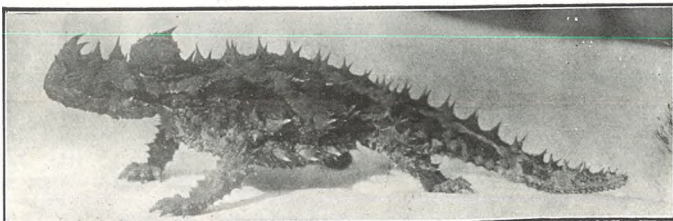

A QUEER REPTILE FROM AUSTRALIA.

Mr. K. Hulbert, son of Mr. Hulbert, organist of Holy Trinity Church, Cheltenham, has sent us a photograph taken by himself in Australia of a very rare lizard, called by the natives a "Mountain Devil." It came from the far North-West, where it was captured by the blacks. It shares with the chameleon the property of changing its colour. The ball on back of neck is a water reservoir, it having the same property of storing water as the camel. It absorbs moisture through its skin, not by drinking. A similar specimen is in Perth Zoo.

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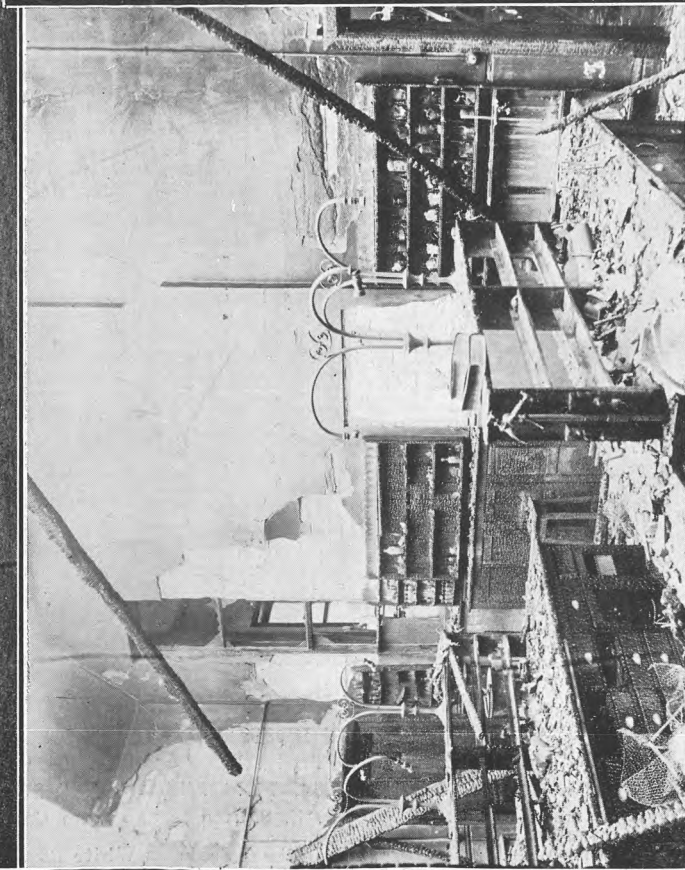
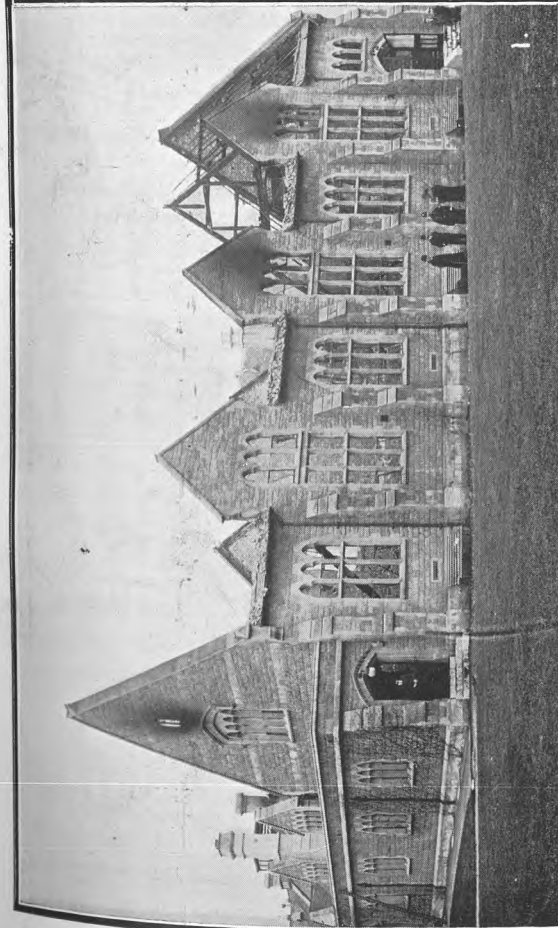
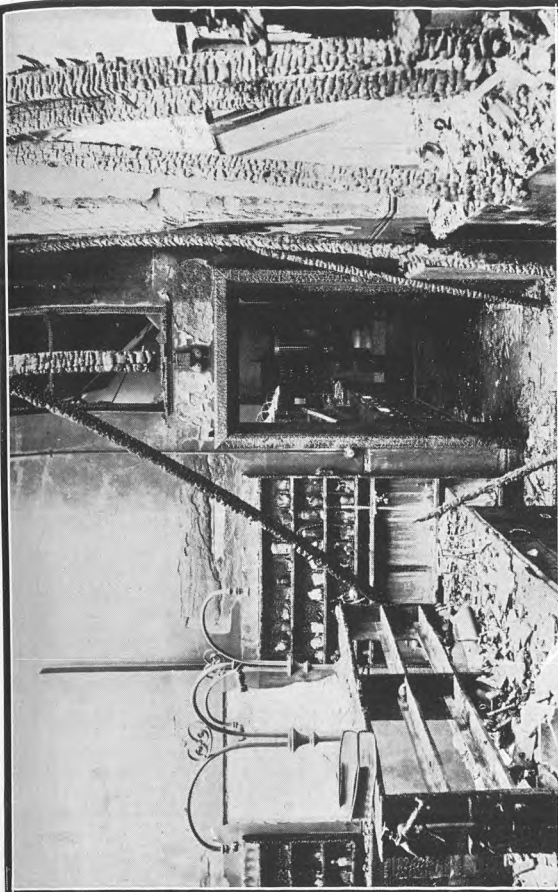


