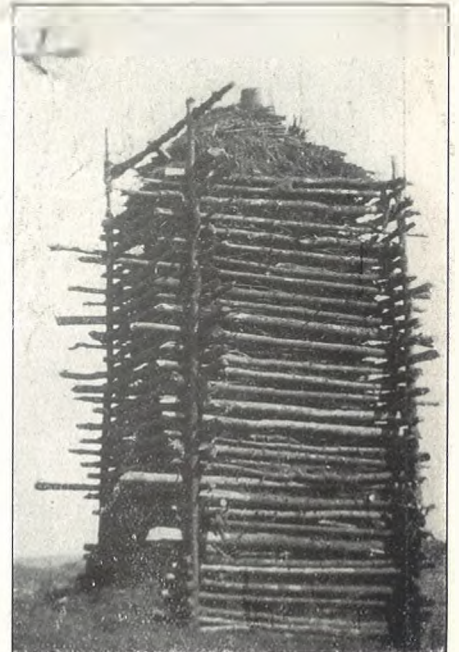

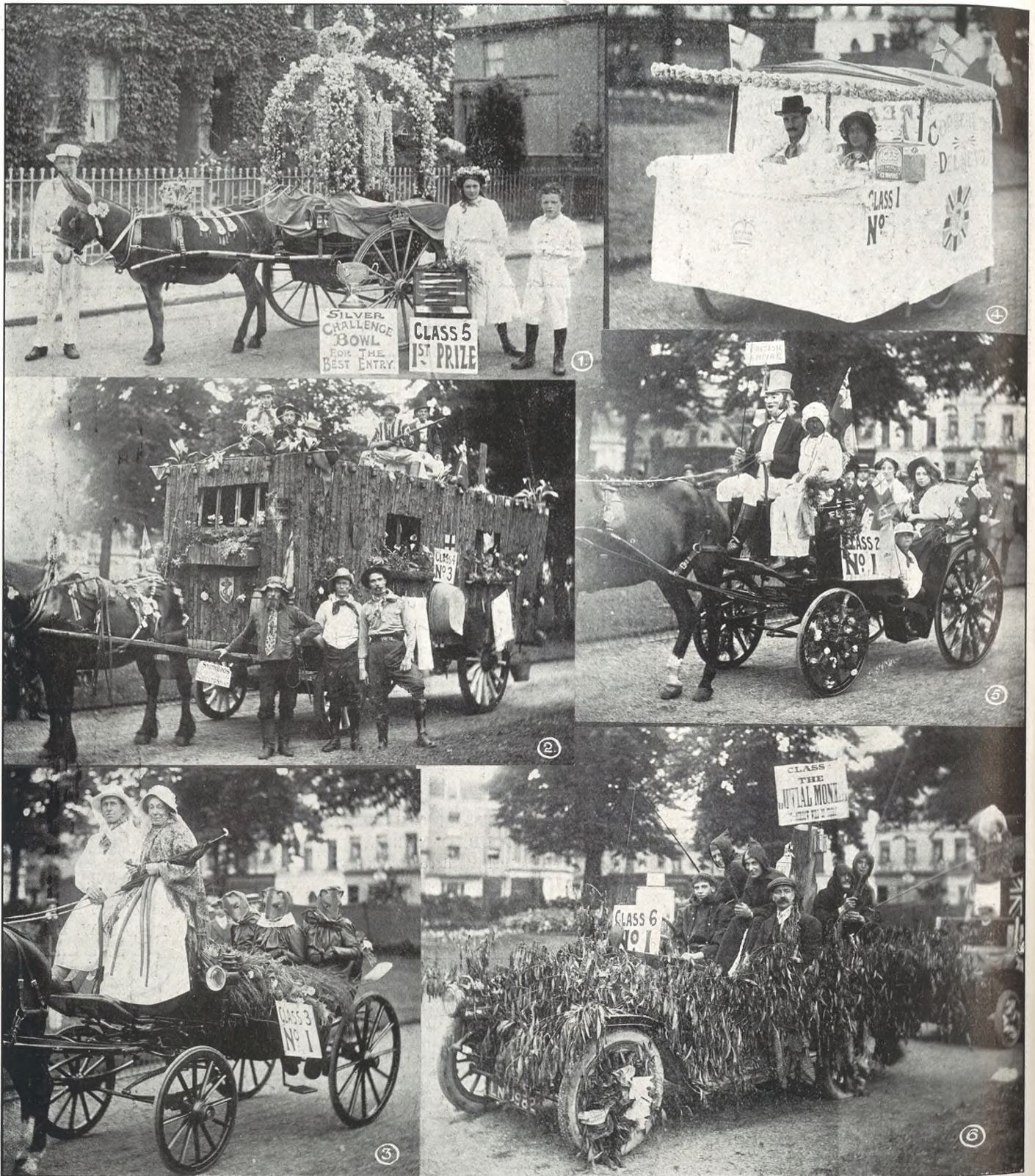


COWLEY BONFIRE.

