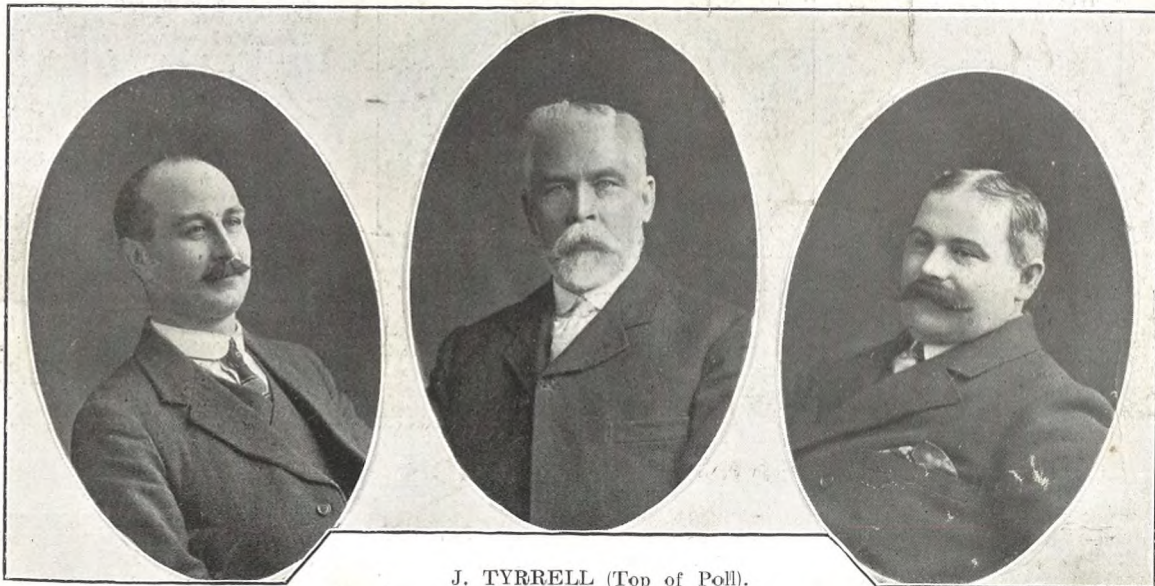

HOW THE MODERN LAUNDRY RUINS YOUR CLOTHES.

"There is one aspect of present-day expenses that is worth a woman's consideration," says a writer in "The Girl's Own Paper," "and that is the way we have increased our channels of domestic expenditure in comparison with the usages of our mother's generation. Take the little matter of the laundry-work, for instance. In the better-class families of the last generation the washing was done at home as a matter of course: the ladies of that day would have been horrified at the thought of their clothes being washed by no one knows what type of unsanitary garments from any sort of household, and then ironed and handled by some of the modern laundry-girls! Think of the wholesale destruction that is now the order of the day, coupled with a succession of articles missing, that goes on like a never-ending serial from time to time. Every housewife who goes through the weekly harrowment of the laundry hamper knows all I mean. Have you ever reckoned up the extent of the actual financial loss you incur by sending your things to a laundry? If not, let me suggest that you keep account for a few months of the cost of the things lost, damaged, or destroyed. In all probability you will arrive at a total that will surprise you."

