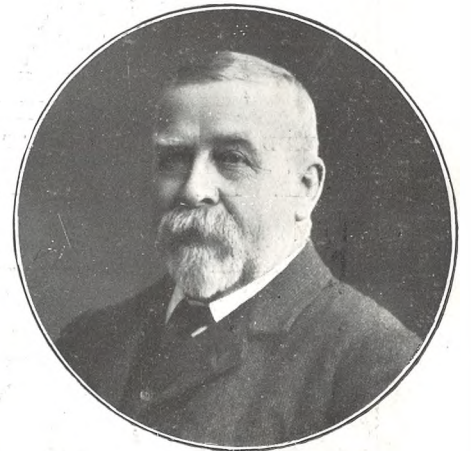

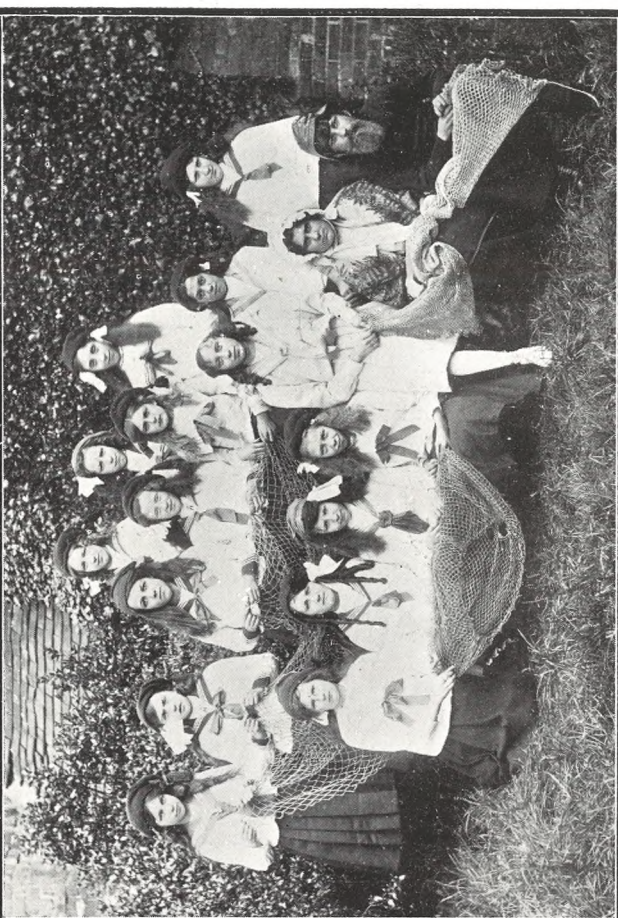

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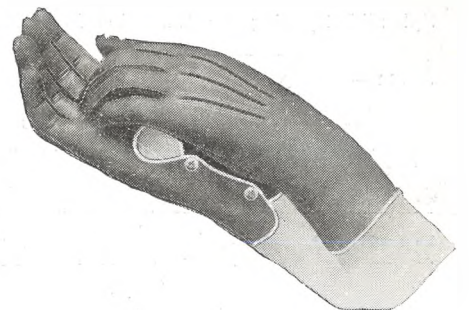

The funeral service was first held at All Saints' Church.

