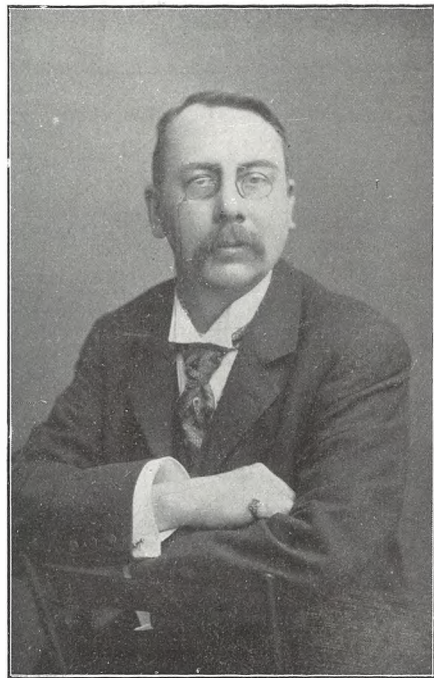

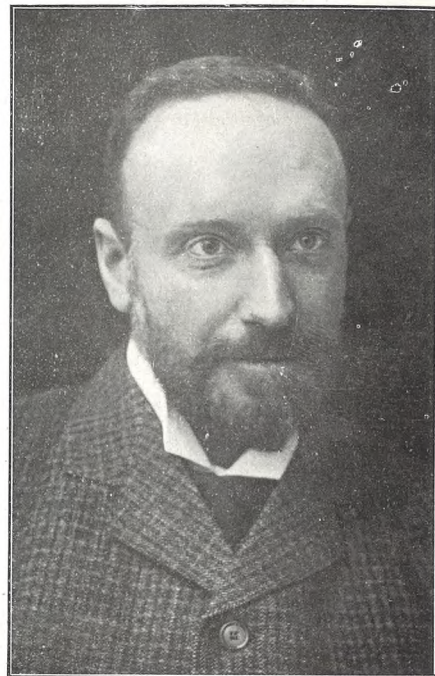

MR. E. B. SHENTON.

Mr. "Ted" Shenton, as he was familiarly known, died rather suddenly from a paralytic seizure on Sept. 2, 1912, aged 65 years. He belonged to a prominent Cheltenham family, and he was well-known as having been the lessee at various times of the old Cheltenham Theatre, the Assembly-rooms, Pittville Gardens, Montpellier Rotunda, and, up to the time of his death, the Victoria Rooms, now known as Poole's Picture Palace. He was also landlord at various times of the Andoversford Hotel, the Lansdown Inn, the Star Hotel, and the Sydney Arms Hotel. He was liked by all, his intimates always being pleased to see "Uncle."



MR. F. G. ADAMS.

Of 8 Pittville-villas, Cheltenham, who died in London, after a long illness, on Sunday, September 1, 1912, aged about 50 years. For many years he was a partner in the firm of auctioneers, Bayley and Adams, Promenade, Cheltenham; but since 1904 he had been established in business on his own account at Montpellier. He was an only son, his father and step-mother being still alive, and he leaves a widow. He was a strong Conservative, but took no part in public life.

