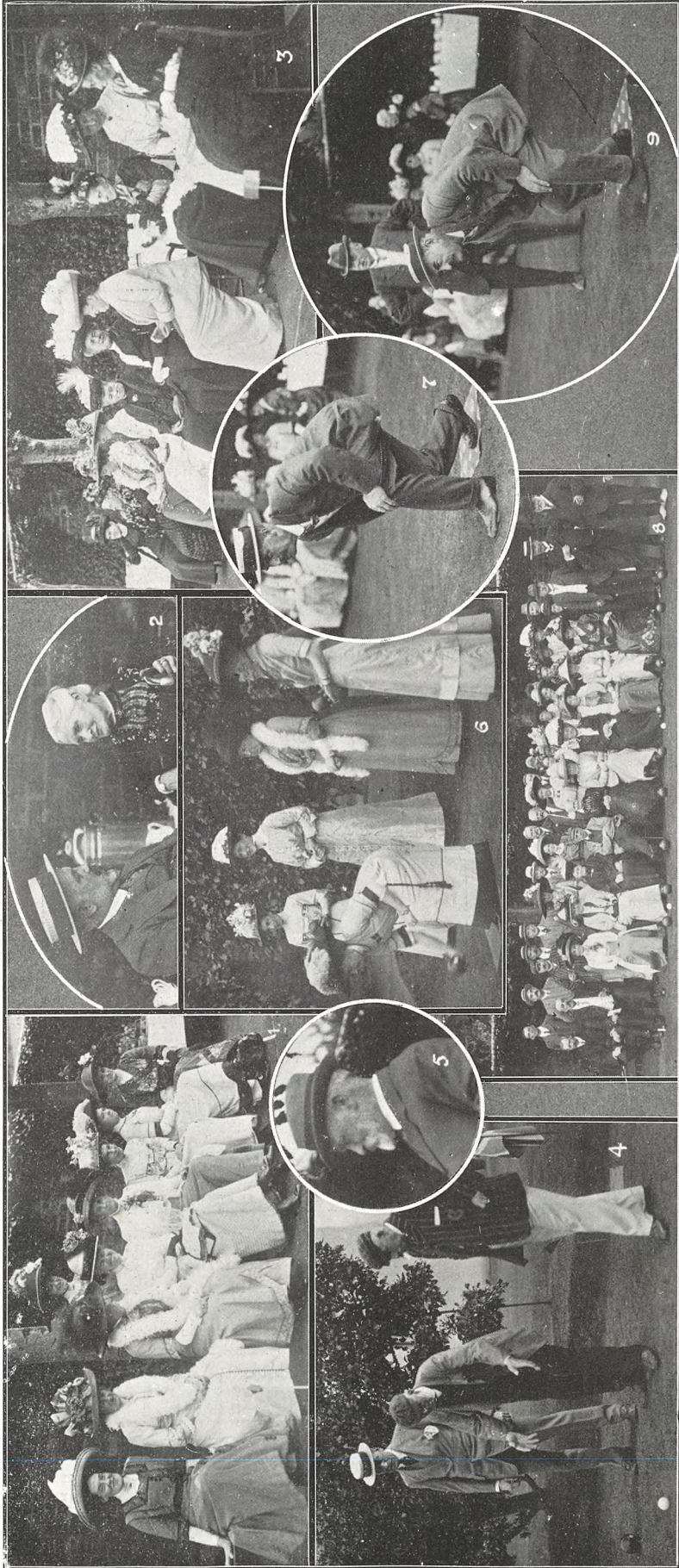

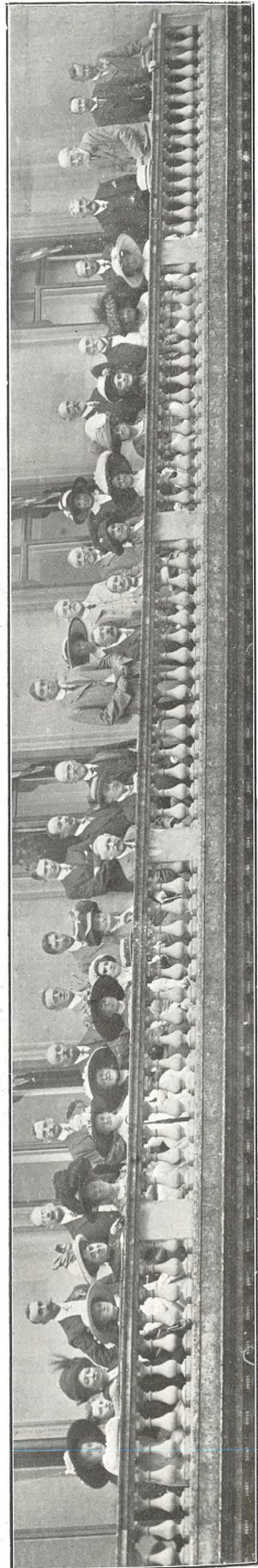

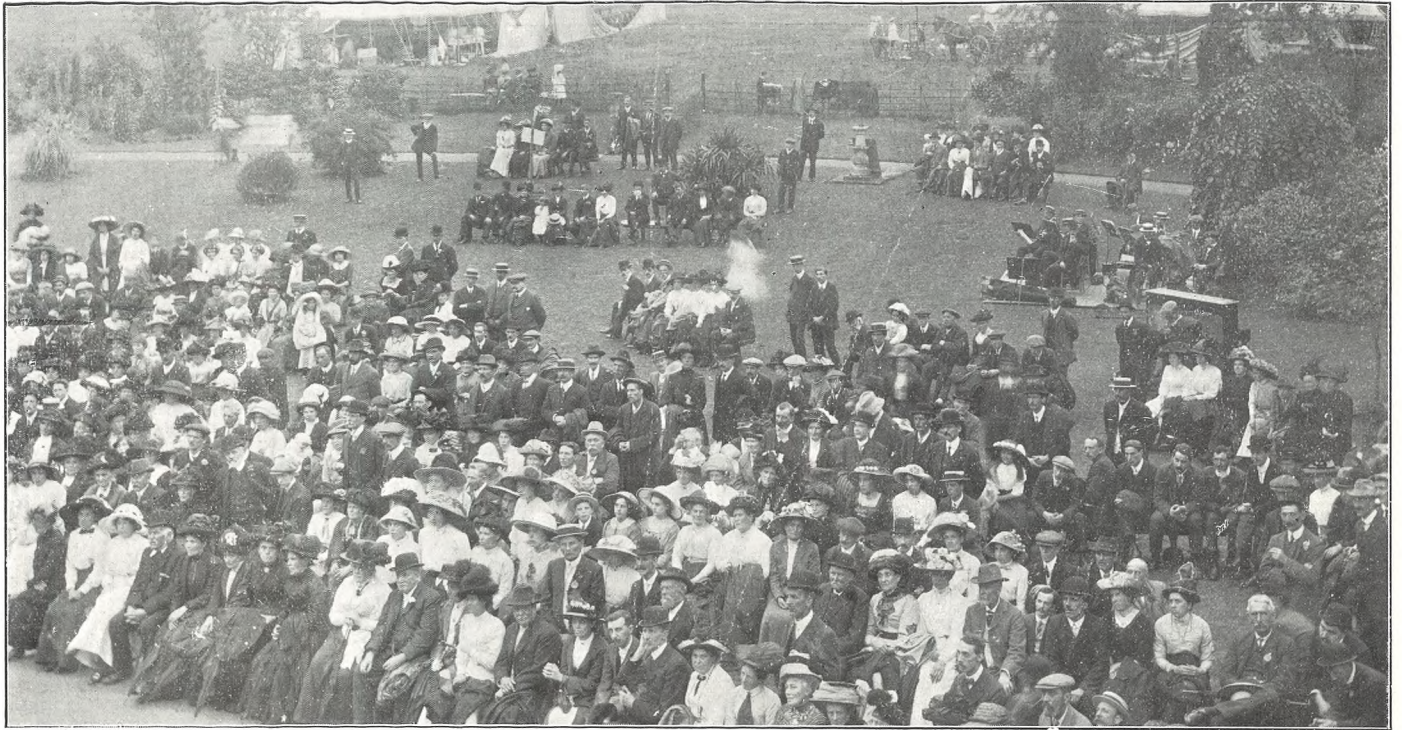

