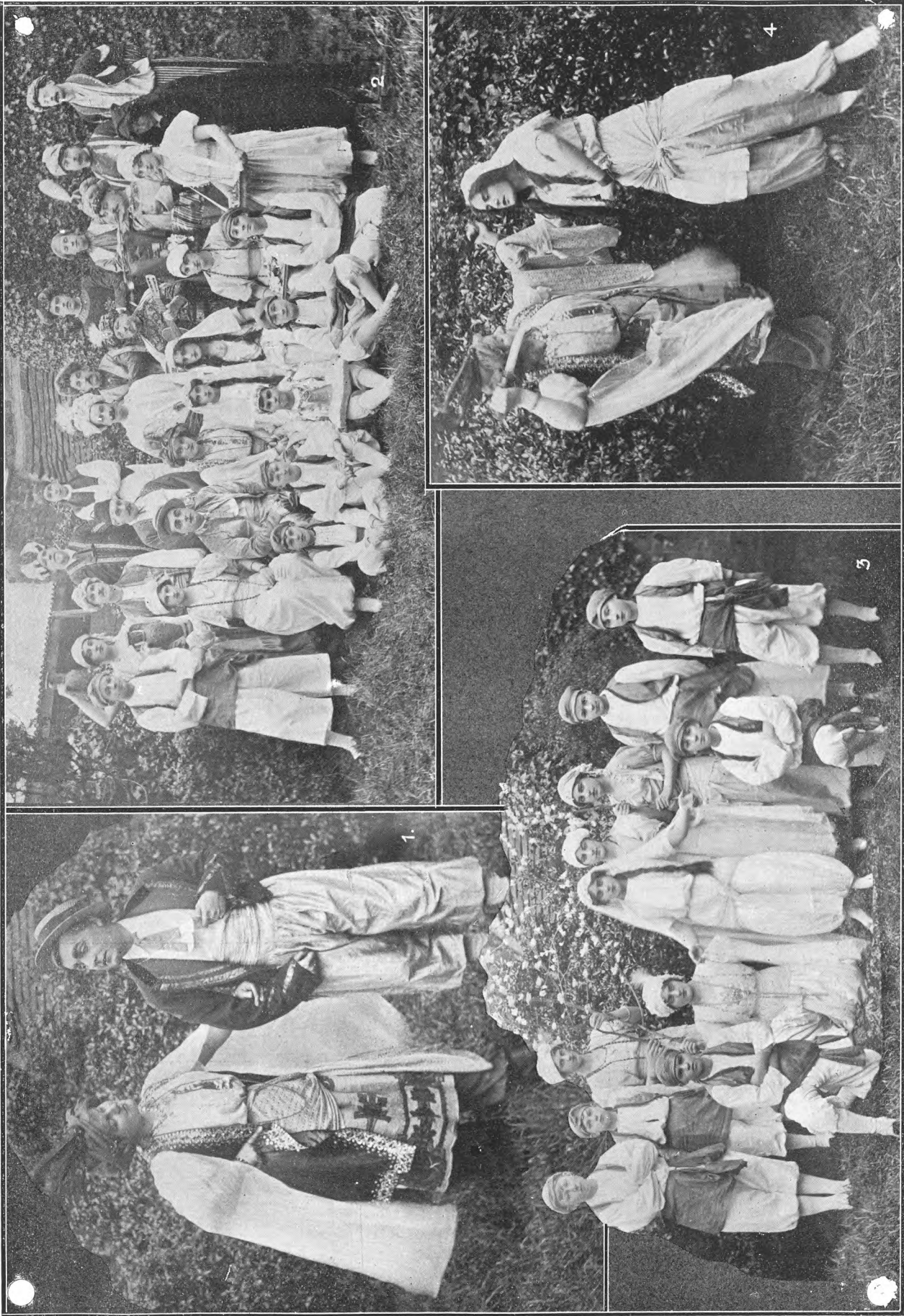

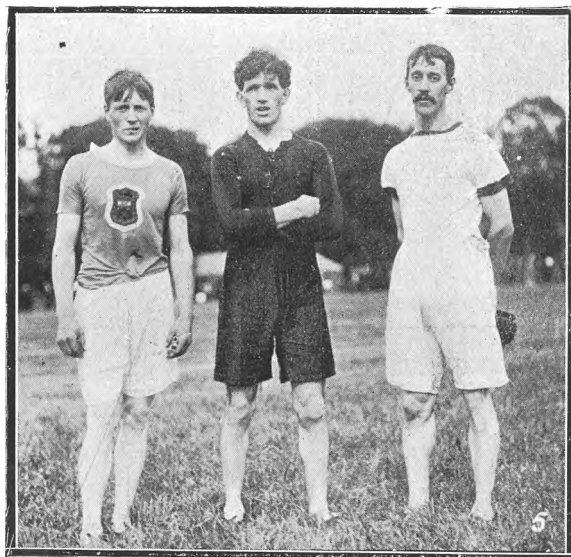
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MR. GEORGE F. POOLE,