“John Ward” Trust.—Dinner to Old People in Gloucester.

DISASTROUS FIRE AT ST. PAUL'S TRAINING COLLEGE, CHELTENHAM.

ABOUT 1.30 ON THURSDAY MORNING, JANUARY 8TH, A FIRE BROKE OUT IN THE GEOLOGICAL ROOM OF ST. PAUL'S TRAINING COLLEGE, CHELTENHAM. THE CHELTENHAM FIRE BRIGADE WERE QUICKLY IN ATTENDANCE, BUT THE WHOLE OF THE MAGNIFICENT GYMNASIUM HALL WITH THE GEOLOGICAL AND THE ADVANCED CHEMISTRY ROOMS WERE COMPLETELY GUTTED. THE CAUSE OF THE FIRE IS A MYSTERY.

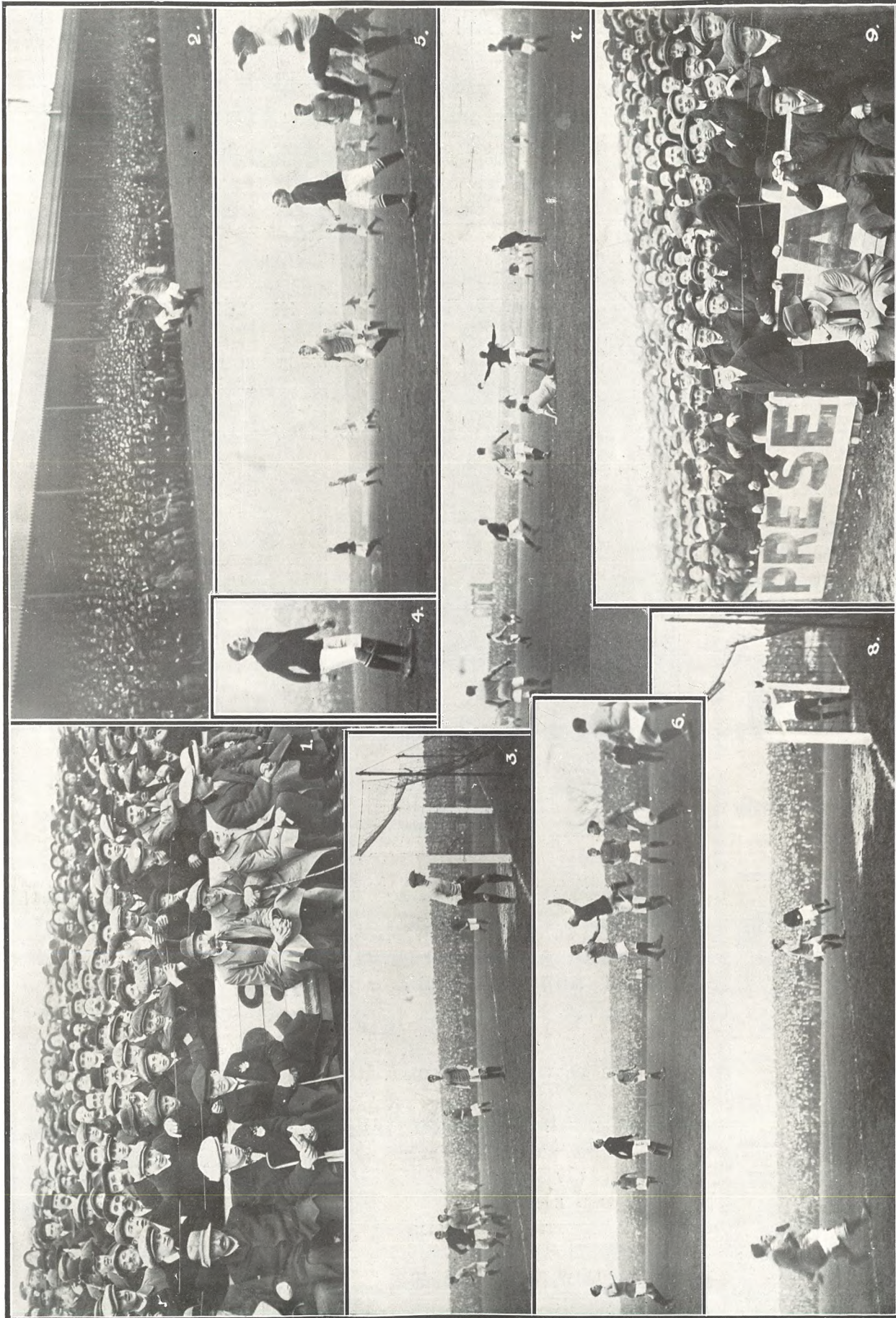

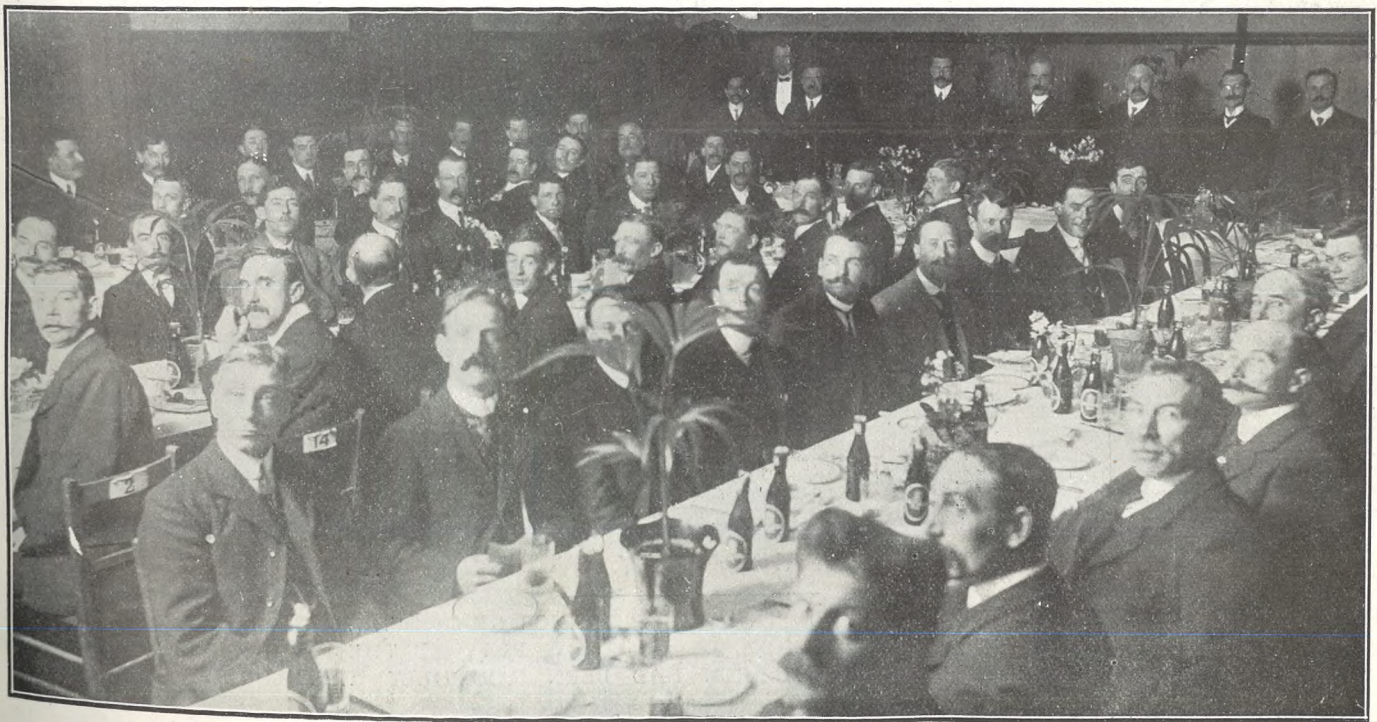

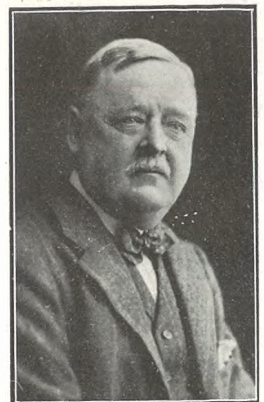

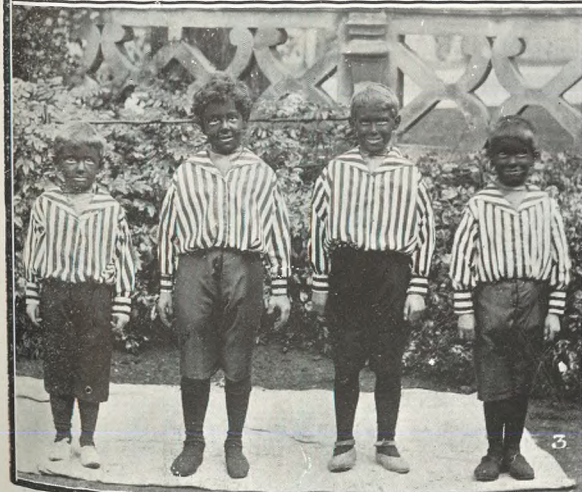