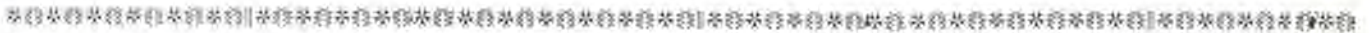

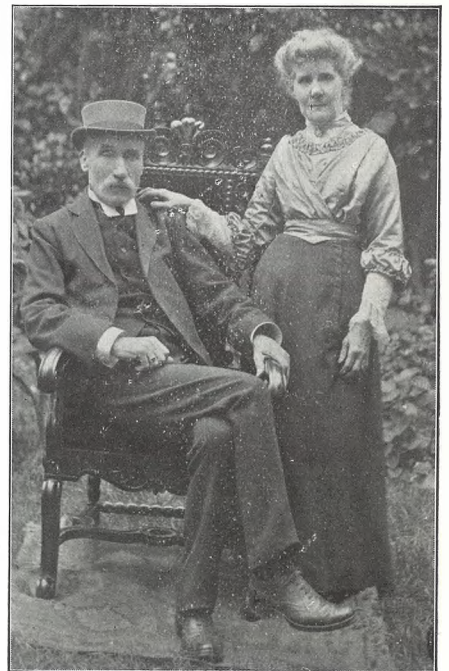

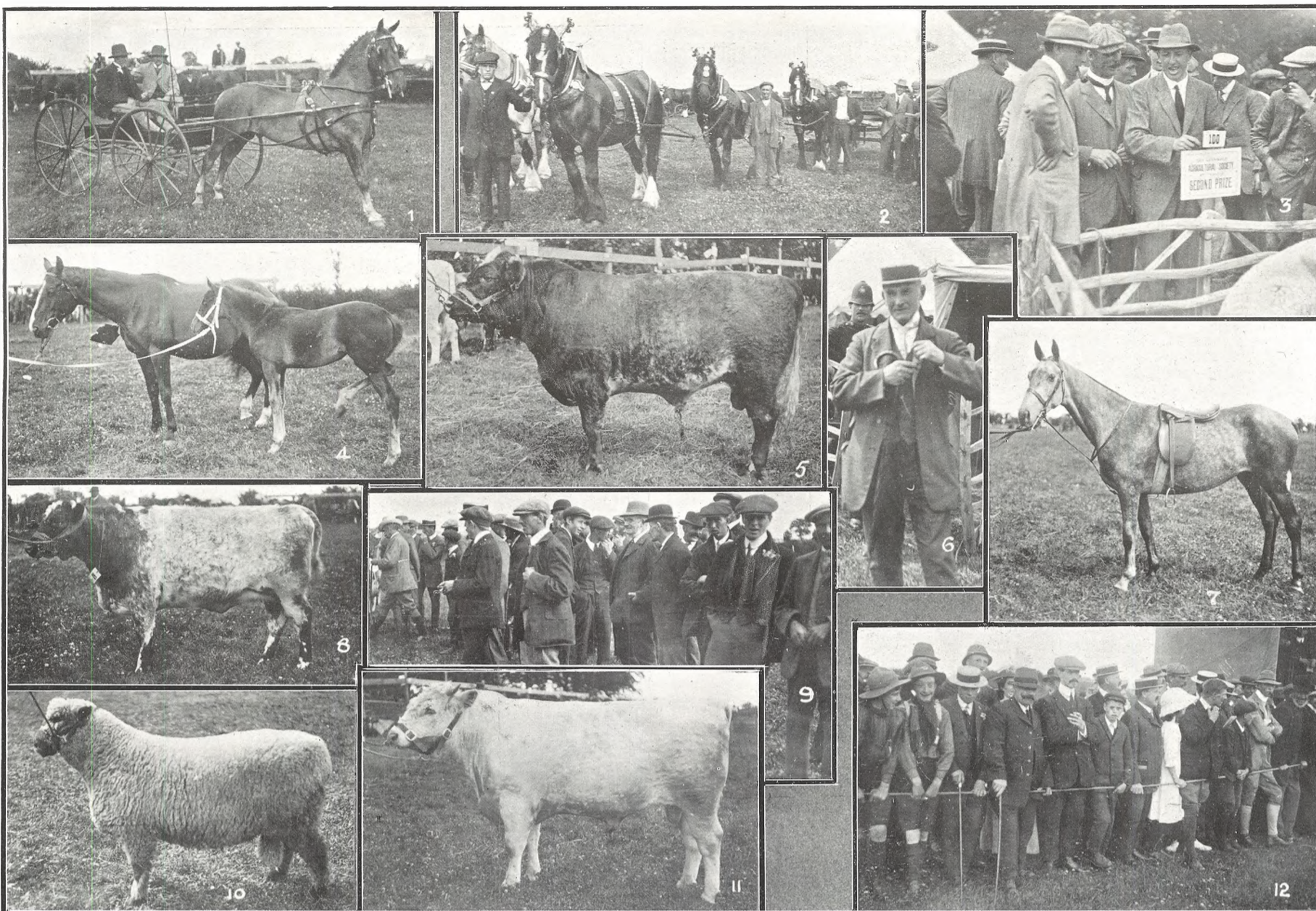


GOLDEN WEDDING.

