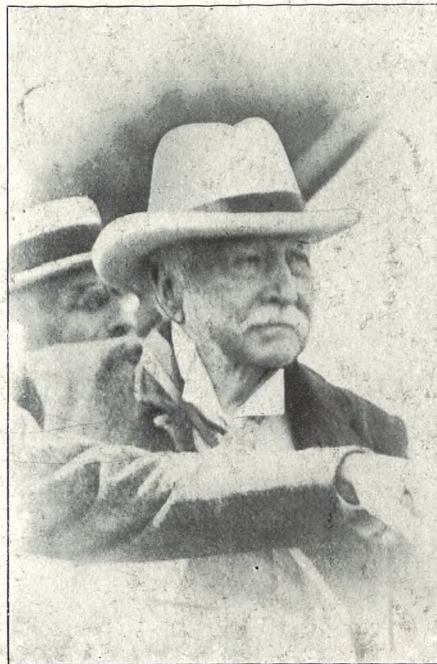

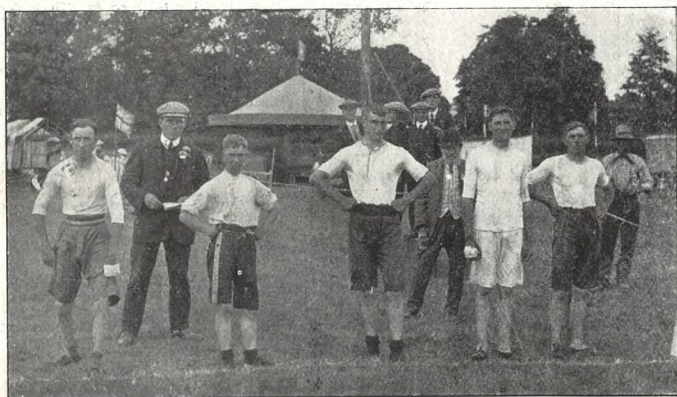

tered if you'll believe that you'll ever board one in the Strand in the place of a taxi, at Victoria in place of a train, or at Dover in place of a turbine.



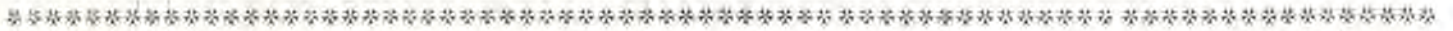

**LADY COLONELS.**

The three "Kaiser Parades" of the 11th and 2nd Corps of Guards, which will take place in August and September this year, will be remarkable for the large number of "lady" colonels who will appear in full uniform at the head of their regiments. The Empress will ride at the head of her regiment of Fusiliers before her husband and Commander-in-Chief at Altona, and at Stettin she will again lead the 82nd Cuirassiers, of both of which regiments she is honorary colonel. Queen Victoria of Sweden will probably appear in her uniform as colonel of the 24th Fusiliers, and at the same parade Elizabeth Eitel Friedrich will ride at the head of the 12th Dragoons before her imperial father-in-law. The Grand Duchess of Mecklenburg-Schwerin will also appear in uniform as chief of the Frankfurt-Grenadier Regiment.

The Dean and Chapter of Winchester Cathedral, Hampshire, have presented to W. R. Walker, a diver, a silver rose-bowl as a memento of his six years' work beneath the cathedral. Working in about 20ft. of water, Walker had to remove the peat and seal down the water in the gravel below the foundations by means of bags of concrete and concrete slabs. This work has been carried on in darkness, and those responsible for the preservation scheme have had to trust entirely to the conscientiousness and skill of the diver, as they could not inspect the work. The scheme, which has cost over £100,000, is now nearly completed.

The United States Senate on Tuesday passed the Bill known as the Farmers' Free List, which admits free of duty a hundred commodities chiefly used by the agricultural population. Its passage by the Lower House also is regarded as certain.

The governors of Raines Foundation are building a new school in Stepney, at a cost of £40,000. This foundation is a very ancient one, and until recent years one of its features was the annual distribution of marriage dowries to old school girls.

