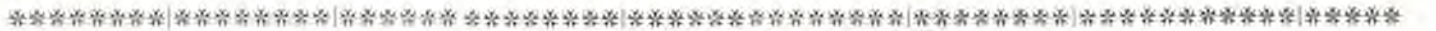


CHILDREN'S FETE AT GLOUCESTER.

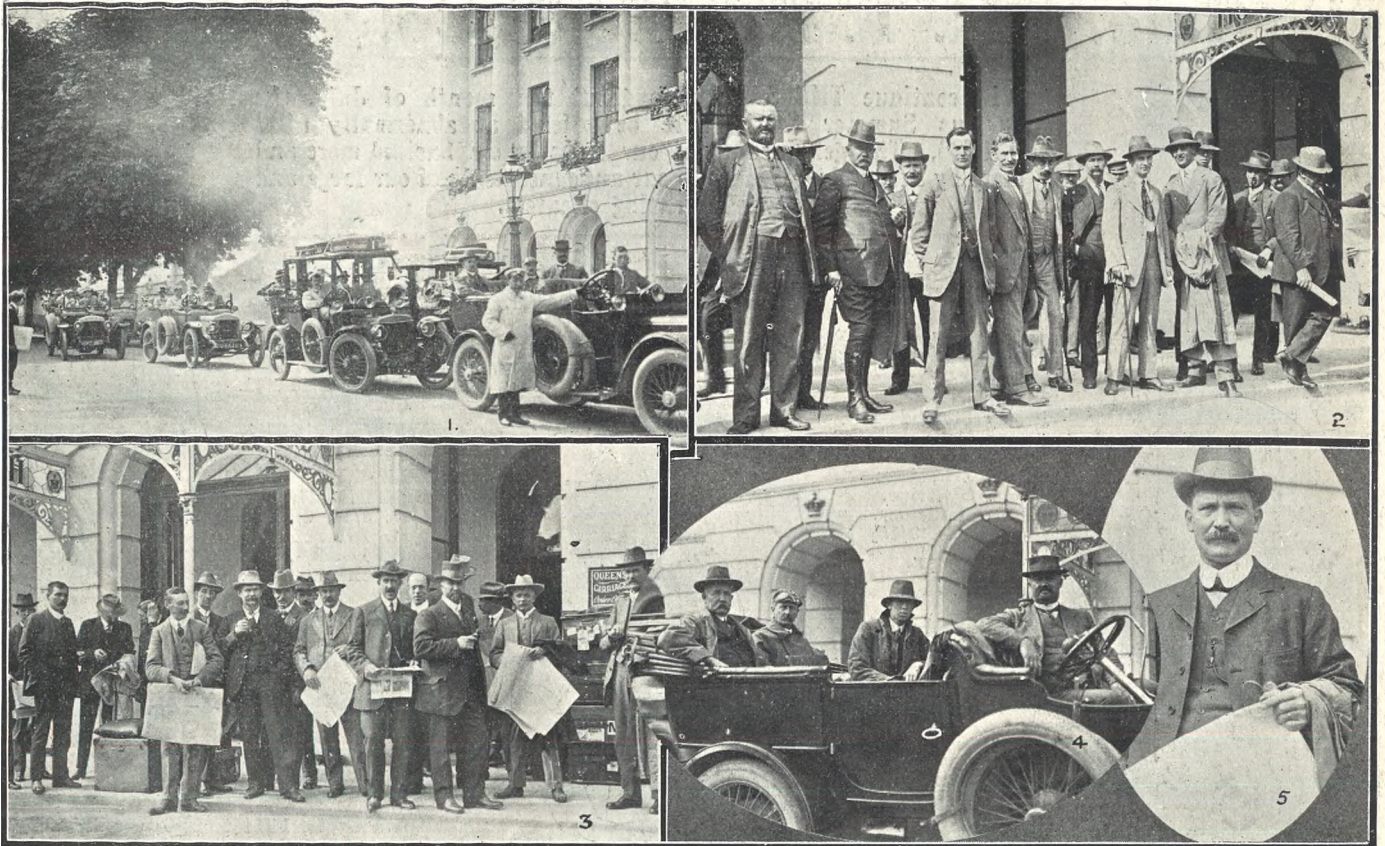
SPEECH DAY AT CHELTENHAM COLLEGE.

