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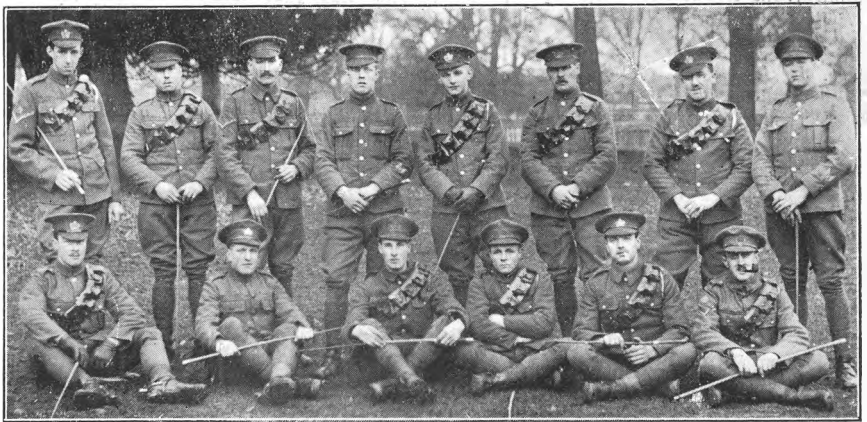

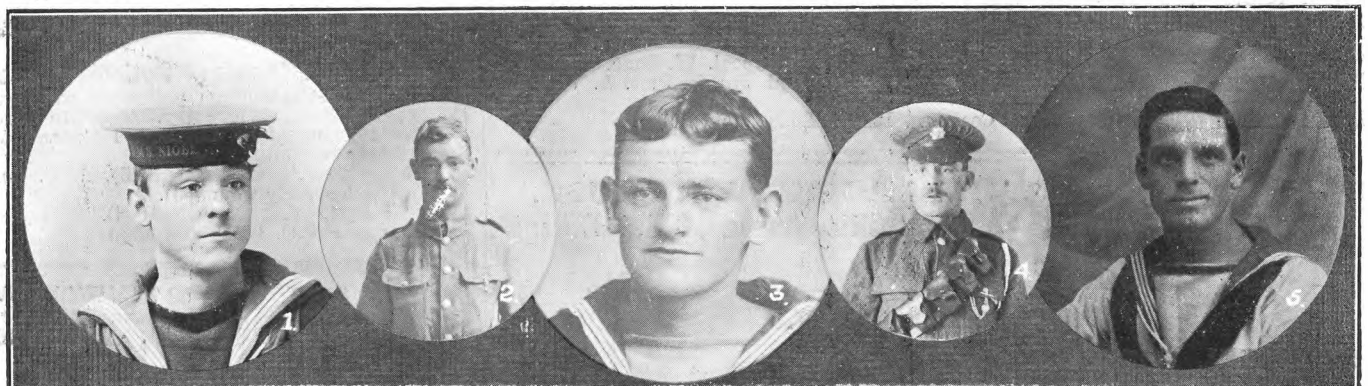


CHILDREN'S ENTERTAINMENT AT STROUD.

