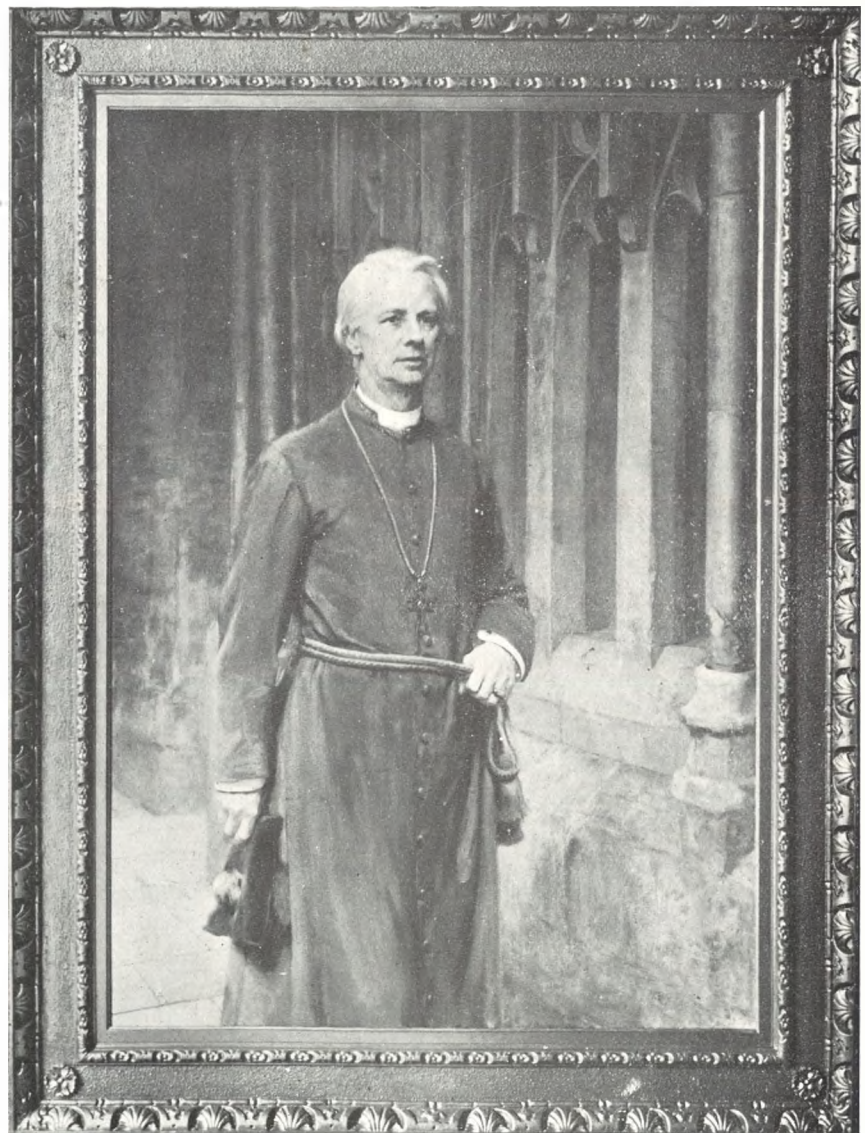

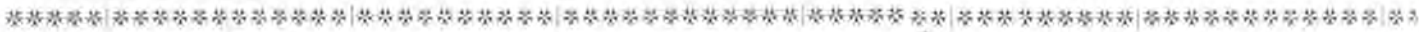

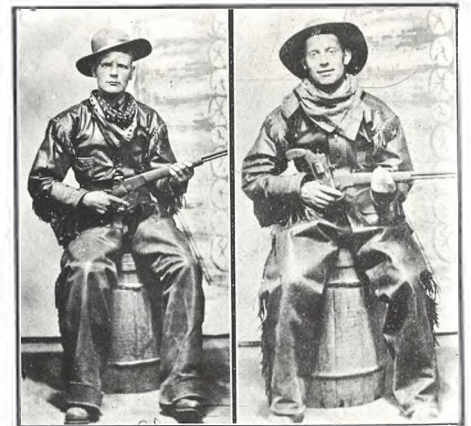

