



delicate imagery. Mr. Meeze has for some time been very hard at work on his great book, which may aptly be termed a thirty years' labour of love. He has named this work "A Pansophic and Telosophical Pantacle: A New and Constructive Interpretation of Experience, or Microcosmic Key to the Macrocosm." The great feature of the work, which is not a "system" in the usual acceptation, is the application of the "Dia-

lectic Movement" to "Experience in Immediacy," in which it differs from the Hegelian School, who apply the "Dialectic Movement" to thought-made premises. Mr. Meeze had been unremittingly labouring at his book, and perhaps had not allowed himself sufficient rest. There is no doubt that this impaired his health and prepared the way for the serious disease from which he is so happily recovering.
