One applicant at Acton Police-court on Tuesday said that she had twelve children, and the woman who followed her into the witness-box informed the Bench that she had fifteen.

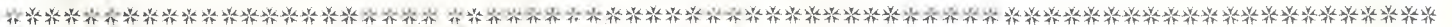

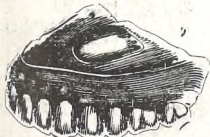

**M.P.'S AND PAPER-KNIVES.**

A saving of £110,000 in departmental expenses has been effected in four years by the revising branch of the Stationery Office, states the report, issued on Tuesday, of the Select Committee on publications and reports of parliamentary debates.

On one Admiralty form alone £280 was saved by its publication in revised form. Dealing with influences making for economy, the report says: "No one outside an office can prevent a clerk sending, as was described by a member of the Committee, a couple of lines on a foolscap sheet enclosed in a full-sized foolscap envelope."

"Even the House of Commons," adds the report, "might itself be expected to be satisfied with the style of paper-knife which is good enough for the House of Lords."

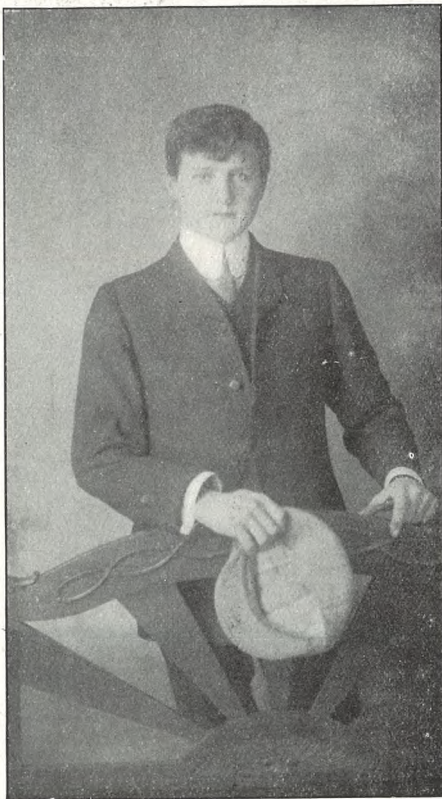

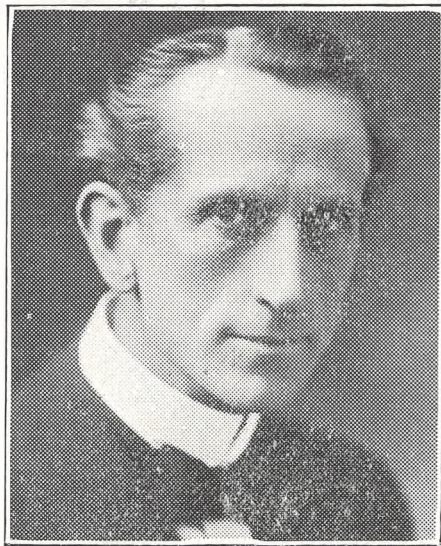

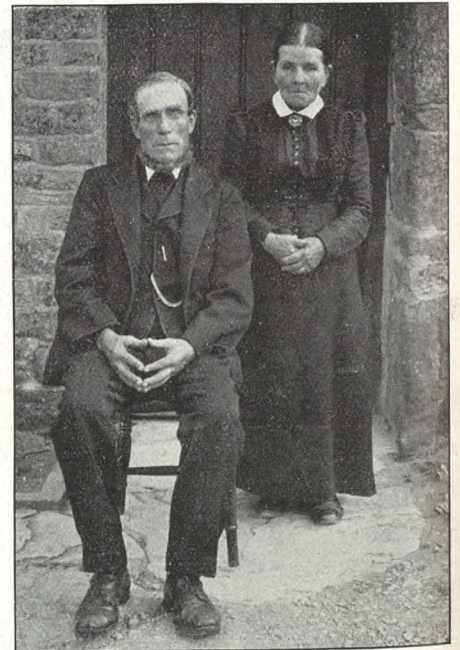
