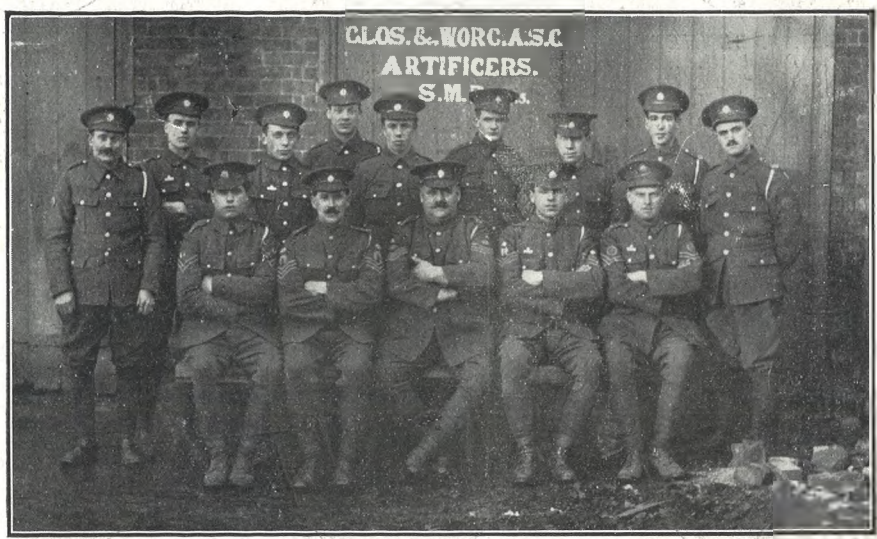

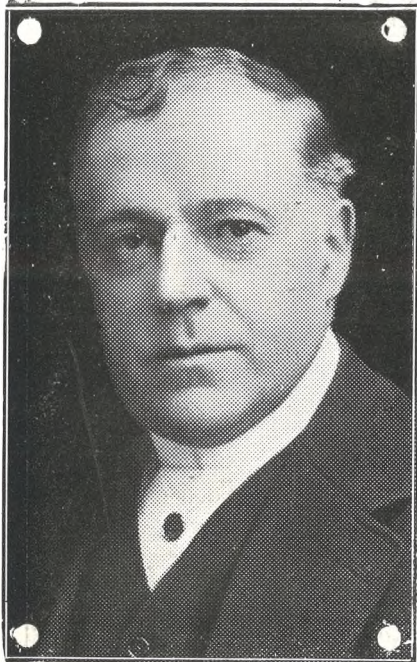


YEOMANRY BRIGADE CAMP AT CIRENCESTER.