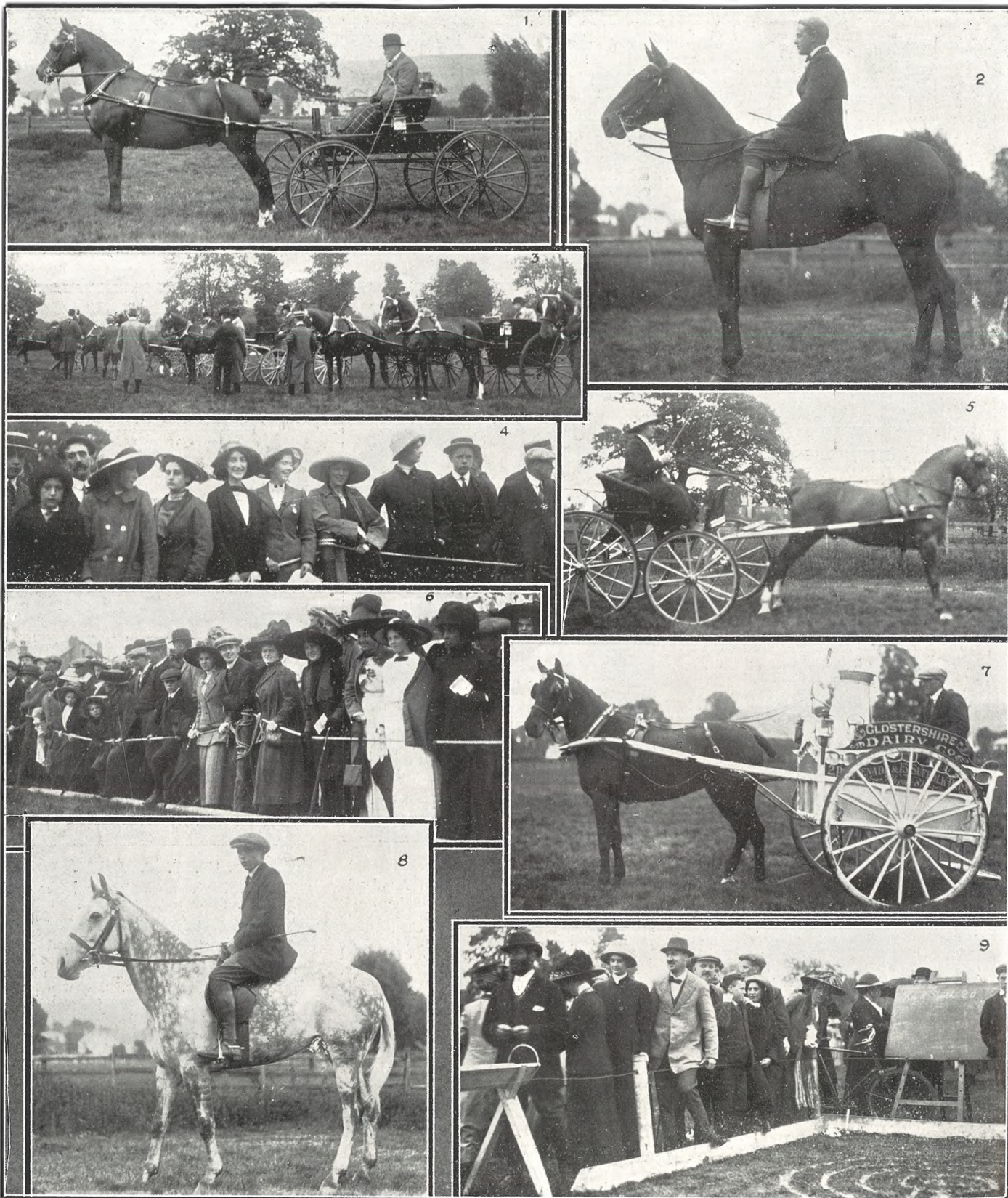

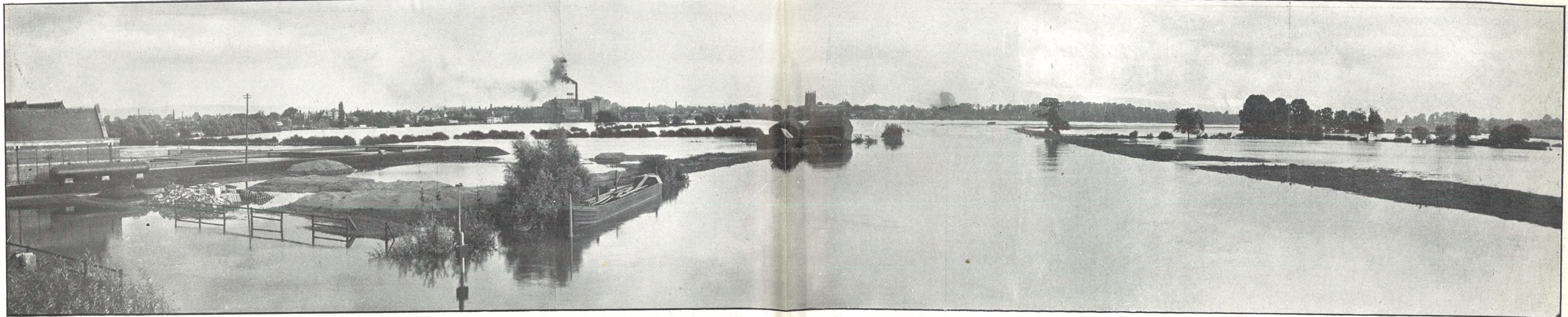

THE GREAT AUGUST FLOOD OF 1912.

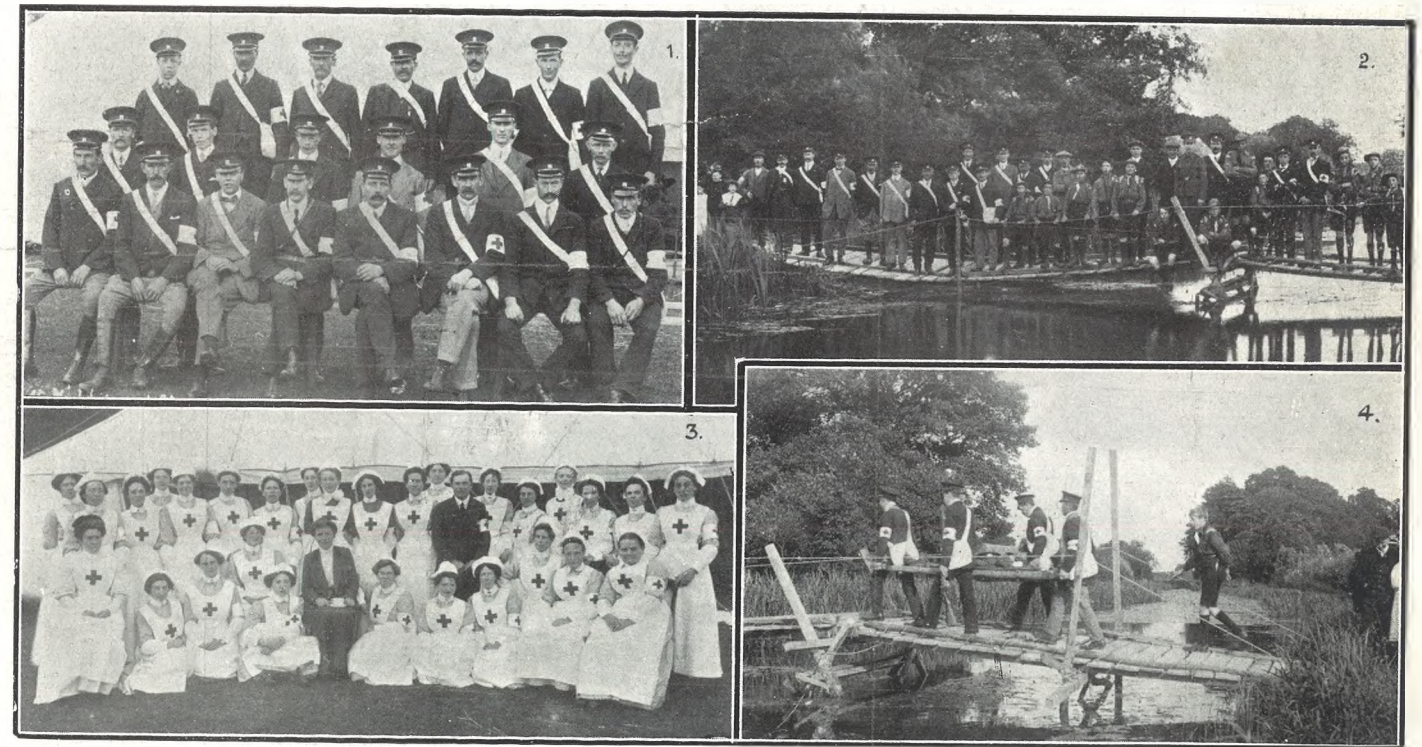

View showing where the landslide started, the whole of the chasm in the foreground being previously wooded, like the distance on other side.



