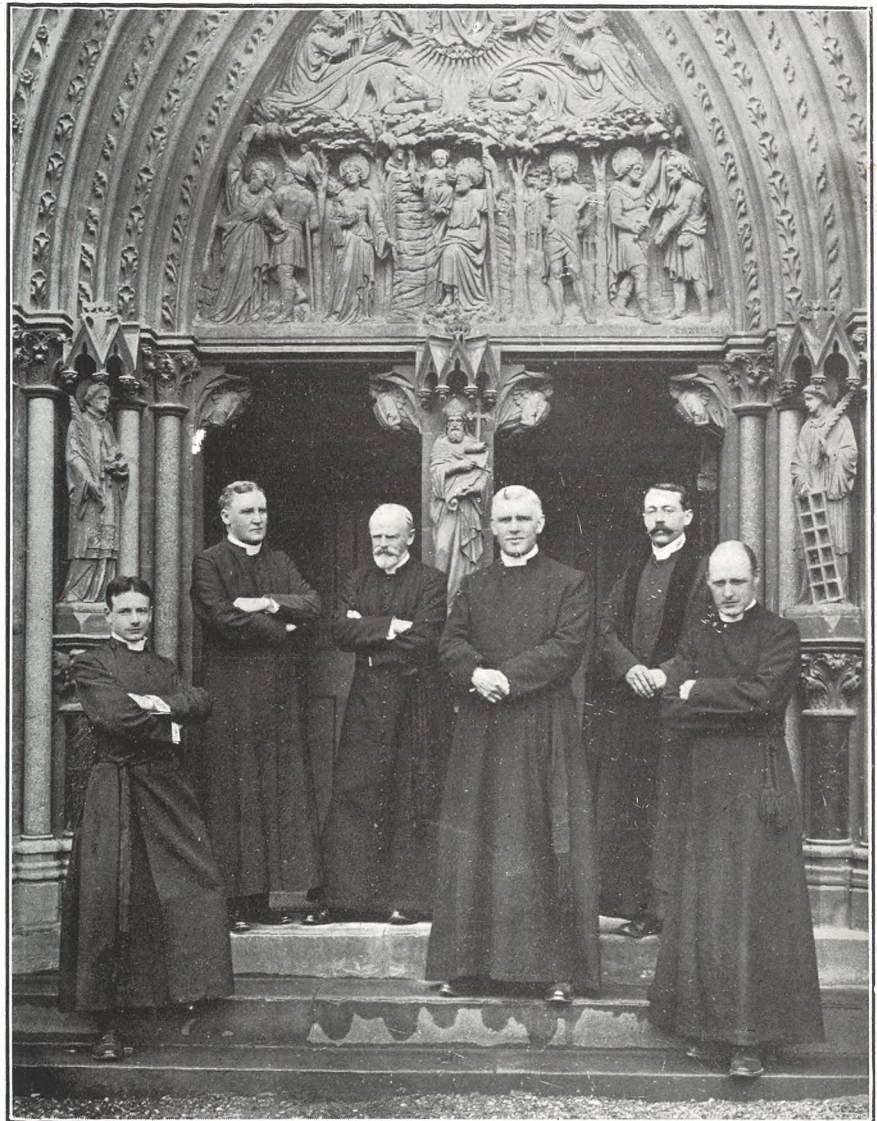

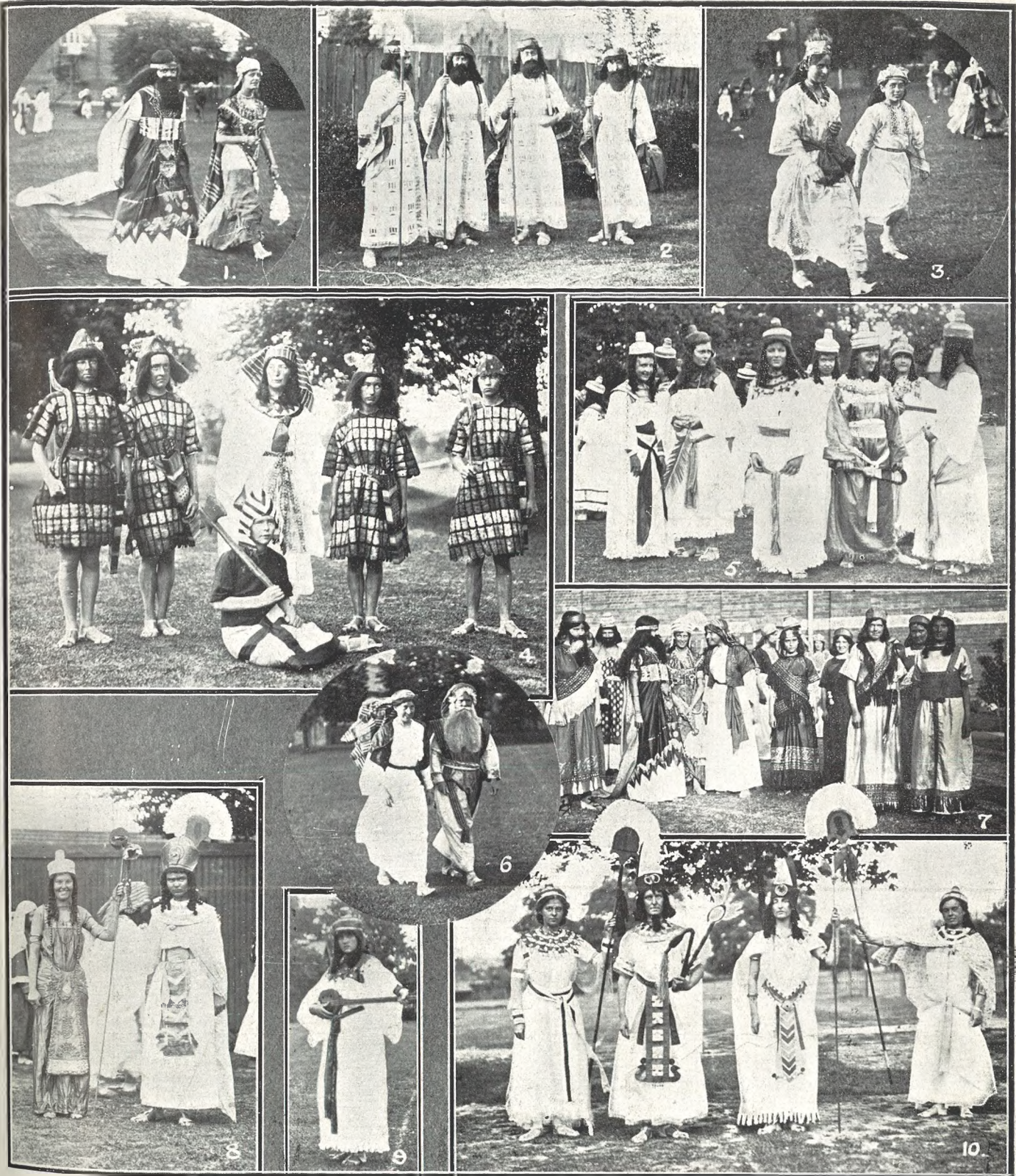

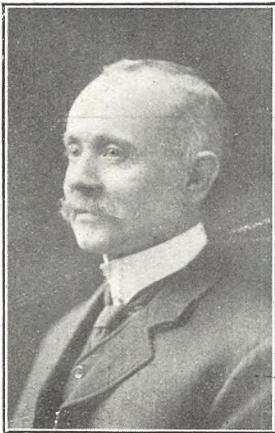