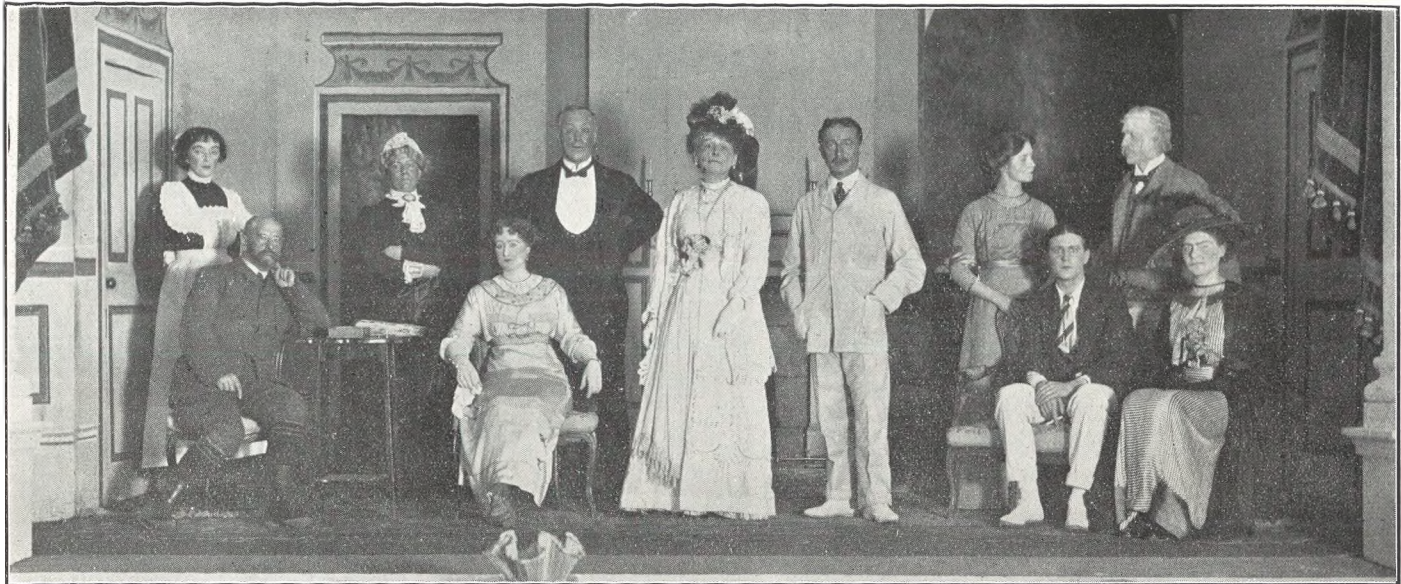

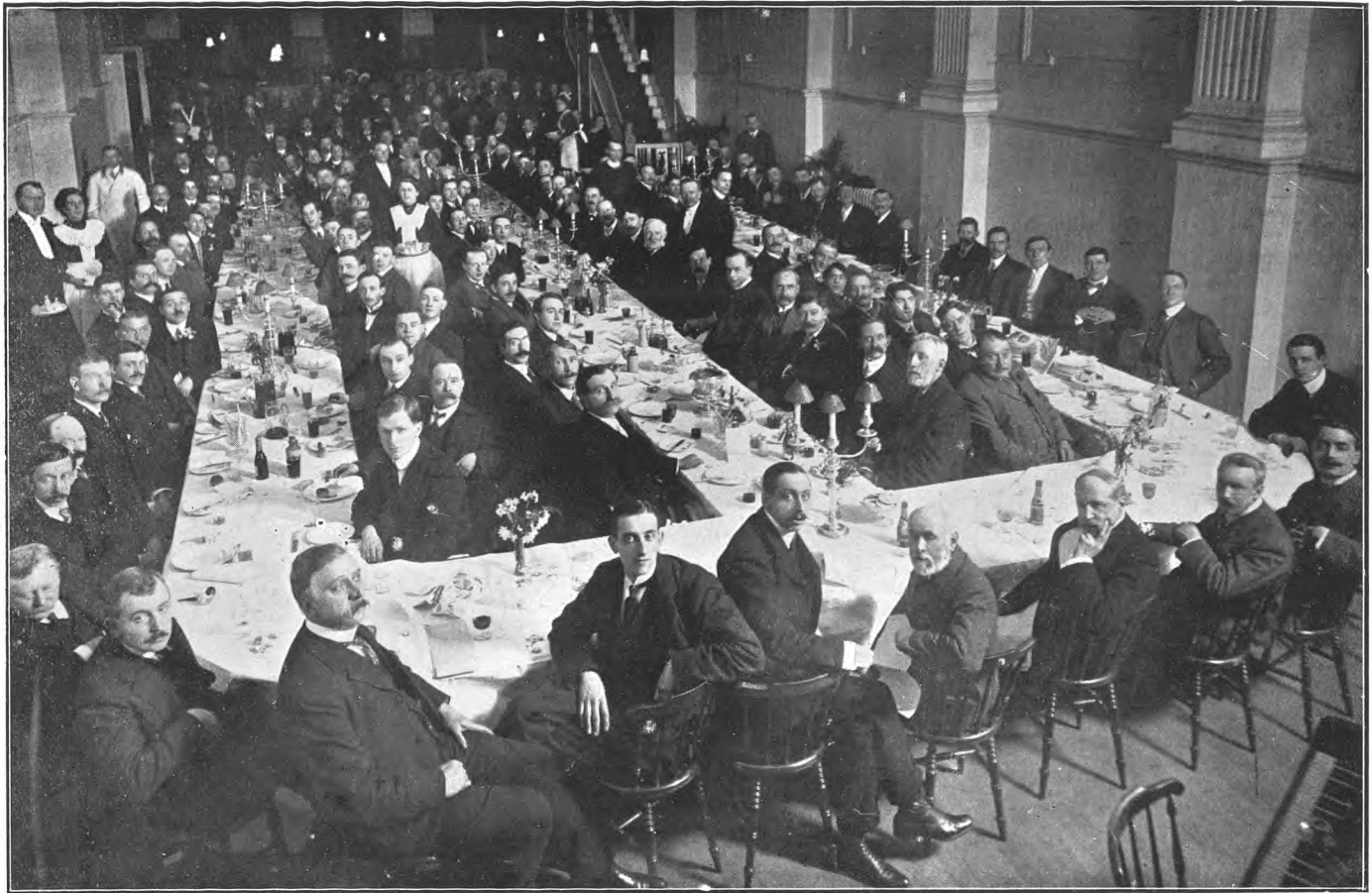

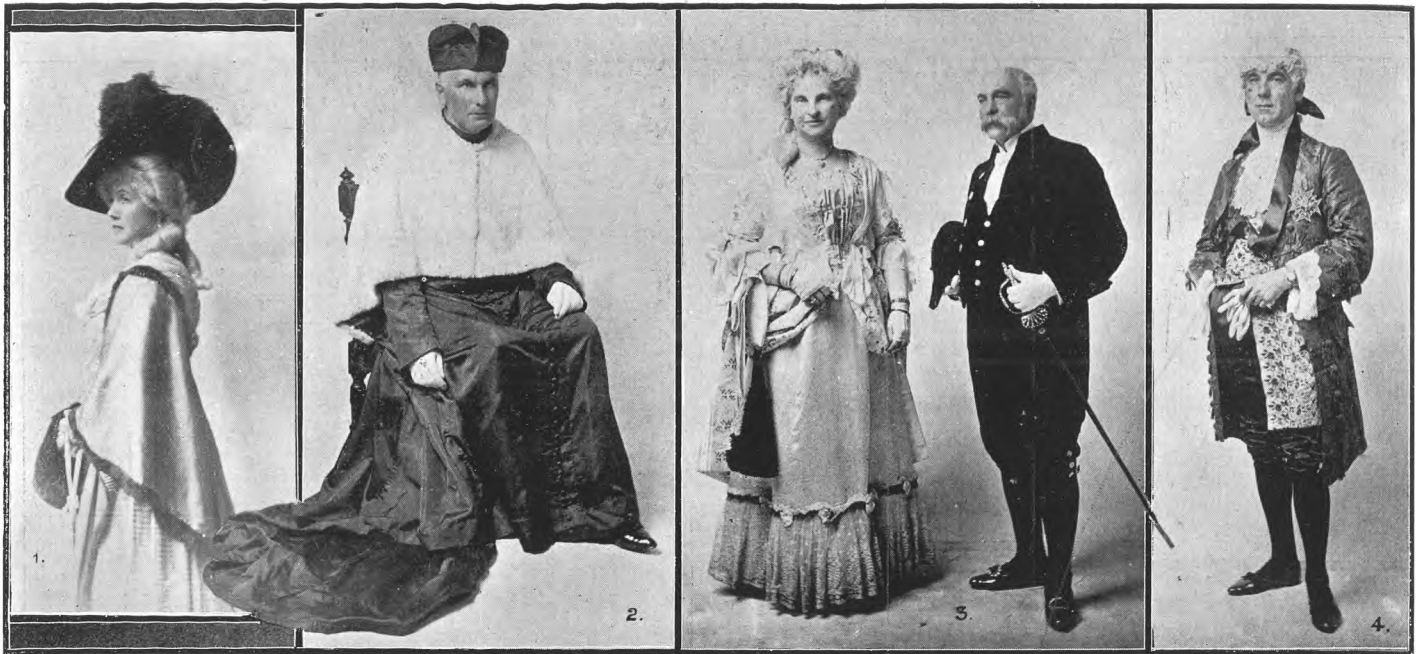

