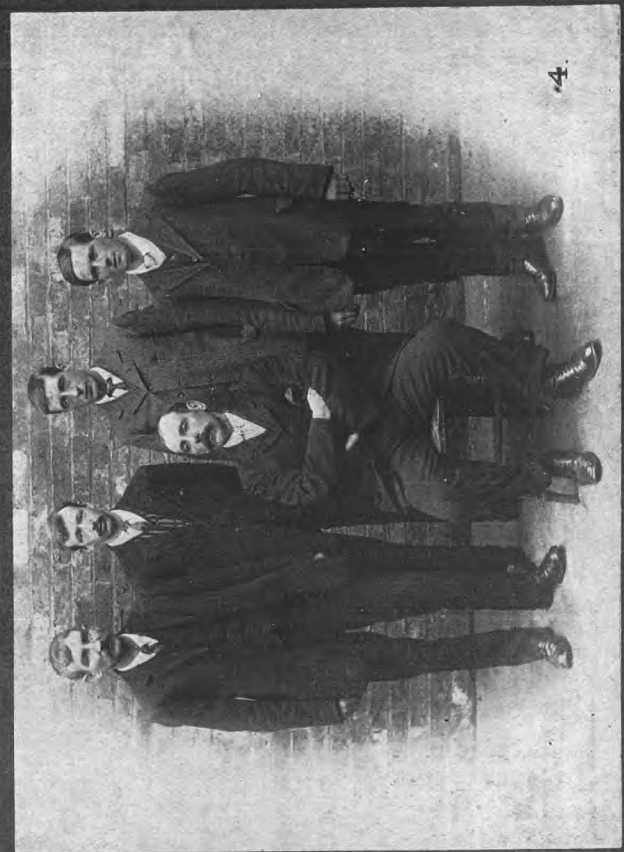
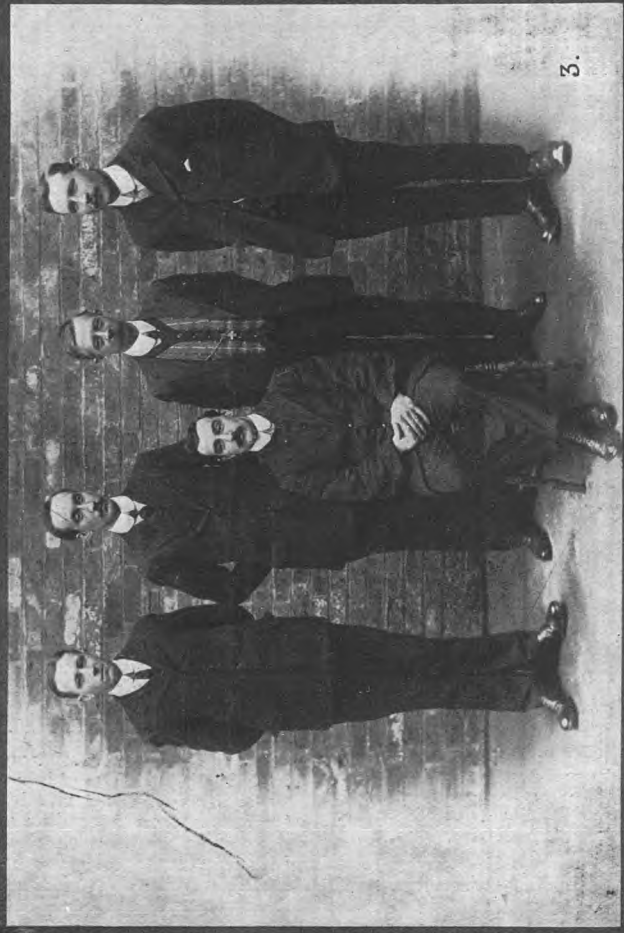