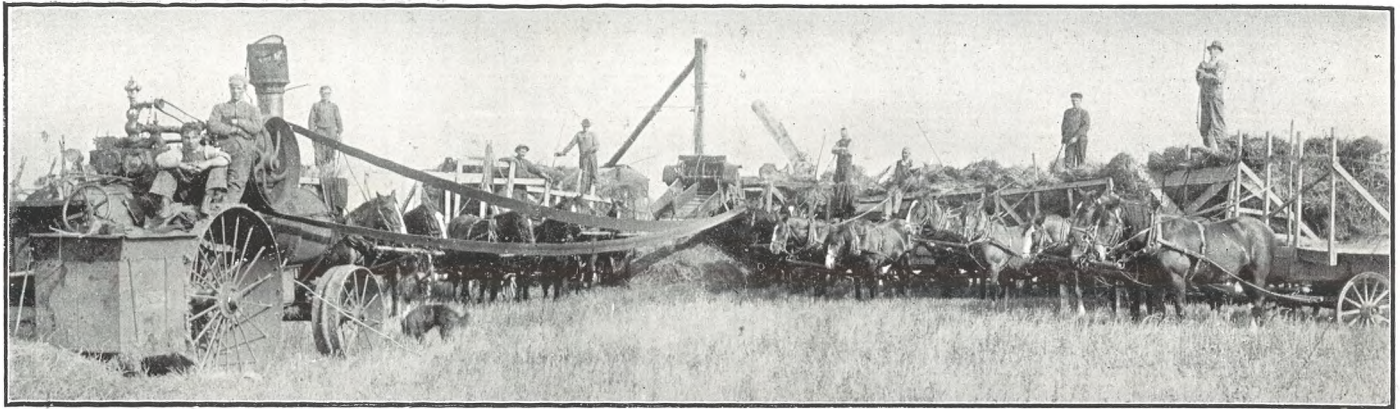

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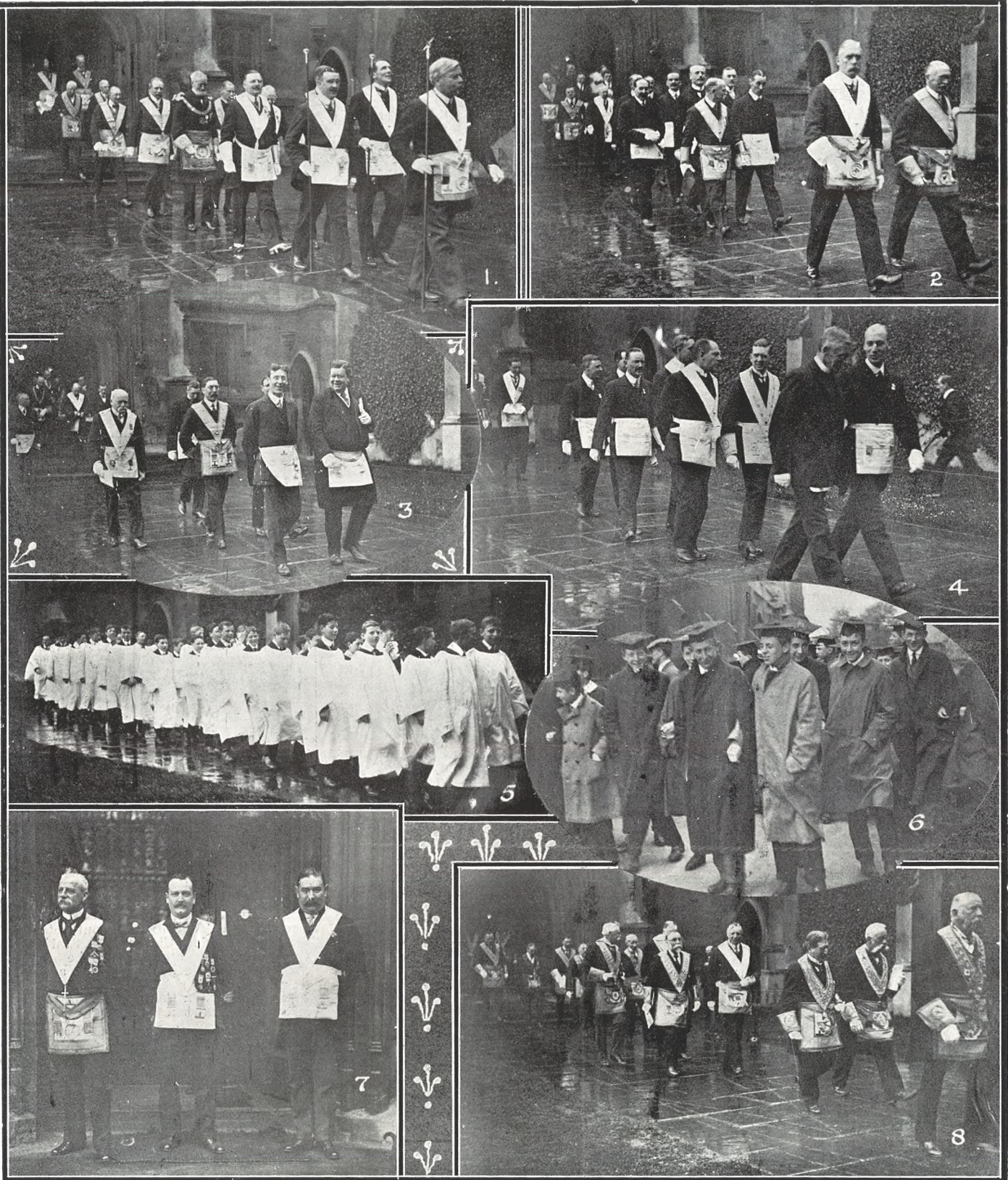

