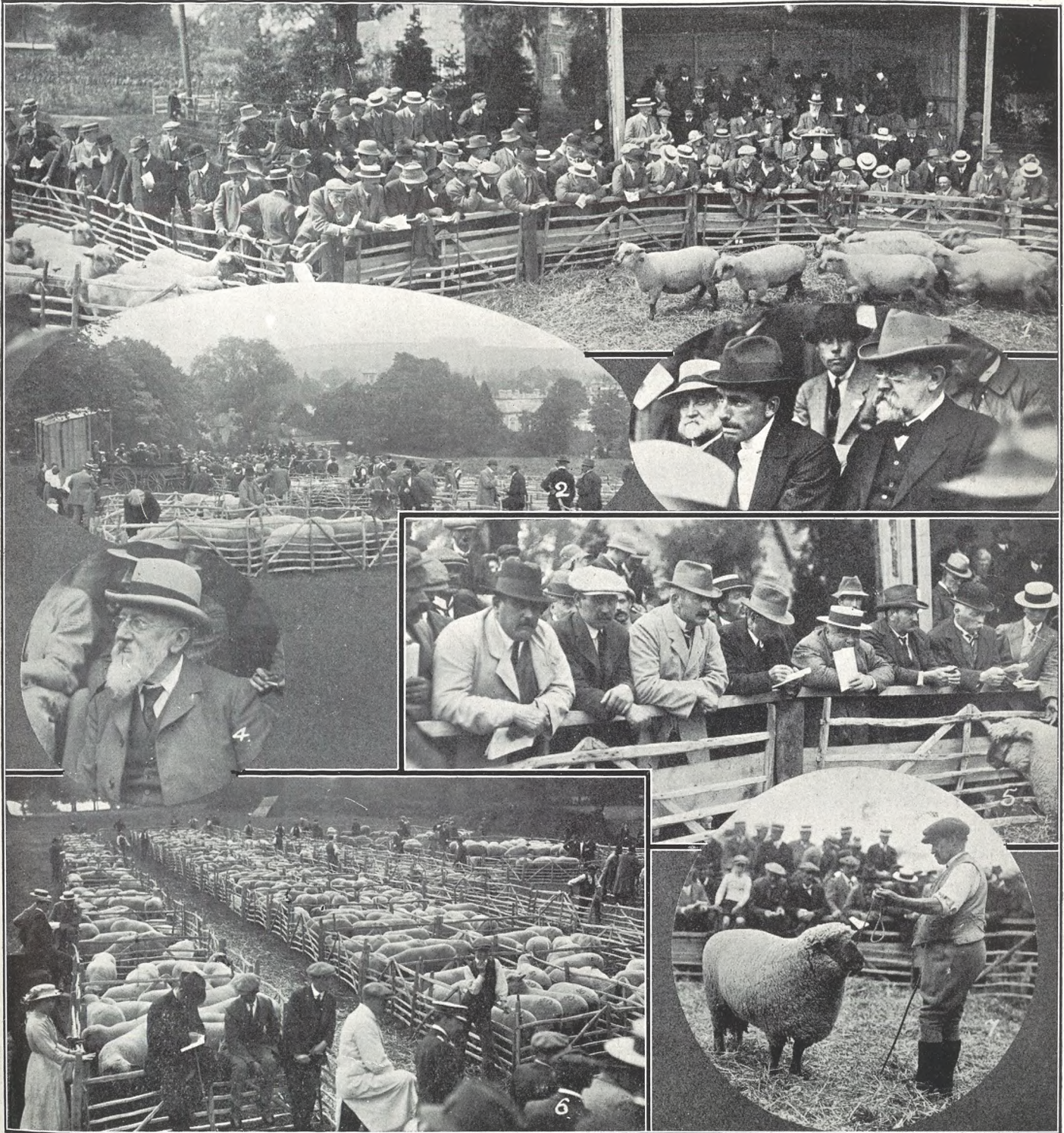


**UNIONIST FETE AT PRESTBURY.