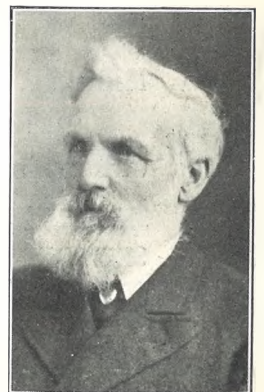

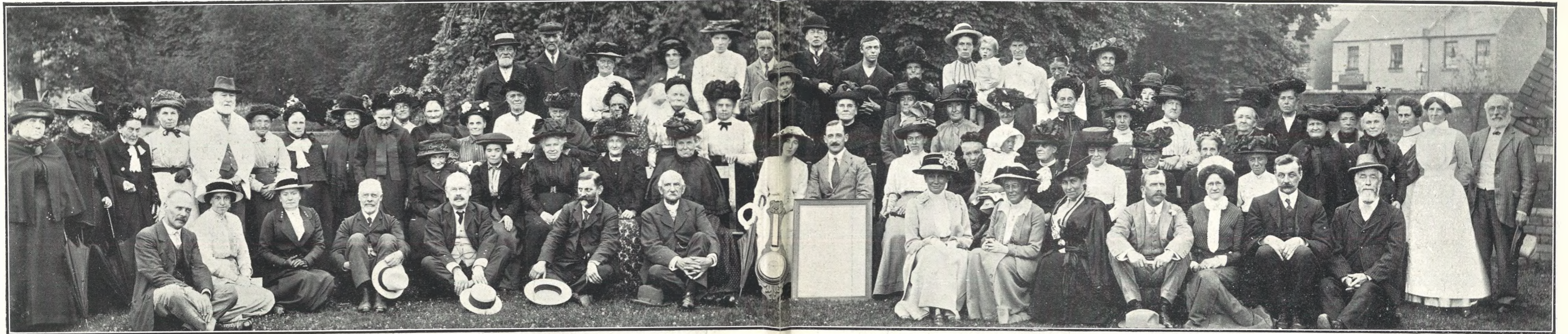
HONOURING CHELTENHAM'S ANTARCTIC HERO.

