the First Commissioner of his Majesty's Office of Works, the following descriptive notice has been affixed to the stem of the great vine at Hampton Court Palace for the information of visitors:—"Black Ham-burgh vine. Planted 1768. Girth of stem on ground level, 5ft. Girth of stem 1ft. above ditto, 4ft. 7in." The vine is bearing over 200 bunches of exceptional size, and a number of them have been cut and sent to Windsor Castle for the use of the Royal Family.

At a meeting of the Isle of Wight Conservative Association, held at Newport on Saturday, Mr. Douglas Hall, of Burton Park, Petworth, Sussex, who at the last General Election was Unionist candidate for Penryn and Falmouth, was adopted as prospective Conservative and Tariff Reform candidate for the Isle of Wight at the next election.

The Rev. E. L. A. Hertslet, son of Sir Cecil Hertslet, Consul-General for Great Britain in Belgium, has been appointed resident chaplain to the Archbishop of Canterbury. Mr. Hertslet has been for nearly five years curate at St. Mary Redcliffe, Bristol, a parish which has the unique record of numbering six living Bishops among its former clergy.

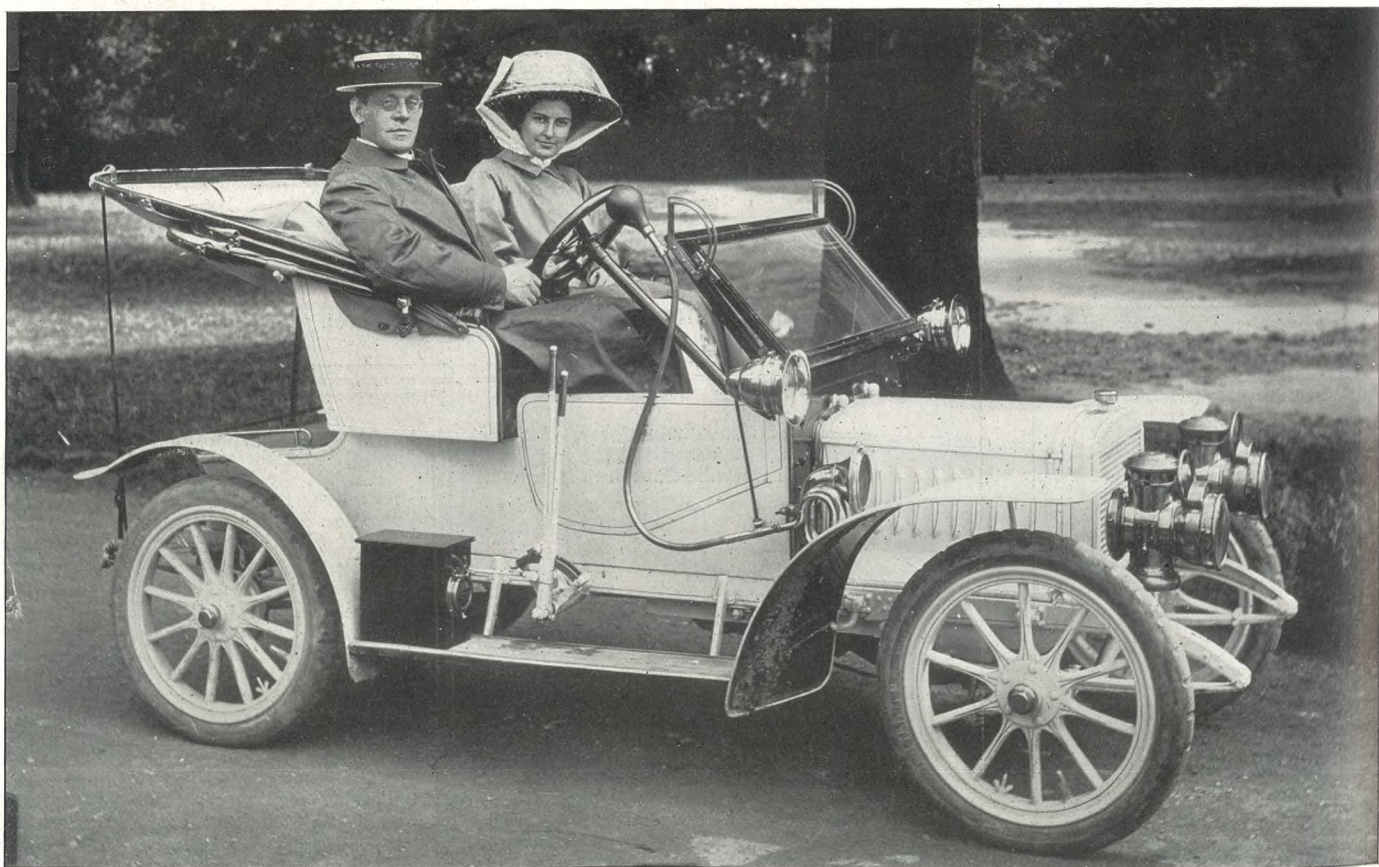

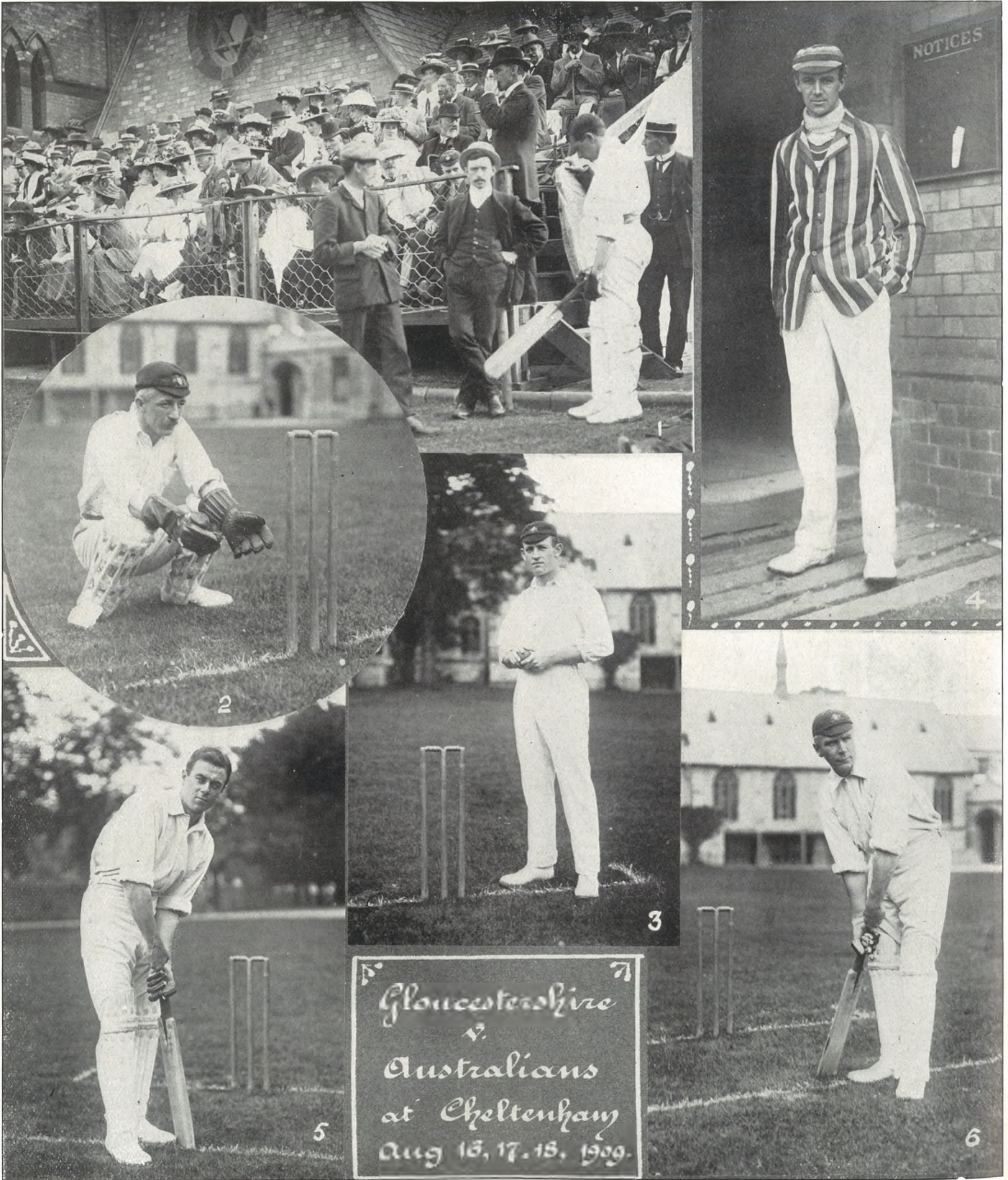

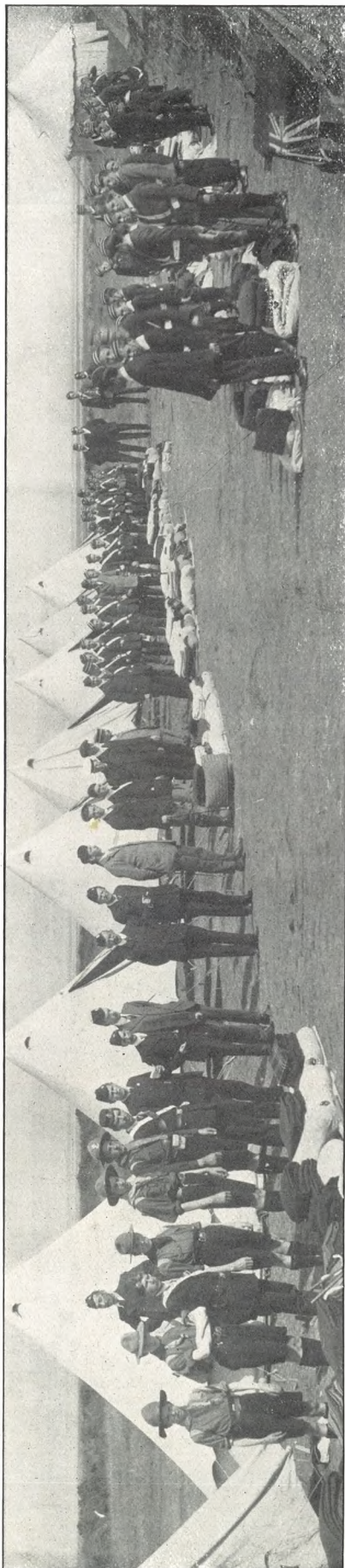

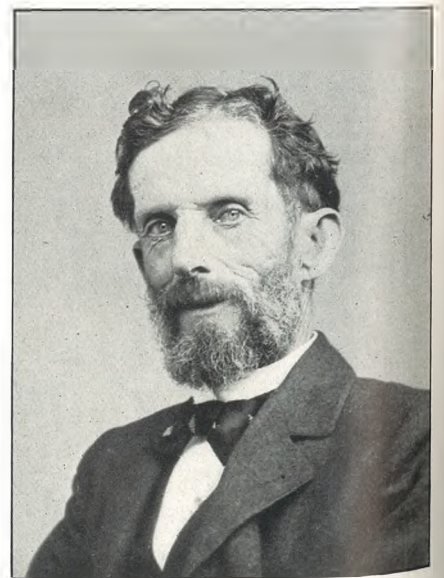

WIRELESS STATION ON MONT BLANC.

