

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



SERGT. E. WAUGH, 9th Gloucester Regt., slightly wounded while in France, and now lying seriously ill with enteric in hospital at Salonika. He enlisted at outbreak of war, and was trained in Cheltenham. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Waugh, of Burngreave Bank, Pitsmoor, Shefjield.



CORPL. F. KEATES, 4th Royal Irish Dragoons, wounded in France at Soissons on Sept. 20th, 1914; after recovering he rejoined his regiment on Nov. 30th, 1915, and was again wounded on Jan. 25th, 1916. Second son of Mr. and Mrs. Keates, 27 Lower Westgate-street, Gloucester.







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

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


