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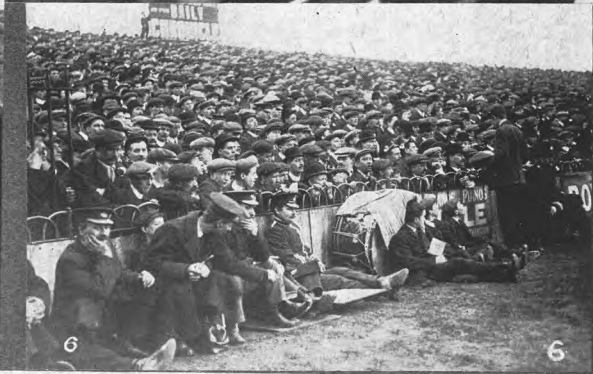
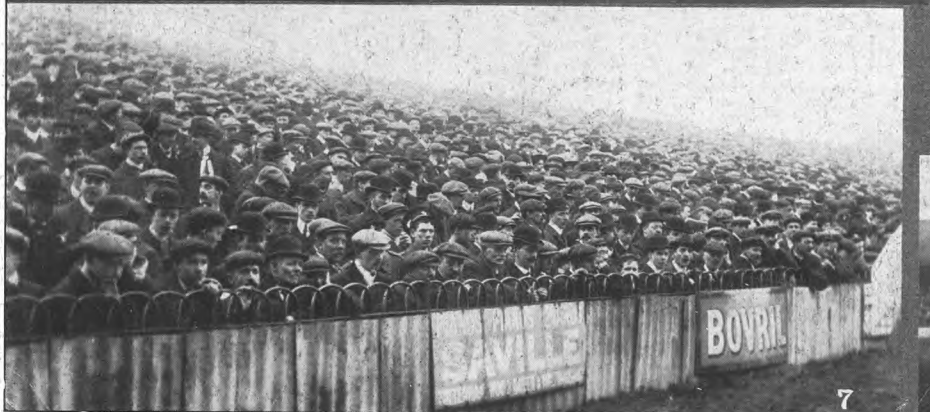

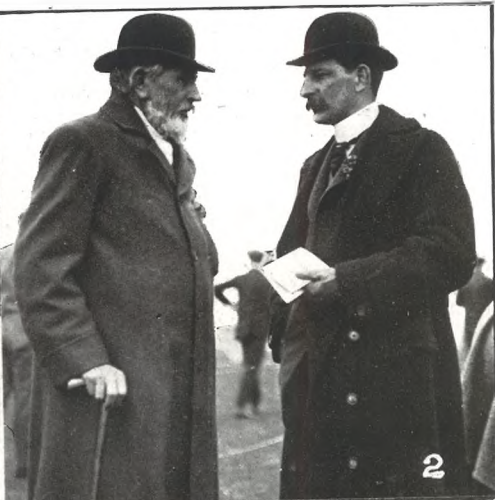

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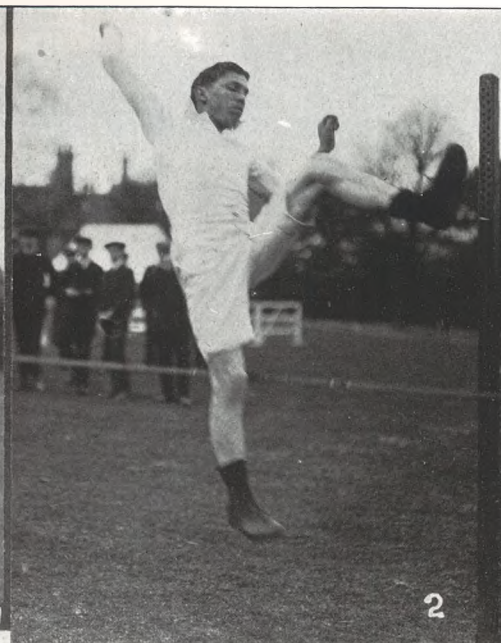

