PRIVATE LEWIS HOPKINS,
1st Gloucester Regiment, who was wounded last year in Belgium, and who died of his wounds in Rochester Hospital, where he has been ever since, on Friday, March 19. He was a native of Condicote, where he was buried on March 23.



PRIVATE R. BRACEY,
Royal Berkshire Regiment, wounded in action, March 11, and now in hospital at Rouen. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Bracey, Alfred-street, Gloucester, and formerly of Cinderford and Winchcombe.



PRIVATE A. S. LEACH,
1st Gloucester Regiment, badly wounded by shrapnel, Nov. 2, near Ypres, and now in Leckhampton Court Hospital. Son of Mrs. George Leach, Cowley, and brother of Mrs. A. Nation, 24 Montpellier-terrace, Cheltenham.



PRIVATE A. M. COOPER,
1st Glo'ster Regiment, missing in France since Oct. 17. Son of Mr. and Mrs. F. Cooper, Norma Villa, Churchhill-road, Cheltenham. Two other brothers, Sergt. A. E. Cooper, 2nd Gloucesters, and Pte. Frank Cooper, 2nd Gloucesters, are at the front.



LANCE-CORPL. G. H. BARBER,
11th Hussars, wounded in France, March 2nd, and now in Norwich Hospital with fractured thigh. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Barber, Cleveland Inn, Tewkesbury-road, Cheltenham.



PRIVATE C. DENNING,
1st Glo'ster Regiment, wounded at Langemarck, Jan. 18, and now in Manchester Hospital. Son of Mrs. A. Browning, of Wanswell, near Berkeley, and brother of Private F. Denning (on this page).



PRIVATE F. DENNING,
2nd Glo'ster Regiment, invalided from trenches with frost-bitten feet, and now in a French hospital. Son of Mrs. Browning, of Wanswell, near Berkeley.



LANCE-CORPL. W. CHICK,
13th London Regiment (Territorials) Wounded in neck in action in France, and now in 1st Stationary Hospital, Rouen. Youngest son of Mr. Geo. Chick, Moorcroft, Grosvenor-street, Cheltenham.



PVT. GEO. EDWARD TROW,
2nd Gloucester Regiment, killed instantly in Belgium on March 14 while improving parapet of trench. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Stephen Trow, of Clatter Grove, Painswick.



SERG. W. J. RUSSELL,
1st Grenadier Guards, killed in action in France. He was a son of Mrs. Russell, nurse at Kemerton, near Tewkesbury.



PRIVATE WILLIAM DRAKE,
1st Gloucester Regiment. Has been missing in France since Nov. 7th. Is a native of Cheltenham, and brother of late Mr. Chas. Drake, Charlton Kings.



PRIVATE T. UNDERWOOD,
13th Gloucester Regiment, who died at Malvern of pneumonia on March 25, where the regiment is training. His home is Tewkesbury, where he leaves a widow and 6 children.