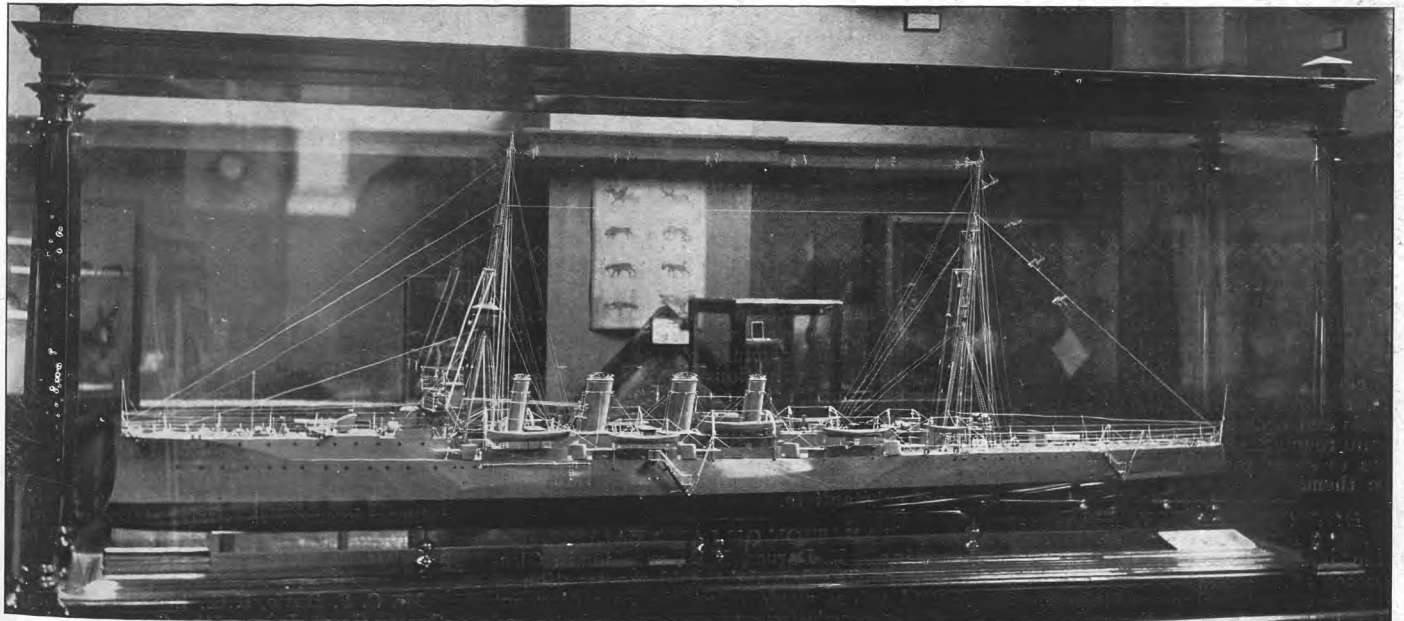

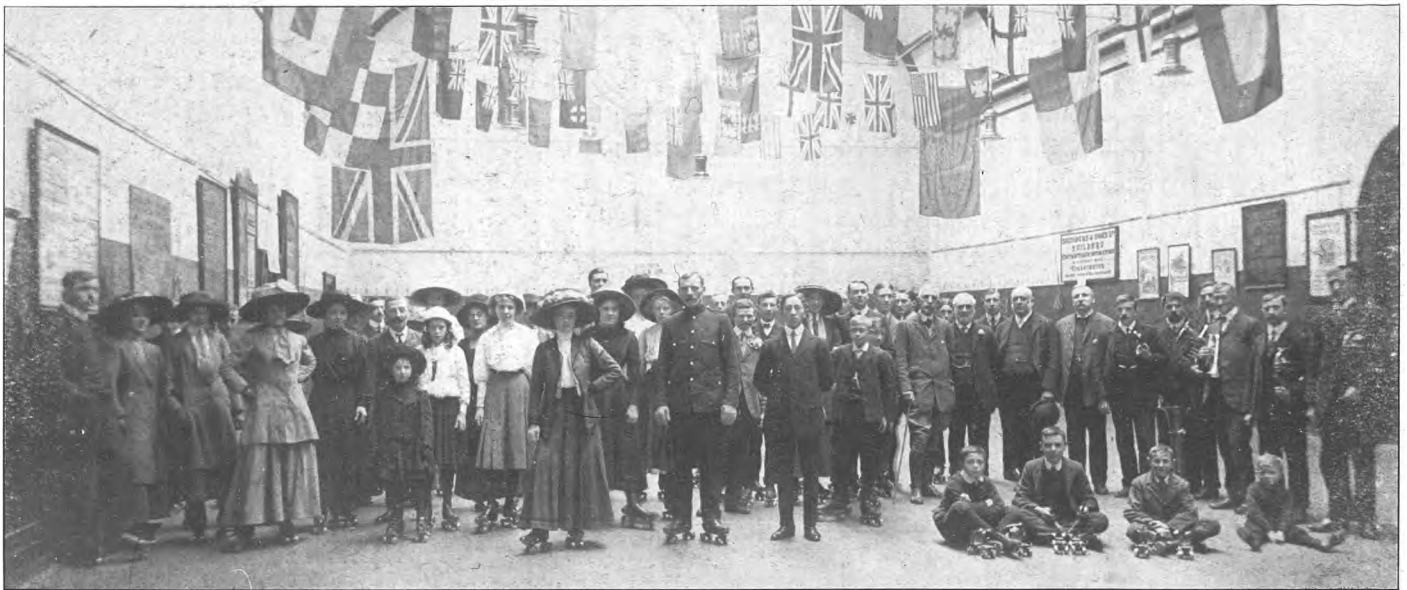

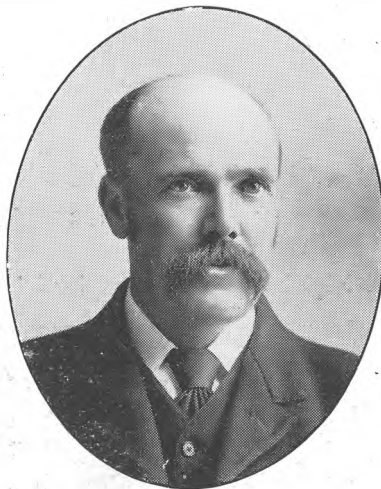

MISS NIGHTINGALE'S WILL.

The net personal estate of the late Miss Florence Nightingale is sworn at £35,649. She leaves legacies to several nurses and matrons of nursing homes, and directs that the jewels presented to her by Queen Victoria, the bracelet from the Sultan, and her medals and orders, with an engraving of the ground round Sebastopol, be given by her executors to some place where the soldiers may see them.