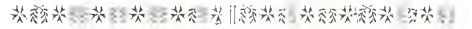

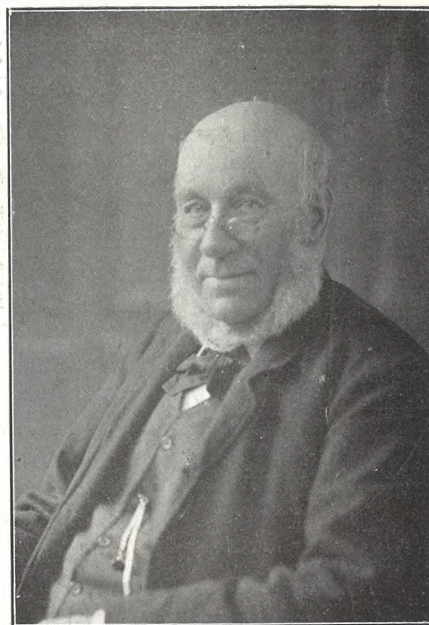

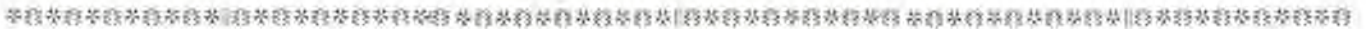

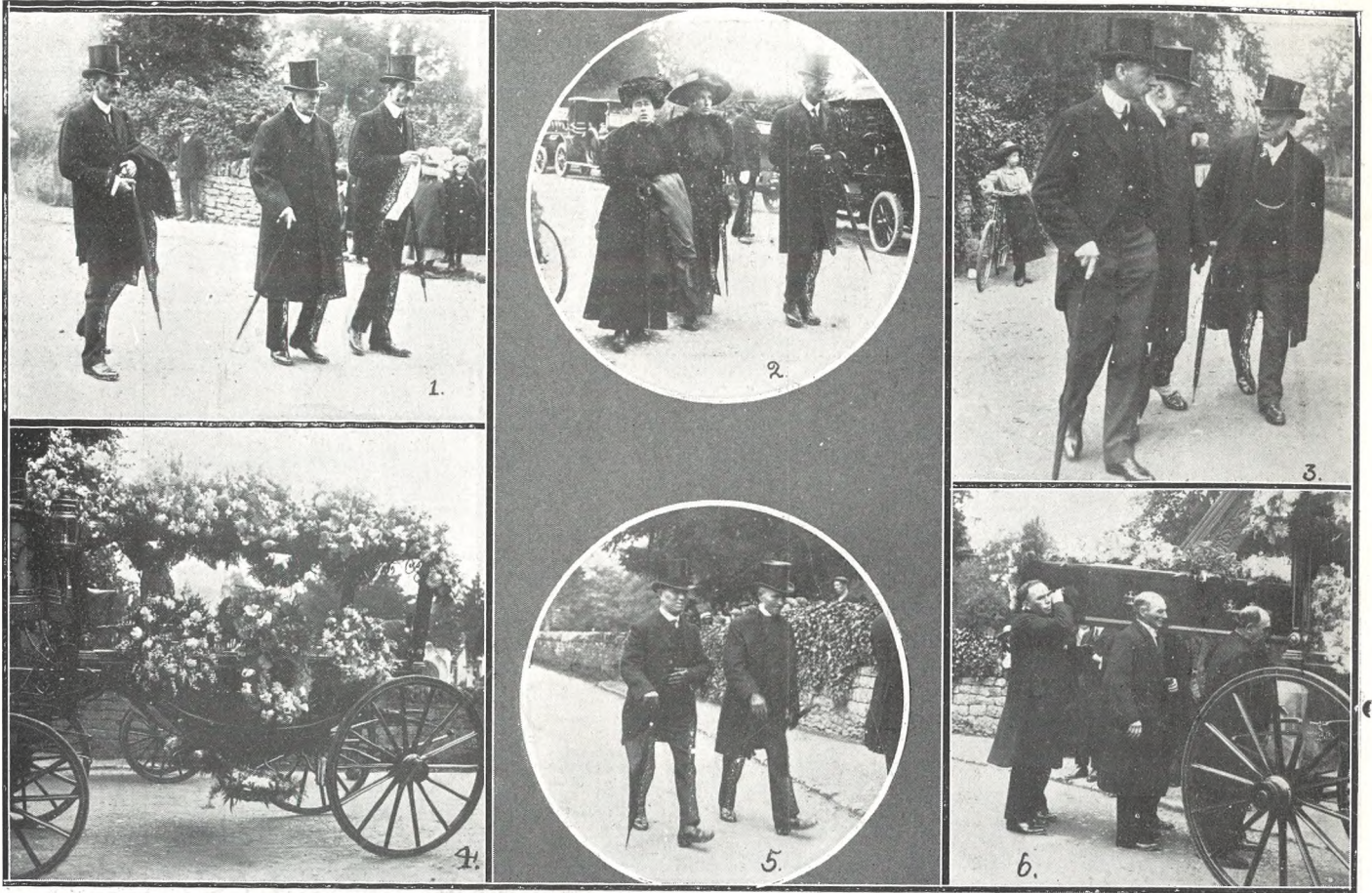