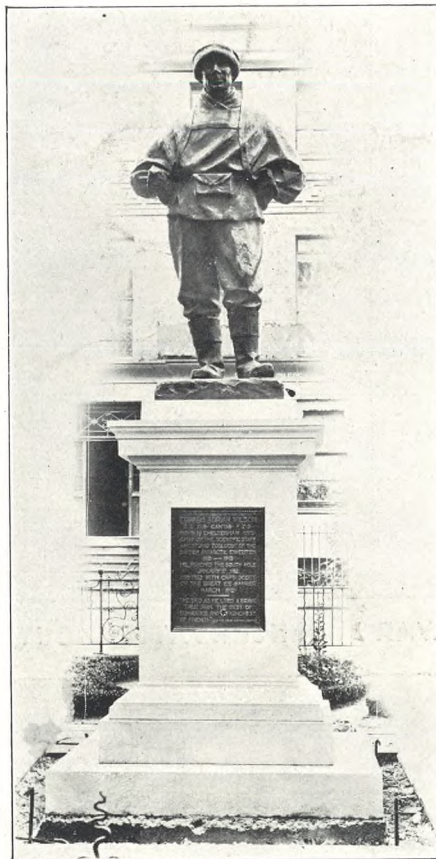

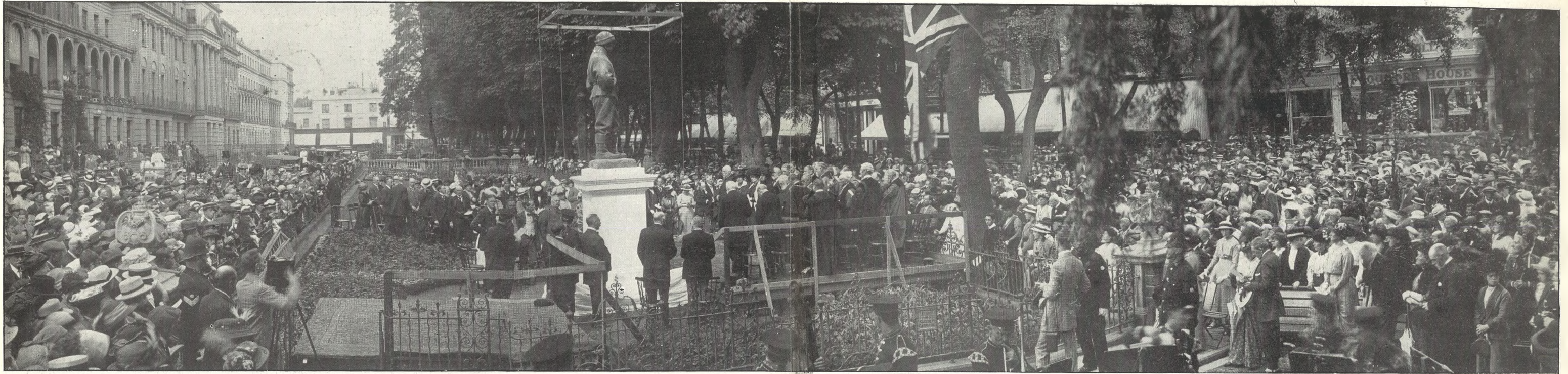

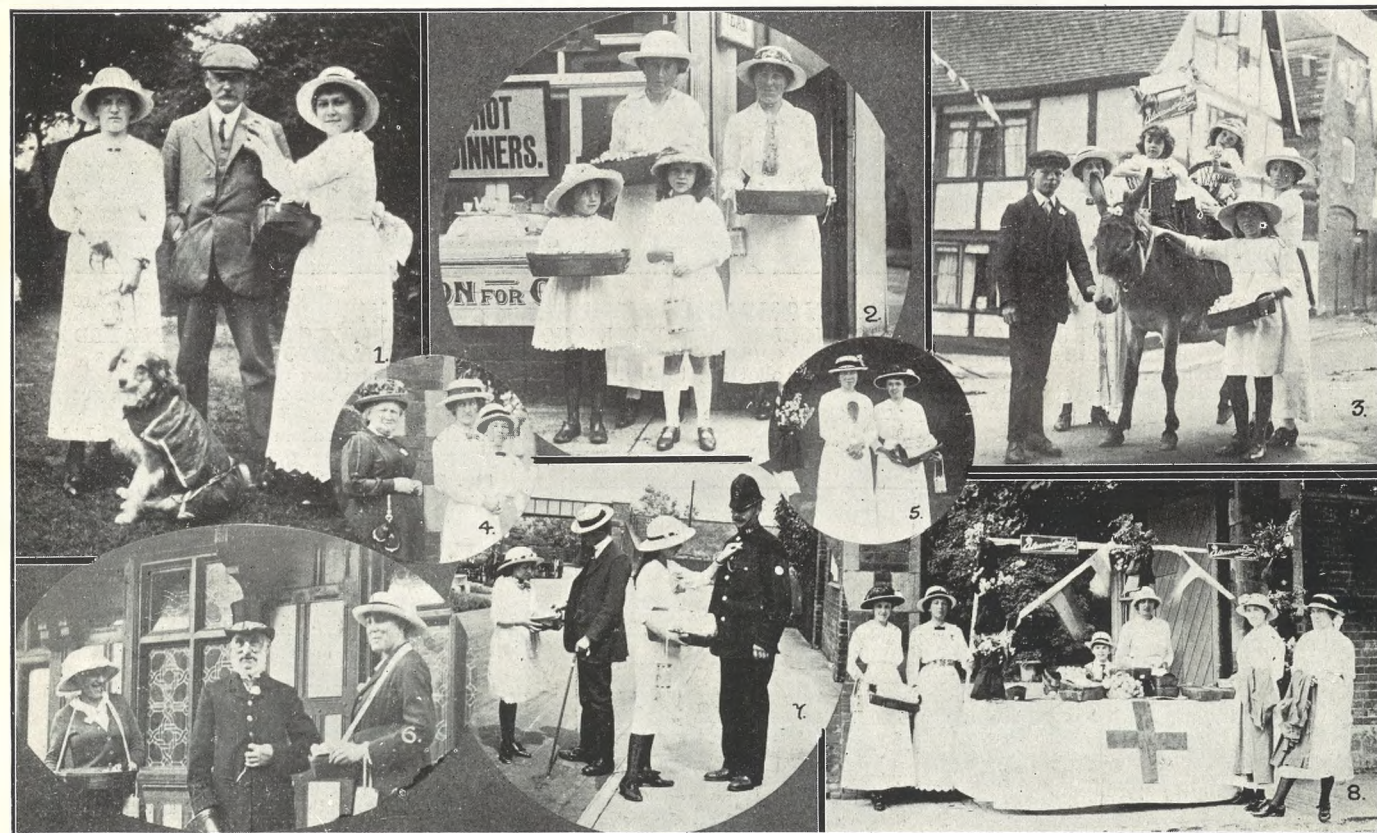

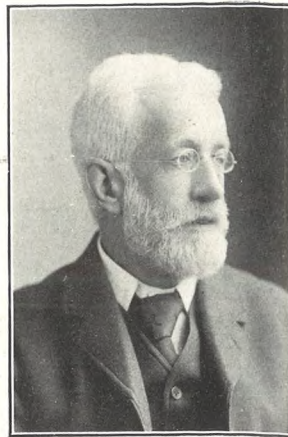