**

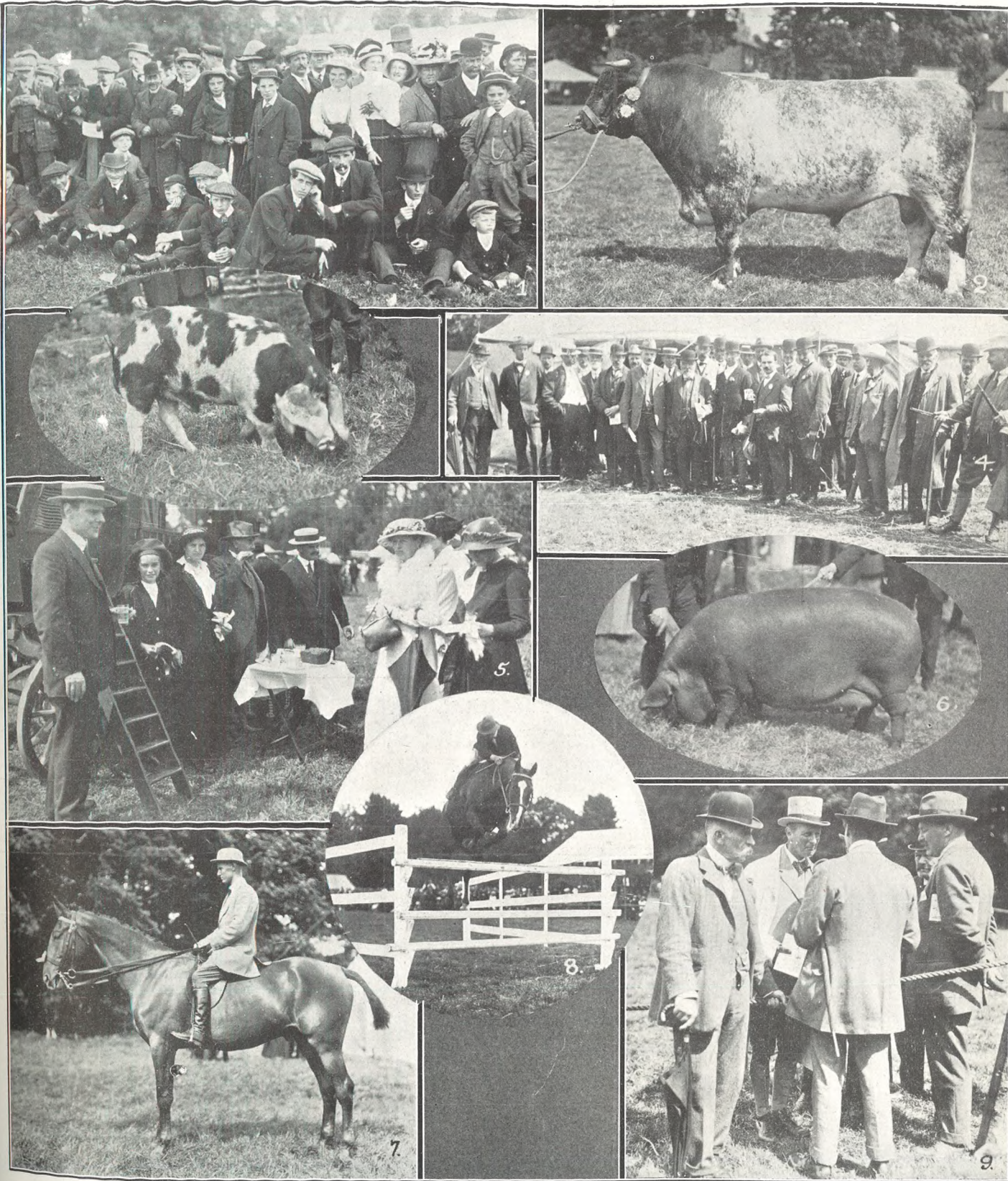


**CHELTENHAM'S VOLUNTEERS