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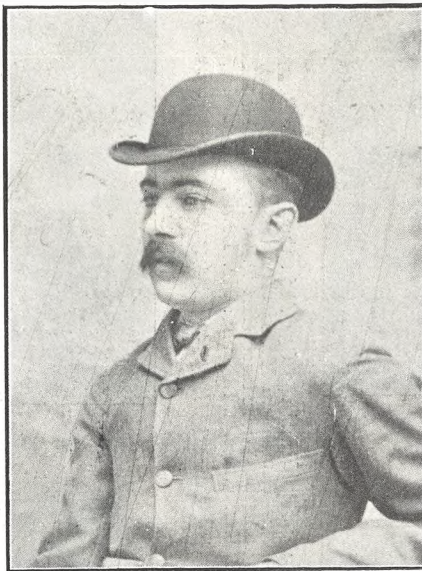

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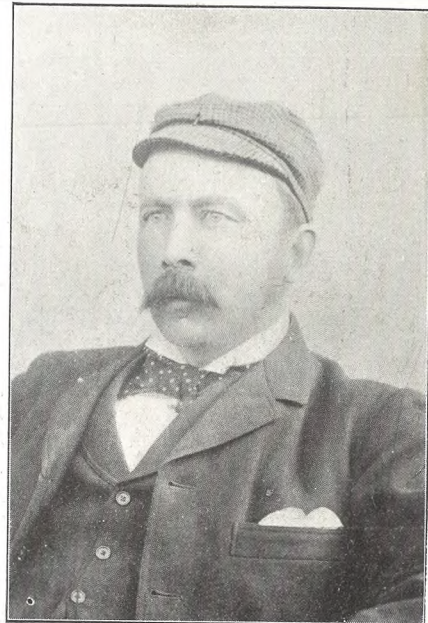

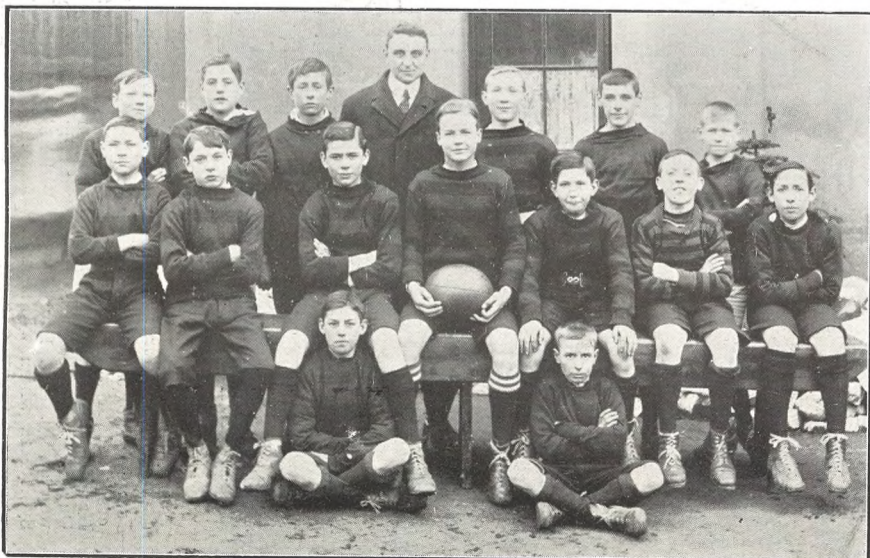

MR. ALBERT BUCHANAN, J.P.,

ONE OF GLOUCESTER'S MOST POPULAR CITIZENS, DIED AT THE ELMS, APRIL 5TH, AGED 70 YEARS.

He was first Mayor of bigger Gloucester, but he resigned the office after it was held by the High Court that the vote given by a certain Councillor was invalid through his having a contract with the city, with the result that ten Conservative aldermen were replaced by ten Liberals.