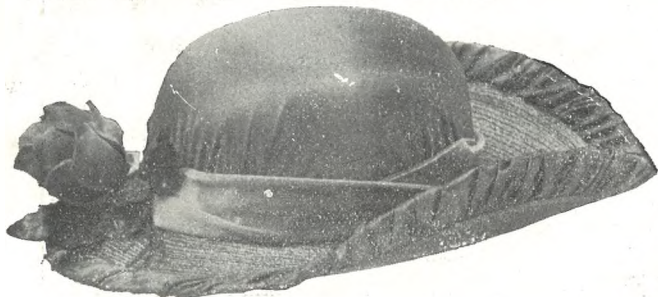

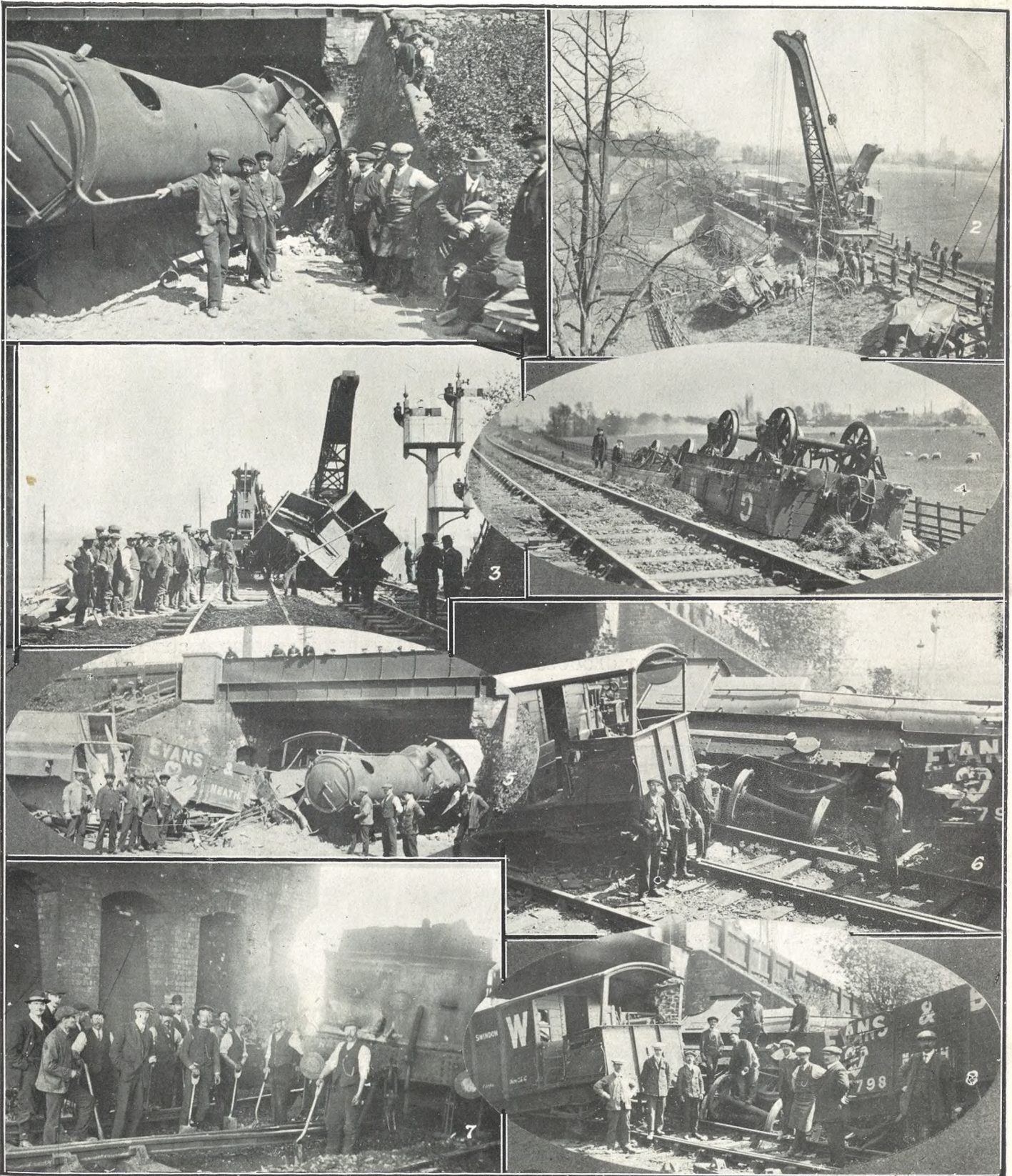
SEAMAN A. J. CRIBBLEY.

BIG RAILWAY SMASH NEAR GLOUCESTER.

ON FRIDAY MORNING, APRIL 30TH, A FAST GOODS TRAIN CRASHED INTO THE BACK OF A STATIONARY GOODS TRAIN ON THE G.W.R. LINE, NEAR OVER BRIDGE, GLOUCESTER, THE ENGINE OF THE FORMER TRAIN JUMPING THE METALS, CRASHING INTO THE BUTTRESS OF THE BRIDGE WHICH CARRIES THE MAIN ROAD OVER THE LINE, AND TURNING ON ITS SIDE. THE TWO GUARDS WERE BADLY SHAKEN, BUT NO ONE ELSE WAS HURT.

