FAIRFORD SCHOOL GARDENING CLASS.



The three potatoes on the front of the stand average 1lb 7ozs. each, and were lifted, together with seven others, from one root, the total weight being 7lbs. 1oz. This result was obtained from a seed potato weighing 2ozs., and a small matchbox full of a manure made up of Superphosphate, Sulphate of ammonia and Kainit. The manure was placed in a trench with a slight covering of soil, and then the seed potato (Factor). The above root was possibly the best, but quite a good proportion of the other roots were only a little less in respective weights.

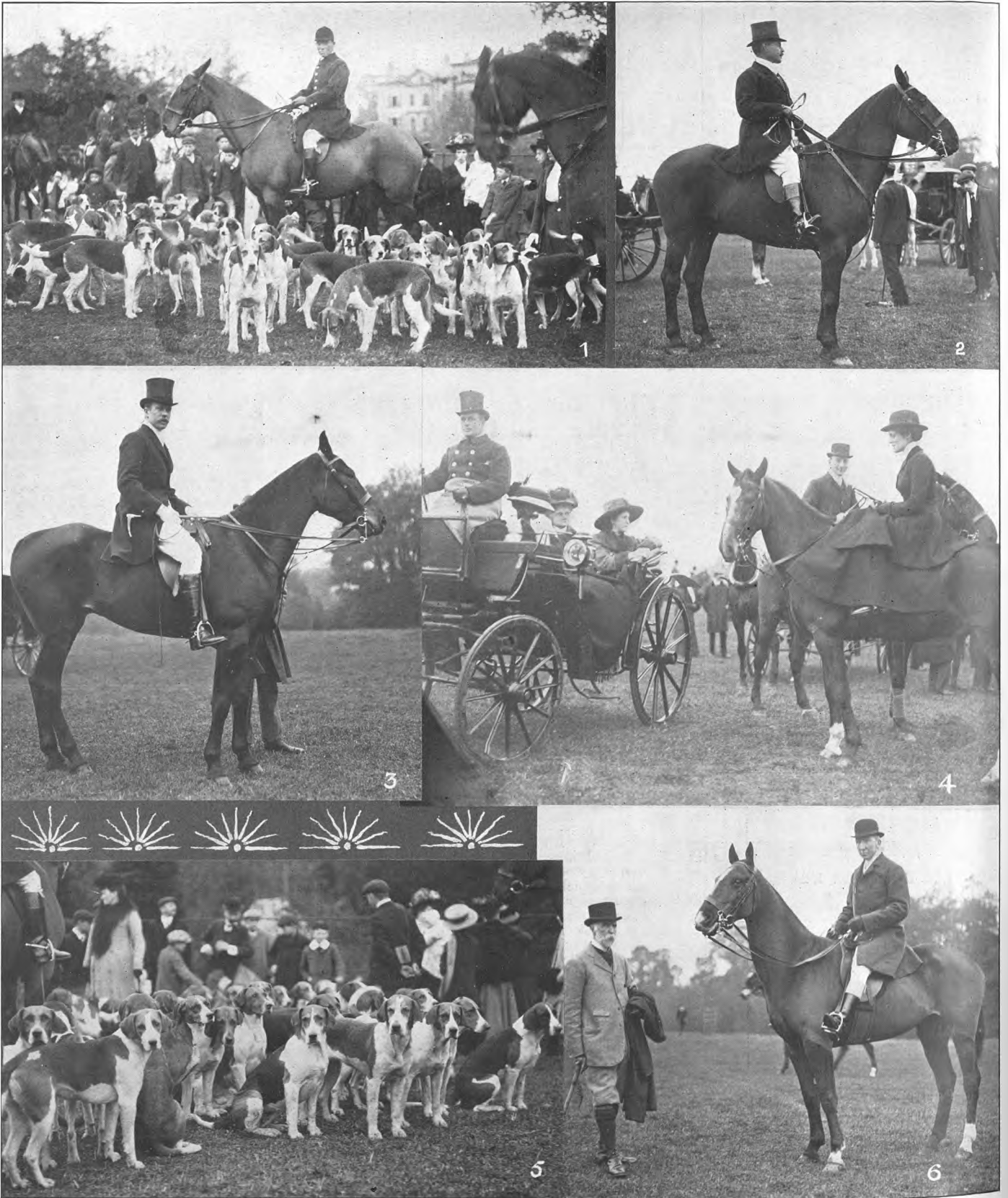

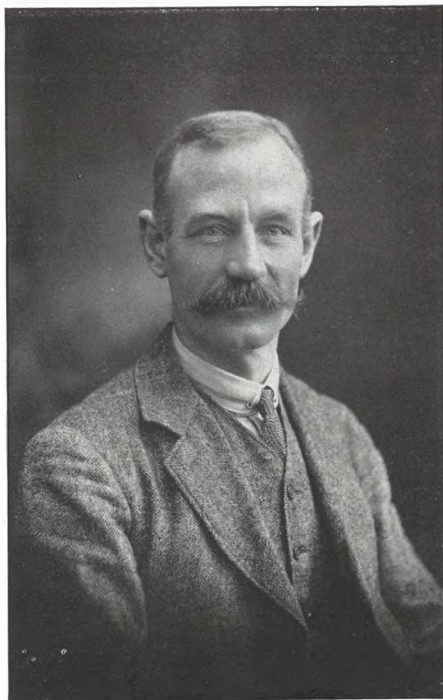

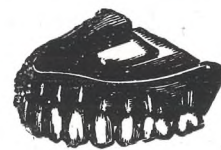

THE OLDEST HUMAN IMAGE.

The Berlin "Vossische Zeitung" says: "In the course of excavations, conducted by the Museum of Silesian Antiquities at Ottitz, near Ratibor, a clay figure, representing a nude female divinity, was unearthed in a stone-age dwelling. The figure is over 4,000 years old, and is the most ancient representation of the human form in existence."