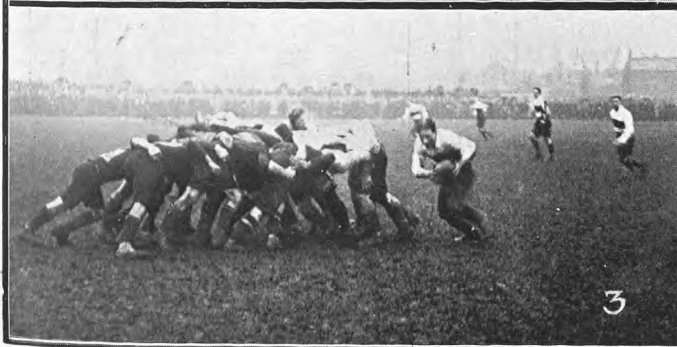

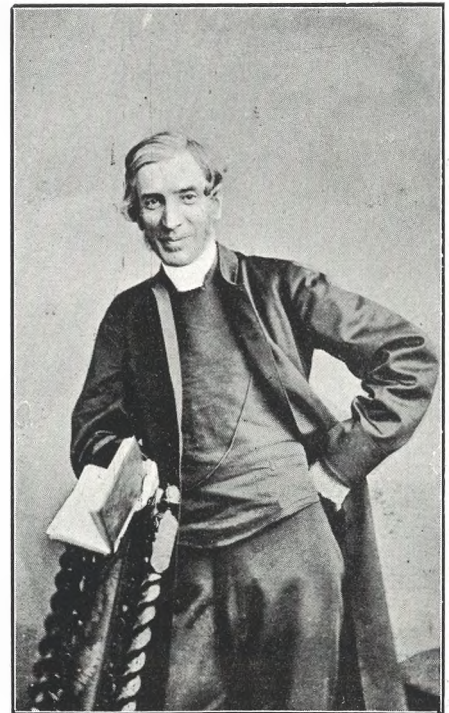

THE OLDEST DINNER IN ENGLAND.