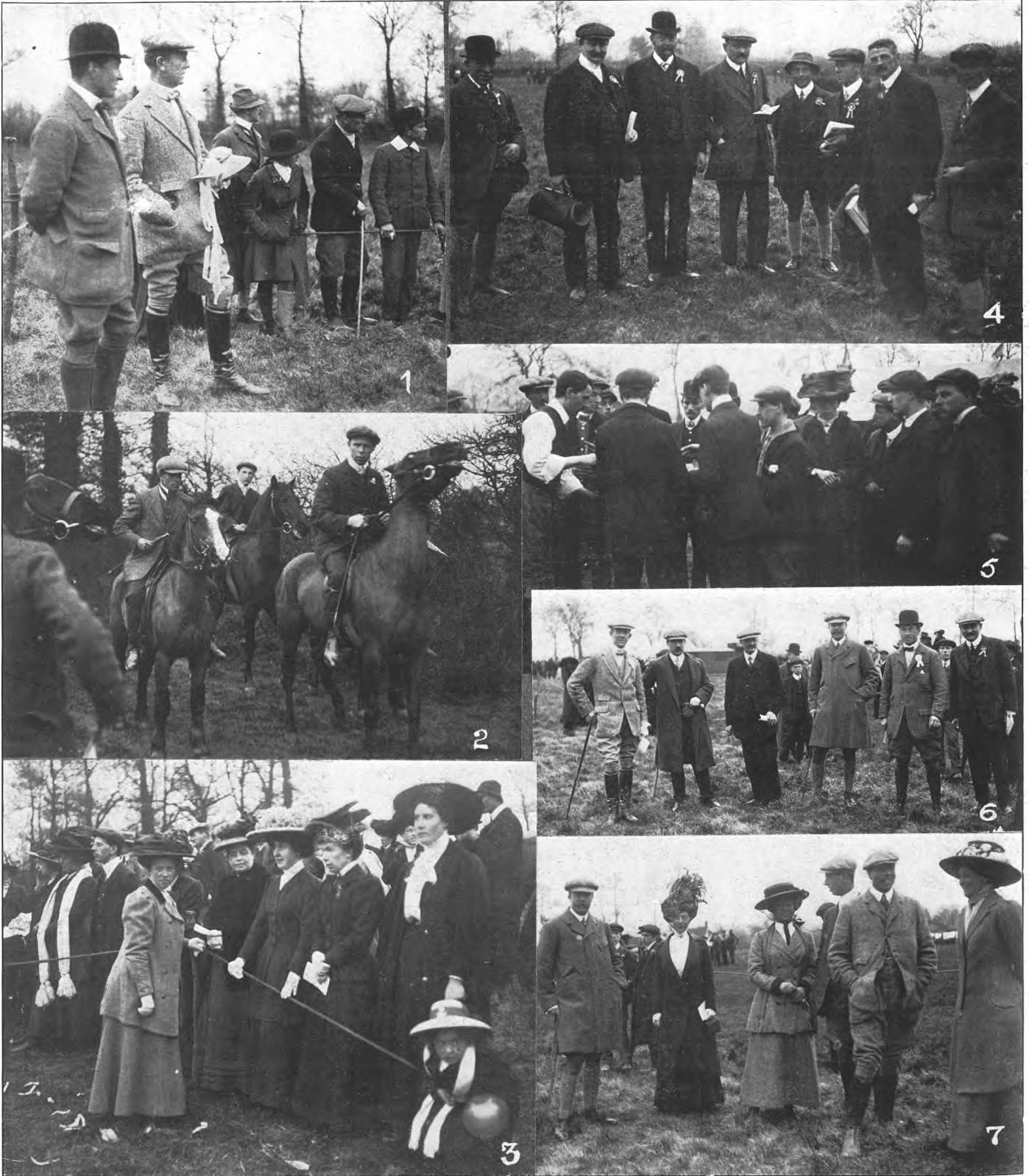

**THE DETECTION of BLOOD-GUILT**

• • •

People often wonder why it is that experts, when giving evidence in court, can so confidently affirm that a certain substance removed from clothes, weapons, and so on consists of blood, although the suspected parties declare it to be rust or red paint. The determination of the truth is, however, a matter of simple preparation and microscopical observation which is absolutely infallible.

The reader probably learnt at school that all human blood consists of two kinds of densely packed globules invisible to the naked eye, called corpuscles, white and red, floating or suspended in a liquid. I doubt whether one person in a million—apart from those who study such topics—has any real idea of the minuteness of these objects. It is useless to say, for instance, that ten millions of the red corpuscles will cover a square inch if laid out quite flat.

It has not only to be determined whether a suspected substance is blood and not rust or paint—which in themselves are capable of affording direct evidence of their own nature—but it has to be learnt whether the blood is that of a human being or of a rabbit, fowl, or other creature. Fortunately, the shapes of the corpuscles differ, slightly or extremely. Another important fact is that human blood responds less readily to the crystallisation process outlined than do other kinds, and, moreover, does so differently. The tiny prisms are an almost sufficient clue to the real nature of tested human blood.—"Strand Magazine."

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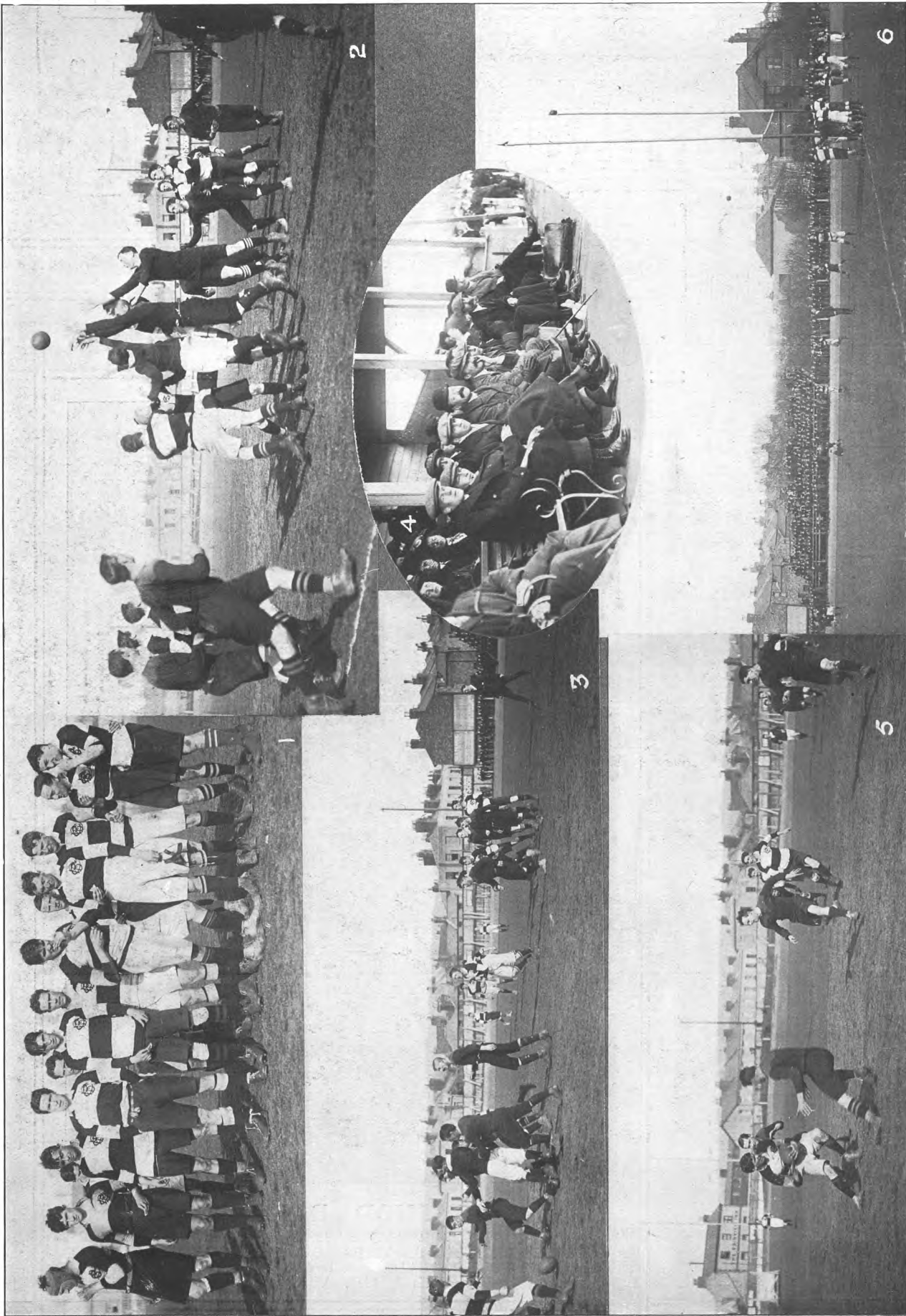