The Rome "Corriere d'Italia" states that a Graffito inscription has been discovered in the catacombs of Sabastiano here dating back to the third century, consisting of the words "Demus Petri." The discovery is regarded as of immense interest to Christian archaeology.

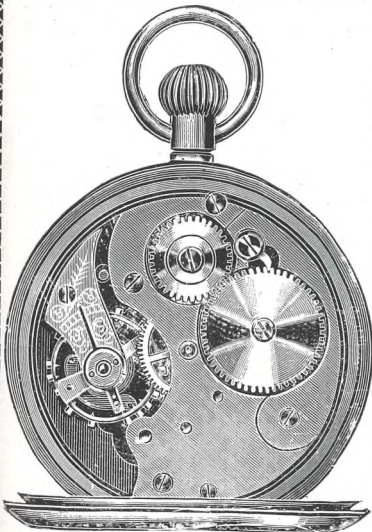

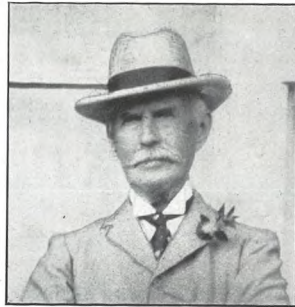

IMPORTS AND EXPORTS.

ANOTHER INCREASE.

The imports for October amounted to £52,651,756 in value, against £50,746,279, being an increase of £1,905,477. The exports were £23,930,778, compared with £23,007,586, an increase of £923,192.

Under the heading of "Articles wholly or mainly manufactured" the principal increases in exports in October were: Iron and steel and manufactures thereof £294,172, cotton £85,653, wool £508,676, and apparel £119,393. The chief decreases were: Machinery £383,281 and ships (new) £951,645.