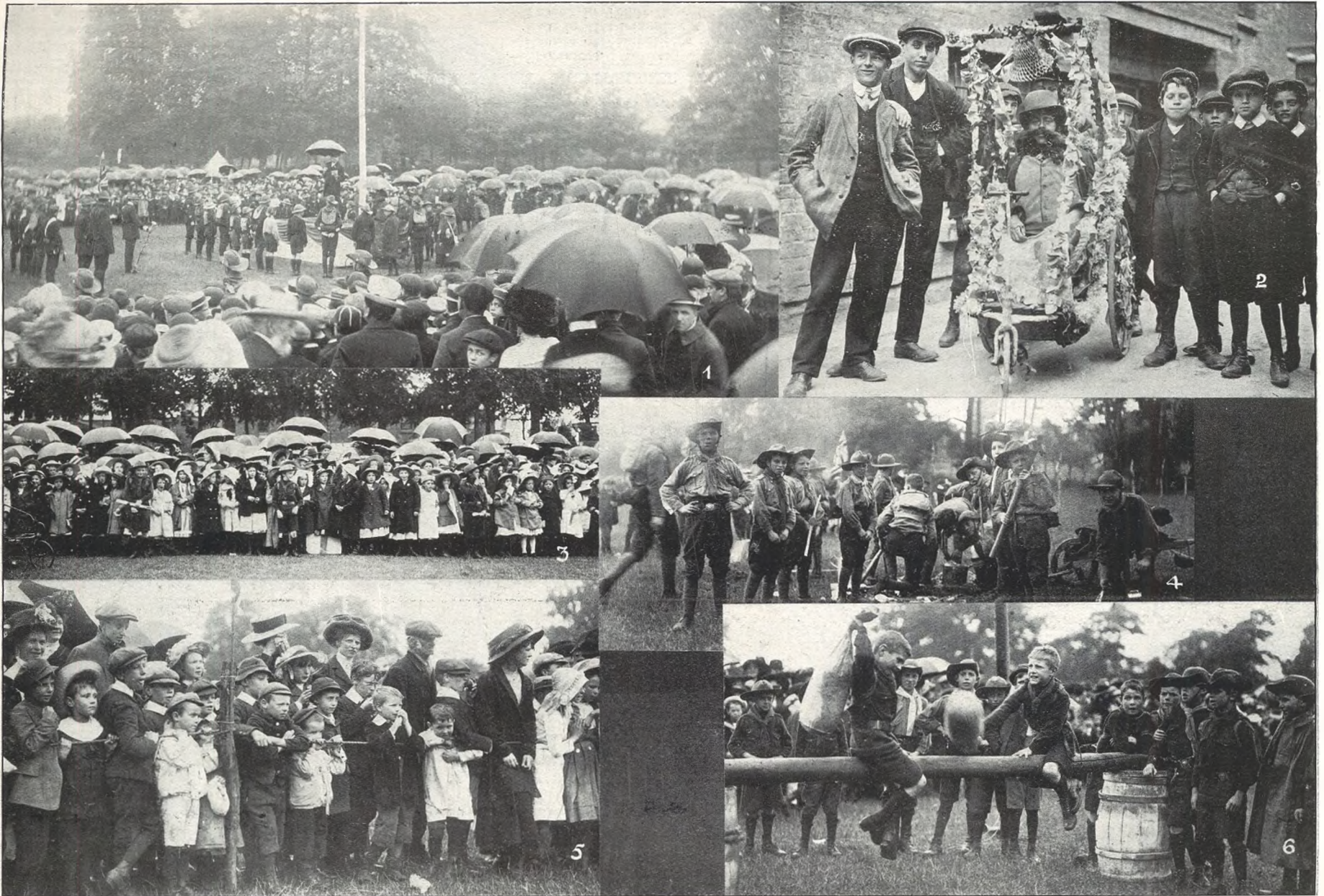

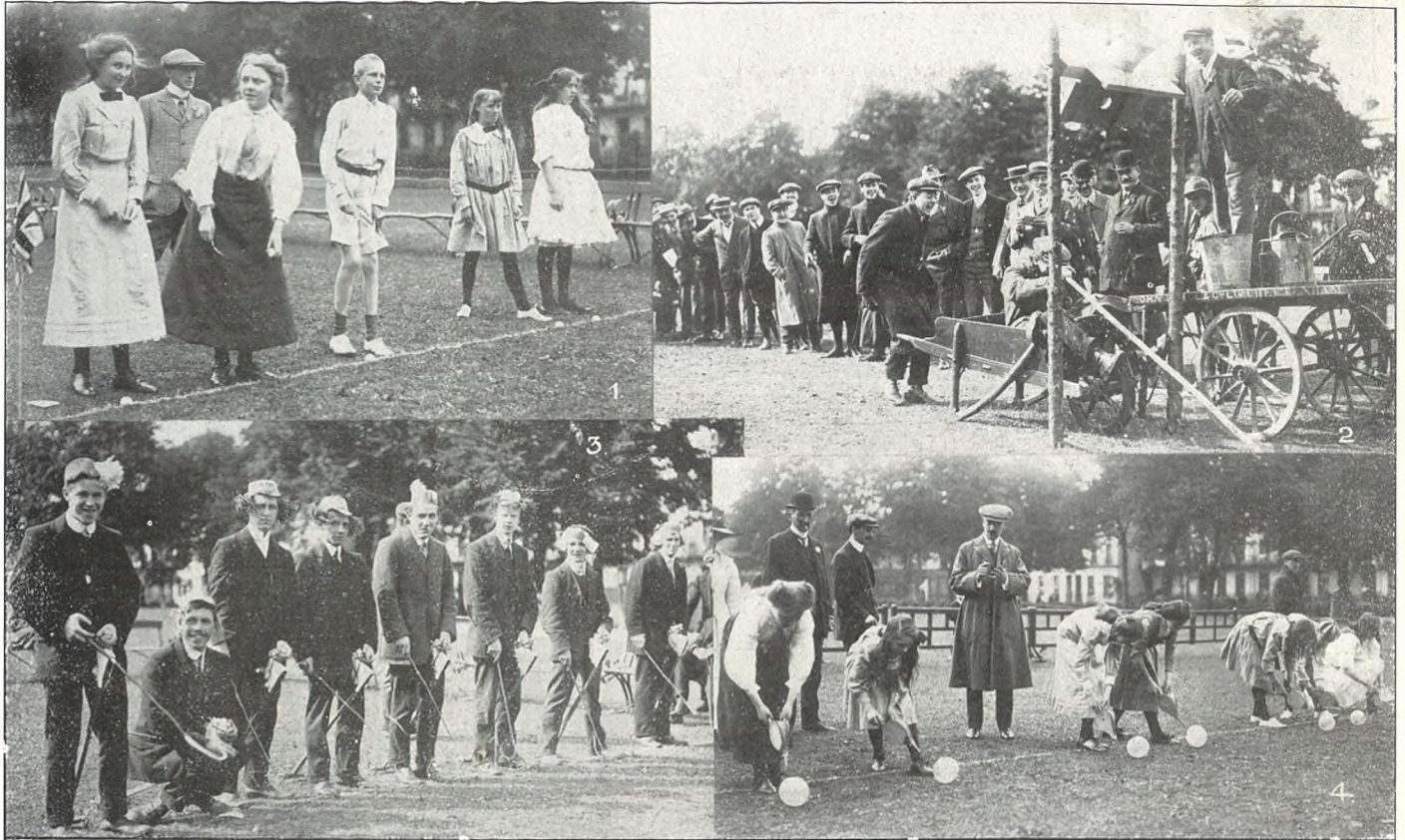

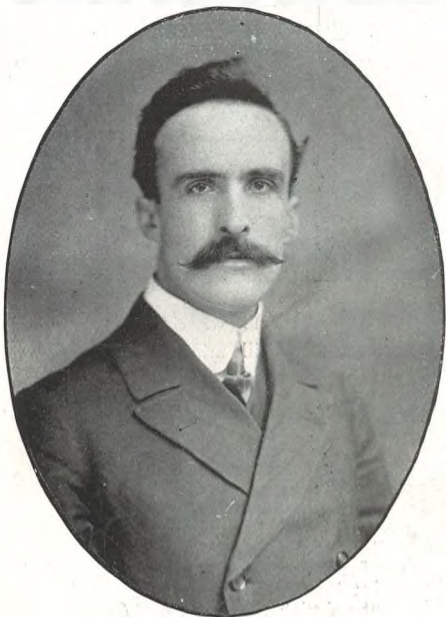

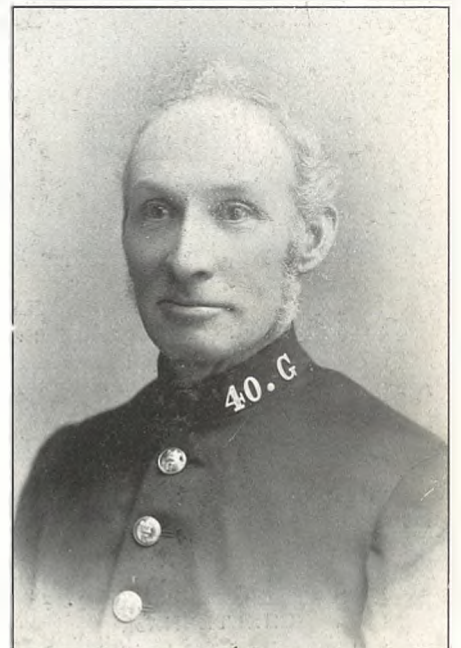

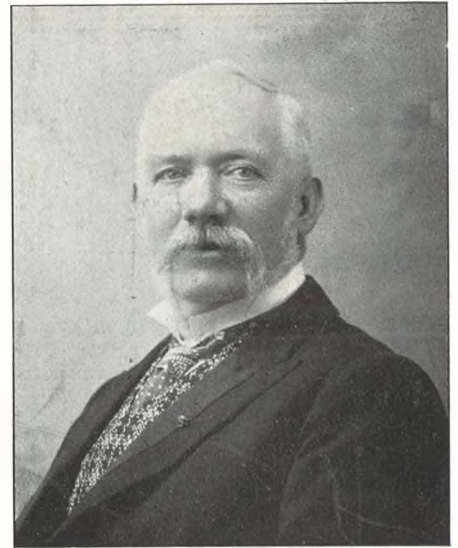

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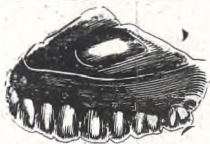