THE NEW CROSS AT ST. PAUL'S.

The Bishop of London on Monday dedicated the new Paul's Cross which has been erected at the north-eastern extremity of St. Paul's Churchyard under the terms of the will of the late Mr. H. C. Richards, K.C., M.P. The bronze figure of St. Paul at the summit of the column, which is about forty feet high, was unveiled by the Lord Mayor. The inscription stated that the new cross stood on the site of the old Paul's Cross which was destroyed by the Long Parliament in 1643.

LLOYD GEORGE AND LAND UNION.

Mr. Lloyd George has written a further letter to the press with reference to the letter of the secretary of the Land Union alleging that valuations for the purposes of the new land taxes were being carried out without inspection of the property valued. Mr. Lloyd George states the secretary has neither the manliness to stand his ground nor the fairness to withdraw charges he could not substantiate.

TAXATION OF LAND VALUES.

Mr. G. N. Barnes, M.P., speaking in Glasgow on Tuesday night, said the taxation of land values would effect the spreading out of the population and an increased demand for labour. The Government, in their modern Domesday Book of valuation, merely touched the fringe of the problem. The Budget contained too many exemptions, because agriculture was strong enough in Parliament to secure these. There was absolutely no justification for exemptions.

CLOSING SCENES AT WHITE CITY.

The third Shepherd's Bush Exhibition closed on Saturday night amid the customary scenes of enthusiasm. Some 50,000 people were present, but the majority left early in the evening. A great number of people, however, viewed the farewell fireworks display in the Stadium. At six o'clock Mr. Willows made a successful flight over the grounds in his new airship City of Cardiff, and was loudly cheered when he descended safely 25 minutes later. Mr. Kiralfy stated on Saturday night that the show this year had been a "glorious success."

Mr. C. F. Doyle, K.C., has been appointed County Court Judge of the County of Mayo.

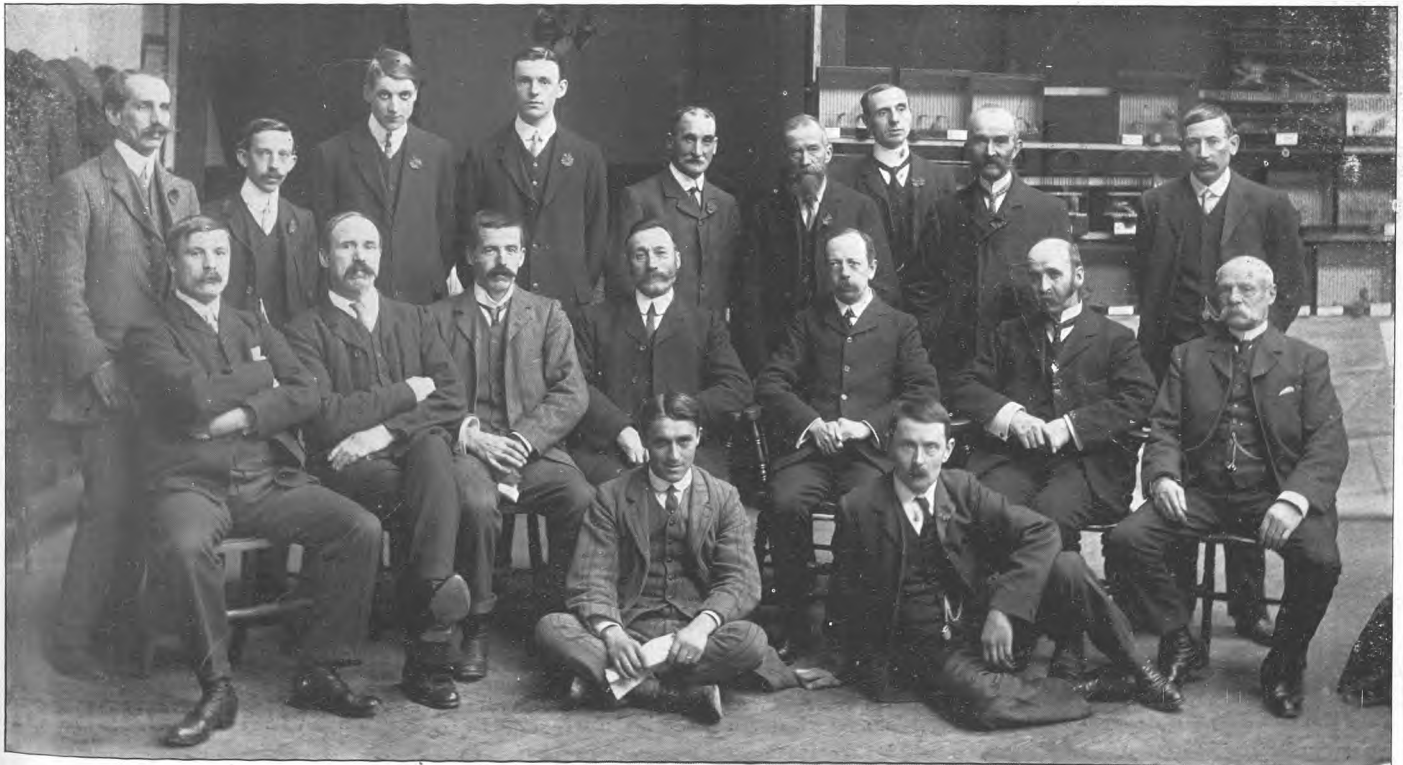
Mrs. Harriett Belton, an inmate of Croydon Workhouse, who celebrated her 100th birthday in August, died on Monday.