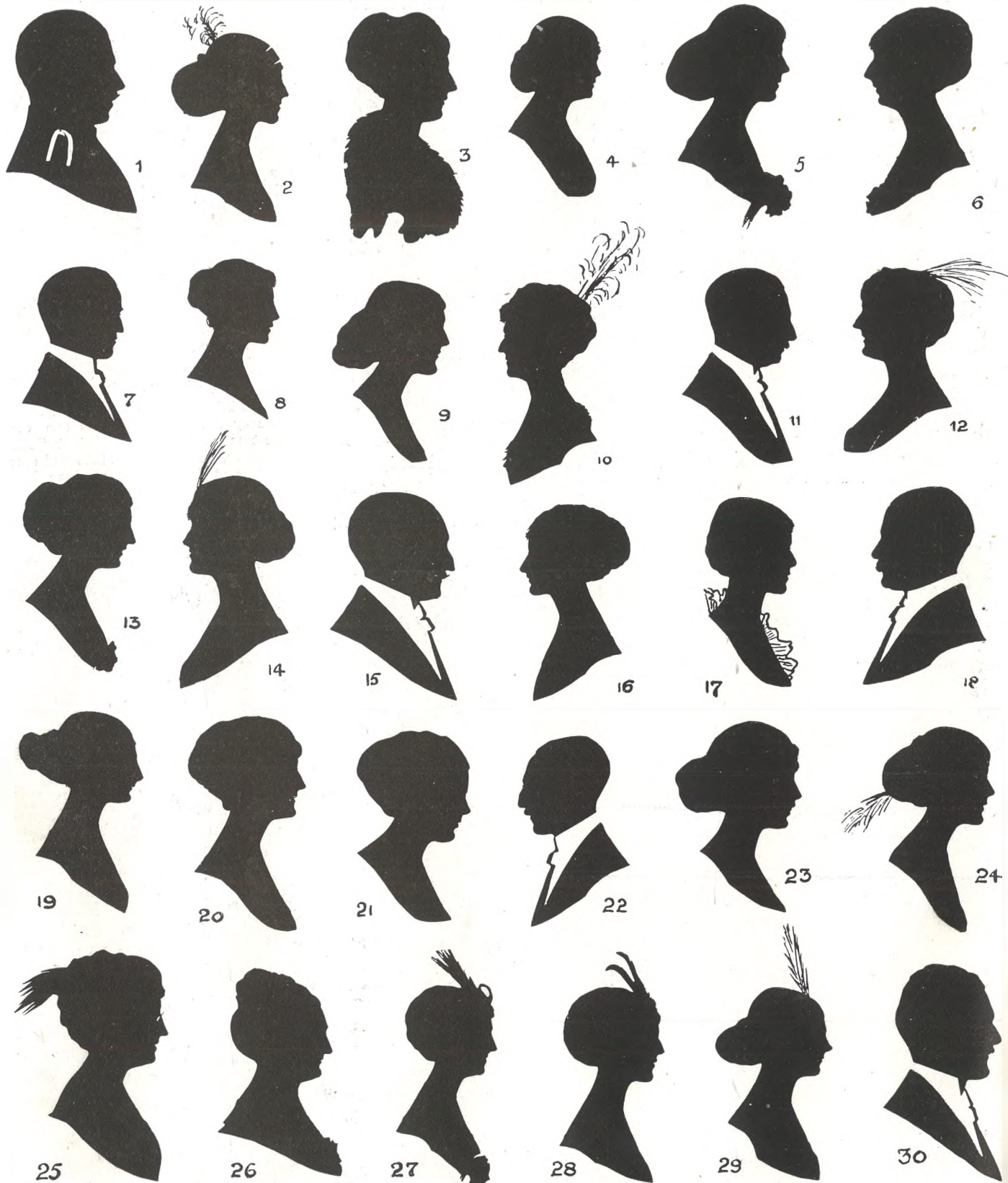

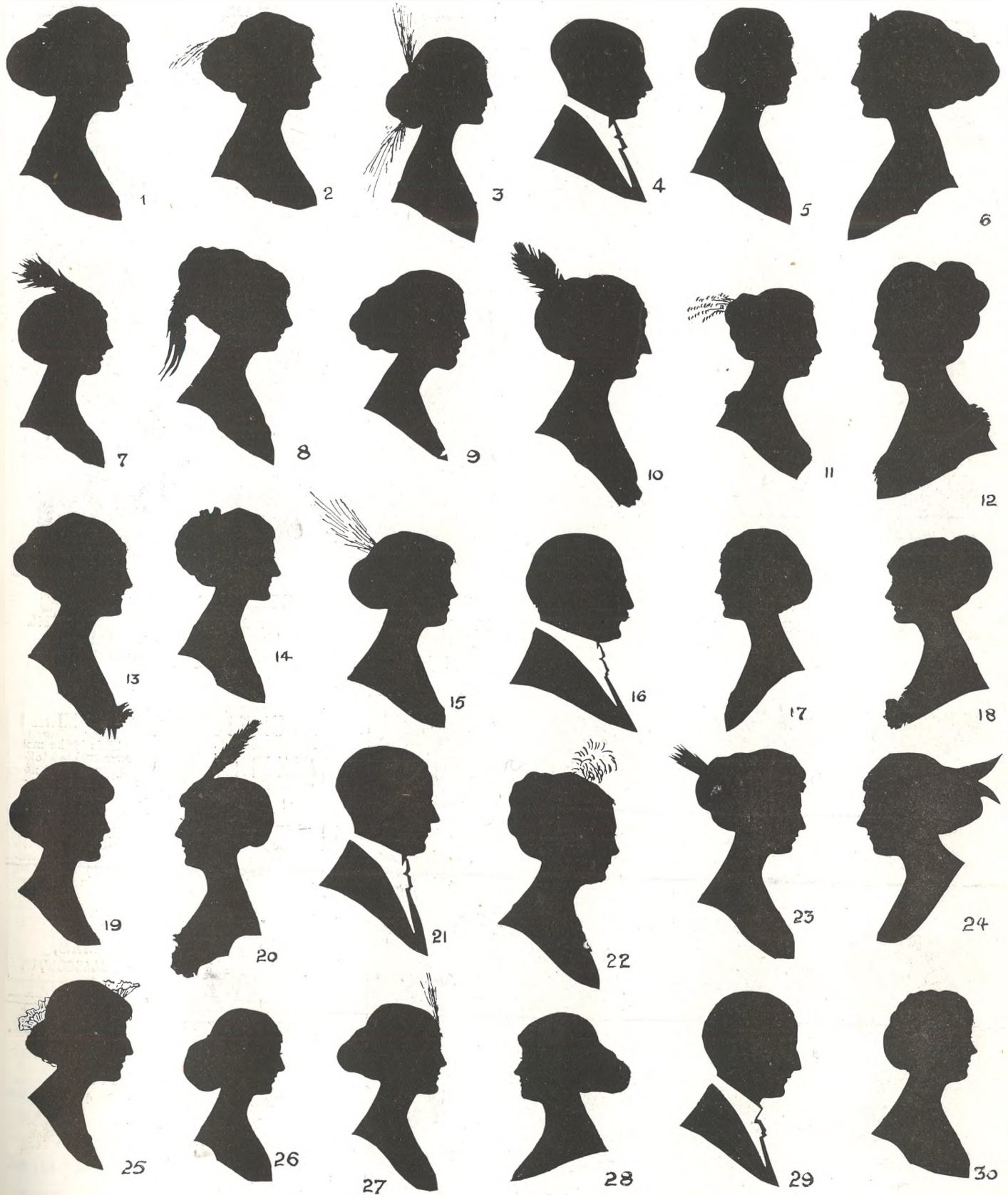

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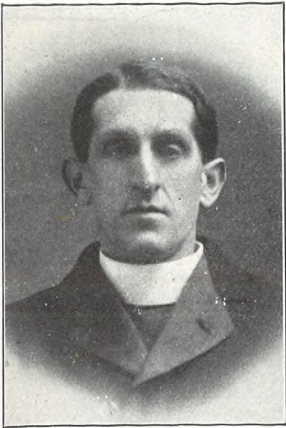

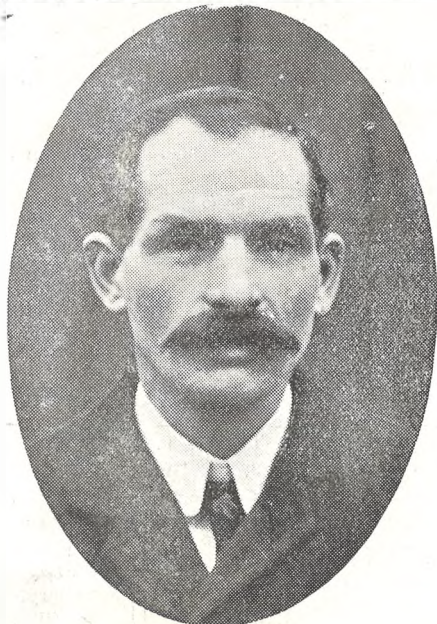
