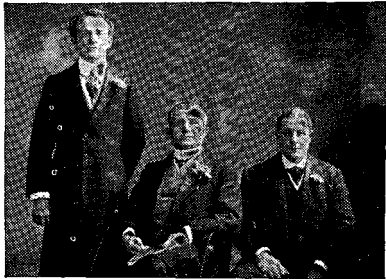

BISHOPRIC DECLINED.

St. Mary Redcliff Church, at Bristol, is one of the finest parish churches in England—in fact, there is only one larger—whilst the holding of the benefice is also regarded as the stepping-stone to high preferment, as will be realised when it is added that six exvicars are now prelates.

That number looked all like being added to until Monday, when Canon Maud, the present incumbent, refused an invitation to the Bishopric of Auckland (New Zealand).

CHRYSANTHEMUM CULTURE.

Sir Albert Rollitt presided on Monday at Essex Hall, Straud, over the annual conference of the National Chrysanthemum Society. Mr. Norman Davis, speaking on the culture of Japanese chrysanthemums for exhibition, said that they were told that the chrysanthemum was already too large, but other qualities being equal, he did not think that any flower could be too large. Successful exhibiting was the result of good cultivation all round, each little point being looked after. In plant-building, the first thing was to create the plant and then to mature it. Growth and root-action should be equal, and to secure this was a matter of root restriction. He thought they treated soil too much as a medium for feeding plants only.