Major-General C. W. Park, who as major commanded the 1st Devons at the battle of Elandslaagte and led the historic charge on Wagon Hill, was buried with full military honours at Exeter on Saturday.

Lord and Lady Middleton have again been elected churchwardens at Peper Harow, near Godalming. It is believed to be the only church in the country where husband and wife hold these positions.

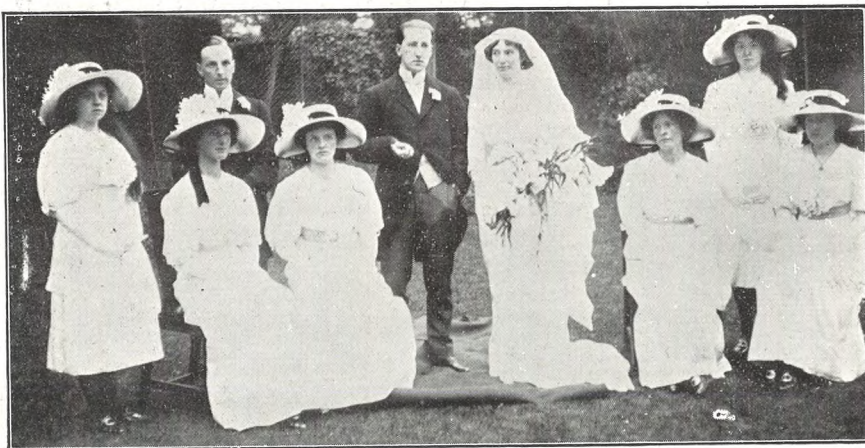

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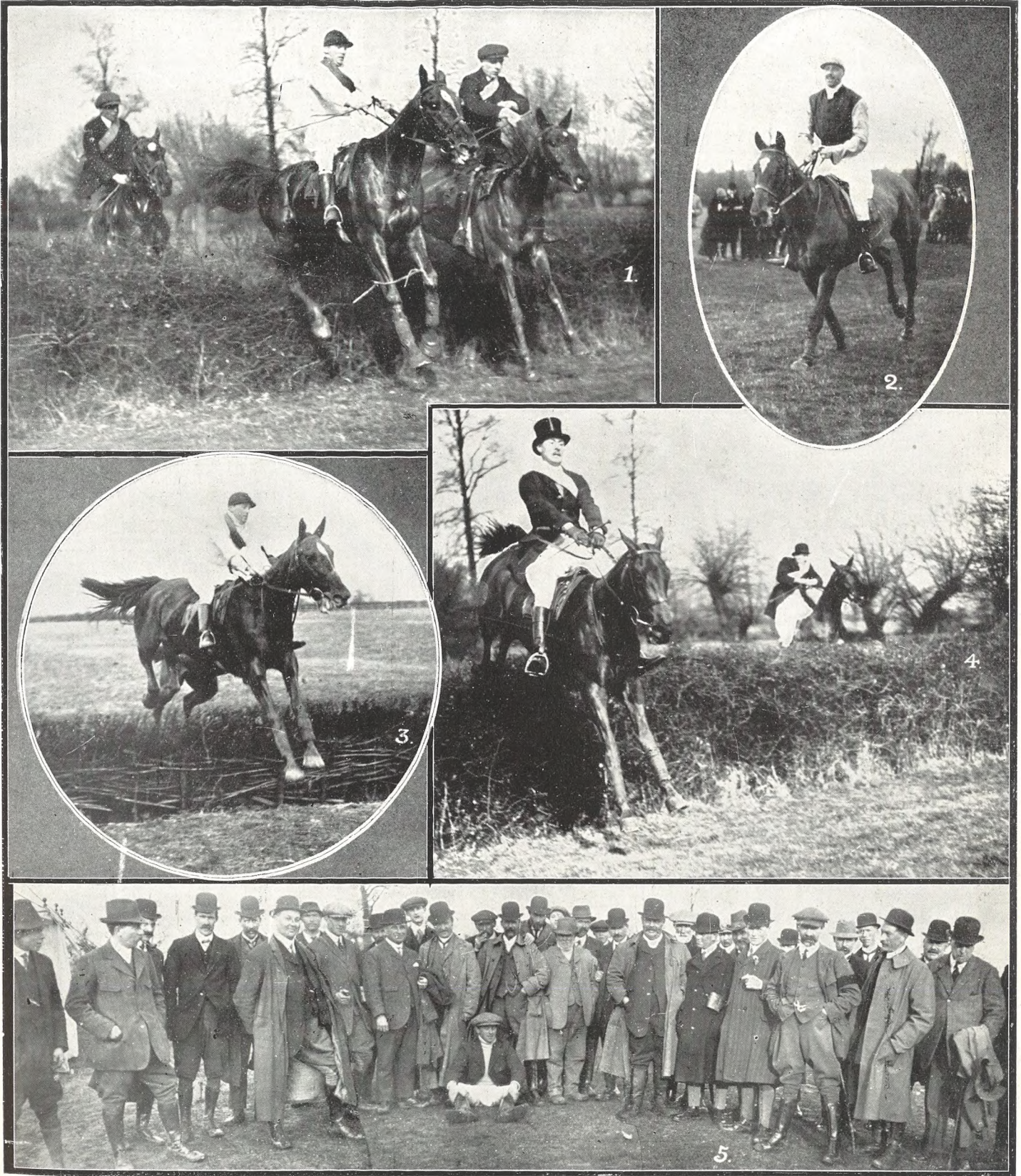