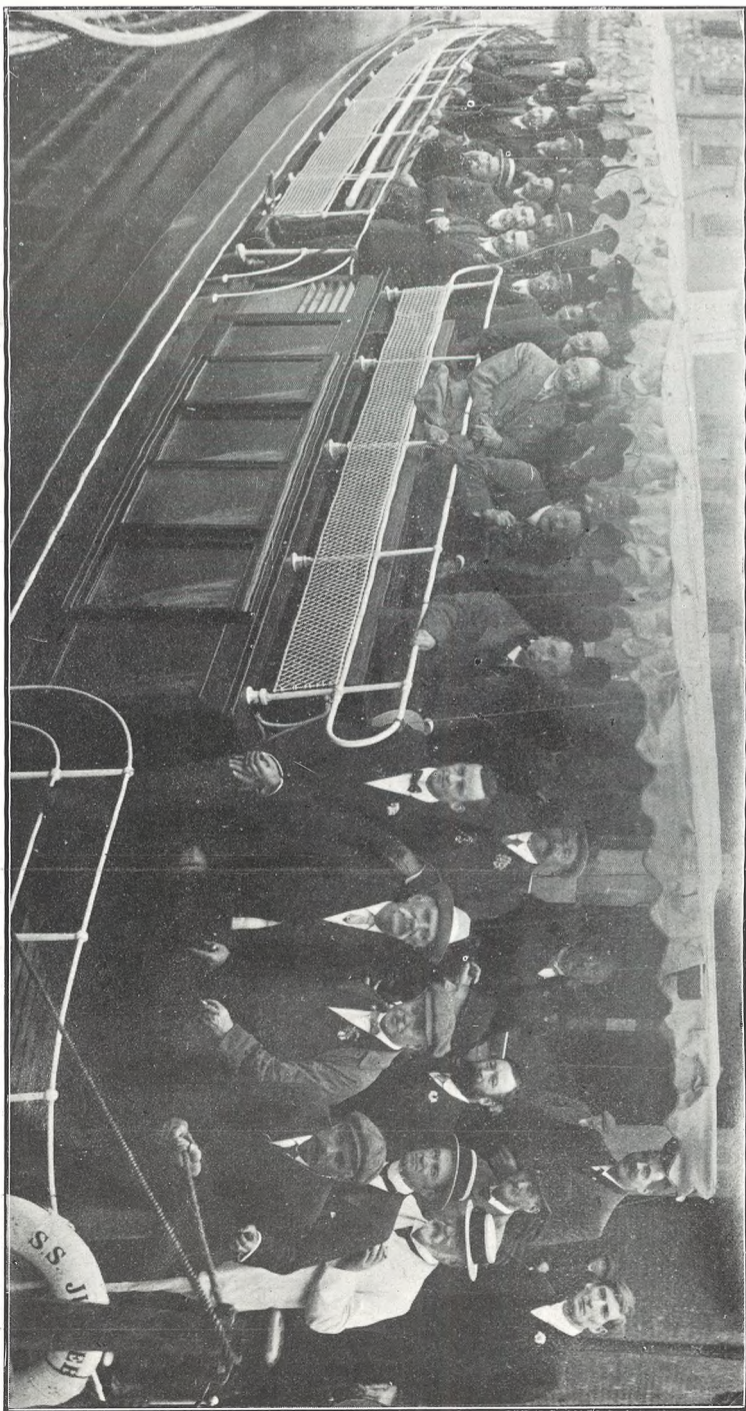

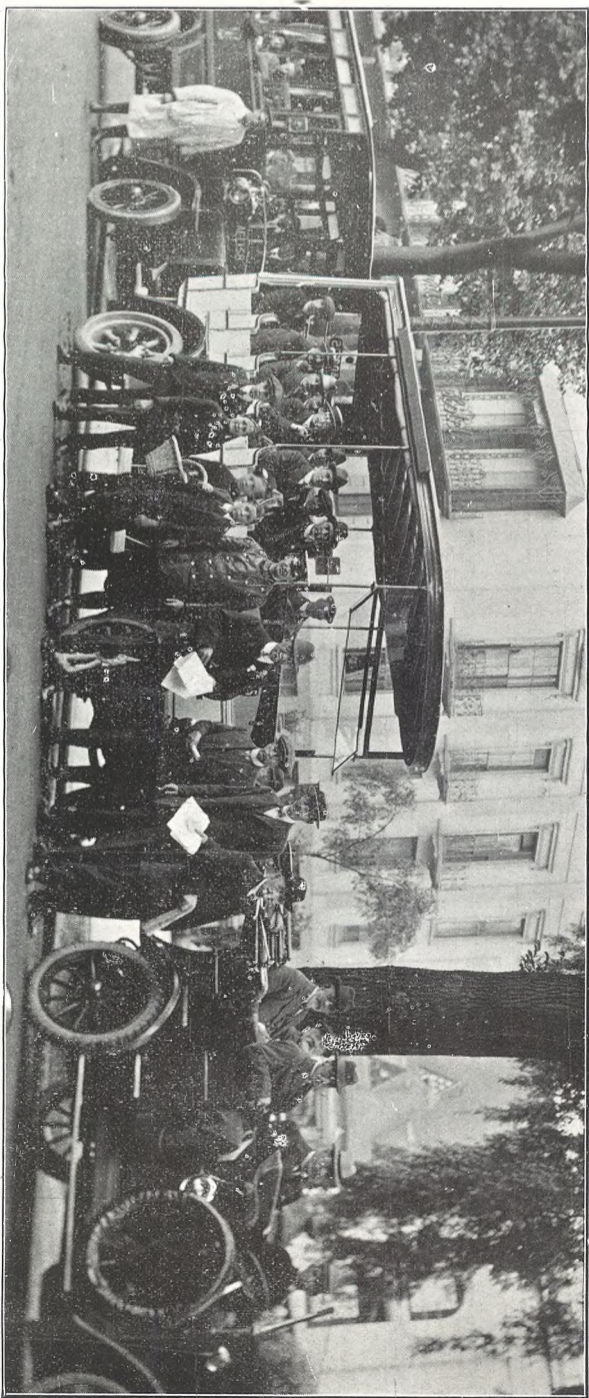

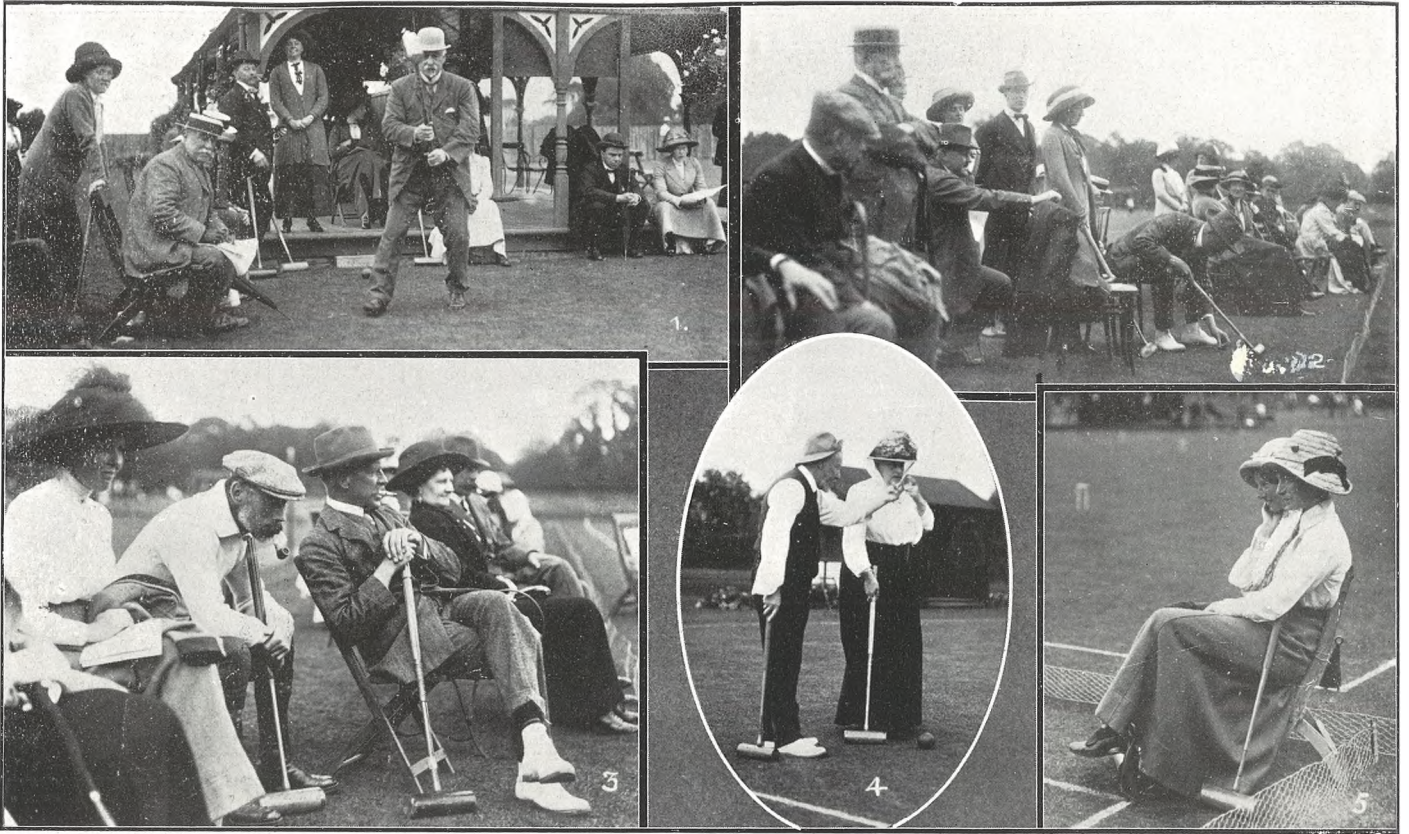

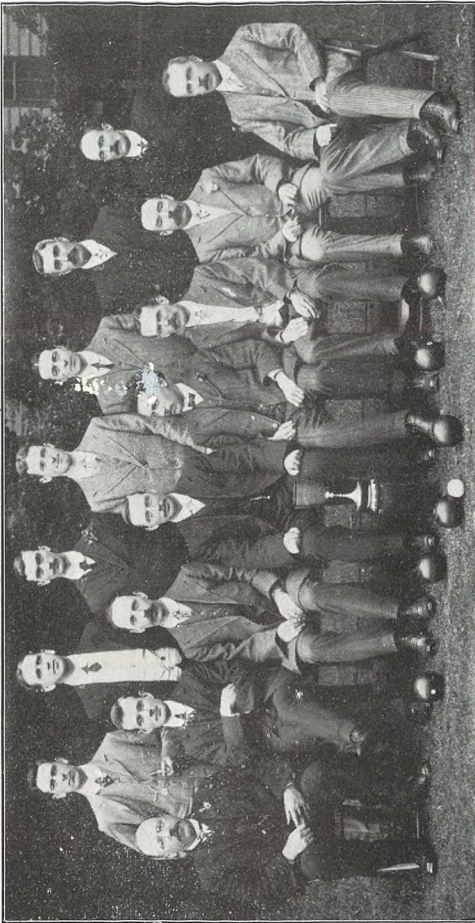