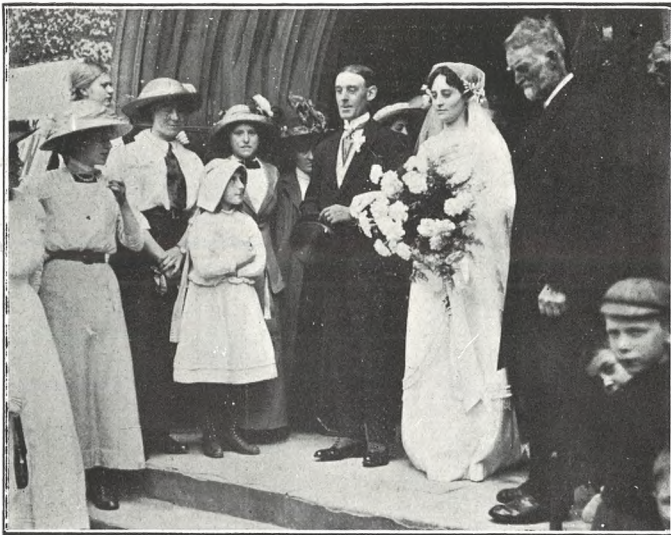

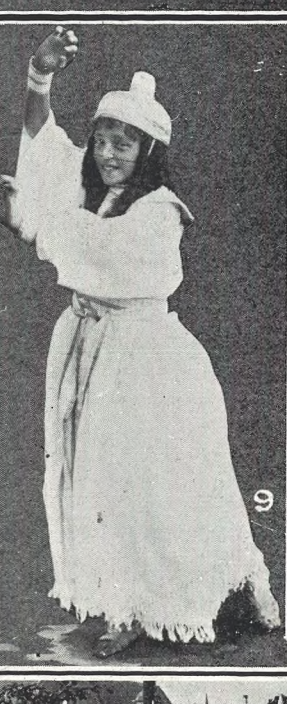

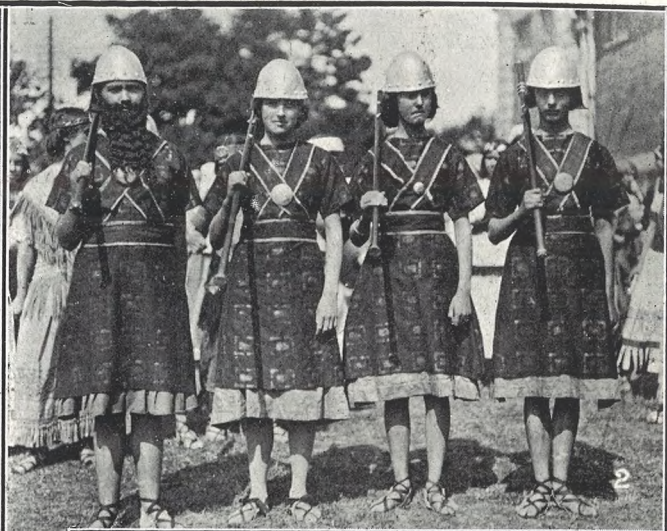