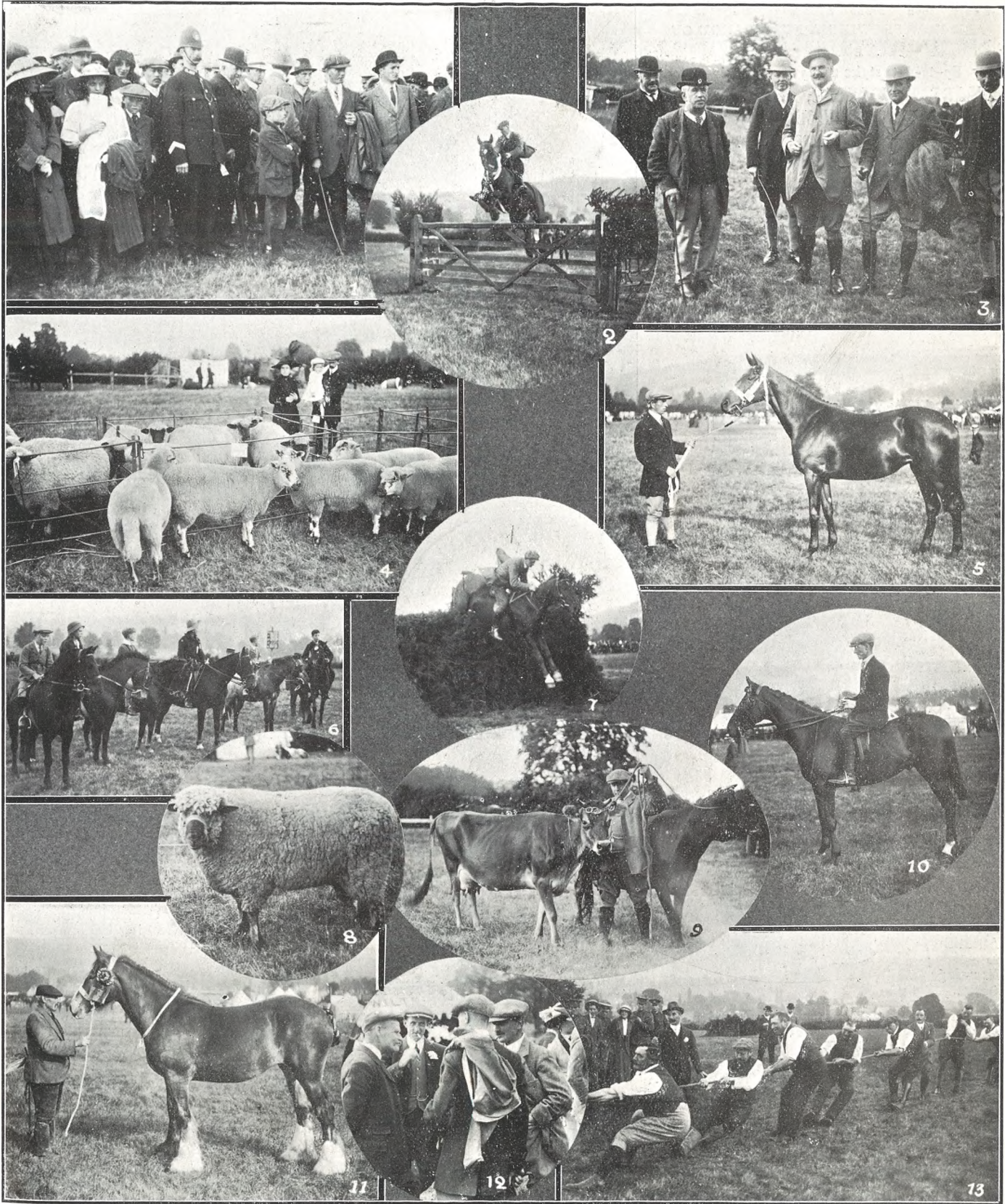

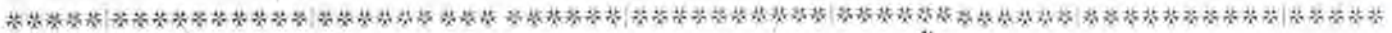

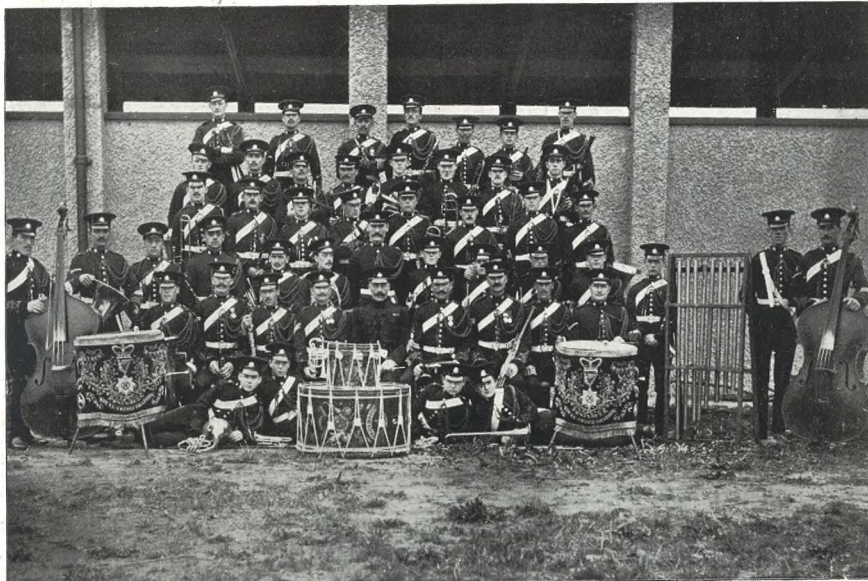