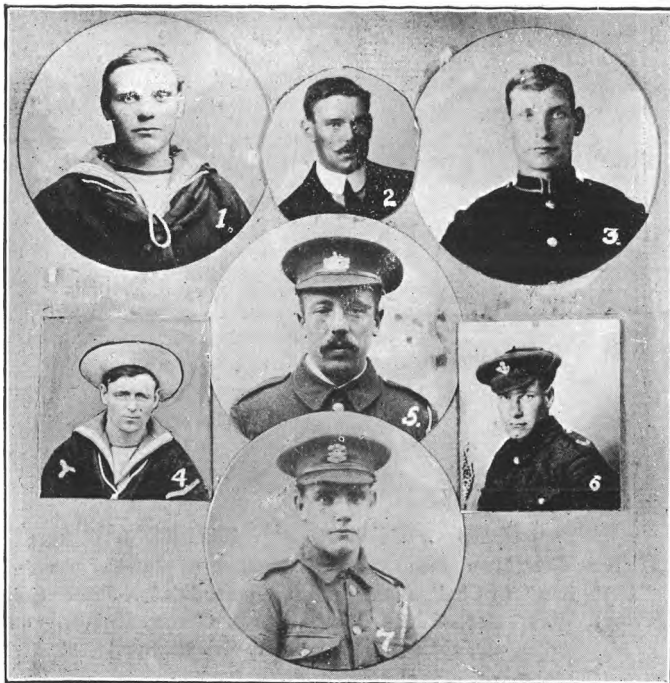

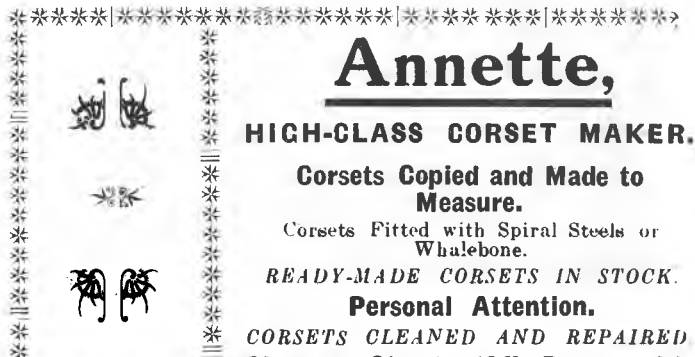

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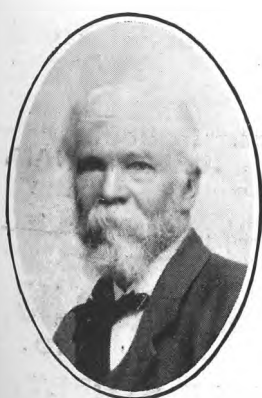

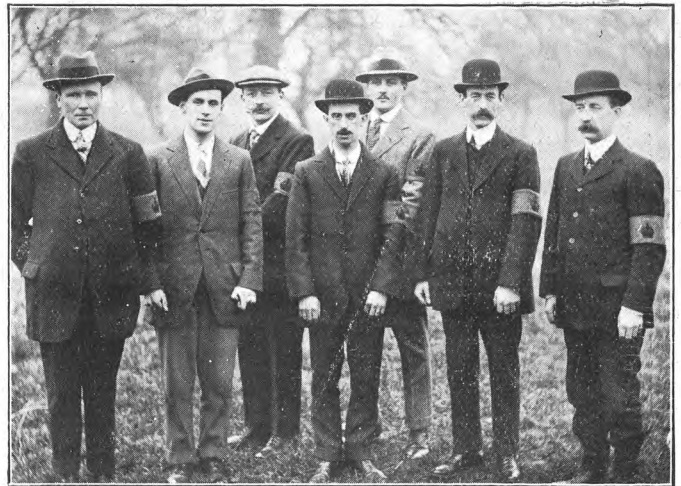

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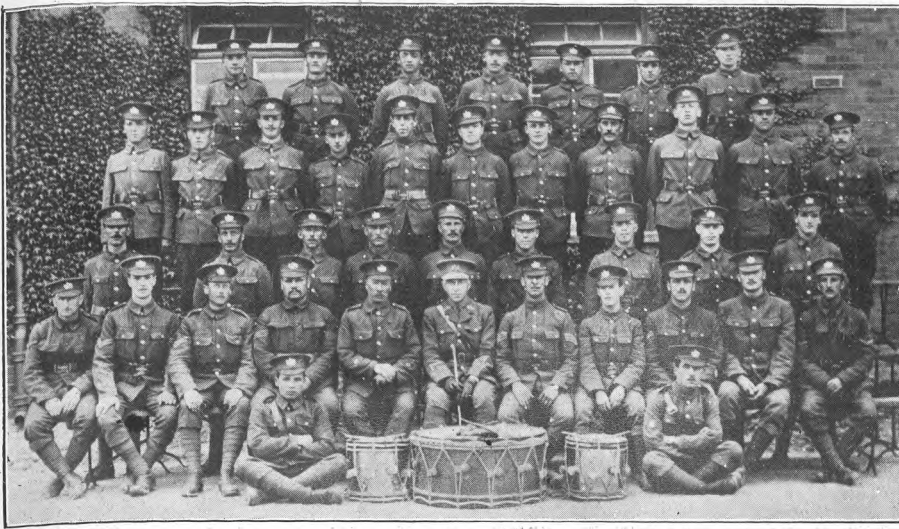