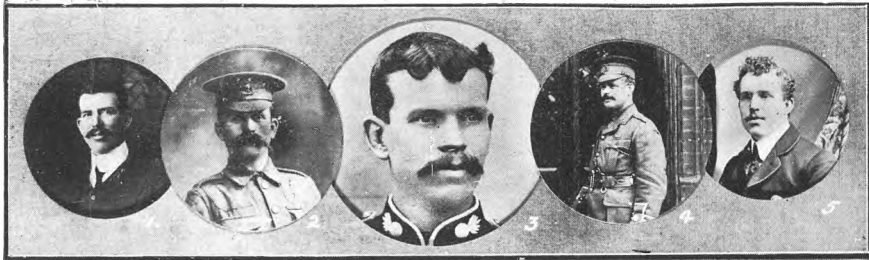

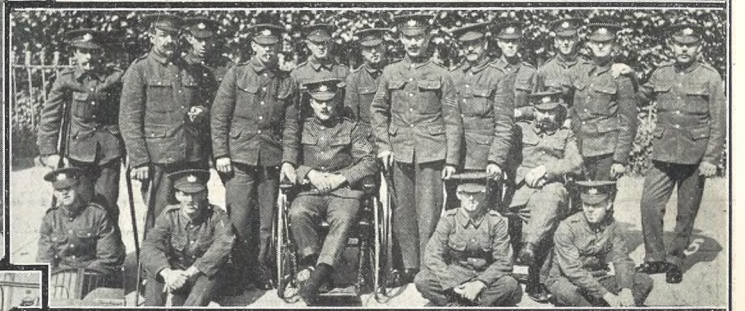