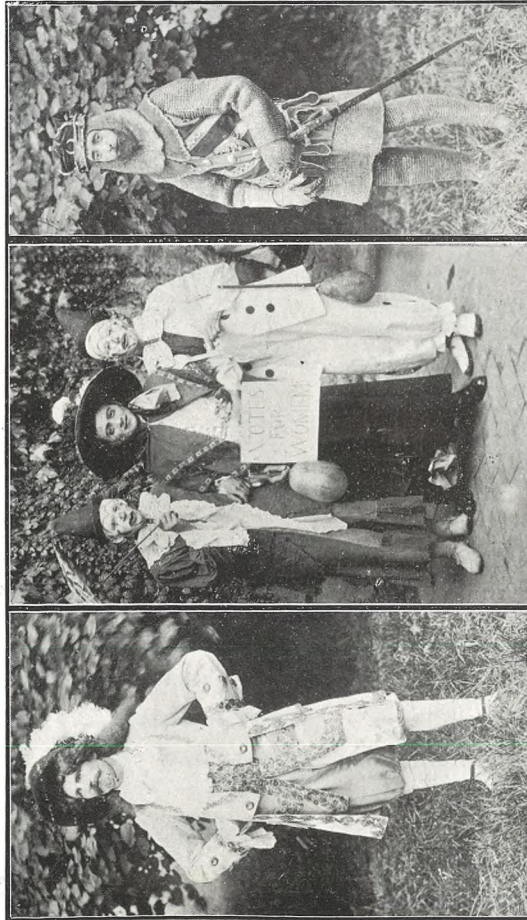

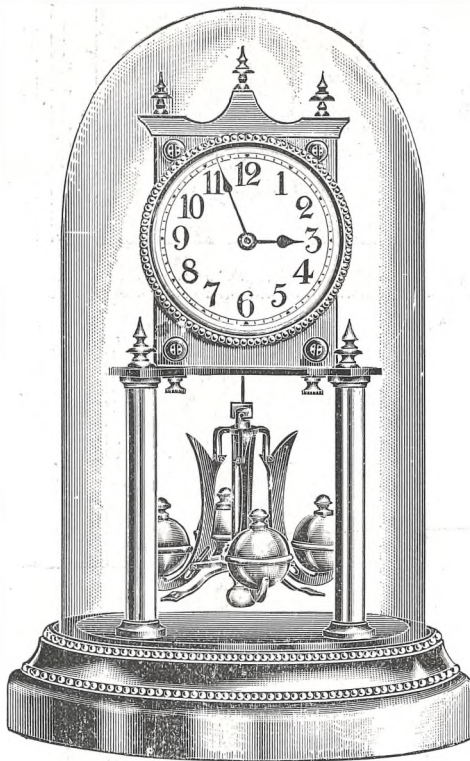

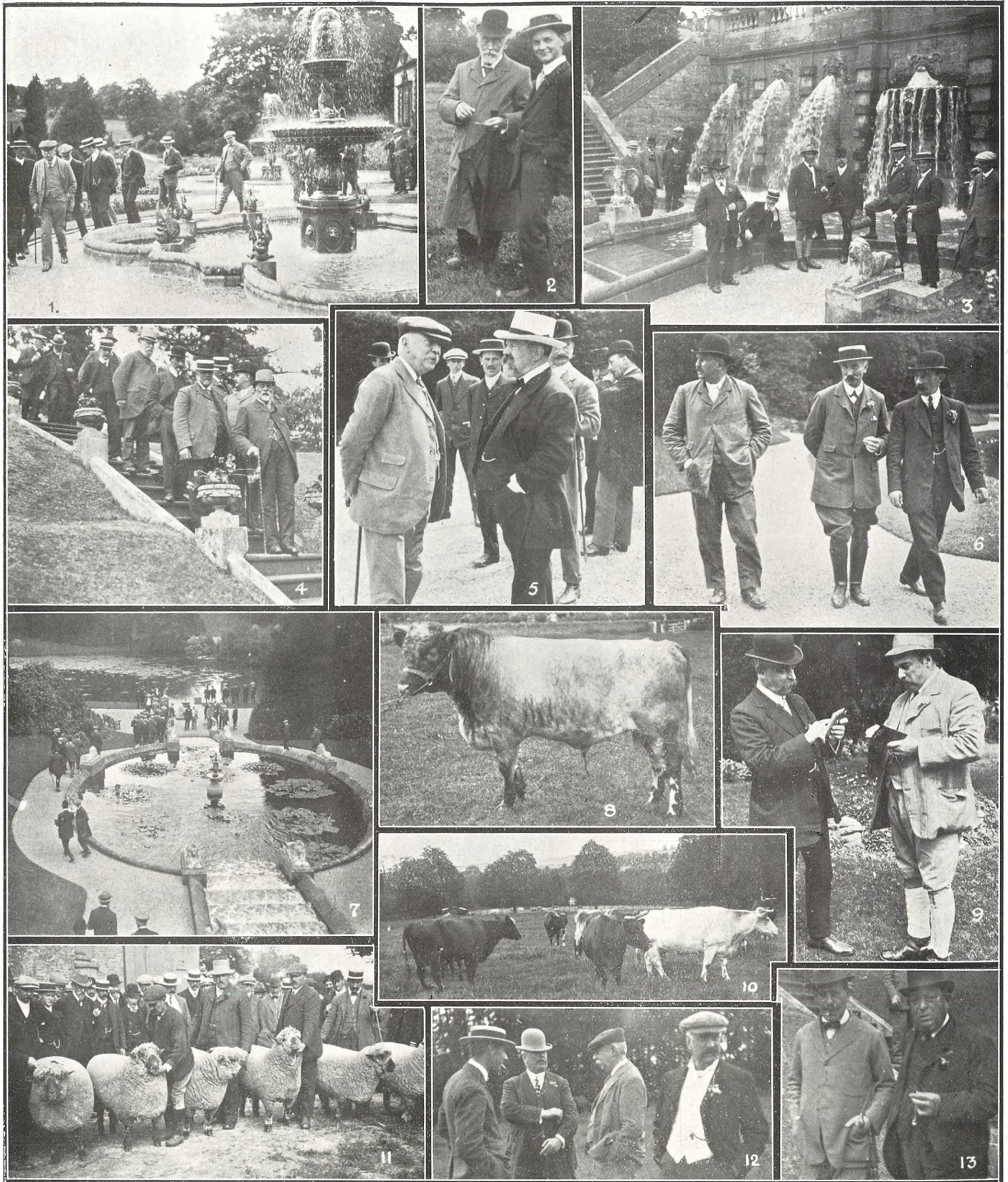

