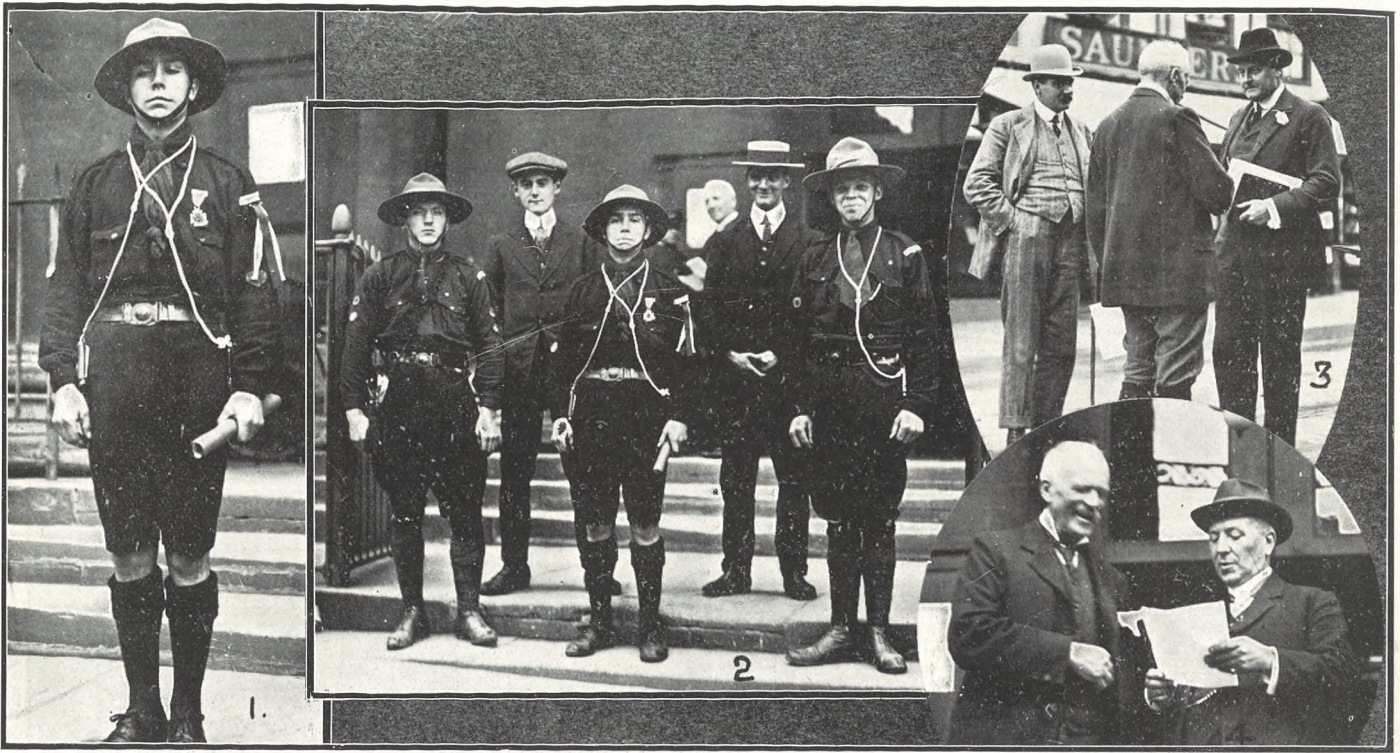

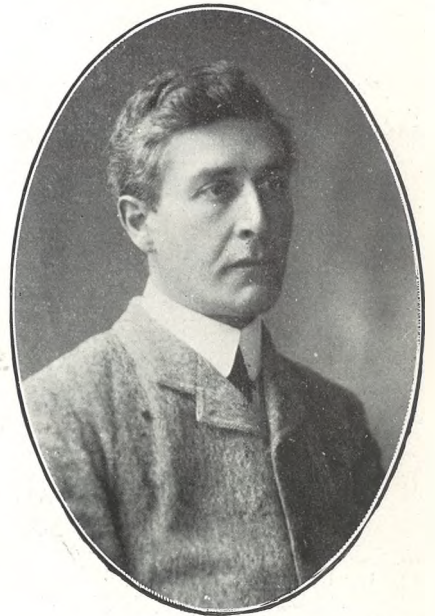

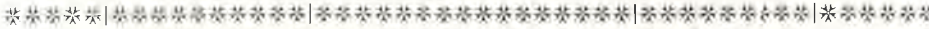

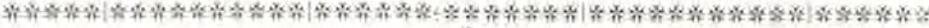
**A Ferndale Man in Australia.**

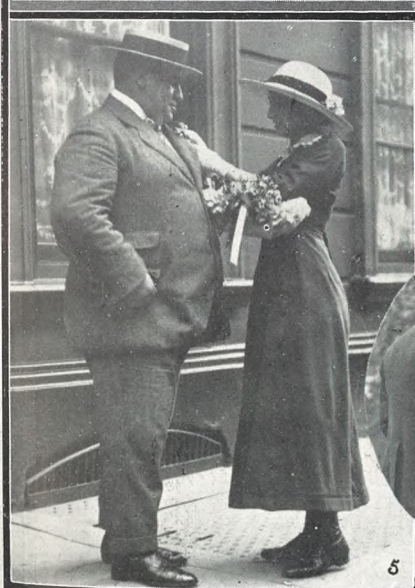

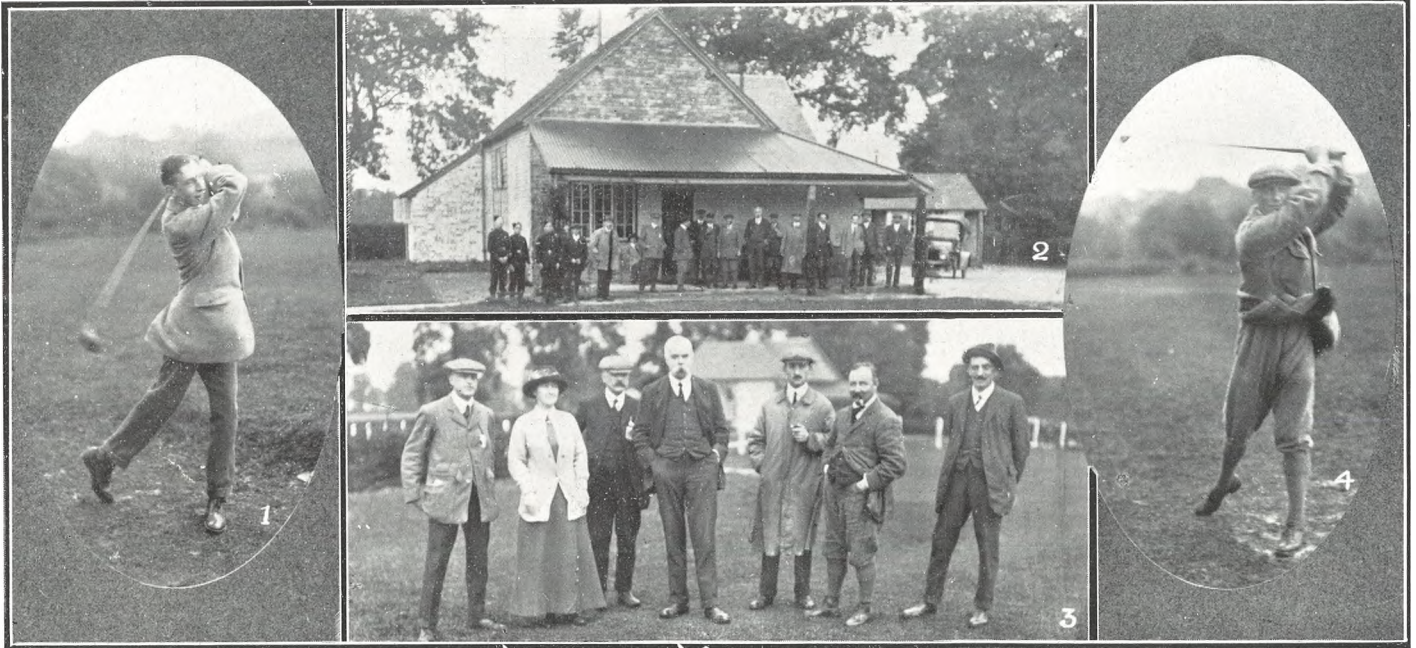

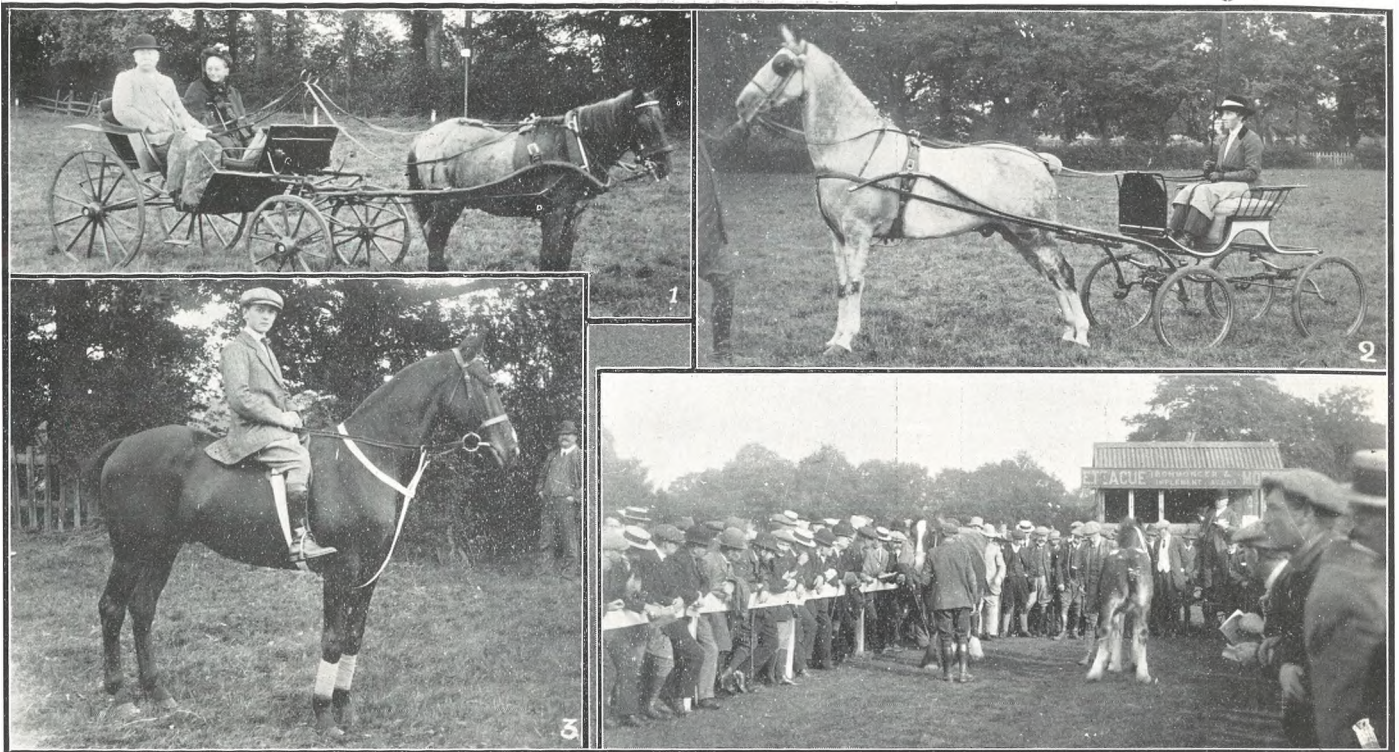

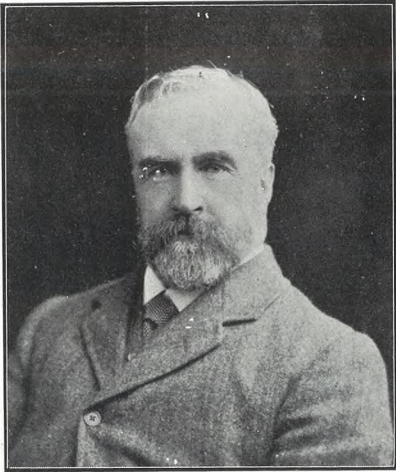

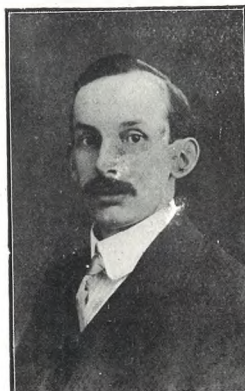

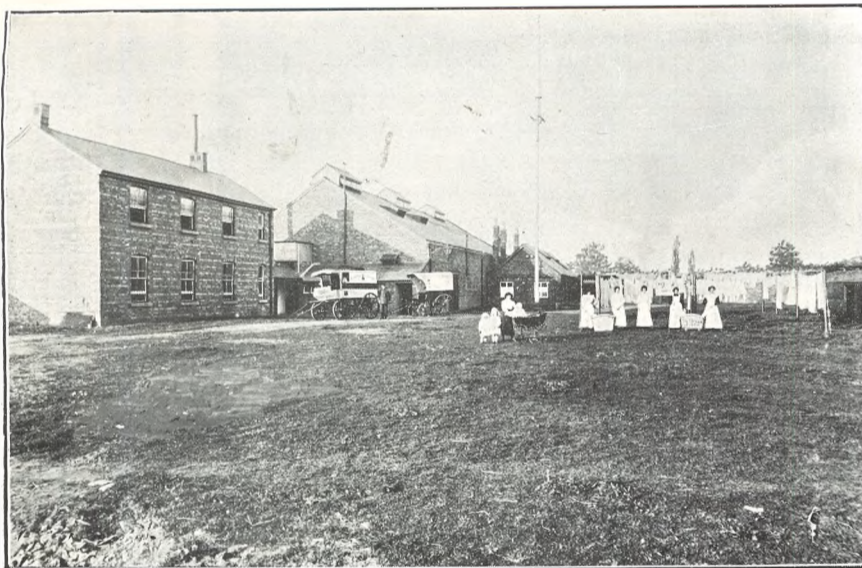

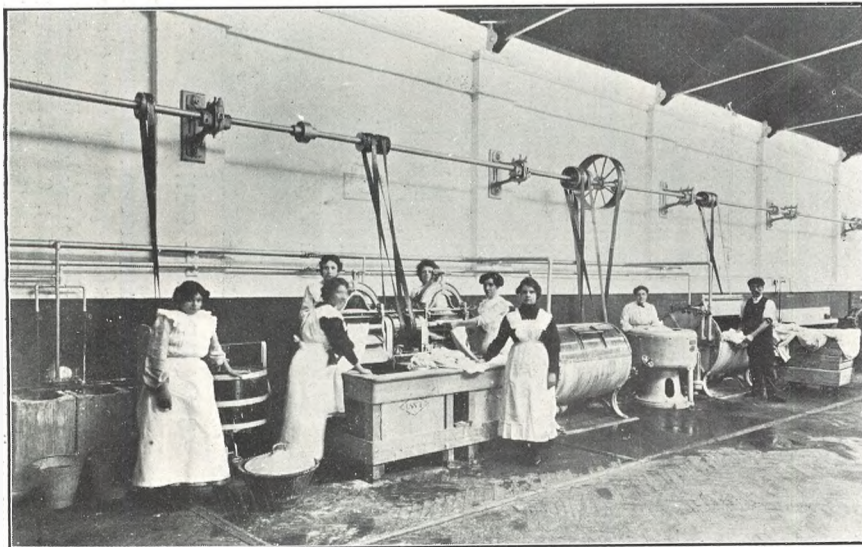

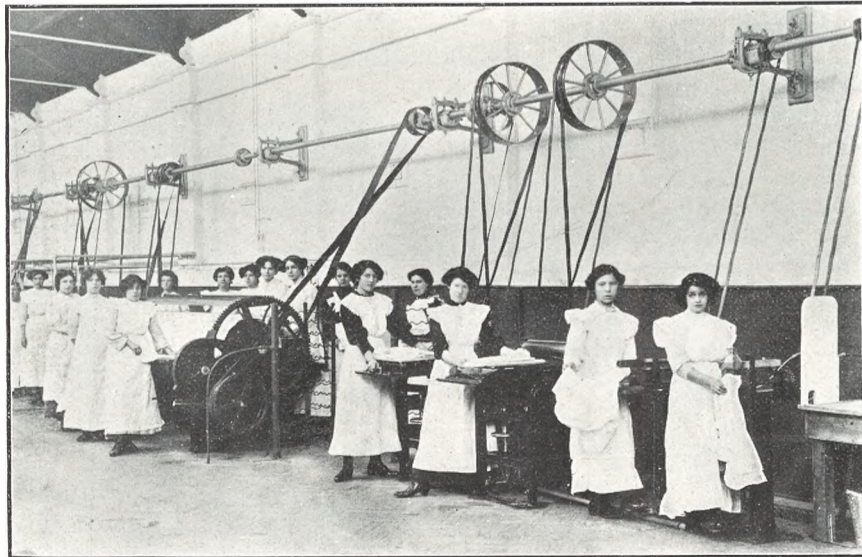