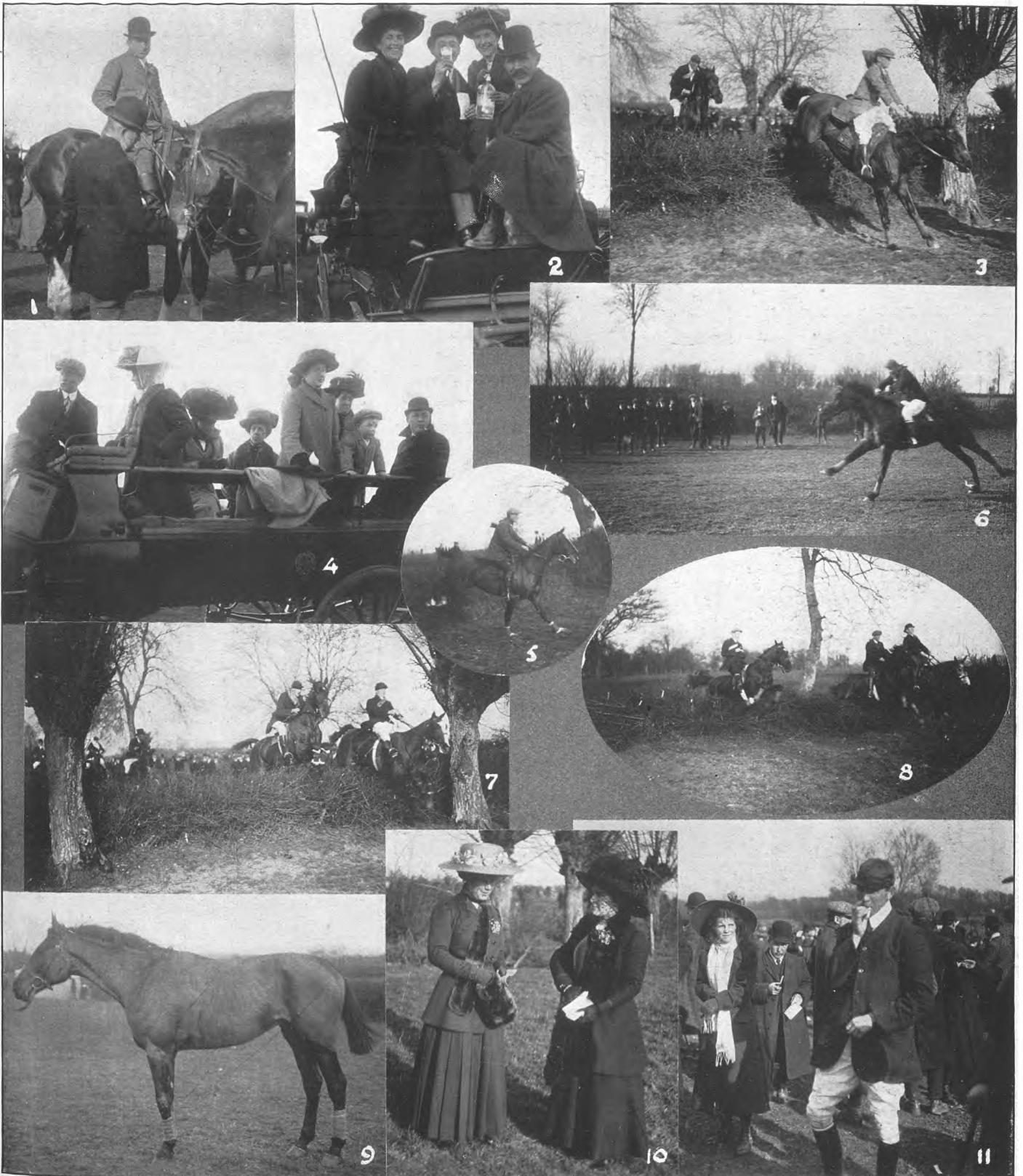

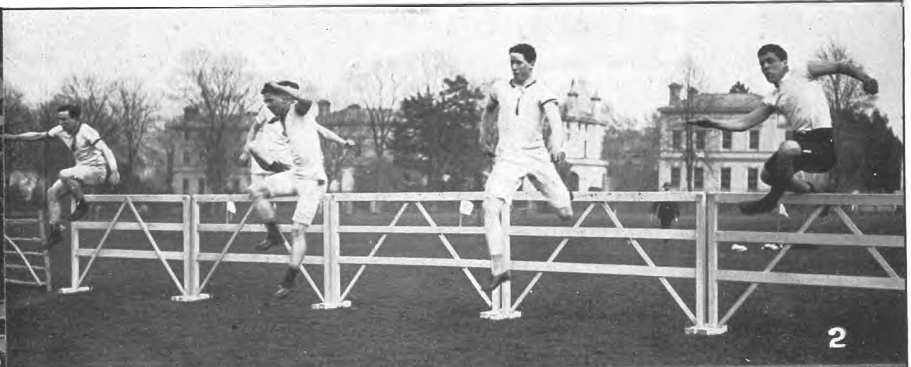
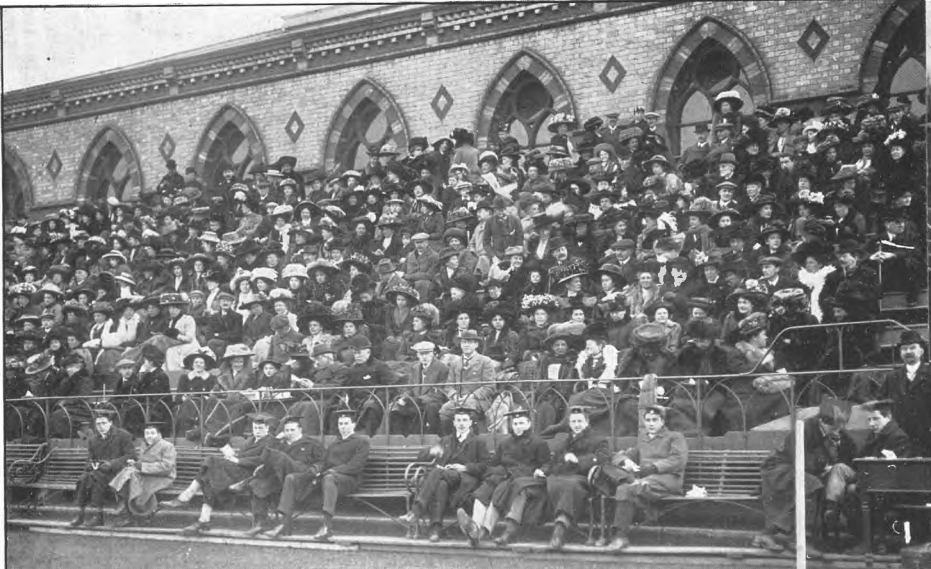

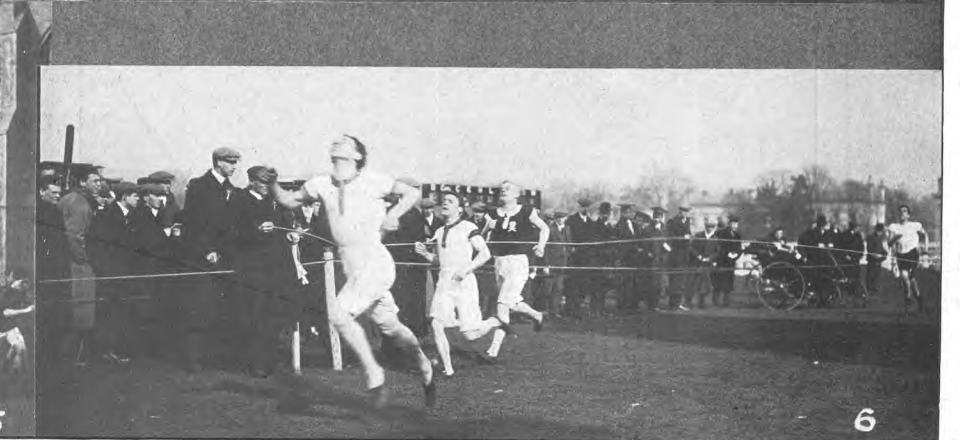

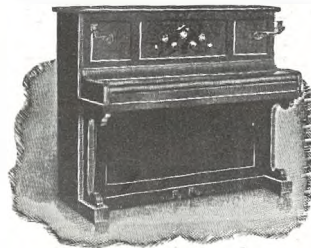

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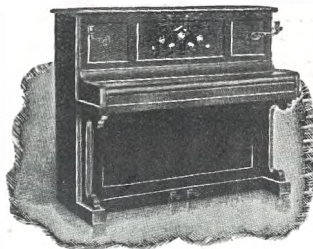

The receipts from the gaming tables at the Monte Carlo casino for the past financial year are £120,000 more than during the preceding twelve months.