THE 123RD ANNIVERSARY OF THE TRUE BLUE DINNER WAS HELD AT THE BELL HOTEL, GLOUCESTER, ON FEB. 4, 1913. MR. W. HERBERT DRUMMOND, THE CONSERVATIVE CANDIDATE FOR THE FOREST OF DEAN, IN THE CHAIR. THIS HISTORIC OLD FUNCTION, HELD TO COMMEMORATE THE VICTORY OF PITT AT THE GLOUCESTER ELECTION OF FEB. 4, 1789, BY ONE VOTE, HAS TAKEN PLACE WITHOUT INTERRUPTION FOR 123 YEARS AT THE BELL HOTEL, GLOUCESTER, AND ALTHOUGH BACK IN THE FORTIES AND FIFTIES ONLY 5 OR 6 CHOICE SPIRITS KEPT IT UP, IT IS NOW WELL ATTENDED, ABOUT 200 BEING PRESENT ON TUESDAY LAST.

A NEW FOUNTAIN IN CHELTENHAM.

At the Cheltenham Town Council meeting on Monday, the Mayor announced that Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Drew were presenting a marble fountain to the town of Cheltenham. We give a photograph of the statuary group by which it will be surmounted. The work is to be carried out by Messrs. R. L. Boulton and Sons, and the model is by Mr. Ambrose Neale, of that firm. The statue is of heroic size, the figure of the King standing 7ft. high, and the top of the pedestal on which it will stand will be 7ft. above ground. The drinking trough will be executed in granite. The pedestal will be in polished Hopton Wood (Derbyshire) marble and the statuary group in white Sicilian marble.

Leader of the South Pole Expedition, who, after reaching the Pole on Jan. 18, 1912, died of starvation and exhaustion within eleven miles of a food depot, about March 29, 1912, after two months of almost superhuman struggles and endeavour, with four of his comrades—Dr. Wilson, Capt. Oates, Lieut. Bowers, and Petty Officer Evans. The news of their brave and valiant deaths has stirred the whole world.



DR. E. A. WILSON,

Who died with Captain Scott about March 29, 1912, after successfully reaching the South Pole. He was one of the three—Captain Scott, Lieut. Bowers, and Dr. Wilson—who were found dead from exhaustion and starvation in a tent only eleven miles from One Ton Camp, a depot of supplies and fuel, which were found untouched. Dr. Wilson was a son of Dr. E. T. Wilson, of Cheltenham, and was educated at Cheltenham College. He was 40 years of age.

