LIEUT. CHAS. GEORGE RODNEY PHILLOTT, Royal Navy, killed while at sea on service, Dec. 26th, aged 24 years. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. G. H. Phillott, of Plas Trevor, Charlton Kings, and was a most promising naval officer, with considerable submarine experience. Great sympathy is felt with his family.



PTE. CECIL H. COLLINS-WILLIAMS, 1st Canadian Contingent (Toronto Regiment), killed in action in France, April 23rd, 1915, when 8,000 Canadians kept back 60,000 Germans. Second son of Rev. T. Collins-Williams, Bideford, London-road, Cheltenham. He was first reported missing, and has now been officially reported killed.



PTE. JAMES WALTON, 10th Worcesters, wounded in neck, Dec. 12, while in action in France. Son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Walton, 50a Worcester-street, Cheltenham. He is another of the many lads who enlisted from the "Echo" publishing staff at outbreak of war.



PTE. WILFRED A. BAYLEY, 12th Otago Mounted Regiment, N.Z.E.F., wounded in action on Aug. 21st in the big charge near Anzac, Gallipoli. After recuperating in Malta he recently returned to Anzac. Youngest son of Mr. G. H. Bayley, auctioneer, of Selkirk House, Cheltenham, another of whose sons is in France with the Canadians.



PTE. E. A. SANSOM, 10th Gloucester Regt., "gassed" in France during battle of October 12th, near Loos, and now in hospital at Napsbury, St. Albans, suffering from shock. Son of Mrs. Sansom, Chepstow Cott., Stonehouse.



PTE. JAS. CAUSON, 7th Gloucester Regt., invalided from Dardanelles with frost-bitten feet, and now in Florina Military Hospital, Malta. Son of Mr. James Causon, Sunny Side, Cranham, and brother of Pte. Jack Causon.



PTE. JACK CAUSON, 7th Gloucester Regt., invalided from the Dardanelles seriously ill with frost-bitten feet, and now in Valetta Military Hospital, Malta. Youngest son of Mr. James Causon, Sunny Side, Cranham.



PTE. GEO. J. H. BEDWELL, 10th Gloucesters, killed in action in France, Nov. 18th, aged 33 years. Husband of Mrs. Bedwell, 7 Kew-place, Bath-road, Cheltenham.