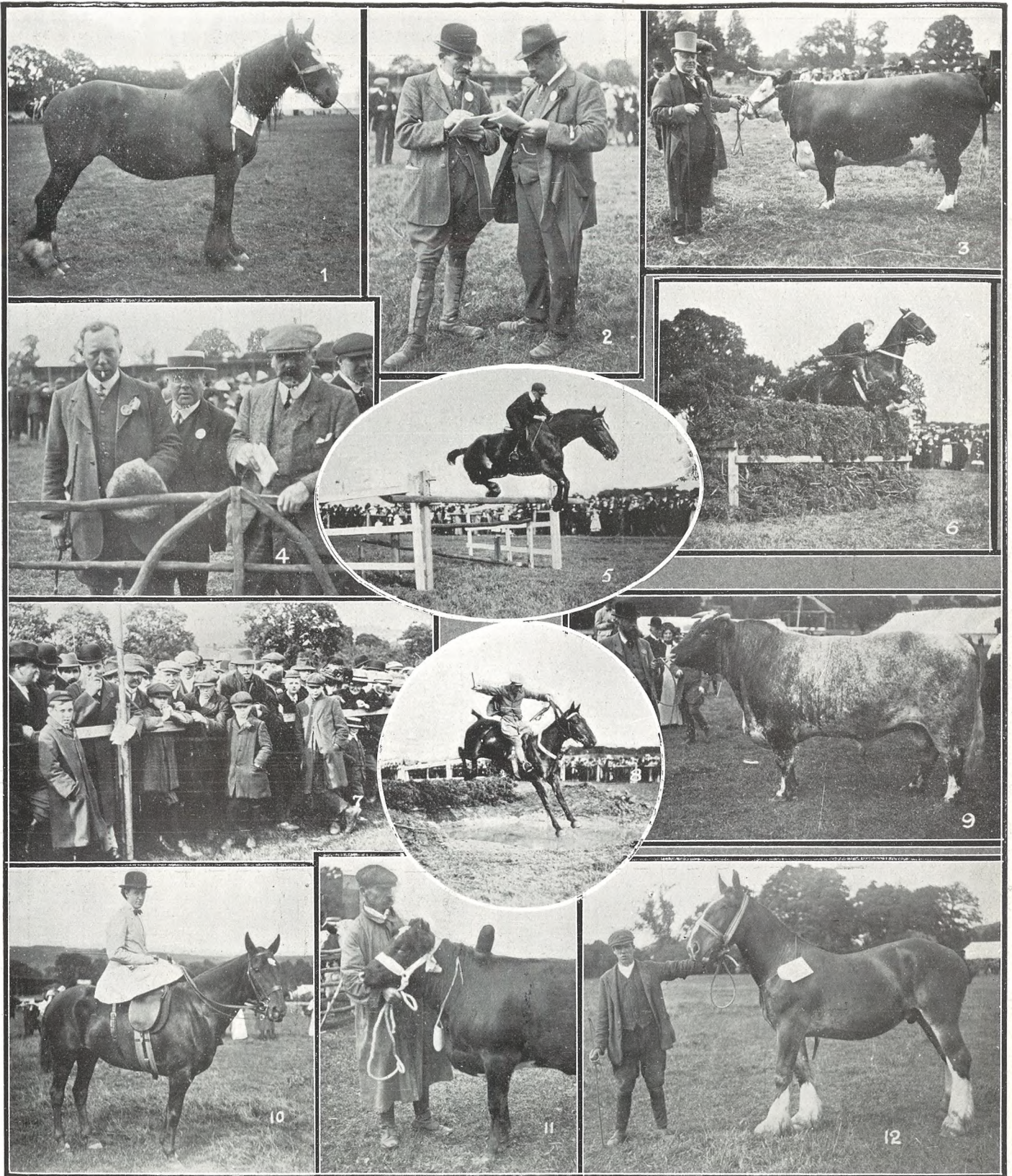

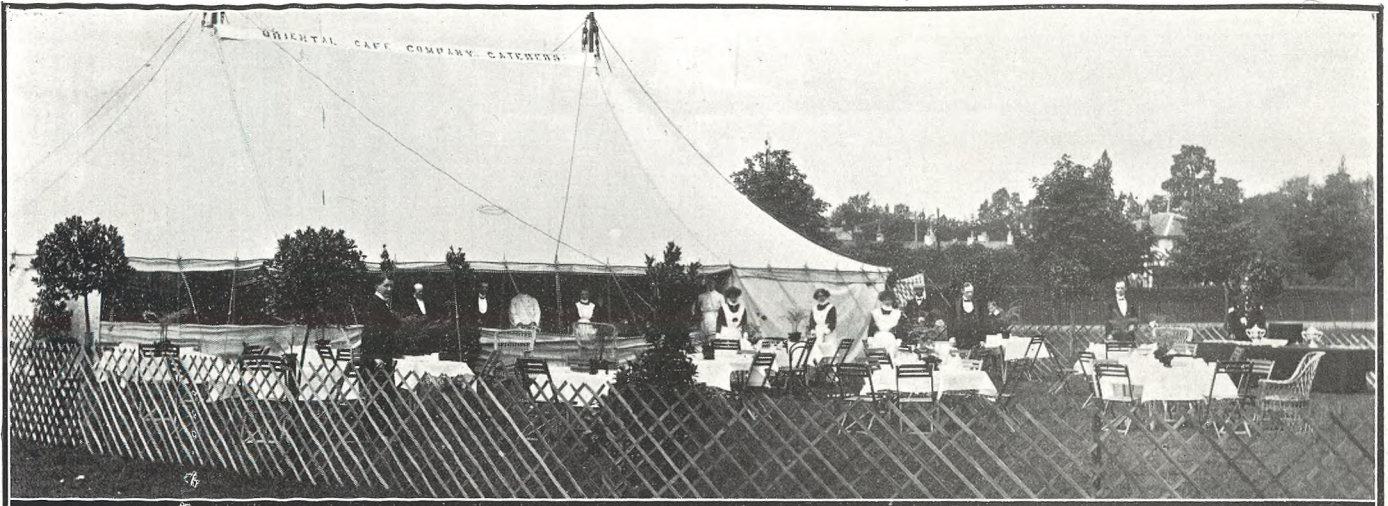

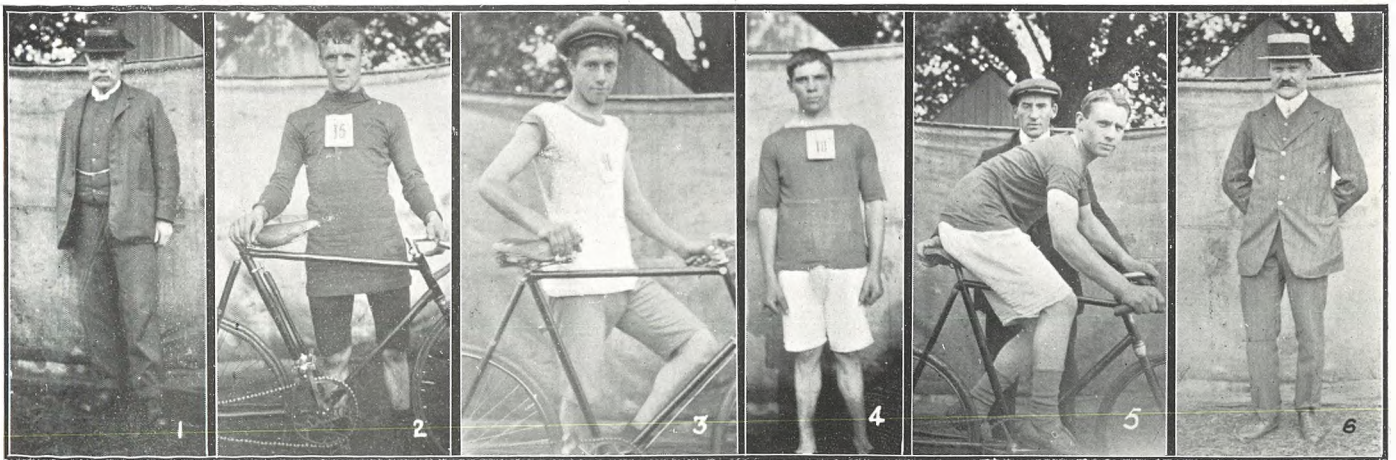
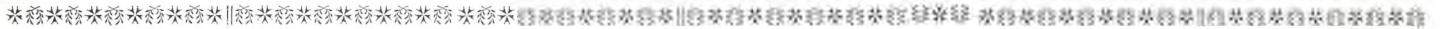