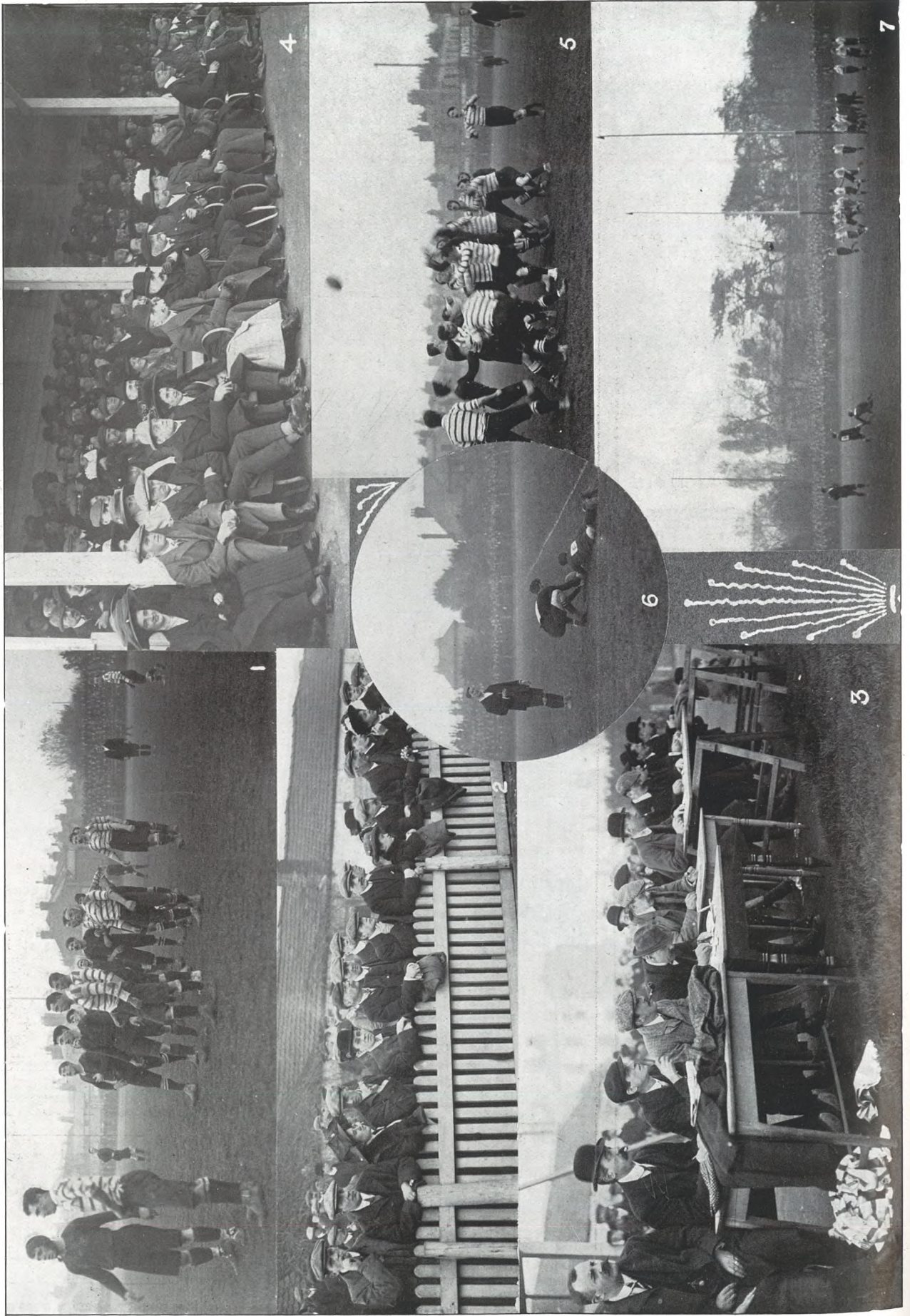

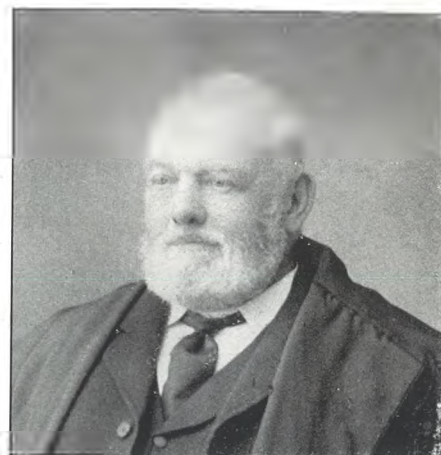

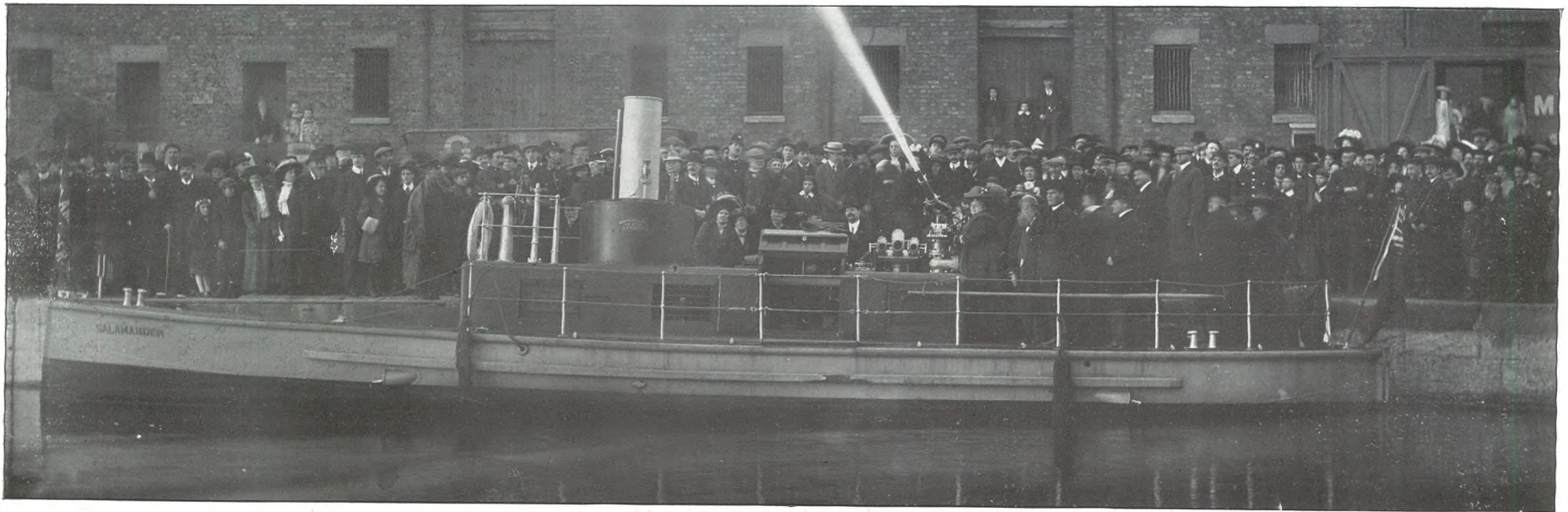