CALLED UP.**

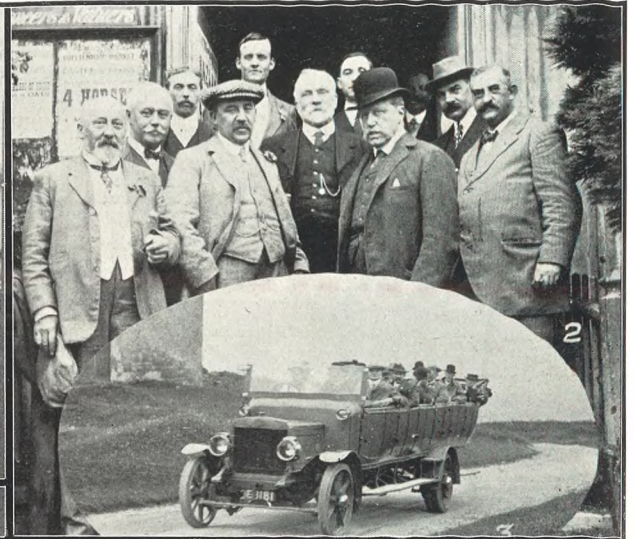

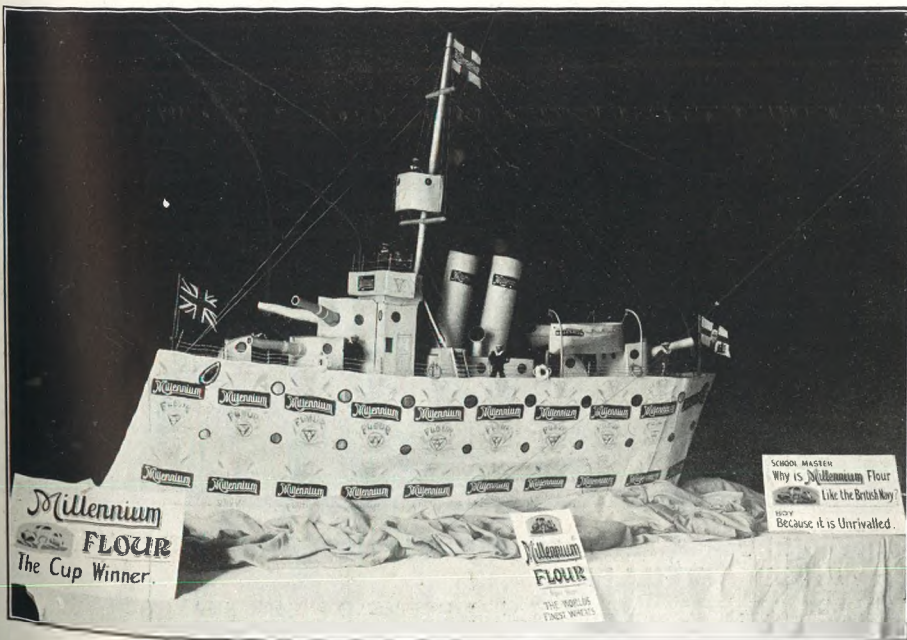

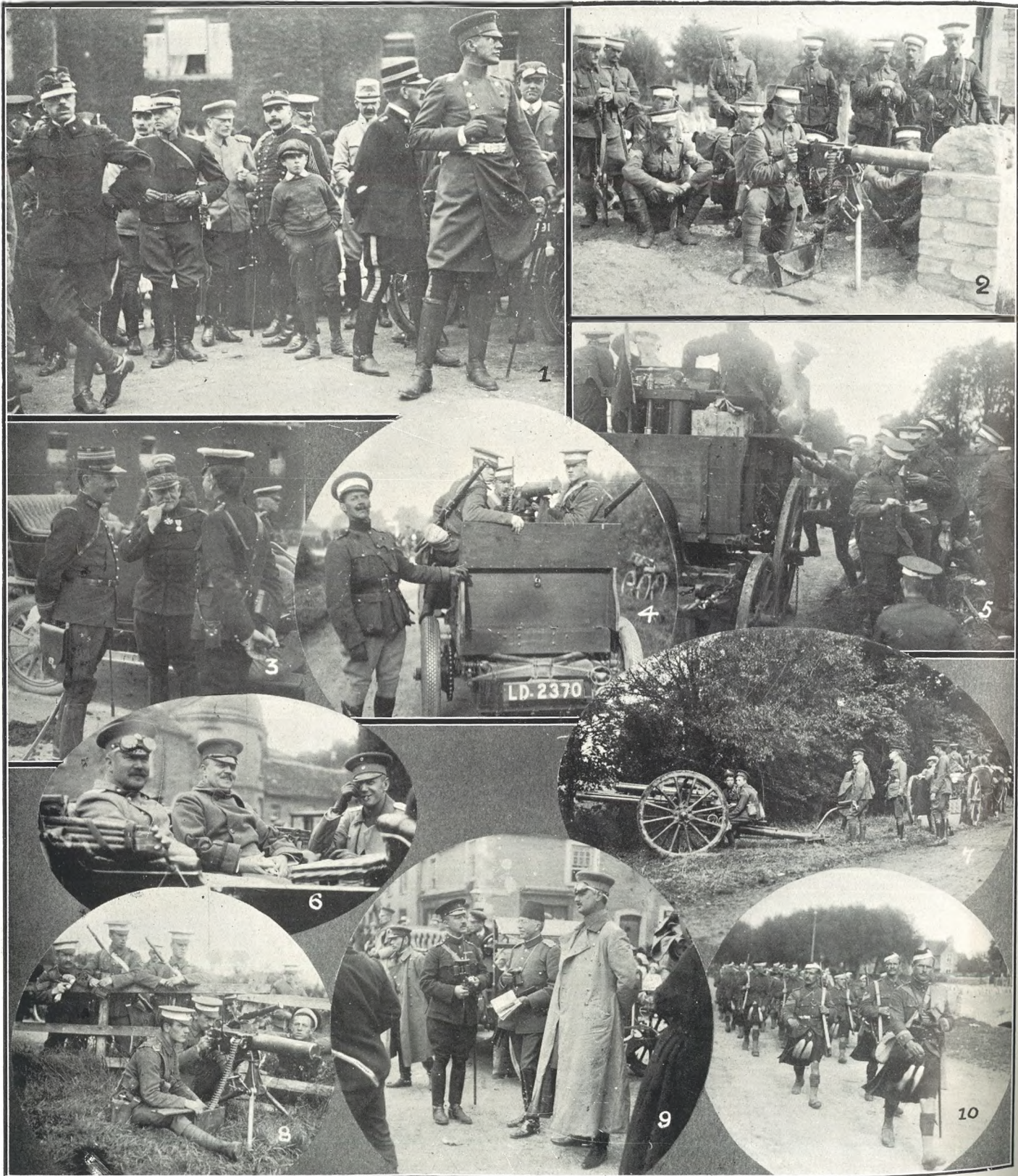