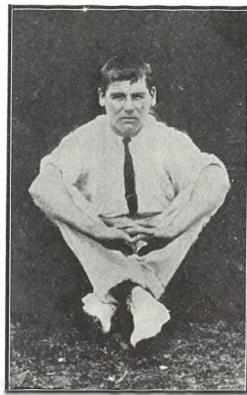

**SERGEANT SCAIFE.**

**Soldiers of the Gloucestershire Regiment.**

Sergt.-Drummer M. Fitzpatrick, 2nd Batt. Gloucestershire Regiment (the old 61st), now in his twenty-ninth year of service, remained in Malta awaiting discharge to pension when the battalion sailed for North-East China last month. This veteran soldier represents the third generation of soldiers who have served in the Gloucestershire Regiment, his son, who sailed with the battalion for Teintsin, being the fourth generation of the same family to serve in the ranks of the old 28th and 61st. The sergt.-drummer's grandfather was a soldier in the 61st Regiment, his father fought with the 28th in the Crimea; and in addition to the medals granted for this campaign, he also possessed the good conduct medal. Each of the old veteran's sons served in the Gloucestershire Regiment, and both of them fought with the 2nd Battalion during the South African War, the youngest son being severely wounded at the action of Klip Kraal, and was eventually invalided from the wounds there received. Sergt.-Drummer Fitzpatrick tells an interesting story of his young days. When he saw a boy companion come home in a tating Scottish uniform, the young Irishman fell in love with the smart dress, and wished to enlist in this special corps. But his father would hear of no corps but the 28th—no regiment like the Old "Slashers." So young Fitzpatrick joined the 28th, and soon went off to India, and served there with his present battalion, in which he has ever since remained, with credit to himself and regiment. Sergt.-Drummer Fitzpatrick was very popular with all ranks, and received many handsome presents on leaving the regiment. Sergt. Scaife, another veteran soldier of the 61st, left the regiment at the same time, he also being a son of a former soldier of the 61st, who joined the regiment at the time of the Indian Mutiny. Each of these soldiers, of whom the Gloucestershire Regiment may be proud, wears medals for the South African War, and the good conduct medal. Sergt. Scaife also wears the medal for Distinguished Conduct in the Field. A brother of Sergt. Scaife, who also fought in South Africa, is still serving with the regiment.