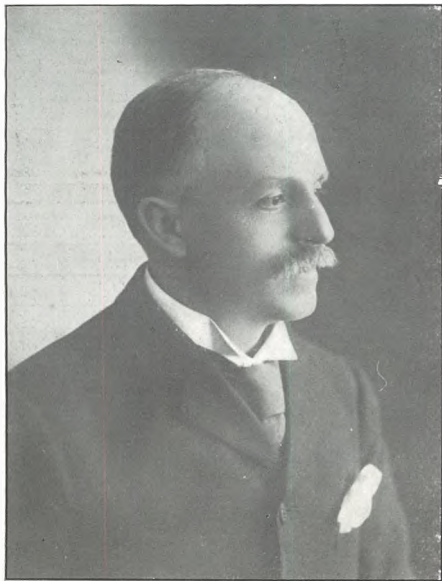

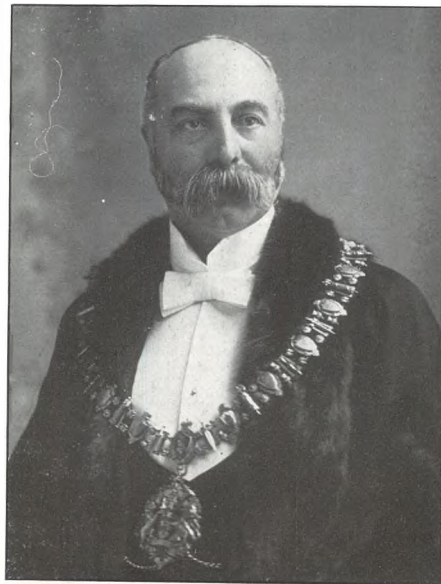

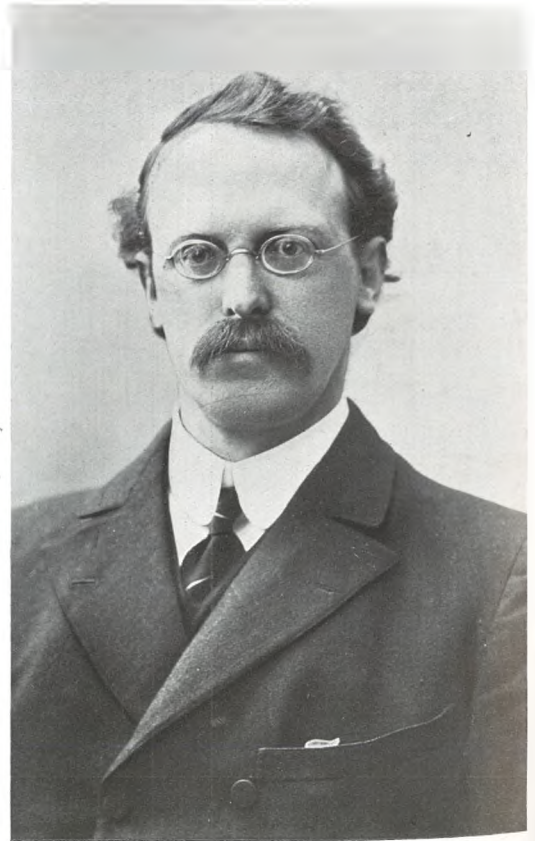

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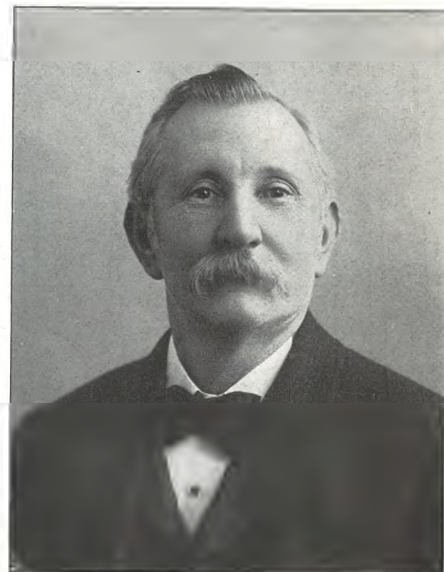