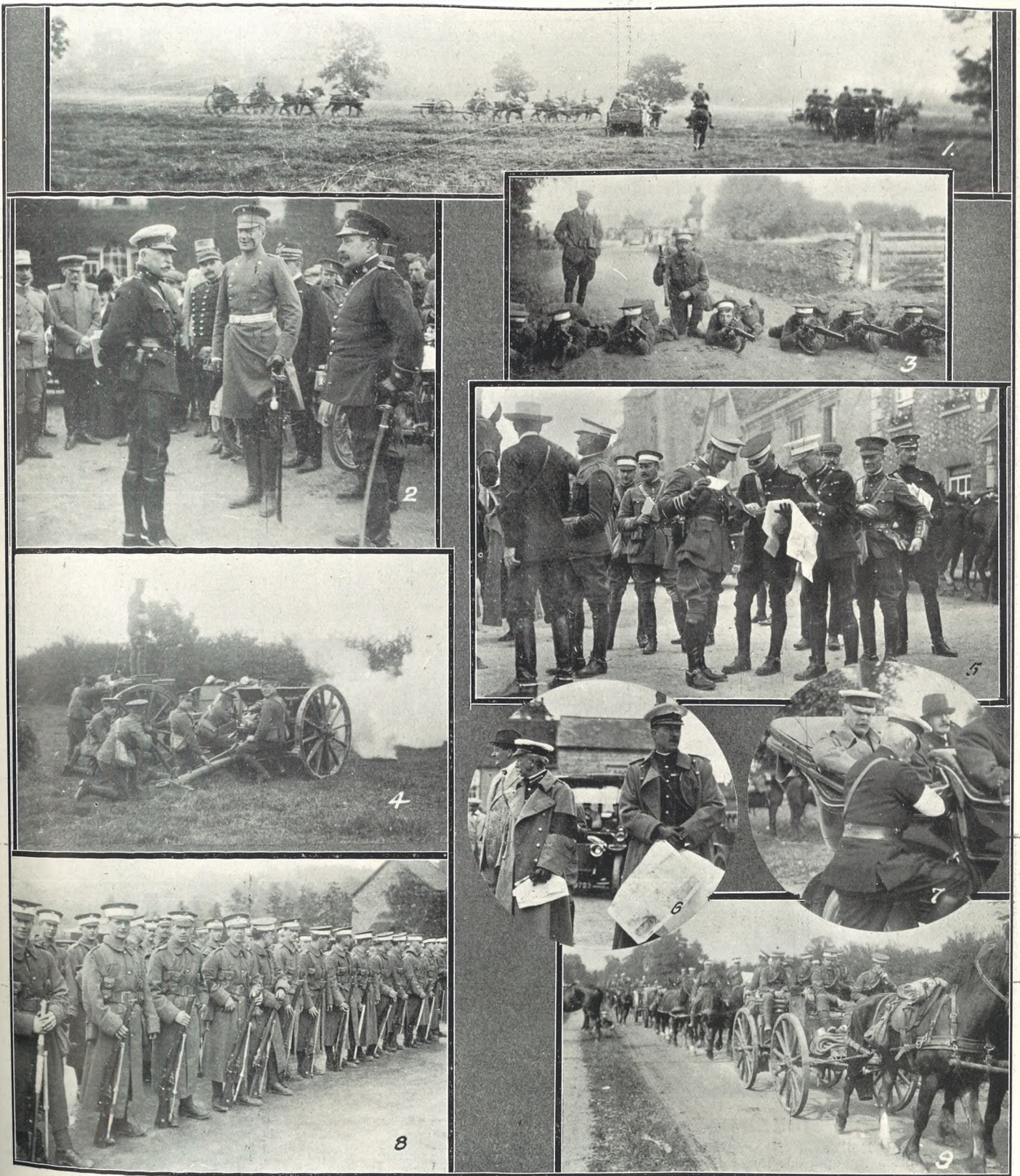

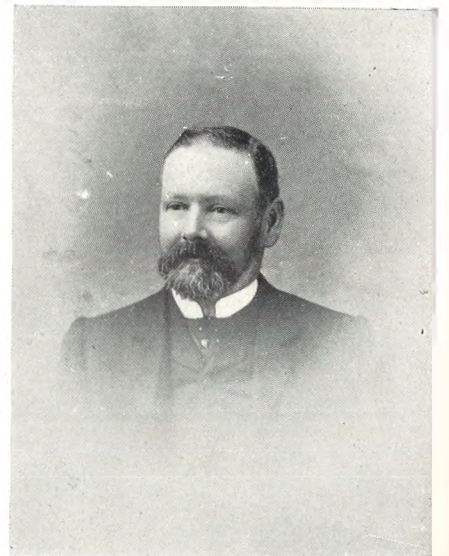