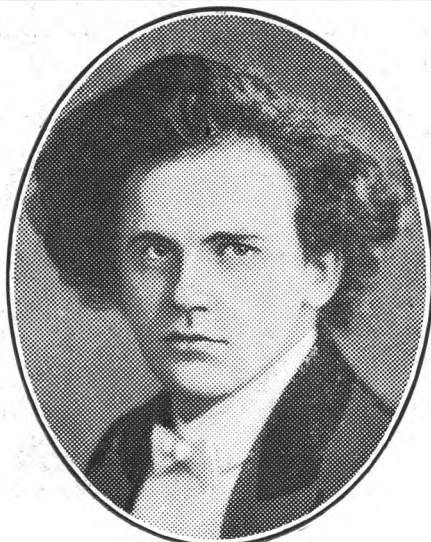
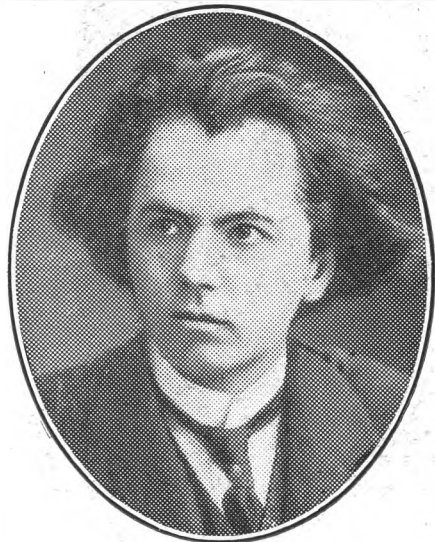