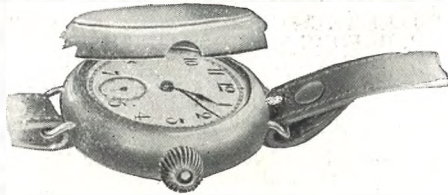

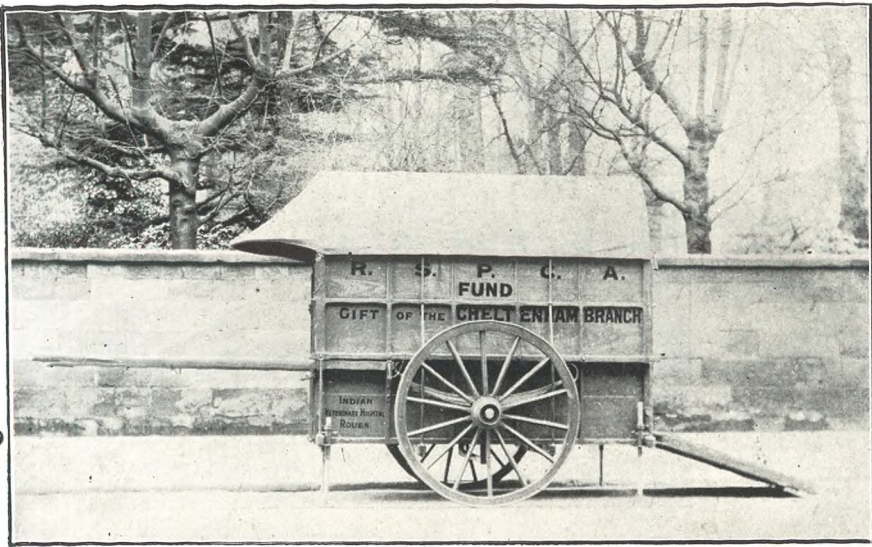

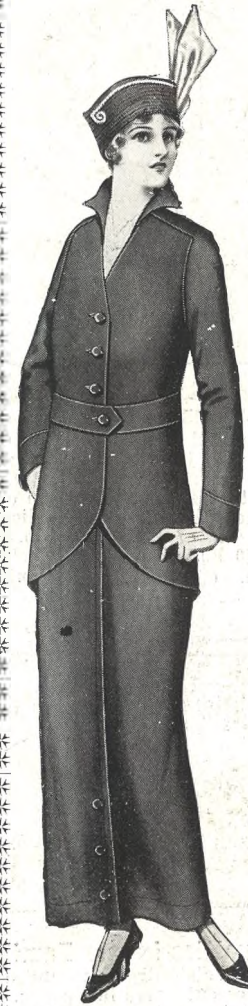

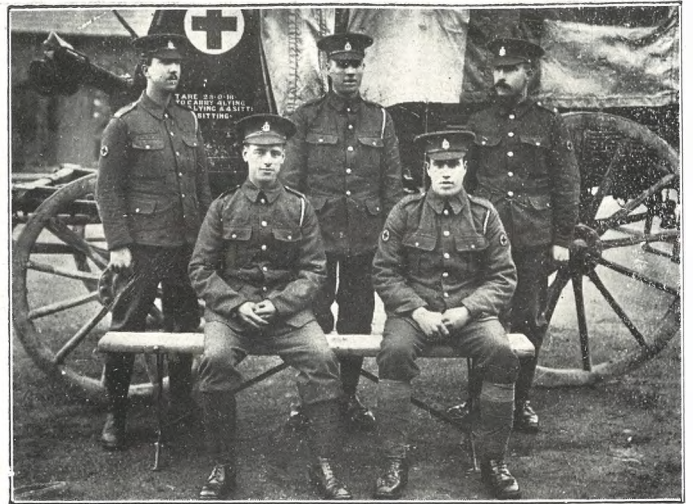

1st Glo'ster Regiment, wounded in action in October, and after rejoining, wounded again near Festubert on March 5th, and now in V.A.D. Hospital, Mortimer, Berks. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Bennett, 32 Sherborne-street, Gloucester.



PRIVATE A. E. JONES,
Northumberland Fusiliers, wounded 21st October at La Bassee, and after recovery, again at Neuve Chapelle on March 12th. Now in 5th Northern General Hospital, Leicester. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Jones, 25 Sherborne-street, Gloucester.



EX-COL.-SERGT. COLLINS,

2nd Gloucester Regiment, who died in France from pneumonia on March 11th after fighting in the trenches. He was a recruit from Brockhampton.



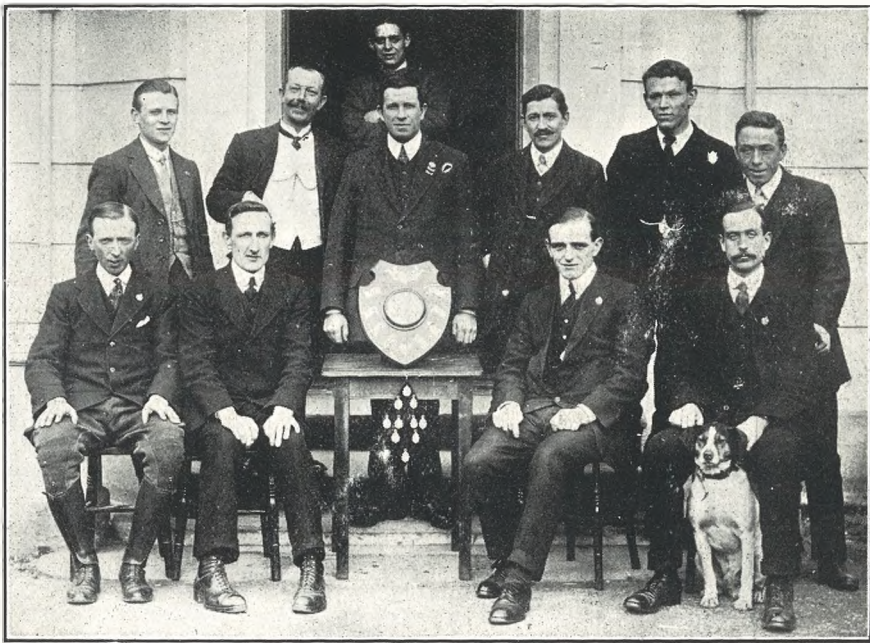
PRIVATE EDGAR DAVIS,

Durham Light Infantry, killed in action in France, Sept. 21, aged 30 years. Son of the late Mr. John Groves, Bell-street, Painswick.

