PRIVATE A. J. BEAMS,
2nd Glo'ster Regiment, wounded
by shrapnel at Mons, but now
returned to front as stretcher
bearer. Son of Mr. A. Beams,
29 Glo'ster-place, Cheltenham.



PRIVATE S. MASON,
A.S.C., now invalided home from
France. Was captured by the
Germans, but made his escape.
An ex-employee of the Chel-
tenham Tramway Co.



PRIVATE HARRY FISHER,
1st Glo'ster Regiment, wounded
in mouth by shell at the Aisne.
He has been home, but has re-
turned to the front. Son of
Mr. and Mrs. Fisher, The
Junction, Saul, Glos.



SERGT. A. J. WILKINS,
1st Gloucester Regiment, died
of wounds at the front on Jan.
6th. His home was at 22 Mill-
street, Gloucester.



PRIVATE W. C. SHAW,
1st Royal Dragoons. Has re-
ceived the Distinguished Con-
duct Medal for gallantry near
St. Pieter in rescuing a
wounded comrade under heavy
fire. He is a son of Mr. and
Mrs. George Shaw, 7 Slaney-
street, Gloucester.



PRIVATE A. W. SUMMERS,
3rd Gloucester Regiment, killed
by the bursting of a shell,
Jan. 25th, aged 20 years. He
is the son of Mr. and Mrs.
Summers, of the White Lion
Inn, Lightpill, Stroud, and
was well known as a local foot-
baller.



PRIVATE WILLIAM BEARD,
1st Gloucester Regiment, in-
valided to his home at Church-
down from Sunderland Hos-
pital, suffering from shock
caused by a shell at La Bassee.
This shell killed and wounded
a large number of the Glouces-
ters. He was previously a
G.W.R. signalman at Peny-
graig.



CORPORAL E. DIX,
1st Gloucester Regiment, killed
in action at La Bassee, Jan. 25,
aged 36 years. He went through
the Boer War, was a Reservist
and in Canada at outbreak of
war. He was previously a resi-
dent at Longborough, where
his wife and family still reside.



RIFLEMAN W. COLE,
2nd Battalion Rifle Brigade,
wounded in leg, arm, and
thigh in action, and now at
Yarrow Military Hospital,
Broadstairs. Son of Mr. and
Mrs. Wm. Cole, St. Mary's-
lane, Tewkesbury.



PRIVATE WILLIAM PIKE,
2nd Wilts Regiment, reported
missing since Nov. 8th, aged 25
years. He is the only son of
Mrs. Mills, of Horcott, near
Fairford.



PRIVATE W. PARSONS,
2nd Gloucester Regiment, now
in a French hospital with
badly frost-bitten feet, age 22
years. His home is at Charl-
ton Kings, and his sister is
Mrs. Gammon, of Turkdean,
Northleach.



PRIVATE WM. MATTHEWS,
1st Glo'ster Regiment, wounded
by shrapnel in leg at La Bassee
and now home on sick leave.
Son of Mr. Fredk. Matthews,
Fairfield-road, Cheltenham.

4th King's Royal Rifles, in-
valided from trenches with
frost-bitten feet, and now in
hospital at Burton-on-Trent.
His home is 2 Gloucester-

PRIVATE W. J. DAVIS,
1st Glo'ster Regiment, severely
wounded in right arm recently.
On October 23 he was wounded
in head. His home is at Stow-
on-the-Wold.



PRIVATE V. MARGRETTS,
1st Worcester Regt., invalided
from trenches with frost-
bite. His home is at Moorend,
Cheltenham.



PRIVATE A. CRITCHLEY,
2nd Gloucester Regiment, now in
Lincoln Hospital with frost-
bitten feet after a spell in the
trenches. Grandson of Mrs.
Critchley, 25 Cleevland-street,
Cheltenham.



PRIVATE S. STEPHENS,
1st Glo'ster Regiment, wounded
at Mons by bayonet, but con-
tinued to fight. At Ypres on
Nov. 30 wounded by shrapnel,
and lay on battlefield for
seven hours before relief came.
His home is Kingscourt, near
Stroud.



PRIVATE J. STEPHENS,
1st Glo'ster Regiment, invalided
home with frost-bite con-
tracted in the trenches. His
home is at Stroud.



PRIVATE A. NATION,
1st Glo'ster Regiment, wounded
in leg at La Bassee Feb. 3rd.
Son of Mrs. Nation, 3 Cleeve
View-terrace, Whaddon-road,
Cheltenham.



PRIVATE HARRY COLLINS,
1st Worcester Regt., wounded
in France on Jan. 9th, and now
in Woodhouse Home Hospital,
Colchester. He was at Lady-
smith in the Boer War, and is
the old Gloucester Rugby for-
ward. His home is 2A Clare-
street, Gloucester.



PRIVATE C. R. NEWMAN,
10th Gloucester Regiment, who
died at Suffolk Hall Hospital,
Feb. 18, of pneumonia, aged
19 years. His home was at
Minchinhampton, where he
was buried on Monday, Feb.
22, with military honours.



PRIVATE JOE SESSIONS,
1st Grenadier Guards, invalided
with frost-bite, but returned to
trenches, and on Feb. 5th was
wounded, and had his leg am-
putated, since being in a pre-
carious condition. He is an old
Stroud footballer.

3rd Gloucester Regiment, died
at Royal Military Hospital,
Woolwich, Feb. 23rd. His
home was at Illerton, Ceme-
tery-road, Cheltenham.

from trenches suffering from
frost-bite, and now in Princess
Christian Hospital, Wey-
mouth. He is a son of Mr.
and Mrs. Thos. Moxey, 23

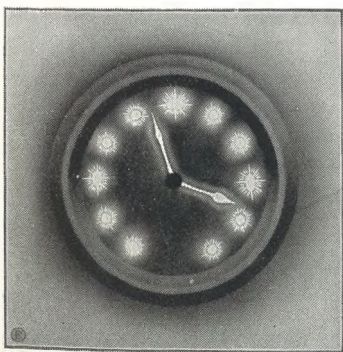

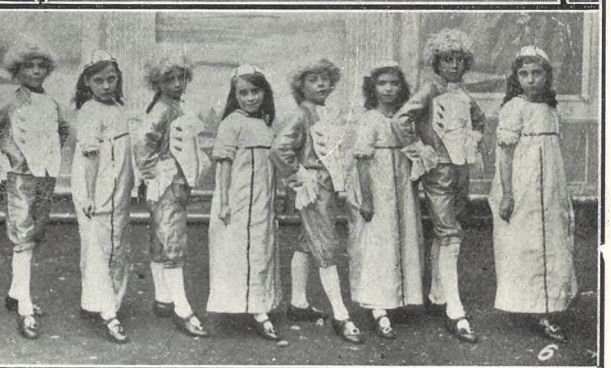

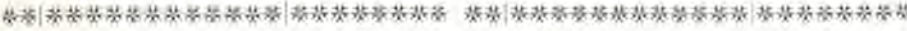
