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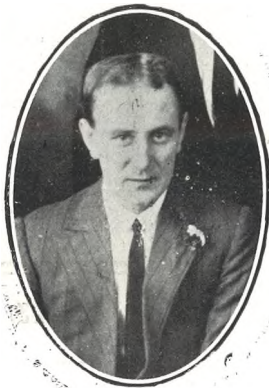
ENGLAND'S ROLL OF HONOUR.



SEC.-LIEUT. G. O. BUNCE, 2nd South Wales Borderers, killed in action at the Dardanelles, May 12th. He was a sergeant in China with his regiment, and was commissioned Feb. 11th and posted to his own company. Son of Col.-Sergt. and Mrs. Bunce, Park-street, Cheltenham, and husband of Mrs. Bunce, 38 Hungerford-street, Cheltenham.



PRIVATE W. MARSHALL, 1st Gloucester Regiment, wounded and missing since Oct. 31st. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Marshall, Overton, Maisemore, near Gloucester, and brother of Pte. E. Marshall (adjoining).



PRIVATE E. MARSHALL, 1st Somerset Light Infantry, wounded Sept. 18th, returned to front Dec. 28th, and killed in action April 30th. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Marshall, Overton, Maisemore, near Gloucester, and brother of Pte. W. Marshall (adjoining).



PRIVATE FRANK POPE, 2nd Gloucester Regiment, wounded in October, and returned to front. Since wounded again, from which he died on May 17th, aged 32 years. He was a native of Deerhurst, and a brother of Mrs. South, of that village.



PRIVATE A. HIGGINS, 1st Gloucester Regiment, invalided home with rheumatism, and now at Racecourse Hospital. Son of Mrs. Higgins, 30 Burton-street, Cheltenham.



RIFLEMAN P. ARKELL, 1st Batt. K.R.R., wounded in action in France last week, and now in Red Cross Hospital, Exeter. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Arkell, 3 Brunswick-place, St. Paul's-road, Cheltenham.



PRIVATE T. MURPHY, 2nd Gloucester Regt., wounded in thigh on May 12th near Ypres, and now in Endell Military Hospital, London. Eldest son of Mrs. James Murphy, 9 King-street Gardens, Cheltenham.



PRIVATE FRED C. PARSONS, 1st Gloucester Regiment, wounded on Sunday, May 9, on Aubers Ridge, and now in Netley Hospital. He has been at the front since the beginning of the war. Son of Mr. and Mrs. G. Parsons, Badgeworth.



PTE. H. W. CLEMENTS, 1st Gloucester Regiment, wounded in head by shrapnel in France, and now in Rouen Hospital, Son of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Clements, of Grafton, Beckford, near Tewkesbury.



ACTING-CPL. C. MOULDER, 1st Batt. Rifle Brigade, wounded at St. Julien, and now in the Nottingham General Hospital. He was well-known in Cheltenham as a sportsman, and played for St. Paul's United F.C.



PRIVATE B. HAYCOX, 1st Dorset Regiment, now in Wimereux Hospital, suffering from gas poisoning. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Haycox, 55 Duke-street, Cheltenham.



PRIVATE A. GASKINS, 1st Gloucester Regiment, wounded in legs, and now in Tewkesbury Hospital. Son of Mrs. Gaskins, of Mayall's-court, Tewkesbury.

FIRST-CLASS P.-O. WILLIAM HUGHES, of H.M.S. Goliath, who went down with that ship when it was sunk by the Turks in the Dardanelles, May 13. Second son of the late Mrs. Smith, 70 London-road, Gloucester.



CORPL. HENRY BRADING, 2nd Gloucester Regiment, killed in action May 9th in France. Brother of Mrs. Taylor, Rendcomb Buildings, near Cirencester, and also of Private Albert Brading (adjoining).



PRIVATE ALBERT BRADING, 1st Gloucester Regiment, killed in action, Sept. 16th, at the battle of the Aisne, brother of Mrs. Taylor, Rendcomb Buildings, near Cirencester, and also of Corpl. H. Brading (adjoining).



L.-CORPL. JACK TOWNSEND, King's Royal Rifles, killed in action in France on May 11th. He was in charge of a machine gun, and was shot through the head while firing it. Son of Mr. J. Townsend, haulier, Hereford House, Suffolk-street, Cheltenham.



