Day, of Kilkenny, Bibury.

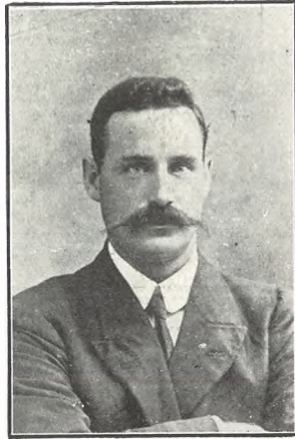

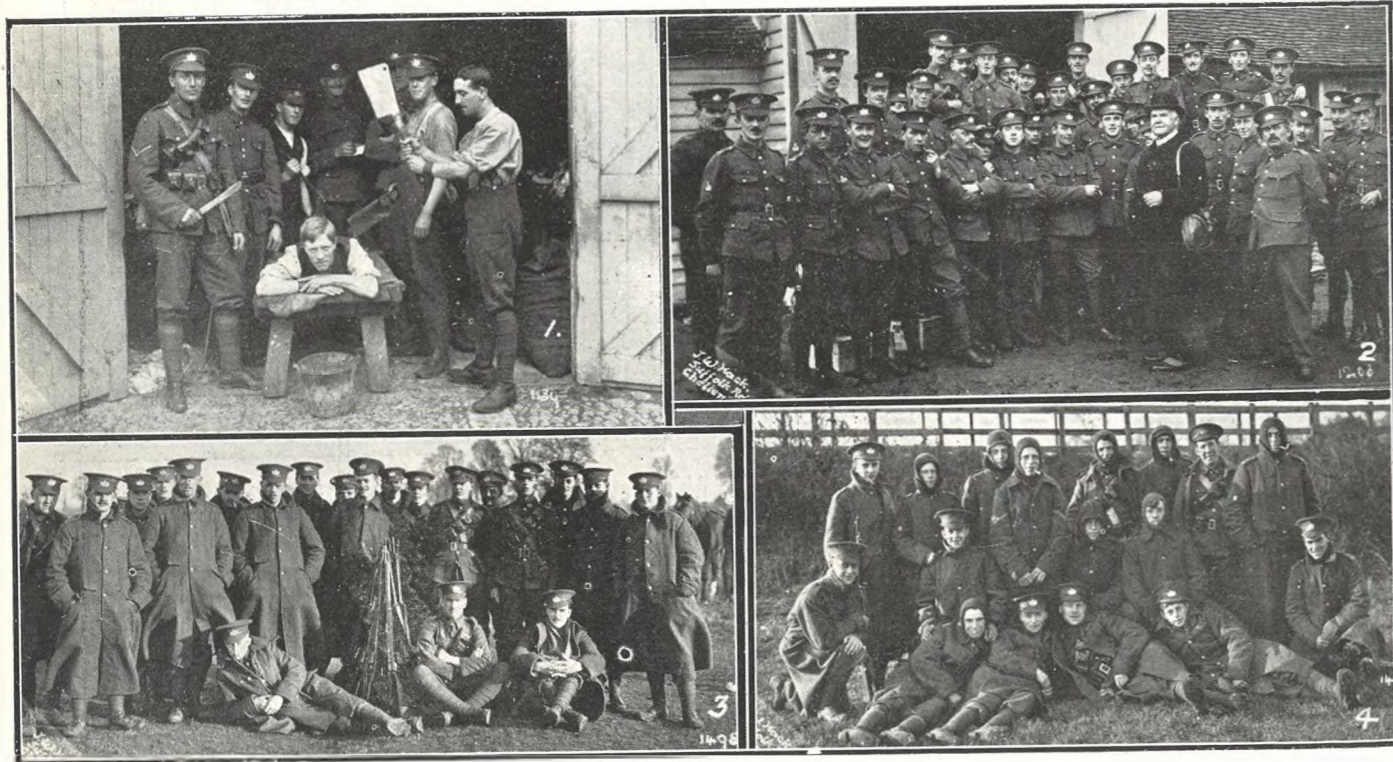

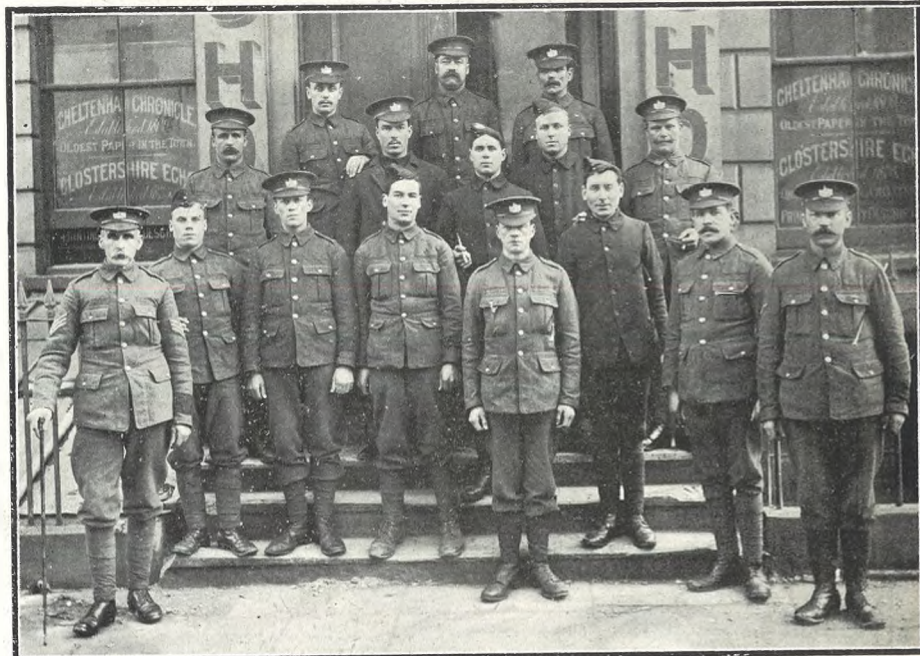