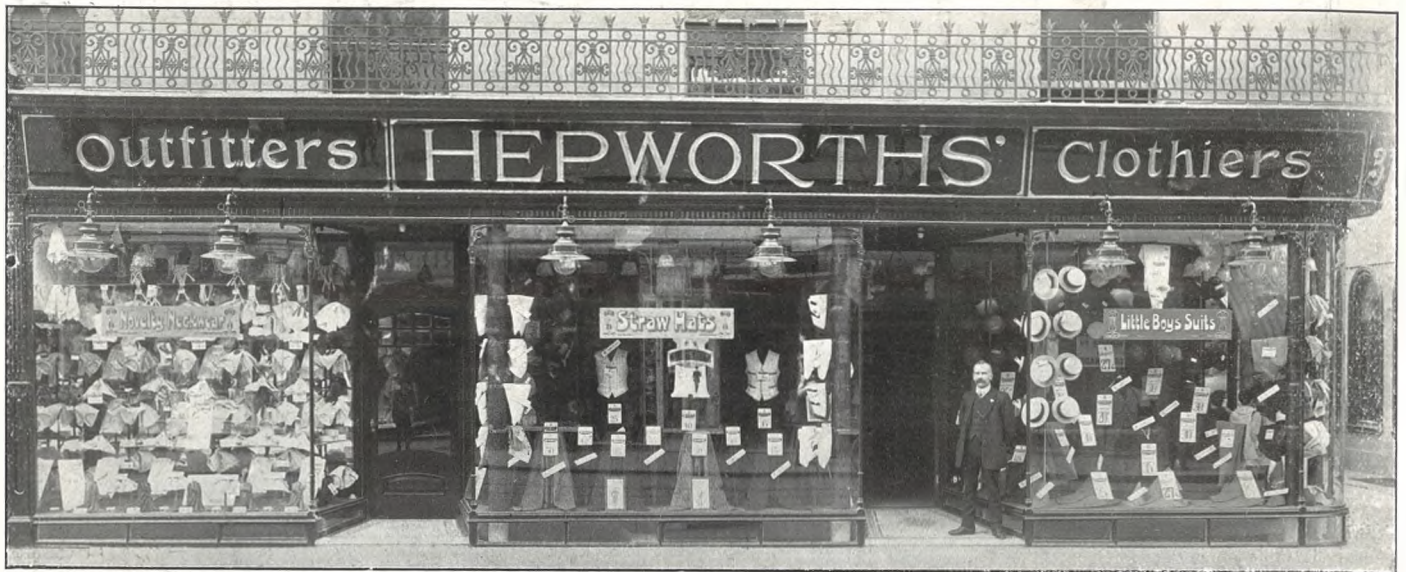

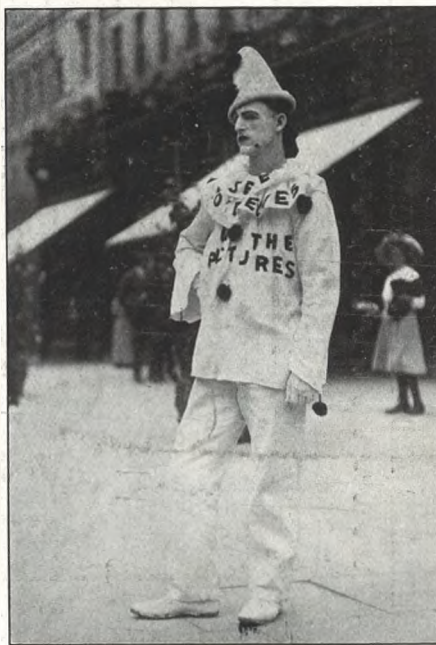


MISS MAY CAMBRAY,