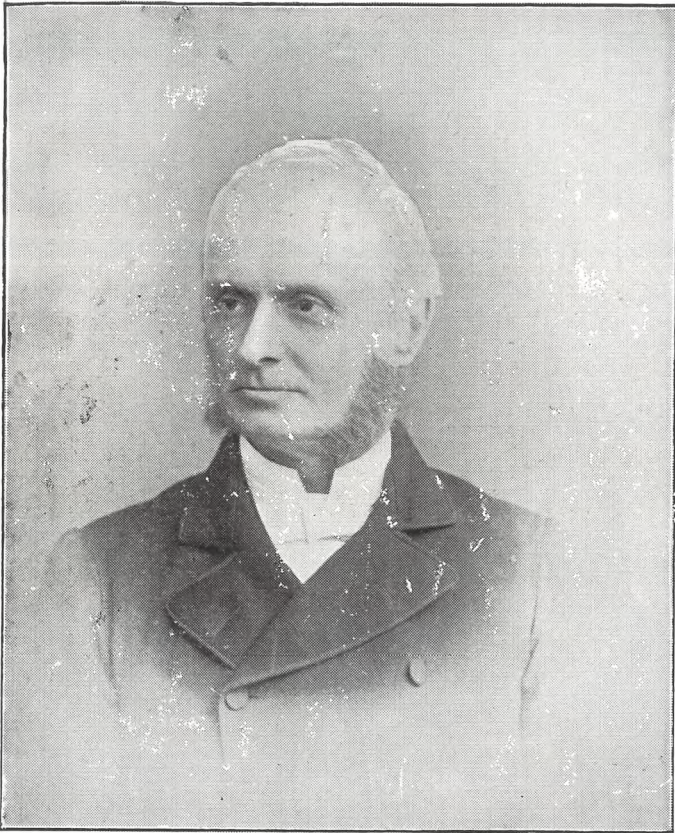

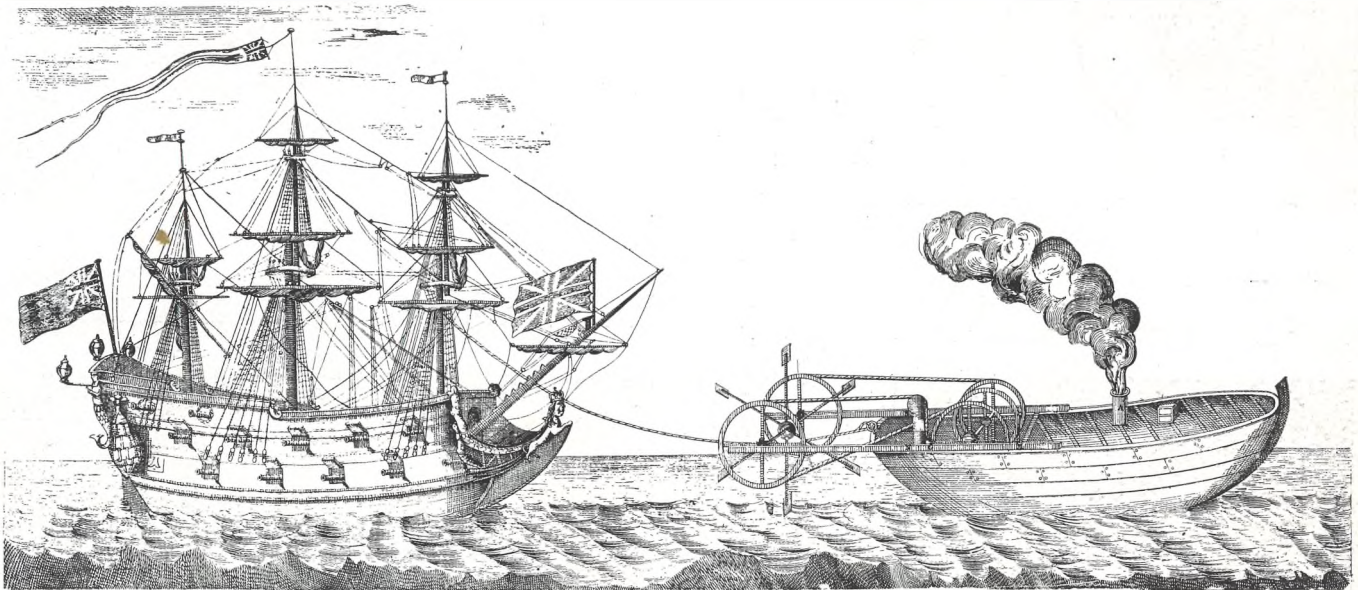


DIAGRAM OF HULLS'S STEAMBOAT (FROM A RARE PAMPHLET PUBLISHED BY HIM, 1737).