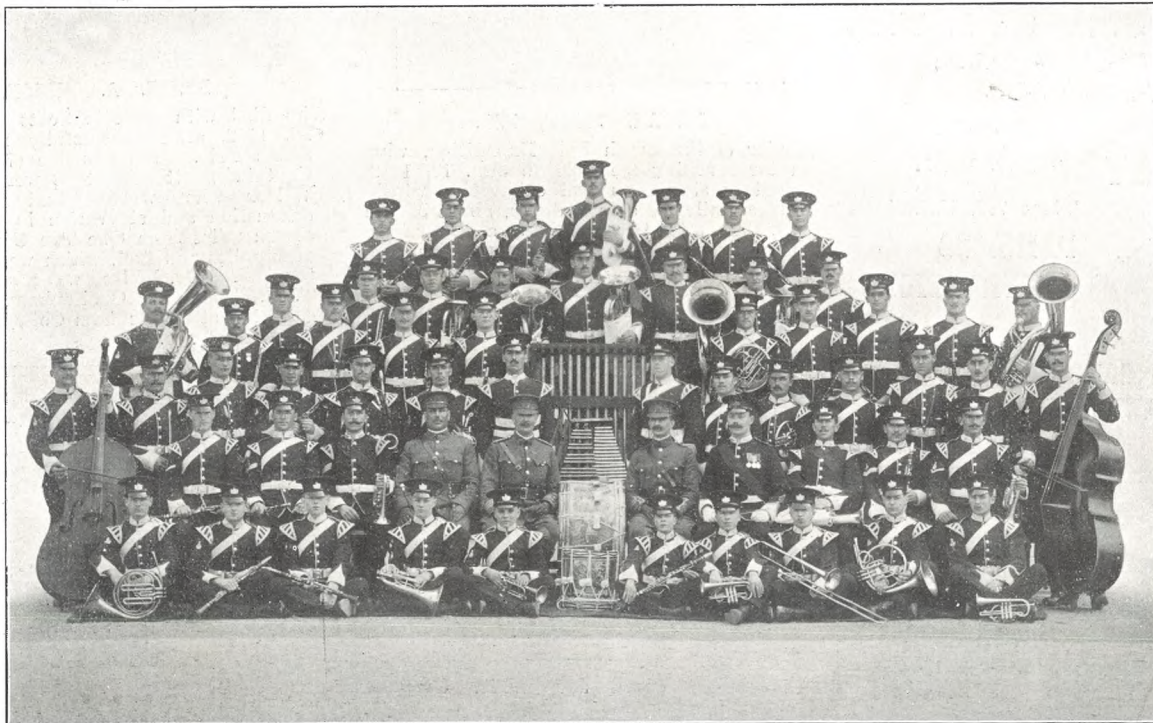

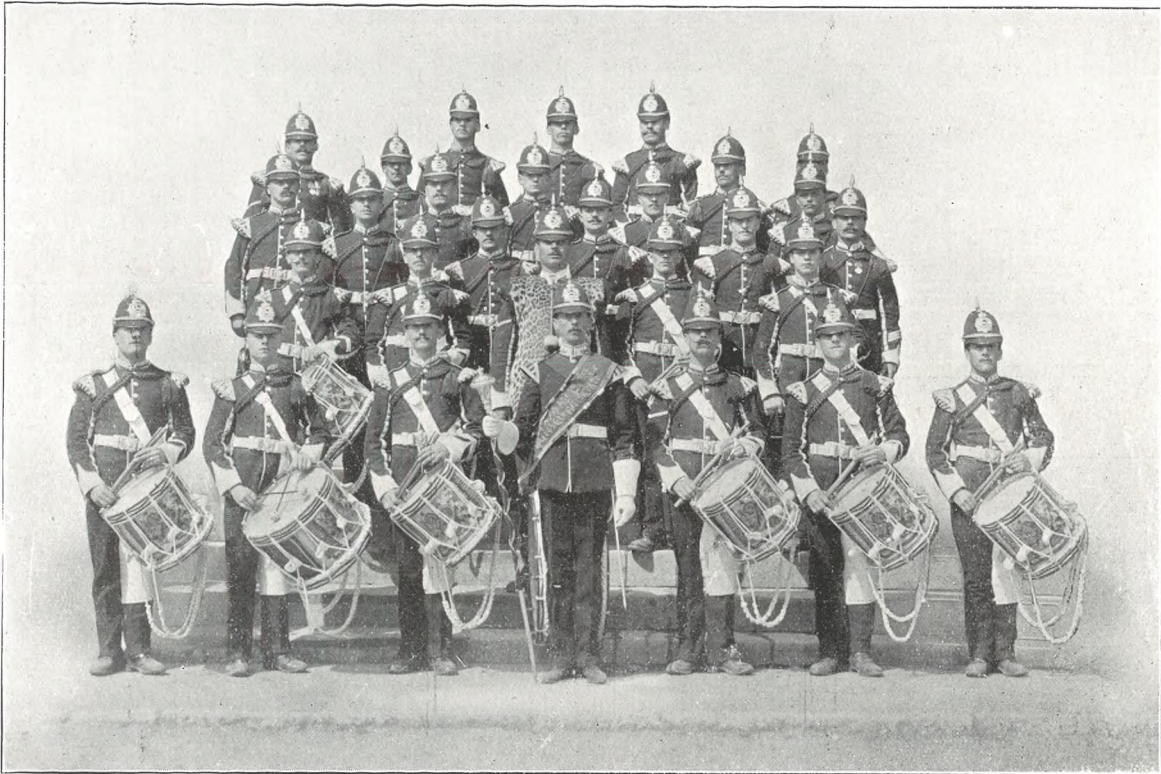

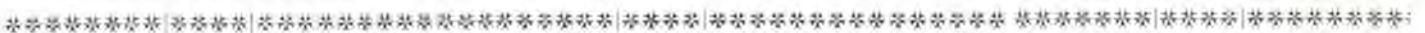