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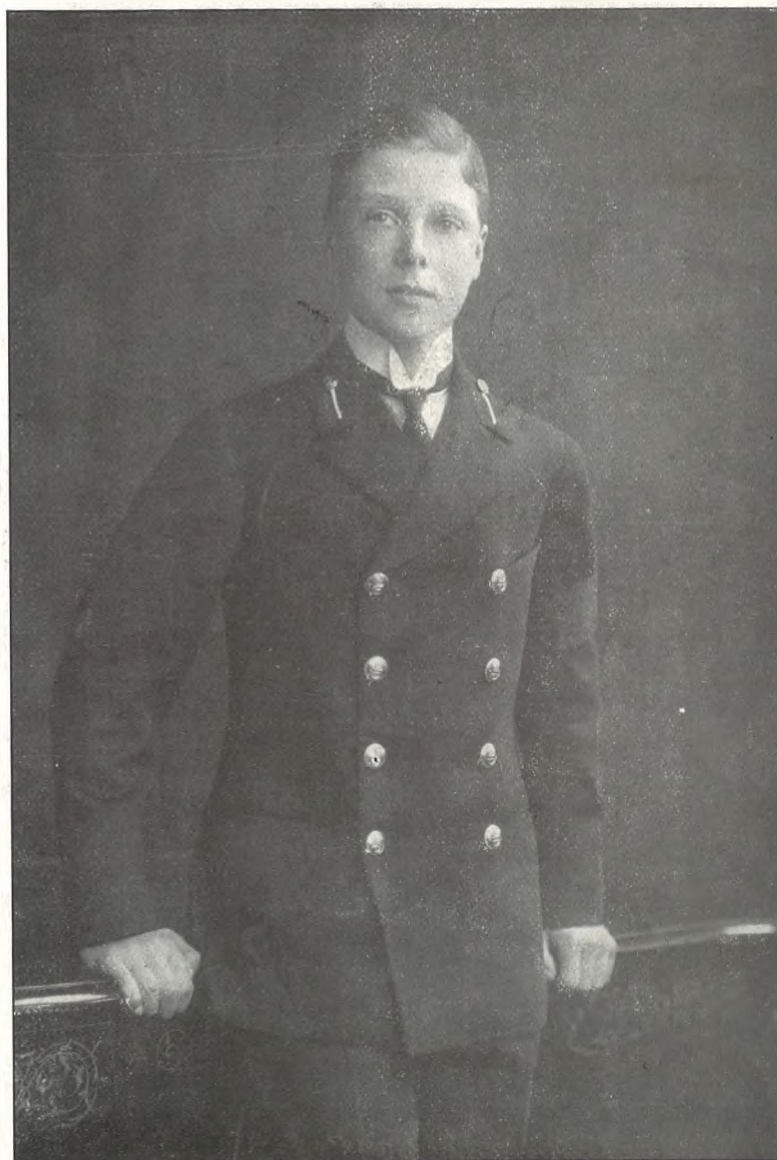