LCE.-CORPL. JAMES DAVIS, 3rd Gloucester Regiment, who died on May 23, from wounds received on May 9. His widow lives at 8 Jersey-road, Gloucester.



PRIVATE W. LANE, 2nd Gloucester Regiment, killed in action on May 10th in France. Son of Mr. and Mrs. W. Lane, 25 Swan-road, Gloucester.



RIFLEMAN W. A. LANE, 4th Batt. King's Royal Rifles, killed in action May 10th, in France. One of the three sons of Mr. and Mrs. Lane, Tibbiwell-lane, Painswick, who were fighting in France.



PRIVATE JOHN ASTON, 1/5th Gloucester Regiment, killed in action in France May 15th by a hand grenade. Eldest son of Mrs. L. Aston, Little Walford, Shipston-on-Stour, Warwick.



PRIVATE GEORGE LAWSON, of the Lancers, killed in action in Belgium on May 12th, aged 18 years. Eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Lawson, late of Dalmeny, Cheltenham, and now of Edinburgh. He was formerly at Messrs. Bryant and Co., Colonnade.



LANCE-CORPL. LESLIE J. SILVESTER, 1/5th Gloucester Regt., died in a French hospital on May 20 from wounds received in action the previous day. Son of Mr. J. A. Silvester, of 2 St. Clair-villas, Naunton Park, Cheltenham.



CORPL. HARRY BERRY, 1st Gloucester Regt., killed in Flanders on May 9th in a desperate attack of the glorious Gloucesters. He is the famous old International Rugby footballer. His wife keeps the Stag's Head Inn, Abvin-street, Gloucester.



PRIVATE REGINALD JOHN BLAKEWAY, 1/3rd Monmouth Regiment, killed in action in France on May 6th, aged 18 years. He was formerly in the 5th Gloucesters. Only son of Mrs. Blakeway, 7 Newland-street, Gloucester.

LNC-CPL. FRED GOULDING, 1st Gloucester Regiment, wounded in action near Ypres, and now in hospital. He is the old Gloucester City and County and Cheltenham footballer, and served through the Boer War. He served for some time in the 10th Gloucesters, and was drafted out. Son of Mrs. Goulding, 114 Millbrook-street, Gloucester.



BOMBARDIER B. GOULDING, R.G.A., in hospital suffering from effects of poisonous gas. He came over with first contingent of Canadians. Son of Mrs. Goulding, 114 Millbrook-street, Gloucester.



PRIVATE JAMES BURFORD, 1/8th Middlesex Regt. (T.F.), "missing" since fighting near Zonnebeke, April 26th. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Burford, of Uckington, and was for three and half years with the Cheltenham Volunteers, while apprenticed to Messrs. Shirer and Haddon.



PRIVATE FRANCIS J. LEACH, 1st Gloucester Regiment, who, after returning to trenches on Feb. 9, after an operation in England, was badly wounded on Sunday, May 9; his right hand being shattered by shrapnel at Ypres. He is now in Norwich Hospital. Son of Mr. A. J. Leach, Float House, Minsterworth.



PTE. EDWARD WM. FORD, 2nd Gloucester Regiment, killed in action May 12th, in France, aged 22 years. Son of Mrs. Ford, 10 Worcester-street, Cheltenham. He came from China with his regiment for the front.



CORPORAL A. ALDRIDGE, 1st Gloucester Regiment, wounded in action in France for the second time, and now in hospital at Sandgate, Kent. Son of Mr. A. Aldridge, 111 New-street, Gloucester.



PRIVATE DANIEL R. SALLIS, 2nd Gloucester Regiment, wounded in head and arm in action in France, and now in Marlborough Hospital, Boulogne. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Sallis, Pamington, Ashchurch, near Tewkesbury.



PRIVATE FREDK. ALDER, 1st Gloucester Regiment, killed in action on May 9th, in France. He enlisted in the 10th Gloucesters in August, and was transferred in December. His home was in Stroud.



PRIVATE E. T. GAMMON, Worcester Regiment, wounded March 15th in thigh in France, but now all right, and gone to Dardanelles. Husband of Mrs. Gammon, 9 Northfield-terrace, Cheltenham.