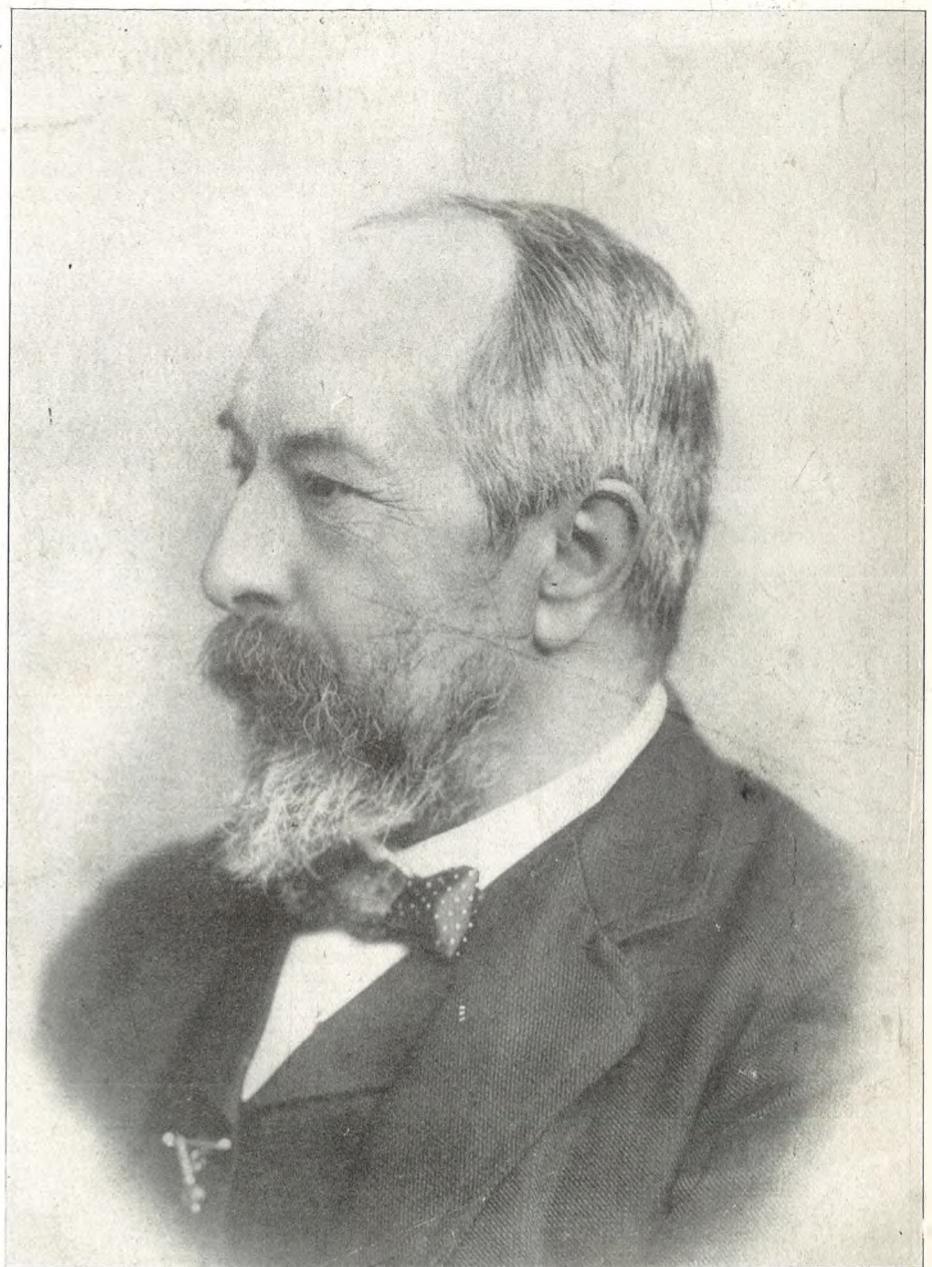

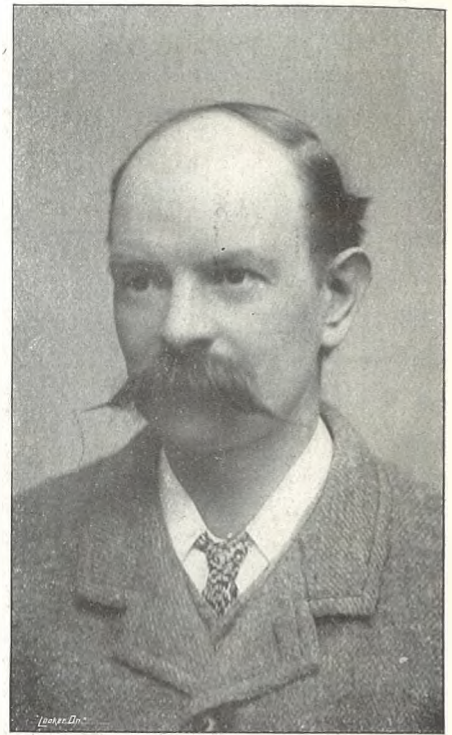

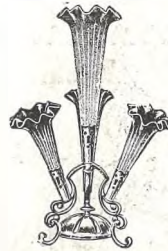

