













### THE CORN TRADE.

The "Mark Lane Express" says: The advantages of a dripping June are considerable, but latterly it has dripped a little too much. High temperature has prevented the effects from being injurious, in the way that they were in the chilly and rainy June of last year. July has come in with showers, but there is as yet no reason to despair of properly ripening weather for cereals. Barley has come on fast, and oats have grown away from their usual scourges. The bulk of the wheat crop south of the Trent looks like being fit to cut fairly early in August, with ordinary July heat; but there cannot now be an early general harvest in England.

### THE CENTENARY OF THE SAVINGS BANK.

The story of the founding of savings banks is not unlike that of certain other important national movements whice have sprung from small and unpretentious beginnings, inasmuch as it is a singularly simple and unromantic story. For example, our Sunday schools had their origin in the cellar-work-shop of a poor and illiterate cobbler, Robert Raikes. The Salvation Army, also, had its genesis at the street-corner of an obscure provincial town, for there, it is stated, the inspiration for his scheme came one day many years ago to William Booth, then but a struggling Methodist preacher. The great system of Trustee Savings Banks, in like manner, began its career in a mean little cottage in an almost unknown rural village, and at the end of its first year's business the resultant sum of £150 gathered by its means was reckoned a wonder! There was no display, no formal inauguration at its founding, nothing whatsoever to denote the possibility of its ever achieving distinction or attaining that extraordinary measure of success which by its initiation was subsequently accomplished. But there was a good spirit presiding at its birth and assisting at its nursing—the spirit of sound sense and earnest endeavour to give the new-created thrift-idea a sturdy and healthy constitution. At least, that was what the first founders of savings banks strove to do for it.—"The Graphic."





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













### Gloucestershire Gossip.

Another recent picturesque ceremony in connection with the Accession of King George V. to the Throne was his Majesty's Proclamation in London announcing the Coronation. This notifies that the King has resolved to celebrate the solemnity of the Royal Coronation "upon a day in June next to be hereafter determined." Ample notice is certainly given, and we must all fervently hope that no untoward event will happen, as it did when King Edward's Coronation had to be postponed from June 26 to August 9, 1902, to prevent the crowning from duly coming off in June. We have to revert to more than seven reigns to find a precedent for a Coronation in August, the previous occasion to that of Edward VII. being the crowning of Edward I. and his Queen on August 19, 1274. It is not generally known (though the Rev. Canon Bazeley has placed it on record about Hayles Abbey, near Winchcombe) that in 1295 Earl Edmund, the patron of the Abbey, gave to it a portion of the true Cross of Christ, and that when he died in 1300 he was buried at Hayles in the presence of his cousin and heir, Edward I., and a great concourse of abbots. and a great concourse of abbots.

The Proclamation also announces the appointment of a number of notable personages to hear and determine such petitions as may be exhibited to them from loving subjects claiming to perform divers' services at the Coronation "as in times precedent their the Coronation "as in times precedent their ancestors and those from whom they claim have done and performed at the Coronations of Our famous Progenitors and Predecessors, Kings and Queens of this Realm." I wonder whether there will be any such petition sent in from this county. I remember that before

the last Coronation Mr. George Sotheronthe last Coronation Mr. George Sotheron-Estcourt, of Estcourt House, near Tetbury, put in in all seriousness a claim to perform suit and service at it as "chief larderer" to the King, but that it was not allowed. Mr. Sotheron-Estcourt, however, to my mind, had a much greater honour to this conferred on him by the King, when his name appeared for a barony in the birthday honours list in the year following the Coronation.

The acceptance by Mr. R. W. Essex of the invitation to be the Liberal candidate for Stafford reminds me that there is this old and favourite toast current in that borough—"May the trade of Stafford always be trodden upon by the feet of the world." be trodden upon by the feet of the world." This ambiguous toast requires explanation to outsiders. The fact is that boot and shoe making is the staple trade of Stafford, and the "Staffs" maturally wish for their manufactures to be trodden upon by the feet of the world, just as Cheltonians may desire that the slabs made from the refuse of the town should become the pavement in vogue throughout the universe, so that their trade might be trodden upon in a way. Mr. Essex thus abandons intention of regaining for Liberalism the Cirencester Division. He is certainly going to a constituency in which the Liberal flag has for the most part been in the ascendant since the Reform Act of 1832. Between that year and 1885, when the borough had two members, I find there were at the thirteen general elections that occurred fourteen Liberal to twelve Conservative members returned. Since the reduction to one bers returned. Since the reduction to one seat in 1885 Liberal predominance has been more marked, for at the seven general elections a Conservative was only returned once, in 1886. Still, Sir C. E. Shaw, who is retiring, and into whose shoes Mr. Essex hopes to step, only had 85 votes to the good for the Liberals at the last election. Mr. Essex will doubtless wear out a considerable amount of

shoe leather in his house-to-house canvass. snoe leather in his house-to-house canvass. A terribly-sounding toast was once given, many years ago, by Henry Erskine. It ran as follows: "Sink your pits! Blast your mines! Dam your rivers!" A less blood-thirsty one, also alluding to colliery operations, ran "May all your labours be in vein!"