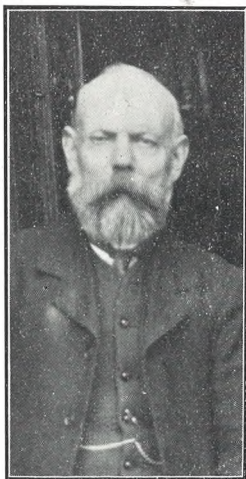

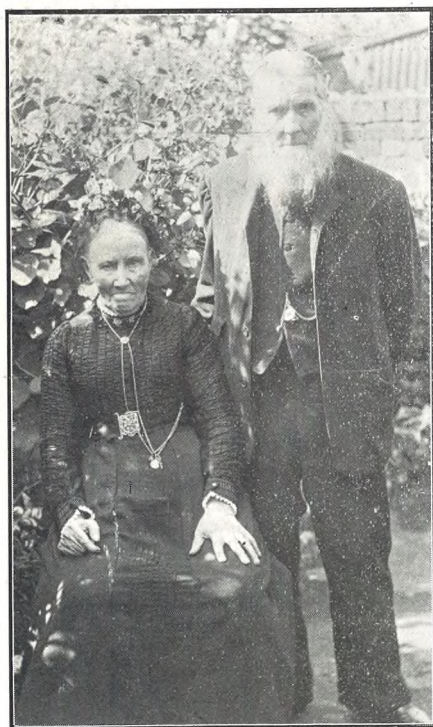
Death of a Cheltenham Postman.

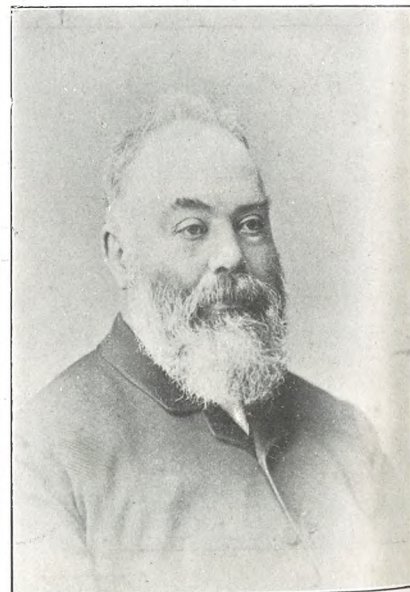
