

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





















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

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





SIR EVELYN WOOD'S SUGGESTION.

SIR EVELYN WOOD'S SUGGESTION.

Sir Evelyn Wood, interviewed on Tuesday, put forward a new suggestion in regard to the National Reserve. His idea was, he said, that any National Reservist who so desired should be allowed to register his name in any Territorial battalion where the commanding officer was willing to receive him, the act being voluntary on both sides. If that were allowed up to 33 per cent. above establishment the best and youngest of the men would be brought into close connection with and fill the ranks of the Territorial Force.

"I am very anxious," said Sir Evelyn, "to

make the very best we can of the Territorial Force, coupling with it the National Reserve, the men of which should, I suggest, rejoin the colours in the ranks of the Territorial army when a national emergency arose. For that purpose, however, the National Reservists must undertake a legal liability to rejoin the colours, and if they do that they must receive in return some honorarium or retaining fee."





WOMEN DRESSED IN WOOD.

SUBSTITUTION FOR SILK.

SUBSTITUTION FOR SILK.

"English women of all classes have dressed better and more attractively this year than ever before," said a leading West-end draper, when questioned on the subject. "This is due to the fact that the prices of silk blouses, ribbons, and the lighter grades of taffetas foulards, crèpe de Chine, and mull, so much favoured for summer and evening even the slenderest purse. Yet, I wonder how many women realise that these so-called silken fripperies with which they so gleefully adorn themselves to gladden masculine eyes—and even more to rival one another—are really made from wood pulp, and haven't even the remotest connection with the silk-worm or the mulberry leaf?

"It is a fact, though, just the same. Manufacturers both in England and on the Continent have been experimenting with wood pulp fibre as a substitute for the product of the silkworm for the past three years, but it was only last winter that they finally succeeded in overcoming all the drawbacks to its use. There are now half-a-dozen big firms engaged in the manufacture of all kinds of 'silk' goods from wood pulp fibre, including laces, trimmings, and stockings. One of these firms employs 1,000 hands, and turns out 23,000 pounds of yarn a week. The output of this plant, however, is only a small part of the artificial product consumed by



"The necessity for the substitution grew naturally out of the enormous and constantly growing demand for silk materials. There

"The necessity for the substitution grew naturally out of the enormous and constantly growing demand for silk materials. There was a time when a woman got a black silk dress and wore it for years, and only people of means possessed this one silk dress. But now, especially in the summer time, almost every other woman who comes along is wearing a 'silk' frock of some sort, or at least a 'silk' blouse. The sadly overworked silkworm has not been able to keep pace with this increasing demand. Moreover, the cry was not only for more silk, but for cheaper silk as well. Even the men entered the field with a growing demand for silk hose and underwear.

"The natural solution, of course, was adulteration. As a consequence, I dare say there is now no such thing as absolutely pure silk on the market, while every manufacturer knows it is a physical impossibility to dye black silks without adding some weight to the fabric. It is also impossible to detect the real quality of silk in a garment, the only way to acquire this knowledge being to submit it to a chemical analysis. Women buy from style and colour without knowledge of the quality. There isn't one who can tell the difference between two pieces of silk on a counter, though one piece may be worth 2s. a yard more than the other. This fact made it more easy for the manufacturer to find a substitute for silk—something that would look like silk, glisten like silk, feel like silk, and perhaps not be silk at all. The chief trouble with the wood pulp fibre in the beginning was that when it was wet it turned back to a pulp, and parted readily under tension. But lengthy experiments were undertaken, and this difficulty was so far overcome that now the artificial silk is introduced into wash cottons as silk stripes or figures, and washes very well. When you meet a beautiful woman nowadays who is beautifully gowned with shimmering silks, it will require no serious stretch of the imagination to think of her as being encased in wood." silks, it will require no serious stretch of the imagination to think of her as being encased in wood."







"THE GRAPHIC" (1s.).

This is exquisitely illustrated in many tints, and contains a good Christmas story by K. L. Montgomery, and other tales by Arthur Eckersley and De Vere Stacpoole. Perhaps the best of the illustrations are "Kittens" and "The Capture of Father Christmas by Boy Scouts." Boy Scouts.

"PEAR'S ANNUAL" (6d.).

With this are given three presentation plates, each in about twelve colours. The principal literary attraction is a story called "Magepa." by Rider Haggard. Fergus Hume also contributes an Australian Christmas tale.

"THE WINDSOR MAGAZINE" (1s.).

Has a magnificent list of contributors, including W. J. Locke, Max Pemberton. Keble Howard, Maurice Hewlett, Eden Phillpotts, Robert Barr, Halliwell Sutcliffe, E. F. Benson, and H. G. Wells. The reproductions of pictures in the Walker Art Gallery in Liverpool are well-nigh perfect. This Christmas number is quite a champion one, and contains over 200 pages of magazine matter.

E. Temple Thurston writes on an East-End Garden. There is an account of a "Woman's Day in the Alps," with the delights of winter sports, illustrated by typical pictures. A useful article for women is that which gives novel ideas for home-made Christmas gifts.

THE POEMS OF ADAM LINDSAY GORDON.

(2/6 and 1/6. Henry Frowde, Oxford).

There has been quite a boom in Gordon lately, largely, no doubt, owing to the fact that the copyright has just expired. Probably other editions will follow shortly, as the poet of the Bush has now secured a safe place among the immortals. Not that all his poetry is inspired. Some of it is distinctly mediocre stuff, and it would be better for his fame if it had never been published. Yet in one or two of his poems he touches the true note, and on their account his claims as a poet will ever be unassailable. In Australia he is held in special honour. It is interesting, therefore, to read in this latest edition of Gordon's poems an introduction by an Australian man of letters, Mr. Frank Maldon Robb, of Melbourne. His appreciation of Gordon's character is not so sympathetic as that of Mr. Sladen and Miss Humphris in the Memoirs of Gordon, which we reviewed last week. It contains a very interesting chapter entitled "The Making of Gordon," in which Mr. Robb traces the debt which the poet owes to English literature, especially to the works of Shelley, Byron, and Browning. In some places where a similarity is claimed, it must be admitted that if Gordon is "after" these giants he is a very considerable way after. his fame if it had never been published. There can be no doubt that he had this in common with Byron, a steady refusal "to polish. to file, or to furbish." None the less, though Gordon is not among the major poets, and though he refused to make by diligence the most of his poetic outbursts, he wrote several lines that will live as long as the English tongue survives. Above all, his poetry must be always of more than ordinary interest to all who care for the Cotswold country.