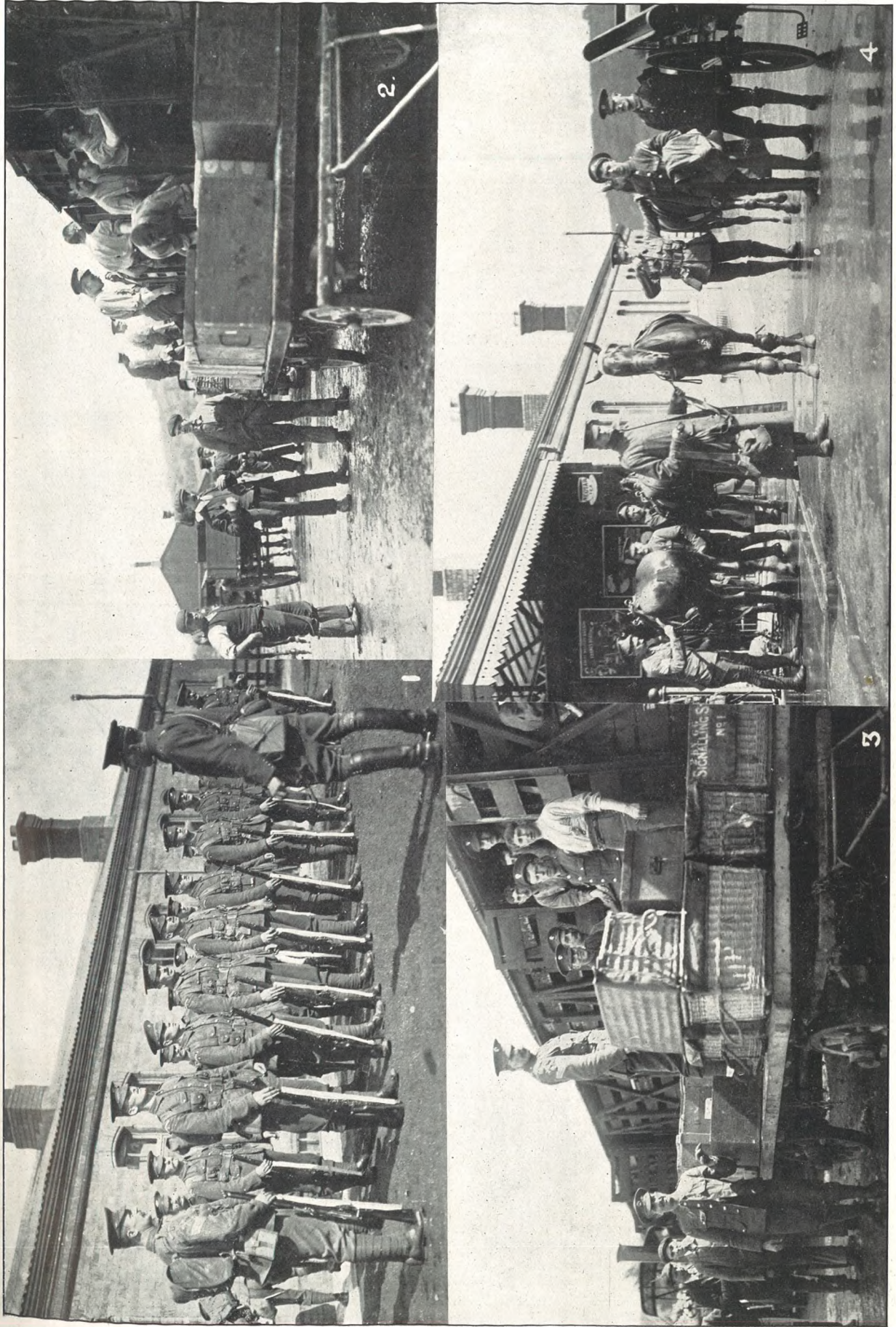

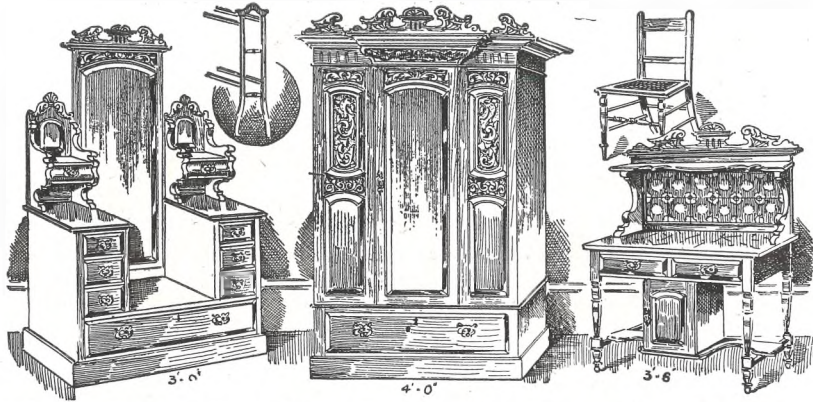

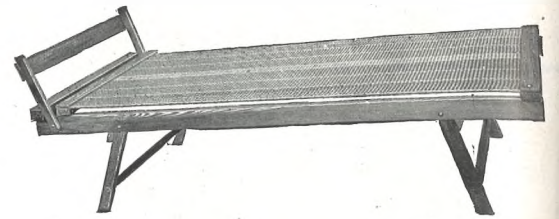

STATISTICS OF FRIENDLY SOCIETIES.

The reports of the Chief Registrar of Friendly Societies for the year 1908 on Friendly Societies, workmen's compensation schemes, industrial and provident societies, and trade unions, return 184 societies with a membership of 165,254 as having surplus. The estimated present value of the benefits paid by these societies is £1,785,992, other liabilities represents £253,478, and the surplus is £208,689. Contributions are estimated to have a present value of £1,131,803, in addition to which there are funds totalling £1,108,679, and other assets returned at £7,677.

Societies with deficiencies number 366, and have a membership of 326,705. The estimated value of their benefits at present is £6,254,832, and other liabilities £241,928, whilst the contribution are returned at £4,175,721, funds £1,157,354, other assets £43,309, and the deficiency £1,120,376.