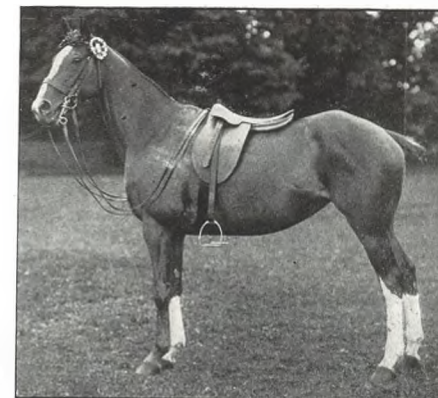

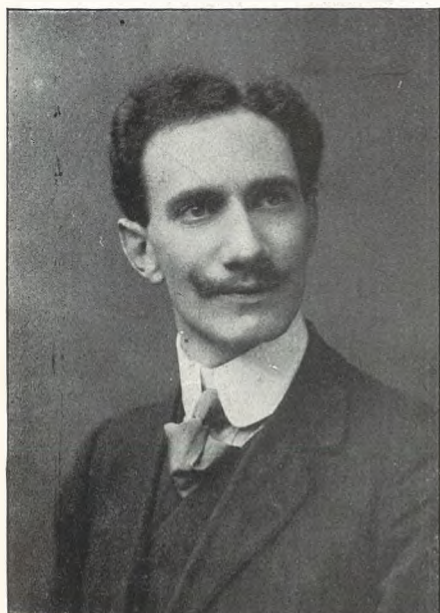

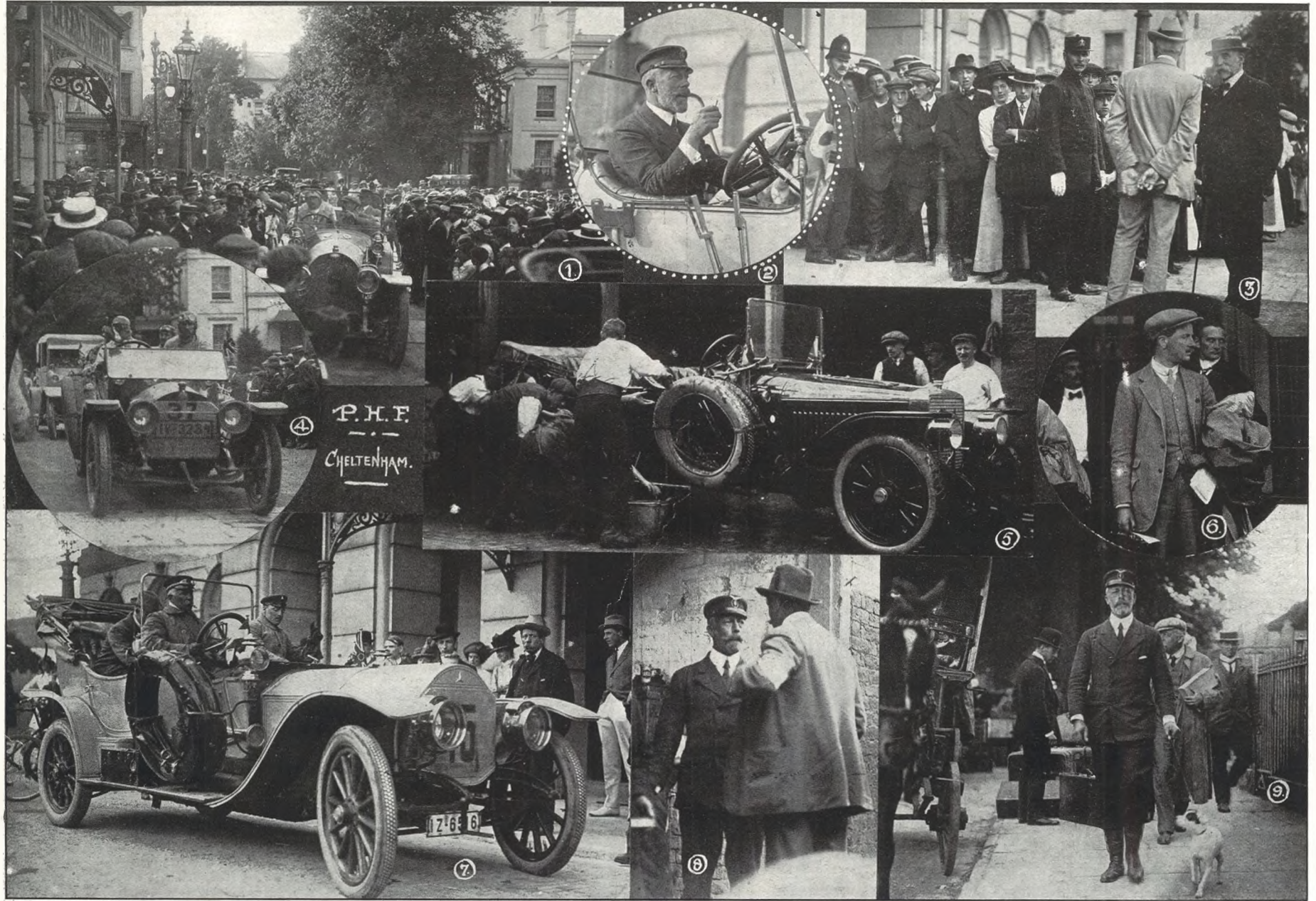

