1st Gloucester Regiment, wounded Oct. 31 at battle of Mons. He is one of the best Rugby three-quarters in his regiment. His home is 11 Foundry-row, Gloucester.



Lieut. D. H. Wiggin,

Of the Gloucester Regiment, died of wounds in Flanders, Dec. 23, aged 18, only commissioned just before war, youngest son of late Mr. F. H. Wiggin, Marle Hill House, Cheltenham.—[Photo by Holloway, Chelt.]



PRIVATE W. GIBBONS,

Of the Royal Naval Brigade, is now interned in Holland. He is a son of Mr. Gibbons, schoolmaster, of Kempford.

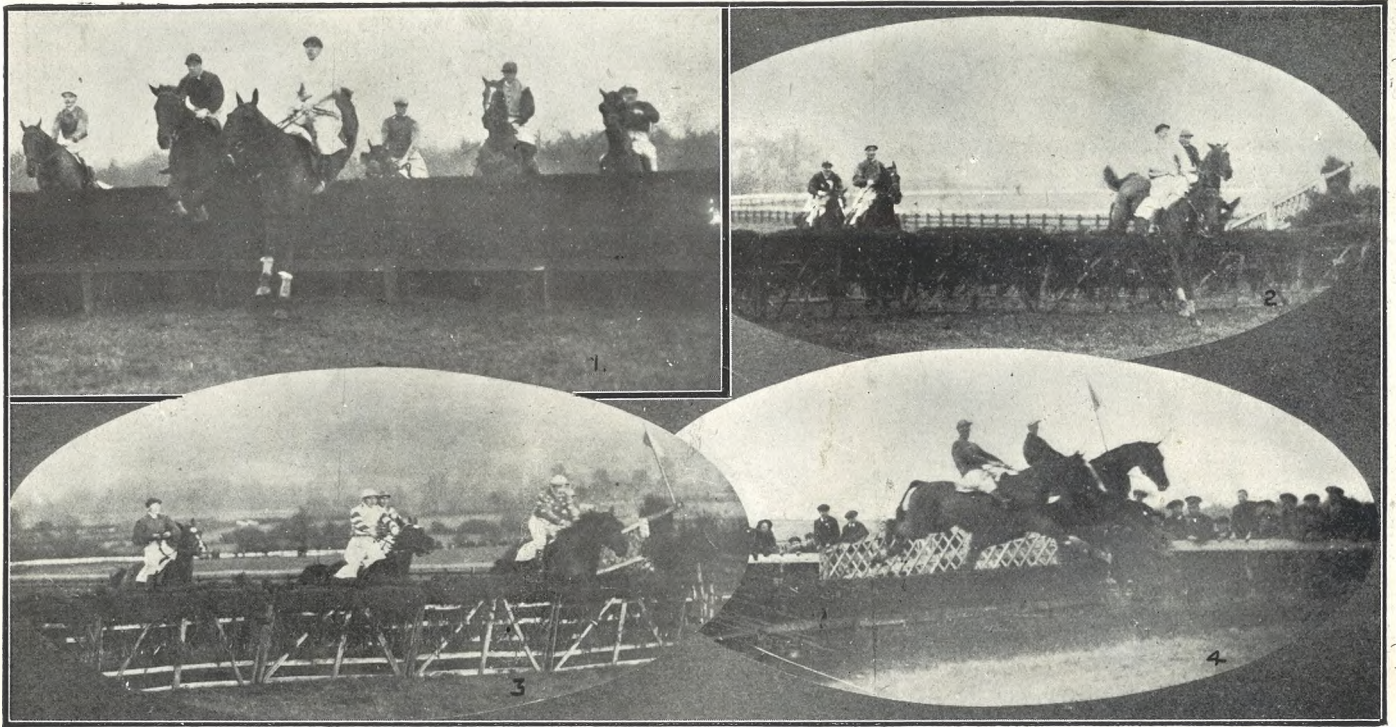

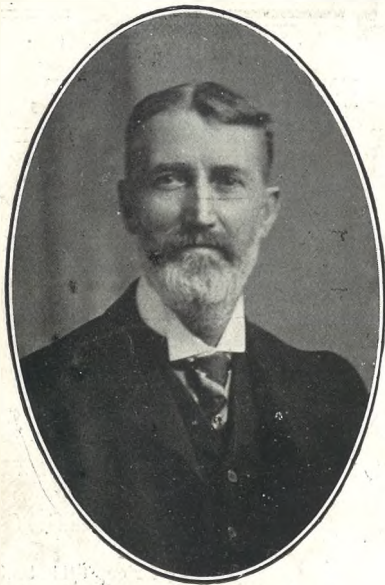


CHELTENHAM BOXING DAY STEEPLECHASES.