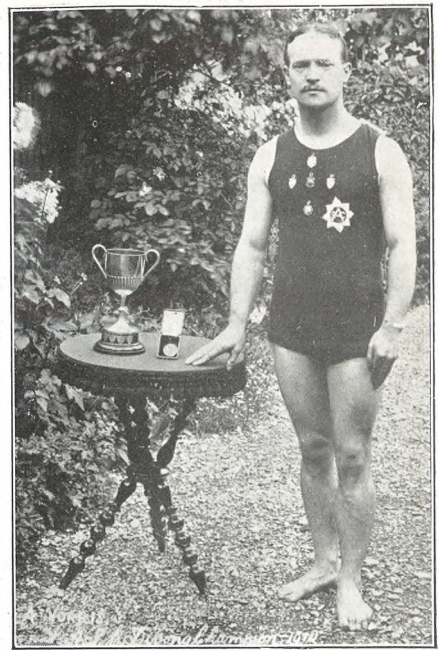

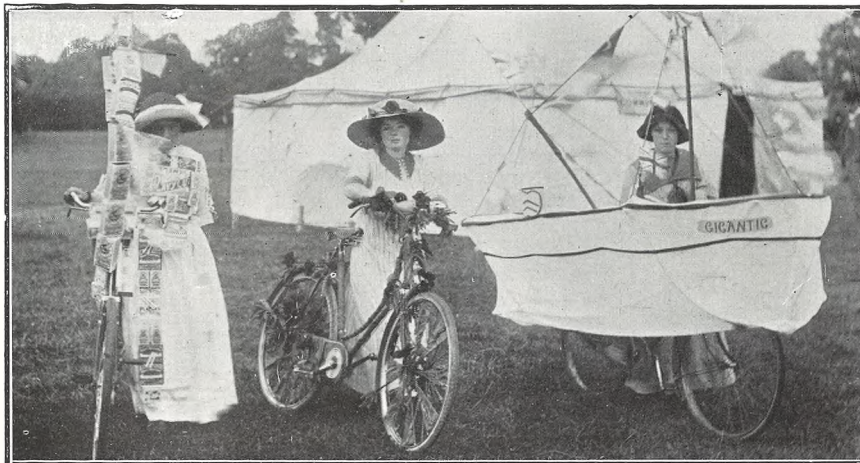

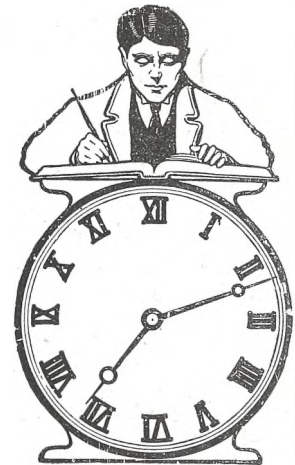

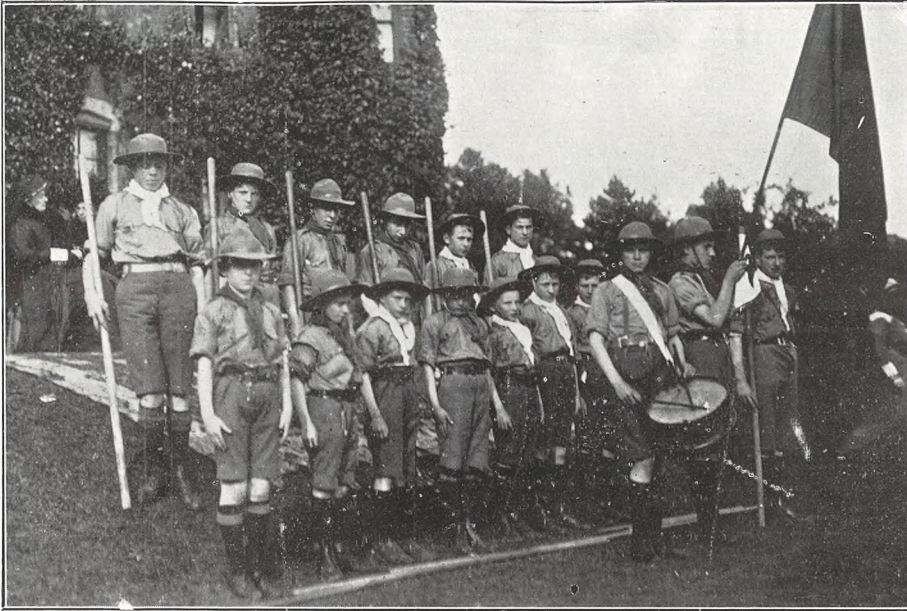

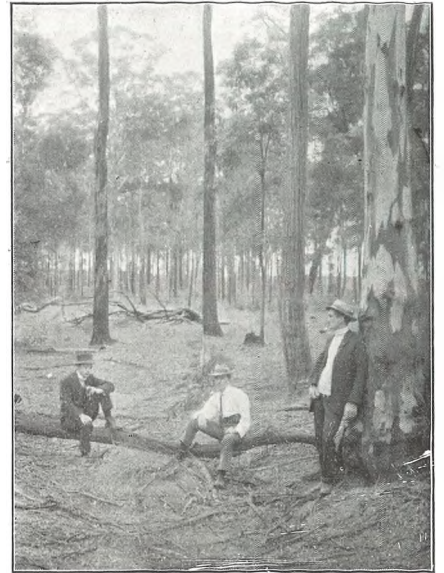

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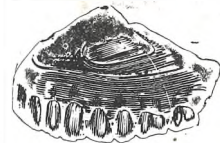
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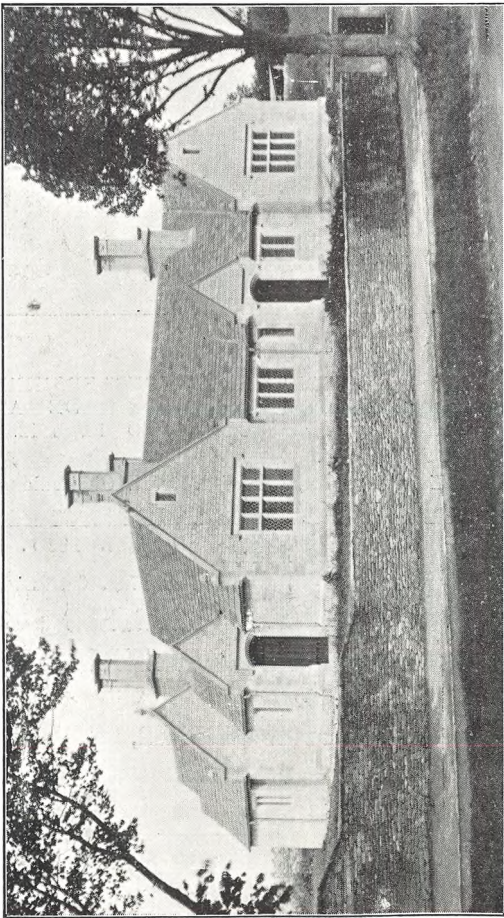
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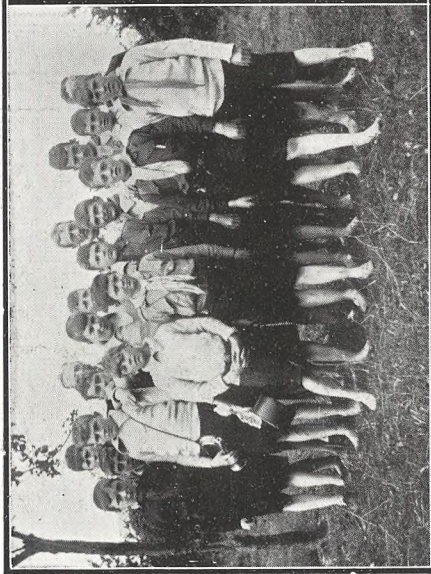