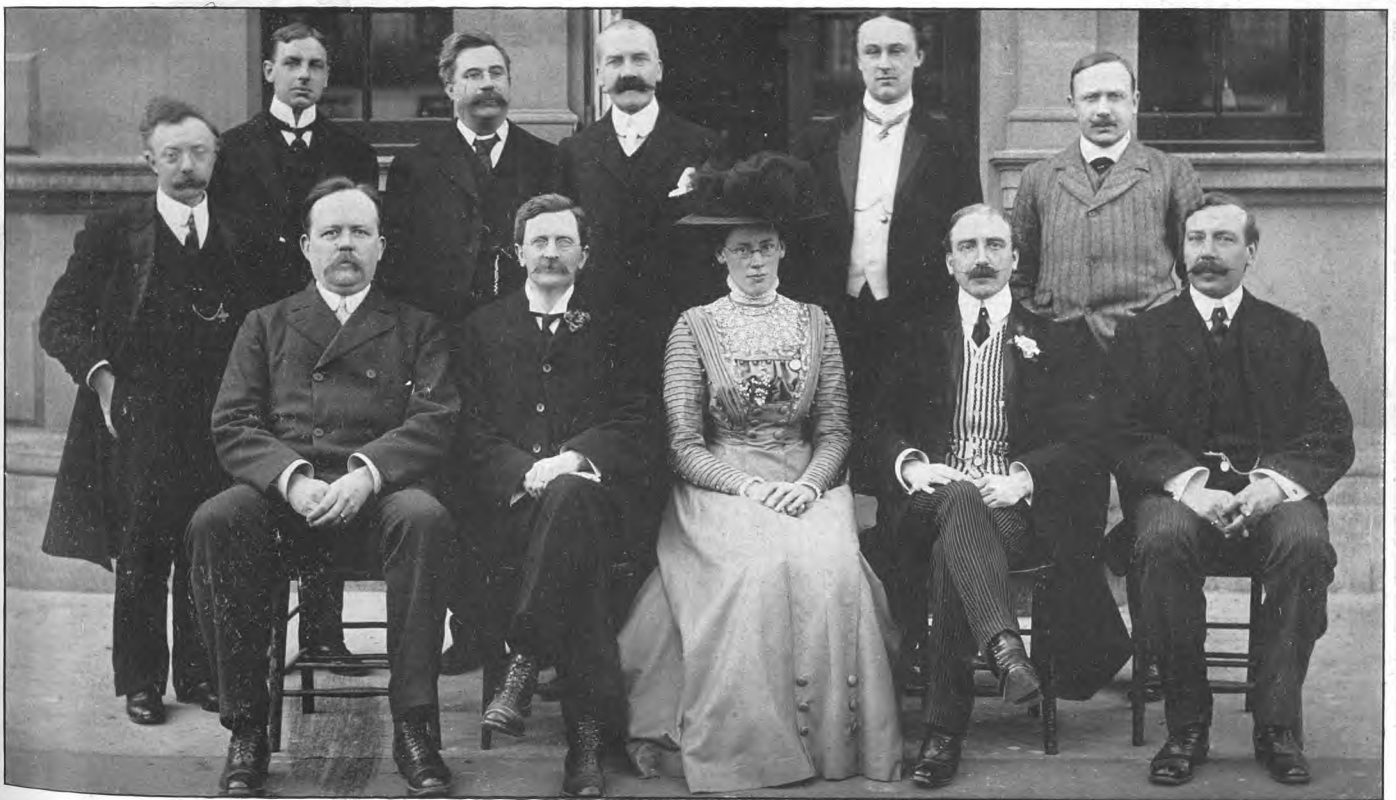

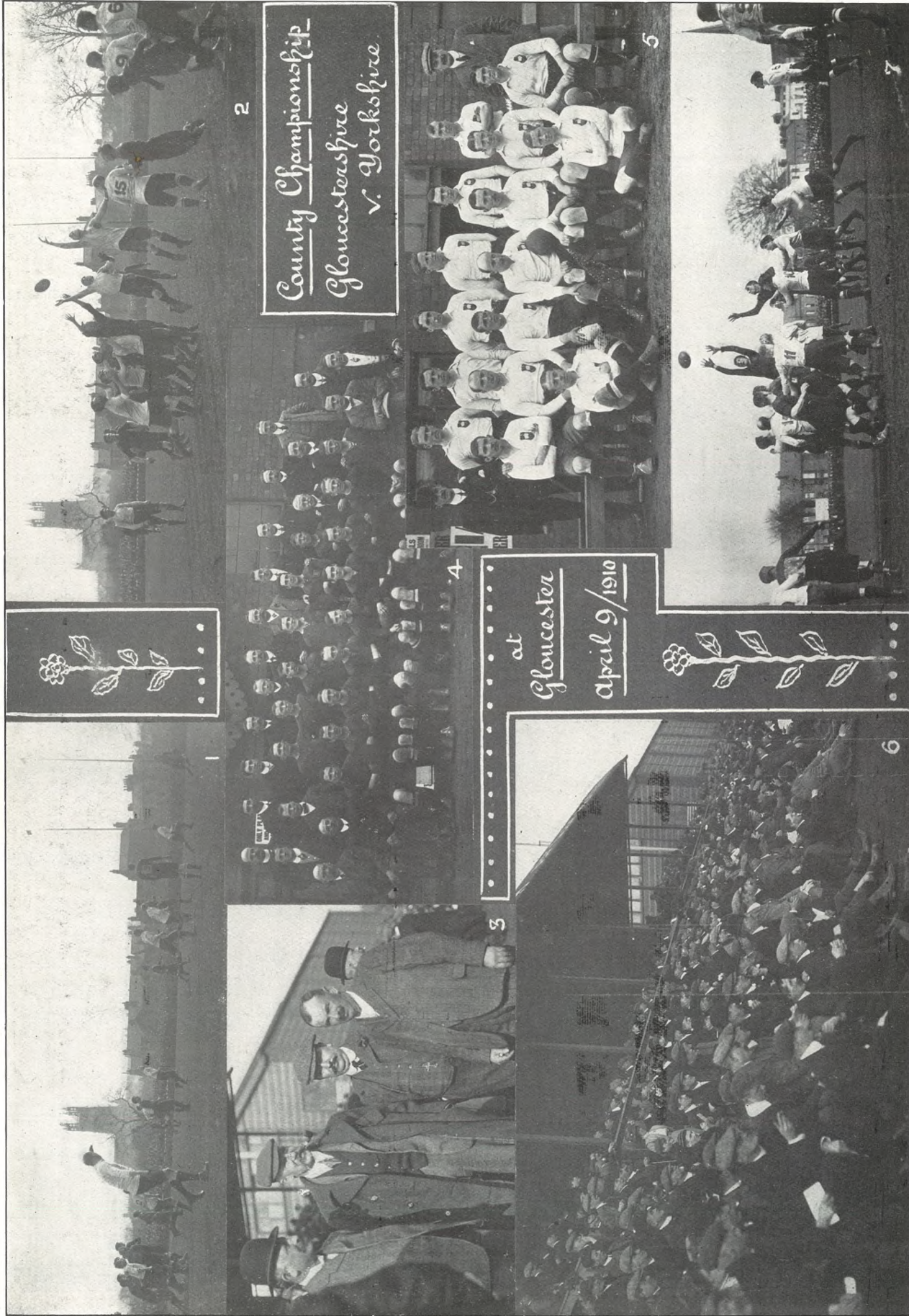

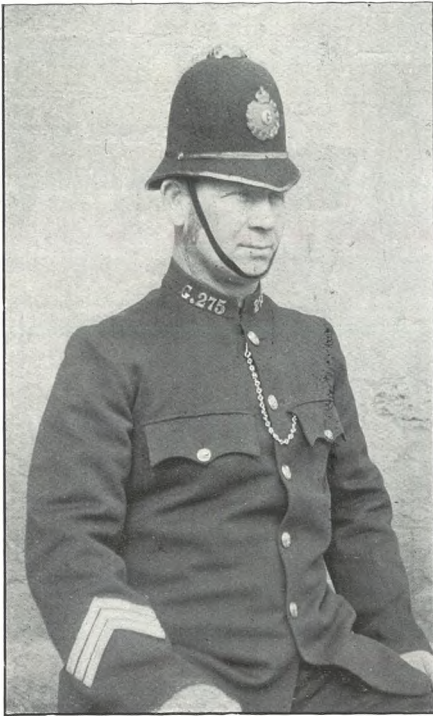

**HABITS OF THE HEDGEHOG.**

Many writers have asserted that after the hedgehog begins to hibernate—generally about November—it never stirs until well on in the spring. This is far from being the experience of a writer in the “Scotsman,” who has a pet hedgehog. It came out of its retreat in the garden quite frequently during the winter, between six and seven in the evening, to feed on bread and milk put out for it there. Other observers admit that hedgehogs are occasionally seen during December and January, though never in February. But this one was undoubtedly out at the beginning of the last month. One very curious habit is a peculiar fancy the creature seems to have for running round in a circle. During the summer, the writer adds, I observed my hedgehog doing this nearly every morning. His run was in a flower bed at the head of the garden and the circle measured about 12ft. in diameter. He went through this performance for at least half an hour at a time, and so regular were his movements that he made quite a distinct track for himself. One of the most interesting things about the hedgehog is its array of teeth. Competent authorities assert that several of the teeth in the adult hedgehog are persistent milk teeth, and this interesting little animal is held to be the most extreme example yet known of the combination of teeth of the two sets in an adult dentition. The hedgehog forms a genus of very ancient origin. Doubtless its covering of spines and its ability to roll itself into such a complete ball have largely contributed to its survival.