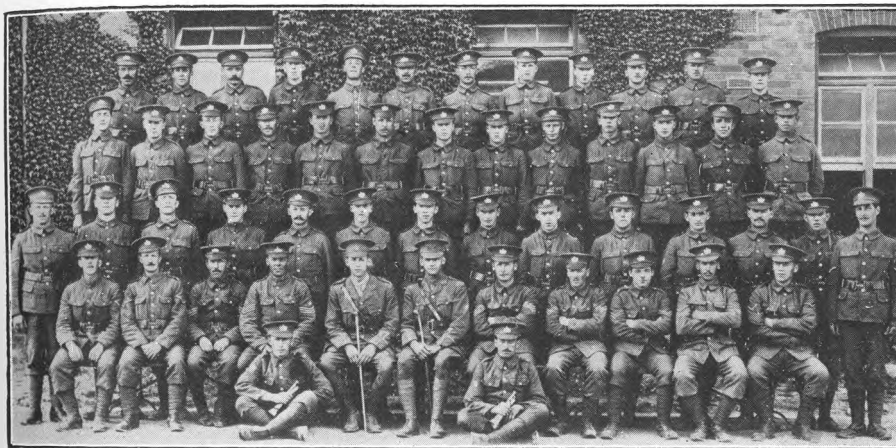

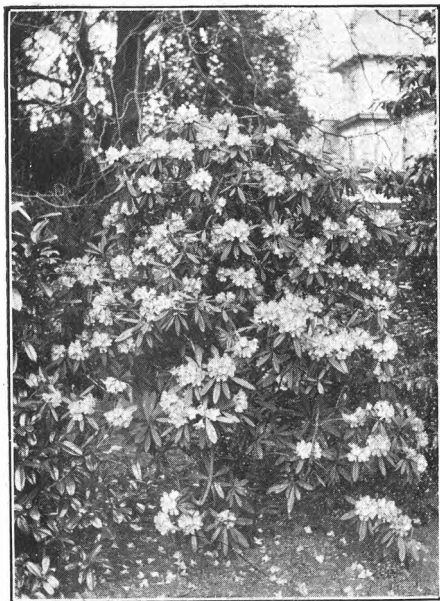

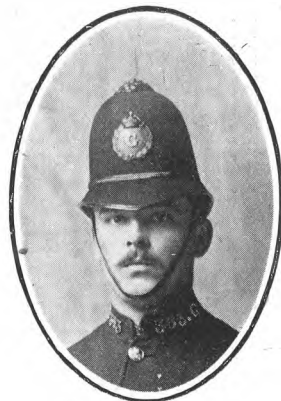
MAJOR BAZETT COLVIN GRAHAM,

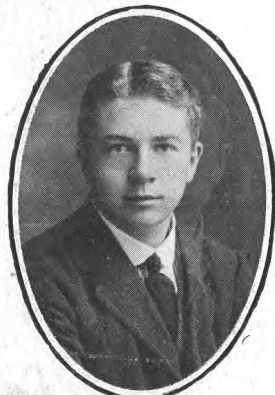
SERGT. E. WAUGH,

CORPL. E. J. MURPHY,
R.A.M.C., of Pilley-lane, Leckhampton, has been attached to the Duke of Wellington's Regiment right through the war, and was with them at Mons, Hill 60, and many another fight. He has been awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal for bravery in rescuing men from trenches after gas attacks.



PTE. W. HAWKINS,

Formerly 3rd, now 7th Gloucester Regiment, wounded in action at the Dardanelles on Dec. 30th, and now in Zagzig Hospital. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Lediard, of Cheltenham Golf Club. He was an old Christ Church boy, and was a clerk in G.W.R. Goods Depot at Birkenhead until outbreak of war.



CORPL. F. KEATES,
4th Royal Irish Dragoons, wounded in France at Soissons on Sept. 20th, 1914, after recovering he rejoined his regiment on Nov. 30th, 1915, and was again wounded on Jan. 25th, 1916. Second son of Mr. and Mrs. Keates, 27 Lower Westgate-street, Gloucester.



SGT. ALBERT H. HULL,
2nd Bati. Grenadier Guards, seriously wounded in Flanders in October, 1915. He was formerly a constable in the Gloucester City Police Force, and was called up at the commencement of the war.