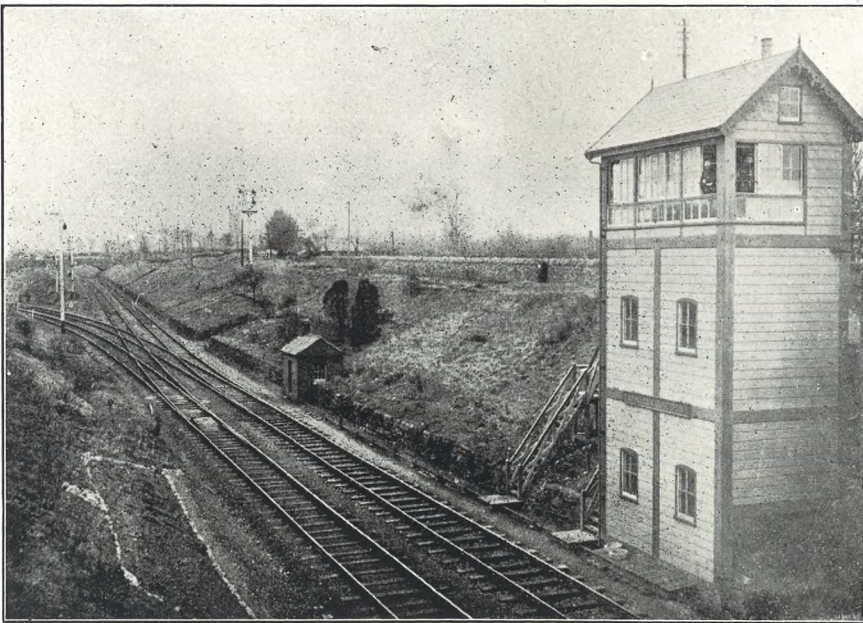