Cheltonian's Death in a Submarine.

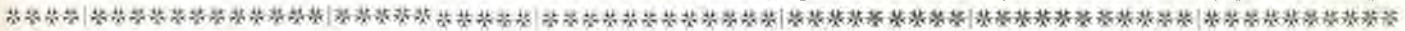

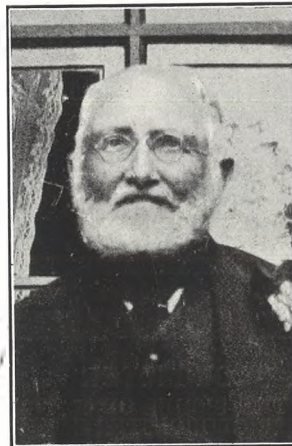

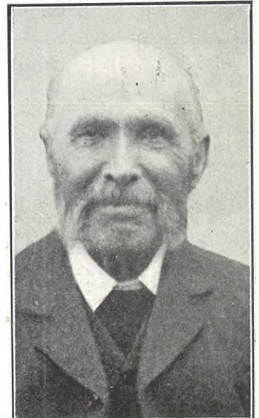

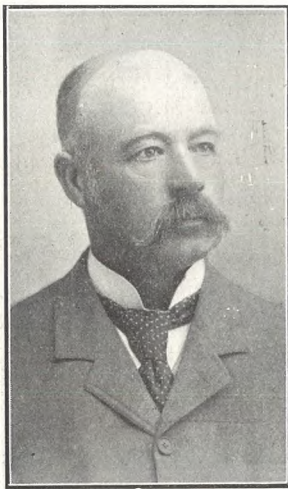