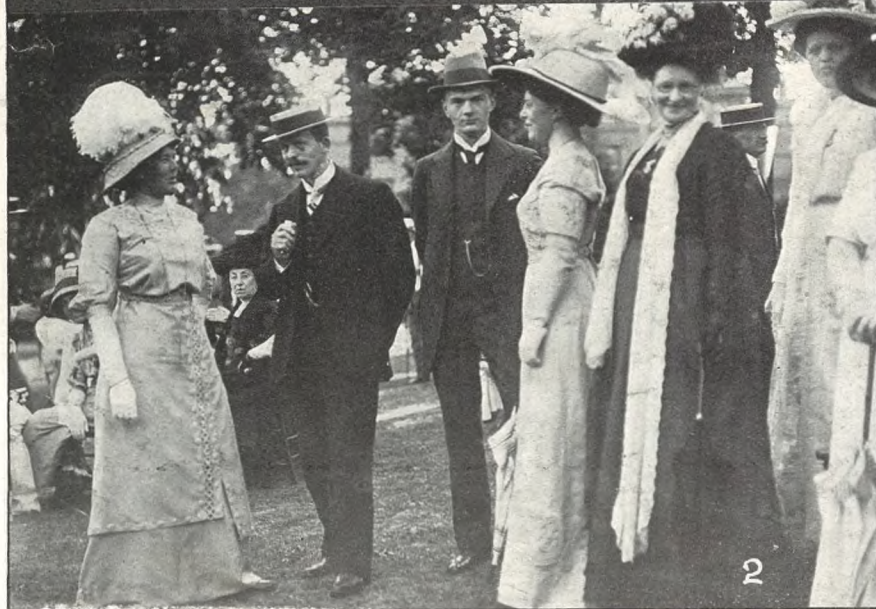

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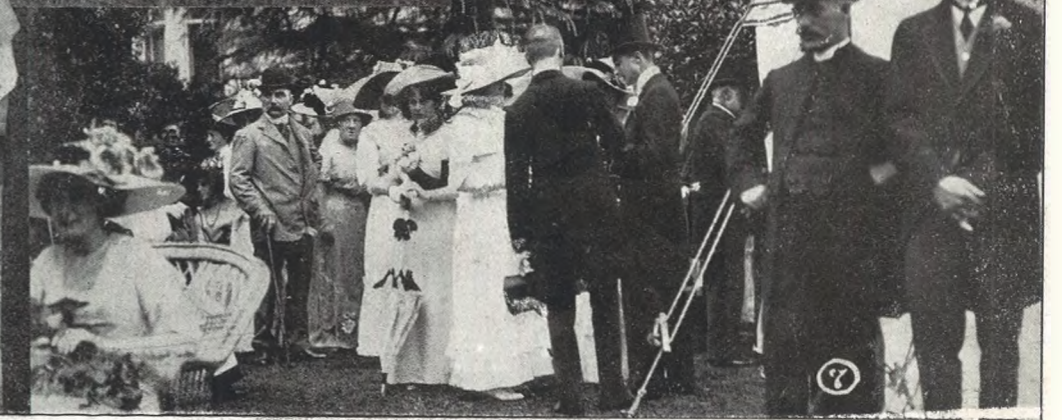