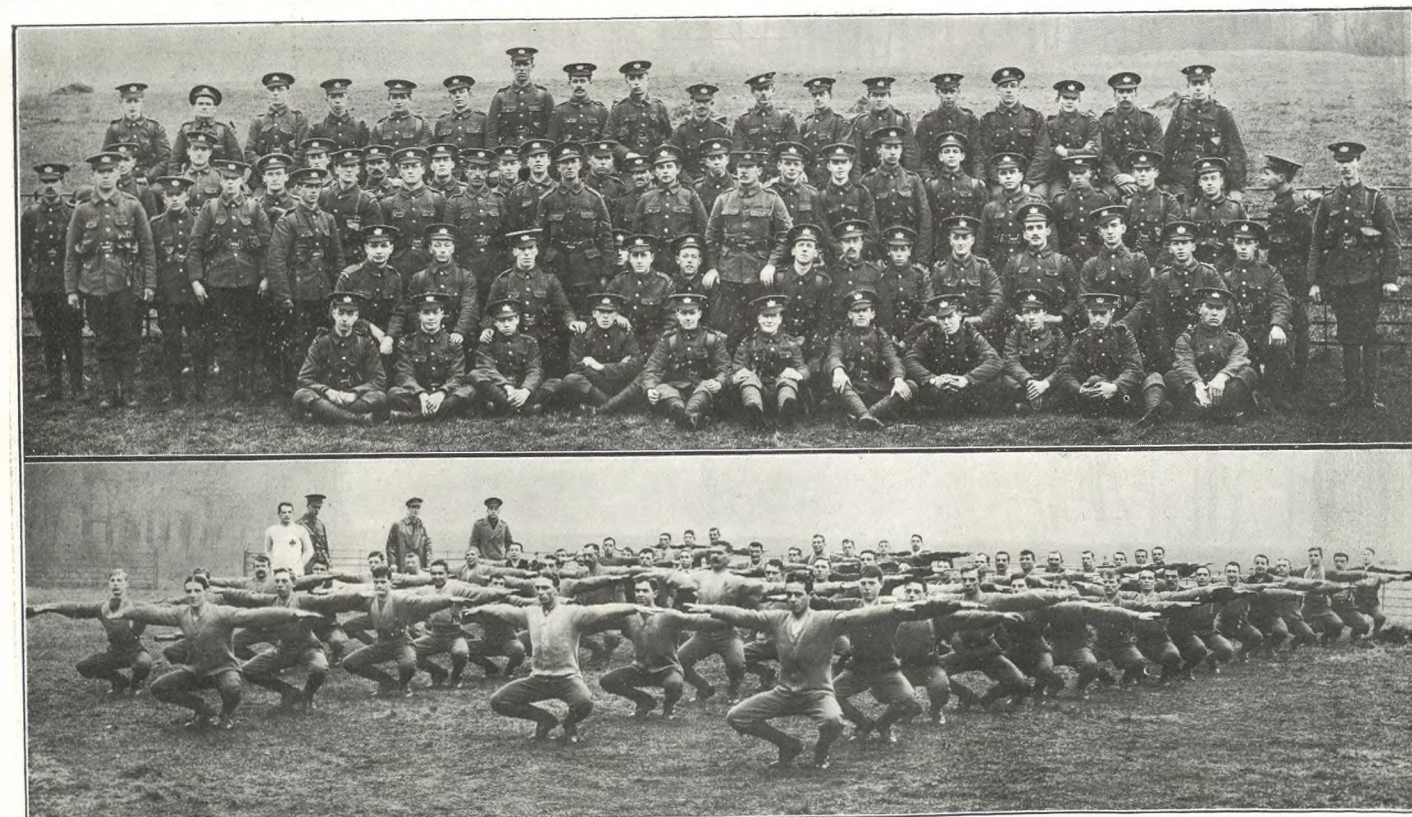

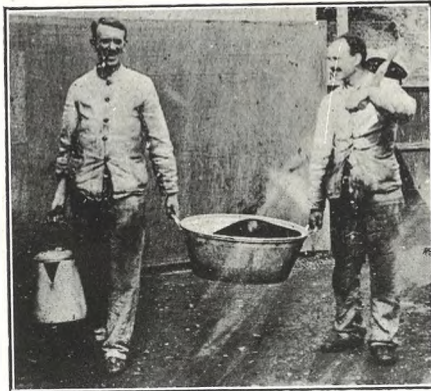

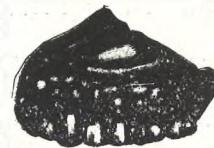

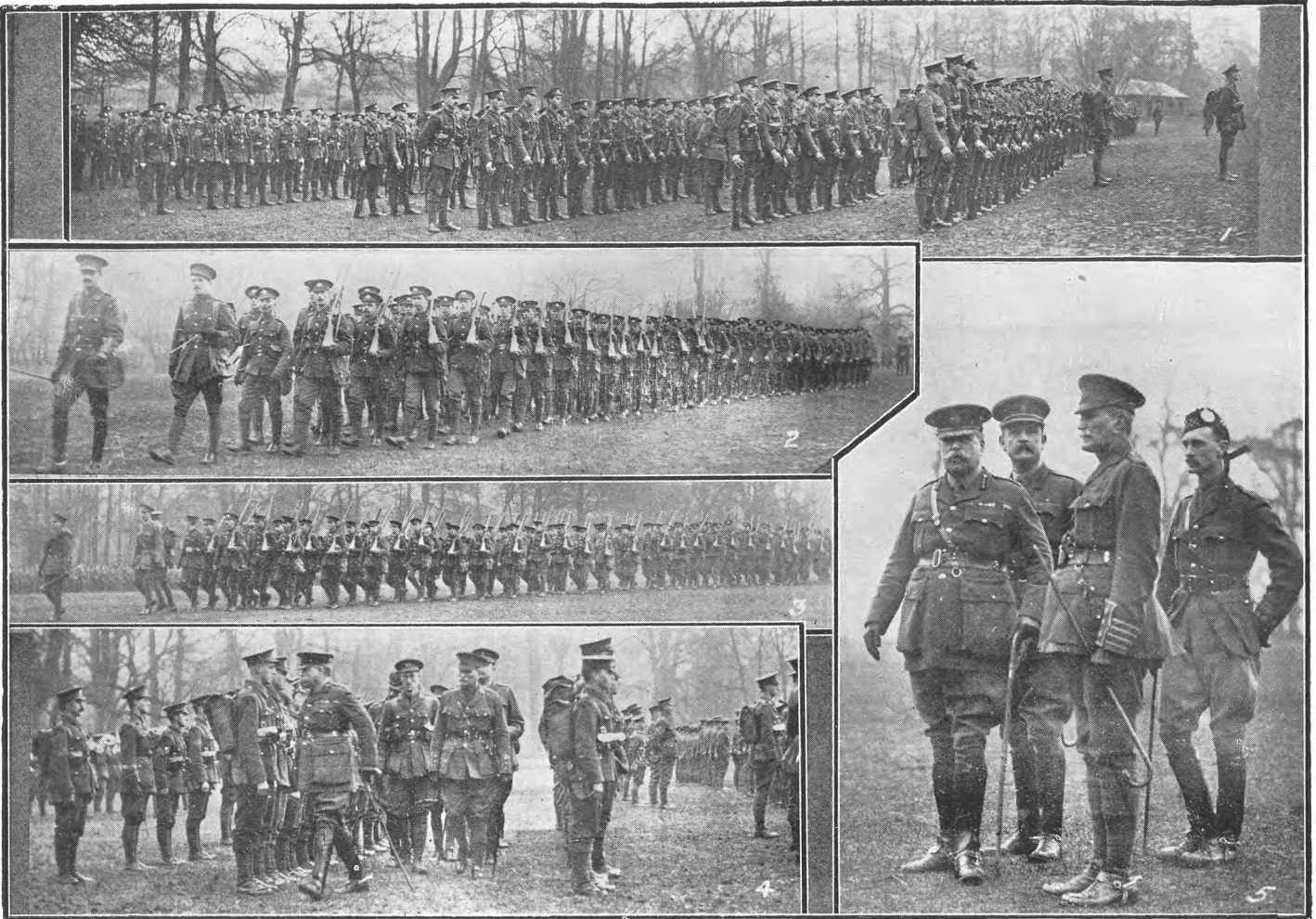

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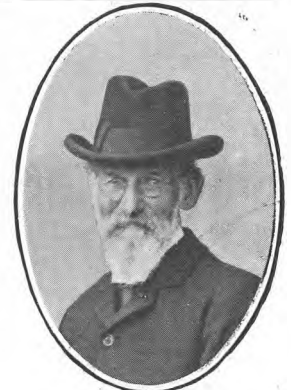

PTE. S. WALTER BILLINGS, Universities and Public Schools Corps, who was wounded in action on Jan. 2nd in France, and died next day in a clearing hospital, aged 36 years. He was a Cheltenham solicitor, the only son of the late Mr. S. Bruce Billings and Mrs. Billings, of Pen Rhys, Battledown, Cheltenham. A famous chess-player, and of great integrity and singular charm of character.



DRIVER E. J. JONES, A.S.C. (attached 32nd Divisional Train), who has been seriously ill at Rouen Hospital, and is now at