For the Afghan War and the Burmese Expedition he had the medals with clasps.

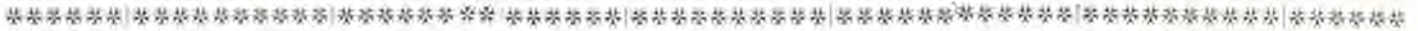

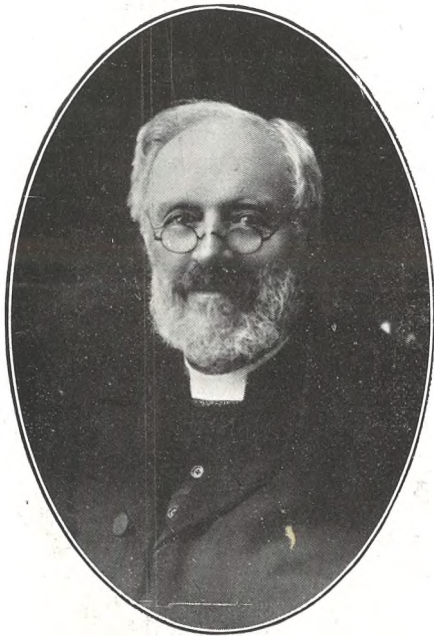

Rector of Woodchester, near Stroud, who died April 8, 1913. He was for 33 years rector, and was much beloved by the parishioners.