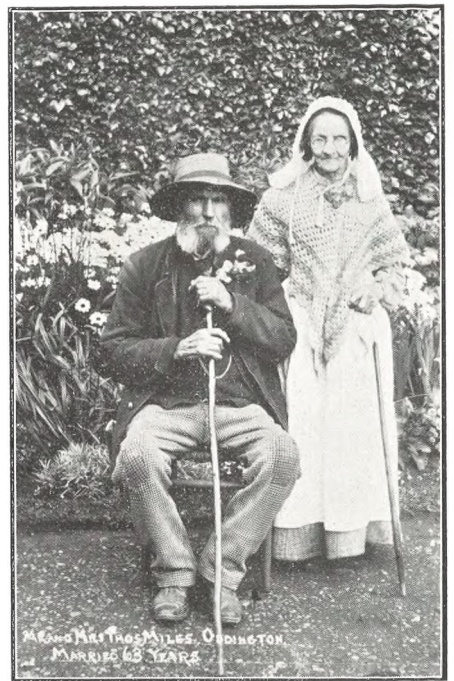

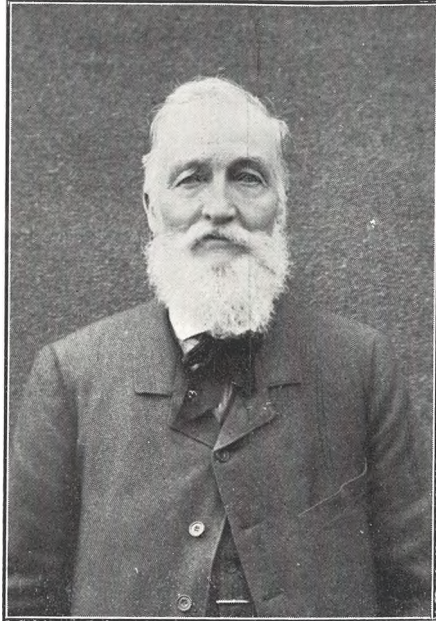

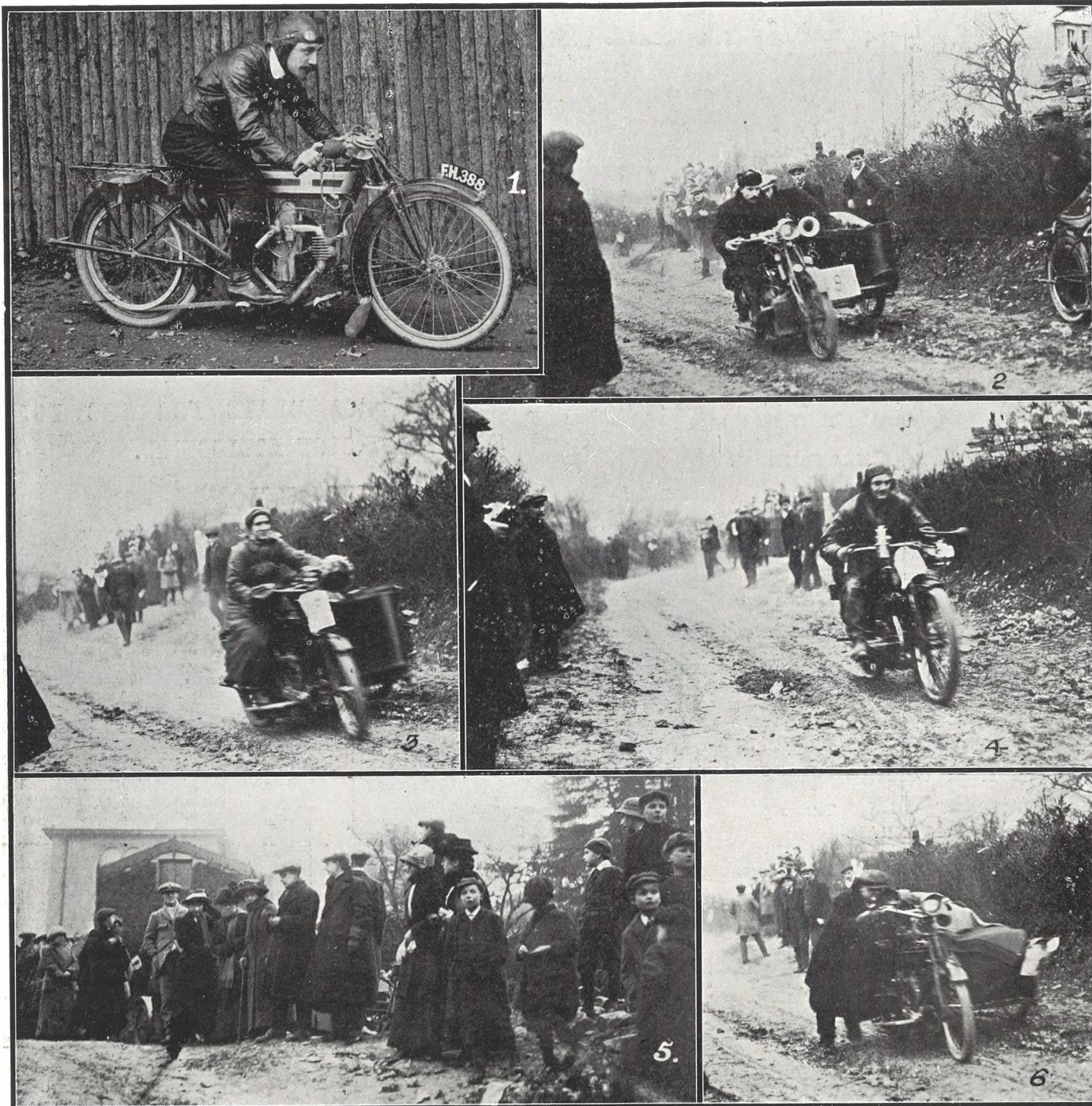

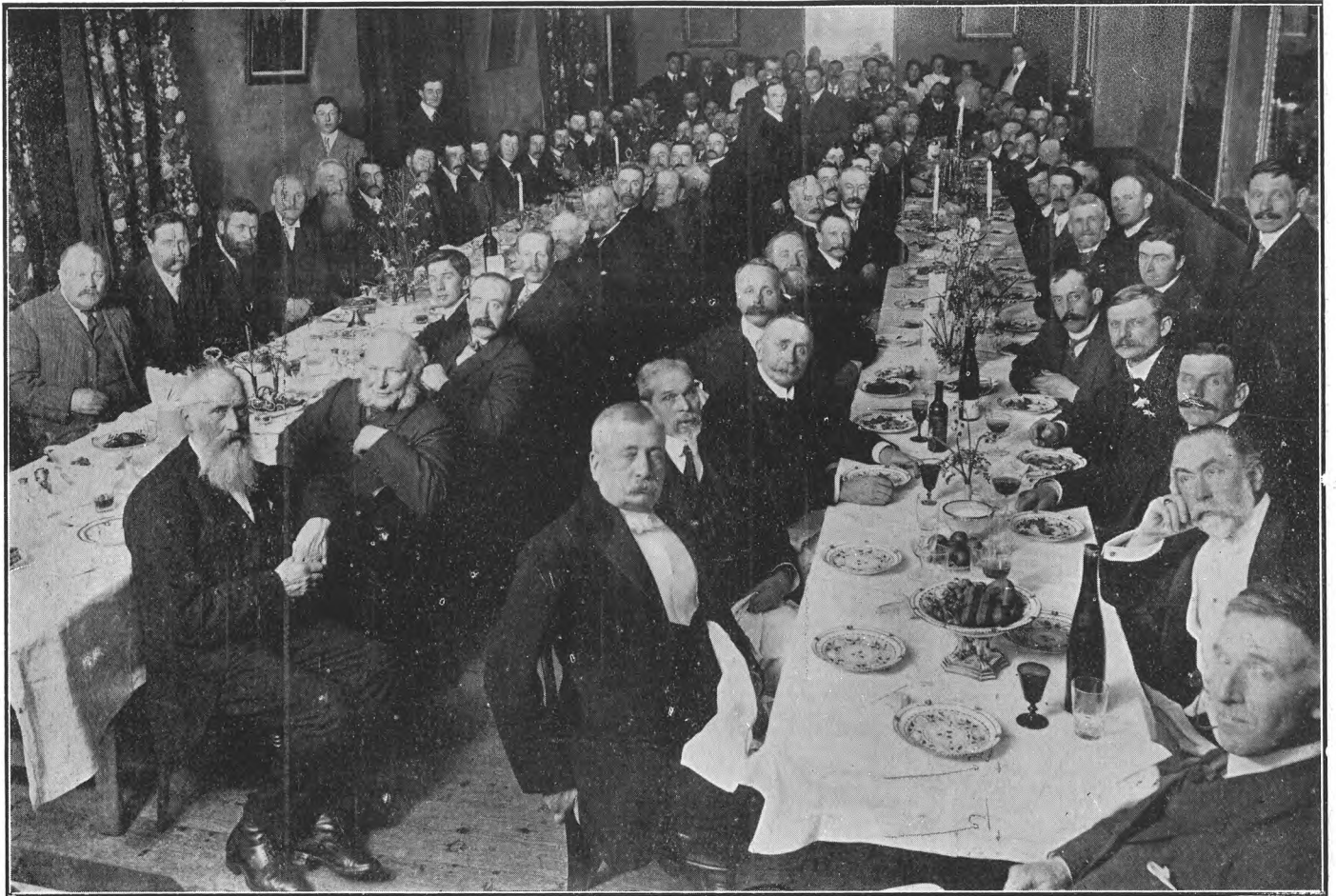