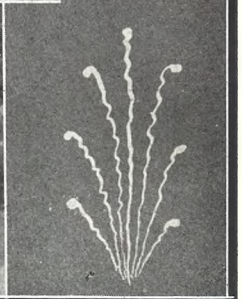
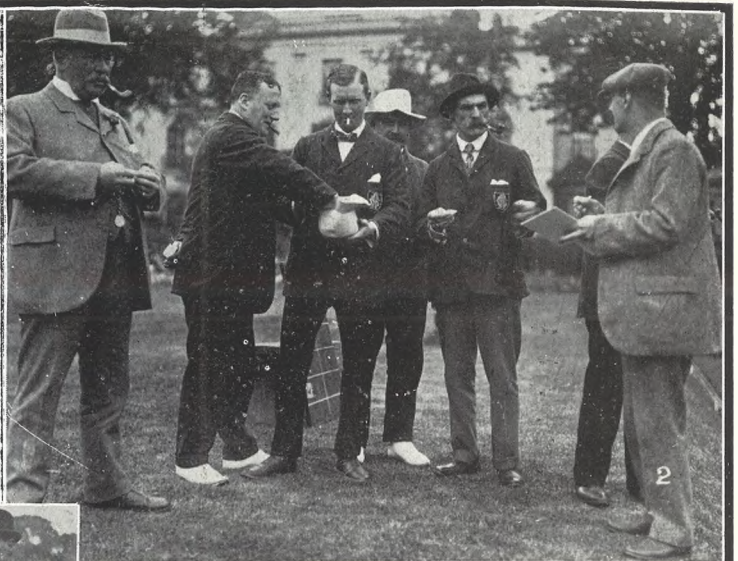


CARNIVAL AT LYDNEY.