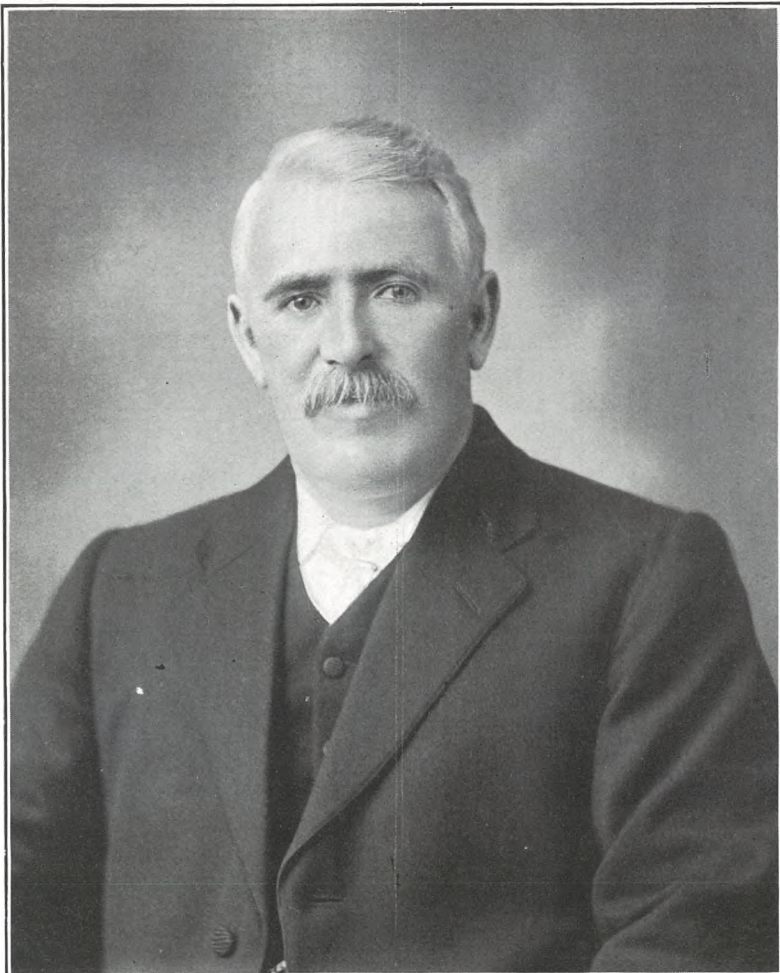

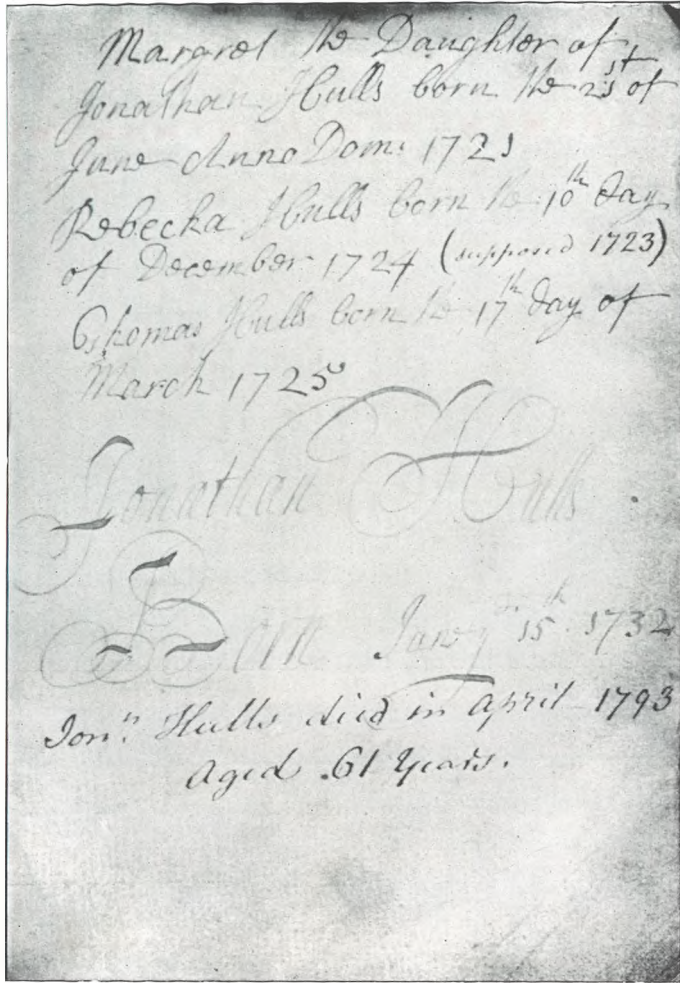

ST. PAUL'S PRACTISING SCHOOL AND SCHOOLHOUSE, CHELTENHAM.

TRAINING COLLEGE PRACTISING SCHOOL.

Since the year of its institution, 1847, the Practising School may lay claim to a fair proportion of those Cheltenham men who have risen to uphold the pre-stige of our fair Garden Town.

In its earlier days the school consisted of two essentially different departments, the one being known as the Commercial School (where book-keeping and shorthand and such subjects incidental to a commercial training were taught) and the other the Practising School. As the name would imply, the latter department was the one in which the students of the Training College did their practice in teaching. With the extension of the College came the need for increased accommodation for the students, and so the Commercial School and the Practising School were absorbed into the one school which was the beginning of the present one. Many of our readers might be interested to know that the present headmaster's house was then used as a dormitory by the College students.

Of the men whose endeavours have raised the school to its present state, a few words only will suffice. Between the years 1864-1876 Mr. E. G. Ensor, M.A., was headmaster, and relinquished his post to assume that of H.M.I., which office he now holds. During the next two years Mr. W. G. Baker, M.A., was headmaster, and he was succeeded by Mr. C. H. King, M.A., who filled the office during the ten years 1878-1888. The fact that the College has been able to retain the genial personality of Mr. King as Method master is one of the happiest reflections entertained of their College days by all Chelms—old and young. From January 1st, 1889, Mr. John McFee, M.A., has been headmaster, and in

the long period of twenty-one years his lofty ideals in matters educational, his infectious enthusiasm, and his strong aversion to any methods smacking of ostentation or advertisement, have combined not only to increase the number of scholars from 200 to 370, but to win among the townspeople a deserved reputation for soundness and efficiency.

Since the year 1896 the school buildings have comprised six large class-rooms, excellently well equipped in the matter of apparatus and museum, and a well-appointed handicraft centre for the exercise of the various subjects in the manual-training curriculum. The playground is a commodious one, and being well ordered as to its asphalt surface, its slope, and its drainage, is fit at all seasons of the year for use by the boys. The sanitation of the school leaves nothing to be desired, and it is probable that there are no better arrangements in this matter in any school in the country.

In regard to the staff, the school is very strong, its members being carefully selected by the authorities from among the best men who have passed through the Training College—men first-class trained, of high qualifications, and chosen for their work on account of their skill in teaching, their interest taken in children and in the various educational aspects of the subjects taught.