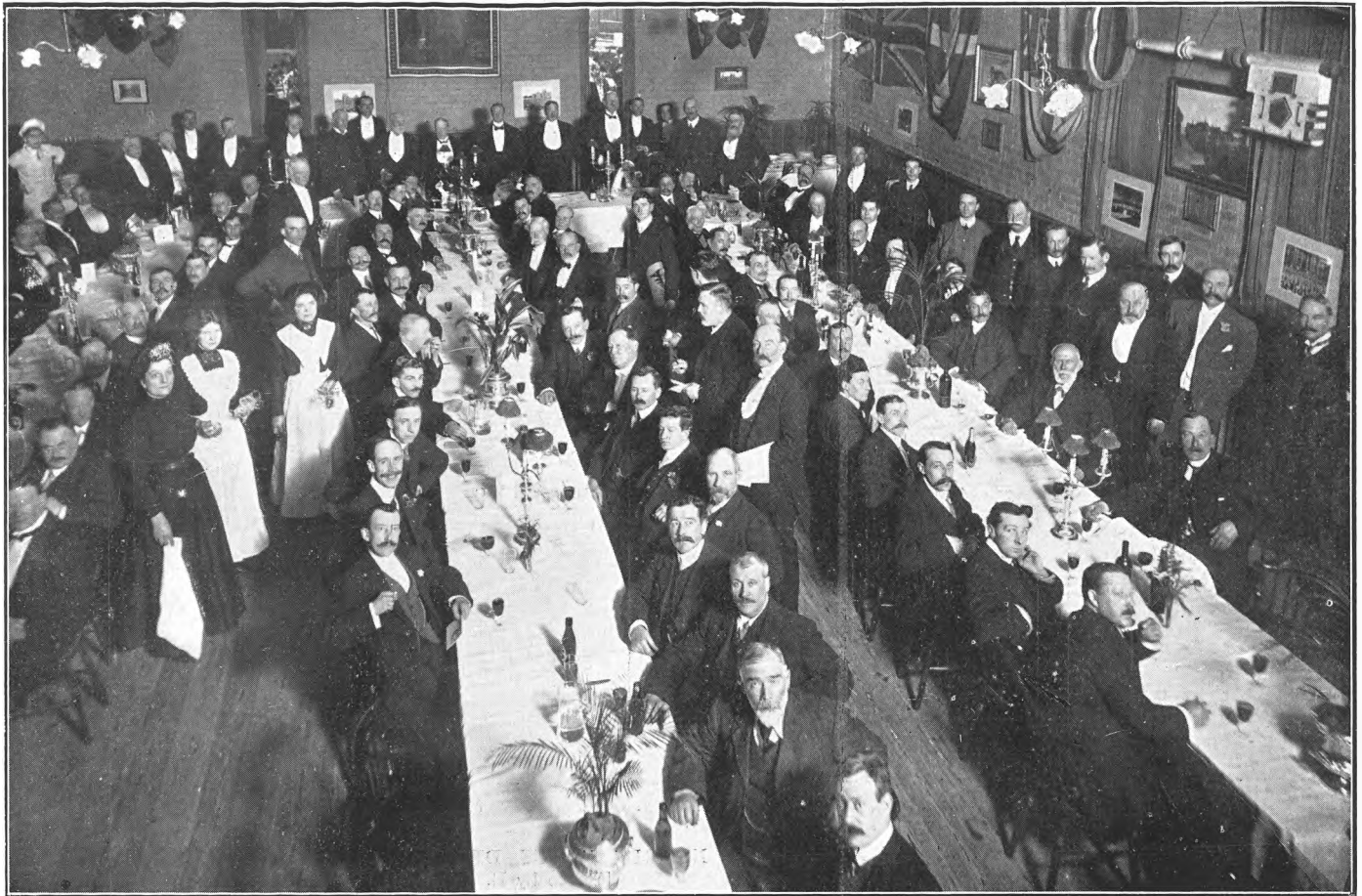

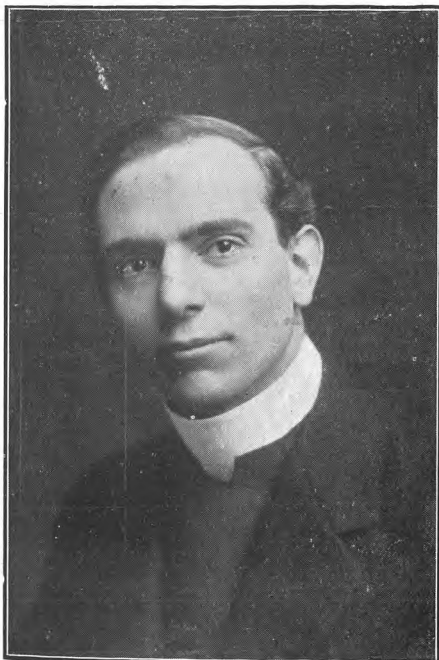

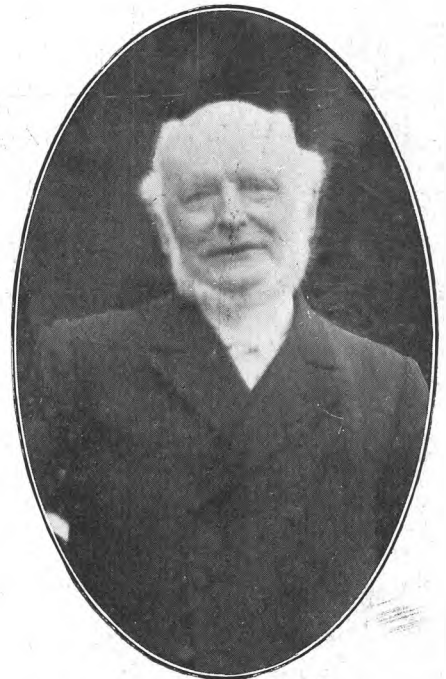