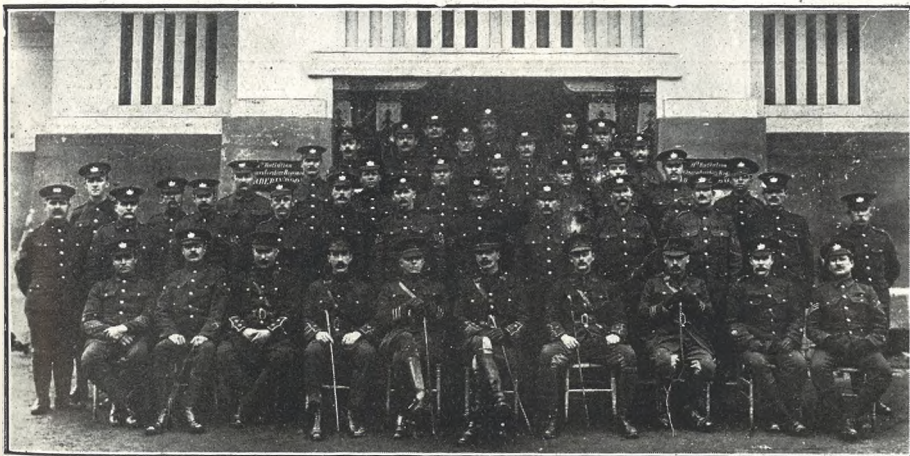

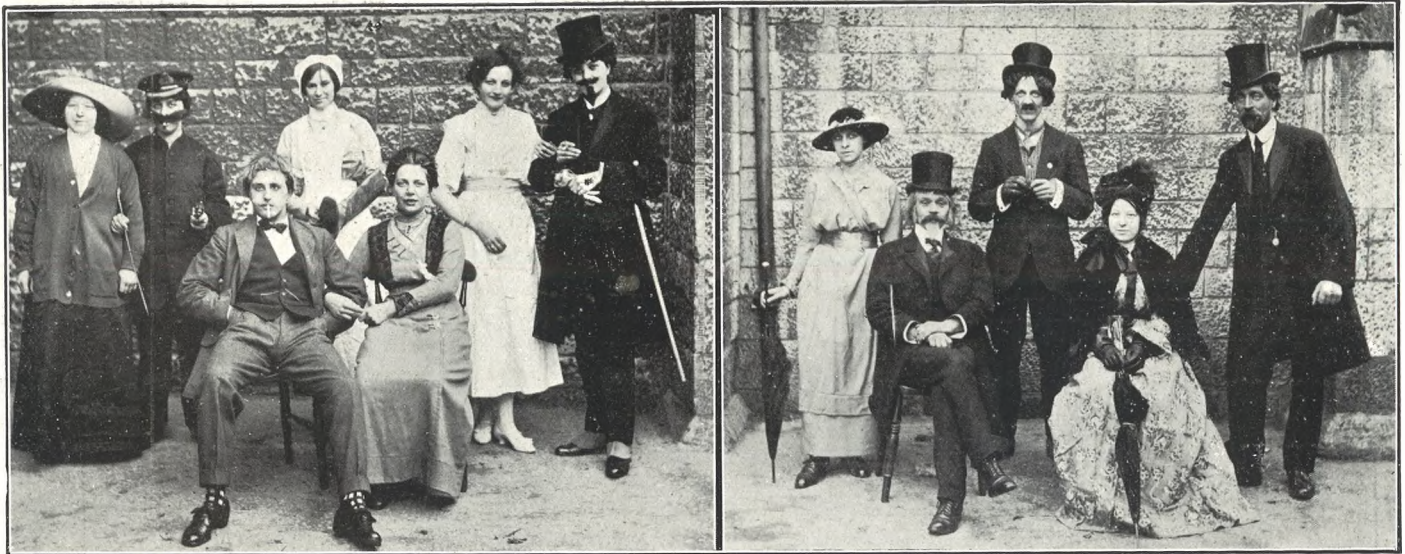

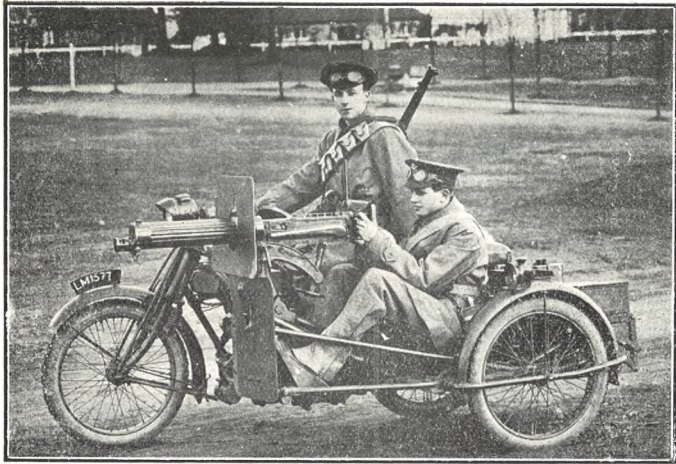

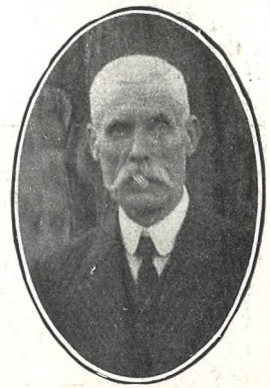

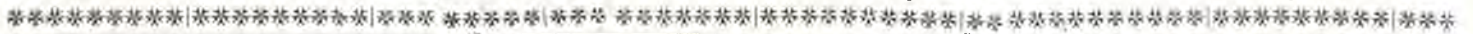