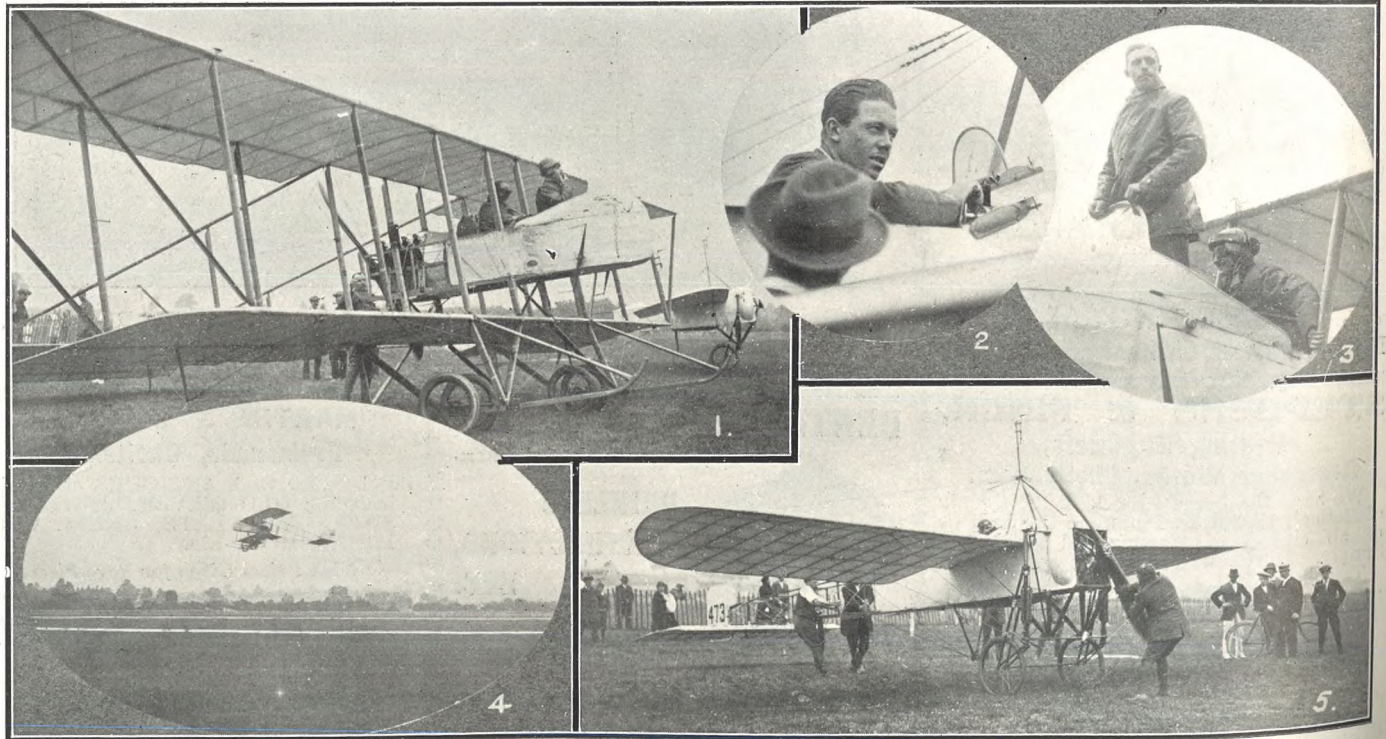

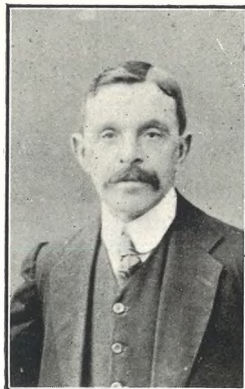
GLOUCESTER PRIMROSE LEAGUE AT LOWER LODGE.

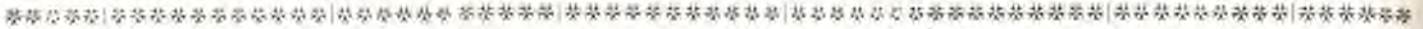