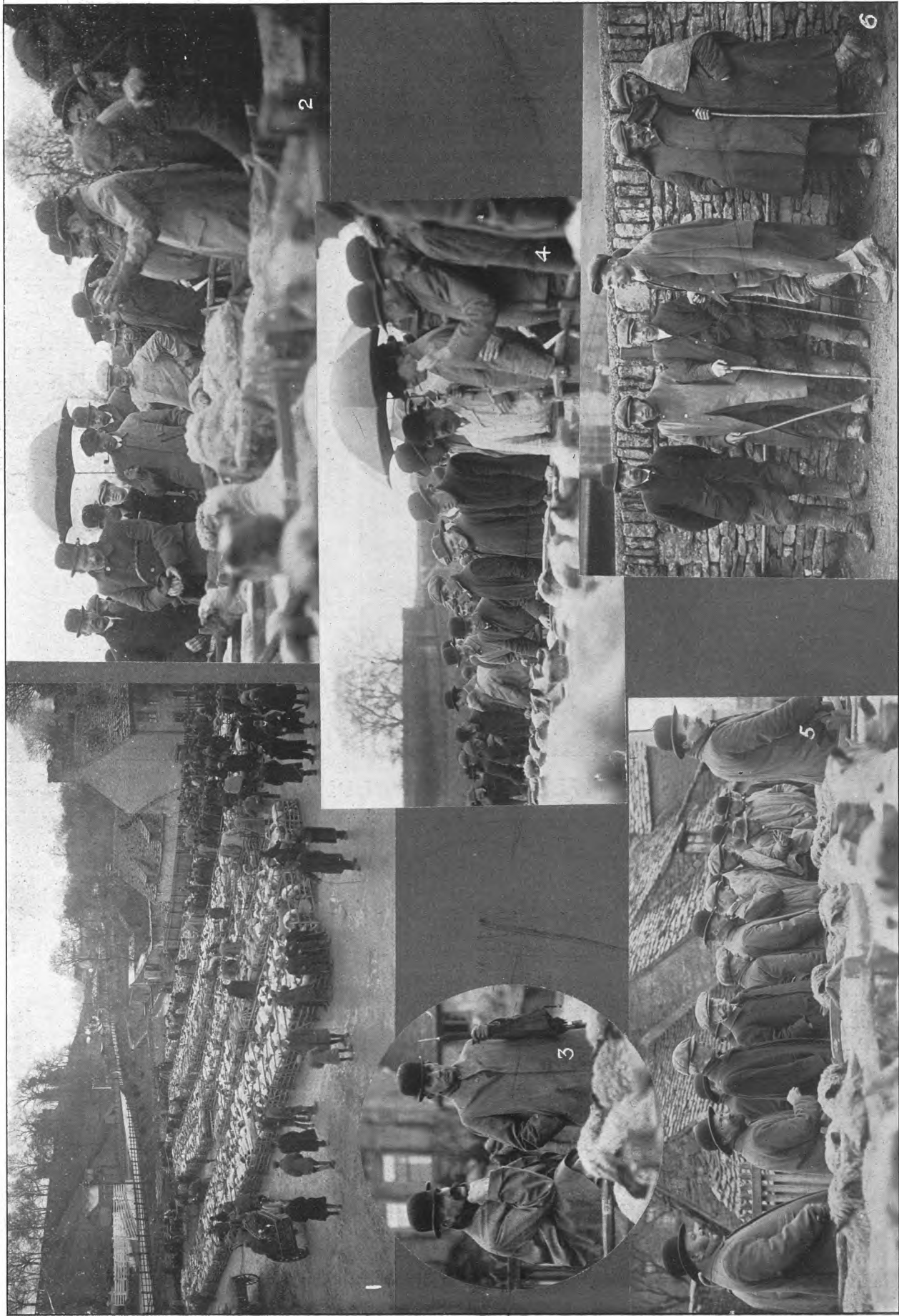

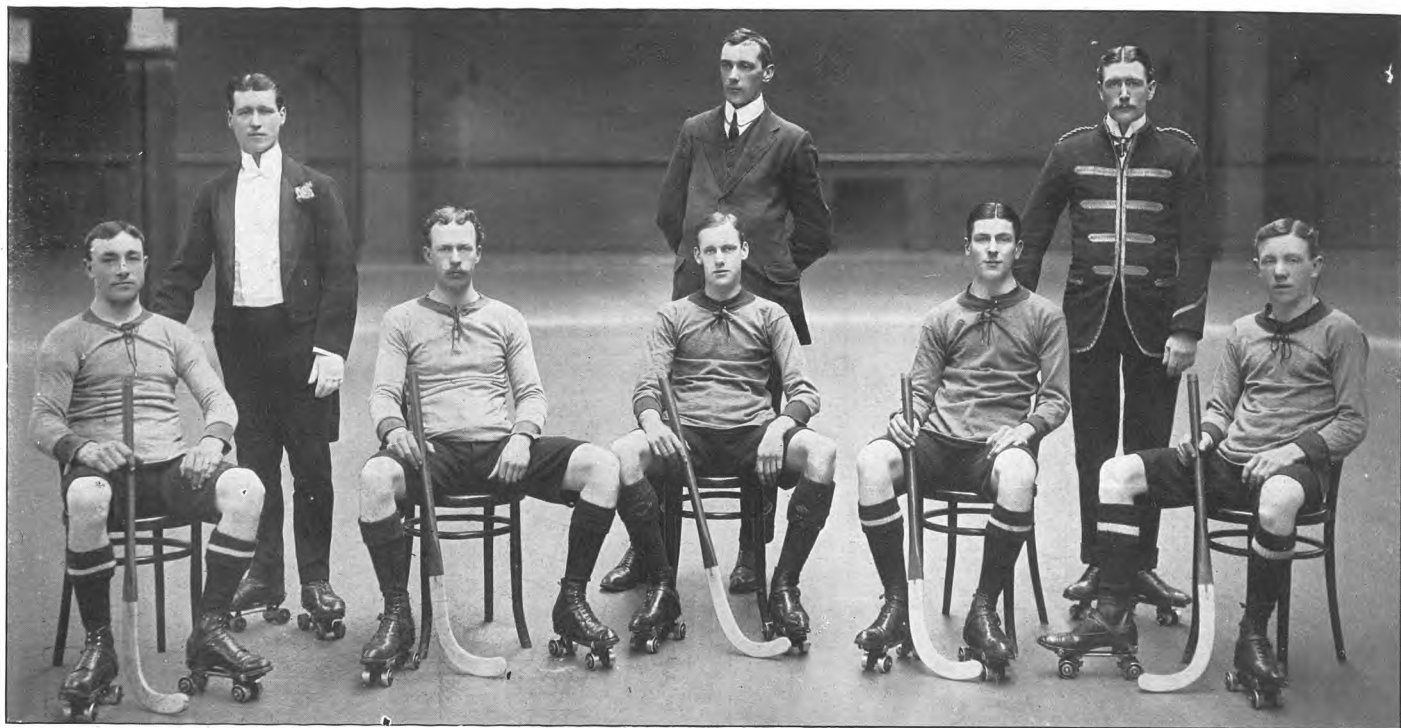

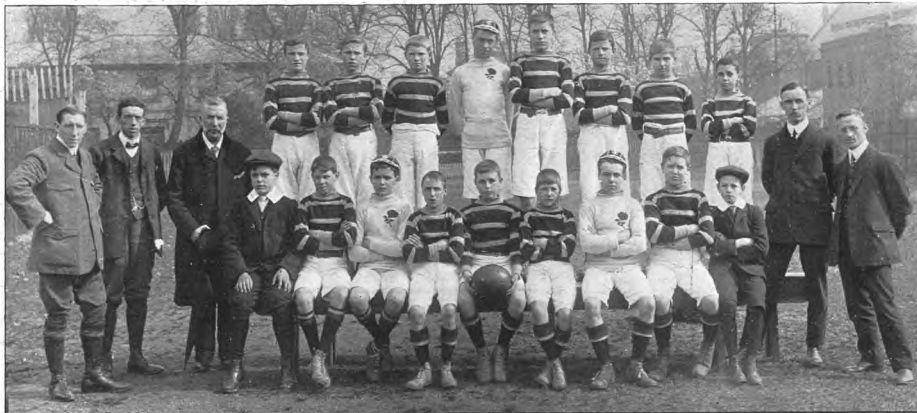

**WOOD PAVING AND LOCKJAW.**

“Lockjaw has greatly increased since the introduction of wood paving.” Such was the comment recently made by a doctor from the London Hospital when giving evidence at an inquest concerning a man who fell and cut his nose on a wood-paved street and subsequently died of lockjaw. “During the last nine or ten years the number of cases of tetanus (or lockjaw) has doubled,” this doctor told press representative. “This enormous increase is coincident with the introduction and popularity of wood paving. Tetanus is a very old disease, known in the time of the Greeks, and it emanates from horses. The germs are chiefly found in dust, dry manure, and on the surface of the earth, and will live and thrive under these conditions for many months. This is where the wood paving comes in. Wood-paved streets, especially when wet, are extremely slippery, and more productive of falls than the ordinary road

surface, for pedestrians as well as cyclists. Again, wood paving, by reason of its powers of absorption, is more likely to harbour tetanus germs than hard stone-faced surfaces. Cuts and abrasions caused by falls in the street have become much more common during the last ten years. In many cases tetanus has resulted and proved fatal.

**POSTAGE TO FRANCE.**

Mr. H. Samuel, the Postmaster-General, received a deputation of members of the House of Commons on Tuesday on the subject of penny postage to France, and in reply said that such a scheme would cause a yearly loss of £90,000. Logically the same favour would have to be extended to Europe, causing an annual deficit of £380,000.

According to a Treasury return issued on Wednesday, the total quantity of coal exported from the United Kingdom last year amounted to 63,076,799 tons.

Dorset County Education Committee learnt at its meeting on Wednesday that the grants from Customs and Excise available for higher education this year would be £3,000 less than last.

A wave of sobriety is passing over Glasgow. In the past year 14,167 apprehensions were made for drunkenness, which showed a decrease of nearly 4,500 compared with the previous year, and fully 6,000 on two years ago.