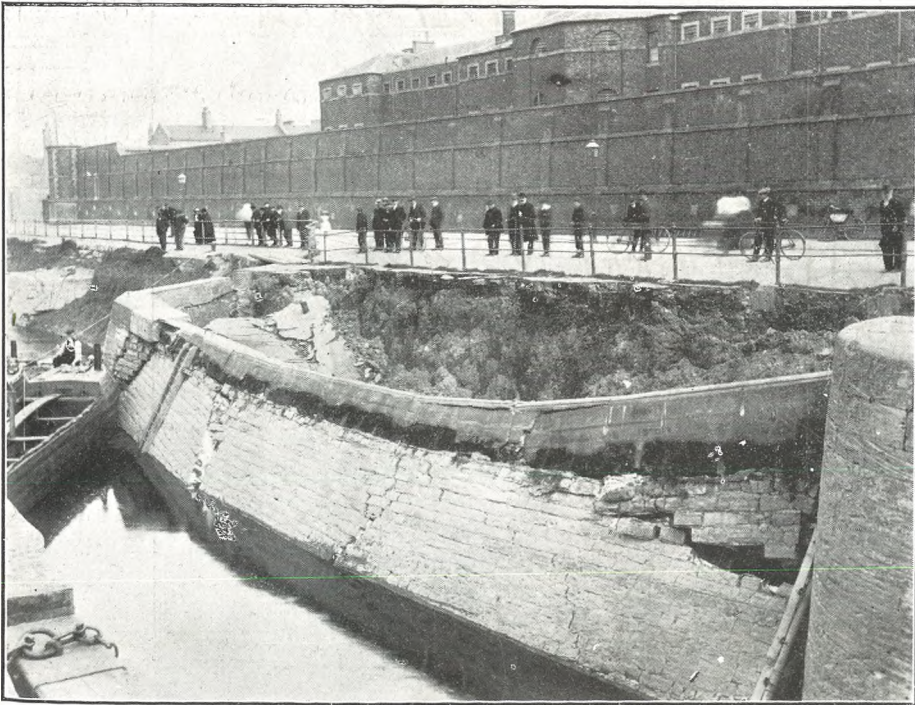

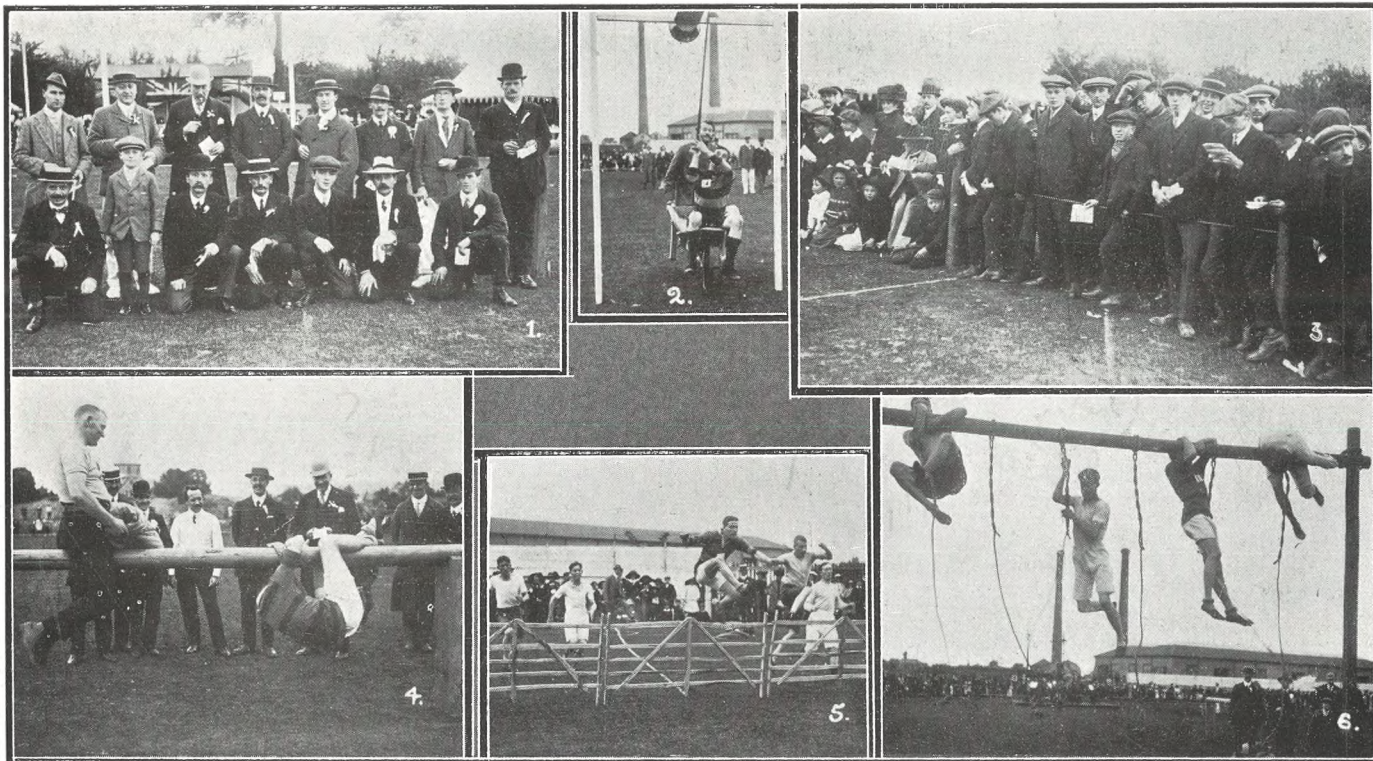

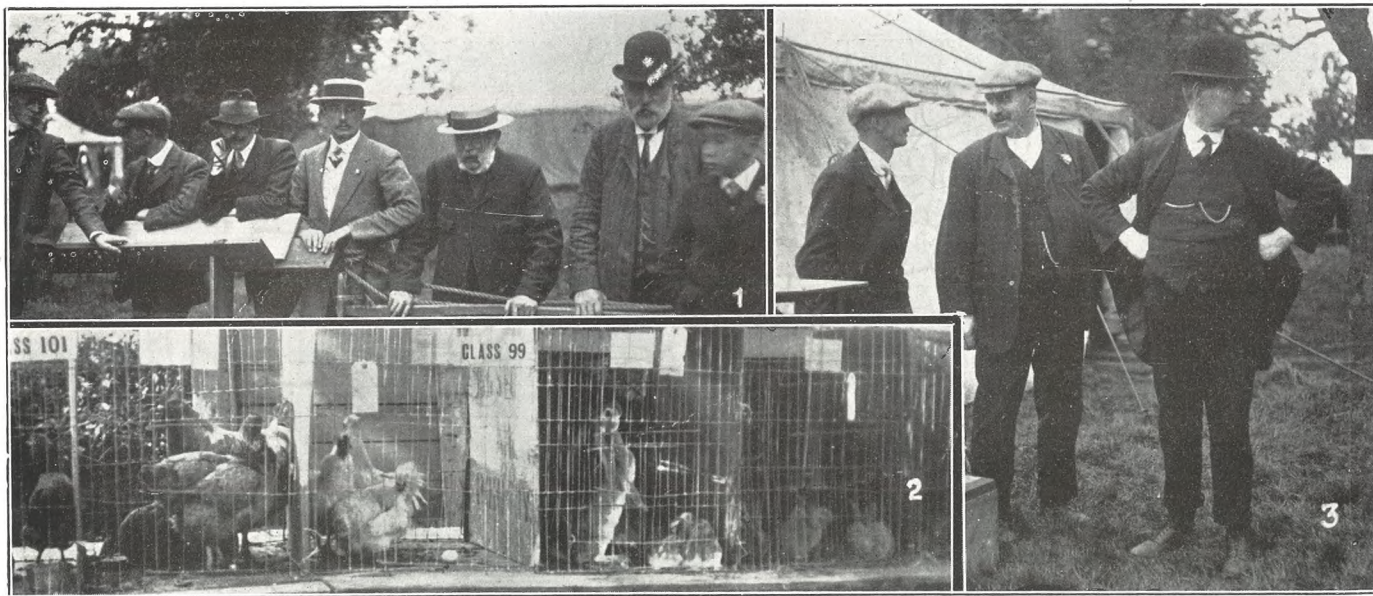

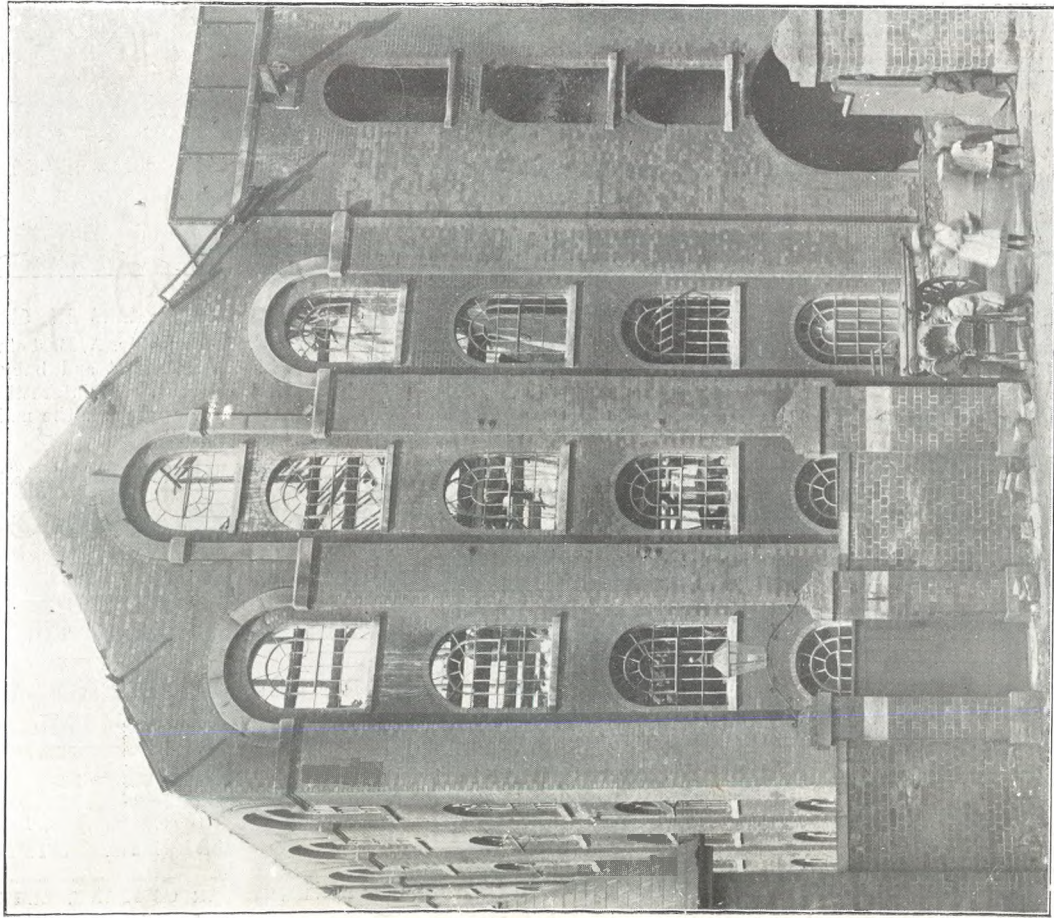