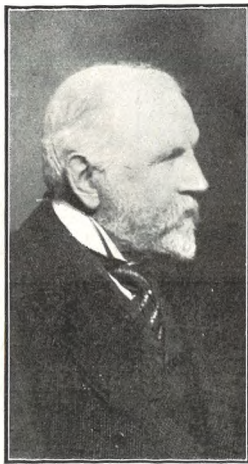

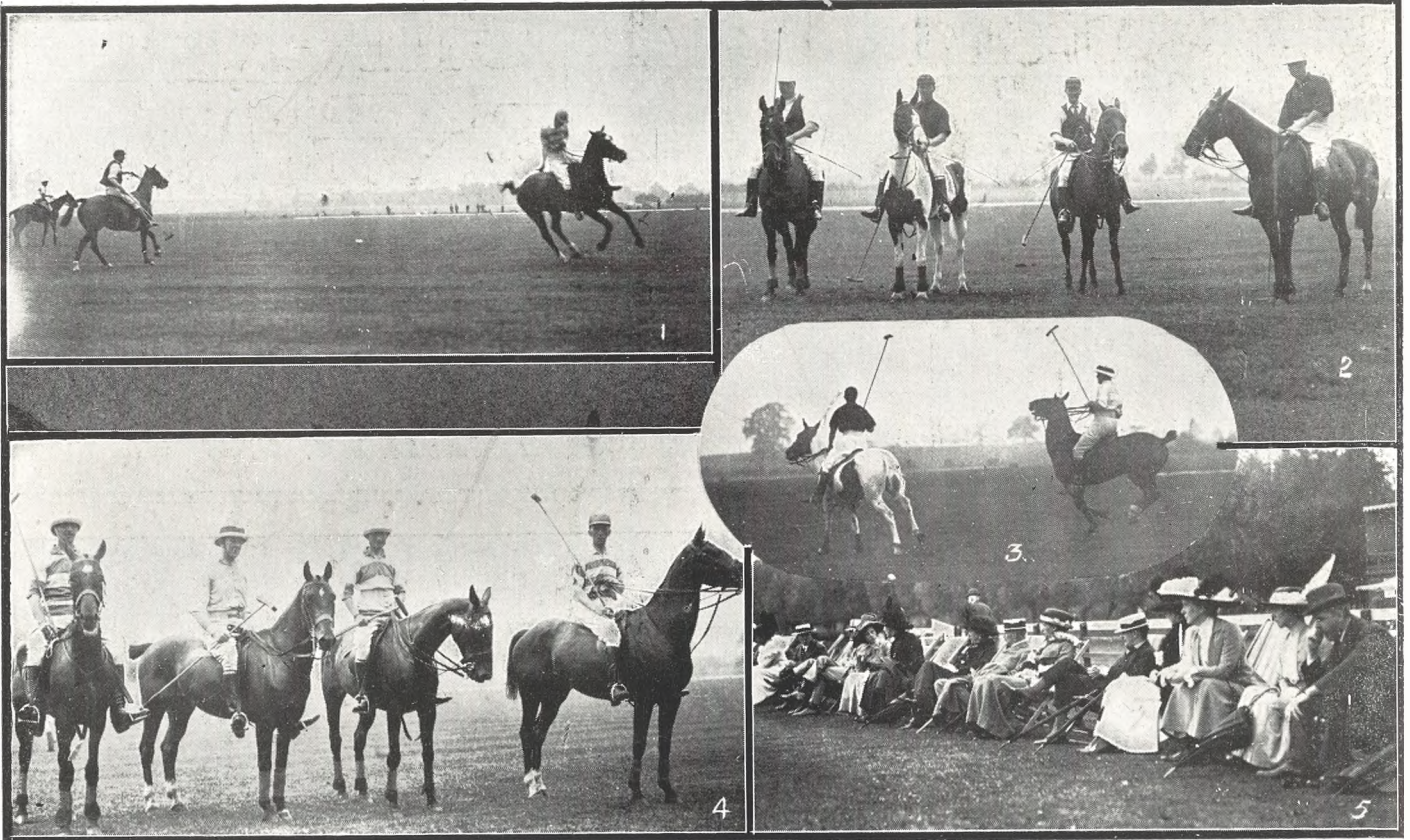