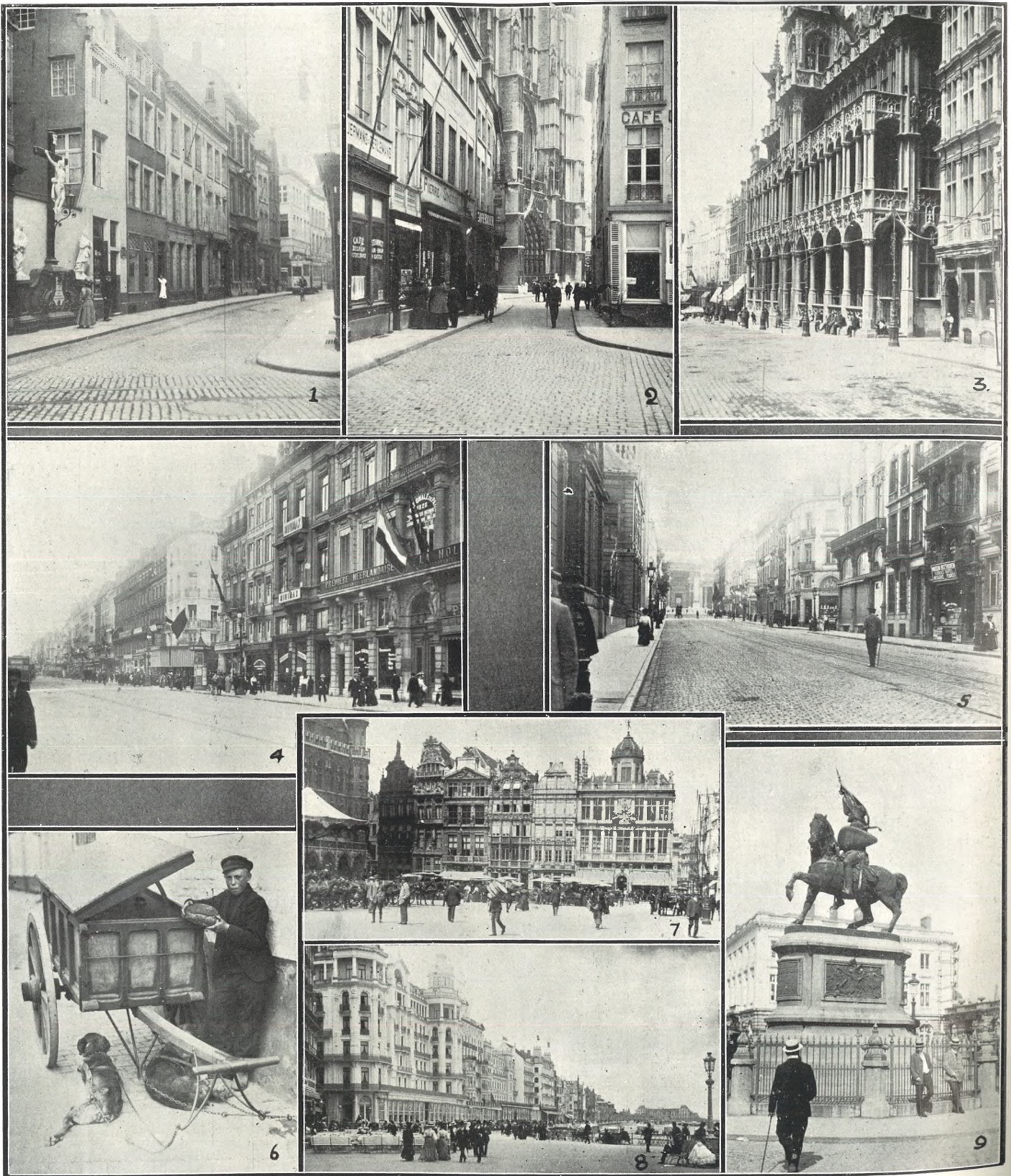

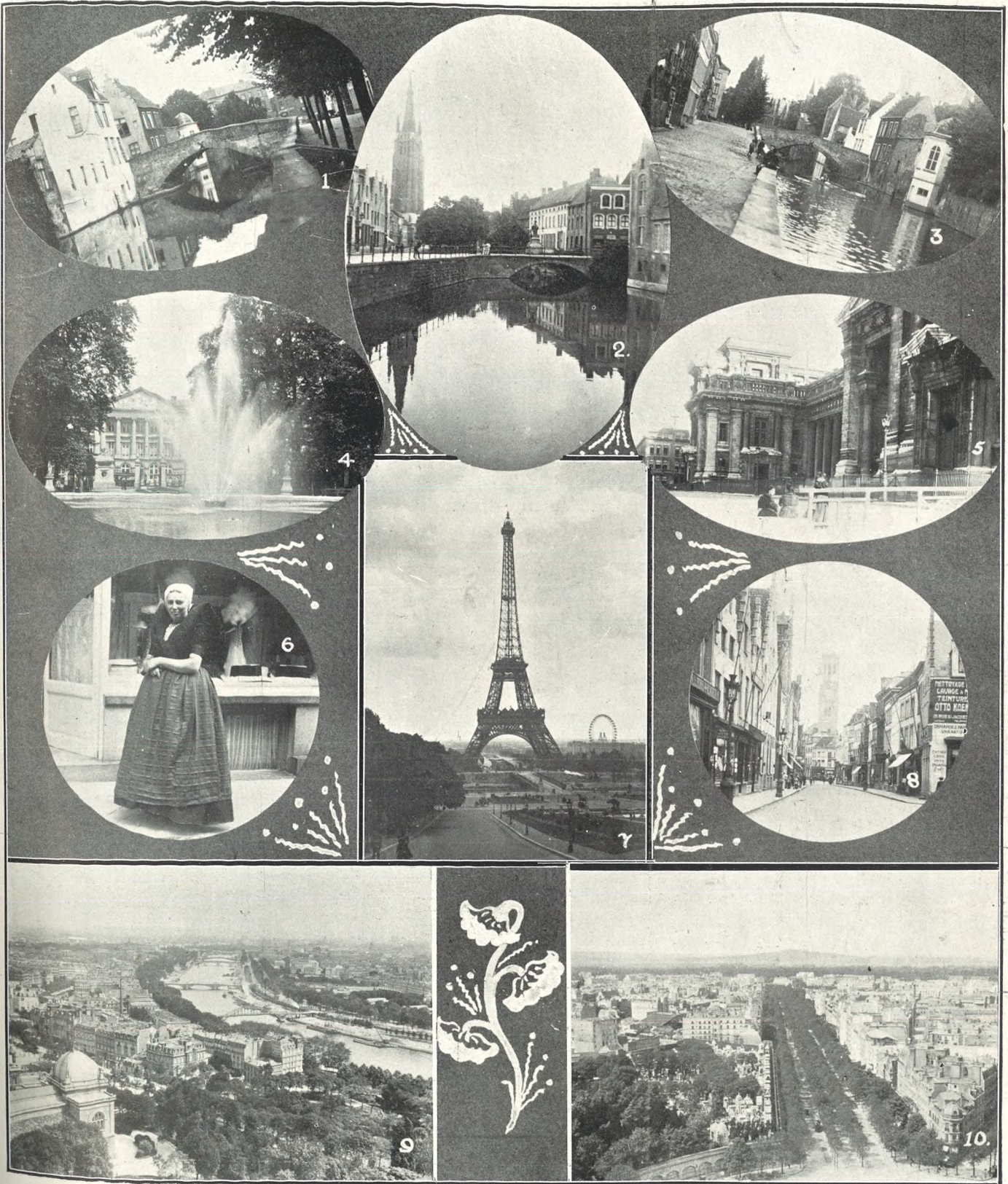