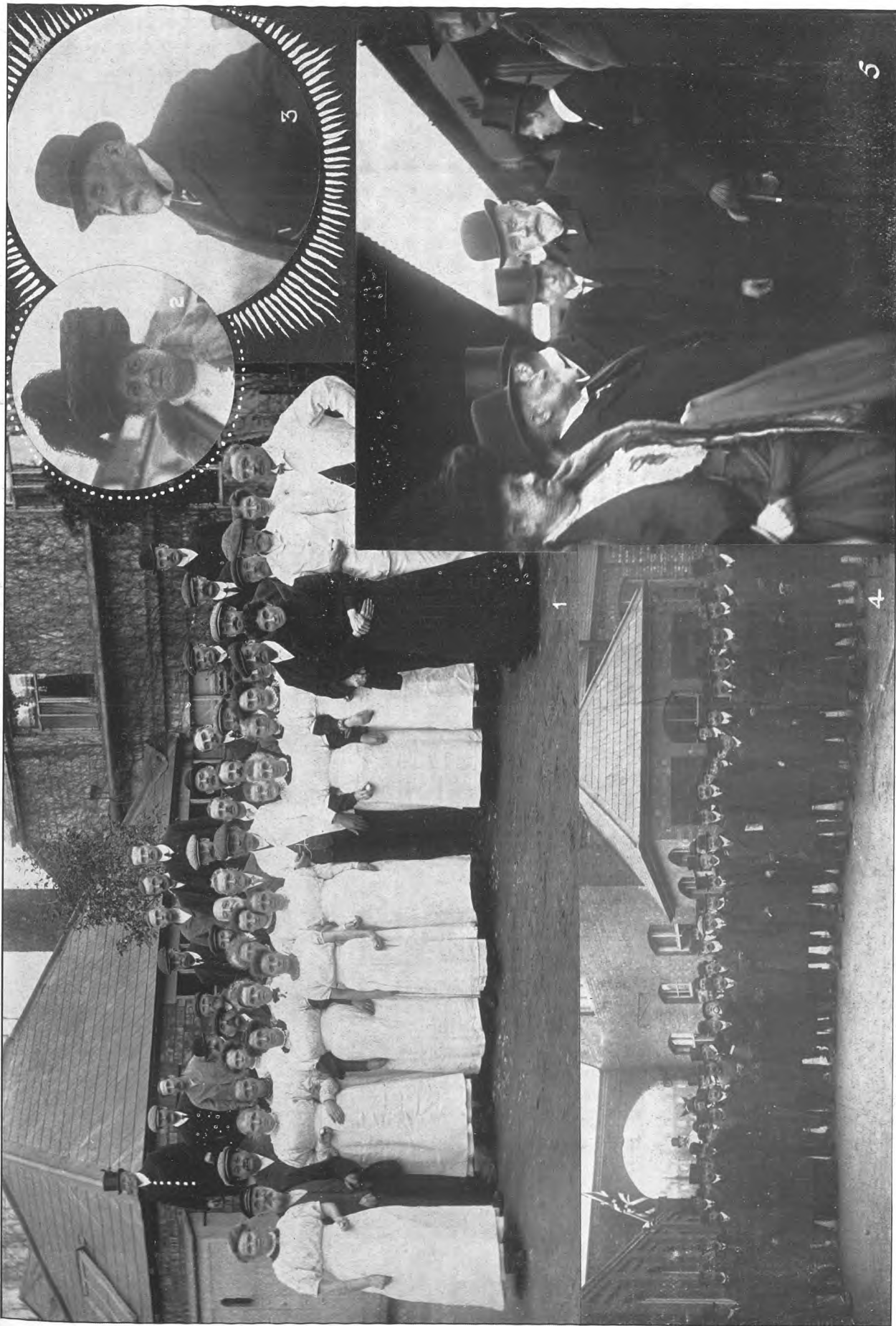

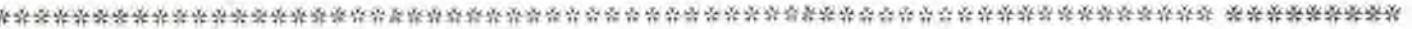

The announcement was made on Monday that the Duke of Sutherland had offered to present Trentham Hall, his Staffordshire seat, and a portion of the extensive park adjoining, to the new federated Borough of Stoke-on-Trent. The terms of the offer have not yet been made public, but it is understood that the offer was on Monday considered in private by the Stoke-on-Trent Council.

Trentham Hall is one of the largest and most nobly-planned residences in the country. It was built by Sir Charles Barry, who designed the Houses of Parliament. The building is in the Italian style of architecture, and its construction cost about £150,000.

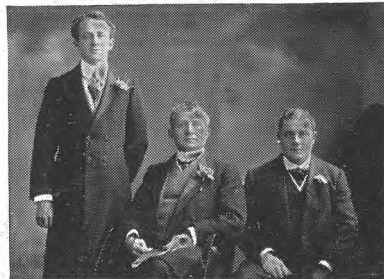

HOUSEKEEPING IN INDIA.

Few of us realise what exile in the tropics means to the gently-nurtured wives of soldiers and civilians (writes Mrs. Humphry in "The Throne and Country"). It needs some imagination to picture a young bride, fresh from home, parted from her family and her old friends, and set down to keep house with a set of servants with whose language and customs she is unacquainted. She has almost everything against her, including the climate, which seems to be gradually drying up at the very source her energies and her health. Her course is not an easy one. She has to steer clear of caste prejudices, to hold firm but gentle sway over the native servants, to prevent their pilfering so far as may be, and yet not rule with too rigorous a hand. When children come there is for the young mother the dreadful prospect of parting with them just when they have grown closely into her heart and, worse still, of the alienation of parent and child that is almost inevitable when the years of childhood and youth are spent, with but a few short intervals, apart from each other. This is really the saddest aspect of the necessary parting. It is a smaller, a much smaller trial, but a very real one, to feel that she is, in a way, obliged to lead a comparatively useless life, so far as the work of her hands is concerned. During the rains it is almost impossible to sew. House-keeping is so different in India that, the morning interview over, the lady of the house has nothing more to do. The hundred-and-one domestic duties that lie to the mistress's hand at home are impossible in the East. And one other trial, estimated lightly from the outside, but none the less heavy to the bright young wife, is the loss of her good looks consequent so often upon the climate. Looking older than she is, her freshness passing from her, the English-woman in India knows the penalty she is paying, and realises that it is a saddening one.