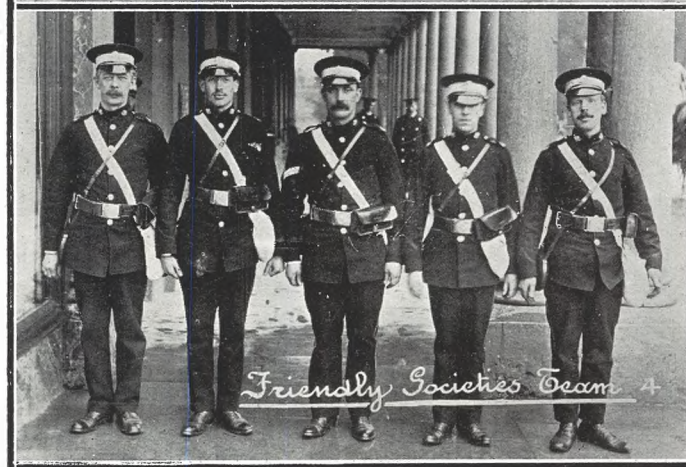

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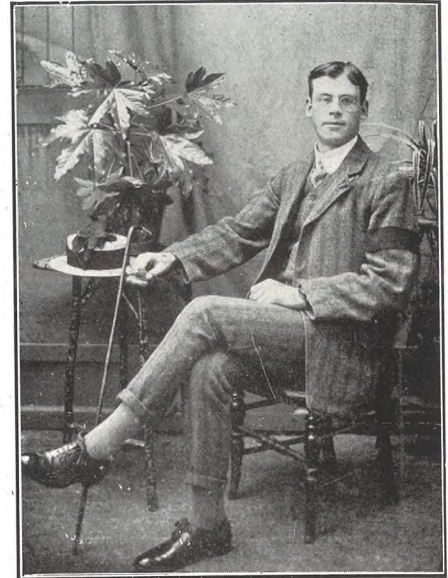

