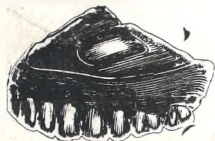

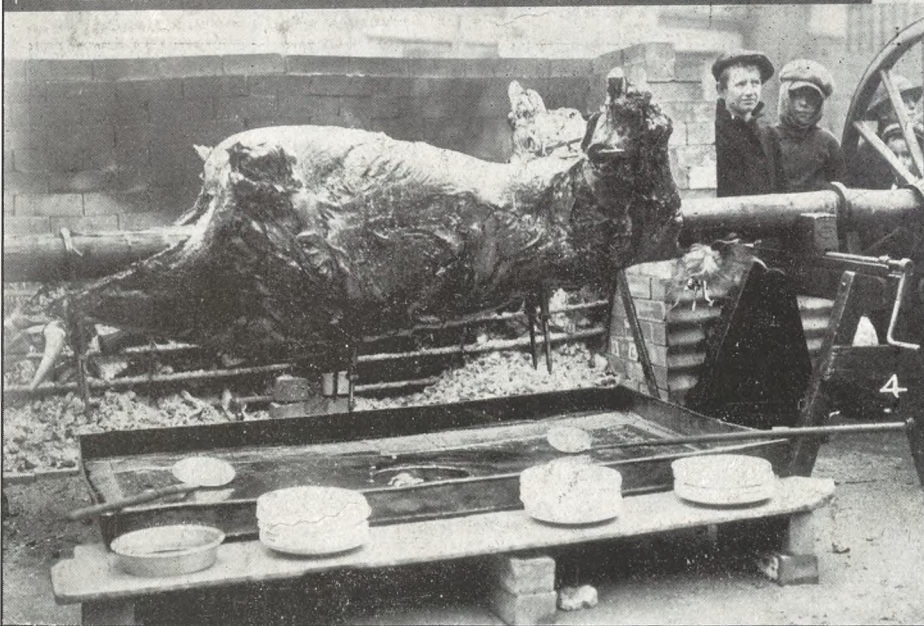

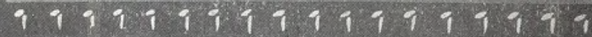
STOW FAIR

and was about 65 years of age.