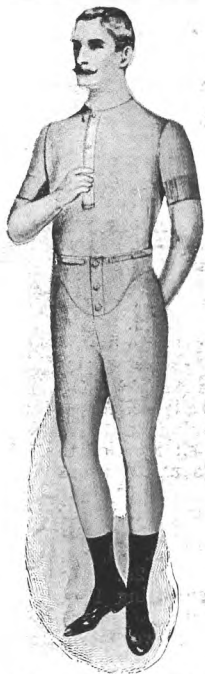

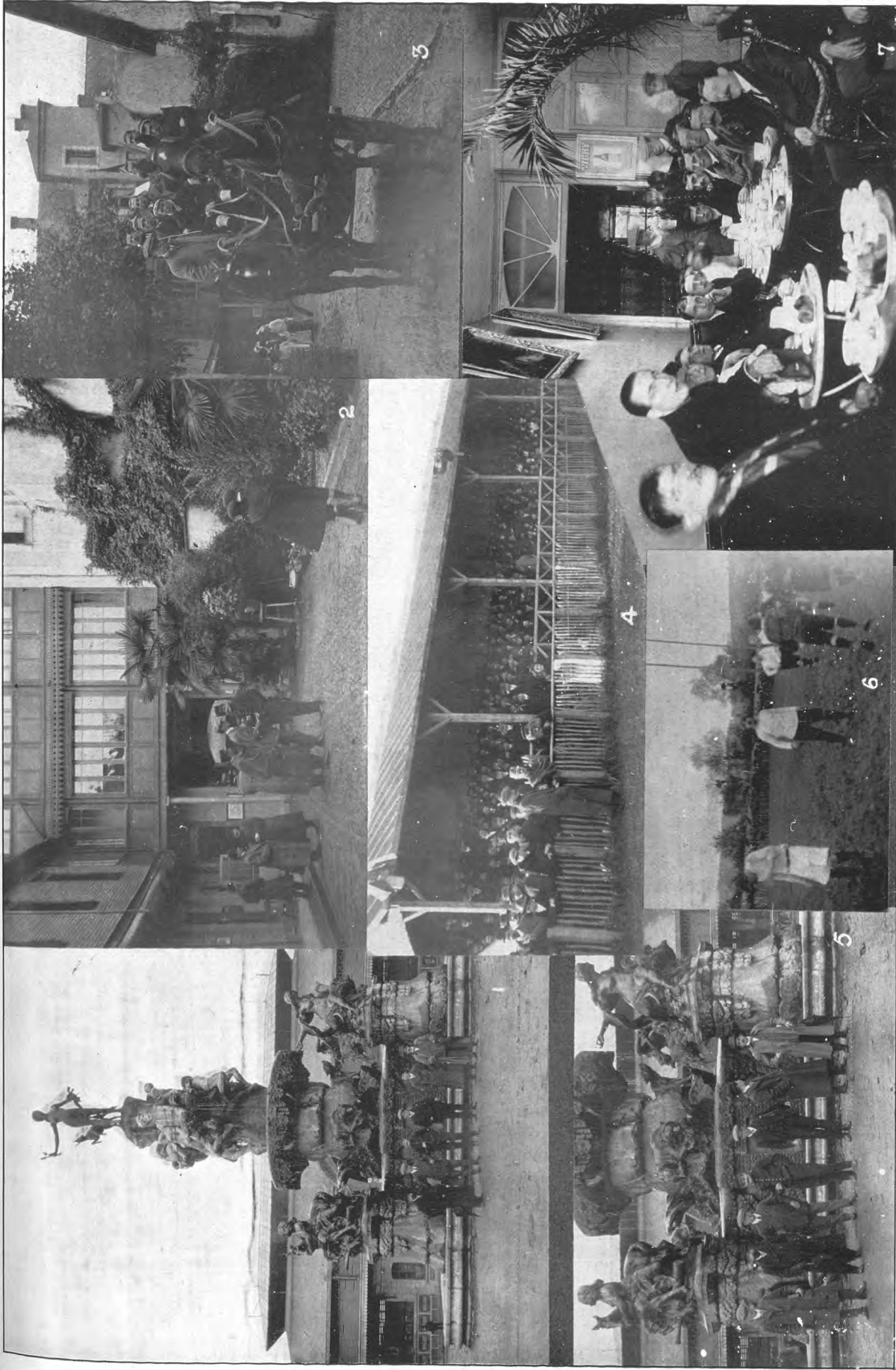

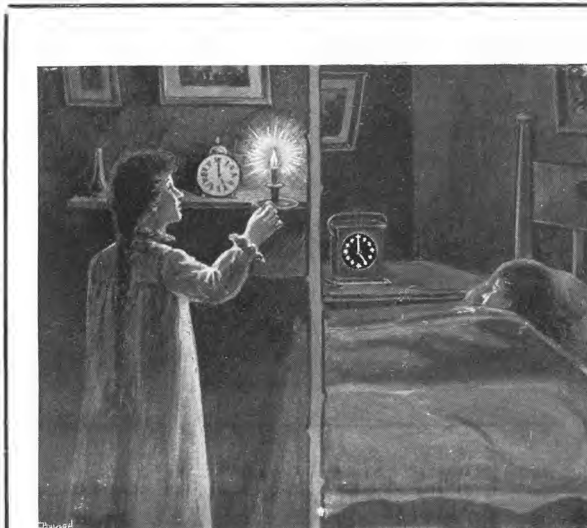