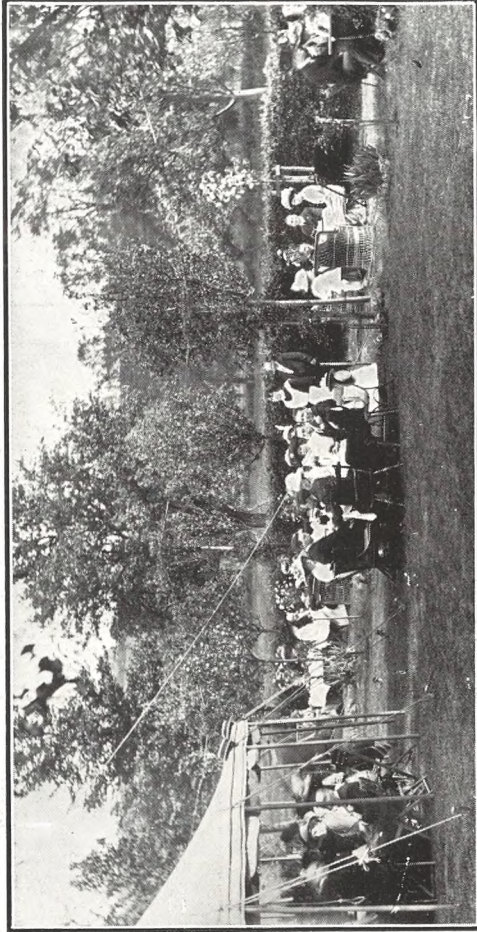

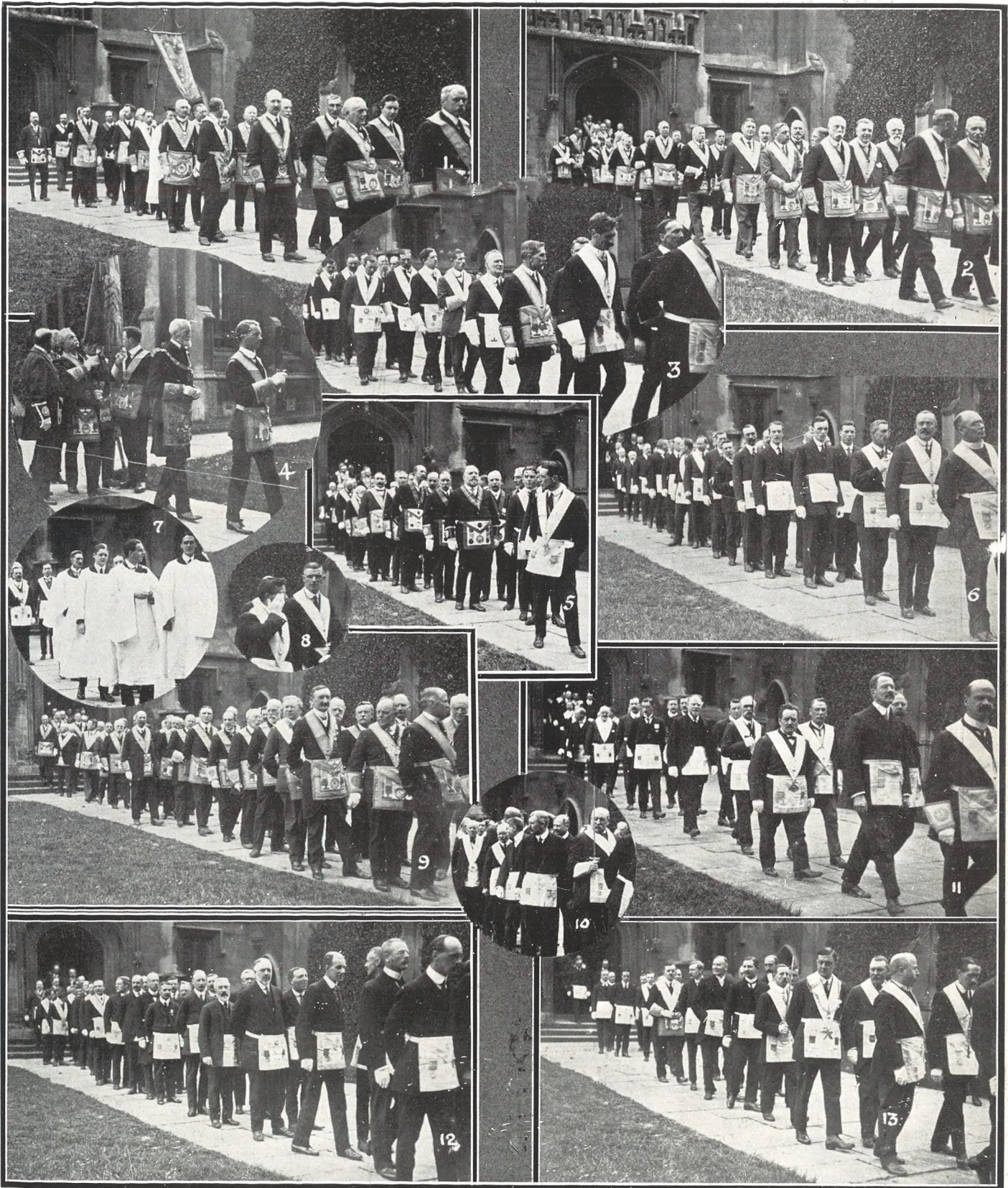