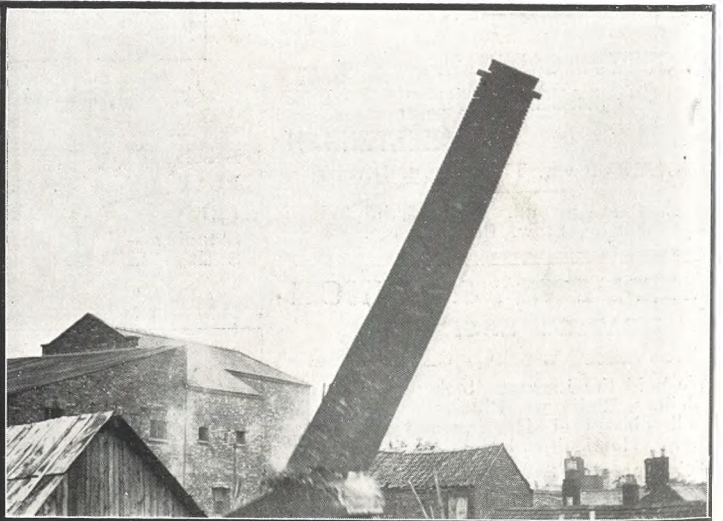

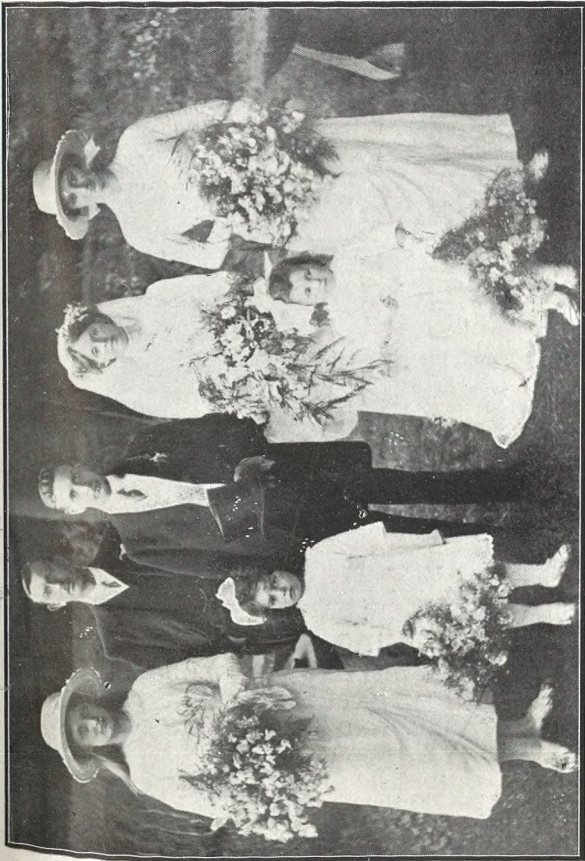

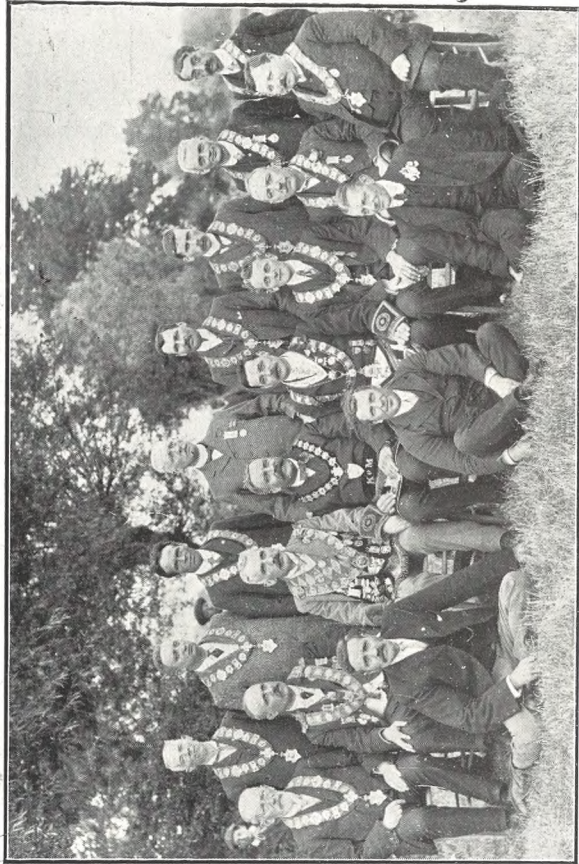