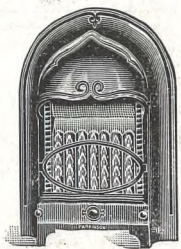

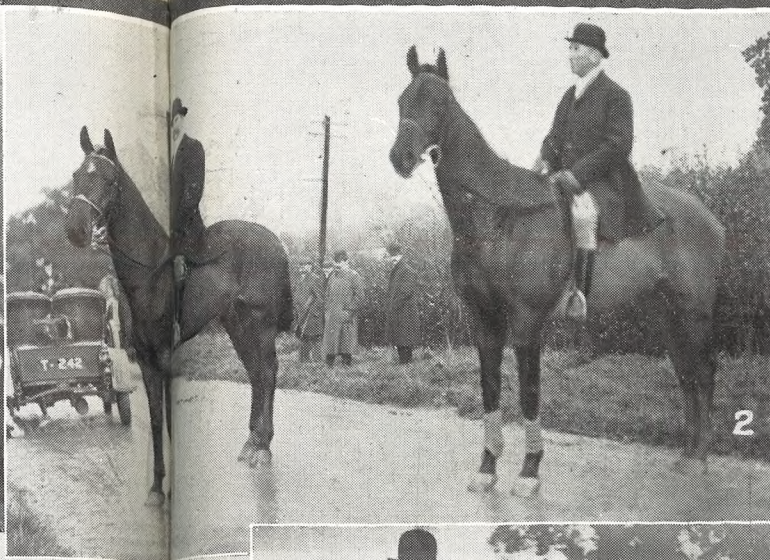

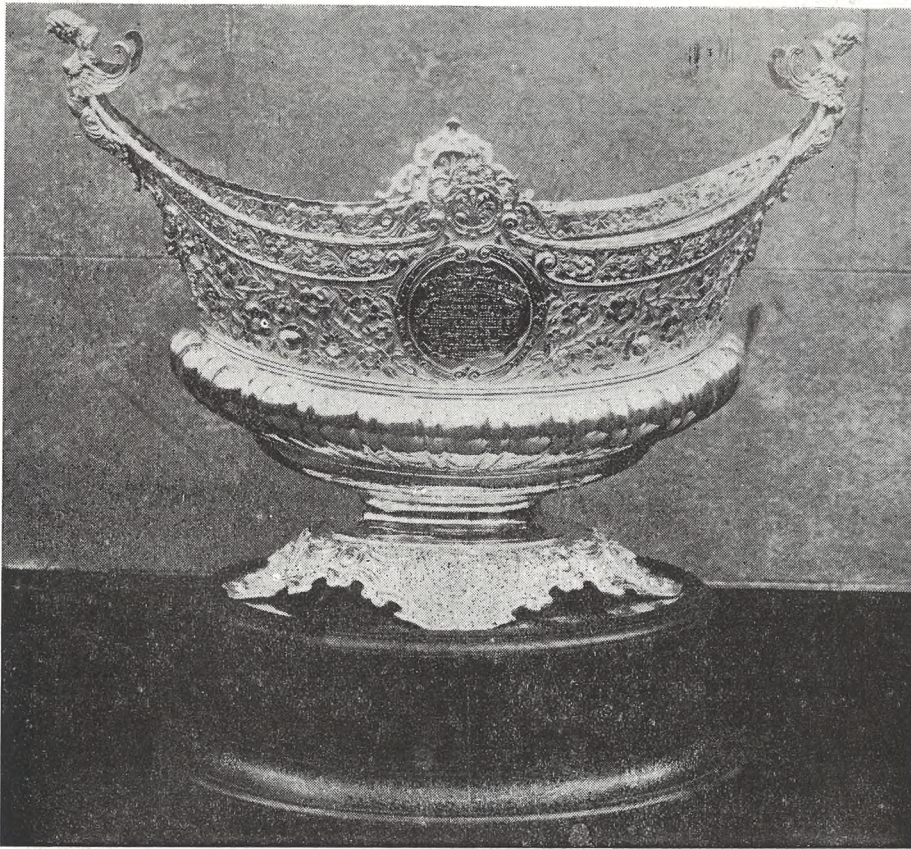

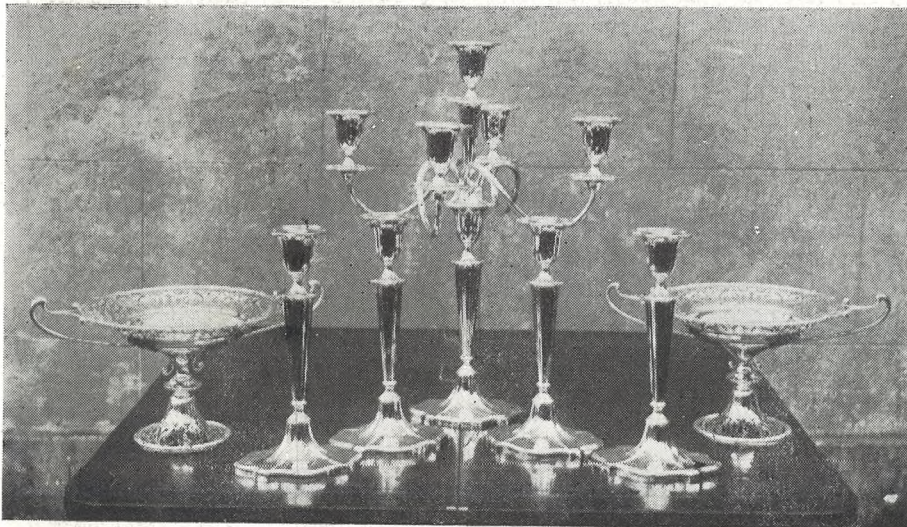

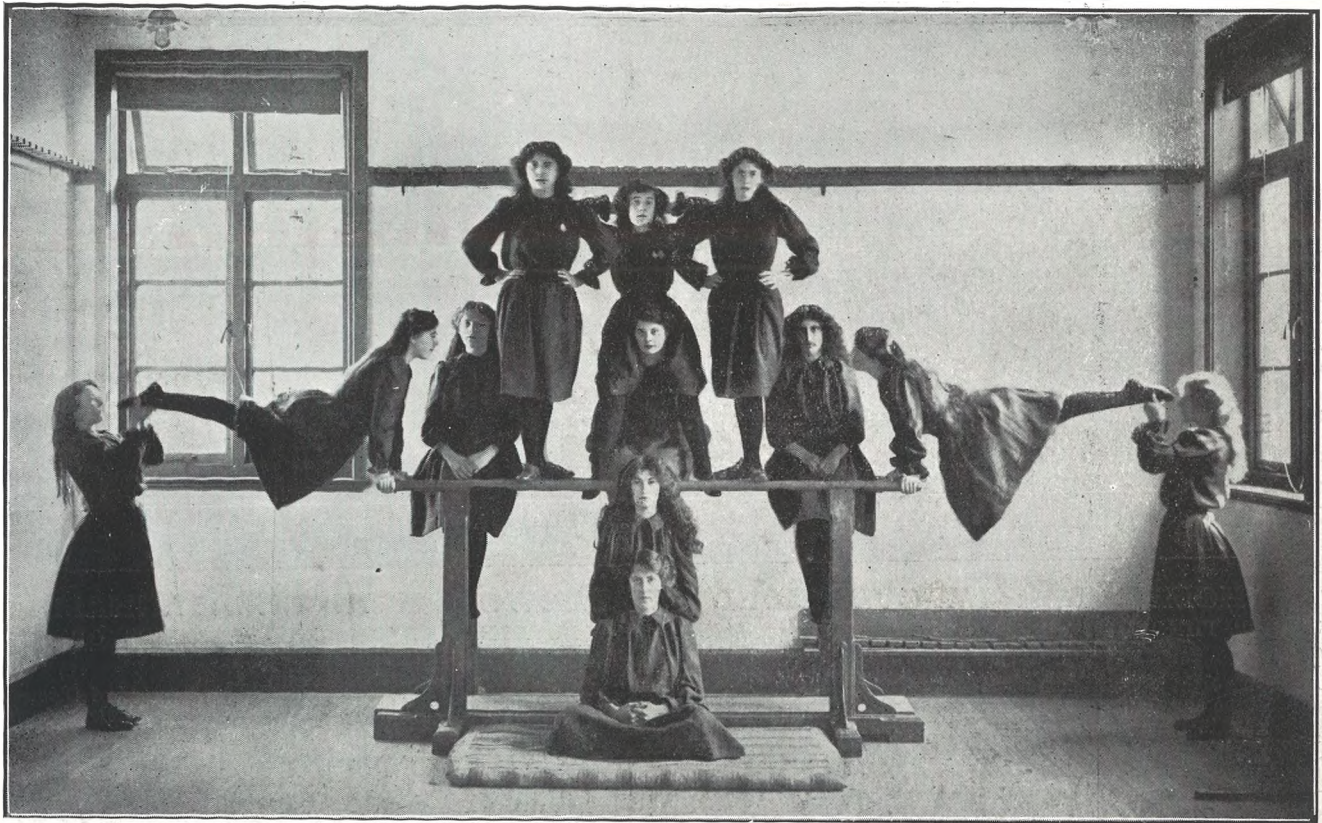

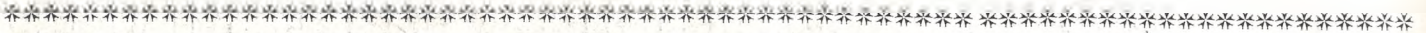

HOMES FOR IMPOVERISHED GENTLEWOMEN IN CHELTENHAM.

UNDER THE WILL OF A CLIFTON GENTLEMAN NAMED BUCKLE, THE FIRST OF A SERIES OF HOMES HAS BEEN BUILT ON THE MOOREND ESTATE, CHELTENHAM.

There are eight houses finished, as shown in photograph, one being already occupied. They are splendidly constructed of Cleeve Hill stone and Dantzic oak by Messrs. A. C. Billings and Sons, Cheltenham, the architect being Mr. J. M. Pizey, of Bristol. They cost to build about £5,000. Two other wings will be built, forming a quadrangle, to complete the scheme.

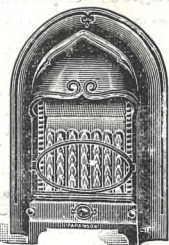

DEMOCRACY AND THE CHURCH.

The modern mind is democratic; many of the Churches are aristocratic. The modern mind must have liberty of thought and movement, equality of opportunity for service, and brotherhood in fact and not in terms. Many of the Churches are built on the bases of subjection to the authority of creeds, not on freedom and independence of judgment. They encourage the monopoly of the priests, and refuse equality of opportunity. They encourage caste, and maintain the divisive ideas and forces of the world within the Church. In a word, the modern mind is creating a modern Church, largely outside the statistics of the Churches, though also to a real extent within those Churches whose organisations are flexible and whose conditions of fellowship are vital, resting on religious experience and fullest liberty.— "Everybody's Weekly."

THE BUSINESS WOMAN AND MARRIAGE.

That there is a revolt against marriage, and that it is a feminine revolt, is an acclaimed fact (says "Everybody's Weekly"). It is, however, a sectional revolt, and is practically confined to that comparatively limited class of women who compete with men in the teaching and commercial worlds, or who have risen by a preferment in other circles to an independent position, and are able to maintain themselves in that position by their own efforts.