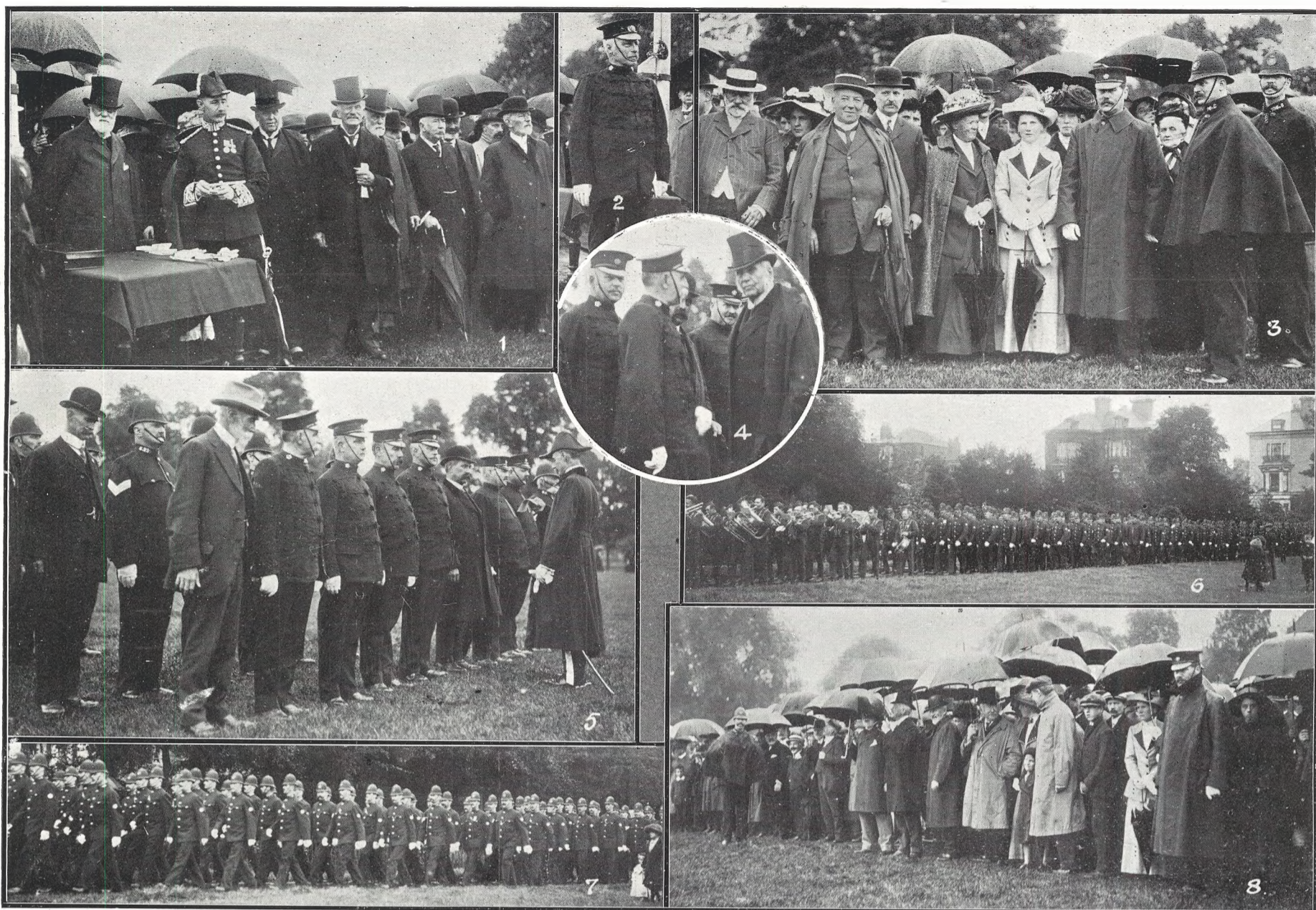

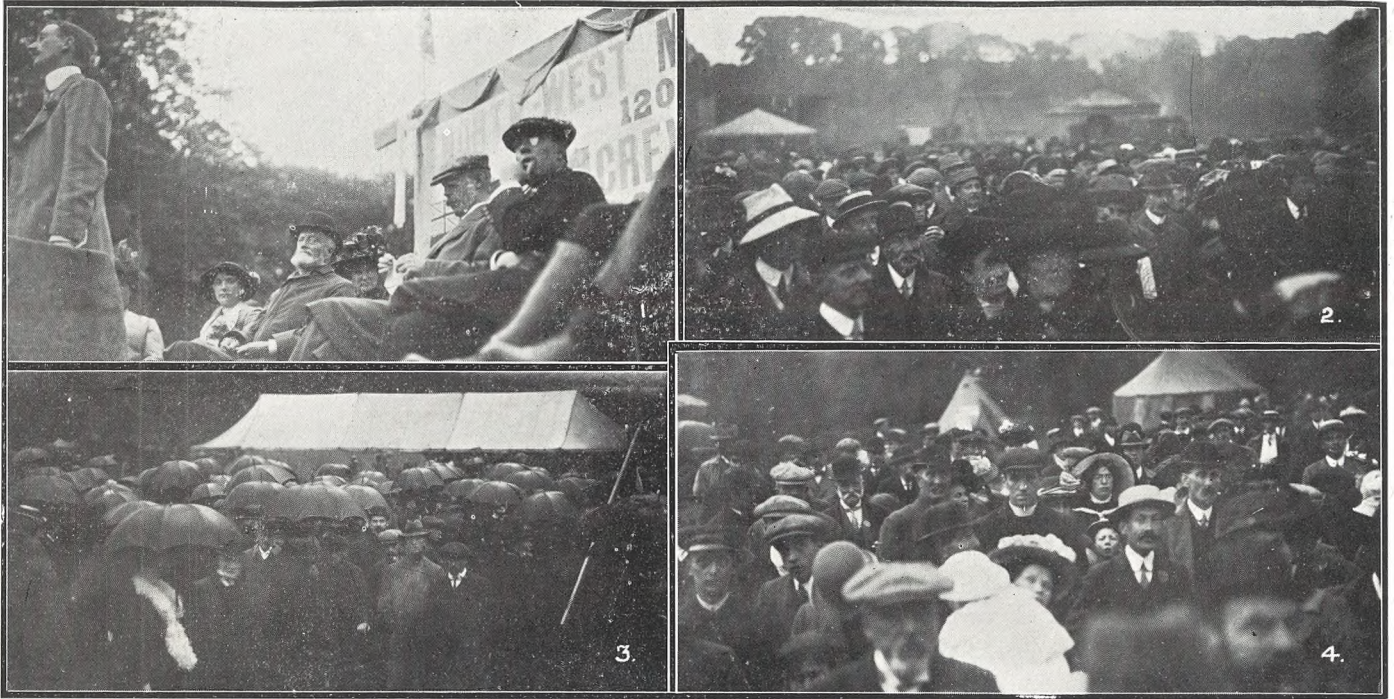

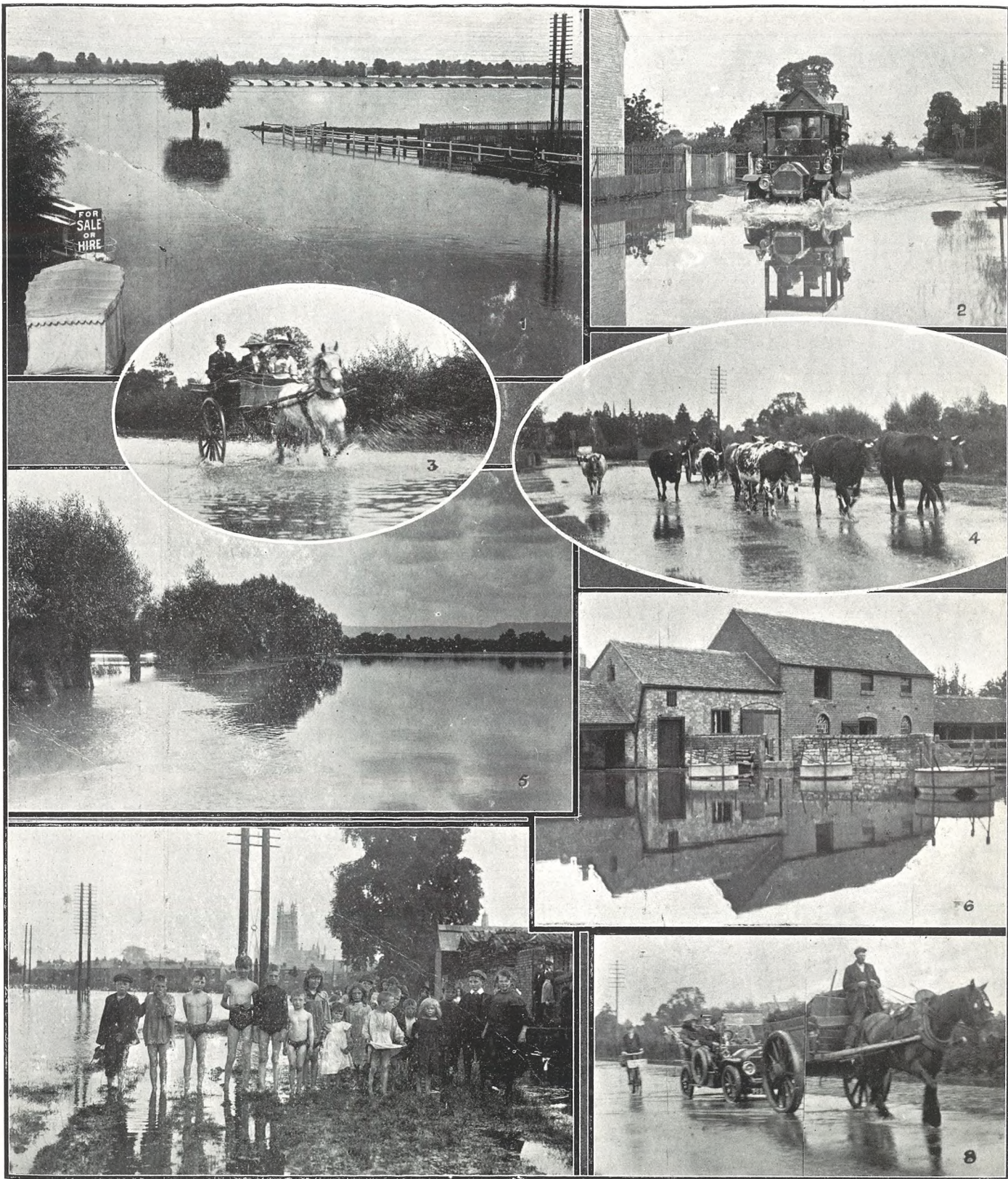

AN EXTRAORDINARY SUMMER FLOOD.