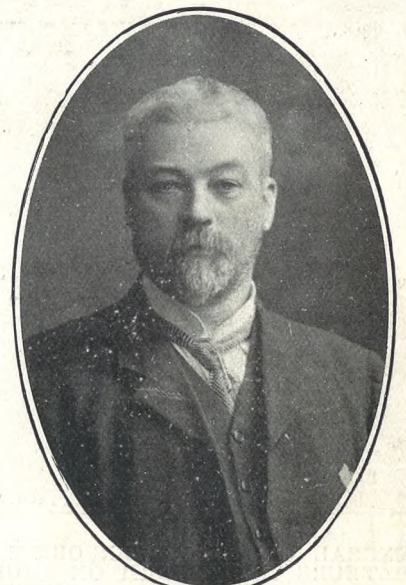
Mr. William Murray,

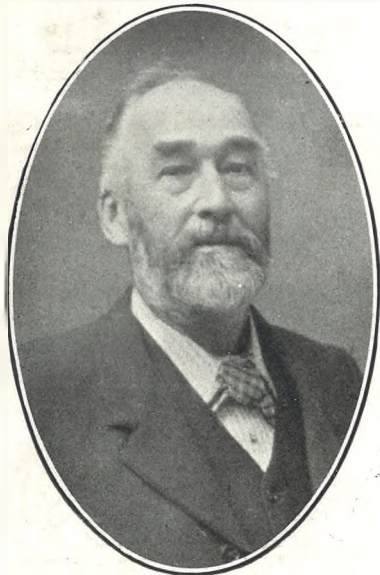