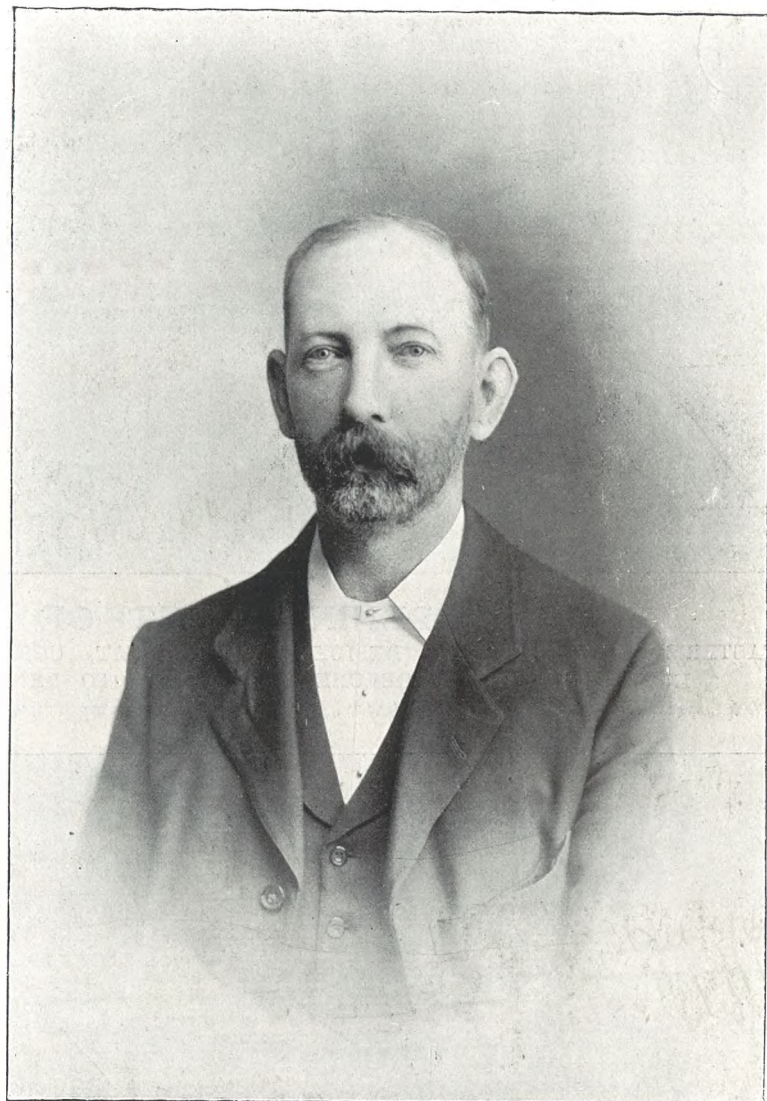

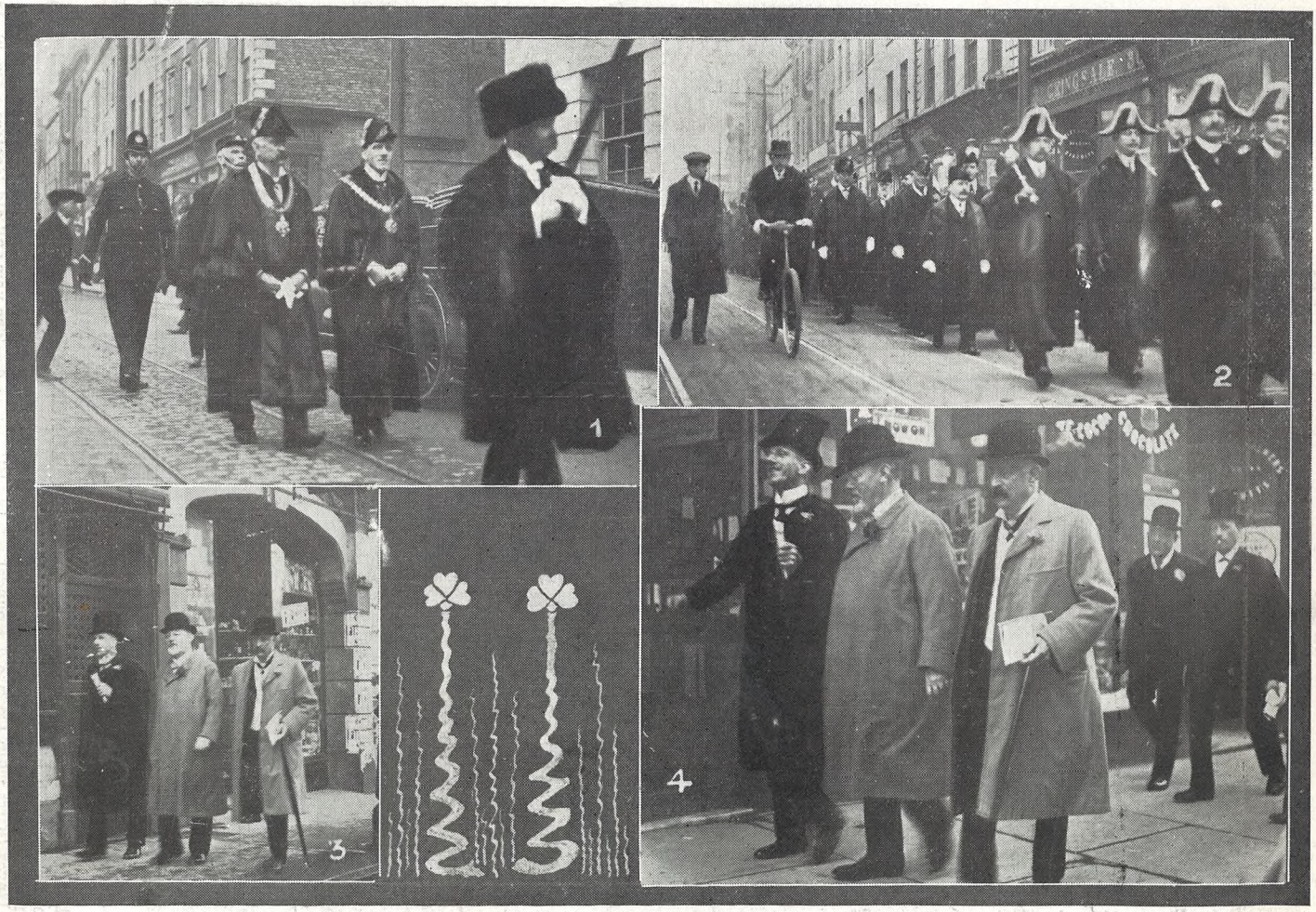

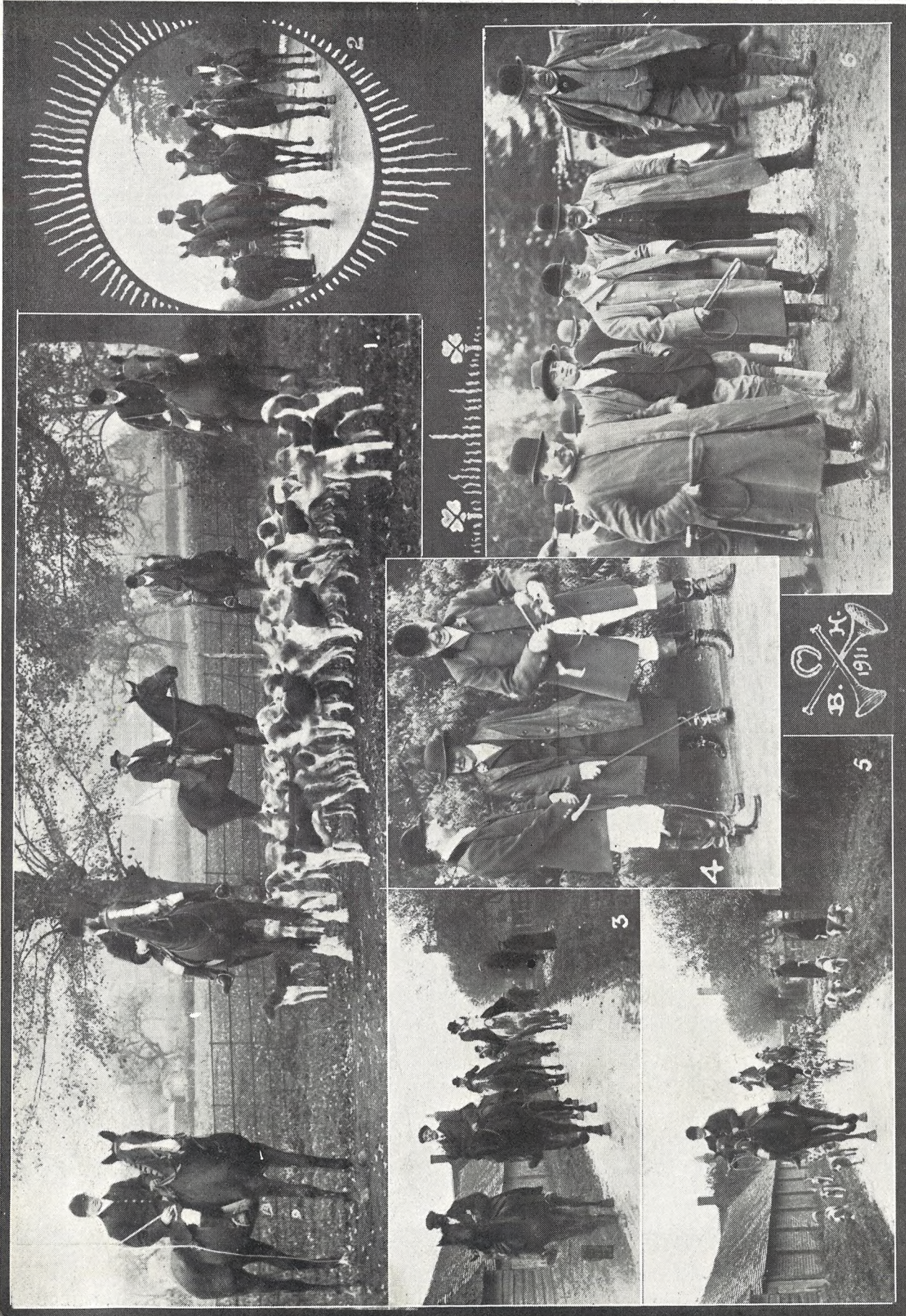

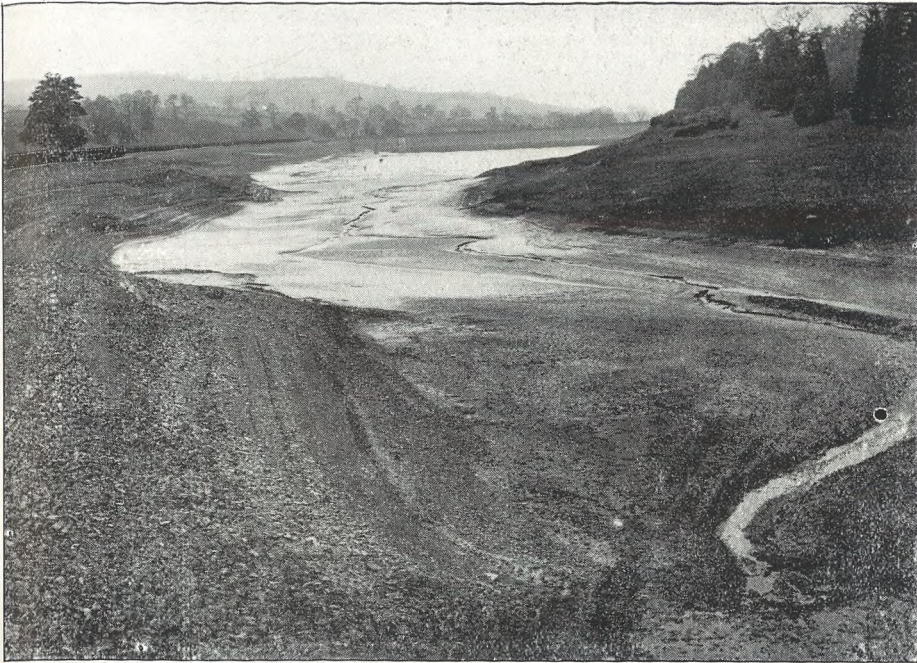

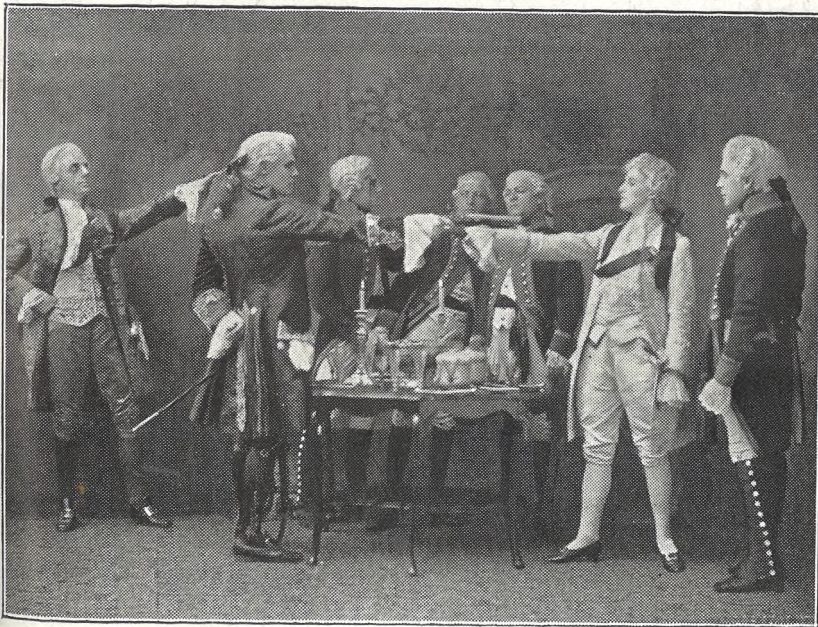

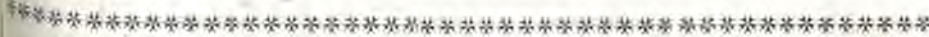

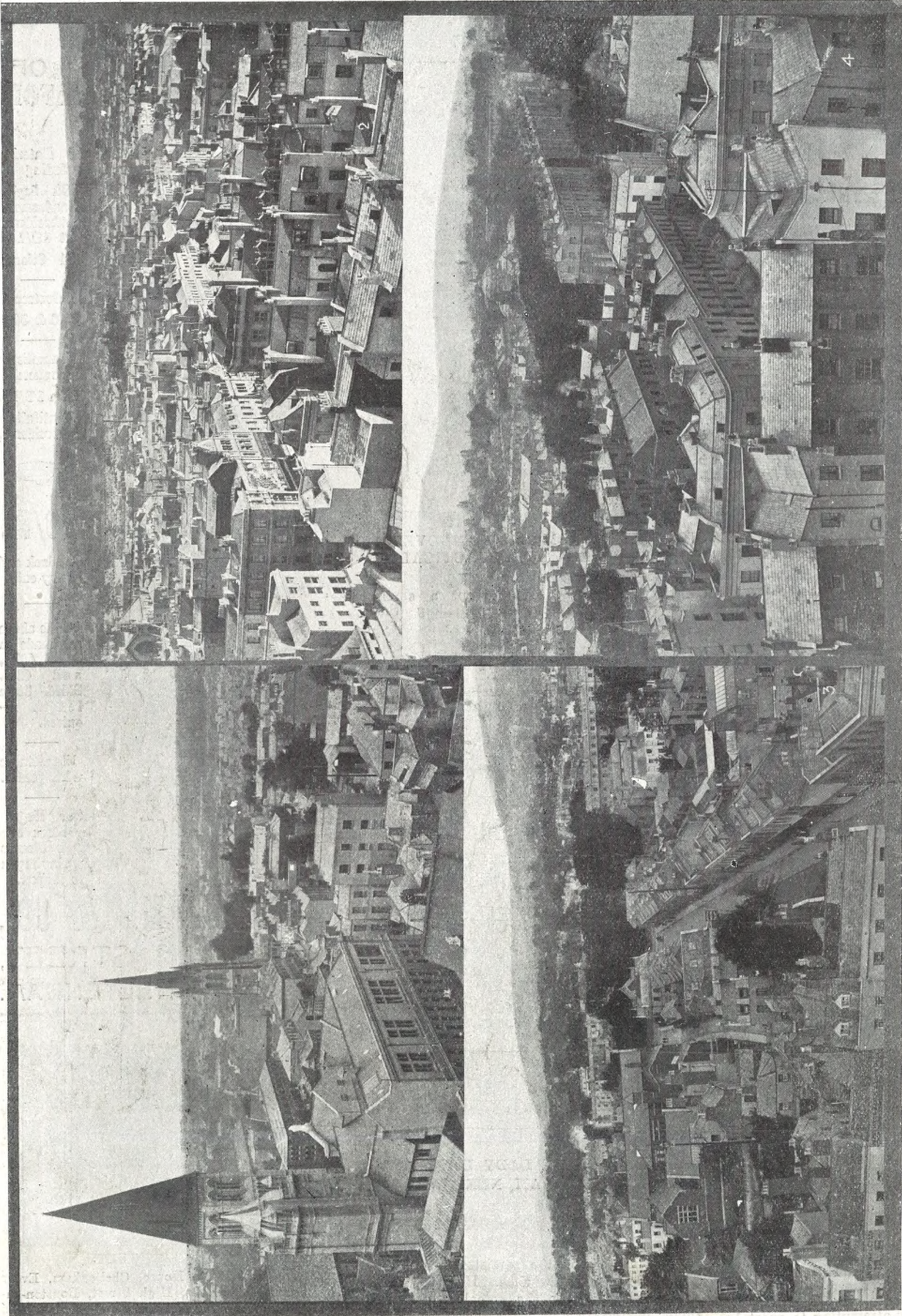

Seizing the opportunity of the repairs to the steeple recently carried on, our photographer ascended the tower and took these views—one from each of the cardinal points of the compass. Declining an invitation to be slung in a cradle to the top exterior platform, he ascended inside and took the pictures from each of the four louvre windows near the top. The steeple of the church has six platforms above the belfry. First is the bell chamber, where a transomation is now taking place, and where a new and ingenious scheme of strengthening the tower with concrete and iron tie-rods has been tried. Then up a fixed ladder to the clock chamber; and after that up loose ladders, through ever-narrowing and darker chambers to the top platform. No. 1 is looking West, No. 2 East, No. 3 North, and No. 4 South.