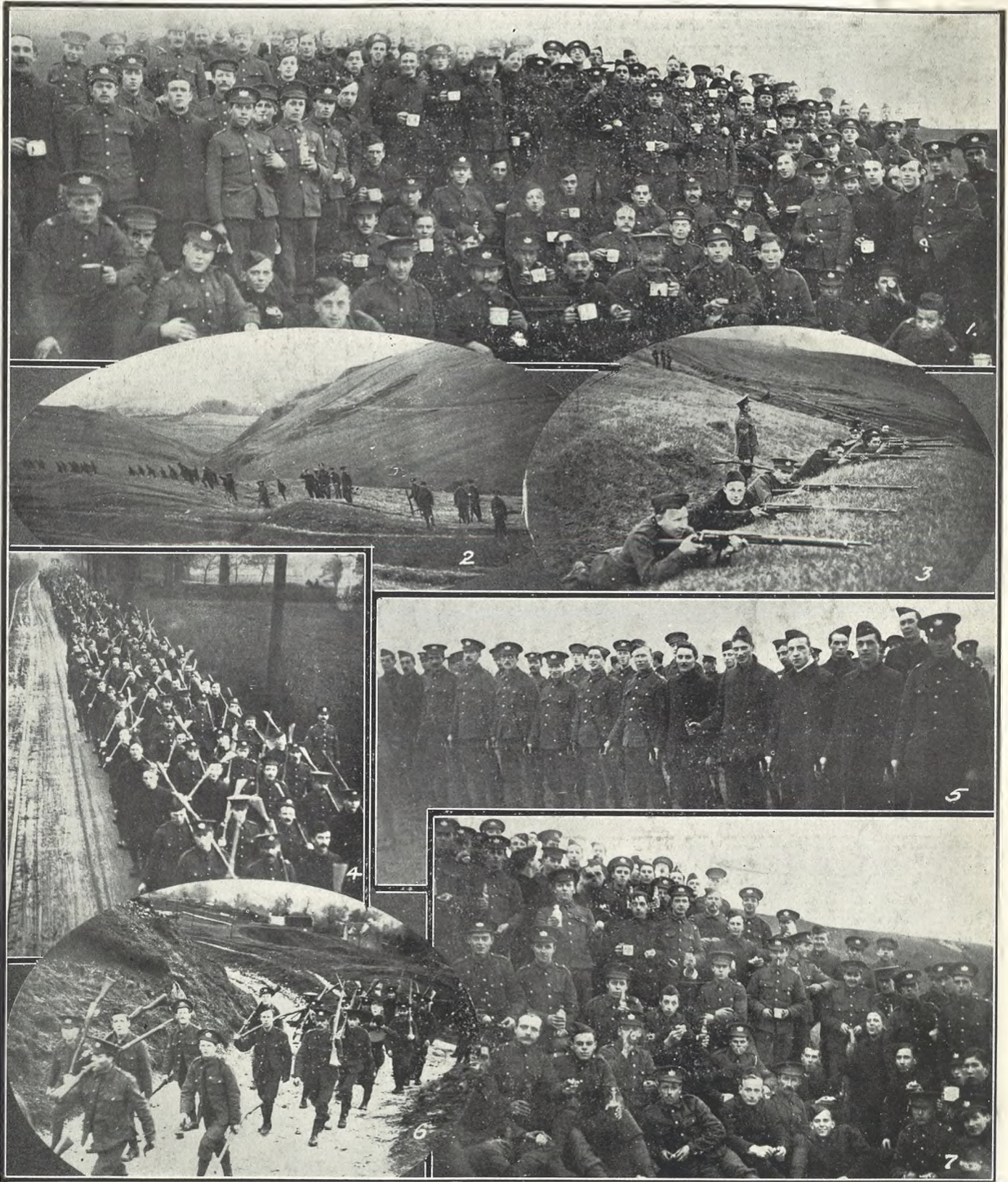

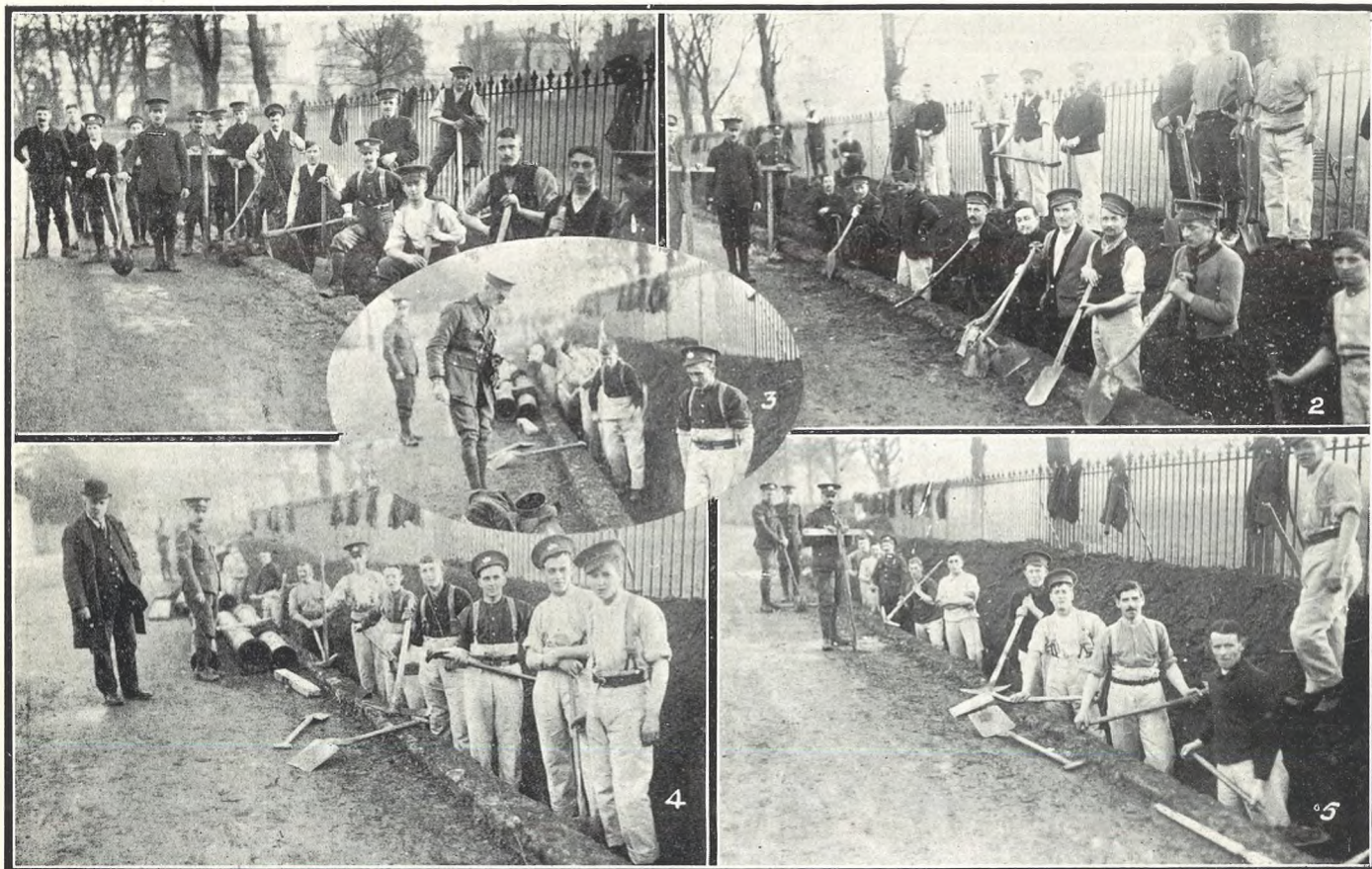