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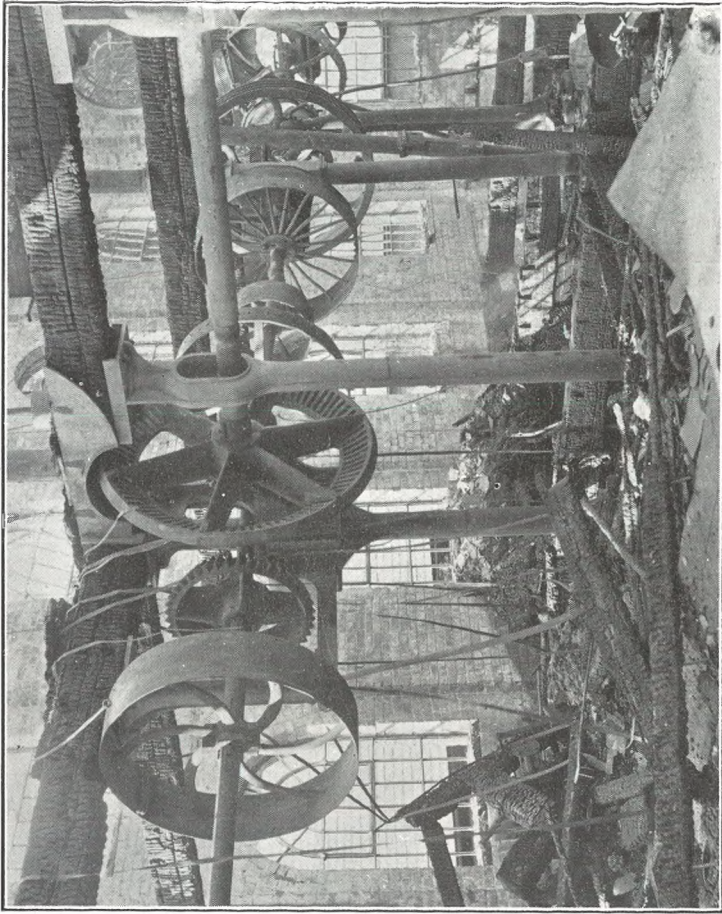

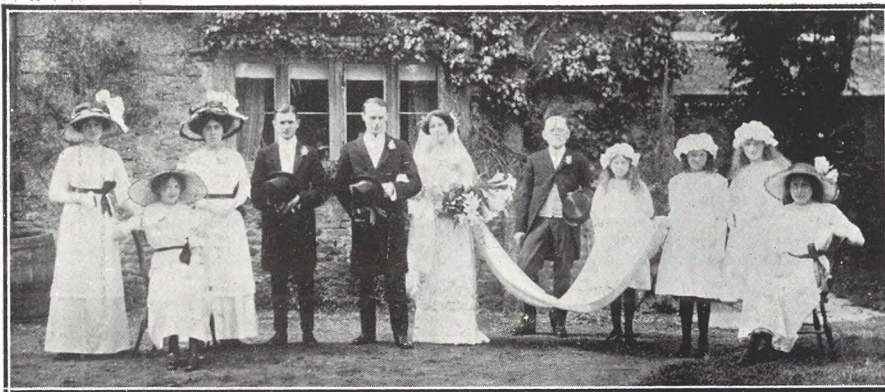

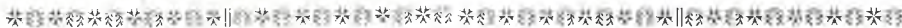
SO CONVENIENT!