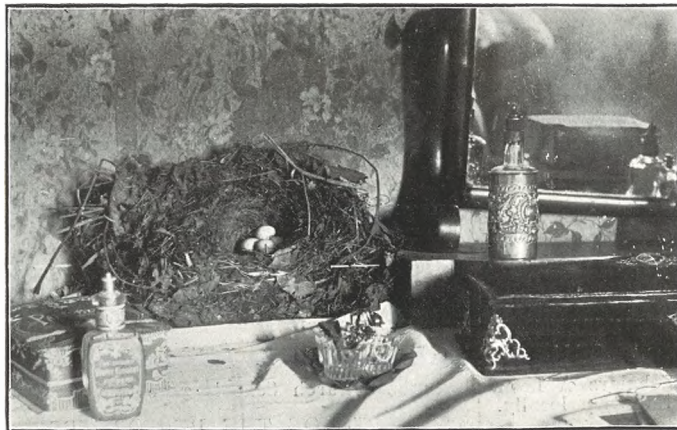

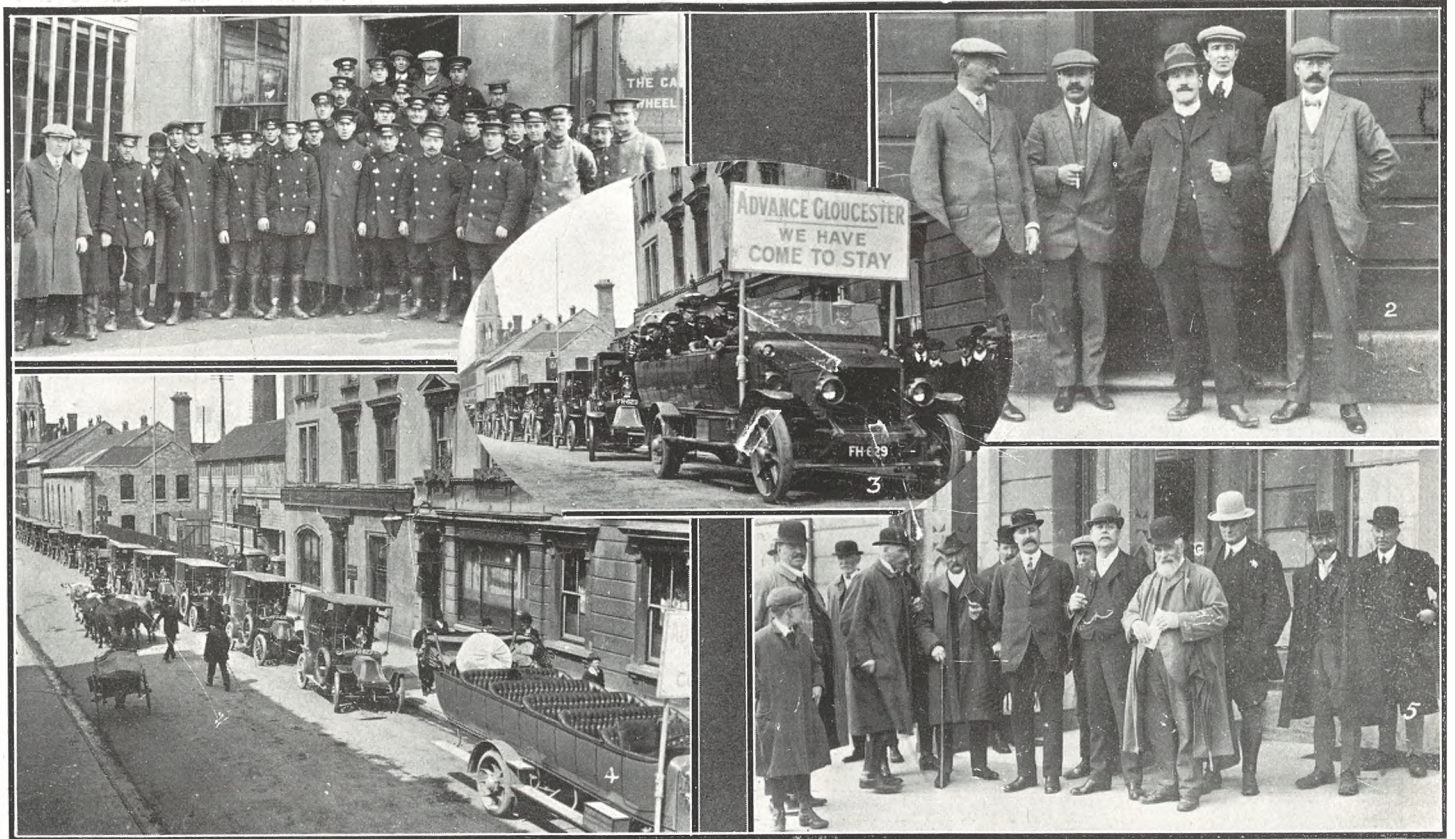

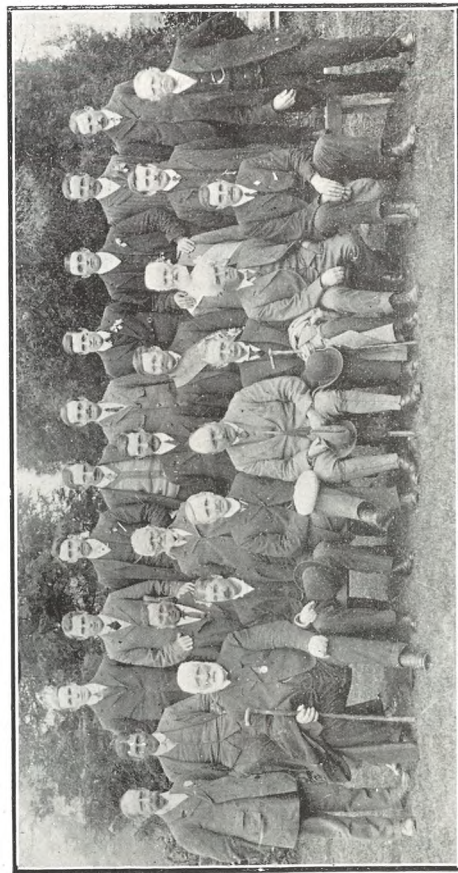