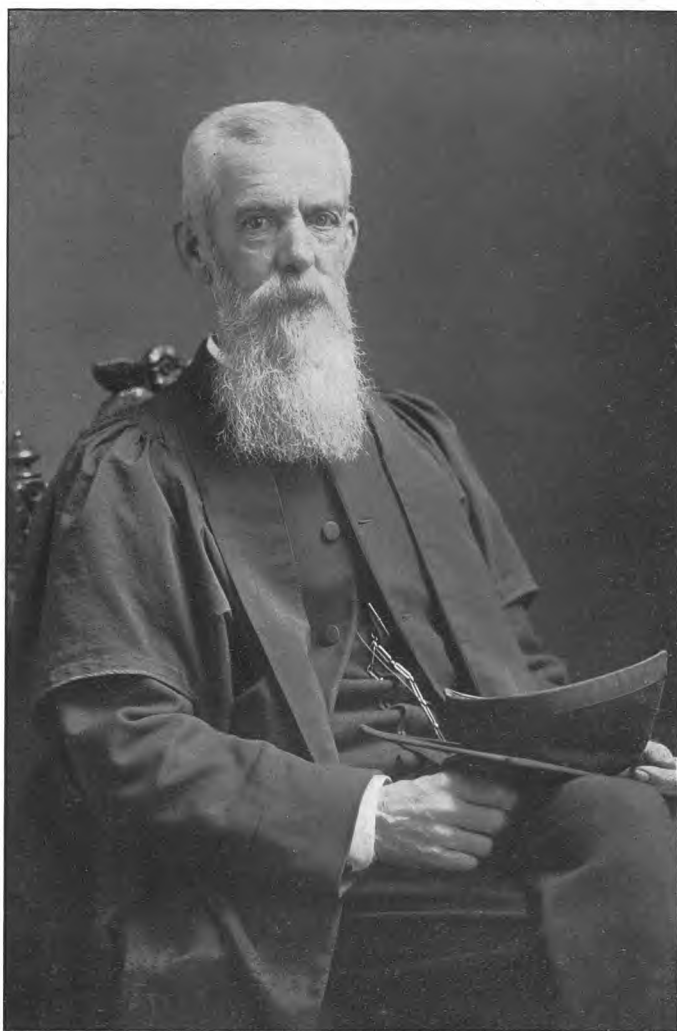

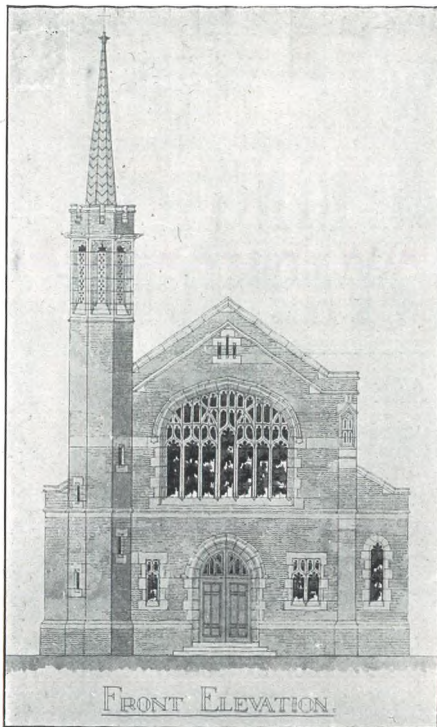
**THE CORN TRADE.**

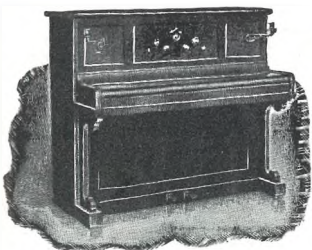




NEW WESLEYAN CHURCH AT ST. MARK'S, CHELTENHAM.

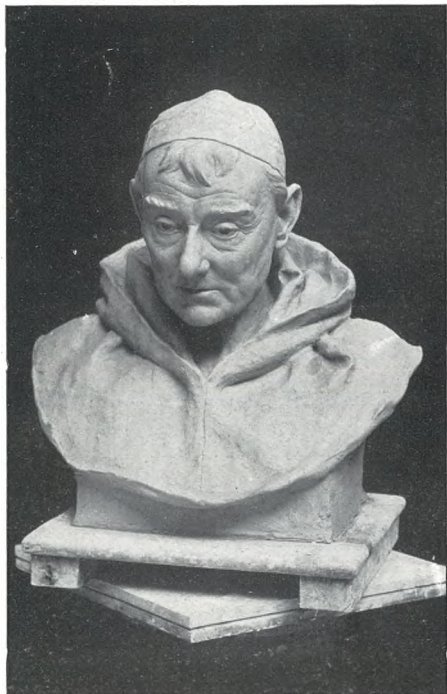

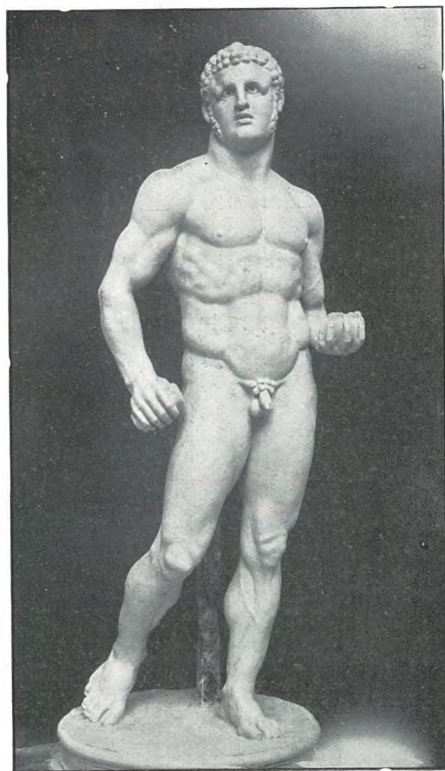