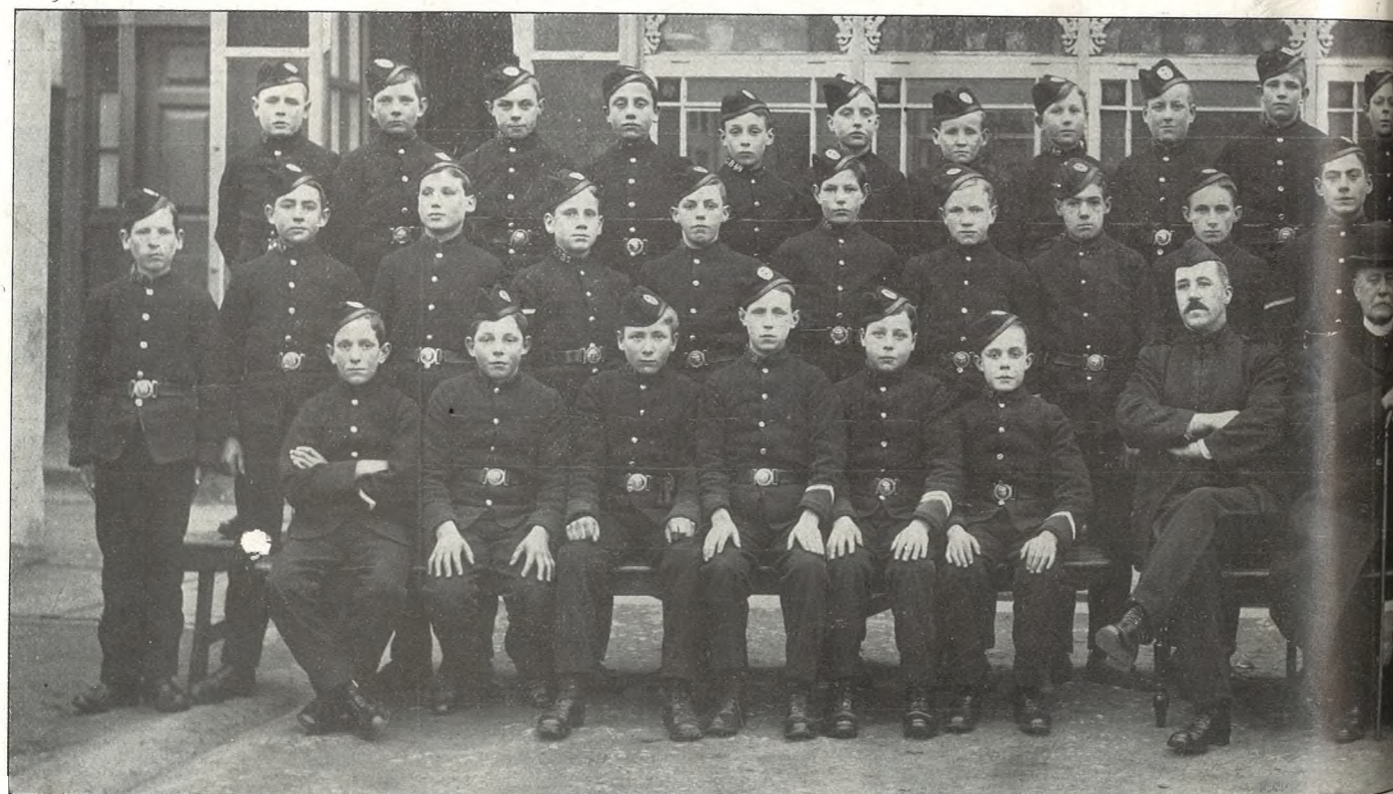

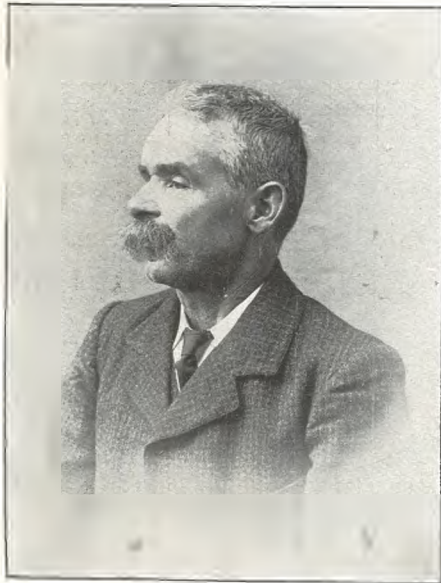

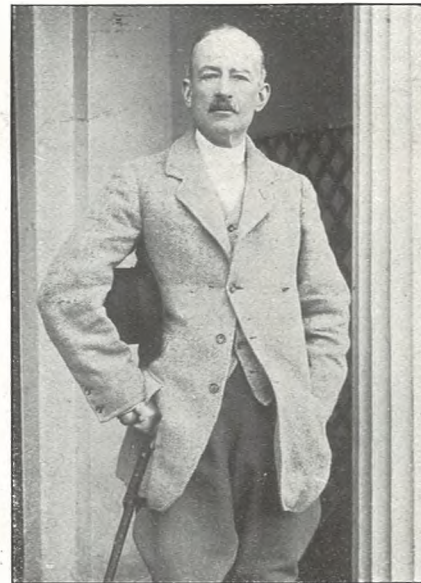

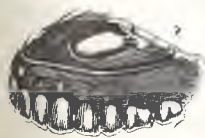