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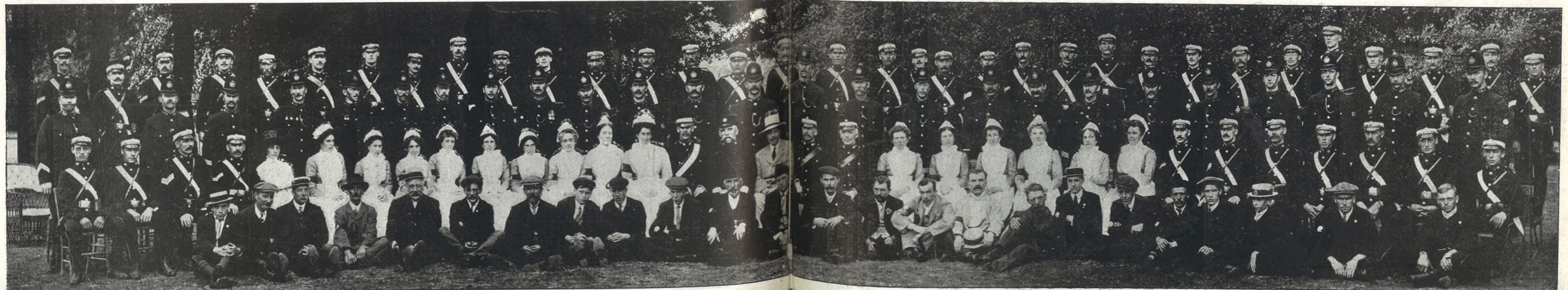

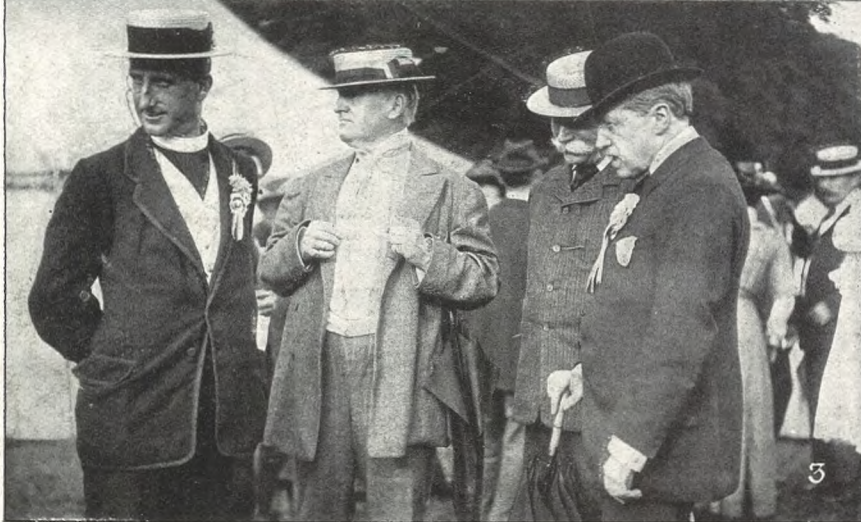