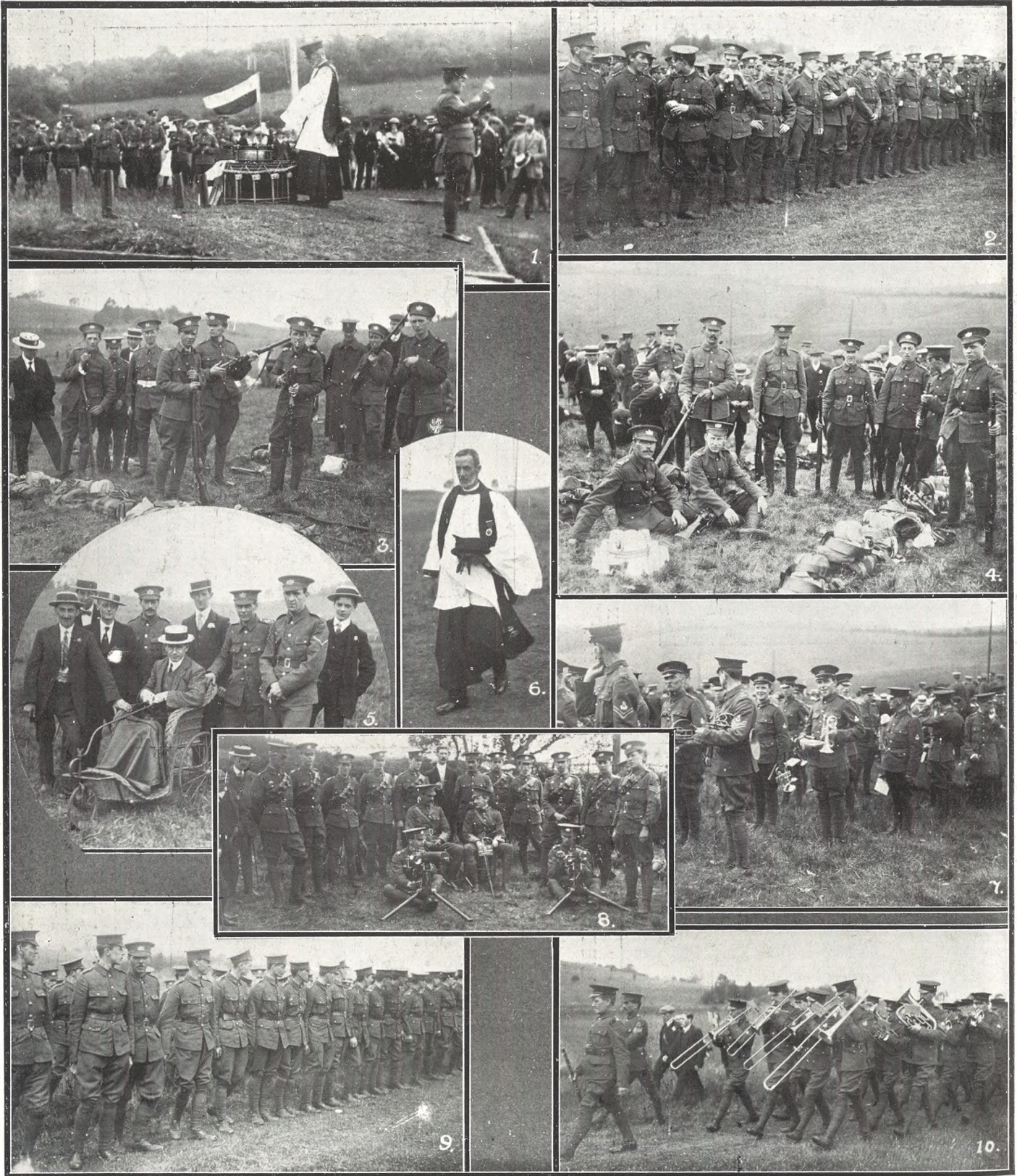

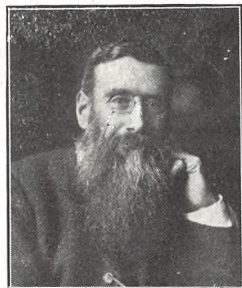