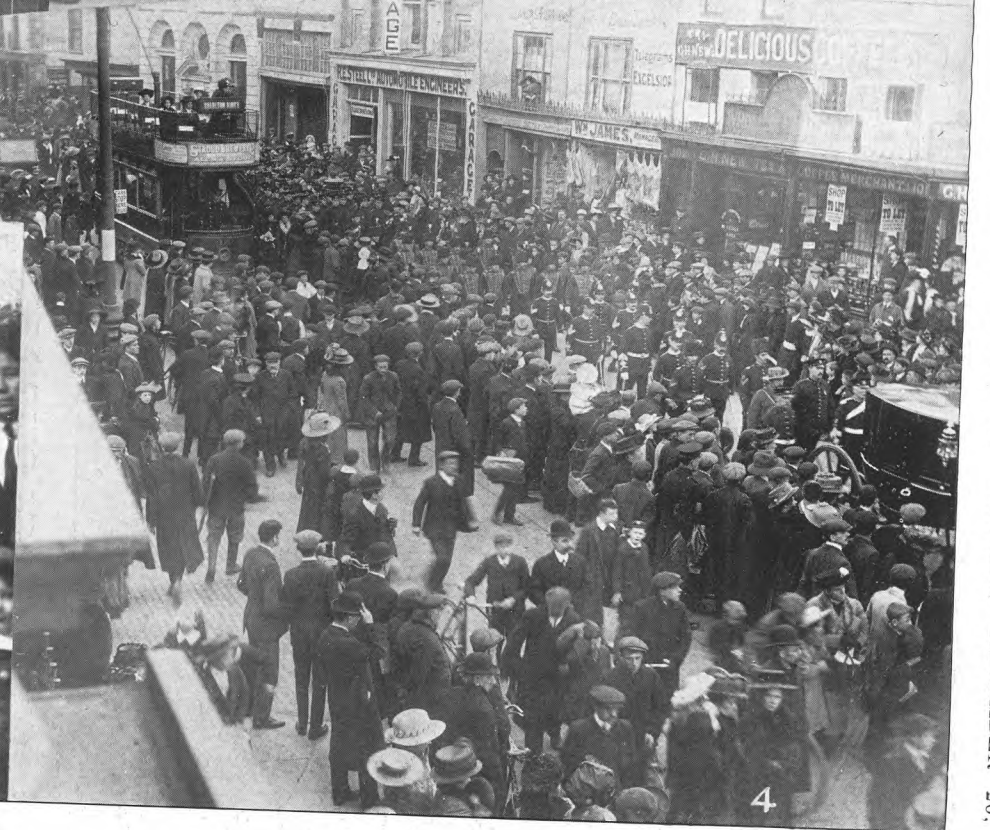

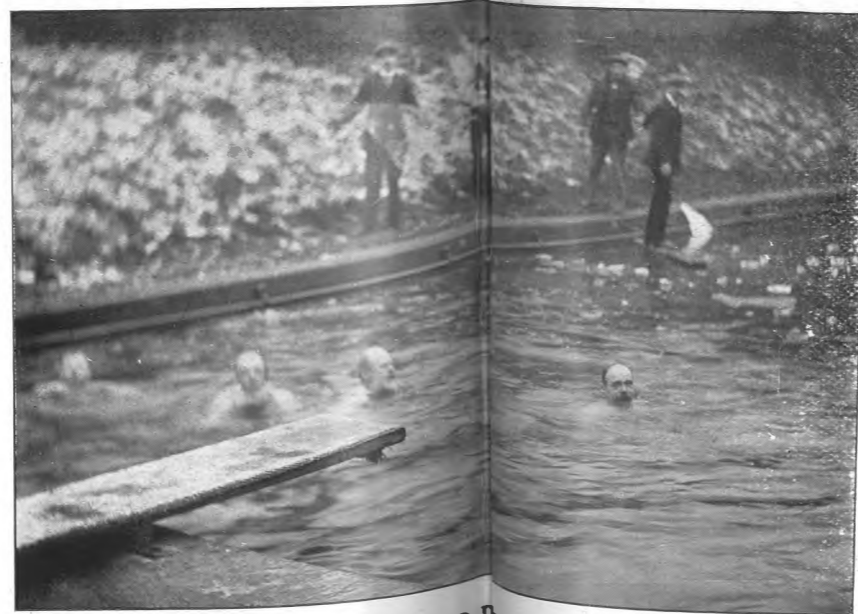
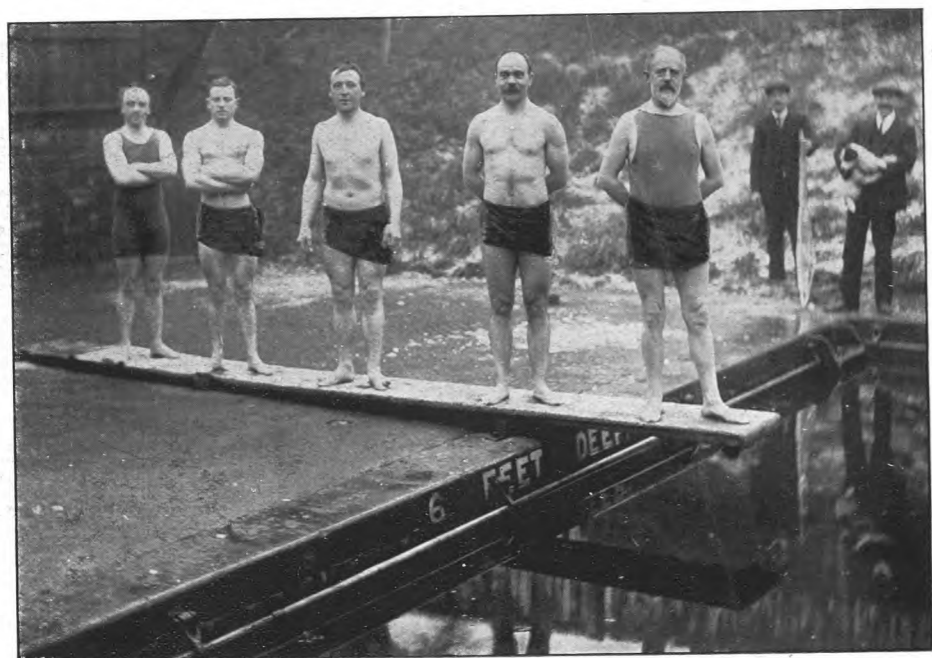