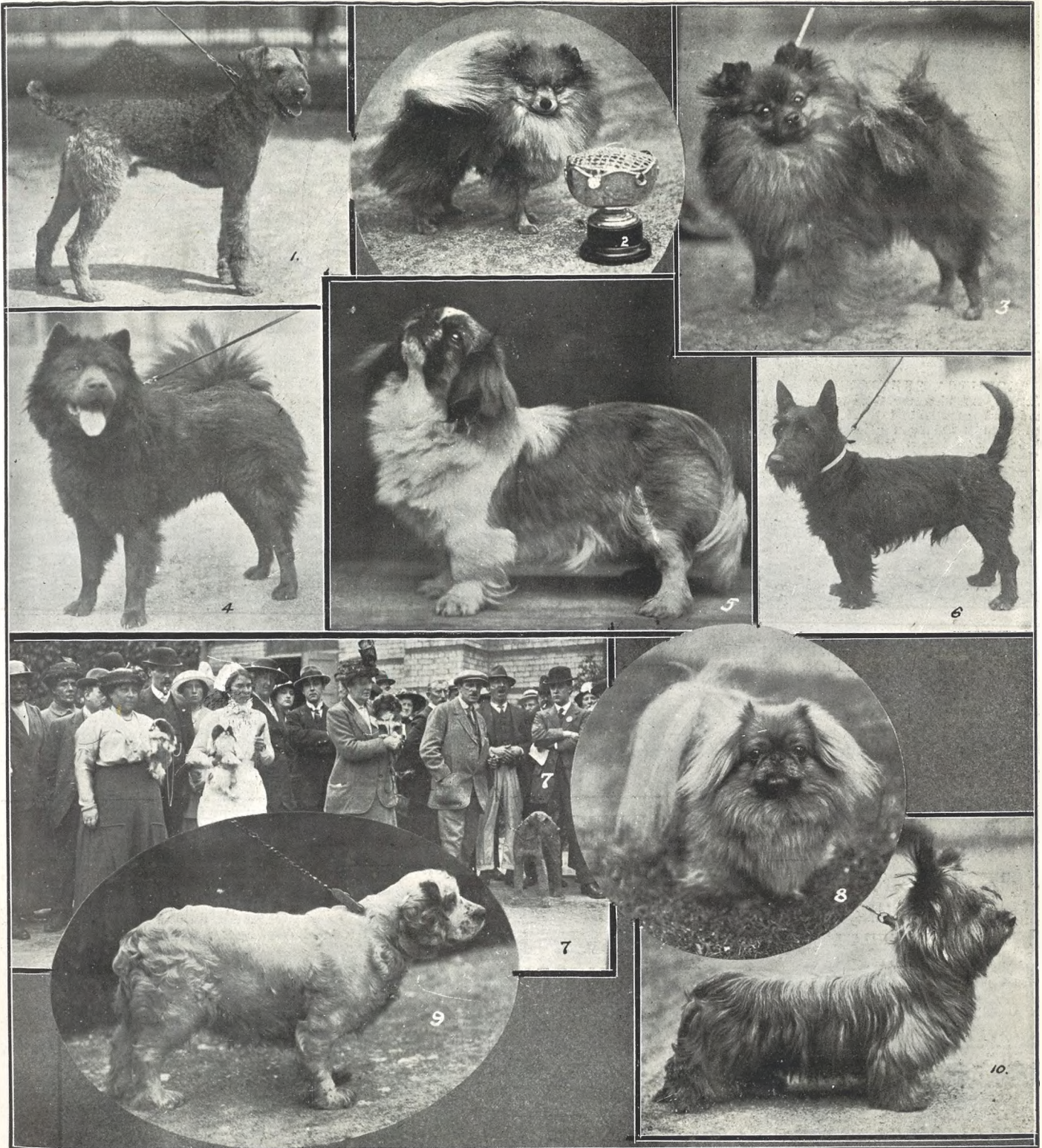

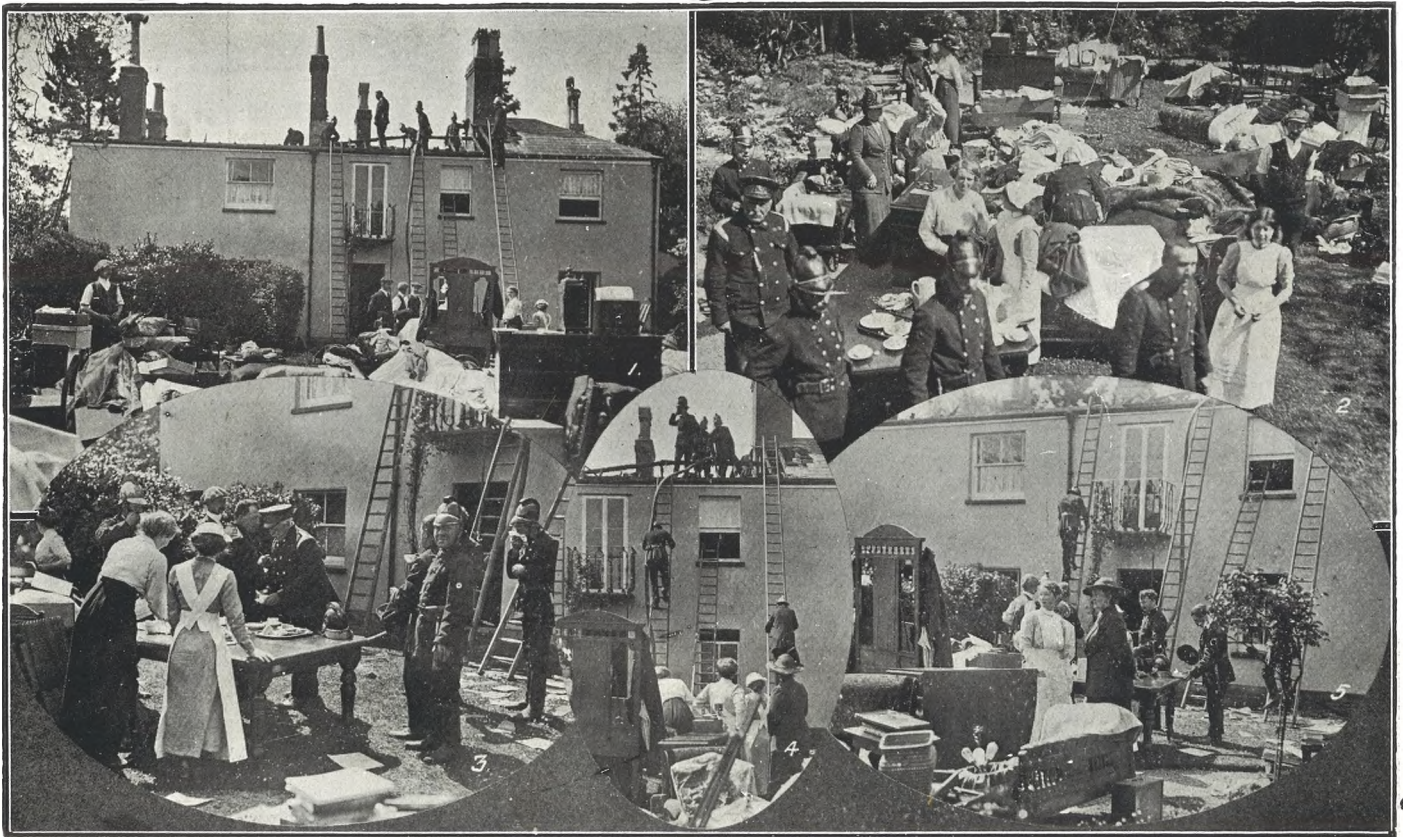