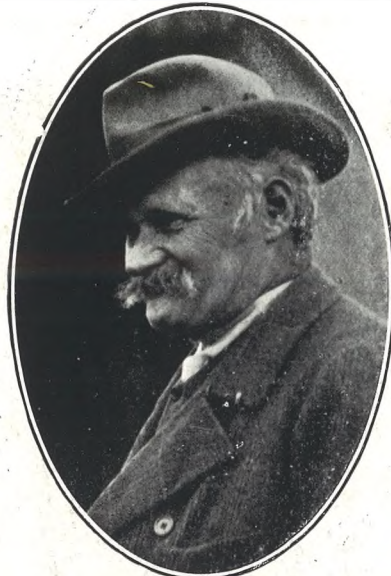

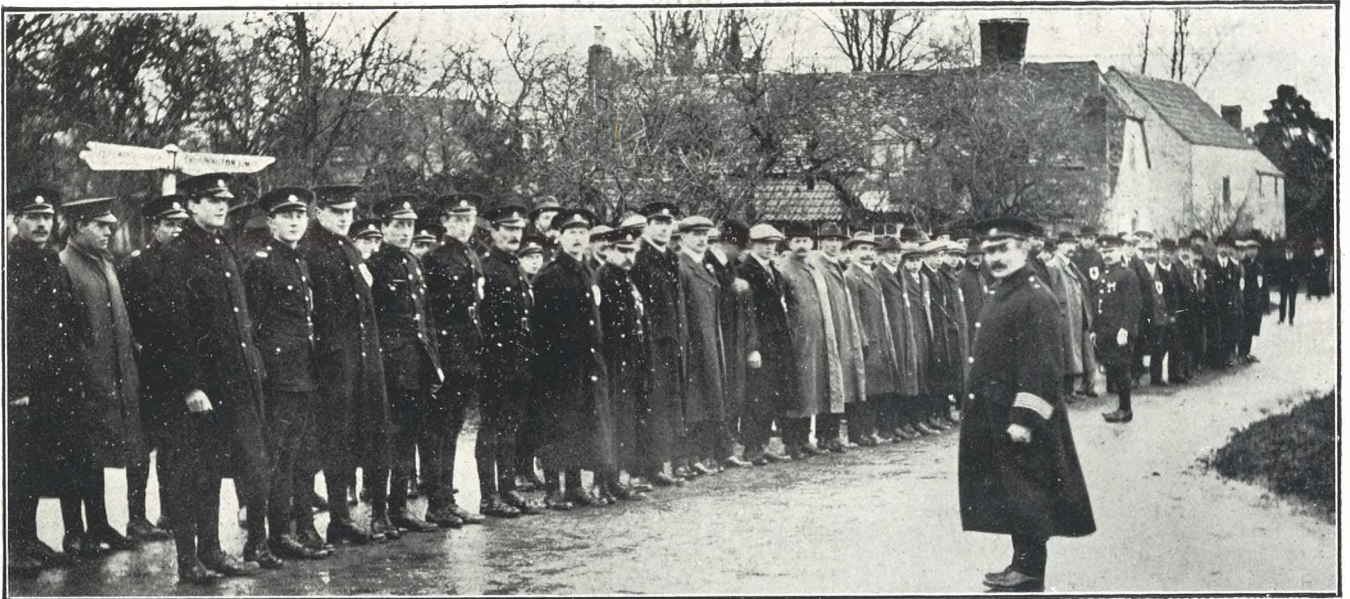

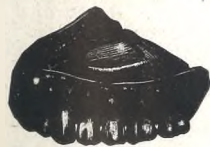