Owing to the continued rain, both the Avon and Severn have overflowed their banks during the past week, and thousands of acres of land are under water. A flood of such dimensions has never been known to occur in August before, and the damage to farmers is enormous. These views were taken on Tuesday, August 27, 1912.

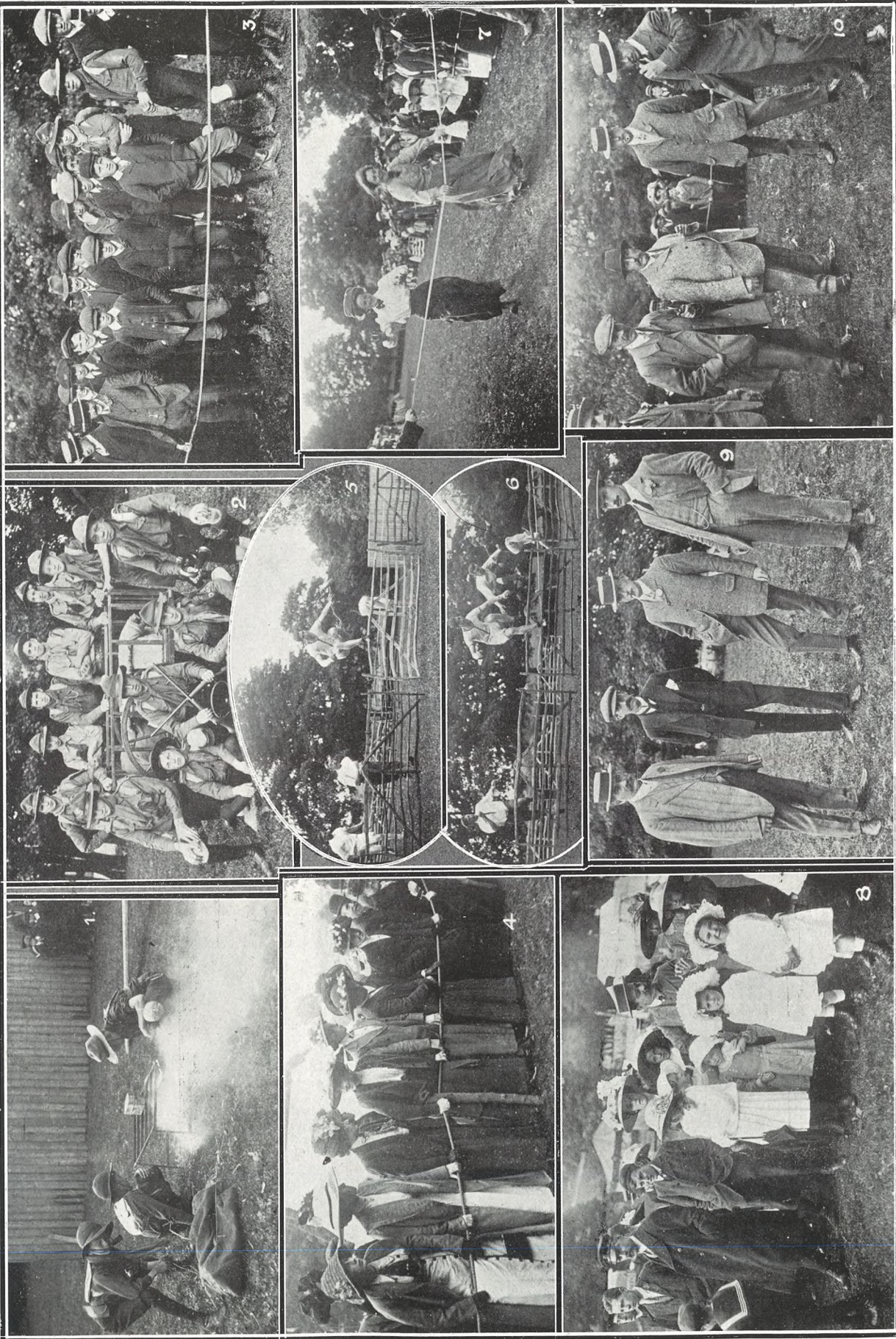

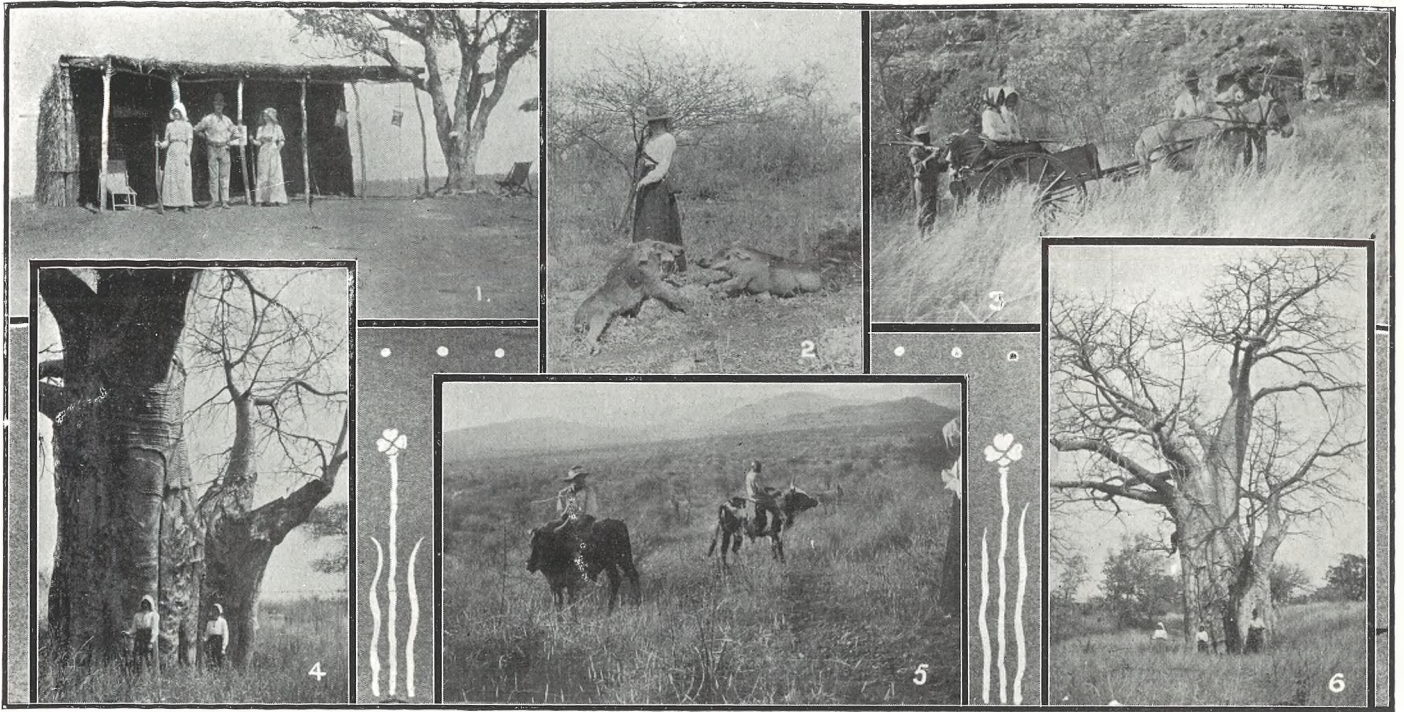

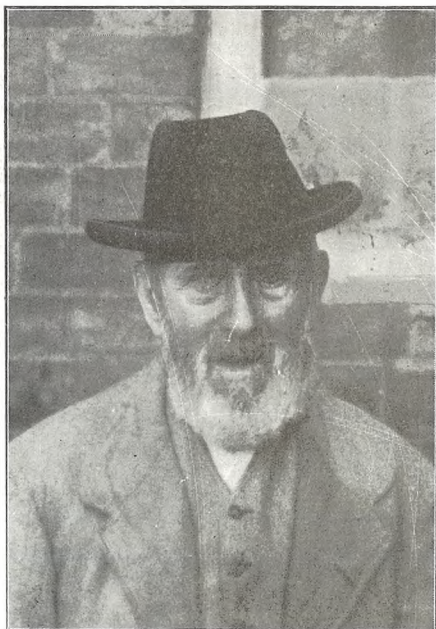