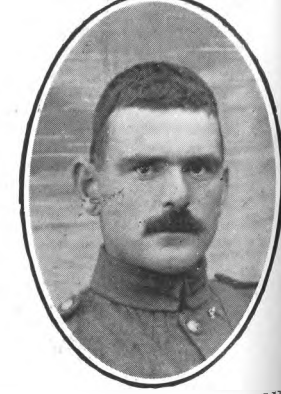
C.-Q.-M.-S. C. CROWTHER,

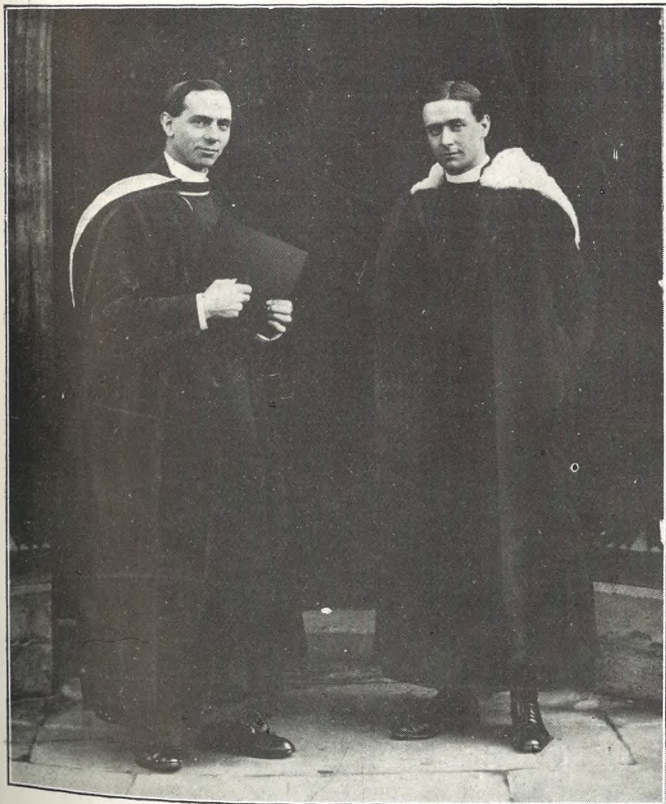

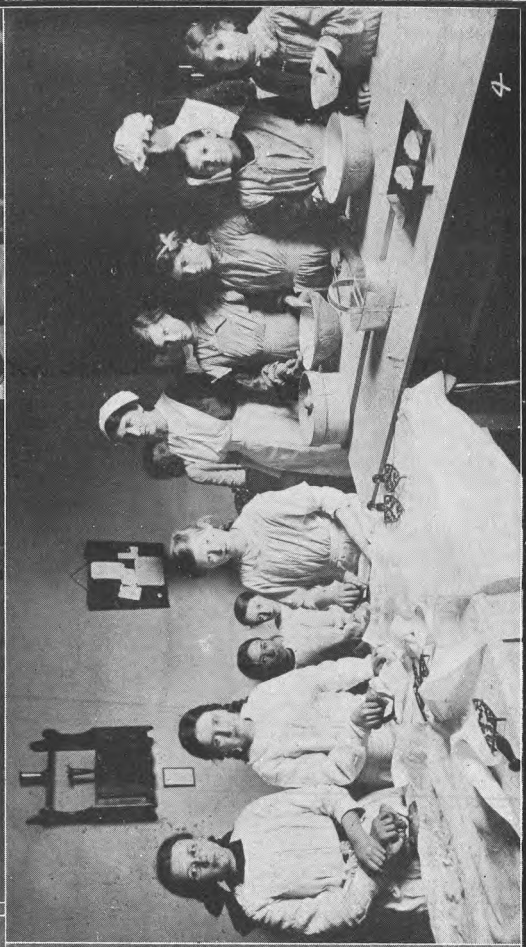

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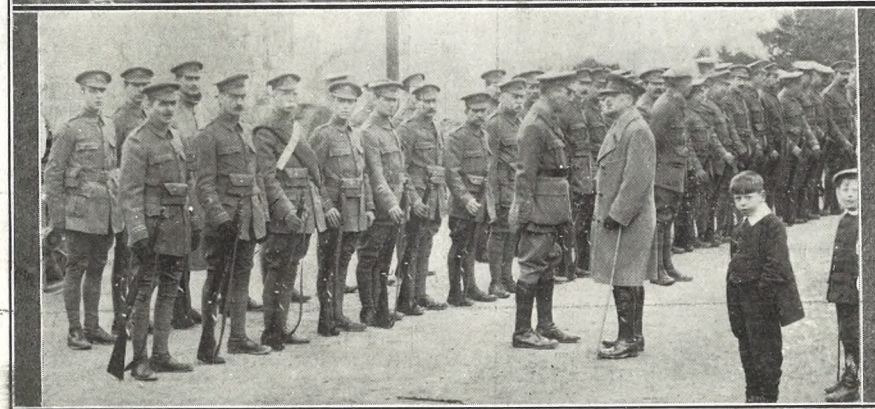