Stationary Hospital, Havre, France. Son of Mrs. Jones, 11 Alstone-place, Gloucester-road, Cheltenham, who has three other sons fighting now, besides one who was killed last May in France.



PTE. C. G. MORGAN, 7th Gloucester Regiment, invalided home from Gallipoli with frost-bitten feet on Dec. 2nd, and now in hospital at Reading. Son of Pte. C. G. Morgan, of 4 Gratton-street, Cheltenham, who is now at Aldershot in the A.O.C.



CHIEF P. OFFICER W. WESTBOROUGH, Royal Naval Reserve, who has been awarded the Distinguished Service Medal for a particularly dangerous and delicate operation in connection with mine sweeping in the North Sea. 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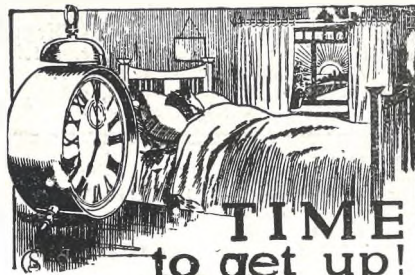

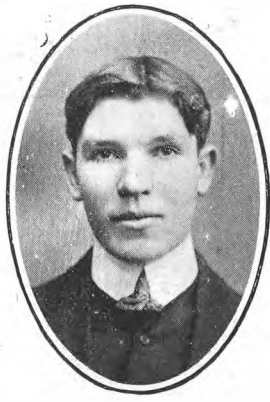