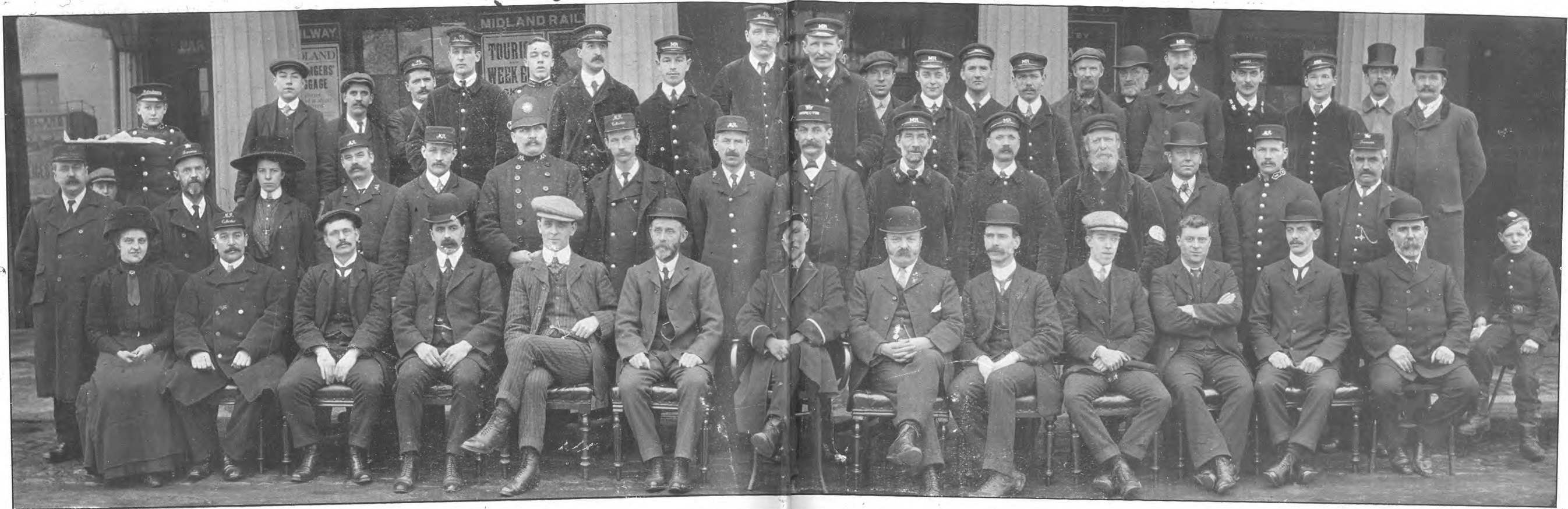

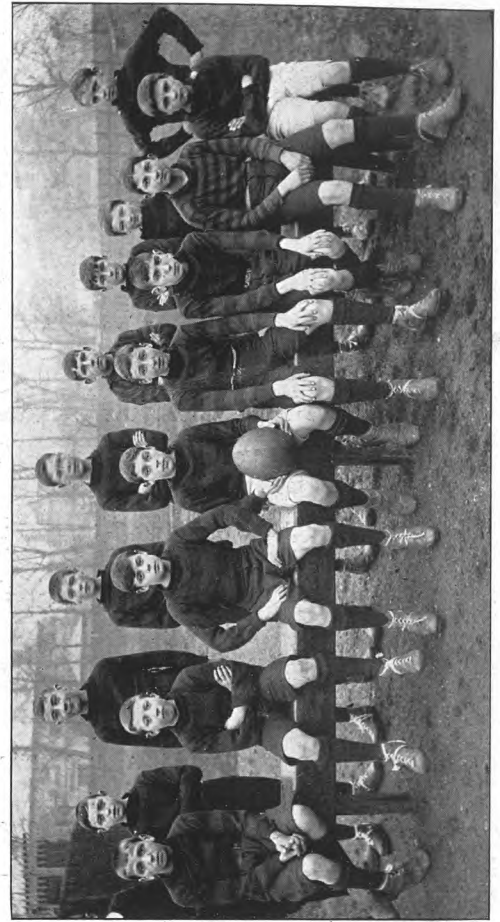

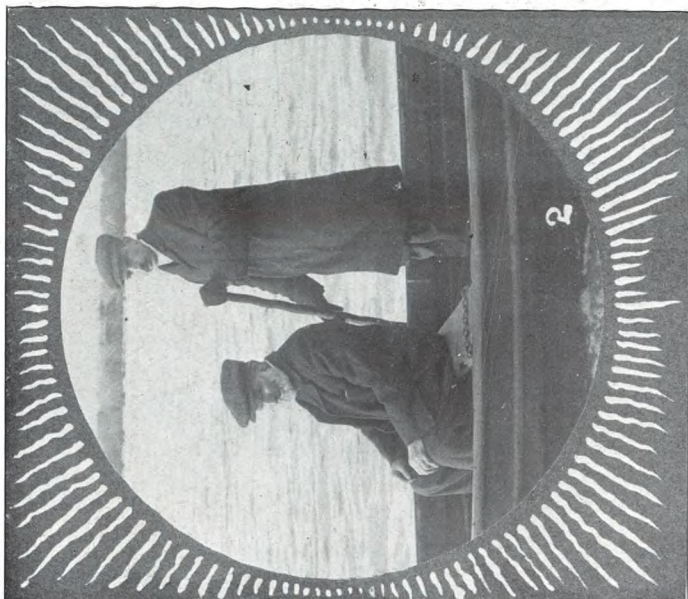

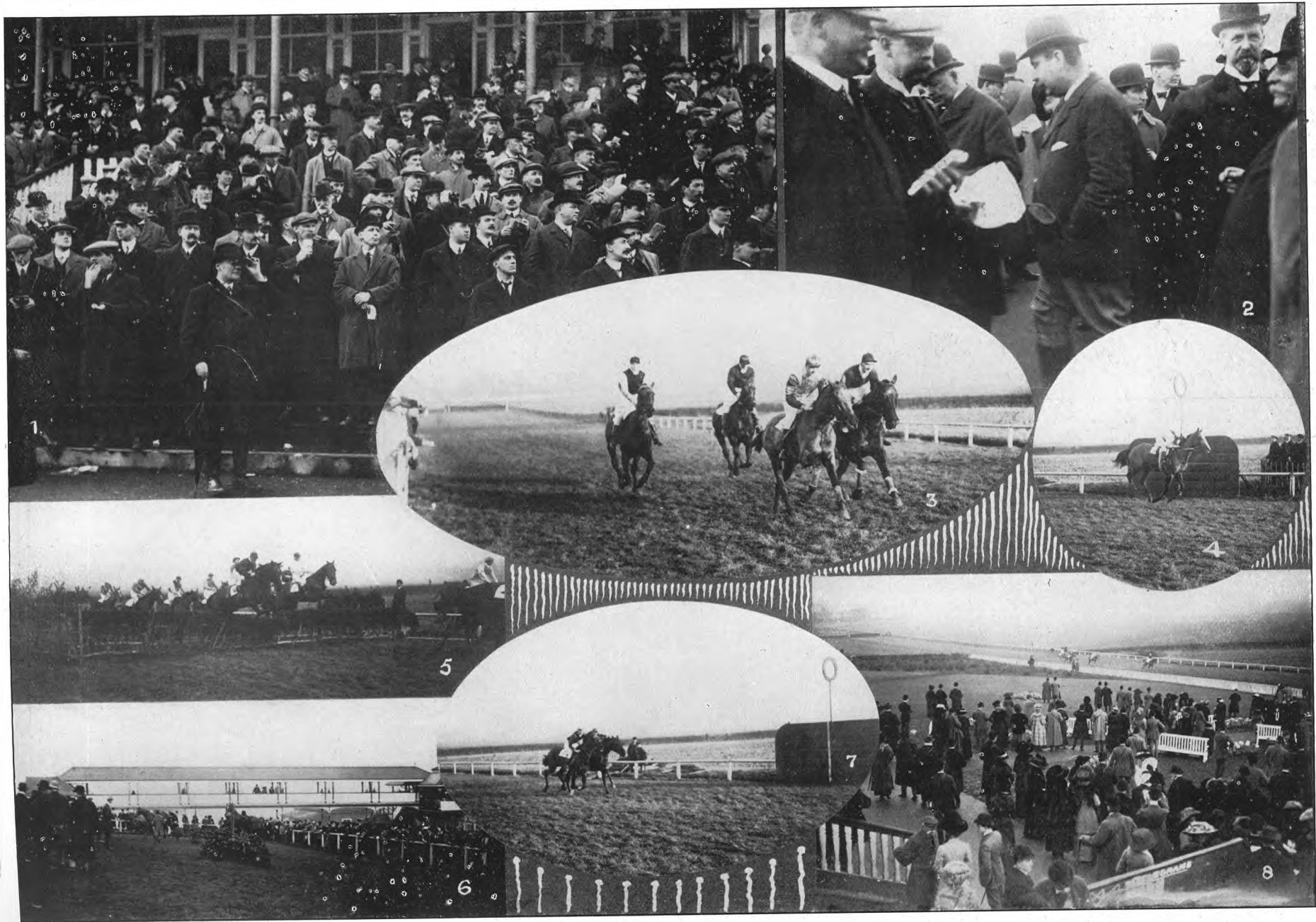