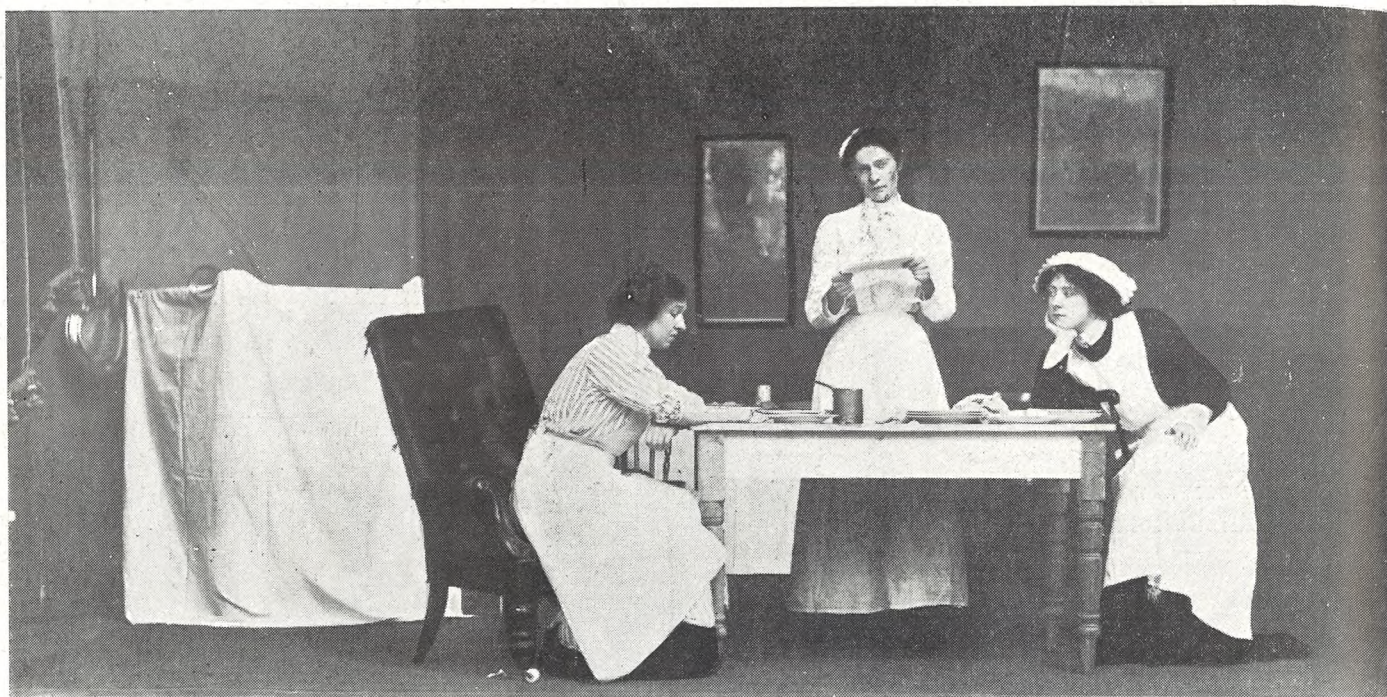

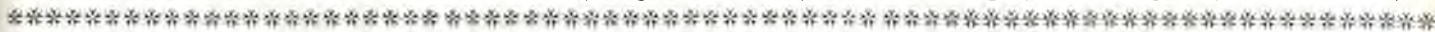

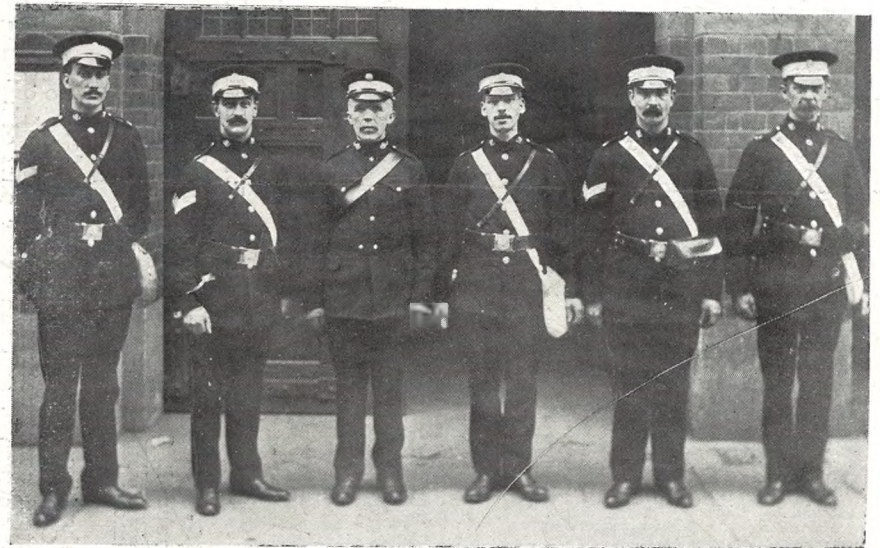

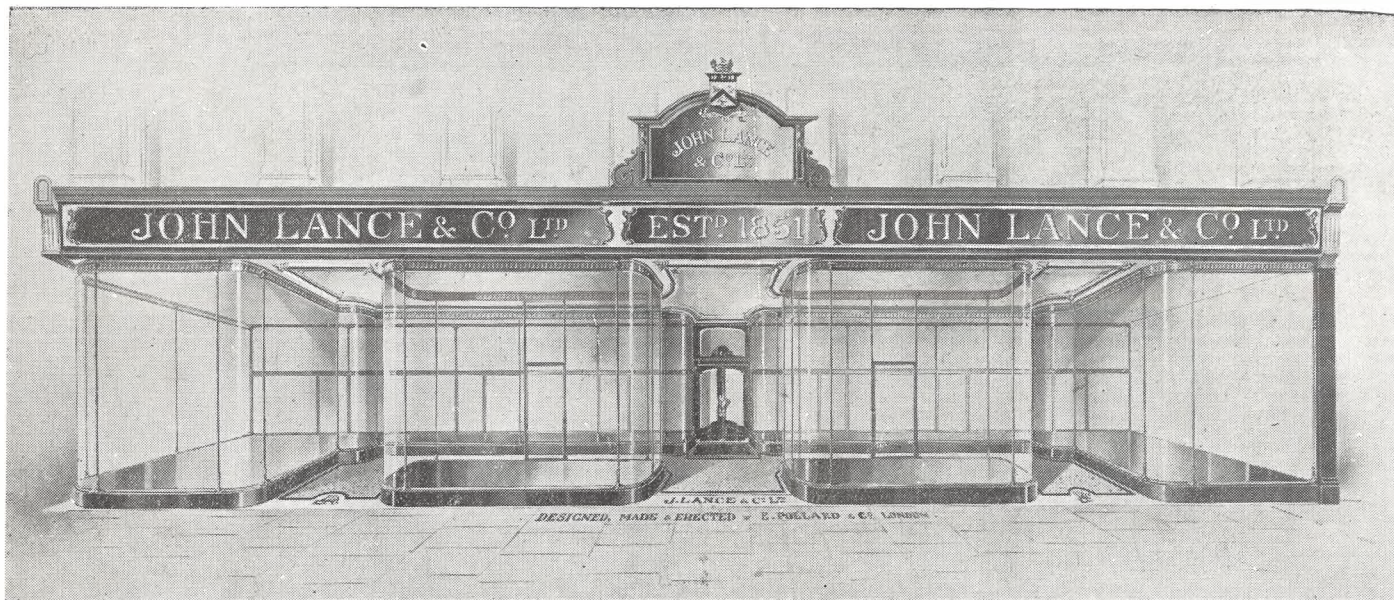

BUSINESS ENTERPRISE IN CHELTENHAM.

Messrs. John Lance & Co's New Shop Front in the High Street.

Messrs. Lance & Co., Ltd., the well-known Drapers, of High Street, have within the past few weeks completely transformed the front of their establishment, and, as shown above, now possess one of the largest and most beautiful of the many fine shop fronts in the Garden Town, or, indeed, in the West of England.

The new shop fronts have been planned, designed, and carried out by Messrs. E. Pollard & Co., "The" Shop Fitters, 29 Clerkenwell Road, London, E.C. To obtain the necessary height for the shop fronts a difficult scheme of steel construction has been carried out by the same contractors, the front portion of shops being entirely re-constructed, and the upper part of building carried on new steel columns and girders, which will form the basis of a new building in due course.

The shop fronts have been scientifically planned on the "island" principle, and are undoubtedly the "very latest" in drapery fronts. The frontage to street is 60 feet only, but the clever arrangement of the