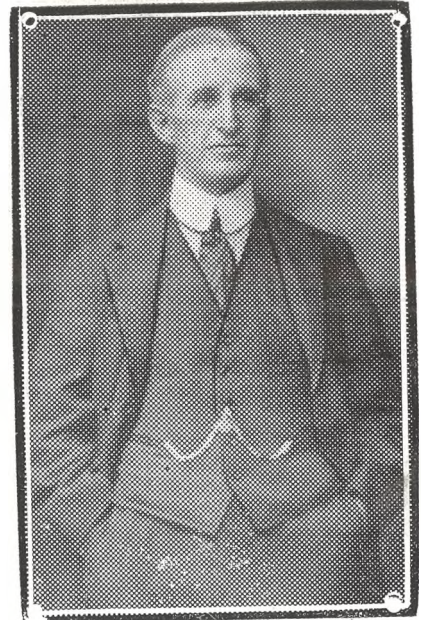

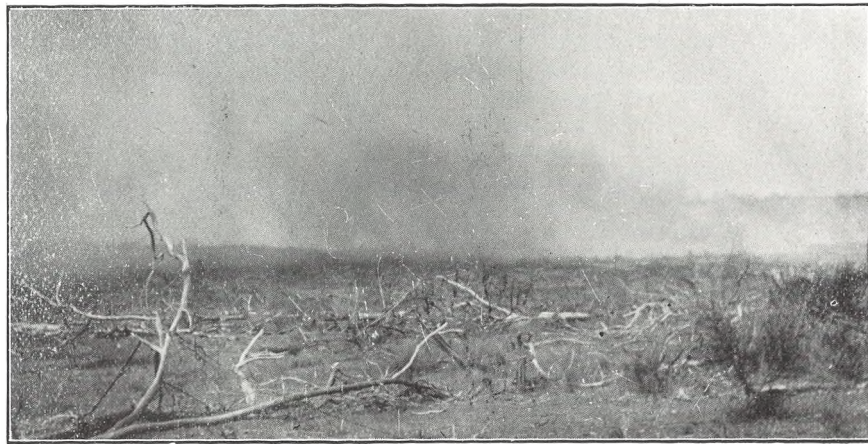

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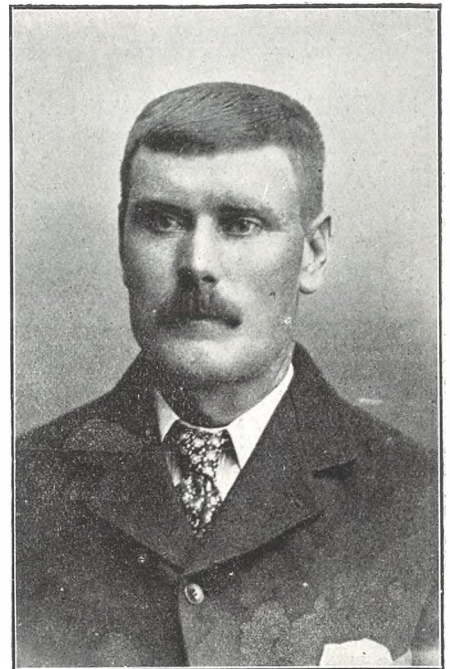

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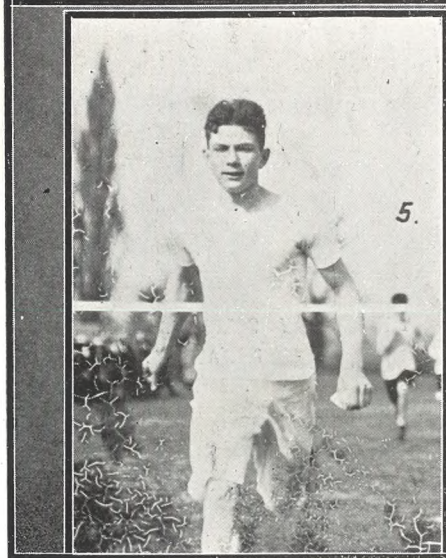

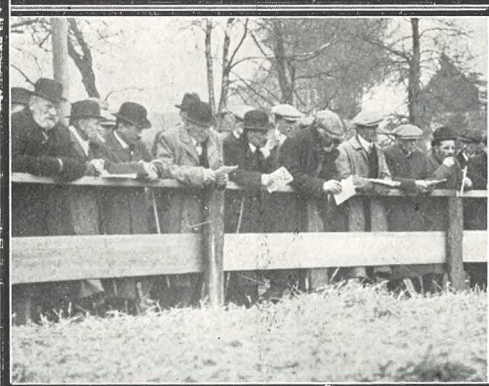

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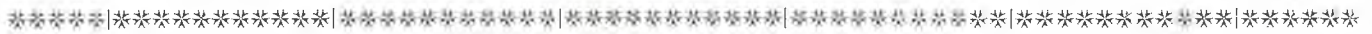