Bradford City Council discussed for nearly four hours on Tuesday a proposal to establish a municipal coal supply. It was urged by Socialists that coal merchants were getting between 30 and 40 per cent. per ton, whereas a local workmen's association worked on 10 per cent. and the Bradford Co-operative Society on 22½ per cent. Alderman J. Hayhurst, a Socialist, said the effect of English "trusts" had been to reduce prices of commodities. The proposal was defeated by 43 votes to 15.

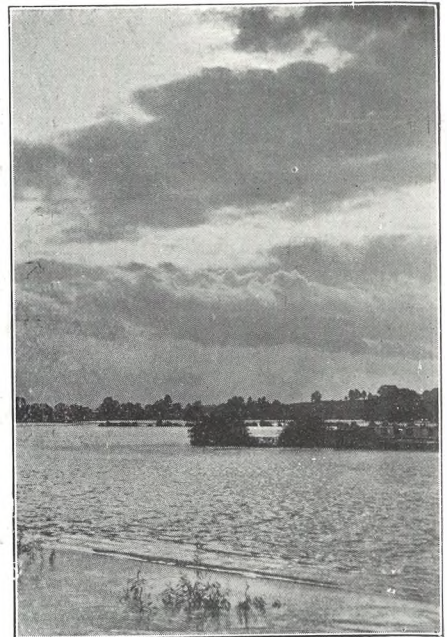

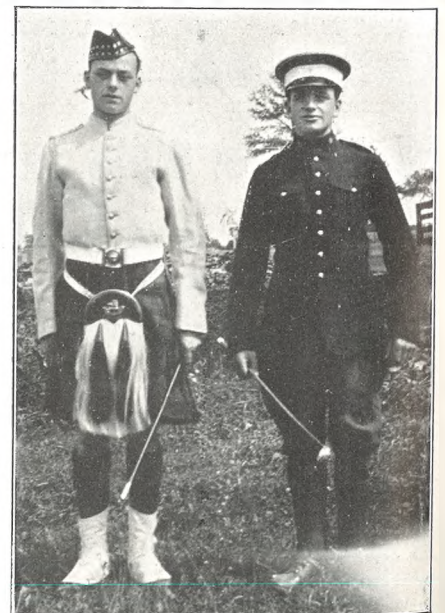

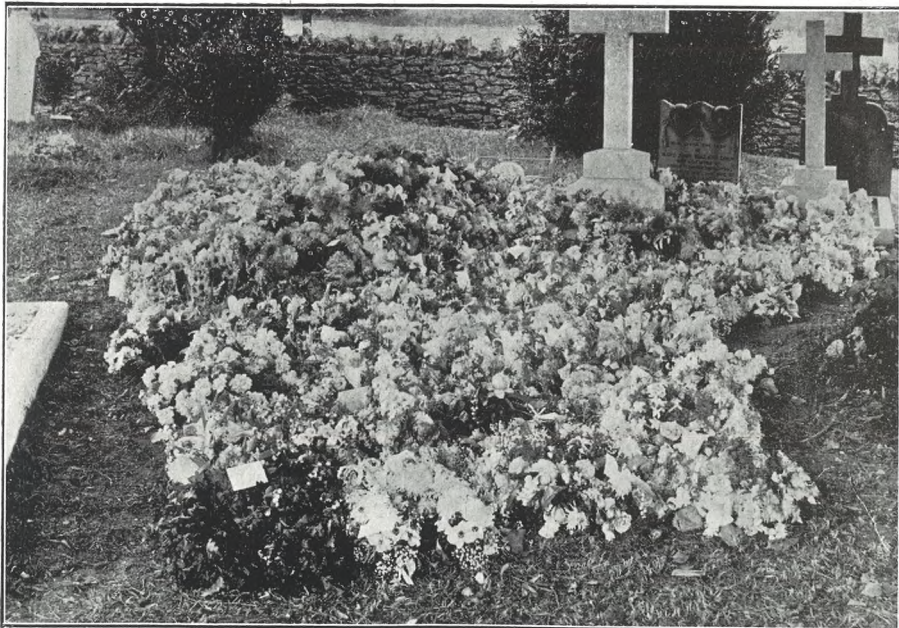

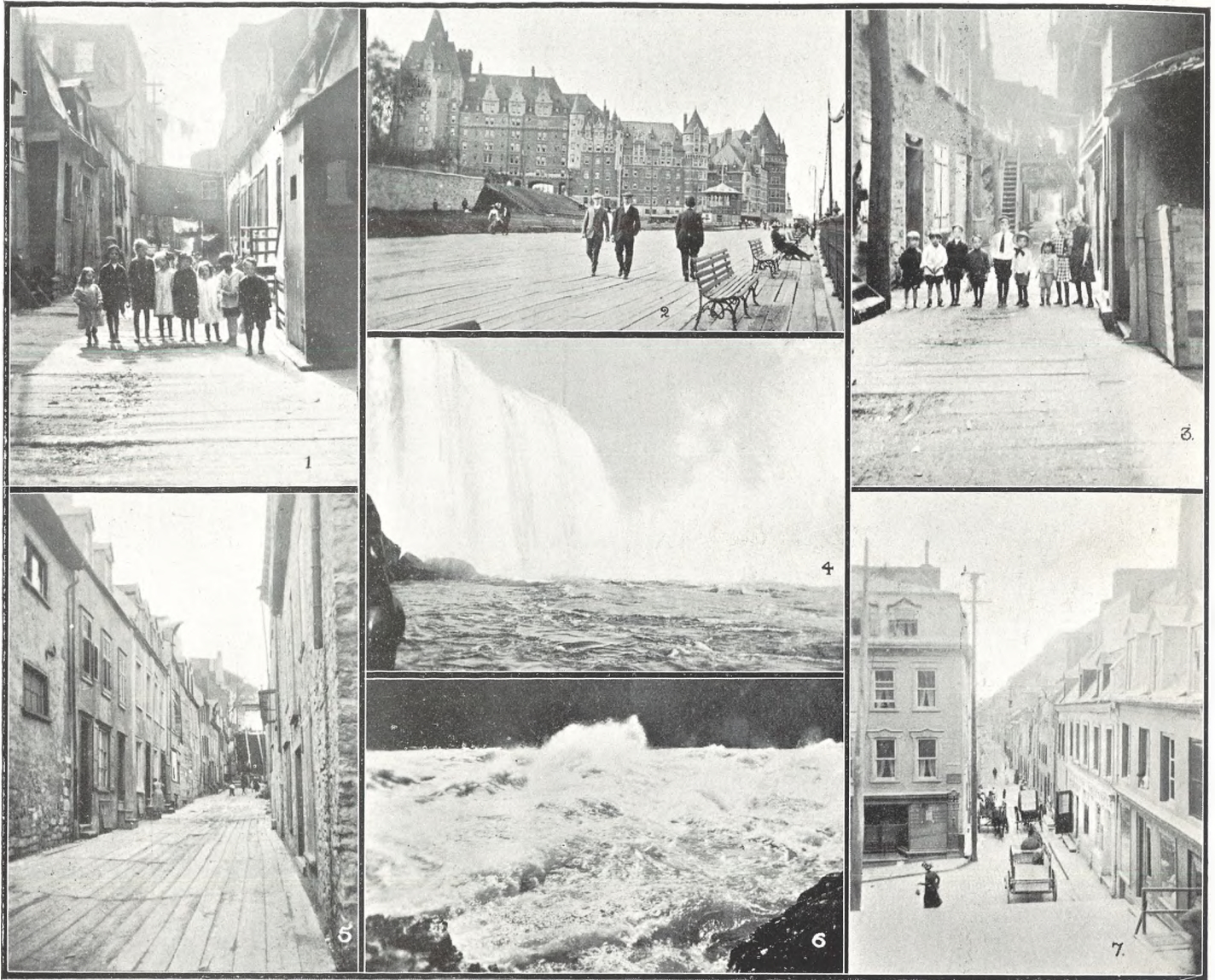

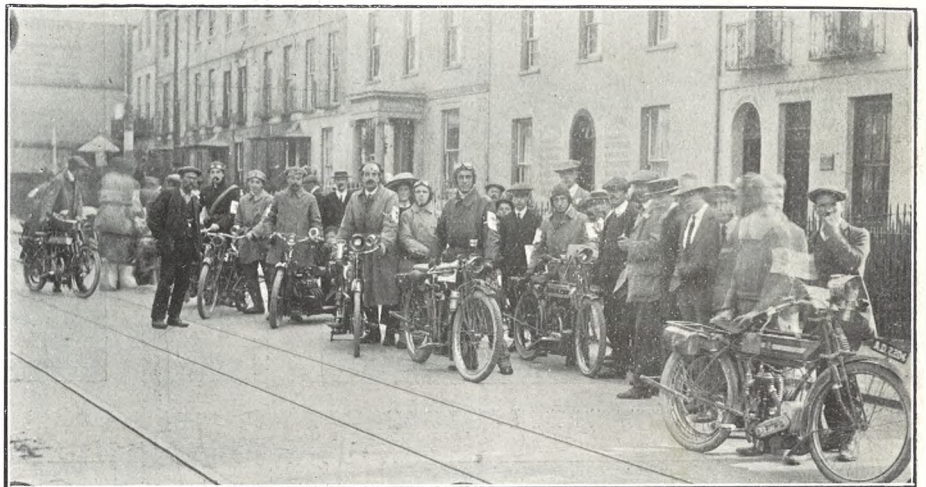

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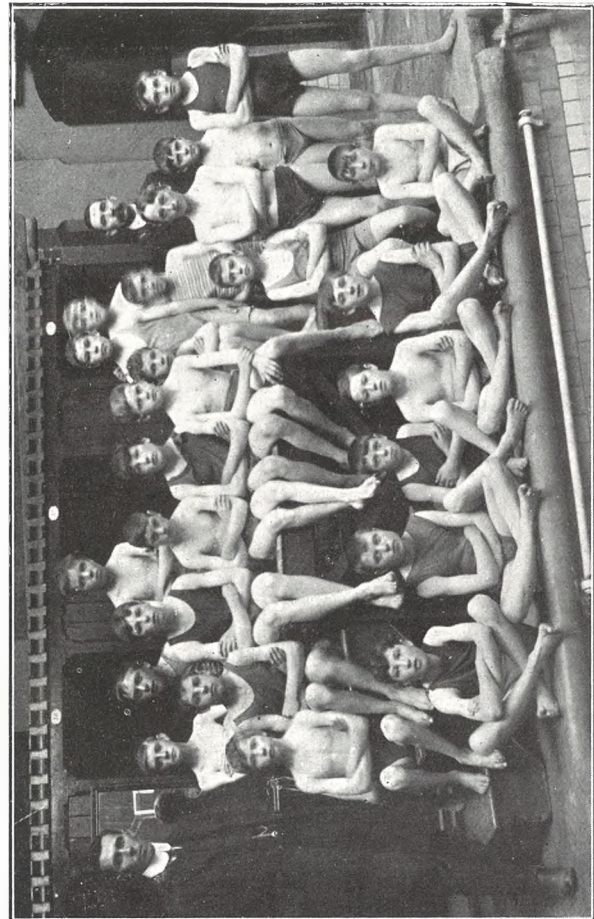