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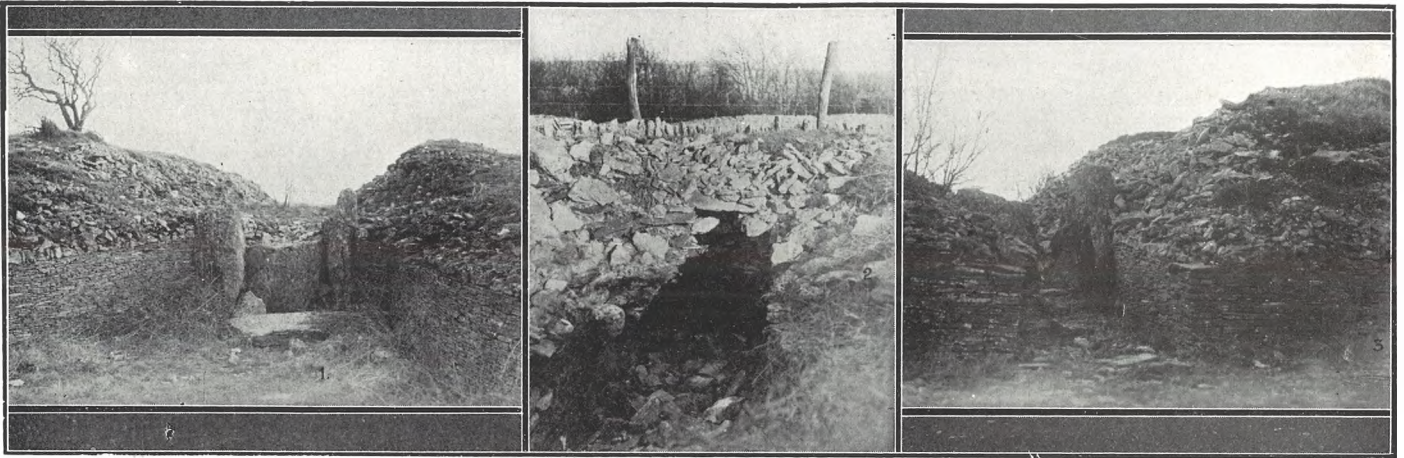
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The Manager,