windows has provided a total glass frontage of 148 feet, giving ample accommodation for effective display by all departments, while the spacious corridors have been arranged with due regard to customers' comfort.

The base of shop fronts is of highly polished emerald pearl granite, forming a splendid and lasting foundation for the handsome bronze-metal shop fronts, with their slender bars springing from tastefully designed bases, and terminating in metal caps, all in heavy cast bronze metal.

All angles of fronts have been rounded off, and the glazing has been carried out with selected squares of plate glass of imposing height.

The floors to entrances and corridors are laid with marble Terazzo mosaic, with white marble strips at entrances, inlaid with leaded letters. The ceilings are of fibrous plaster, with decorative mouldings.

A bold central entrance, with double doors, forms the main road to the interior.

A plate-glass fascia above shop fronts effectively displays the Company's name, and the fact that this business was established in 1851.

The installation of these shop fronts is indeed a fitting celebration of the Diamond Jubilee of this business.

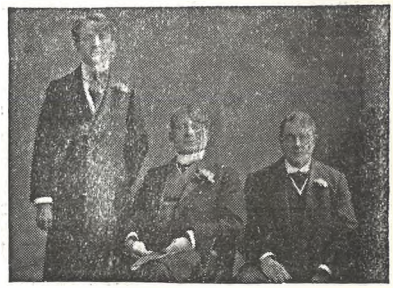

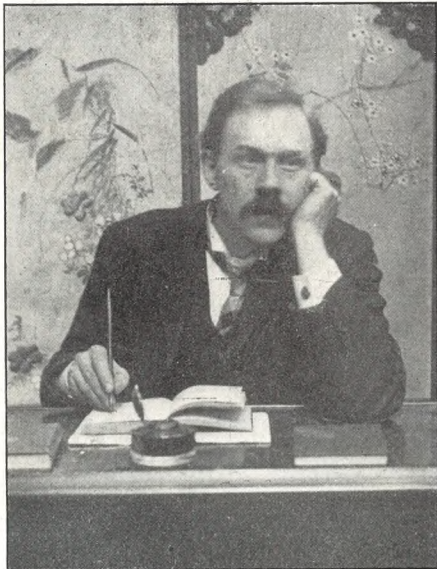