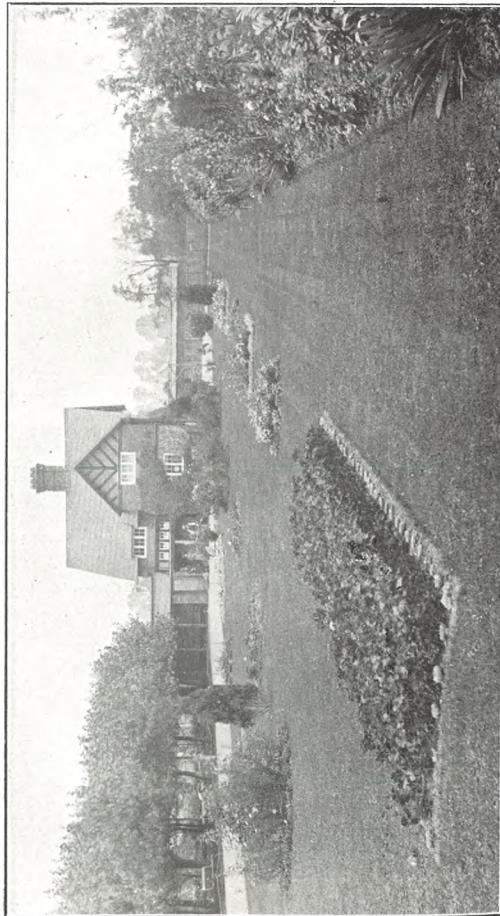

"THE FATHER OF MODERN BILLIARDS."

Prominent among the articles in the October "Windsor Magazine" is one on Billiards, by the English Champion, Melbourne Inman, who has a number of interesting things to say. The earlier evolutions and history of the game are traced by Frederic Adye, from the days of the first pictorial records of the game in its present form, which show Louis XIV. and his sons as patrons of it. Mr. Inman says:—
 "The father of modern billiards' is John Roberts. He lifted the billiard table from amidst unpleasant surroundings. He showed it to be what it really is—the medium of scientific recreation. The evil association fled like demons of the night when the daylight breaks. He lived his life in the atmosphere of the billiard-room. The up-to-date 'top-of-the-table,' with all its refinements, disappointments, light and shade, was developed by the inspired mind of John Roberts. For nearly twenty years he was facile princeps as its delineator a giant among pigmies, always very conscious of his outstanding rank as a champion of champions. What is more, he always carried himself as such, and brooked no rival in his path. His personality lent a glamour to billiards which has not lost any of its lustre since the dawn of the present century, and the partial eclipse of the brightest billiard constellation by younger, if less glowing, planets. John Roberts was my billiards hero in the days when I figured as a juvenile player. He has lost little of his fascination for me. For speed, daring flights of fancy, and belief in his own ability, apart from his abnormal skill, John Roberts has written a chapter of billiards all to himself. He is the model upon which all the big billiards of the day is shaped."



MR. WILLIAM FRATER COCKBURN,

A native of Edinburgh, for over 40 years a surgeon-dentist in practice at Gloucester, where he died on September 19, 1912, in his 74th year.

KAFFIRS' FONDNESS FOR BICYCLES.

A taste for European clothes, cheap furniture, European food, bicycles, tin trunks, etc., is reported to be developing among the coloured native population of South Africa, according to the official trade report. The Commissioner estimates that £6,351,000 is the value of the native population to overseas exporters of goods. Hitherto trade with the natives—known as "Kaffir Truck" trade—has comprised chiefly cheap goods, such as beads, cotton blankets, brass, copper, and steel wire, and cheap cutlery. The natives are now earning better wages, and this is developing their taste.

INDIAN MEDICAL REQUIREMENTS.

It is more than a quarter of a century since the Dowager Marchioness of Dufferin inaugurated the association for supplying female medical aid to the women of India. The 27th annual report, relating to the year 1911, shows that steady progress in the work has been maintained; 310,717 women have been treated in hospitals mainly controlled and supported by the Dufferin Fund, and 397,109 in hospitals supported from other sources, but assisted by the fund. In addition to this work the association is supporting to a greater or less extent ninety female students of medicine in various medical schools and colleges throughout the country. It is stated that there are now 56 medical women of the first grade practising in India, 92 female assistant surgeons, and 342 female hospital assistants; while 586 women are at the present time studying medicine or undergoing training for the nursing profession in various colleges, schools, and hospitals in the different provinces.

WOMEN AS SOLICITORS.

An interesting paper was read by Mr. Edward A. Bell, London, before the Law Society at Cardiff, on the admission of women into the legal profession. Dealing with the present position of educated women in other professions, Mr. Bell remarked that no fewer than 20,000 women were carrying on the profession of attorneys-at-law in the United States. In the Solicitors Act, 1843, the word importing masculine gender was held to include women as well. Why, asked Mr. Bell, should women who were properly qualified for the responsible profession of a solicitor be refused permission to practise?

The argument of domesticity was used against the admission of women to many other professions where they were now triumphantly installed, and which they admittedly adorned by their ability. An educated woman, by reason of her patience and methodical habits, her deductive and tabulative instincts for ministerial duties, was eminently qualified to act as a solicitor.

Mr. J. W. Reid, London, thought that women had scarcely learnt to be honest yet, a remark that was received with some amusement.

The members proceeded to the next business, without taking a vote on the question.

DEATH OF A LADY AGED 104.

The death occurred on Wednesday morning at Sunningdale, near Ascot, of Mrs. Mary neighbour, in her 104th year. The deceased married at the age of 19 years, and had thirteen children, five of whom survive, the eldest son being 81 years of age.

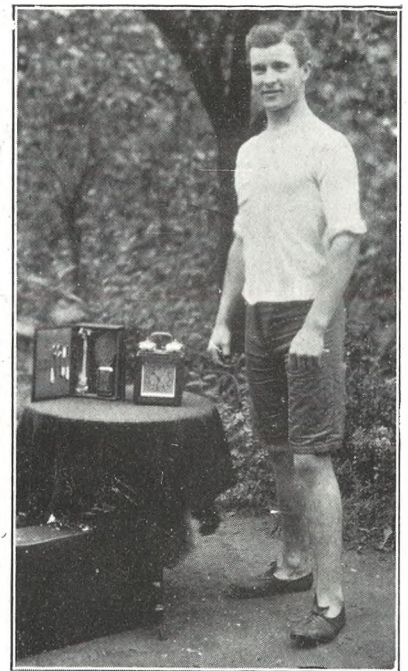

TO BUSINESS MEN.

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LADY PAGET ON CHAPEL POLITICS.