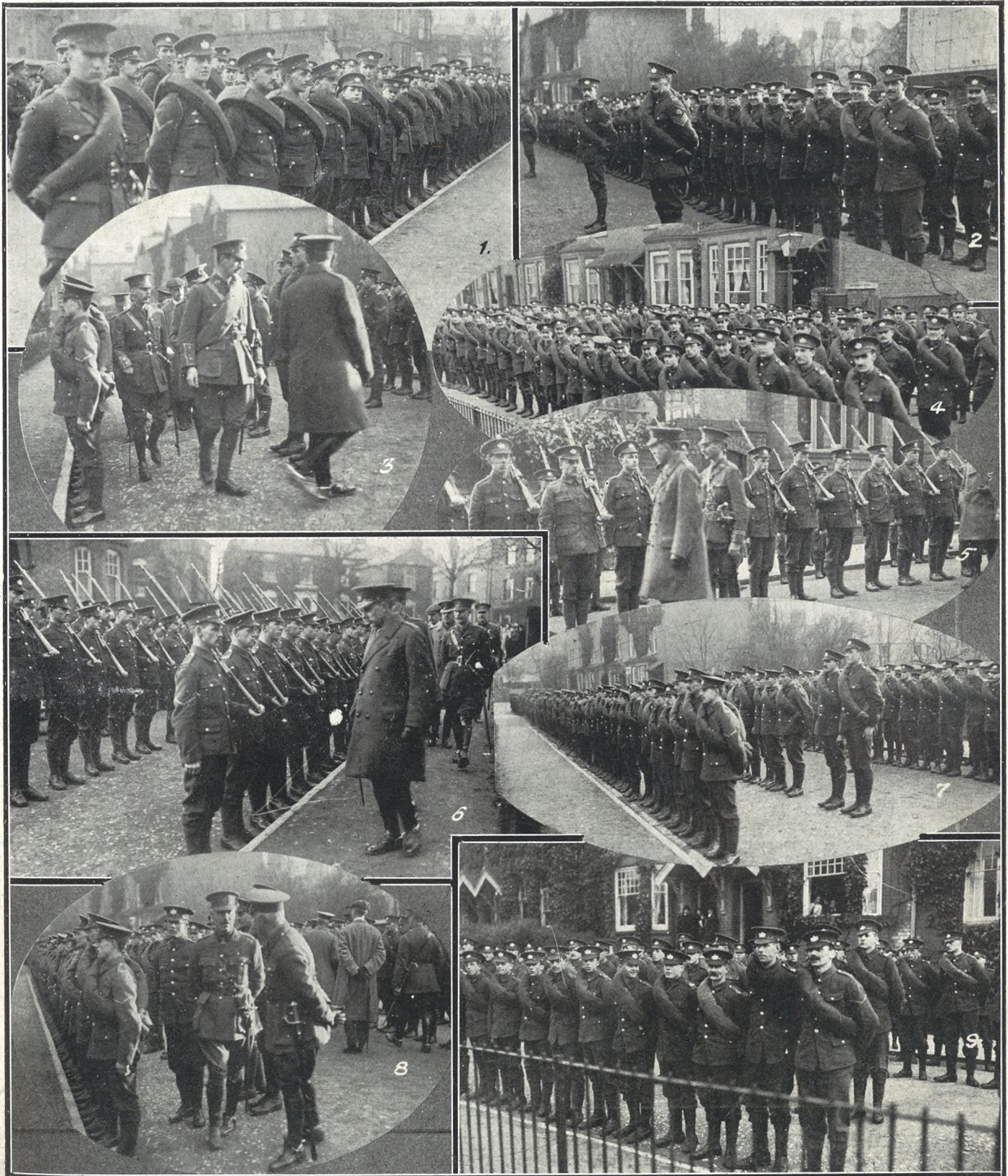

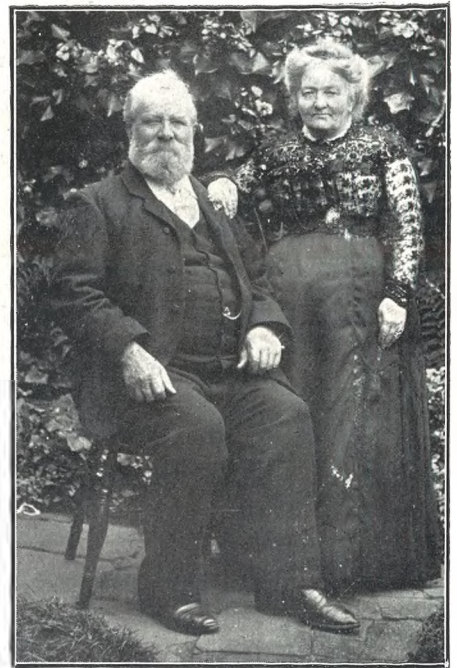

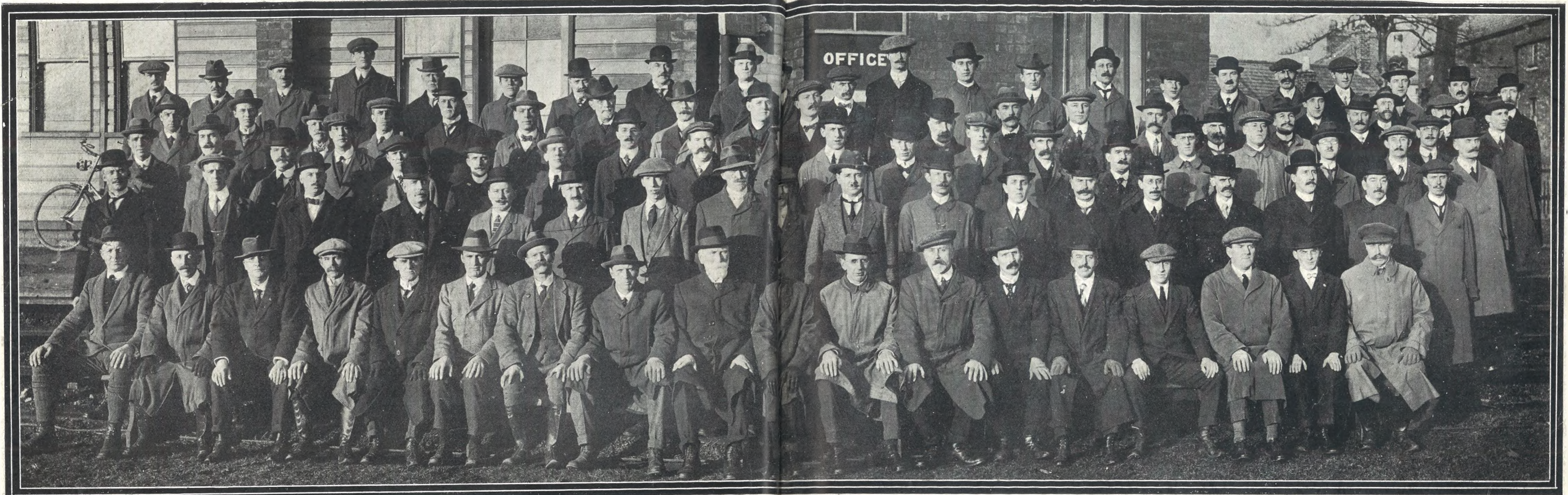