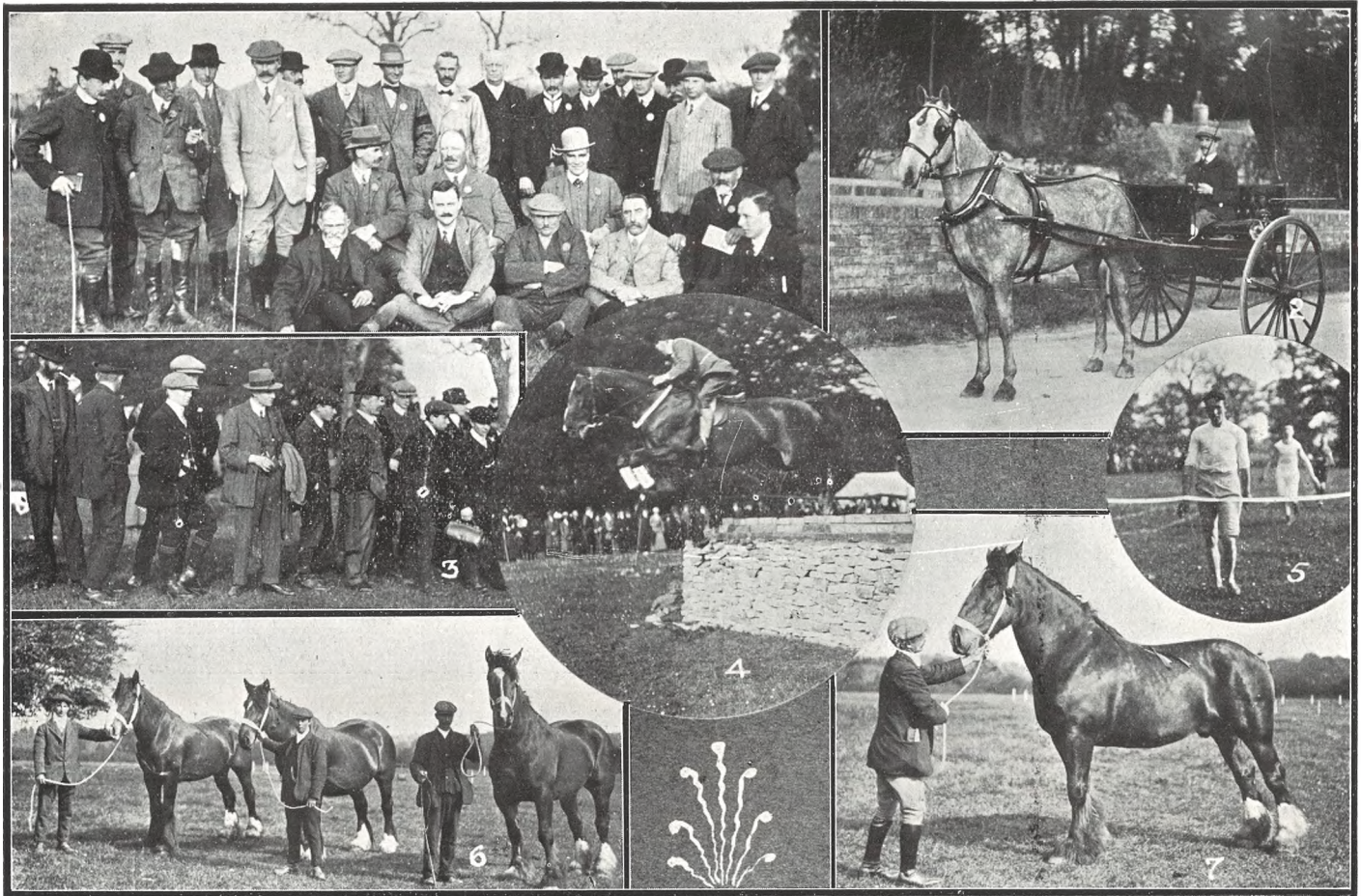

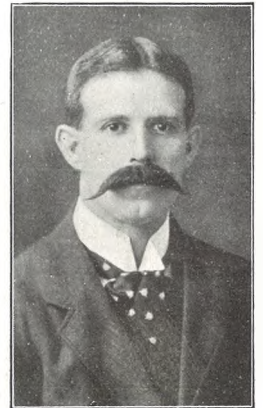