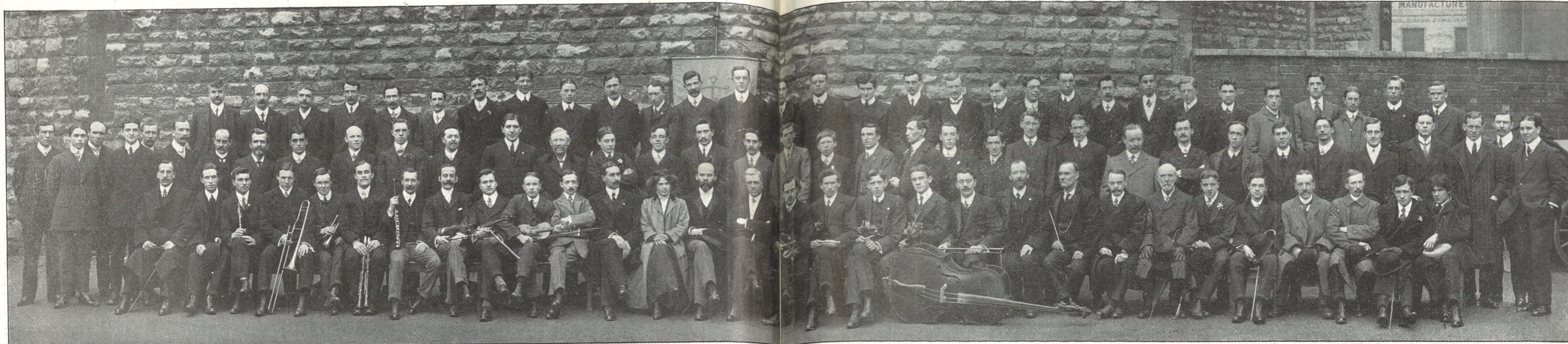

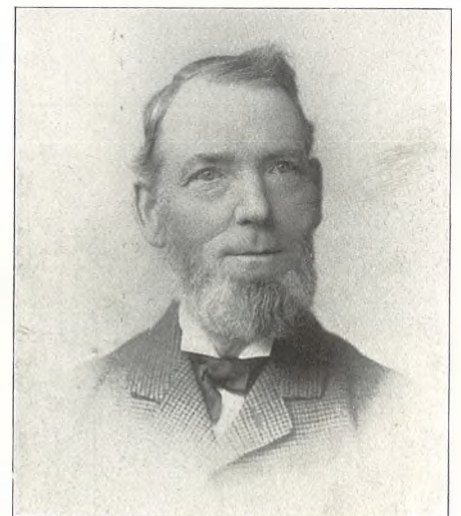

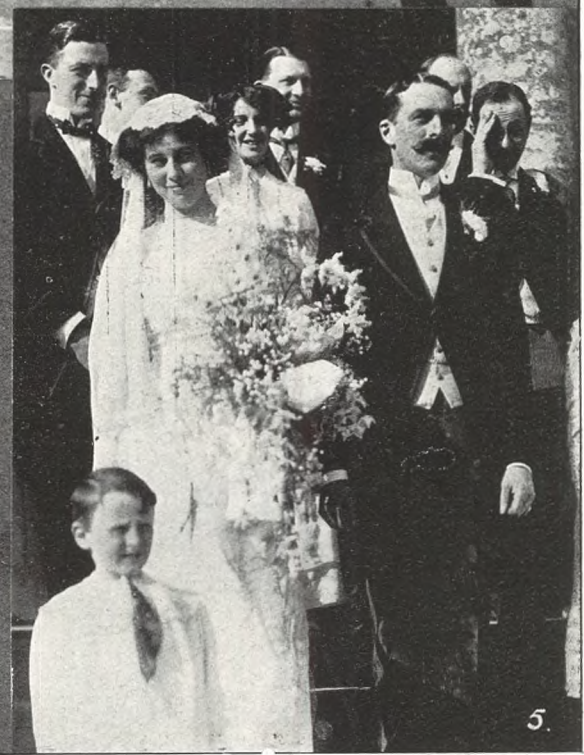