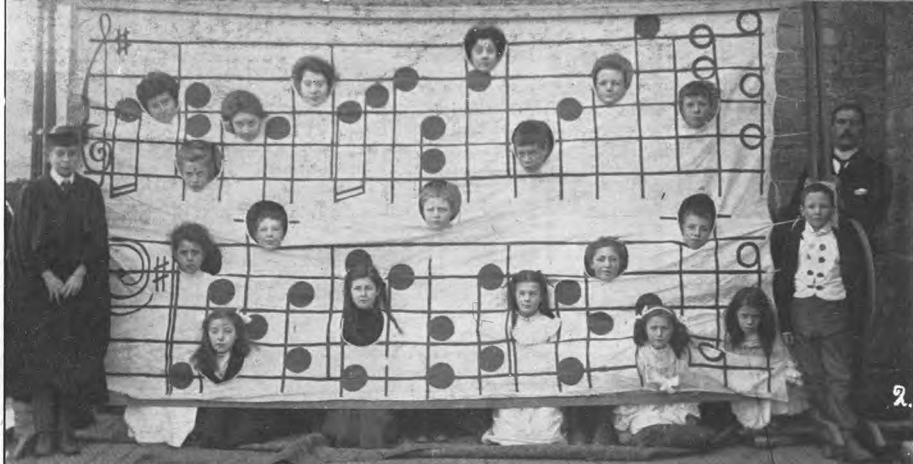

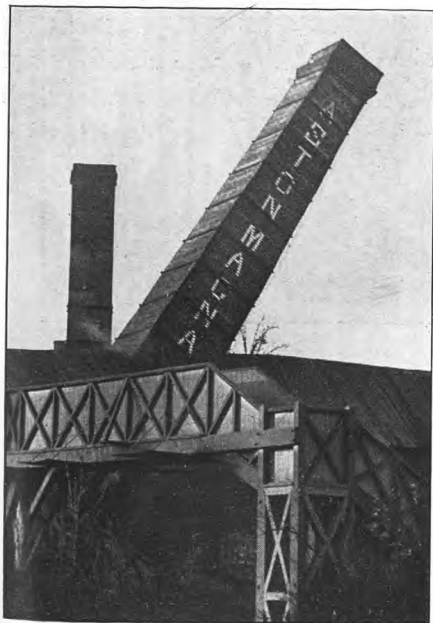

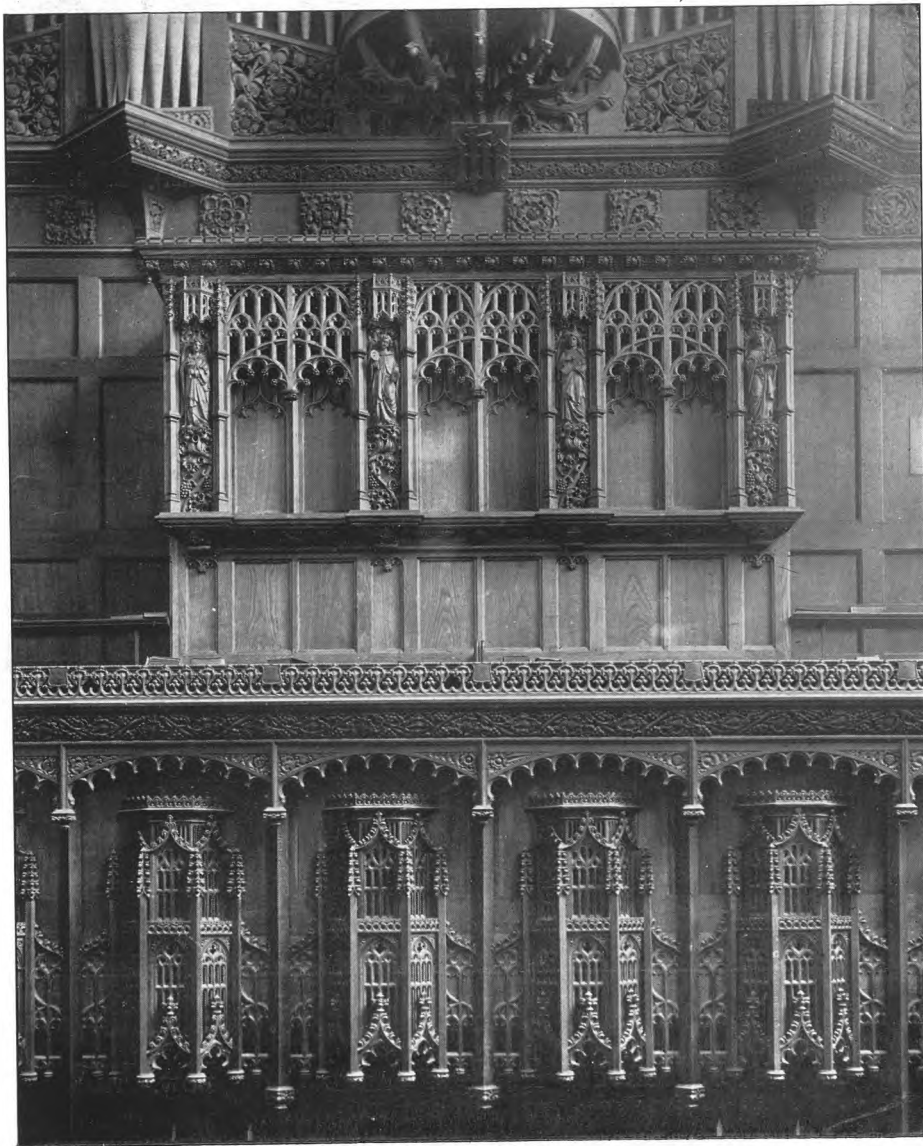