PRIVATE F. A. HANN, 1st Grenadier Guards, wounded in head and neck in France, April 30. Nephew of Mr. and Mrs. Tovey, 1 Salford-cottages, High-street, Prestbury



L.-CPL. F. A. WILLIAMS, 1st Gloucester Regiment, wounded at Ypres May 9th, and now in London hospital. His home is at 6 Little Herberts, Charlton Kings.



CORPORAL A. MORTIMER, 1st Gloucester Regiment, wounded in action in France in last big British advance. His home is 125 Southgate-street, Gloucester.

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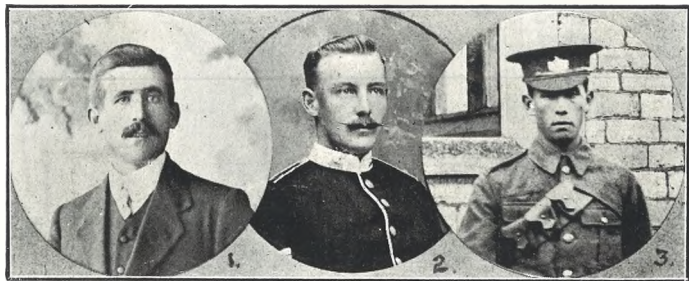

A Meal in the Trenches.

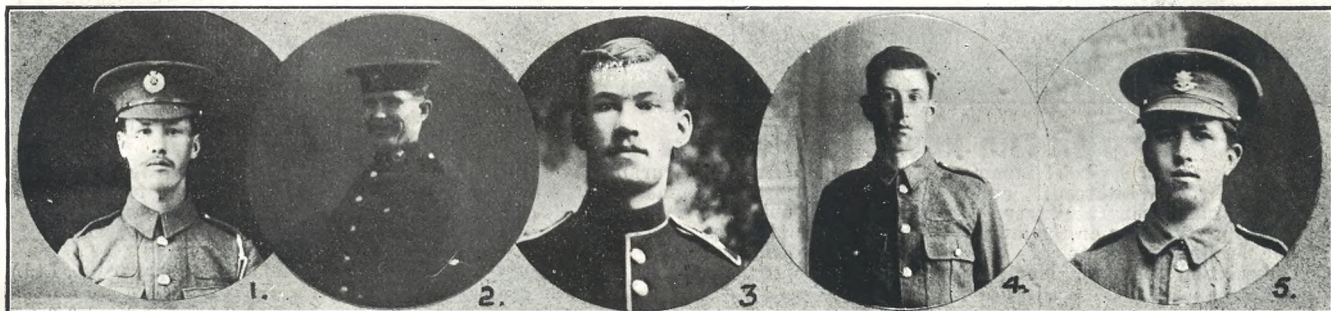

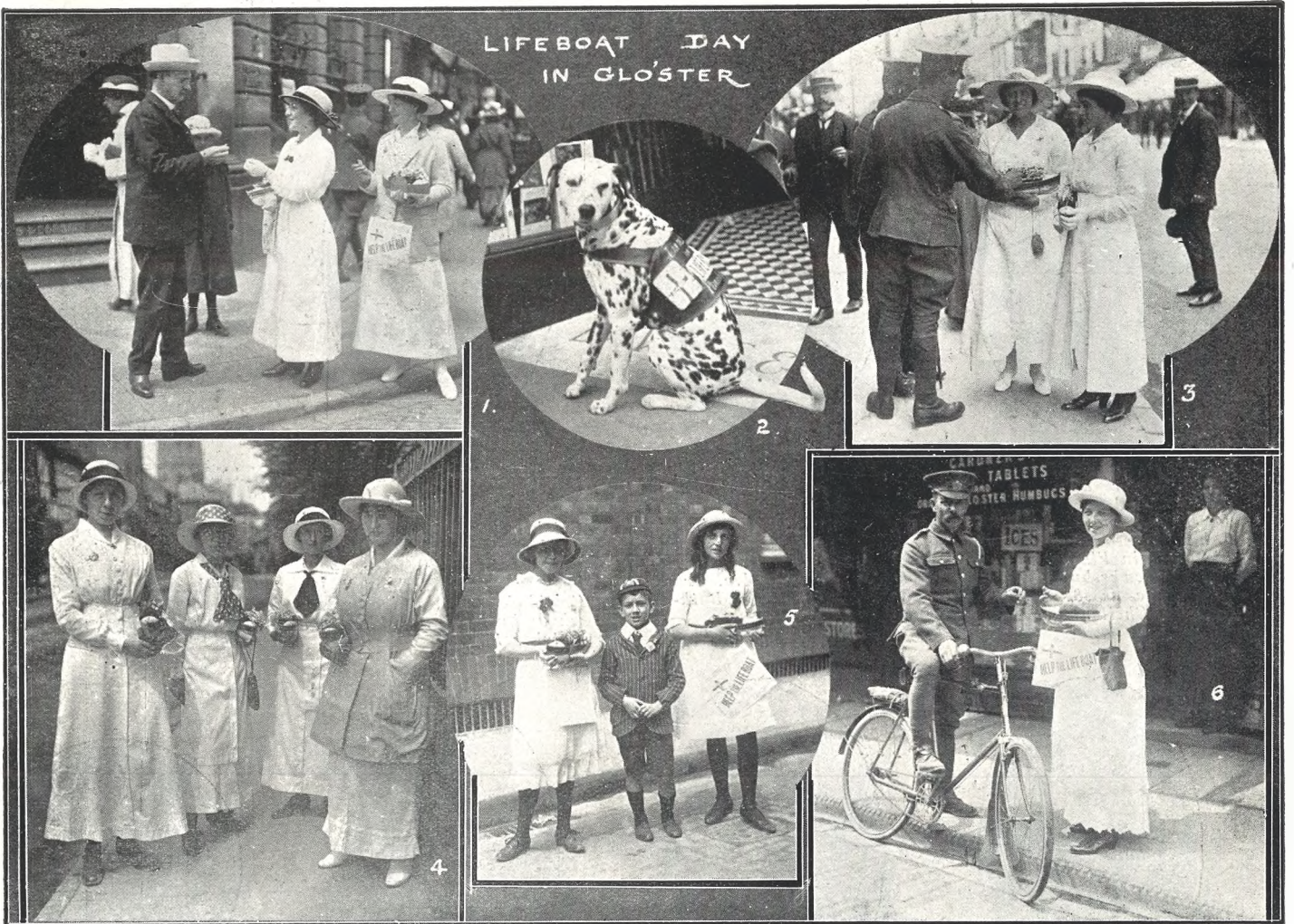

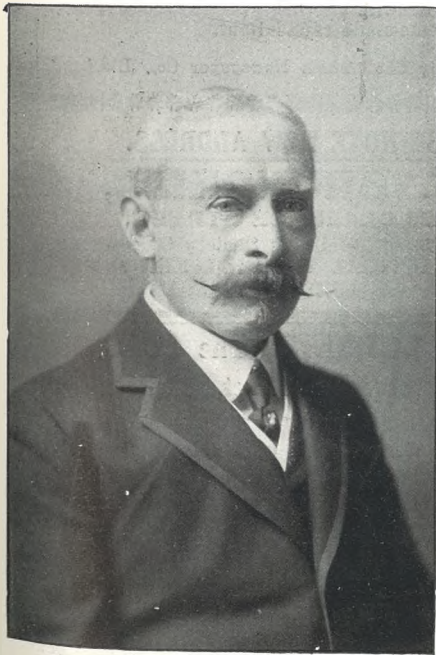

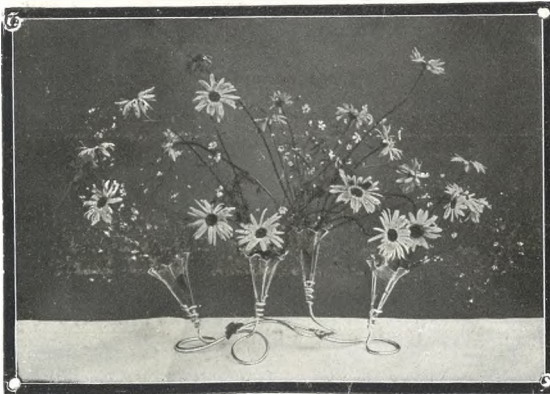


CONSECRATION OF ST. CATHERINE'S CHURCH, GLOUCESTER.

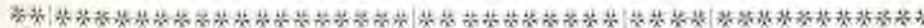
